Naval Funds Approved By Both Houses

Over Billion Marked For Speeding Ship Construction

WASHINGTON, May 1 (AP)—The senate today approved a \$3,415,521,750 naval appropriations bill containing \$1,515,000,000 to speed the construction of 729 vessels of all types under way in the two-ocean fleet program.

Adopting a conference report previously approved by the house, the senate provided for an expenditure of \$484,550,000 on naval aviation, of which \$350,372,000 would be available for payments on 7,129 planes now on order.

Included in the measure were funds to provide an increase in enlisted personnel from 223,000 to 258,000, with 26,120 officers, as well as raising the enlisted strength of the marine corps to 50,566.

A total of \$142,000,000 in cash and \$150,000,000 in contract authority was provided for alterations and repairs to fighting ships, including the modernization of the aircraft carriers Lexington and Saratoga.

Congress wrote into the measure a limitation of 2 per cent on commissions payable on land purchase contracts. It also provided for the purchase of Argentine canned beef and other foreign products by the navy where domestic articles of satisfactory quality could not be obtained at reasonable prices.

Mayor Urges All Citizens To Help

A proclamation designating the current week as "Defense Bond and Savings Stamp Week" in Big Spring was issued Thursday by Mayor Grover C. Dunham, who called upon each citizen to do as much as he can at this time for his country. The proclamation:

"Inasmuch as our country is now faced with a serious emergency concerned with national defense and the financing of a defense program, our government has undertaken a campaign to enlist the financial and moral support of the citizenship through the sale of savings bonds and stamps.

"These savings bonds and stamps offer to every citizen an opportunity to contribute money to the building up of our armaments, an opportunity to show his confidence in the future of the nation, and an opportunity to improve his financial condition through sound and systematic savings.

"For that reason, I, Grover Dunham, as mayor of Big Spring, proclaim the week of May 1 as 'Defense Bond and Savings Stamp Week' in Big Spring.

"The citizenship of Big Spring can find no better way of demonstrating its loyalty and confidence in the government of the United States than to contribute to this savings campaign during the week. There is no goal or quota to reach in this effort; each citizen should simply do as much as he can at this time for his country."

Big Guns Pounding Dover Area Again

On the English-southeast coast on THE ENGLISH SOUTH-EAST COAST, May 1 (AP)—German cannon renewed the shelling of the Dover area tonight. Shortly after 6 p. m. (hoon. E. S. T.) two salvoes of four shells each thundered across the Dover Strait from the Nazi-occupied French coast.

American Tankers To Be Put At Disposal Of The British

Britons Accuse Lindbergh As An Obstructionist

LONDON, May 1 (AP)—R. A. Butler, undersecretary of foreign affairs, answered "yes" in the house of commons today to a member who asked him whether Charles A. Lindbergh had not "consistently, always used his influence to prevent effective action against Germany."

His questioner was conservative member S. Y. T. Adams.

The brief discussion involving Lindbergh brought a statement from Butler that the American flyer's views on the strength of the soviet union about the time of the Munich pact in September, 1938, were considered of "no undue significance" by the British government.

The house cheered this declaration.

Butler refused to answer Laborite Ellis Smith's query whether Lindbergh had used his influence "along with a well-known lady member of this house."

Also responding to a question, Butler said records showed that Lindbergh's views were available for the government's consideration.

Asked, however, whether Lindbergh ever had been interviewed by the foreign office, the undersecretary answered, "not as far as I am aware."

Compromises In Airport Plans Sought

Efforts to compromise differences of opinion on several minor points in development of a huge airport improvement program here were due to begin today between representatives of the Civil Aeronautics Administration and the Works Progress Administration here Thursday.

F. W. Callahan, San Angelo, district director of operations for WPA, and A. C. Allen, San Antonio, assistant state director of operations, arrived here shortly before noon. CAA representatives, probably A. E. Dyatt and possibly S. E. Travis, regional airport engineer, were expected from Fort Worth.

Both units were sending officials here at the request of E. V. Spence, city manager, in hopes of ironing out matters concerning specifications, particularly the type of paving to be used on seven runways.

The manager, however, stressed that the differences were of such a nature that they would not interfere with operations.

At the port everything was being put in shape for an intensive program. Lines for the new property which gives the port approximately 720 acres have been run and fencing is on hand. Caliche pits are being located, and labor supply is being listed here, and in Martin and Midland counties.

FINNS TO 'CATCH UP' ON THEIR WAR DEBT

WASHINGTON, May 1 (AP)—Finland, which lost its standing as the only up-to-date payer on World War debts last December, contracted with the treasury today to catch up.

Will Be Used Outside War Zone, With Transfer Of Cargo; Additional Shipping May Be Rounded Up

WASHINGTON, May 1 (AP)—In quick response to President Roosevelt's request for ships for this country's "all-out aid to the democracies," the maritime commission made plans today to place 30 American tankers in the service of the British within the next few days.

All operators of American tankers of over 5,000 gross tons are being called on for aid in the program.

The tentative plan does not call for a transfer of registry of tankers to the British, but for their use outside the war zone for the direct benefit of the British.

Under the proposal the tankers would be operated from oil-producing countries along the north coast of South America to United States North Atlantic ports.

At the North Atlantic ports the oil would be transferred to British tankers for the remainder of the trip.

Shipping experts said the transfer of a cargo from one tanker to another is not a difficult operation, such as would be involved in the transfer of general cargo from one vessel to another.

The commission was asked by the president last night to begin rounding up 2,000,000 tons of shipping to carry around "vital war materials."

President Roosevelt, himself, was reported ready to order the prompt requisitioning of 2,000 vessels in United States ports as one of the first steps toward the objective.

Requisitioning of 80 axis and Danish vessels aggregating 800,000 tons would provide—as a starter—approximately 15 per cent of the 5,000,000 tons the president called for "at the earliest possible moment" to transport the raw materials required by American defense industries and the war supplies needed by nations resisting aggression.

"Vital war materials are piling up at the ports or delayed at the factories," Mr. Roosevelt declared. "We must supply these ships and at once."

Official Australian reports said Hitler's conquering legions suffered "colossal losses in men and machines" in the Greek campaign, while the British war office declared more than 80 per cent of the 60,000 B. E. F. troops who fought to defend the Aegean kingdom had been rescued by sea.

A communique by the British Middle East command indicated that at least some of the 9,000 remaining men were still being removed from the bullet-splattered beaches of the Grecian Peloponnese.

Total B. E. F. casualties were listed at 3,000 killed and wounded. Australia's acting prime minister A. W. Fadden, in Melbourne, announced the "colossal" German casualties. He gave no specific figures.

Informed military circles in London freely predicted that a grand-scale naval assault on Egypt and the Suez canal, by way of French-mandated Syria and Palestine, would break within 10 days.

At the same time, these sources said, other axis columns striking from Libya would join in a giant pincer movement.

Cosden Hikes Wages 5 Pct.

A wage increase of five per cent, for all operating employees in the refining (Big Spring and Graham), pipeline and production departments, was announced Thursday by the Cosden Petroleum corporation, Raymond L. Tollett, president of the company, said the increase became effective today, May 1, beginning of Cosden's fiscal year.

The minimum boost for operating workers is five cents an hour. Tollett estimated that the pay hike, affecting some 350 employees, represented about \$5,000 a month, approximately \$3,500 a month for Cosden employees in Big Spring and Howard county.

The increase, Tollett said, was authorized at the last meeting of Cosden's board of directors, in New York on April 22.

"The company is operating profitably, and does not its fiscal year in a stronger position," Tollett said. "Directors were encouraged over prospects for future operations, and voted the wage increase in line with their policy of permitting employees to participate first in company earnings."

The Cosden executive said that office workers' salaries were adjusted upward last fall.

Title Litigation Heard In Court

Trial of the case of J. H. Taylor against Leslie Walker and others, a suit for title and to cancel deed, was underway today in 70th district court.

The case was transferred to Howard county from Martin county, where it has been heard once and resulted in a mistrial.

April Trade Figures Up

Added strength was noted in three business indices for April, although the odd pattern remained basically unchanged here, a survey of building permits, postal receipts and new passenger car registrations showed Thursday.

Most encouraging development was that in the construction field. Although the \$31,545 total for April was under the corresponding month of last year, it nevertheless was the best month of a bad building year thus far. It was well under the \$57,780 for April of 1940 but well up from the \$18,310 for March of this year. Included was \$15,515 for six new residential structures, almost on a par with last month's residential gains.

Postal receipts bounced back after a slight loss in March to reach \$7,628.33, an all-time record for the month. It was up from the \$7,079.71 for the same month last year and from the \$6,007.28 in March.

Maintaining its status as the pace-setter, new passenger sales boomed upward again to 144 for April, a substantial gain over the 135 for the preceding month and far above the 79 for April 1940. The total brought the advantage over last year to 139 cars for the first four months of 1941. The April total, incidentally, was the largest on record for the month and the third largest on record for any month here.

Cooksey Trial Set For Next Monday

Trial of Tom Cooksey, former Dawson county sheriff, on a charge of kidnapping for extortion, has been set for Monday in 70th district court.

Cooksey has been arraigned before Judge Cecil Collins and has entered a plea of innocence. A special venire of 75 men is being summoned to supply jurors for the trial, said District Clerk Hugh Dunagan.

Tom Good's Annual Spring Drive Starts

A herd of bawling long yearlings, 1,500 of them, shuffled along a 25-mile trail from the Bar-J ranch, north of here, today as Tom Good, pioneer rancher, started his 20th spring drive to market.

Like a scene from the old west, the trip is being made much like those common to early days of this section. Two days of driving across the rugged "breaks" of Borden and Dawson counties will be required to bring the steers to a rail point north of Lamesa for loading Saturday noon.

Good is shipping the yearlings to stockers to buyers at Raton, N. M.

Leading out on the drive was the traditional chuck wagon, with J. J. Southern as cook. Tonight the 10 cowhands riding herd—and members of Good's family—will camp at the old home place 35 miles northwest of Big Spring, and Friday night the herd will be bedded down near the Dean ranch, 12 miles east of Lamesa.

The drive had its modern touches, however. Art Wintehiser, manager of the Big Spring airport, flew over pastures where cowboys were "scouting" for calves missed in Wednesday's roundup and aided by dropping notes to the punchers.

Volunteers To Leave May 6

Six young Howard county men, all volunteers, will leave on the Sunshine Special May 6 for Fort Bliss to begin a year's service in the army.

They will report to the selective service board office here at 8 p. m. on that date and board the train at 9 p. m.

The volunteers are Chester Conroe, Blake, James, Melvin Wray, Edmond Mears, James Daniel Jackson, Edson Taylor, John Lawrence Hasey, Mears is an under-age volunteer, not coming within the draft age limits.

Alternates named are Julian Napoleon Pond, William Edward Pate and John Truman Reynolds. They will be called to fill vacancies occurring if any of the regular quota fail to qualify.

The six Howard county men will be part of a quota of 1,000 men for Texas.

Next draft call is set May 19, when 600 Texas negroes will join the army. Howard county, however, did not receive a quota under this call, due to its small negro population.

No negroes have yet reported for army service from Howard county, since no call has been issued to the local board. However, Bruce Frazer, board clerk, reports that several negroes have volunteered and are awaiting a call.

The army plans to induct approximately 8,600 additional Texas men before July 1 to complete the first year's quota.

FD Purchases First Bond For Defense

WASHINGTON, May 1 (AP)—Urged by President Roosevelt to participate in the nation's "all-out effort to perpetuate democracy," Americans young and old stepped up to post office and bank windows today to begin investing in defense savings bonds and stamps.

Public sale of the new securities started throughout the country today. The president led the way last night, launching the bond sale program in a national broadcast address. He announced he was buying a bond of \$500 denomination, the White House said later, for Mrs. Roosevelt, and 16 defense savings stamps (25-cent denomination) for each of his grandchildren.

In a frank and clear appeal for financial support to pay for our armament, and to pay for the American existence of later generations, the president expressed hope that the sale of bonds and stamps would "reach down to the individual and the family in every community, and on every farm, in every state and every possession of the United States."

Postoffices, banks, department stores and other organizations will participate in the sale of the bonds in denominations, from \$25 to \$10,000, and of the savings stamps (25 cents to \$5), which bear no interest but can be exchanged for the interest-bearing securities.

Funds For Highway To Panama Asked

WASHINGTON, May 1 (AP)—President Roosevelt asked congress today to authorize a \$20,000,000 appropriation for construction of an inter-American highway as far as the Panama Canal.

Defense Bond And Stamp Sales Hit \$12,650 Here

Big Springers trekked, along with other U.S. citizens, to banks and postoffice windows Thursday, to invest their savings in defense bonds and postal savings stamps, in response to a call from the treasury for public participation in the all-out defense financing program.

Local agencies reported that up to noon, \$12,650 in bonds and stamps had been placed.

Bond sales at the postoffice totaled \$3,037.50, and stamp sales were \$102.50. At the State National bank, \$4,100 in bonds had been sold, with the first sale of a \$1,000 bond going to A. B. Wade and wife, Mrs. Martha Wade. Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Collins were first purchasers at the postoffice.

The First National bank reported its morning sales aggregated \$5,460.

Meanwhile, publicity efforts were continuing to arouse more people for the cause of adding Uncle Sam while making systematic savings. A city-wide patriotic rally is scheduled for Friday afternoon on the courthouse lawn, immediately following the Safety parade, which will move off at 4 p. m.

District Judge Cecil Collins and Jas. T. Brooks will be speakers, and the Big Spring band will play. J. B. Collins will preside.

The savings stamp proposal was put before school children of the county today. Cliff Wiley spoke before Big Spring high school students, Ray Ogden took the sales message to the Forsan pupils, and Collins was to speak before Cosmo students this afternoon.

All school children in the county have been asked to take part in an essay contest, writing on "Why Everybody Should Buy Defense Bonds and Savings Stamps." Winners will be named in each school in the county, with prizes of \$1, 50c and 25c in saving stamps awarded.

AUSTIN, May 1 (AP)—Residents of the state capital bought an estimated \$30,000 of defense savings bonds during the first hour of their sale today.

MARFA, May 1 (AP)—Sale of United States defense savings bonds totaled \$55,000 at 9 a. m. today in this town of 3,896 population.

Coal Miners Go Back To Work

Safety Week Observance To Be Climaxed With Parade Friday

Safety Week, being observed here, will be climaxed Friday at 4 p. m. with a long parade through the business district. Roy Reeder, safety council president, reminded

Joining in the parade also will be sections boosting the sale of defense bonds—an item of "safety" for the nation. With this in mind, leaders of the parade have decided on a big rally on the courthouse lawn to popularize the sale of bonds and stamps to help finance the huge defense program.

Tax Measure To O'Daniel For Signature

AUSTIN, May 1 (AP)—Amid wholesale flow of bills between houses of the legislature and to Governor W. Lee O'Daniel for signature—indicating approaching adjournment of the regular session—lawmakers today awaited O'Daniel's action on the \$22,000,000 tax bill.

The measure, nearly tripling social security spending in Texas, was due on the governor's desk for approval and most legislators were betting he would sign it—and possibly run for the vacant U. S. senate seat.

Both houses must agree on a date for adjournment before they can quit and one such resolution, specifying May 15, the day the legislature's salaries drop from \$10 a day to \$4 was proposed yesterday in the senate. Several have appeared in the house but as yet there has been no action. O'Daniel urged eleventh-hour enactment of a bill recommended by Attorney General Gerald C. Mann. The legislation would curb participation of utility corporations in municipal bond elections.

The governor also asked speedy appropriation of \$1,028,000 to bolster old age pensions payments, due a slash of \$3 each this month. The omnibus tax bill provided \$1,000,000 a month until Sept. 1. O'Daniel believed the funds from the bill, if signed, would come too late.

A house bill authorizing a \$1,200,000 loan from the county road and district indebtedness fund to forestall a pension cut rested in a senate committee.

The house killed, after friendly wrangling, a proposed constitutional amendment increasing the term of elective state, district and precinct officers from two to four years. The proposal also would have paid legislators \$10 a day the year around.

Apparently ready for conference committee consideration was a bill limiting issuance of liquor prescriptions to 100 in 90 days by physicians in dry counties.

Bills receiving final approval in either house included ones to lift the 100-acre restriction on county parks, authorize counties to use money seized in gambling raids for investigations, permit courts to commit delinquent children to homes in addition to institutions, require examinations for recording agents and solicitors for insurance companies, authorize counties and home rule cities by local option elections to levy a tax of 5 cents on \$100 valuation for advertising purposes, simplify organization of soil conservation districts, permit state colleges to tag \$5 of each tuition fee for building purposes, authorize counties to levy a tax for park purposes.

A bill requiring the governor to make appointments to any office within 10 days after vacancies occur was introduced in the house. The house appropriations committee favorably reported bills allocating \$300,000 for an anti-tuberculosis program and \$1,700,000 for cancer research.

Among bills which became law through O'Daniel's filing them with the secretary of state were ones to permit soldiers to fish without licenses in salt water, allow counties to negotiate with the federal government for money in lieu of taxes on resettlement and rehabilitation properties, allow state banks to invest in F.H.A. mortgages, permit cities to condemn property for drilling water wells, allow school districts to vote taxes to repair condemned buildings, and others.

New State Park Dedicated By Neff
AUSTIN, May 1 (AP)—Dedication of the new Fort Parker state park and the nearby restored fort attracted hundreds of Texans today to the site where, 105 years ago, occurred one of the bloodiest massacres in the state's history. An address by former Governor Pat Neff of Waco was the highlight of the all-day program. Most of the fort's residents were killed during the brutal attack on May 19, 1836, but among the survivors was nine-year-old Cynthia Ann Parker who was taken captive. She lived among the Indians until 1860, when she was recaptured by whites.

ASCAP MUSIC MAY RETURN TO MUTUAL

NEW YORK, May 1 (AP)—The Mutual Broadcasting System announced today it had reached an agreement with American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers on a proposal that may return 1,250,000 ASCAP-controlled songs to its airwaves shortly after an absence of four months.

Declaring the end of the radio-music war appeared imminent, Mutual said terms of the agreement had been mailed to its 175 member and affiliated stations for approval, with the stations being offered their choice of two plans to be effective for any period up to Jan. 1, 1950.

WHEAT STOCKS UP

AUSTIN, May 1 (AP)—Stocks of wheat in Texas interior mills, elevators and warehouses on April 1 were estimated by the agricultural marketing service today at 8,125,000 bushels, by far the largest April 1 stocks since estimates were begun in 1931.

Strike Moratorium Plan Is Proposed

WASHINGTON, May 1 (AP)—A proposal for a moratorium on strikes in defense industries is being pushed through the joint efforts of "patriotic labor and industrial leaders" was placed before the United States chamber of commerce today by its resolutions committee.

The proposed resolution also declared it to be "intolerable" that anyone should threaten to interrupt defense production "for purposes of coercion" and added that "such acts are offenses against the public safety, and offenders should be subject to the penalties of the laws they violate."

Another proposed resolution, on "federal finance," called for a \$2,000,000,000 reduction in non-defense expenditures and for tax increases in unspecified amounts which should be "limited in duration to the period of the emergency with the burden fairly distributed."

Diplomat Fails In Plan For A U-Boat Getaway

DURAZZO, Albania, April 28 (Delayed AP)—Ronald Ian Campbell, British minister to Yugoslavia, is stranded in this Albanian port with staff after failing in a daring plan to escape the invading axis armies by submarine.

The British officials with their families and a sprinkling of Greek, Belgian and Polish diplomats from Belgrade—about 40 persons in all—were found in a Durazzo hotel by foreign correspondents who arrived here from Rome on their way to the former Italian-Greek warfront.

The party had been at the hotel for three days, not exactly refugees or prisoners but a bit of both.

They were brought here by bus from the Yugoslav port of Dubrovnik, where they were found waiting on the dock for a British submarine when Premier Mussolini's soldiers marched into the city.

While they were on the dock, the submarine sent to spirit them away poked its conning tower above the surface of the harbor, but the crew spotted the Italian soldiers on the dock, and the craft immediately submerged. That was the last seen of it.

That is the story told by the Italians.

The British themselves refused to talk to three American correspondents who, with a dozen Germans and five other Europeans, met them in the lobby of the Hotel Del Dogi.

It was only by accident that the correspondents met the diplomats.

Stamp Plan Offers Relief Client Opportunity To Get More Food At Same Cost

Families on relief who take advantage of the food stamp plan, which begins operation in Howard county May 16, will be able to "set a better table" than previously for the same amount of money they have been spending.

The food stamp plan is a system whereby the government will give to families on relief several types of food of which there is now a surplus on the market.

Instead of handing out this food directly, as it has in the past, the government will give to relief clients stamps which may be traded to regular grocery stores.

In order to get the free stamps, relief clients will be required to buy, at face value, another type of stamp. The stamps are issued in two colors, orange and blue. The relief client buys the orange stamps, and may trade them for any type of food, so long as he sets it away from the store.

Every time he buys orange stamps, the relief client will get a certain number of blue stamps—usually about half as many

blue given free as orange stamps paid for—which he may trade for any food on the surplus commodity list.

The amount of blue stamps given depends on the type of relief the underprivileged is receiving. In a few cases, notably those persons on direct relief with no sort of cash income, blue stamps will be given without the necessity of purchasing orange stamps.

A certain family now may be spending \$20 per month cash for food. Under the food stamp plan, he may, for example, be allowed \$10 worth of blue stamps for every \$20 in brown stamps bought. Thus, at his same old expense of \$20 per month, the relief client can get \$30 worth of food under the new plan.

The plan is entirely voluntary. If the reliever wishes, he may continue to buy his groceries with cash, ignoring the opportunity of buying stamps. Experience in other counties where the food stamp plan is operated, however, shows the large majority of people on relief anxious to get the extra food available at no cost under this system.

How will a person know if he is eligible? Each eligible person will receive a letter from the department of welfare. This letter should be taken to the stamp issuing office in the county courtroom on first floor of the courthouse by the person to whom it is addressed. There an identification card will be issued to the person with the letter. From then on, the card must be shown whenever stamps are obtained, and it must be shown to the grocer when stamps are traded in, unless the grocer is acquainted with the customer.

The stamps will be issued on books. Book covers must be kept and returned to the stamp issuing office ever so often, as will be explained when they are issued. Relief clients who do not understand this system should confer with workers at the county department of public welfare office at 309 West Second street.

Johnson Replies To Refusal Of Commission

WASHINGTON, May 1 (AP)—In the opinion of Hugh S. Johnson, President Roosevelt's action in denying a renewal of his commission as a brigadier general in the reserve corps was "neither very wise nor very consistent with what at least used to be a very close and precious friendship."

The 66-year-old newspaper columnist yesterday made public a letter he wrote to the president to that effect. Johnson declared the White House had given "misleading, so-called reasons" for the non-renewal.

Rep. Bender (R-Ohio) took a hand in the controversy by telling the house yesterday that if Harry Hopkins was "qualified to be the No. 1 defense production man" then Johnson "surely has some qualifications to warrant him continuing in his capacity as a reserve general."

Johnson's commission expired April 10. He applied for re-appointment, the war department approved, but President Roosevelt turned him down.

The bright-eyed, witty little Sapulpa, feeling "fresh as a daisy" and itching to be up and about, admitted she was in love again, this time with John Knight, a 77-year-old neighbor.

"I'm just a fast-steppin', giddy girl," she said. "We're goin' to get married soon as I'm able to get up and cook."

Now that romance has come in to her life again, Aunt Lizzie said she needed only three things to make her birthday complete—a monkey, a canary bird and "a ride in one of them airplanes."

Aunt Lizzie's father was a full-blood Cherokee Indian. Her mother was Irish and Dutch.

"That's the meanest mixture they is," she commented. "That's why I'm tough. Man, I've been make bit six times, been bit by 'a mad dog once, had nine husbands and I'm still here."

She walked with the Cherokee over the "trail of tears" to Oklahoma and still is mad at the pale-faces because "they wouldn't let us stop and bury my pore old grandmother," who died on the trail.

She smokes a pipe and uses snuff but when offered a cigaret she shook her head.

"No, sir, I don't smoke them things, and I don't like to see any woman do that at all. Me, I like snuff and I don't just dip it. I eat it."

She lives in a three-room home at the edge of town with her son, Henry Pinkman, who will be eligible for an old age pension in two years. She hasn't heard from her 11 other children in many years.

Senatorial Candidates Outline Issues On Which To Make Race

AUSTIN, May 1—With frenzied organization plans getting under way quickly, candidates for the United States Senate to succeed the late Morris Sheppard are already outlining the issues on which they will run.

All of them will point to their records of achievement—Congressman Martin Dies to his national fame as a red-hunter; Governor W. Lee O'Daniel to his success in financing the state's social security program; Attorney General Gerald Mann to his work as Attorney General, and Congressman Lyndon Johnson to his work as a member of the lower house of Congress.

Beyond that, there is less agreement. All of them will pledge allegiance to President Roosevelt, in varying degrees. Johnson will strongly emphasize the fact that he is the president's choice for the

Senate seat; Mann will say that he will support the president but "I will wear no man's collar; I will be no man's man"; Dies will point to a record of votes which shows him favoring many new deal measures, and O'Daniel, if he is a candidate, no doubt will speak highly of Roosevelt's humanitarianism.

The labor strike problem, as yet has not been attacked vigorously. All candidates will say in guarded terms that "labor must do its part in this emergency," but as yet there has been no vigorous condemnation of the defense industry strikes. Political observers expect Governor O'Daniel to make more capital of this issue than anyone else, if he runs.

Johnson will emphasize two other items—his plan to draft executive management and brains for defense work, and his great success in getting federal projects for his district. During one year Johnson obtained more federal money for his district than was obtained for all the other congressional districts in the state, and he will emphasize that he knows the ropes and can get Texas its share of federal money. Governor O'Daniel likely will hit along this line too. He can emphasize the progress made in industrializing Texas, and will say that he can get new defense industries established in the state if he is sent to Washington.

Congressman Dies will bear down hard on his investigations of fifth-column activity, and will say that he can carry on this work more effectively if he is sent to the senate.

The pension problem will make its entrance. Mann already has declared that the federal government should make equal allotments of money to states on a per capita basis, regardless of state matching. O'Daniel will emphasize his success in getting pensions paid, saying that he can carry on the fight in Washington.

All candidates will express their sympathy for Great Britain, and before the campaign is far advanced, most of them probably will make specific promises on such issues as the conveying of supplies.

At present, there are strong indications that each candidate will conduct his own campaign, saying little about his opponents, but when the weather and the race both get hot, there is likely to be some hard slugging. Feelings rise, and the punches begin to fly as the end of a tense, hard-fought campaign is neared.

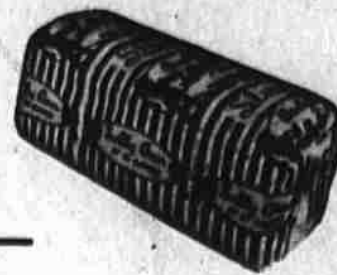

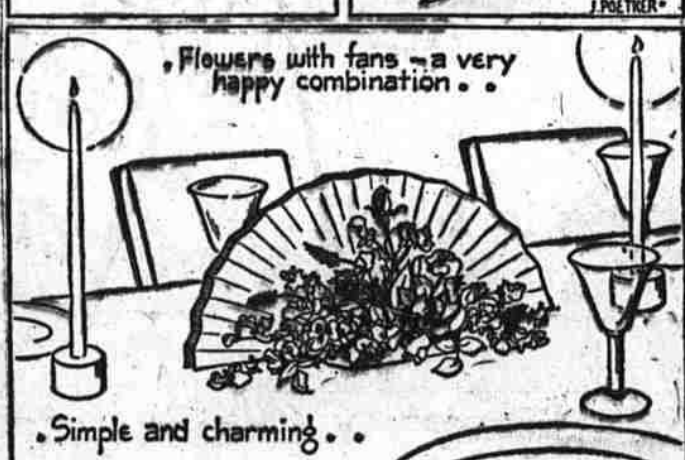
"I may be a buck private at camp, but I'm still General to the folks back home in Pinellas county."

Feathers And Fans Can Add To Beauty Of Table Arrangements

No. 1—Mother's day brings to mind a train of sentimental memories—palm leaf fans and soft summer nights. Above a pair of palm leaf fans are crossed and the ends stuck into a low, simple container. In this case an ice box dish serves as the flower bowl. I arrange stocks of peach gladioli in front of the fan background and begonia leaves at the base. Chicken wire crumpled into the container holds the flowers in place.

No. 2—Have you ever thought of what a dramatic picture can be created by using a few luscious clusters of bloom against the back-

ground of a lovely weather fan—peacock, turkey, or ostrich feathers? The fan itself can be placed in a heavy tumbler and used behind the flower arrangement to prevent its becoming damp or stained. In the above sketch three beautiful mauve and pink hydrangea clusters are used.

No. 3—Simplest of all is this charming centerpiece in which the dainty flowers we associate with "Mother's Day" are arranged on each side of a pretty, opened fan. The procedure is simple. Shallow, quarter pound butter dishes (from the dime store) are on either side of the opened fan. The fan is wired or tied to them for additional stability. Fans, sweet peas and tiny rose still the dishes. The flowers show up to great advantage against the pastel colors of the fan. Don't these ideas sound like fun? You can surely find a lovely, old, paper, lace, silk or feather fan. Try the old trunks in the attic. You may find the fans tenderly laid away in lavender-scented boxes, a more romantic era.

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Slavery Or War Is The Issue, Wallace Says

NEW YORK, May 1 (AP)—Vice President Wallace says the issue of "slavery or war" may soon be forced upon the United States.

Nazi agents, he told the New York Young Democratic club last night, are already stirring up "conflict and confusion so as to soften us in the United States for easy conquest, as they have softened and conquered other free nations."

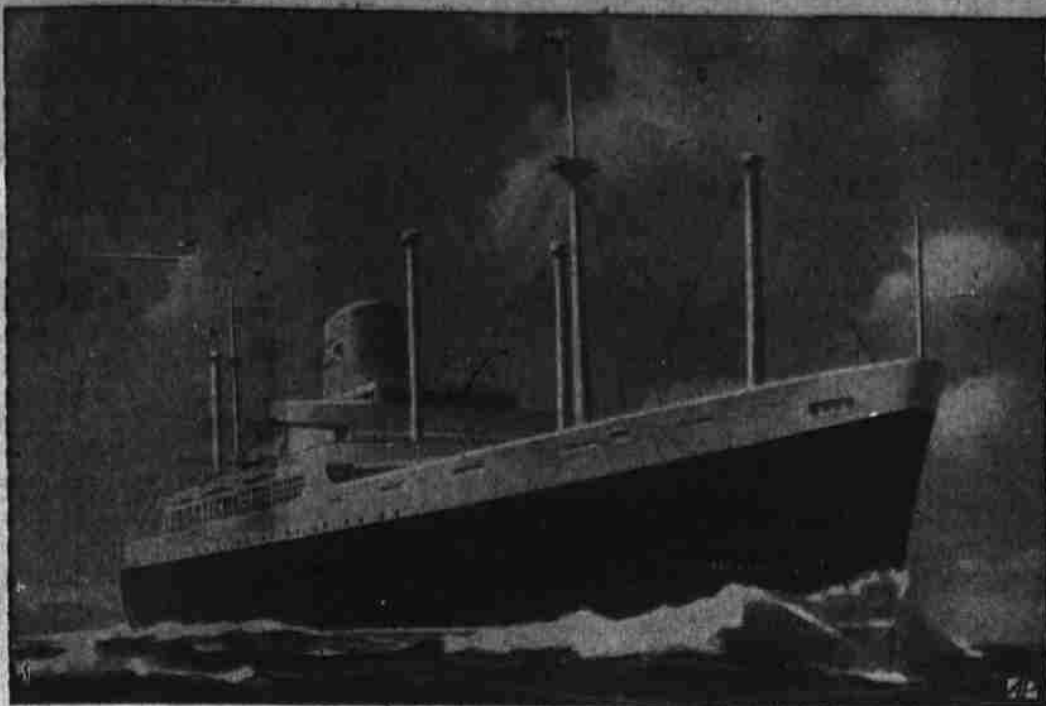

Reds To Resist Encroachments Leader Says

MOSCOW, May 1 (AP)—A warning by Defense Commissar S. K. Timoshenko that Soviet Russia is ready "to offer an annihilating re-buff to any encroachment by imperialists" ushered in a great display of the Red army's might today as the communist party celebrated May Day in traditional fashion.

Timoshenko's warning was issued in a special order of the day acclaiming Russia's achievements during the past year and emphasizing steps taken to reorganize her armed forces "in the light of experience and modern warfare" at the behest of Joseph Stalin.

He declared that it is the Soviet government's intention to adhere to a peaceful policy, but asserted soberly that "the present international situation is pregnant with all kinds of surprises."

"In these conditions," Timoshenko said, "the Red army must keep its powder dry and be in constant mobilization and preparedness so that no 'accident' and no tricks of four foreign enemies can catch us unawares."

NEW FLOOD THREAT ON GUADALUPE

CUERO, May 1 (AP)—A new rise on Peach creek, a tributary between here and Gonzales, held a continued flood threat to the Guadalupe river today although the stream's crest was standing at 27 feet.

Alimony Payer Only 17
OAKLAND, Cal. — Stanley G. Stevens is believed to be the country's youngest alimony payer.

Pending outcome of an annulment suit with his estranged bride of two months, the court has ordered he pay his 19-year-old wife \$30 monthly. Stevens is 17.

Prepayment Of Taxes Is Suggested

WASHINGTON, May 1 (AP)—Secretary Morgenthau announced today the treasury was "working on a plan" to enable citizens to prepay their taxes under the heavy rates being considered by congress.

He said he could not give details, but generally the treasury was thinking of selling a special kind of security which could be used by taxpayers to pay their taxes instead of paying cash.

Thus, a man expecting to pay \$120 income tax could prepare himself by buying a \$10 security every month of the preceding year. When tax time came around, he would turn over the securities, and avoid the necessity of borrowing money or disturbing his personal budget or disturbing his tax bill.

Morgenthau said defense savings stamps and bonds, which went on sale today, were not adaptable to this purpose, and a different type of security was being studied.

Rep. Dewey (R-N.Y.) proposed today that individuals be permitted to make advance payments in anticipation of estate taxes and that such payments be deductible from the estate in figuring the final tax.

Dewey, a former assistant treasury secretary under President Coolidge, contended that the government would derive an advantage from the immediate receipt of money and that his proposal also would aid thousands of small business men to protect their businesses from "the shock of sudden tax liability."

Issues Warning On Children's Driving Law

AUSTIN, May 1 (AP)—Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., state police director, reminded automobile owners today that no child under 14 years of age may legally drive a motor vehicle in Texas.

Persons between the ages of 14 and 16 must obtain written recommendations from their county judges in order to get a license, Col. Garrison said. No person under 16 was eligible for a license either as a commercial operator or chauffeur.

Drivers' regulations forbade licenses to all persons habitually addicted to drink or narcotics, and to any person adjudged insane, an idiot, imbecile, or feeble-minded, unless his recovery was certified by judicial decree by the superintendent of the institution from which he was released.

Persons suffering from a mental or physical disability or disease which would prevent proper control of a motor vehicle may be refused a license, Col. Garrison said.

Cheese Dishes For Thrifty Meals

You can do things with cheese! It's a help to your food budget, and equally helpful in getting variety into your meals. What's more, it goes a long way toward keeping the family feeling fit. In one pound of cheese you get the protein and fat of a whole gallon of milk, plus calcium, vitamins, and minerals. Best of all, it adds zest to many a dish. You'll never know you have tried the several recipes below.



(All Recipes Tested by Good Housekeeping Institute)

Cream-Cheese Chive Omelet

1/2 lb. cream cheese
4 tsp. finely chopped chives
6 eggs, separated

Beat egg whites until stiff, add cream cheese and chives with a spoon. Beat egg yolks until stiff, add salt and pepper. Fold omelet into thirds, cook over low heat for 10 min., or until bottom is lightly browned. Then slide in moderate oven of 350° F. for 10 min. Remove from oven, and place on a platter. Fold over omelet, and turn out onto a platter. If a skillet is used, cut across center of omelet without cutting all the way through. Then fold over carefully, and turn onto a hot platter. Garnish with parsley, watercress, or chives, and serve at once. Serves 4.

Olive-Cheese Scallop

1/2 lb. dry scallops
1/2 lb. cream cheese
1/2 lb. butter or margarine
1/2 lb. grated, processed American cheese
1/4 c. sliced stuffed olives
1/4 c. sliced stuffed olives

Remove scallops from liquid; spread olive lightly with 1/2 cup butter; then cut into 1/2" cubes. Arrange 1/2 of bread cubes in bottom of a greased 11x7-in. casserole. Sprinkle with 1/2 c. cheese and 1/4 c. olives. Repeat: Cover with remaining bread cubes, and top with remaining 1/2 c. cheese and 1/4 c. olives. Bake in hot oven of 350° F. for 10 min. Remove from oven, and place in a pan of warm water. Bake in moderate oven of 350° F. for 1 hr., or until a silver knife inserted in center comes out clean. Serves 4.

Cream-Cheese Pie

4 eggs, beaten
1/2 c. heavy cream
1/4 c. milk
1 tsp. vanilla

Line a 9" pie plate with pastry; fold the edges. Bake in hot oven of 400° F. for 10 min. Meanwhile, blend sugar, flour, and cream cheese. Add remaining ingredients, and beat with a hand beater until mixture is smooth. Pour into partially baked pie shell, and bake in moderate oven of 350° F. for 30 min., or until firm.

Cheese-Stuffed Celery Salad

1 bunch celery
1/2 cup, shredded sharp cheese

Cut tops from celery. Wash and dry each stalk. If cheese is firm, moisten by spreading consistency with milk. Fill smallest stalk with cheese. Fill next larger, and press onto back of first. Fill next, and press onto back of second. Continue, duplicating a bunch of celery. Tie with string. Chill. Slice crosswise in 1/2" slices; serve on lettuce or watercress, with French dressing. Serves 4.

Forest Fires Being Quelled

Forest fires that struck at five eastern states for the second time within a fortnight were either quelled or virtually under control today (Thursday).

New Jersey again suffered the brunt of woodland blazes as more than two dozen fires laid waste to 3,600 acres yesterday. Although the fires were reported in check today, conditions were termed "extremely critical."

Before dawn a light rain in Massachusetts and New Hampshire enabled fire fighters to gain the upper hand on every conflagration which had cut a wide swath through timberlands.

Although 28 blazes swept upstate New York forests and woodlands—which Governor Lehman proclaimed closed to the public except for "necessary business"—all were under control last night.

Uses Alarm Clock And Chemicals To Take Own Life

SOUTH BEND, Ind., May 1 (AP)—Coroner T. T. Goraszewski told today how a man found dead in a tourist cabin used an alarm clock and two chemical substances to take his life.

The coroner, who identified the man as Dr. Robert Elph, an Elkhardt, Ind., podiatrist, said that when authorities approached the cabin outside nearby Mishawaka yesterday, they found a red-lettered sign in the window reading: "Keep out. Poison gas."

After airing the cabin, authorities entered, found the body and what Goraszewski said was his death-dealing arrangement:

On a table was a bottle of chemical substance and suspended above it was a can containing another poisonous compound. Attached to the can was a string which extended to the alarm key of the clock. When the alarm rang the key wound the string around it, spilling the substance in the can into the substance in the bottle. Thus, the coroner said, a death-dealing gas was generated.

Soil Conservation Project Likely To Develop In Large Watershed Area Near Soash

Although no definite action has been taken yet, it appears that a group of farms near Soash will be the scene of the first conservation project to be carried on under direction of the Martin-Howard soil conservation district.

Applications for surveys and planning, which will be made by the federal soil conservation service staff under direction of the district's board of supervisors,

are being turned in to the supervisors, county agents and the SOCS office.

A cluster of these applications are coming in from farmers near Soash, giving promise of sufficient interest there to assure a good-sized project.

The soil conservation district supervisors will approve these applications by groups, each group representing a given watershed

area. Thus work will be coordinated, each watershed being equipped with soil conservation devices on a general basis, instead of each farm being individually terraced and planned.

The watershed likely to be worked on in Soash community covers an area of 5,000 or 6,000 acres, according to Howard County Agent O. F. Griffin. The slopes are not particularly steep, but on occasion of heavy rains water floods down through the central draw, flooding several farms and causing considerable damage. Much erosion of soil has also resulted.

Several farmers in the watershed have already requested assistance in conservation work. If others can be lined up to cooperate in the project, the soil conservation district's board of supervisors

will designate the area as a conservation priorities area, and technical men from the soil conservation service will make detailed surveys and studies of the area.

They will draw up a complete plan of soil and water conservation, showing all terraces, contour lines, drainage structures and other conservation details.

Effort will be made then to get each landowner to build the conservation structures. He will of course be given all assistance available—use of county machinery, etc.

If the area is successfully organized and all recommended structures are built, all water will remain on the farms on which it falls, benefiting these farms instead of running down on those

unpowdered patches which act as tell-tales on so many tired mouths. Another thing which makes the appearance of these mouth depressions unattractively obvious comes from carelessly extending lipstick applications into their depths. Keep your lipstick away from these crevices. Or, if the lipstick does become established there, remove it.

A tired, disconsolate appearance of the eyes is most often caused by an obvious droop of the lids, with dark circles beneath the eyes a frequently accompanying condition.

The droop of the lids can be minimized by outlining the base of the lashes on the lower lid with an eyebrow pencil, applied slightly heavier than is usual for the ordinary make-up. This definition line should then be extended beyond the outer corner of the eye with a slight upward stroke.

Definitely tired and sagging cheeks can be minimized by an application of rouge which attracts onlooking eyes to the rouge area, rather than the cheek droop.

For dark circles which may appear beneath the eyes, the only make-up device which I can recommend calls for dark-circle concealment—not cure—with a covering of make-up blender.

Monogram Pictures previewed "ROAR OF THE PRESS," starring Jean Parker and Wallace Ford . . . plus a large and extremely competent cast.

In Hollywood parlance, this is a "whodunit" picture . . . a mystery yarn, with a reporter, Mr. Ford, doing all the dirty work in solving the mystery murder. Written out of newspaper headlines on the activities of fifth columnists, the story clicks in a big way . . . and even gives a gangster an opportunity to prove he is, first, a decent American. His racket is a clean one.

It's definitely Wallace Ford's picture . . . he dominates practically every scene, playing a reporter without the benefit of the accepted smart alec technique. Jean Parker, as his much-neglected bride, is charmingly adequate. A nod, too, to Jed Prouty, Suzanne Kaaren, Harland Tucker, and Evalyn Knapp for away above average performances. And an especial bow to Paul Fix for an outstanding performance as the gangster who proves he's a good American.

"ROAR OF THE PRESS" is swell entertainment, with never a dull moment in its 72 minutes of length. And there's nothing to scare the youngsters.

Warner Brothers' "THE WAGONS ROLL AT NIGHT" is a circus affair, starring Humphrey Bogart and Sylvia Sidney, with Eddie Albert and pretty Joan Leslie in the featured brackets. Actually, it's

a re-make, against a different background, of "Sir Galahad," the film which catapulted Wayne Morris to stardom. This time, instead of a prize-fight manager picking up a local boy to exploit, it's Mr. Bogart as a circus manager who picks up Eddie Albert and makes him into a lion tamer. All the while, Bogart is sheltering his young sister, Miss Leslie, from any association with the rough and tumble of circus life.

Of course, Eddie Albert meets the girl and they fall completely in love. How Bogart attempts to break up the romance leads to a powerful climax, with Albert and Bogart in a cage with an enraged lion. It's a thriller for fair, this smash bang finish, and will bring many dollars to the Warner coffers.

Bogart is his usual tough self; Sylvia Sidney returns to pictures after a two-year absence, and as Bogart's fortune-telling girl friend is swell. Eddie Albert really rates bigger and better roles. He's fine; while the up-coming Miss Leslie is both naive, beautiful and very lovable. Sig Ruman, Cliff Clark, and Charlie Foy are splendid in supporting roles.

It's real family entertainment . . . and the kids will love the circus background.

Universal's "THE FLAME OF NEW ORLEANS," Marlene Dietrich's third film for the studio, turns out to be a delightful sophisticated comedy which provides the seductive Marlene with just the sort of vehicle to display her wares, both physical and histrionic.

The story is about the New Orleans of a hundred years ago. Miss Dietrich, a European adventuress with a phoney title, arrives in the dashing southern city, determined to marry wealth and position. Roland Young, a wealthy banker, is putty in her competent hands . . . but eventually and unknowingly bows out to handsome Bruce Cabot, the captain of a small schooner, who, after all, is her type of folk, rather than the socialite Mr. Young.

The film is blessed with the skilled direction of famed French director Rene Clair, who succeeds in making the most of every drop of humor and sophistication that Norman Kraas's story provides. A fine supporting cast headed by Mischa Auer, Andy Devine, Laura Hope Crews, Theresa Harris, and Franklin Pangborn contributes to the merit.

Definitely adult entertainment, I'm sure that everyone above teen age will enjoy "THE FLAME OF NEW ORLEANS."

This, of course, was nothing new to Mr. Oakie, but these were "still" pictures and the assignment must have been a pleasant one because he was posing with the "Navy Blue Sextette," as they call them—a half-dozen of the primest honeyes this wide-eyed boy has ever beheld.

Dodgers Drop To 2nd Place Despite Wins

Cardinals Lead Pack On Basis Of More Games Played Per Losses

The National league race is in its typical spring squeeze, tighter than the cover on a baseball.

The Brooklyn Dodgers climbed into first place Monday by winning their seventh straight game. Tuesday they won their eighth and slipped into a tie. Yesterday they won their ninth in succession and dropped into second place.

This would seem to be going full speed forward in reverse and that may be just as clear as trying to explain the actual jam no involving the Dodgers and the St. Louis Cardinals.

Brooklyn has won 13 games and lost 4 for a .765 percentage while St. Louis has a record of 10 and 3 for .769. Actually, on the basis of games won and lost, the Dodgers are in front of the Cardinals by a full game, but because the Cardinals have played less games, and lost less, they have an advantage in percentage.

Yesterday's ninth victory at Brooklyn came on the anniversary of their ninth straight last spring in Cincinnati, the day Tex Carleton pitched his no-hitter. What has the Flatbush fans jittery today is the memory that Brooklyn was beaten a year ago today by Bucky Walters, who was slated to try to stop the Dodger onrush again this afternoon.

Johnny Vander Meer put the brakes on Brooklyn for seven innings yesterday, scattering three singles and striking out eight while his teammates routed Kirby Higbe for a 3-0 lead, but in the eighth inning Dixie Walker and Joe Medwick hit home runs, and dodged around a walk, to tie the score and in the ninth Mickey Owen and Peeewe Reese smacked a pair of doubles for a run to win 4-3.

The Cardinals hopped on Hal Schumacher for a dozen hits, including homers by Country Slaughter and Johnny Mize, to whip the New York Giants again in a game that was kept out of trouble till the eighth, when Babe Young homered with two on. The Giants got only six hits.

The Chicago Cubs clustered four runs in the first and four more in the eighth to blast the Boston Braves 9-4, with the help of four Boston errors.

Cy Blanton, a castoff of the Pittsburgh Pirates, kept ten hits scattered and struck out six as the Phillies pounded the Pirates 5-4. The Cleveland Indians extended their winning string to six by over-taking the Philadelphia Athletics 6-5 on Ken Keltner's two-run homer with two out in the ninth inning.

The Detroit Tigers came out of their hitting slump with 18 hits to subdue the Boston Red Sox 15-8. The Chicago White Sox held on to second place in the junior circuit by beating the Washington Senators 5-1, scoring four runs in the eighth inning when Ken Chase blew up and walked three.

Joe Gordon and Marius Russo led the New York Yankees to vengeance against the St. Louis Browns, 7-1.

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Traffic Situation Alarming

**Alsop and Kintner—
Early Action By U. S. Can Save Much
In Britain's Battle Against Germans**

By ALSOP AND KINTNER
WASHINGTON, May 1.—In his great speech Sunday, Winston Churchill gave the president's new Atlantic patrol system as proof that "westward the land is bright."

It was the best evidence he had, unfortunately. But no one should be deceived into thinking the patrol system anything but a makeshift compromise, in defense of which competent naval authorities can offer only a feeble, conventional murmur of hope.

The theory of the patrol system is that American ships and planes will spot German planes and submarines for the British, warning convoys away and summoning the British navy and air force. This is merely an extension out into the Atlantic of the old neutrality patrol in hemisphere waters.

Although few persons realized it at the time, the neutrality patrol also spotted German craft for the British, since its reports were purposely sent in simple navy code. The president once grimly remarked that "if the British couldn't break the code, they were much stupider than he thought."

The weakness of the compromise can be seen by comparing it with the real shipping protection system for which the patrols are a substitute. This system, worked out by a British-American joint committee which met quietly in Washington until a few weeks ago, calls on the British and American navies to clear a safe sea-lane for merchant shipping from Halifax to Greenland, to Iceland, to northern Scotland, where the British navy alone is to take over the task of coastal convoying.

The system is reported to be perfected to the final detail. American officers, led by the admiral who is to have charge of it, are even understood to have visited Britain to make the necessary arrangements at that end. All is in readiness, except that the president has not given the word.

Furthermore, it is impossible to discover any really well-informed member of the administration who does not regard the president's giving the word as a mere matter of time, in the last few days, according to the navy's reports, German submarine and air activity in the Atlantic area are declining, and shipping losses have dropped proportionally.

Before then, however, losses were downright appalling. Even now, the British are steadily using up their reserve stocks of all sorts, and their orders for steel and other war materials are piling up at the factories here while food receives shipping priority.

It is estimated that their minimum import deficiency in the next month will be from 500,000 to 600,000 tons. In short, if the president intends to pursue his policy to its logical conclusion, he cannot delay giving the word much beyond two months more. These facts only serve to underline the bitter irony of the American position. For if we could do immediately what everyone believes we shall do soon, we should have a good chance of restoring the Mediterranean situation, as well as meeting the Atlantic danger.

It was pointed out in this space yesterday that owing to Turkish and Russian sluggishness, the Germans will probably have a clear road to the vital oil of Iran and Iraq. The picture in the eastern Mediterranean is as dark as it will be. But if the British hold in Egypt, and the western Mediterranean does not go also, the loss of Iran and Iraq will only confront the British Mediterranean fleet with a grave supply problem.

For even now the Germans only have sufficient transport to bring a comparatively small percentage of Romanian oil into western Europe. They can hardly get much use from Iranian and Iraqi oil unless they are able to carry it past eastern Europe to the western port of Marseilles, where transport facilities are far better. This they cannot do until the Mediterranean is a German lake.

As to Egypt, the outlook is not bright, but far from hopeless. The supply lines of the German mechanized divisions in Libya are infinitely long and tenuous. In the last days, heavy reinforcements both men and material have been landed at Alexandria. So far, Wavell's armies have held the Germans and Italians back, despite their numerical superiority. But even assuming that the drive to Suez is halted, the outlook in French North Africa and the Iberian peninsula is extremely black.

The position of Marshal Weygand in French North Africa has been seriously undermined. In Case Blanche—a port on the Atlantic, it should be remembered—more than 300 German military men and Gestapo agents are in virtual control of the situation. Elsewhere in his provinces, Weygand must deal with internal troubles fomented by the Germans, while preparing to ward off dangers from without.

In Spain, renewed German pressure for an invitation to pass the Pyrenees has just been resisted by General Franco, despite the best efforts of his pro-German brother-in-law, Ramon Serrano Suner.

Spain is a foodless desert, populated by an angry, anti-foreign people, now riddled with typhus, and destitute of all but rudimentary transport facilities.

The Germans want, for these reasons, to come in by invitation, which would be far easier for them. But come they now plan to in the end, according to the best authorities here. If they come both French North Africa and Portugal, with its magnificent Atlantic port of Lisbon, will fall into their hands.

And the fortress of Gibraltar and the base in Egypt will then be isolated and ineffective.

The German hesitation on the Spanish border promises a few weeks breathing spell. During that short space, in the opinion of many of the ablest American strategists, is within this country's power to reverse the trend of events in the western Mediterranean by resorting to the shipping protection system now waiting to be put in force.

That will commit the United States. It will have an overwhelming effect on morale in every nation, and particularly those nations and territories threatened with German aggression.

Above all, it will derange the German time-table still further, and make the German high command hesitate to take on far flung new commitments. Under the circumstances, American policy offers a tragic parallel to the behavior of King Tiberius, who had to pay the Curian Sibyl the same price for three of her celebrated books as he was originally asked for twelve.

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Maybe you were amazed but not alarmed over the results thus far in a traffic infraction count being made this week by Boy Scouts.

If you place any belief at all in figures, it's high time to become alarmed. Here we are observing Safety Week and at the same time violating the traffic code thousands of times daily. Scarcely a one of us is guiltless in this respect.

Keeping tabulations on 15 intersections, the scouts noted more than 1,000 plain infraction of traffic laws in two-hour periods daily. Multiply this by 10 or more hours and add in a reasonable amount to care for the scores and scores of other intersections in the city and you begin to get an idea about how well our driving laws are being obeyed.

The astonishing thing about this business is that it consists mostly of those who thoughtlessly run around the rules for convenience or for time. Comparatively few are those who wantonly break the law, who show utter disregard for established driving rules. Yet, the absence of malicious intent does not necessarily lessen the potential danger of disobeying traffic regulations.

Perhaps some points of our code are antiquated or not applicable here. If so, a study should be made and those points eliminated or changed. Those which are well taken should be more scrupulously observed.

Interesting, too, is the fact that officers have been found negligent in this respect. Charged with enforcing the law, officers certainly should be the first to be careful about obeying it.

To be sure, this is another case of carelessness, but nowhere can a better example in safe driving be set than by those who must be charged with keeping the rest of us in line.

Obviously every corner and street in the city cannot be watched all hours of the day. Thus, it becomes largely an individual responsibility to stay in line with our driving and our walking.

Some will argue that the boys are not competent to record infraction, that they may be over-zealous. That point is nothing short of silly. They could be ever so incompetent and ever so eager to find something wrong and still, with these allowances, the figures would be amazing. The fact remains it is an unhealthy situation.

Action Must Be Taken

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Hollywood Sights and Sounds— Draws Sighs In Hollywood Jean Gabin, Late of France,

HOLLYWOOD — That gentle zephyr blowing out of the west these days is naught but a huge, collective, feminine sigh. Jean Gabin, the leading movie actor of France, is in town.

Gabin, as you will know if you have seen "Pepe le Moque" or other of his French films, is no sleek, hand-kissing Latin. He is ruggedly handsome. In the Spencer Tracy-James Cagney style: strong chin, prominent nose, brown hair waving back from a high strong forehead, keen blue eyes with a Gallic twinkle when he smiles.

Hollywood got him not without a struggle. Gabin, long unheeding Hollywood's bandishments, was in the French navy on a minesweeper while France was in the war. He was on leave at his new home in Paris, some 75 miles west of Paris, when the Nazis broke through at Sedan. The word came they would be upon him in 15 minutes, so he packed an extra shirt, leaped into his car and headed west toward Cherbourg to rejoin his unit.

The Nazis beat him there. He swung toward Brest, found the enemy ahead of him, dodged south to Toulon. There, with Paris taken, he was demobilized. He was in Marseilles, bunking with friends and with only a spare shirt to his name, when Hollywood offered the way out. Andre Daven, French producer at 20th Century-Fox, brought him here and he will make a picture as soon, he says, as he can learn "not only to speak but to think in English."

At present, taking daily language lessons, going to movies, he has mastered quite a few American expressions. These he uses with small accent, fills in with eloquent gestures, but is still most at home in French with Daven or Margot Frager, the producer's secretary, as interpreter. Through his slight English, his gestures, and the aid of Miss Frager (after throwing my school French out the window), I learned that Gabin, who will be 37 next month, was no stranger to German invasion. As a boy of 10, in 1914, he and his family fled their home in Creil.

first movie. He does not expect to make the same kind of pictures he made in France — censorship, and all that. He does expect to remain the same kind of person — no glamour-boy stuff for him.

Divorced last year from Dorvane, music-hall artist, he is fancy free at the moment, but his name was linked frequently in Paris with that of RKO's Michele Morgan. In France, he says, no one ever asks questions about love or women.

George Coulouris is radio's new "Bulldog Drummond." Karloff is on the Inner Sanctum, a Sunday night mystery thriller. Joslyn appears opposite Helen Hayes on her Sunday evening radio dramas. Everett Sloane has appeared on 700 broadcasts since 1931. So it goes. You could keep on naming them like this until you ran out of paper.

If someone will kindly cast Edward Trevor in a play where he can wear an ordinary pair of men's pants once again he, Trevor, will be grateful. Four times now he has appeared on Broadway and so far, modern trousers have not been his happy lot. In "Mary of Scotland" with Helen Hayes he wore knee breeches. As Lafayette in "Valley Forge" he also wore knee breeches. Then came "Oscar Wilde" and knee breeches were again in order. Just the other day he went into "Lady in the Dark" to replace the ailing Vic Mature, and what they trotted out for him to wear was a pair of riding breeches.

Since most of the writers were headline-minded, Bees struck their fancy. Fourteen voted for that against four for Blue Birds, three for Beascons, two for Colonels and one each for Blues and Bulls.

Grocers To Cut Down On Work Hours

Monday several of the larger grocers in Big Spring will inaugurate a new schedule of business hours, designed to shorten the working time of employees by a full hour.

Among those who will observe an opening time of 7:30 a. m. and a closing time of 6:30 p. m. are the Safeway, Hodges, Robinson and Piggly Wiggly food stores. Other stores were considering falling in line.

The new hours will be in effect daily except on Saturday when the opening and closing times will be the same—7 a. m. and 9:30 p. m. By shoving the opening time back half an hour and the closing time up half an hour, employees in grocers will have their working time reduced by five hours a week.

It was pointed out that the change was not anticipated as a summer-time adjustment, but as a step toward bringing grocers' hours in line with those of other mercantile establishments.
