

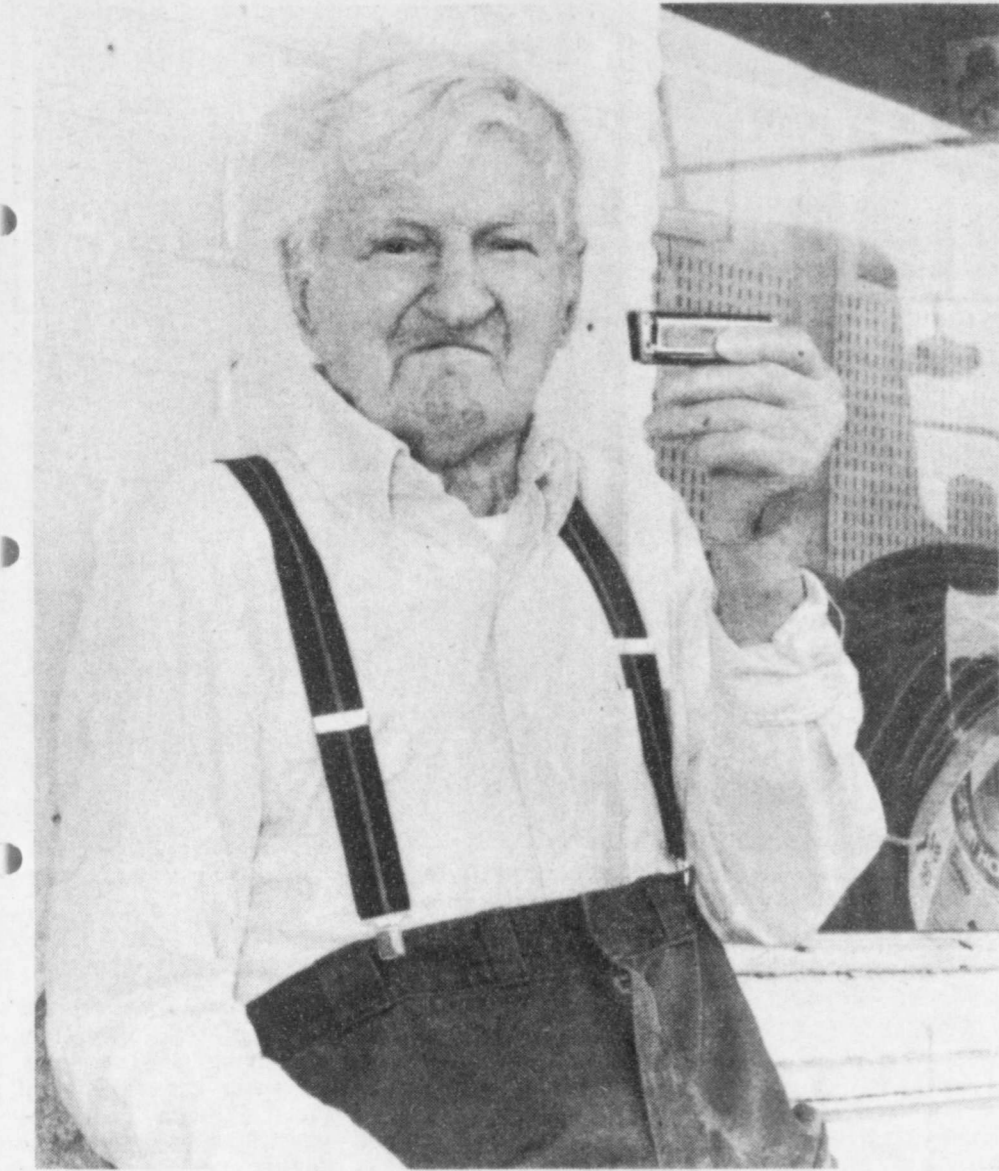

Local Option Petition Denied

A petition to the Red River County Commissioner's Court to call an election for the sale of alcoholic beverages in Bogata was denied Monday by the Court because only 65 of the 92 signatures could be validated by County Clerk Mary Hausler. Eighty-four signatures were necessary for the election to be called.

Mrs. Hausler said Tuesday that the problem was not that the signers of the petition do not live within the city limits of Bogata, but that state law requires that the resident's signature appear on the petition exactly as the signature appears on the county voter registration rolls.

The petition backers will now have to make application for another petition to be circulated. Mrs. Hausler said there is no waiting period for petitions, but if the election had been held, a one year period for petitions, but if the election had been held, a one year period would have to pass

Wolfe said the pair talked about the little men in green hats, hundreds of them, who were all over the place, and about being watched from the Nichols barn. James Earl Brock, 19, a white male, and a juvenile subject told Wolfe that they

had stolen the car they were driving in Rusk, Texas, but Louisiana authorities had records of the car being taken from Ruston, La.

Warrants had been filed in Louisiana for theft of over

\$500 and the pair are in Red River County jail awaiting extradition.

Wolfe said he had no way of determining what had caused the strange behavior of the men.

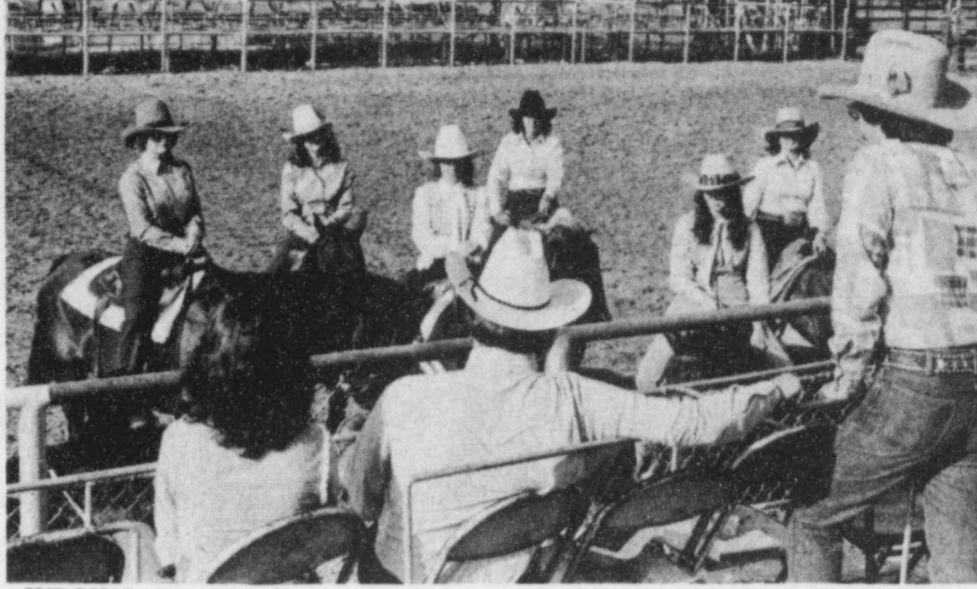

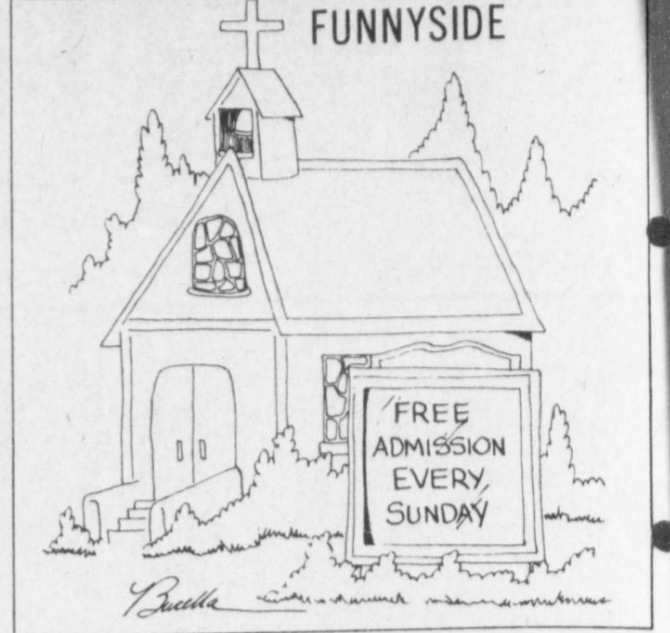

Soybean Contest Announced

Soybean producers once again have an opportunity to compete for top honors in the Texas Soybean Yield Contest.

The 1979 contest is being sponsored by the Texas Soybean Association and Elanco Products Company in conjunction with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, announces R. J. Hodges, Extension agronomist.

"The contest is designed as an educational tool to stimulate interest in soybean production," notes Hodges. "Benefits include the development of worthwhile cultural information, cooperation within the industry to increase production efficiency, and recognition of individuals who achieve superior yields."

Interested producers should contact their county Extension agent for contest rules and entry forms, points out the agronomist. All entries must be in by Aug. 15.

Each entrant must grow at least 25 acres of soybeans and designate at least five acres to be harvested. There

may be only one entry per entire farm operation. Measuring and weighing of the soybeans will be supervised by a three-man County Soybean Contest Committee.

According to Hodges, awards will be presented to the top three producers in the High Plains, Northeast Texas and Coastal Prairie. Then the state champion will be selected from among the nine area winners. Winners will receive appropriate plaques along with various amounts of Treflan on Surfman, depending on their placings. The state champion will receive a trip for two to Acapulco.

The agronomist also points out that entering the contest makes producers eligible for membership in the Texas 60 Bushel Soybean Club or the Texas 70 Bushel Soybean Club, should they reach either of these yields.

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Structures Can Control Erosion

"Active gully erosion can be reduced by installing an erosion control dam," said Wendell Reeder of Bogata. The dams catch runoff water and release it through a pipe at a slow rate. Reeder has recently had two constructed on his farm in the Line Branch area. The erosion control dams were built with a bulldozer.

A structure is similar to a farm pond dam, except a pipe is placed thru the levee. Pipe that is used in these dams is made of corrugated metal coated with asphalt. The pipe is designed to handle most runoff water. When large rains occur, the excess water is routed through a 30 foot wide earthen spillway.

Erosion control dams are of more demand in blackland than sandy soil. Blackland soil absorbs water at a slower rate. Because of the slow permeability there is more runoff water and erosion is greater.

Gullied areas below the dam are usually shipped into a grassed waterway. A gentle slope on the waterway will allow water to leave the farm with little erosion.

Landowners that plan to install erosion control dams on their farms this year are: Merle Enz, Preston Combest, Connie Presley, Eugene Suddeth, Kenneth Brumley and Issac's Red River Ranch.

Erosion control dams can be cost shared at 75 per cent of cost by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS). The Cost-share assistance can also be obtained from the Resource Conservation and Development program in the Line Branch Watershed.

The Soil Conservation Service (SCS) will provide landowners with engineering assistance on all erosion control practices. If gully erosion is occurring on your farm, contact the SCS office in the basement of the Post Office in Clarksville.

LVN Program Offered

The Adult Education Division of the Mt. Pleasant ISD is accepting and interviewing for the Licensed Vocation Nursing (LVN) program. The class will begin September 4, 1979 in the Adult Education Building on Riddle street in Mt. Pleasant.

The LVN program will be a tuition type program. The Adult Education Division in Cooperation with the Titus County Memorial Hospital in Mt. Pleasant, Franklin County Hospital in Mt. Vernon and David Granberry Hospital in Naples will operate this LVN program. It is a fifty two (52) week program. The academic classroom work will be in the Downtown Education Center on Riddle street in Mt. Pleasant and the clinical experience will be in the three hospitals.

The program is approved by the State Board of Vocational Nurse Examiners and the Texas Education Agency.

Any interested person who is qualified for nursing practice can become an LVN through preparation in the formal educational program through the Adult Education program and passing the State Board of Vocational Nurse Examination.

The Licensed Vocational nurse is vitally needed in the health care system. The LVN is a recognized member of the health care team and functions under the direction of a Registered Nurse (RN) or Physician.

There is a great demand for the services of the LVN in direct patient care as well as emergency room or intensive care units.

The scope of nursing is expanding to include prevention of illness, health education, rehabilitation and many other areas. Many nursing homes of the area are in need of trained LVN's to staff their institutions.

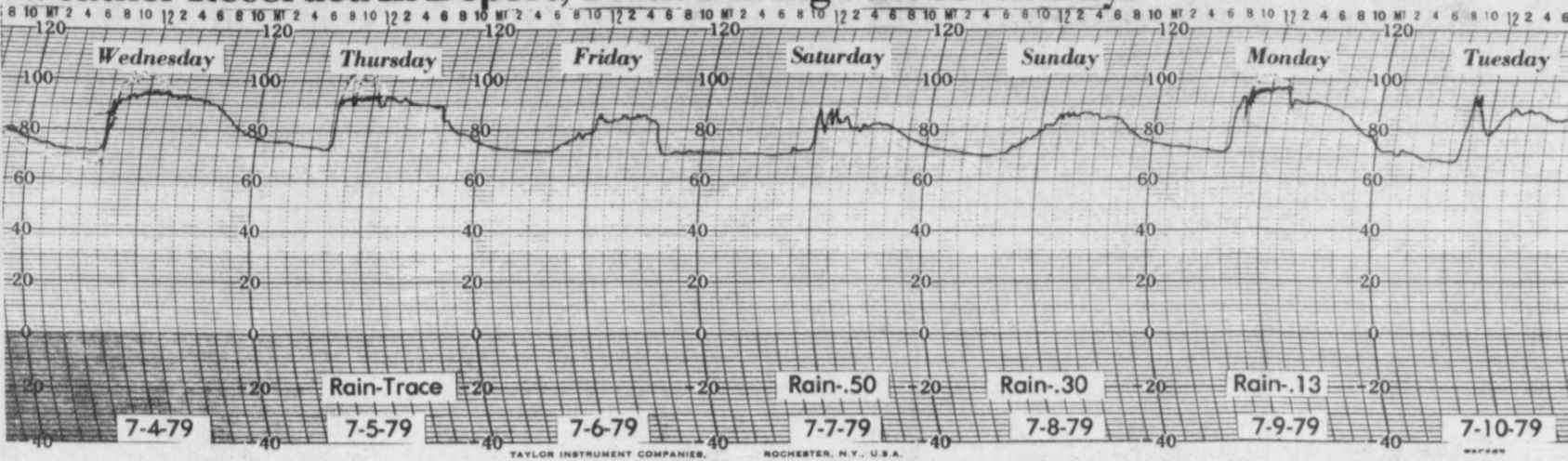

Summer Fish Harvests Risky

Warmwater fish (catfish, largemouth bass and bluegill) grow best between water temperatures of 76 degrees and 90 degrees F. Thus fish become more vulnerable to sudden temperature changes and require more oxygen during hot summer weather, says Dr. S. K. Johnson, a fish disease specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. This makes fish harvesting risky in summer and early fall since it exposes fish to distinctly different temperatures, says Johnson. Surface water is warmer since water heats from the surface downward. Water stratifies into distinct warm and cool layers as heating continues. Also, fish in a pond emptied from the bottom or drawn to shore by a net will experience a drastic temperature change. Fish can survive a 10-degree change if it occurs over several hours, explains Johnson. Otherwise, they may die. Also, excited fish in 90-degree water need more oxygen than can be supplied. If fish must be transferred, make small net catches and pump fresh water of suitable temperature into the catch area, advises the specialist. When water is drawn from a pond, pump fresh water into the catch basin to maintain a proper temperature.

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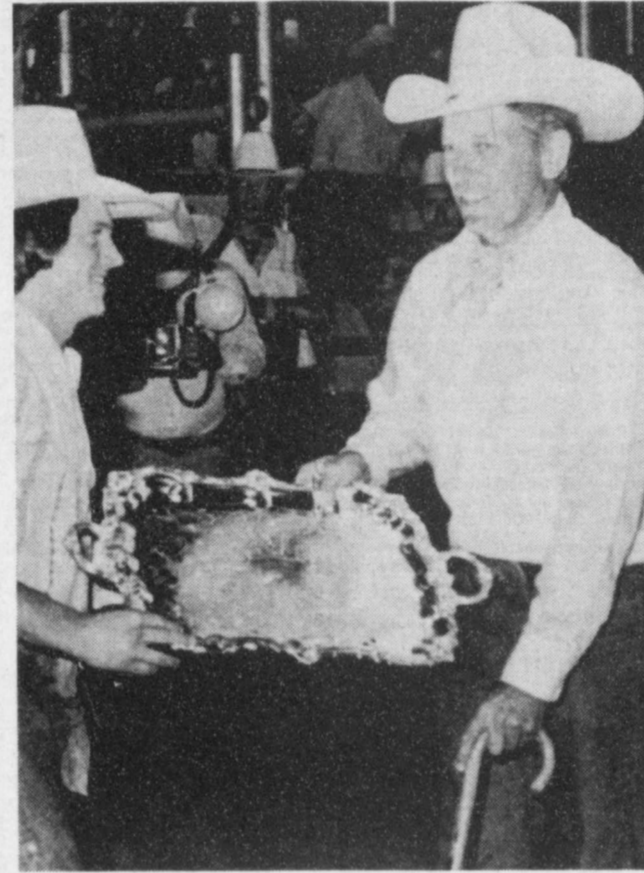

East Texas Eating

The six flags of our East Texas heritage have contributed some exotic sounding, but really very simple and delicious foods to our menus. Gazpacho, from Spain, is an example. It is a surprisingly delicious cold soup, and is equally refreshing as a cooling summer beverage. I like to keep a pitcher of Gazpacho in the refrigerator during the fresh tomato-and

hot weather season. It is a fresh tasting and vitamin packed mid-afternoon perk'er upper. Many variations occur in Gazpacho recipes. Most include chopped or pureed fresh tomatoes, cucumber, onion, and green pepper. Some include other herbs, garlic, beef stock, or chicken stock and occasionally are thickened with bread crumbs. Father Bernard Zicke, a former pastor of St.

Joseph's Catholic Church, in Clarksville, and years earlier a seminary student in Spain, says, "Oh, there is no one recipe (in Spain). The people use what they have." When Father Zicke first encountered Gazpacho made in a blender, in east Texas, his admonition was, "That is not Gazpacho!" Later, he decided that "The blender gives it a nice smoothness." So like our Spanish neighbors, and Father Zicke, use the ingredients and equipment that you have and like. For a starter, here is a recipe to try:

6 large very ripe tomatoes or 4 tomatoes and 1 cup tomato juice.
1 large cucumber, peeled.
1 medium onion, 1 medium Bell pepper, seeded, 1 clove garlic, minced finely.
1 & 1/2 cups chilled consommé or light beef stock.
1/4 cup salad oil.
2 Tbsp. lemon juice or wine vinegar.
Salt and pepper to taste.
2 Tbsp. fresh parsley and/or chives-optional.
1. Core, peel, and seed tomatoes. If using all fresh tomatoes, puree and sieve 2 tomatoes. Finely chop 4 tomatoes, the cucumber, onion, and Bell pepper. All of the above ingredients may be pureed in the blender, if you prefer.
2. Add the garlic, but do not blend because the flavor becomes too strong.
3. Slowly stir in the lemon juice or vinegar, oil, and salt and pepper.
4. Chill.
5. Serve in bowls or cups, or even squat glasses. Add a couple of ice cubes to each portion just before serving. Sprinkle with chopped parsley and/or chives if you like.
Gazpacho can also be an ideal answer for a low-calorie refreshment for summer meetings or parties. It could even be served from a chilled punch bowl.

EIC Could Affect Small Businesses

"Earned Income Credit (EIC)," as spelled out in the Revenue Act of 1978, may affect many small businesses. According to the tax law, all employers must make advance payments toward EIC to eligible employees who request the payments after June 30. Prior to the 1978 Act, employees could obtain EIC only by filing Form 1040, explains Dr. Richard Edwards. Edwards is an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Employees choosing not to receive advance payments may receive credit on their annual tax return. EIC can provide payments up to \$500 a year even if you owe no tax, Edwards points out. These payments, based on weekly earnings, are not subject to income, social security or payroll taxes. EIC is extended to married employees earning a combined annual income of less than \$10,000 and supporting a dependent child or full-time student, or to a surviving spouse or head of a household. Employees must determine their eligibility and file Form W-5 to request these payments, emphasizes the economist. They must also notify their employer of any status change causing loss of eligibility. Employers failing to make requested advanced payments are subject to penalties, warns Edwards. Complete details on EIC are provided in "A Supplement to Circular E" available from the Internal Revenue Service. **Lightning Strikes** Strokes of lightning are caused by an electrical imbalance between clouds or between clouds and earth.

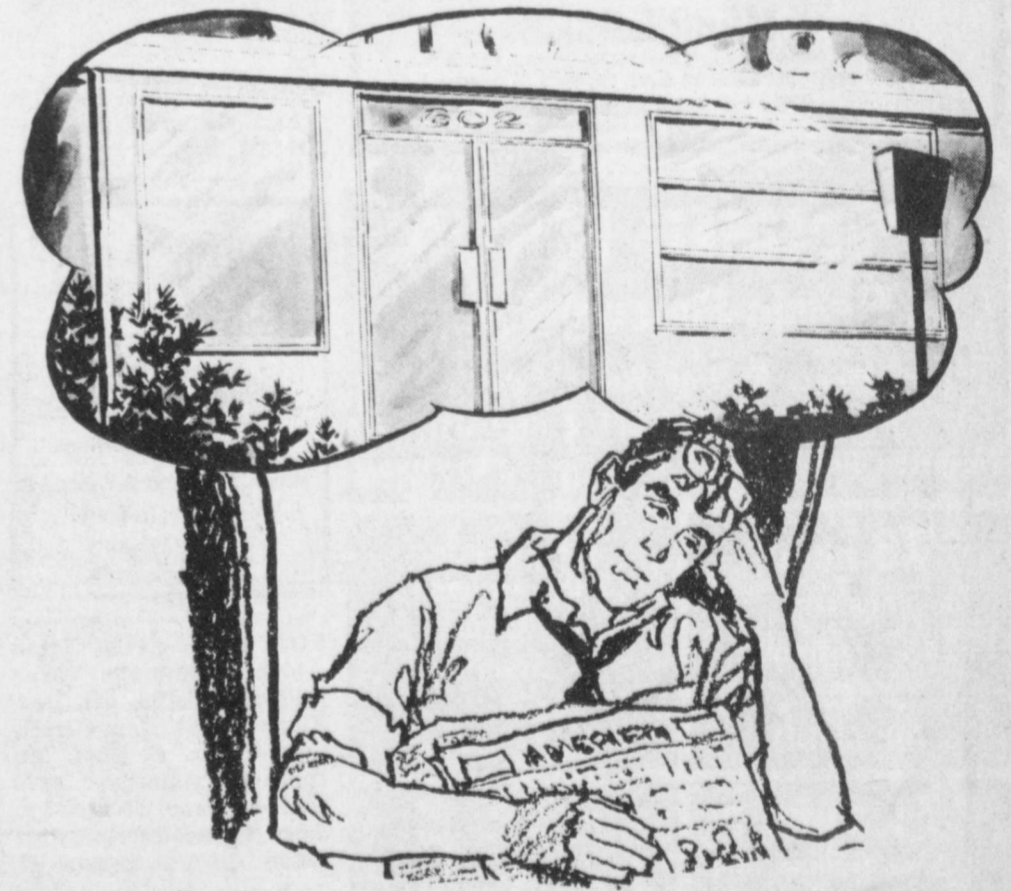

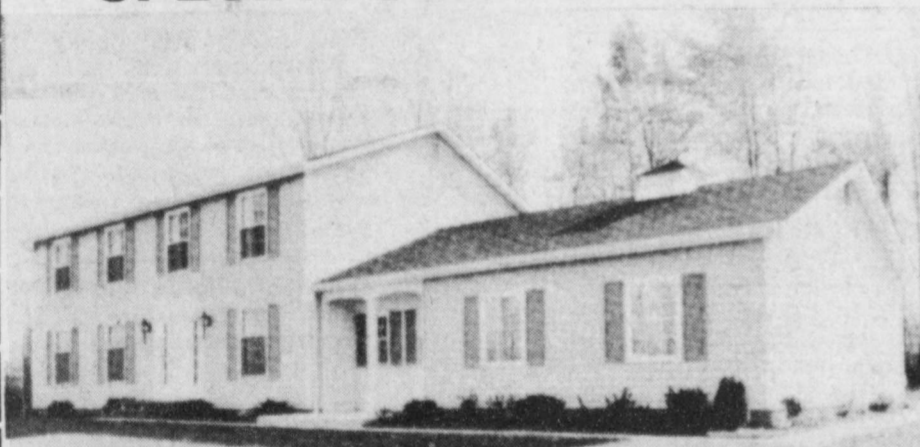

ORDINANCE NO. 6-14-79
AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF BLOSSOM PRAIRIE, BLOSSOM, LAMAR COUNTY, TEXAS, PRESCRIBING SEWER SERVICE CHARGES FOR THE CITY; AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 1-5-79; AND HAVING AN EFFECTIVE DATE OF July 3, 1979.

WHEREAS, the bond guarantees for the City sewer system requiring that the sewer system of the Town of Blossom Prairie, Blossom, Lamar County, Texas be self-sustaining; and WHEREAS, the sewer system of the City is presently and has been operating at a deficit; and WHEREAS, it is necessary to amend the sewer rates and charges to make the sewer system in the City self-sustaining;

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF BLOSSOM PRAIRIE, BLOSSOM, LAMAR COUNTY, TEXAS:

SECTION I. SEWER RATES-FOR CUSTOMERS USING CITY WATER
Charges for sewerage service furnished by the City to domestic and commercial customers who are also users of City water are hereby fixed at the following minimum charge per month:

1. Single dwelling residential - \$5.00.
2. Commercial - \$6.00.
3. Apartments - \$20.00.
4. Carwash - \$35.00.
5. School - \$45.00.
6. Washeteria or Laundromat - \$40.00.

SECTION II. SEWER RATES-FOR CUSTOMERS NOT USING CITY WATER
Single family residence sewerage customers, who are not water customers of the City, shall pay a flat rate charge of \$5.00 per month for sewerage service. All other sewerage customers, who are not water users of the City, shall pay a flat monthly rate to be determined by the City Council.

SECTION III. BILLING: WHEN AMOUNTS PAYABLE
Sewerage bills and accounts shall be due and payable on the 10th day of the month following the billing date and shall become delinquent after the expiration of 21 days following the billing date. All bills and accounts

shall be due and payable at City Hall, Blossom Prairie, Blossom, Lamar County, Texas.

SECTION IV. DISCONTINUANCE OF SEWERAGE SERVICE FOR FAILURE TO PAY
If any person shall fail to pay the sewerage bill for service rendered to such person by the City before the expiration of 10 days after the date which such bill is due and payable, the sewerage service of such person shall be discontinued, and such service shall not be resumed until such person shall have paid the delinquent sewerage bill in full, together with a reconnection fee of \$10.00. It shall be unlawful for any person, other than a duly authorized employee of the City to reconnect such service.

SECTION V. SEWERAGE RATES FOR CUSTOMERS OUTSIDE THE CITY LIMITS
The sewerage rates for customers outside of the City Limits of the Town of Blossom Prairie, Blossom, Lamar County, Texas shall be fixed for a single family residence at \$5.00 per month; for a multi-dwelling housing unit at \$6.00 per month; and by individual contracts between the City and commercial users.

SECTION VI. EFFECTIVE DATE
This Ordinance shall become effective on July 3, 1979.

EMERGENCY CLAUSE
WHEREAS, an emergency is apparent for the immediate preservation of order, health, safety and general welfare of the public, this Ordinance shall be passed and take effect as an emergency measure and be in full force and effect from and after its passage this date as provided by law AND IT IS SO ORDAINED.

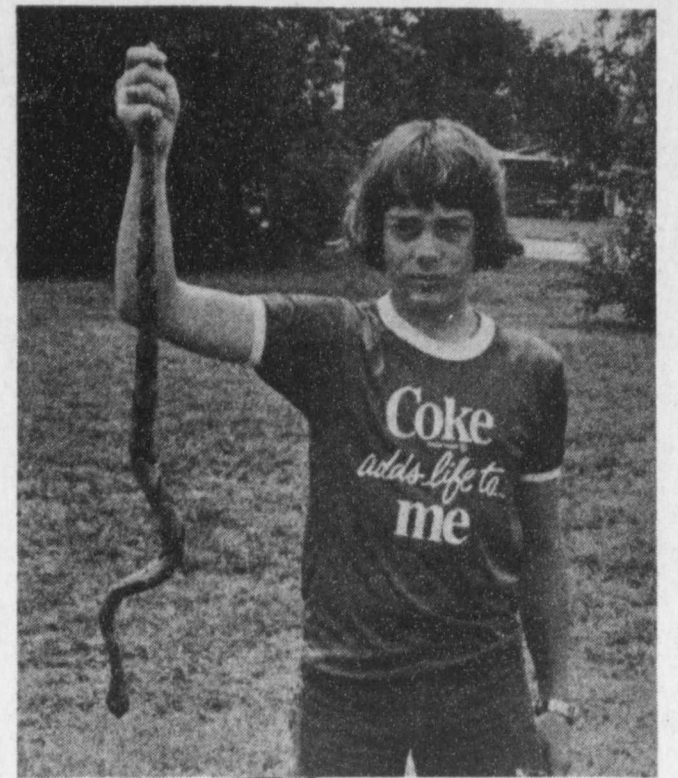

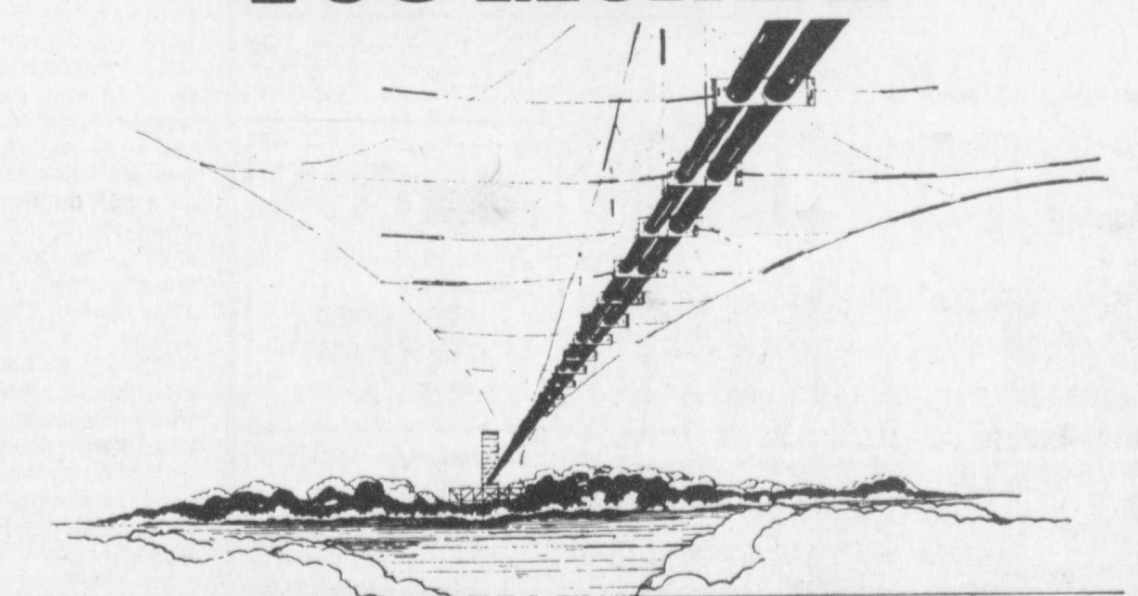

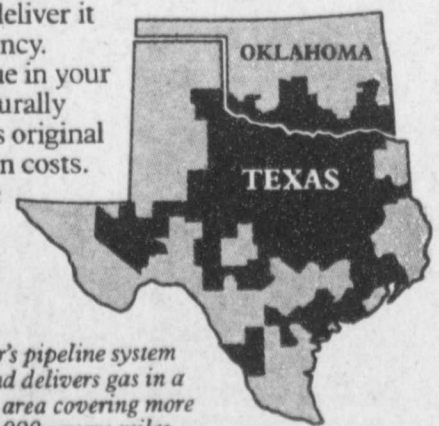
