Dr. Ralph Graham New Pastor Here

Colorado City's newest minister, Dr. Ralph Graham, assumed his duties as pastor of First Christian Church, 4th & Elm Sts., Sunday.

Dr. Graham and his wife have moved into the First Christian parsonage at 73 East 10th St., pastor's home, owned by the church.

The new pastor resigned as minister of the Collinswood Church of Christ in Collinswood, N. J., suburb of Camden and just across the Delaware River from the city of Philadelphia, to accept the pastorate here.

First Christian congregation's former pastor, the Rev. Kish Barnett, accepted a call from a church in Lubbock.

Dr. Graham and his wife are both native West Texans. Moving back to West Texas they call it "like coming home."

Mrs. Graham, the former Miss Irene Forrester, was born in Merick, reared in Abilene. Dr. Graham was born and grew up in Tuscola.

He received his B. A. degree at Abilene Christian College in 1941 and was awarded his Bachelor of Divinity at Princeton Theological Seminary in Princeton, N. J., in 1949. He

was graduated from Temple University School of Religion in Philadelphia where he won his master's degree and completed work for his doctorate.

Pastoral counseling and philosophy of religion were his graduate study specialties.

Dr. Graham's chief hobby is reading. He moved with him to First Christian parsonage and pastor's study here his library of 3,000 volumes. He admits to being a book-lover.

His mother, Mrs. Carl Graham of Abilene, will move to Colorado City soon to share the Graham's new home in Colorado City. The pastor and his wife have no children.

C-City Chamber Gets TMA Award Of Merit

Colorado City Chamber of Commerce was selected to receive an award of Merit from the Texas Manufacturers Association for outstanding local observance of Texas Industrial Week.

Four Texas cities were singled out by Texas Manufacturers Association to receive Texas Industrial Week awards with Dumas Chamber of Commerce named first place winner for cities with less than 10,000 population. Dumas was then selected as the Grand Award winner for having con-

ducted the best observance in the state.

First place awards were made to Ft. Worth Junior Chamber of Commerce for cities of more than 100,000 population; to Longview Chamber of Commerce for cities between 25,000 and 75,000; and the Seguin and Guadalupe County Chamber of Commerce was created as winner for cities with a population between 10,000 and 25,000.

Runner-up, all to receive Awards of Merit, were: Abilene Chamber of Commerce, Grand Prairie Chamber of Commerce, Mineral Wells Chamber of Commerce and Colorado City Chamber of Commerce.

Texas Manufacturers Association has been sponsor of Texas Industrial Week since 1951 and conducts an annual competition among chambers of commerce to recognize local observances.

Texas Industrial Week was created by resolution of the Texas Legislature and is proclaimed annually during the week April 1-7 by the Governor and mayors in participating cities.

Student & Teacher Attend Symposium

A Colorado City High School student, John Tiller, and a science teacher, Eugene (Bo) Merket are to leave Sunday for University of Texas where they will attend the fourth Texas Nuclear Science Symposium, June 7-10.

Trip to the symposium for student and teacher is being sponsored by Texas Electric Service Co. Symposium is jointly sponsored by the Texas Atomic Research Foundation and the University of Texas. The Foundation is made up of 10 investor-owned utility companies in Texas, including Texas Electric.

Some 500 selected high school science students and teachers will attend the sessions in Austin at which some of the nation's outstanding nuclear scientists will speak.

"The Foundation, which is co-sponsoring with the General Atomic Division of General Dynamics Corporation the world's largest privately-financed research effort in the field of controlled nuclear fusion, is also seeking through its sponsorship of science symposiums to contribute to scientific education and understanding in Texas," said Don Benson, TESCO manager here.

"The meetings seek to bring to high school science students and teachers of Texas lectures on nuclear physics and related topics by outstanding scientists and to provide the students with an opportunity to obtain answers to their questions on scientific careers and college curricula," Benson said.

Speakers at this year's symposium will include two General Atomic scientists from San Diego, California; Dr. Frederic de Hoffmann, president of General Atomic and Dr. W. E. Drummond, theoretical physicist.

Other speakers will include: Dr. B. H. Amstead, professor of mechanical engineering, Dr. J. D. Gavenda, associate professor of physics and Dr. W. T. Guy, Jr., professor of mathematics, all of the University of Texas; Dr. H. C. Thomas, chairman of the physics department at Texas Technological College; Dr. W. O. Milligan, vice-chancellor for research at Texas Christian University; Dr. J. A. McIntire, professor of physics at Texas A&M University; and Howard B. Drew, executive vice-president of Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation.

Loraine Studies Request

Loraine's city council took no action on request from George Culler of Dallas for a proposed raise in telephone rates.

Culler is president of Telephone Incorporated, owner of the Loraine telephone exchange and four other exchanges in Texas.

Company proposes to seek a loan from the REA to make additions and improvements. Culler told city council in Loraine.

Rates sought by the company would raise business telephones from \$9 a month to \$12, private residential phones from \$5 to \$6.50 and two-party line phones in proportion.

Loraine city officials took no action of the rates raise request but will meet with the Culler again in July.

Last Strip Of Circle

Commissioners of Mitchell County have secured the right-of-way necessary for the paving of West Lake Road, said County Judge Elmer Martin Saturday.

All property owners have signed, granting right of way. All highlines have been moved. All pipelines have been enclosed. Paving of West Lake Road will complete a paved route around Lake Colorado City.

The road, last unpaved strip of roads circling Lake Colorado City, is part of Farm to Market 2836. The unpaved strip is 3.2 miles in length and will link Interstate 20 with the Sterling City highway, 163, west Lake Road runs due south from Interstate 20 to intersect highway 163.

Texas State Highway Department is expected to ask for bids on construction at an early date, perhaps in July, with construction likely to start in August.

Commissioners look forward to seeing its completion this year, said Judge Martin.

Paving of the road will be completed at a good time for Colorado City and visiting tourists. Lake Road runs near the proposed new site for Lake Colorado City. After it is paved, the road will be a good route for re-locating city park at the lake has been proposed by city council members and by the Parks Board. Decision concerning its new location is on city council agenda for Monday night, regular monthly meeting held for the Council.

Site offered by Texas Electric Service Co. is across the lake in a southwestern direction from the present city park site at Lake Colorado City. Site under consideration is across the water from Wyatt's Point.

Shifting of the city park at the same was agreed upon between city officials and officials of Texas Electric when the company told the city or plans to construct a new \$4 million addition to Morgan Creek power plant.

Construction of that multi-million dollar project is set to begin in September. Present site on Lake Colorado City park on the east shoreline was used until machinery and men are moved in to begin the power plant project.

Cross Country Golf Player Visits C-City

Colorado City was visited this week by Floyd Rood, "the nutty golfer" who is staging a one-man coast to coast drive.

Rood, golf professional, is going across the country now riding the golf ball and riding a Cushman cart. His going stunt, from Santa Barbara, Calif., to Miami, Fla., is for benefit of the Floyd Rood Youth & Sports Foundation, a Louisiana corporation, "the nutty golfer" is the way he bills himself.

He hopes by way of his golf cart trek across the United States to call attention to the need for setting up training centers in cities at abandoned camps or other facilities for the training of youth.

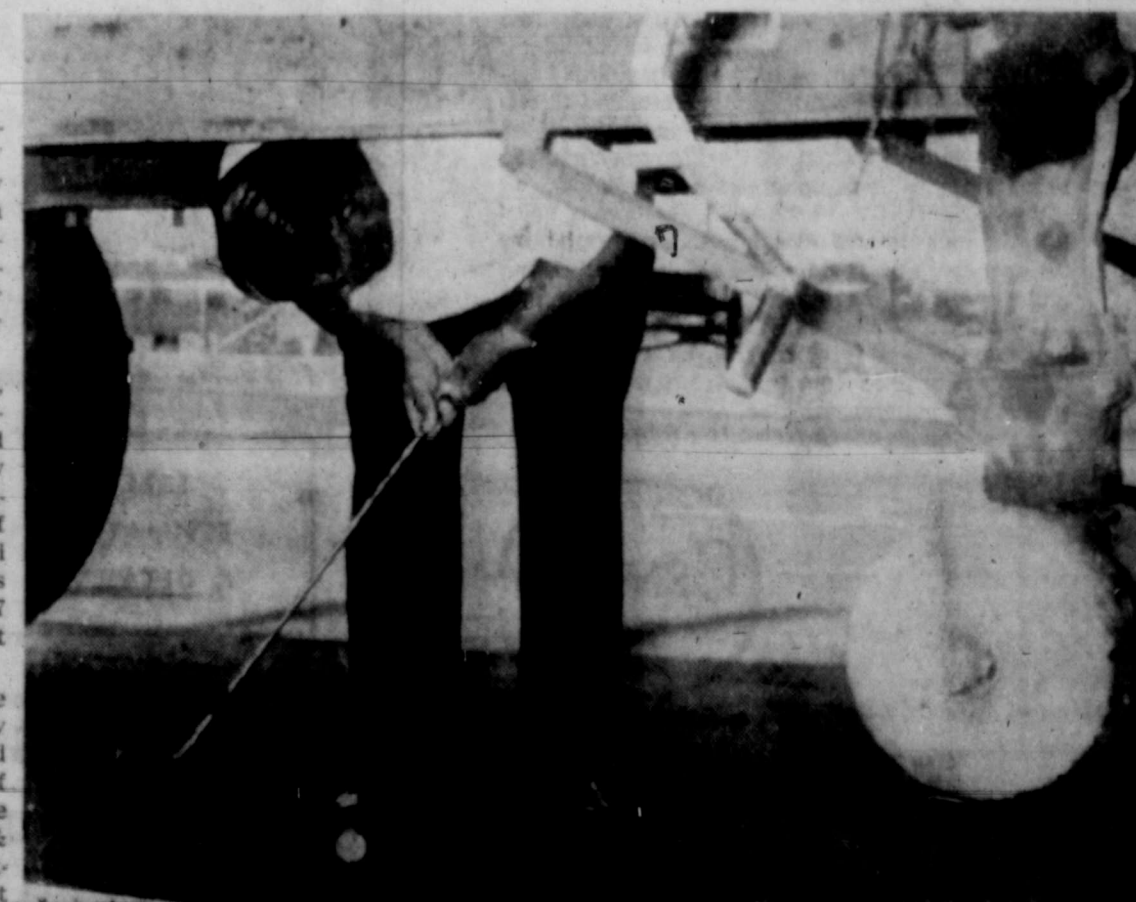
Rood's plan is to give delinquent youth training in trades. "We've got so many kids nobody seems to want," he said. "And they can't get proper training in any reform

school. If you help a youngster he'll turn out all right."

The retired golf pro, now 53, strated his jaunt in Santa Barbara Sept. 14, 1963. Sixty-three miles later he was bitten by a black widow spider and had to take 17 days for treatment.

Since he started he has had, he said, two proposals of marriage—a fact he termed "worse than the black widow bite." He had, when he reached Colorado City, hit the golf ball 34,875 strokes, hit the ball 1,525.6 miles, lost 729 golf balls and had to kick the ball 137 times up-hill. He has been lost himself twice.

"I'm hitting it down the highway," Rood said, "every stroke." First golf ball used was sold to John Foley of Arizona City for \$2,000 to be put into the Rood Youth & Sports Foundation. The cart, traveling golfer expects to get \$3,000 for the last golf ball used in his stunt, he said.

Seems like everybody from Farmers Home Administration to Lady Bird Johnson is 'eyeing poverty' these days.

Mrs. Johnson, wife of the President of the United States, is as pretty, as bright, as charming and as naturally lovable a First Lady as any generation has ever seen. Or ever is likely to see.

Have admired her Democratic fervor ever since that appealing little Southern accent of hers kept its dignity and calm when she was interviewed after certain forces of the opposition publicly spat upon her in our old hometown, Dallas.

LIKE her clothes, her speeches to school graduates and her hospitable, warm, Texas personality.

Thing is... it's confusing, even to this staunch admirer, when anybody, anywhere, 'eyes poverty.'

That kind of poverty — lack of nourishing food, lack of decent housing, lack of employment — is the heart-breaker, the spirit crusher, the mind mangler.

Few of us ever even care to eye it as it exists. Most of us turn away from so much as eyeing it. Much less smelling it. Hearing it. Tasting it.

TRUE poverty, the kind our Lady Bird was eyeing, also has the smell of need. The sound of children crying. The taste of tears, along with the taste of monotony and fear.

To abolish poverty, true poverty, is the dream of any and all idealists.

The more refined type of poverty — just wanting what you haven't got — is more than likely here to stay, fellow citizens.

Might as well learn to live with just two cars and revolving charge accounts. At the very least, you're in good company.

At most, you can learn how to live along and like it.

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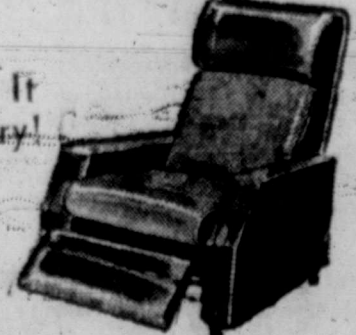
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
