District Court convened in Perryton on Monday morning. Judge W. R. Ewing is seriously ill at his home in Miami and was unable to preside so the attorneys present elected Judge H. E. Hoover of Canadian to serve as acting judge until Judge Newt Willis could get here. Clifford Bralley, Panhandle, is the present district attorney.

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Study These Four Modest Men

Modesty is one of the chief characteristics of true greatness. A man can have no further commendation or no greater bid for popularity than to have it said that he is modest.

This has been a characteristic of President Coolidge. He has avoided the spotlight and attended to the serious duties of his office with becoming humility. His recent word that he did not choose to run for President again should be taken at its face value. It is the solemn dictum of a man who, having achieved the acme of his popularity, desires to step aside.

Another man who is winning all kinds of plaudits and reaping all sorts of popularity from his becoming modesty is the Prince of Wales. Of course he deserves no credit for being born the son of a king, but he does deserve credit for not slopping over. He has managed to say the right thing at the right time and to conduct himself with becoming decorum in whatever lime-light he may be placed. While he is not to be credited with the distinction of being born to royalty, he is entitled to the distinction of caring for the duties of this superior place as he should. He is well liked not only throughout the British Dominions, but in the United States and elsewhere throughout the world.

To those who have met Jack Dempsey personally he has been a surprise. They expected the Manasa mauler to look like a bruiser. They were surprised to find him gentle, well liked by everybody and courteous. His form is slim and his manner is that of a gentleman. He is affectionate in his family relations and altogether those who know him are not envious of his fame.

The fourth modest man that has recently loomed in the horizon has been Lindbergh. After achieving a feat that brought him the plaudits of kings and nations everywhere he apparently was not possessed of the idea that he was a superman, but modestly restrained his claims to those of a flying man. He had crossed the ocean alone in a flying plane, but did not suppose that because he had done a stunt with his machine in the air he could do every other kind of thing. It is with a feeling of pride that the people of this country read of the way he demeaned himself in France and in Great Britain and in connection with the officials of this country. As far as we know, he has made no enemies, for the one thing that makes an enemy is over weaning egotism.

America is justly proud of these four men and principally because they are not proud of themselves especially.

Something Wrong With the System?

There is considerable debate in Washington just now as to whether a special session of Congress is to be called next month to give attention to urgent matters—some of which should be disposed of before the regular session in December—amongst them, party struggle over the seating of Vane of Pennsylvania and Smith of Illinois.

The fact that the new Congress—elected last December—even after thirteen months, bids to be further delayed before it can get down to business—is one feature of our Congressional system which most certainly needs correction.

The thing we should do is to amend the Constitution and provide that the Congressmen and Senators who are elected in November shall take office on the first of the following January. That practice is universal in the parliaments of other countries. If it had been in force in this country there would be no question of having to call an extra session of Congress to take care of the Mississippi flood victims. Congress would have been in session in April when the flood came.

This Constitutional Amendment, proposed by Senator Norris, must pass both houses of Congress, and then be ratified by three-fourths of the States. There is no open opposition to the measure, which in the last three Congresses has passed the Senate—the last time by a vote of 67 to 2. It would have passed the house if it could have been brought to a vote but it has been kept off the floor.

Let's have the Norris amendment passed early at the next session of Congress, and sent for ratification by the forty-eight State Legislatures. It will do away with "lame ducks," short sessions, filibusters and other evils of the legislative jams in the short session which is inflicted upon us every two years. It will remove one of the great barriers to the expression of the popular will at Washington.

Favors An Air Department

Sooner or later, of course, the United States will have three distinct arms for national defense, an Air Department taking its place with that of the Army and Navy. There will be a secretary of equal ranking, with place in the President's cabinet—and unless the trend of the times is entirely misleading, the Air Department will rank first in importance.

Old ideas die slowly. Power gives up its throne ungraciously. It has always been thus. Great minds have usually been persecuted and punished for daring to try to change the order of things—even for distinct advancement of mankind.

Former Colonel William E. Mitchell of the U. S. Army Air Division dared some two or three years ago to tell us what we needed in the air to keep abreast of other nations. He advocated an Air Department under its own head and detached from Army and Navy—to the extent that those departments have always been separated. It was not long until he found himself back in private life.

The American Legion in its Paris convention, just closed, has gone on record for an Air Department—as a new and separate unit of our defense. Of course it will not come soon because Washington does not operate that way. But eventually—

Does the reader of these lines know of a man better qualified to head the department than William E. Mitchell? The nation owes it to him.

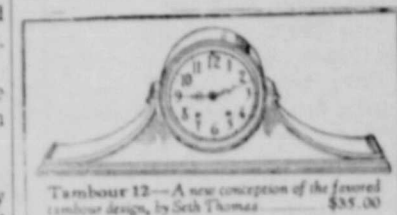

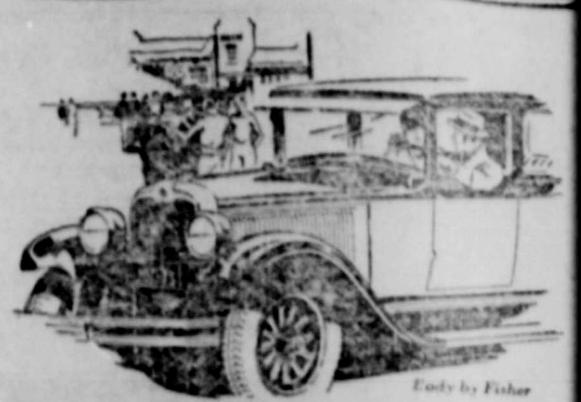

called "the house of God" and now "the gate of heaven," was by the Roman arms crushed into oblivion. Twelve miles north of Jerusalem there is today a wretched, filthy, little Mohammedan town called "Betin," which marks the site of ancient Bethel.

Verses 7-9 emphasize the majesty and might of the God Who had thus spoken to His people. The leaders who perverted judgment to wormwood (v. 7) (bitter wrong) and who struck down righteousness to the earth, were bidden to remember Him who ruled in the heavens, Who ordained the courses of the stars, Who sent light and darkness, Who ordered the succession of the seasons, Who pored floods of waters upon the earth when He chose to do so—"the Lord is His name" (v. 8). What suicide to oppose such a God!

This magnificent description of God's power concludes with an expression which must have made a deep impression upon those who relied upon the military strength of their capital. Dr. Henry Cowles renders v. 9—"Who makes destruction flash out upon the mighty and decolation to come upon the strong city." The verb rendered "flash out" takes its figure from the breaking forth of the dawn upon the darkness of the night—a figure which has most force in countries near the equator, where twilight is short.

Vs. 10-13 further expose the impious character of the leaders of Israel. They had no use for a just magistrate—"him that rebuketh in the gate" (v. 10). At the city gates justice was administered. The popular judge in our day is the one who is ready to give the verdict to the man who will slip him the graft.

They "tread upon the poor" (v. 11) and exacted unjust wheat taxes that the grafter-officials might build themselves costly homes and have plenty of booze to drink. One would almost think Amos was sizing up the day in which we live.

"Therefore the prudent shall keep silent in that time (the judgment foretold) for it is an evil time" (v. 13). Crookedness often masquerades as prudence, but the day will come when God will do the talking, and to Him "all their transgressions and mighty sins" are known (v. 12). However much they may have built

their costly mansions and planted their extensive vineyards, God would frustrate their hope of enjoying them.

Once more Amos urges repentance and reformation. "Seek good and not evil, that ye may live" (v. 14); and then is added the more specific injunction: "Hate the evil and love the good." It is mere empty talk that speaks of God being with a man when he himself is not controlled in heart and life by hatred of evil and love of good.

Until men hate evil and love good there can be no equity in the administration of justice and no reign of truth and righteousness in society. This is not a principle that rules in the natural heart of man, and our New Testament teaches us that it is not until the Lord Jesus Christ comes to dwell in men's hearts by faith that evil does really become hateful to them and good becomes their supreme desire.

Who can fail to see how perfectly the message of Amos fits the day in which we live? Are there not still limits to God's forbearance? Our and has likewise been greatly prospered. God has given us many great devout men to press upon our people His warnings and entreaties. Steadily influential leaders have been seducing the people away from the old Book and the old faith.

Peafowl apostasy stalks abroad.

Rejection of Christ, defiance of the commands of the Bible and ridicule of His worship are in the very atmosphere today. It is hard to fight against God. All of our twentieth-century wisdom and all of our scientific devices put together can never withstand Him when His patience comes to an end. "Seek ye the Lord while He may be found; call ye upon Him while He is near."

PITH AND POINT

Many a man is willing to hear the Word—if it has to do with the other fellow's sins (cf. "against you" v. 1).

There can be no real attachment to the Lord until there is detachment from the world (v. 5).

God endures no rivals. He is not sought truly unless He is sought only.

He who seeks out perishing gods must expect to perish with them (v. 6).

The God who is able to turn the shadow of death into morning and to make the day dark, is able to turn sorrow into joy and the prosperity of sinners to outer darkness (v. 8).

That which is not honestly gotten will not long be enjoyed (v. 11).

All sin is against God and its guilt is heightened when it is done against light (v. 12).

While Athens was governed by the thirty tyrants, Socrates was summoned to the Senate House, and ordered to go, with some others, to seize a certain man of rank and fortune, whom they had determined to put out of the way, that they might get his estate. Socrates flatly refused to participate. "I will not assist in an unjust act," said the

philosopher. Dost thou think," asked one of the officials sharply, that thou canst talk in this high tone and not suffer?" "Far from it," said Socrates; "I expect to suffer a thousand ills, but none so great as to do unjustly." When men are ruled by such a spirit as this, judgment will indeed "run down as waters, and righteousness as a mighty stream."

Getting at the Truth

YEARS ago I had a letter from a school superintendent in a neighboring state making inquiry about Olcott whom I had had in my classes for two or three years. The man asked for a confidential statement, and I gave it to him quite frankly. Olcott had some admirable qualities and he had as well some that would not be helpful to him in filling the position for which he had applied. On the whole he was a pretty good man, and I said so in so many words, but I tried to tell the man who had made the inquiry just what I should have wanted to know had I been thinking of employing Olcott.

In time I received a letter from Olcott who had been shown my letter and who was not pleased with it. He argued that if I said anything about him it should be complimentary. If there was nothing to be said to his credit, it was my duty to remain silent.

It is a question, of course, whether or not in writing a letter of recommendation one should tell all of the truth or only a part of it. There are commendable qualities in the worst of us, and some men who have letters of recommendation to write argue that only the pleasant and the laudatory should be mentioned.

A friend of mine, a superintendent of schools in a large city, who has received as many letters of recommendation as anyone I know said that he came in time to see through the subterfuge of these letters.

"Men often reveal the truth that one is after more by what they omit saying than by what they actually express in words. One must learn to recognize the omissions that have been consciously made, if he would get at the truth."

I had an inquiry concerning Corbett a few weeks ago. He had been dismissed from college for what was really larceny, but there were some mitigating circumstances. I could have camouflaged the situation or ignored it if I had so chosen. It seemed to me wiser to do neither, so I laid my cards on the table. (I knew the man wanted the truth.)

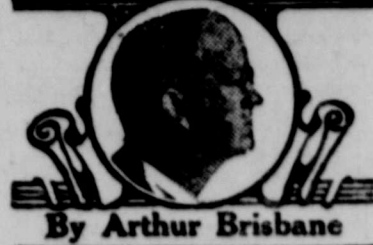
"The boy has had his lesson," I said, "he has paid a pretty severe penalty; I believe he can be trusted in the future."

"I appreciate your telling me the truth," the prospective employer wrote back, "I'm going to give the boy a chance, and I believe he'll make good."

Ultimately employers get at the truth. I believe it is better to help them to it at the outset.

LIGHTNING RODS WORK
THE BABY'S EARS

The American Legion in Paris last week adopted the report of its National Defense Committee, demanding establishment of a national air force as a separate department, with an "Air Force Secretary" in the Cabinet. Common sense.

The National Machine Tool Builders' Exposition in Cleveland, recently was a concentrated demonstration of industrial genius and of the tools that have built prosperity and civilization.

Man differs from all other animals in that he is a tool-using creature.

Animals work with their bodies, the beaver with teeth and broad tail, the woodpecker with his beak, the mud wasp with her sting, putting stunned caterpillars in cold storage for her unborn children.

Man with his brain, creates tools OUTSIDE of his body, then he harnesses the ox, horse, elephant, Niagara Falls and the lightning to work those tools.

Cleveland's exposition contained 30 carloads of machinery sent from eighty cities by 180 companies. There were machines that will turn thirteen-inch guns, others measure a light wave, a million waves or so to the inch.

Lightning struck a barn in Virginia, killed four persons, and two mules, paralyzed a dog and stunned two men. Modern lightning rods properly installed would have prevented that disaster.

Modern protection against lightning is included in the recent White House alteration. All around the balustrade above the White House roof, sharp, short, copper points stand at close intervals, connected by a copper cable, the whole system being connected with the earth, also by copper conductors, buried deep enough in the ground to reach perpetual moisture.

Such lightning rods give real protection. Insurance companies recognize that in lower rates for factories thus protected. Old fashioned, badly installed, cheap lightning rod construction is worthless and even dangerous.

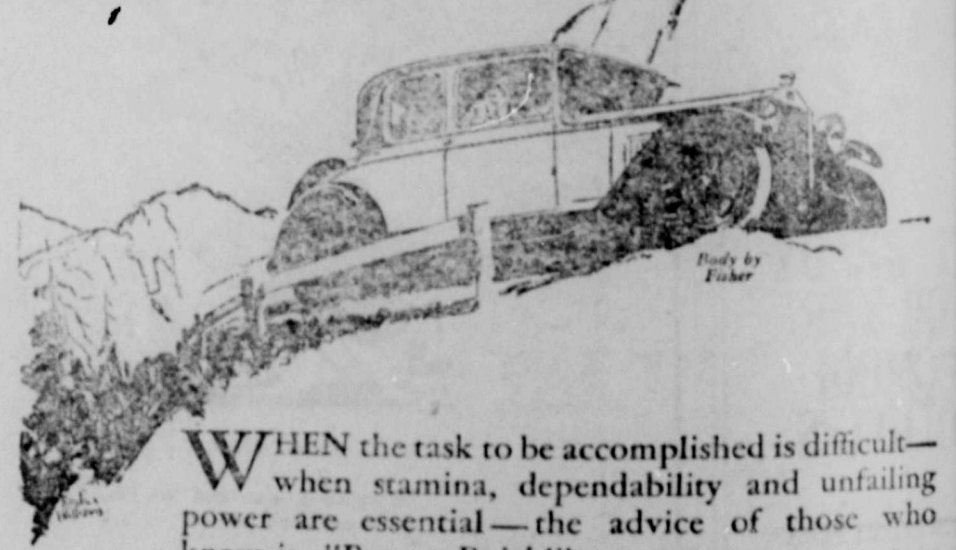

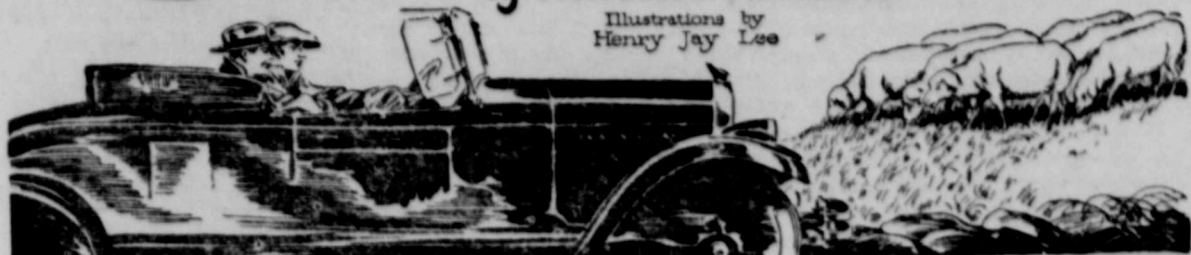

Commissioners' Court Order Concerning New Courthouse

The following order was entered by the Commissioners' Court on October 17th, 1927:

It is the sense of this Court that the construction of a new Court house can not be further delayed. That a new building is demanded and unless constructed by the issuance of time warrants an election will be called to vote bonds for such purpose. That it is to the best interest of the County, and the tax-payer thereof to construe said building by the issuance of time warrants rather than resorting to the issuance of bonds.

In support of this position we will state that any building this court would authorize under the scheme of time warrants for construction and equipment would not exceed the sum of \$100,000.00 and in fact any sum in excess of what is absolutely necessary to secure an adequate building and equipment and in no event to exceed the sum just stated. If we should refuse to authorize the construction of a building upon this plan we feel assured that an election will be called to issue bonds for such purpose and in that event we believe that a much larger sum would be asked for and of course would necessarily be spent. Furthermore if warrants should be issued in payment of such building the building should be fully paid for with the present levies and values without any apparent necessity for increased taxation in the period of time not to exceed ten years.

Whereas, if bonds were voted they would range over a period of forty years and from the best calculations we have been able to make, would be a direct loss to the County and the tax-payers of at least \$100,000.00.

This being the judgment of this Court it is ordered that this order be published in the local newspaper on the front page and in at least two issues thereof so that the citizenship shall be fully advised of the proceedings contemplated, and any person or persons who are not in favor of such proposition may file their objection with the clerk of this Court or may present them in person to the Court at its next regular meeting, which will convene on the 14th day of November, 1927, and will remain in session until all parties are heard and their objections or otherwise fully considered and if no considerable objections are filed or urged within the time and as above specified, or if after a full and fair hearing the Court feels it would be to the best interest of the citizenship as a whole to proceed with the matter, it will at the next term take final action in the matter and enter into such contract or contracts as may be necessary for the construction of a new building as above stated and will commence construction thereof at the earliest practicable date.

The Livestock Situation.

It is doubtful if there ever has been a more optimistic feeling in the cattle situation generally than prevails at this time. An actual shortage of cattle is claimed by some in the trade—others are of the opinion that as a matter of fact, there are not enough cattle in the country to prove burdensome yet there may be nothing about the situation to warrant extremely high prices or talk of anything that might be termed an extreme beef shortage.

During the war period when, both for patriotic reasons and under influence of high prices, an oversupply was created, the crash which followed as a result of a lower market ruined many good cattlemen and "in and outers." Since that time and up until the past year or so, deflation was in progress. Until 1926, most of the liquidation of cattle was forced because of financial pressure and because of lack of sufficient feed. Personally, it seems to me that in 1926 and early in 1927, the movement of cattle to market had much the appearance of a clean-up of undesirable cattle. The result, at least, is that at the present time, western ranges are pretty well cleaned up of old, worn-out breeding stock and aged steers. The ranges are carrying barely enough cattle to produce enough young stock to move readily at the markets, and the ranges are reseeded and better feed conditions are

developing, aided by good rains.

Right at this time, the cattle situation as far as the western producer is concerned, is almost ideal. There is a ready market for everything that can be produced above actual replacement needs, perhaps not at high prices but certainly at satisfactory and profitable prices.

September receipts at the 67 public livestock markets in the U. S. as shown by the department of agriculture, are 17 per cent fewer than for the 5-year average. Likewise, the slaughter of cattle at those points is 16 per cent smaller than a year ago and 10 per cent smaller than for the 5-year average. Stock and feeder movements to the country show a decline of 22 per cent from a year ago and a 27 per cent decrease from the 5-year average.

Despite these figures for the country as a whole, it is interesting to note that the slaughter of cattle at Los Angeles, the principal packing center of the Pacific coast, are actually larger than a year previous. For the first nine months of 1927, the Los Angeles slaughter of cattle totaled 228,955 head, as compared with 222,190 cattle during the corresponding period of 1926.

From these contrasting figures, the principal lesson which might be gathered is that the consumer demand on the Pacific coast is steadily increasing. In the face of admittedly smaller cattle population in the country as a whole, the

cattle population in California fails to show a proportionate decrease, a slight increase being noted, as a matter of fact. Thus it may be gathered that supply and demand have had a great deal to do with regulating the cattle population. There has been no pressing need of cutting down cattle supplies in California because the human population has increased more rapidly than the cattle population.

But the cattle population is now well balanced in ratio to the market requirements in most sections of the country. The best minds in the trade see no reason for any rapid expansions of the cattle supply but rather feel that the natural output of beef breeding herds will provide all necessary requirements and at a satisfactory profit to the industry.

Forty-eight members and five visitors were present. This is the largest club meeting we have had for some time. We were glad to have the visitors and hope they will come back.

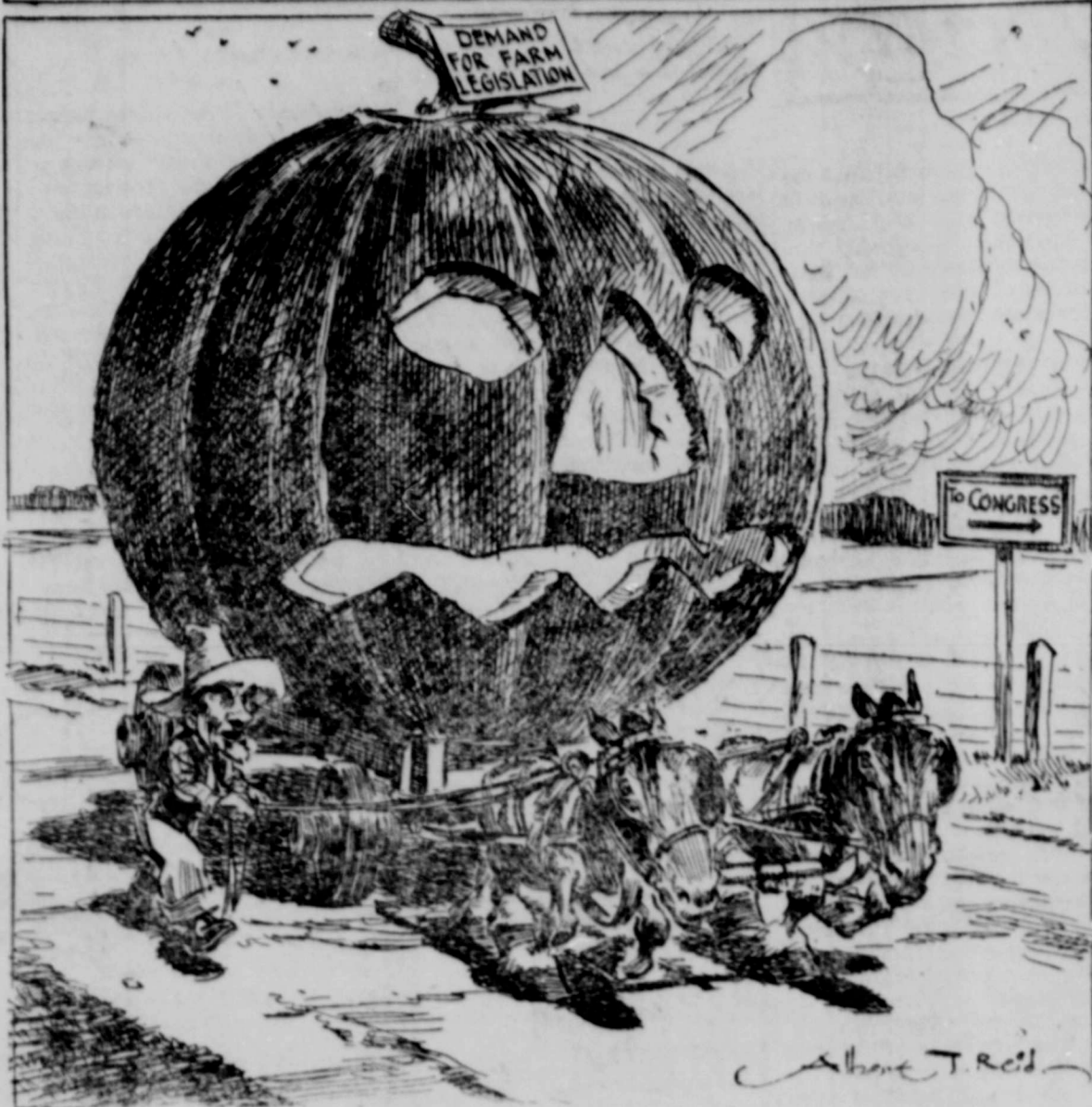
