Lubbock MD's Are Scheduled To Be In Olton

Two MD's from the University Clinic at Lubbock will begin Thursday to help provide medical service for people of the Olton and surrounding area.

Dr. R. E. Lemons and Dr. Ed Bayouph will alternate each Tuesday and Thursday coming to Olton Community Clinic for the purpose of seeing patients.

Appointments will be taken at the Olton Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture Office or at the Olton Enterprise. For an appointments between hours of 10 a. m. and 4 p. m., call 285-2292 or 285-2631.

Supplies will be bought for the clinic with proceeds from the style show which was held Friday night for the benefit of raising funds for a doctor-hospital fund.

Volunteer workers will provide bookkeeping service, receptionists and nurses. Those who can work on Tuesdays or Thursdays are asked to call the Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture secretary, Frances Redinger.

Mrs. Redinger stated that persons unable to pay for medical services may still see the D.O. who will be in the Clinic on Wednesdays. Persons making appointments to see the MD's on Tuesdays and Thursdays will be expected to pay for their services.

The MD's will be able to take blood samples and other lab work back to Lubbock with them on Tuesdays and bring the results back to Olton on Thursdays.

'Four More Years' Decreed By Voters

Hart voters went along with the county, state and nation in approving President Richard Nixon for another four years but by a much smaller margin in the local box.

While the nation's voters were giving a landslide victory to the Republican candidate, Hart voters narrowed the gap with 198 votes for Nixon and Agnew and 152 votes for the Democratic slate of George McGovern and Sargent Shriver. Castro County results were 1534 to 751.

Barefoot Sanders was the choice of Castro Countians for the U. S. Senate post held by John Tower. Balloting county-wide was Sanders, 1206; Tower, 1168. Hart voters cast 215 votes for Sanders, 128 for Tower.

Unopposed, George Mahon drew 1798 votes in the county and 286 locally.

Democratic hopeful Dolph Briscoe garnered 1803 votes in the county and 260 locally with Hank Grover amassing 897 and 81. Outcome of that race was still in doubt at press time Wednesday morning although Briscoe was presumed the winner with a narrow lead. Castro County also reported 113 votes cast for Ramsey Muniz of the Raza Unida Party and 3 votes

for Deborah Leonard of the Socialist Workers.

Bill Hobby received 1900 votes for lieutenant governor across the county and 287 locally. Meyer Alewitz and Alma Canales received 4 and 98 votes, respectively, in the county.

John Hill, with no Republican opponent, swept the attorney general's race easily with 1899 votes in the county; 280 locally Robert Calvert was returned to the comptroller's office with 1935 and 285.

Maurice Angly Jr., Republican candidate for state treasurer, drew 817 and 80 in his bid to unseat Jesse James. James received 1521 and 250. Ruben Solis Jr., Raza Unida candidate, received 93.

Bob Armstrong drew 1843 and 282 to Howard Patrick's 14 and 1 for commissioner of the general land office. John White was re-elected agriculture commissioner with 1926 and 286.

In the railroad commissioner race, Bryon Tunnell received 1786 and 273; Jim Segrest, 528 and 42 and Fred Garza, 100 and 4.

Other results included Chief Justice, Supreme Court, Joe Greenhill, 1909 and 276; Associate Justice, Price Daniel, 1990

and 293; Associate Justice, Sam Johnson, 1927 and 285; Judge of Court of Criminal Appeals, Wendell A. Odom, 1919 and 283; State Senator, Max Sherman, 1933 and 283; State Representative, Bill Clayton, 1997 and 291; member, State Board Education, James H. Whiteside, 1913 and 280; Chief Justice, Civil Appeals, James A. Ellis, 1915 and 279.

On the home front, Jack Cartwright was re-elected without opposition and garnered 2050 votes over the county and 299 locally. George Bennett was elected commissioner with 477 and 306 votes.

Voting for the proposed constitutional amendments in Castro County were in accordance with voters across Texas with numbers one, nine and eleven going down in defeat. Castro Countians also disapproved Number 13. Amendments one and eleven provided increased in salaries for members of the Senate and House of Representatives and Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House, respectively. Nine would have provided directors of soil and water conservation districts to not be disqualified from holding or being compensated for

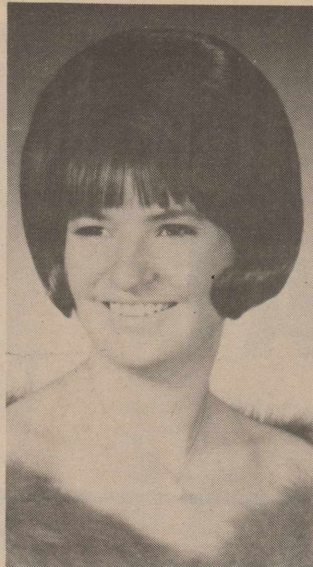

Irene's Ideas

Time certainly is flying by isn't it? Here we are already in November. I hope each of you have already started on your Christmas shopping. If we get started on these jobs now it won't place us in that holiday rush and also chances are we're more likely to find the items we want. This is also the time to get started on your baking, fruitcake should be made now so the flavors can mellow and be enhanced before the holidays.

Lemons have long been known for their beautifying action. Many of our cosmetics are made with lemon and manufacturers try to make us believe that lemons have just been discovered. There are many ways we can use lemons ourselves at home and get the same effect as with the cosmetics but at much less expense. The fresh lemon rinse on your hair helps to cut dulling soap film and leaves your hair shiny. After shampooing, squeeze the juice from a lemon directly on your hair, massage thorough, and rinse. For skin freshner rub a half lemon on your face. It leaves your skin feeling tingly clean and helps remove excess oil. Here are two good lemon facial masks. Lightly beat one egg white. Mix in 1 tablespoon of mayonnaise and 1 tablespoon of lemon juice. Spread on face and neck and allow to dry. Rinse with warm water. You may prefer to try this one. Mix one egg white and 1/2 cup lemon juice with sufficient dry oatmeal to make a paste. Apply to face and neck

and allow to dry. Rinse with warm water. Save your spare lemon peels. Drop them in your bath water or rub them over your arms and legs after bathing. The natural lemon oils, the same ones found in expensive creams, make the pores of your skin feel tingly and elegantly fresh. (A small number of persons are allergic to lemon oils; test a small patch of skin to determine whether lemon oil is irritating to you.)

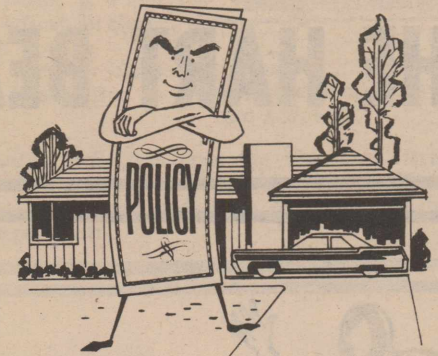

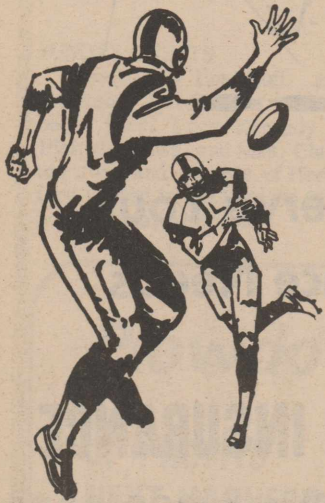
the ball game.

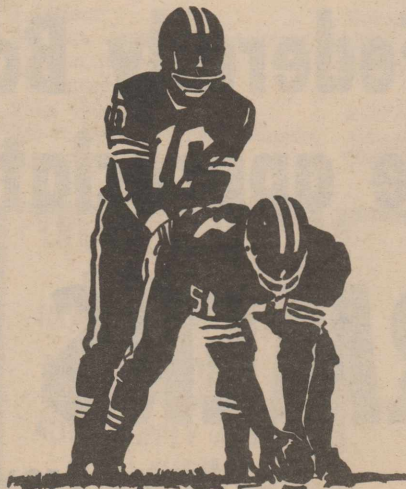

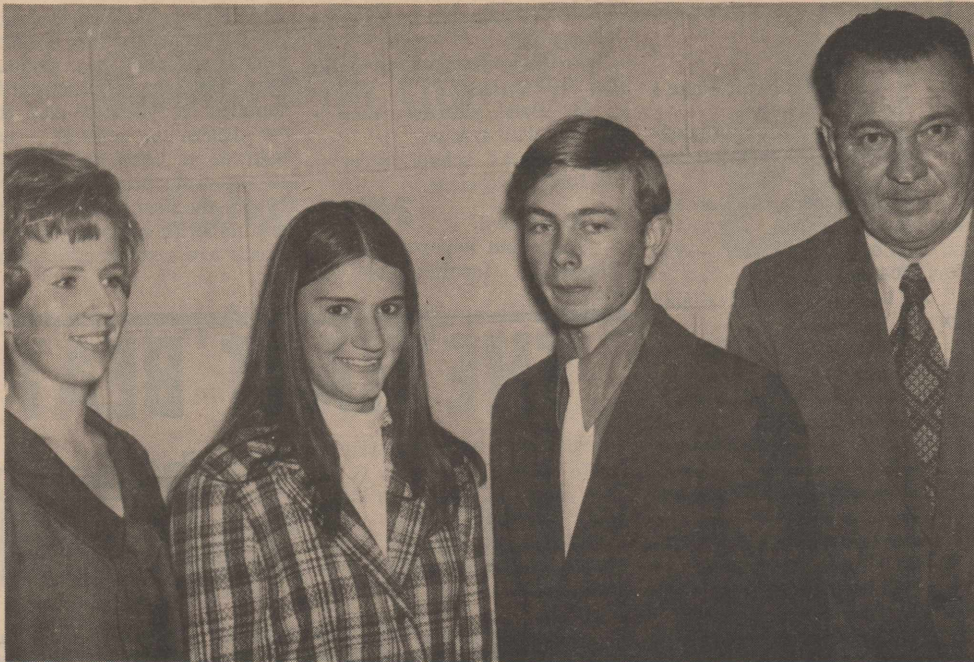

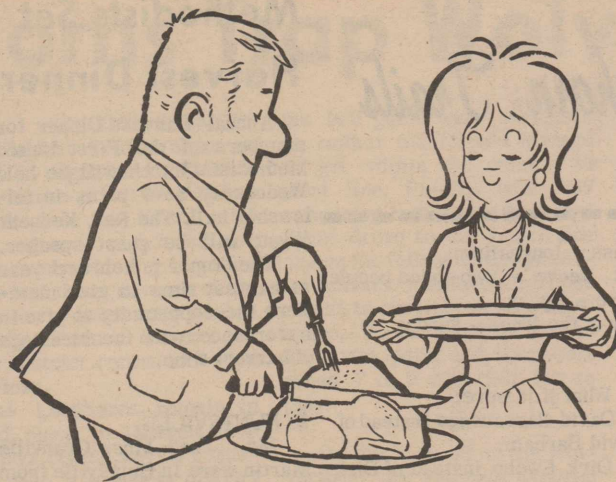

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--- Recipe Round-Up ---

PUMPKIN CAKE

2 c. sugar
4 eggs
1 1/2 c. Wesson oil
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. vanilla
2 tsp. soda
1 tsp. cinnamon
1 No. 2 can pumpkin
2 c flour

Grease and flour tube pan. Mix all ingredients and pour in pan. Bake at 350 degrees for about 1 hour and 10 minutes. Can be eaten plain or with icing.

CREAM CHEESE ICING

1 box powdered sugar
1 3 oz. pkg. cream cheese
1 stick oleo
1 c. pecans
Cream together.

CARAMEL CHOCO-SQUARES

49 caramels (1 14 oz. pkg. Kraft caramels)
1/3 c. evaporated milk
1 pkg. German chocolate cake mix
3/4 c. melted oleo
1/3 c. evaporated milk
1 c. chopped nuts
1 c. chocolate chips (6 oz. bag)

In double boiler, combine caramels and 1/3 cup milk. Stir constantly till melted. Set aside. In large bowl, combine cake mix, oleo and 1/3 cup milk. BY HAND, stir till blended. Add nuts. Press 1/2 dough into greased 13x9 pan; reserve remaining dough. Bake 6 minutes in 350 degree oven. Remove from oven, sprinkle with chocolate chips. Spread melted caramels over caramels and top with remaining dough. Return to oven and bake 15-20 minutes. Cool. Cut in bars.

GERMAN FRUIT CAKE

3/4 c. butter or oleo
2 c. sugar
4 eggs, whole
3 c. flour
1/2 tsp. each allspice, cinnamon, nutmeg
1 c. buttermilk
1 tsp. soda
2/3 c. each cherry, pineapple, apricot preserves

1 c. pecans
1 tsp. vanilla

Cream oleo and sugar. Blend in eggs. Sift flour and spices together and add alternately with milk to which soda has been added. Fold in preserves (you may substitute "flavors" but use three different kinds) nuts and vanilla. Bake in greased and floured loaf pan (makes two) in 325 degree oven 1 1/2 hours. May be baked in tube or bundt pan.

PEANUT BUTTER FUDGE

2 c. sugar
2/3 c. milk
Cook together till reaches soft ball stage. Remove from fire and stir in 1 jar marshmallow cream, 1 cup crunchy peanut butter and 1 tsp. vanilla. Pour into buttered pan.

FRUIT SALAD PIES (Makes 3 pies)

1 can tart cherries
6 drops red food coloring
3 T. corn starch
Drain cherries, add enough water to make 1 1/2 cup liquid. Cook cherries, liquid, coloring, and corn starch till thick and clear - remove from heat. Add 1 pkg. raspberry Jello, 1 cup sugar and stir - then cool. Add 1 c. crushed pineapple, 4 bananas (cubed) and 1 c. pecans and pour into 3 pie shells. Let pies set and top with whipped cream.

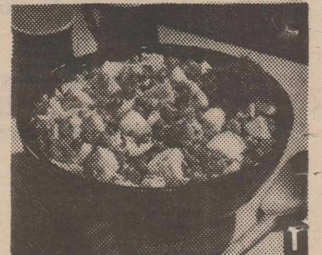

Accent on Health

What did these individuals have in common? They are among the hundreds of thousands of individuals who have lost their lives to cancer.

More than 52 million Americans now living will eventually have cancer; one in four persons according to present rates. Cancer will strike over the years in approximately two of three families. In the 70's, there will be an estimated 3.5 million cancer deaths, 6.5 million new cancer cases recorded in this country, and 10 million under medical care for cancer.

There will be about 650,000 new cancer cases (diagnosed for the first time) in 1972. This year about 345,000 will die of the disease; that is about 960 persons a day, more than one every two minutes. Of every six deaths from all causes in the U. S., one is from cancer. This year cancer will take the lives of approximately 4,000 children under the age of 15. Cancer is the second leading cause of death in the United States, second only to heart disease.

Texas has its share of tragedy from cancer, say State Health officials. Some 16,476 Texans died of cancer in 1971. The disease will claim approximately the same number again this year. It is estimated that over 31,000 new cancer cases will be diagnosed in Texas this year.

State health officials are quick to join their federal counterparts in warning the public against over-optimism in what

some reports have labeled a "potential breakthrough" in the treatment of cancer. Very limited success under very controlled animal tests in the laboratory cannot yet be regarded as the discovery of a complete cure.

But the stepped-up federal battle against cancer is pushing ahead on a variety of fronts. Federal funding for cancer control is to reach \$40 million annually a year from now. Almost completed by the National Cancer Institute is a master plan detailing the strategy for achieving the expanded, intensified and coordinated cancer research program called for in the National Cancer Act of 1971.

Plans include establishing programs for cooperating with state and other health agencies in the prevention, diagnosis and treatment of cancer and rehabilitation of its surviving victims.

Cancer control programs that include public education are to be one of the major missions of an envisioned national network of comprehensive cancer research and demonstration centers.

Since 1936, the cancer death rate has fallen slowly but steadily in women, a drop of eight percent. In men the rate has increased about 40 percent.

The rise in cancer mortality in men is mainly due to rapidly increasing cancer of the lung, a largely preventable disease. The decline among women is due chiefly to reduction

in mortality from cancer of the uterus, largely due to wider use of the Pap test which uncovers cervical cancer earlier, before it has begun to spread.

Cancer of the lung has been increasing steadily in women as well as men. Cancer of the breast is the leading cause of death among women 40 to 44 years of age. Cancer of the colon and rectum has seen slight--if any--progress in the last several years. Incidence of cancer of the pancreas, a highly fatal form, is up 65 percent in the past generation and up 200 percent in the past 40 years, for no known reason. The survival rate of men from cancer of the larynx improved until the 1960's, but has now levelled off. The same is true with cancer of the bladder, lip-tongue-mouth, kidney and brain.

Most cancer education programs emphasize three ways

for individuals to protect themselves against cancer: (1) adopt preventive habits: avoid cigarette smoking, overexposure to sunlight and other known causes of cancer; (2) have a medical checkup annually, no matter how well they feel; and (3) learn cancer's warning signals and go to their doctor immediately if one should occur.

Cancer's warning signals include: a change in bowel or bladder habits; a sore that does not heal; unusual bleeding or discharge; thickening or lump in the breast or elsewhere; in digestion or difficulty in swallowing; an obvious change in a wart or mole; and a nagging cough or hoarseness.

DPS Intensifies Efforts To Stop Highway Litter

An intensified effort to prevent littering on the highways of Texas was announced today by Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Speir said DPS patrolmen in all uniformed services have been ordered to watch closely for motorists or other persons throwing litter on the highways or rights-of-way, and to take appropriate enforcement action.

State law prohibits the dumping or depositing of refuse, garbage, rubbish or junk on public streets, roads or highways. It is also unlawful to dump any sort of waste on rights-of-ways, beaches, parking areas,

or in inland streams or coastal waters.

The law makes drivers responsible for any refuse or garbage falling from their vehicles.

Fines for littering offenses may be as high as \$200, and minimum fines of \$25 are provided in some instances.

Speir said the DPS made 841 littering arrests in 1971 as compared to 225 in 1960. Total pollution oriented arrests by the Department of Public Safety last year totaled almost 7,000 including such offenses as loose material, material spillage and faulty mufflers and exhaust emission systems.

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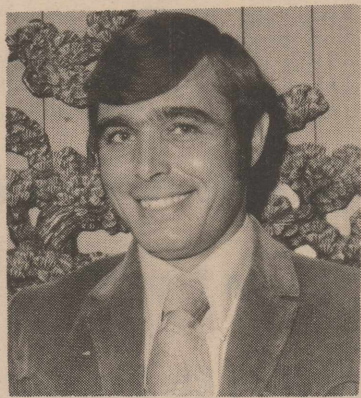
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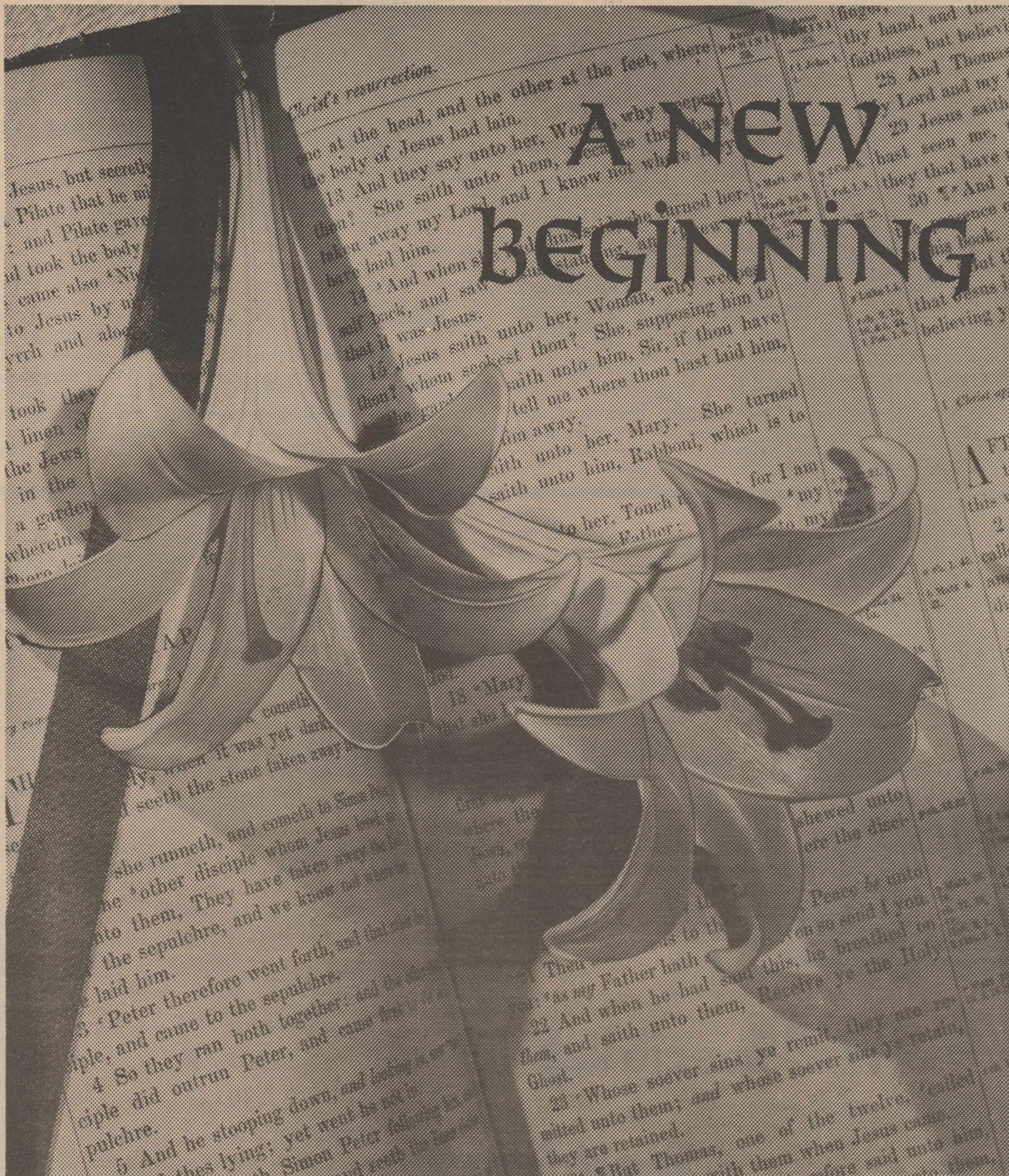
