**LOOK BEFORE YOU SHOOT**

The following article from the Ft. Worth Star-Telegram seems to us very apt just now. We hope our nimble will read it and remember it when they start out on hunting expeditions.

A certain young man, a citizen of grand old Missouri, of home ly speech but philosophic mind, once invented the saying that there are three things more pleasant to give than receive—medicine, advice and kicks.

The Star-Telegram, on the eve of the hunting season, feels inclined to give some of the middle article of this trio of benefactions—advice—but rather as a duty than a pleasure.

It is to look before shooting, and, as the eating house nabobs say when they go on a strictly cash basis, "this means you." To all hunters and shooters, whether novices or veterans of many open and closed seasons, this admonition applies, for all at various times and in sundry manners, are liable to take the "buck shakes" and go astray, or let their bullets go astray, which is still worse.

On the very first day of the open deer season in New Jersey, from one community comes the account of two tragedies, the direct consequence of shooting first and then looking, instead of the reverse of this order. A 19-year-old high school student, with a heavily loaded shotgun in his trembling hands, fired at a big buck at close range. He killed the deer alright, but some of the handful of buckshot in his gun went over the mark and also killed his hunting companion, who was on the opposite side of a thicket trying to get a shot at the same deer.

In the other case two young men who had gone out before daylight sighted a deer in the early dawn and followed it but in the brush they became separated and lost sight of each other, each man naturally intent and eager for a successful shot. In the semi-darkness one of them saw a dimly outlined moving object that looked like a deer. But it was his friend and partner in the sport, and the hasty shot killed him instantly.

It is quite true, of course, this presents nothing new or unusual. Each is, in fact, typical of what has happened over and over during many game seasons in various states. But such acts of precipitancy and guessing are in no wise excusable because of repetition.

It is of great importance to ambitious hunter of big game to bring down a buck, of course, but really it is not always of first importance. The thing to know beyond the shadow of a doubt is that the object seen is the game sought and that a fellow hunter is not in range of the powerful, long-distance sporting guns now in use.

Therefore it is good and timely counsel to each hunter, old or young, to "look before you shoot, lest you regret, lest you regret."

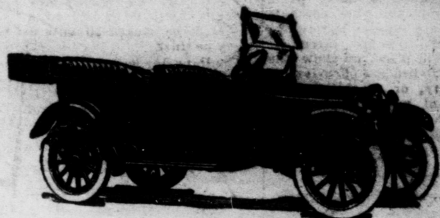

## HELP KEEP JUNCTION FREE FROM TYPHOID

At the request of the Civic League we publish the three following rules, taken from the Advisory Supplement to the Sanitary Code for Texas. These rules, together with the others contained in the Code may with the approval of the majority of the County Commissioners, be enforced in Junction, and have the full force and effect of law. The Civic League considers taking up this matter with the Commissioners and urging the adoption of the Supplement to the Sanitary Code, as it will bring about great improvement in sanitary conditions of our town. We would be very glad indeed to see such rules adopted and enforced. The neglect along the lines referred to in these quoted rules is a standing, burning disgrace to Junction citizenship. Present conditions encourage and breed disease, such as typhoid. Ask your family physician if these statements are not true. Won't you do your part toward ridding Junction and keeping it rid of typhoid? Let's clean up! Here are the three rules:

**RULE 3.** It shall be the duty of every owner or proprietor of every livery stable to construct a water tight box or bin of sufficient size to hold not more than one wagon load of manure, in which all offal or droppings of animals shall be kept, and the contents of said box must be carted off, once a week, or often or when full, or whenever it becomes a nuisance.

**RULE 5.** All cattle, horse, or hog pens, stables or enclosures in which any cattle, horse or hogs may be kept or confined shall be so drained, and all offal so removed as to create no offensive odor or smell.

**RULE 6.** No person owning or occupying any premises shall knowingly construct or keep or allow to be kept on their premises any privy, the contents whereof are exposed to view, or can be seen from any street or other public place, or allow the contents to become offensive or unsanitary, or discharge the contents of a privy or water closet into any street, alley, public thoroughfare, or other public place, or upon the premises of any other person.

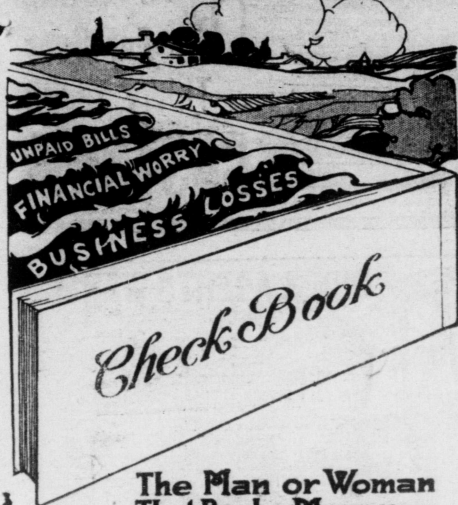

"Unless by the work of man or the intervention of unexpected natural causes and favorable weather conditions something is done to destroy boll weevils now in the cotton fields of Texas, this pest will next year destroy a million or more bales of cotton in this State next year," says W. F. Proctor, State Agent in charge of Demonstration Work in Texas.

"There are more weevils in Texas at this time than at any time since they made their appearance in this State," continued Mr. Proctor, "and they are scattered over a large area. The damage to this year's crop was large, but it is a trifle in comparison with the loss they will cause Texas farmers next year unless something is done to prevent it.

The heavy growth put on by the cotton plant after the rains that accompanied the gulf storm has furnished the weevils an ample food supply to carry them in winter quarters and unless farmers destroy them early they will have an immense army to fight next spring and summer.

Mr. Proctor urges all farmers to give attention to the weevil menace as soon as they finish picking cotton. Where the size of the stalks and the number of stalks permit the stalks may be pastured, but the plan is not advised unless the farmer has enough cattle to clean up all the stalks.

Another plan recommended by Mr. Proctor is to cut the stalks green and plow them under. If that cannot be done he advises that the stalks be cut and burned.

If the latter plan is followed he suggests that every 11th and 12th row be left standing. The weevils will desert the dead stalks and crowd into the two rows left standing. When the cut stalks are dry enough to burn rake into windrows along side the standing stalks and burn. The fire will lap over and destroy the trapped weevils.

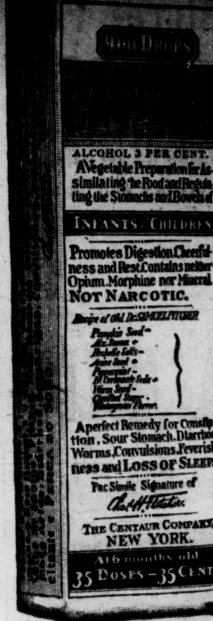
