Area Elections Post Few Surprises

Area elections Saturday posted few surprises as only a limited number of races were contested and the turnout was light in most areas.

Results follow.

BOGATA

John Worth Hood was elected mayor of Bogata in Saturday's city elections. He received 80 votes.

Write-in candidate James Wood received two votes. Hood replaces William C. Bernard who did not seek re-election as mayor.

In the city council race, Dr. Jack Troutt and Mrs. Iva Hooker were elected to the council. Dr. Troutt, who

received 82 votes was the incumbent in the race. Mrs. Hooker, who received 67 votes replaced H. Ed Bryson who did not seek re-election as councilman. Danny Smith received 27 votes.

TALCO-BOGATA ISD

Jerry Clemmons, John M. Ward and Dr. E.E. Brooks were re-elected to three-year terms on the Talco-Bogata Independent School District Board of Trustees Saturday. Clemmons was elected from Talco with 97 votes. Ward was elected to the Bogata seat with 127 votes, and Dr. Brooks was elected to the at-large seat with 108 votes.

Ms. Patsy Smith, who ran for the Talco seat, received 41 votes.

DEPORT

Charles Foster was elected mayor 37 votes in the Deport city council elections held Saturday. Foster was running unopposed.

Mrs. Ross Skaggs and Duane Glover were elected to another term on the city council. Mrs. Skaggs received 37 votes and Glover received 36 votes. Dale Gray, a write-in candidate received two votes in the election.

BLOSSOM

L.C. Cotham was elected mayor of Blossom with 135 votes in Saturday's Blossom city elections.

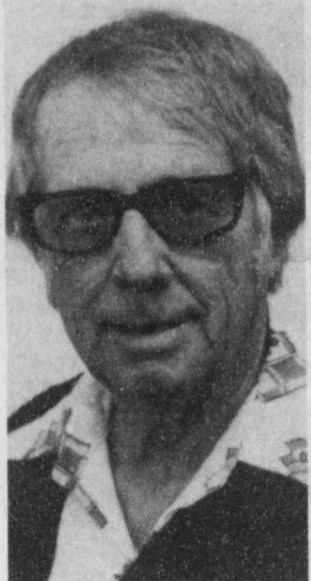
Frances Brewer received the next largest amount of votes with 29, and Roger S. Johnson received 19 votes.

Cotham replaces L.J. Myers, who did not seek re-election, as mayor.

In the city council race, George W. Lemley, Roger E. Daugherty and Mrs. V. JoAnne Roberson were elected to the council. Lemley received 143 votes, Daugherty received 136 votes and Mrs. Roberson received 140 votes.

Write-in candidate Walter Harrison and Thomas House received three votes each. Miscellaneous write-in votes numbered 17, election judge

James E. White, who withdrew from the race before the election, received six votes while write-in candidate Jerry Gilley received 13. Another write-in candidate, Walter Harrison, got one vote.

In the Place 2 race, Morrison received 140 votes, L. C. Cotham got 99 and write-in candidate Bethel Harrison received one vote.

Stinson, unopposed in his bid for re-election, received 197 votes from the 244 cast and write-in candidates John Gifford and Thomas Nichols received two and one, respectively.

SAVE WITH A WOOD STOVE

They told me I could save if I heated with a wood stove. So here is a brief list of the expenses incurred in the project:

Stove pipe, installation, etc., \$458; six round trips to town for supplies, 40 miles at 20cents per mile, \$48; Chain saw, \$149.95; gas and maintenance for chain saw, \$44.60; four-wheel drive pickup, stripped, \$8,379.04; four-wheel drive pickup, maintenance, \$438;

Replace rear window of pickup (twice), \$310; fine for cutting unmarked tree in state forest, \$500; 14 cases of beer, \$116; littering fine, \$50; doctor's fee for removing splinter from eye, \$45; safety glasses, \$29.50; emergency room treatment (broken toes—dropped logs), \$125; Safety shoes, \$49.50; new living room carpet, \$800; paint walls and ceiling, \$110; chimney cleaning brush and rods, \$45; log splitter, \$150; 15-acre woodlot, \$9,000; taxes on woodlot, \$310; replace coffee table (chopped up and burned while drunk), \$75; divorce settlement, \$33,678.22.

Total first year's cost, \$54,970.81; savings in conventional fuel, first year, \$107.37.

Net cost of first year's woodburning, \$54,836.42.

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Brown Patch

Blotches

Lawns

St. Augustine grass lawns will be greening up soon and circular patterns of dead grass will be noticeable. The problem—brown patch.

Brown patch is a fungus disease occurring in late spring or early fall. It is characterized by circular patterns (1 to 50 feet in diameter) of dead grass in the turf. Often healthy grass will persist or grow back into the interior of the circle so that the diseased area has a "doughnut appearance."

Where the brown patch fungus is present in St. Augustine grass growing in shady or moist areas, a large area of turf may be thinned and eventually killed.

The disease develops rapidly in moist areas where temperatures range between 75 and 85 degrees F. Fungus activity stops when the air temperature reaches 90 degrees. This explains the seasonal development of the disease.

Brown patch can be effectively controlled by timely fungicide applications. The fungicide should be applied when the disease is expected or when it first appears.

Fungicides recommended for control of brown patch include Benomyl, PCNB and the Maneb-Zinc iron complex. These materials are available at farm supply stores or garden centers.

Weatherization

Grant Awarded

The State of Texas has been awarded a grant of \$2,000,000 to continue implementation of the U. S. Department of Energy's (DOE) Weatherization Assistance Program for Low-Income Persons in Texas, it was announced by G. Dan Rambo, Regional Representative for DOE.

The grant will allow Texas to continue weatherizing homes of low-income residents under the FY 1980 plan developed by the Texas

Department of Community Affairs. This will be the fourth year that weatherization assistance has been provided to low-income Texans under the DOE Weatherization Program which has resulted in the weatherization of more than 7,000 homes.

The Texas program is part of a nationwide effort to reduce energy consumption and improve the dwelling unit environment of the low-income persons in the nation.

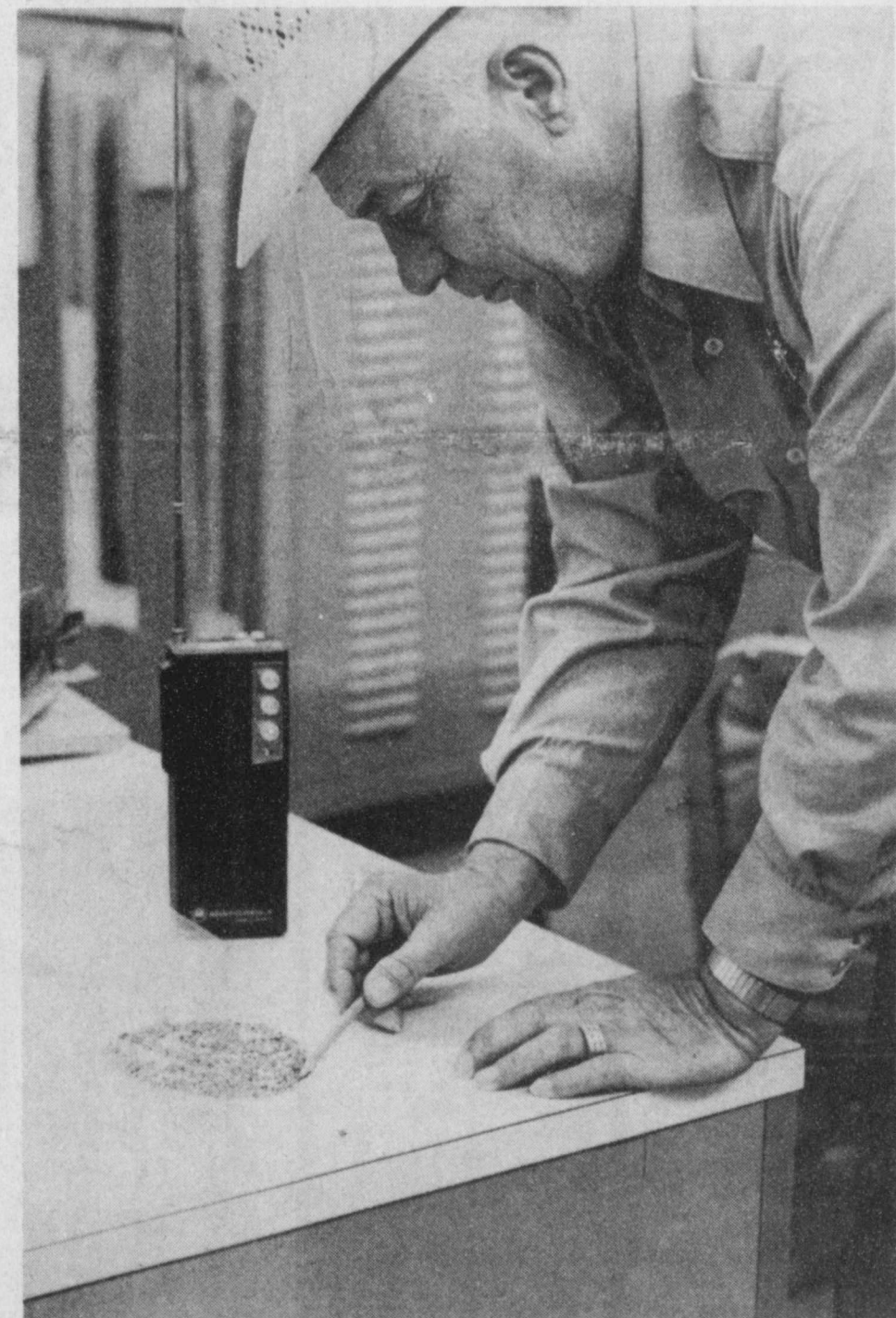

Paris Art Fair Set For April 26

Artist and craftsmen from this area are invited to sell their work at the 19th annual Paris Art Fair in Paris, Texas Saturday, April 26 from 10 a.m. until 6 p.m. on the campus of Paris Junior College.

The event is sponsored by the YWCA and all proceeds from concessions, stall rental and other fees go to continue the service projects of the YWCA.

Space is available to artists and craftsmen at \$25 for 12 ft. by 12 ft. area. Artists may share space at no additional charge and no commission is charged on sales from the stalls.

Thousands of people from Texas and Oklahoma attend the Paris Art Fair which features \$1500 in prizes for artists and craftsmen, entertainment, homemade foods, children's creative activities, a new professional division, a hot air balloonist, and atmosphere of fun and

fellowship, according to Linda Clark, executive director of the YWCA.

Six hundred dollars in prizes will be awarded in the professional division. Those entries must be received by April 18 and may be shipped to the YWCA, 308 S. Main. Entry fee for this division is \$5 per piece. The Senior Division, which may be entered the day of the fair between 8 and 10 a.m. will award \$900 in prizes. Entry fee is \$2 per piece for this division. Anyone may enter the competition, they need not be renting stall space. Work must be original and not previously entered in the Paris Art Fair.

Entertainment features bands, choirs, jazz and country music, disco dancing and Middle Eastern dance. The PJC fine arts department will be presenting "The Importance of Being Earnest." The Paris 10,000 meter run is also

set for the day of the fair. Hot air balloonist, Mark Meyers, will appear at the fair in his bright orange and green balloon. Meyers is a Paris Junior College student.

An alternate location in several buildings on the Paris Junior College campus is available in case of severe weather. The fair will be held rain or shine, according to Fair officials.

Select Garden Seed Varieties With Care

Attractive and colorful seed catalogs and seed packets on store shelves are great temptations to the impulsive

garden buyer, but vegetables varieties and seed must be selected with great care.

Often the success or failure of a home vegetable garden depends on the kind and variety of vegetables selected, emphasizes Bob Moody, county agent.

Varities differ in time of maturity, quality and disease resistance. Such information is usually noted on most seed packets. Some companies also indicate which vegetable varieties are best suited for preservation by canning or freezing.

Choose varieties with built-in resistance to diseases, advises Moody. This added protection can prevent many problems and insure a better crop.

New disease-resistant varieties are continually being developed by universities and private companies. Current listings are available through the county Extension office.

When buying seed, purchase only the amount needed for the current year. This will save money, and you can buy fresh seed next year.

Plan your garden carefully. Measure the length of row to be planted of each vegetable and purchase seed accordingly, suggests Moody. Plant sufficient seed to insure a good stand. For a larger planting of a particular vegetable, buy larger, more economical packages of seed. Many garden centers, nurseries and feed stores carry seed in bulk which is often more economical.

Thought and care taken in choosing vegetable seed and varieties can produce a better garden and save time and energy later on.

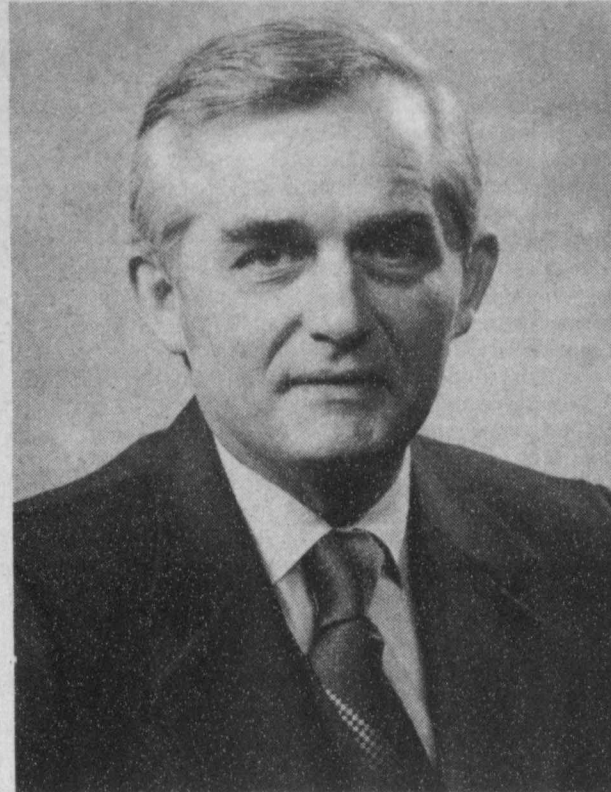

Re-Elect PAT F. BEADLE 2nd Term County Attorney

To The Voters Of Red River County

There is no shortage of candidates for county attorney this year. That represents quite a change from recent years. In 1974, when there was a vacancy in the office, no one wanted the position. The Commissioners Court asked me to take it as a public service. Again in 1976, when the current term was up for election, there was no one else who would take it.

You might very well ask: what has changed? Why are so many seeking the office this year? There is one simple answer and none other: Money. In 1974 Red River County paid the county attorney, and the salary was so low that no lawyer in the county wanted the job. The same was true in 1976. But in 1977 the state legislature recognized that the county attorney in Red River County (and some other counties) was prosecuting felony offenses as a district attorney would and provided that he would be paid the same as a district attorney by the state. This elevated the salary to \$26,100.00 per year. It has since been raised and this year is \$31,000.00. All of a sudden we have "public servants" coming from every side.

Where were they when the county needed help? Well, two of them were right here but declined to help. In 1976 I asked both Thomas Fowler and Jack Herrington to file for the office of county attorney instead of me (Clayton Hall was not then a resident of Red River County). Both refused because of the low salary. Since criminal prosecution in Red River County could not be postponed while we awaited a more attractive salary, I agreed to take the job for a full term.

The circumstances remind me of a fable which I read many times to our children: The Little Red Hen. Maybe you remember it. The little hen finds a seed of wheat and plans to raise some wheat. She goes to various friends and asks for help for each stage of production: planting, cultivating, harvesting, grinding the wheat into flour, and finally baking a cake. Each time they all refuse to help. Finally, the cake is done, and she asks, "Who will help me eat it?" and every one of them says, "I Will!!!"

In spite of this past history of total self-interest the other candidates are using campaign slogans designed to make you believe that they are going to do a better job than I have done. These might be summarized as: "a full time active prosecutor in one courthouse office," and they are not very reliable. The slogans they have chosen are very funny in one sense, since these are the same people who would not devote any of their time to county problems when the salary was low.

The thing which all of them are working to death is this term "full-time." One of my opponents in particular, who is beginning to show signs of real desperation, has been telling some of you privately that I do not spend "full-time" in the County Attorney's Office (meaning the office located in the courthouse). There is a half-truth here; so let me tell you a fact of life about the county attorney position in Red River County, and this will be true whether you vote for me or not: there simply is not enough criminal work in Red River County to occupy a competent lawyer full time. Besides, we have no resident district judge. The district judge is only in Red River County about three days a month, and we only have a jury called about once every six weeks. No matter how zealous a man may be, he cannot try criminal cases without a judge and a jury.

Anyone who tells you he will spend eight hours a day in the courthouse office, and does it, will spend a lot of time twiddling his thumbs. That has never been my way. One of our more talented military commanders once said: "One man on the move is worth at least two standing still." That is a sentiment with which I agree; and when there is no work to do in the county attorney's office, I have no hesitation about going somewhere else where I can accomplish something. My father and I have a law office which is right across the street from the courthouse (and which, incidentally, is more accessible to the public and more comfortable than the space provided in the courthouse, with no stairs to climb). I have maintained the county attorney's office in the courthouse, staffed with a secretary, during the entire time I

have held the office, and do not plan to change that arrangement. There is virtually no time when I cannot be reached by anyone needing to talk to me.

The real question is not how many hours a man can sit behind a desk doing nothing but how well he performs the work which needs to be done.

This brings up the second thing which the desperate candidate has been telling some of you. He has told you that I have "neglected" the office, and I resent this one because it is simply untrue. I have never neglected the duties of the office. I have always given them priority and have always devoted whatever time was necessary to see that they were performed, even in the early years when it required a substantial personal sacrifice. I ask you to consider my record in office to see if this accusation could be true.

When I took the office in 1974, there were 143 felony cases and 365 misdemeanor cases pending in the district and county courts. Many of these were old cases with dead or missing witnesses which would have been routinely dismissed by Marion Lawson before the end of his term, but because his untimely death deprived us of his knowledge of the history of the cases, we had to examine each one carefully before determining if it should be dismissed or taken to trial. Since I took office 230 new felony cases and 389 new misdemeanor cases have been filed. All of these cases have been completely disposed of except 25 felony cases and 6 misdemeanor cases. By the time this statement appears all of the misdemeanor cases should be completed, though others will probably take their place. Of the felony cases 13 are left over from 1974, when I first took office. I was disqualified in these cases because my father had earlier appeared for the defendants. Jack Herrington was hired by the Commissioners Court and appointed by the district judge to prosecute these cases as special prosecutor. None has yet been tried. Of the other 12 felonies 5 are older cases in which the defendant has never been apprehended, and the defendant in one case is already serving a long term in the Arkansas penitentiary. This leaves only 6 active felony cases awaiting trial. All of them are scheduled for trial before June 1, 1980. I think our trial docket situation in Red River County will compare favorably with any county in the state.

I have never failed to be present and ready for trial when there were criminal cases to be tried.

Then there is the matter of the "Professional Prosecutor's Act," which has been often mentioned but never explained. Perhaps you have wondered just what all the fuss has been about? The act does prohibit a prosecutor doing any legal work outside his official duties; but why is that necessary? Each one of these men who has been talking about it has told you that if elected he will not accept private work at all. If they are men of their word, there is nothing to prevent their doing just that. They do not have to invoke a law which would require it. There is nothing in this law for the benefit of the ordinary citizen. No, the true answer to their keen interest in this law lies in the feature of it which none of them has ever mentioned: a prosecutor under the Act is paid 90 percent of a district judge's salary, which in Red River County would mean a salary increase of about \$5,000.00 per year with no increase in workload. Personally, I think the present salary is quite adequate for the position.

I am the only candidate in this race who was willing to take the job when the work and the responsibility far out-weighted the reward. Now I would like one full term with the present good salary.

I am also the only candidate in this race with substantial courtroom experience and the only one with any experience as a prosecutor. I have 20 years experience as a practicing lawyer, including 7 years as an active prosecutor in Denton and Red River Counties.

I would ask that you consider that when the job needed doing, I accepted the responsibility. I did not wait until it was more profitable for me.

Reaction To Warning May Mean Survival

"We interrupt this program for the following announcement. . . This is a tornado warning. A tornado has been sighted north of town. . . All residents are urged to take cover immediately. . . I repeat, this is a tornado warning. . ."

These words, along with the piercing sound of sirens, often strike terror in the hearts of those who live in areas prone to tornadoes. Too often, however, the warnings are not taken seriously enough.

How you react if a tornado strikes your town may determine whether you survive the almost certain devastation.

The Insurance Information Institute stresses the importance of staying inside during the storm. Above all, it warns, do not attempt to flee from the path of the tornado in an automobile. Tornadoes are too swift and erratic.

Last April, when a tornado struck Wichita Falls, Texas, 26 of the 43 persons who were killed and 30 of the 59 who were seriously injured were attempting to flee the tornado in their car, according to a study by a team of epidemiologists.

The researchers, from the Bureau of Epidemiology at the Federal Center for Disease Control in Atlanta, also reported that of the 56 persons killed or injured in their cars, 43 had entered their car expressly to get away from the tornado.

AVOID AUTOS, MOBILE HOMES

The study concluded that automobiles and mobile homes afforded the least safety during a tornado, while apartments and single-family homes were the safest place to be if a tornado strikes.

It pointed out that the homes which 20 of the victims left while attempting to flee the tornado suffered little or no damage and only five deaths occurred among people who remained indoors during the storm.

The researchers recommended the following:

1. People in single-family dwellings in tornado prone areas should identify and reinforce some interior portion of their house as a shelter.
2. Mobile-home parks should provide a community shelter for their residents.
3. All public buildings should have clearly designated tornado shelters.
4. People in motor vehicles should seek shelter immediately when they hear a tornado warning.

Although more tornadoes occur in Texas than in any other state, no state is entirely free from the threat, the Insurance Information Institute notes. Since these killer storms often strike

suddenly and with little or no warning, knowing what to do can save your life.

According to the Institute, the safest place in the home is in the basement. In houses that do not have a basement, residents are advised to take shelter in a bathroom or closet on the lowest level of the structure or under a piece of heavy furniture. Stay away from windows.

If a tornado strikes during school hours, teachers should keep children away from windows and seek shelter either in a designated area or in interior hallways. Concerned parents should not attempt to go out in the storm to pick up their children at school.

The Institute advises office workers or shoppers to seek shelter in an interior corridor on the lowest level of whatever structure they are in and to stay away from windows or exterior walls. All personnel should be aware of the location of designated shelter areas in their building.

For motorists who happen to be in their car as a tornado approaches it is best to abandon the vehicle and to seek shelter in the nearest ditch or depression. Again do not try to drive out of the path of the tornado.

AFTER THE STORM

Broken power lines, shattered glass, splintered wood and other sharp objects are some of the hazards that residents may encounter after the storm has passed. Extreme care should be taken when moving about in the area damaged by the tornado.

Home owners and businessmen who have suffered damage to their property are advised to make temporary repairs to prevent further loss from rain, wind and looting. They

The Institute emphasizes exercising extreme caution the importance of staying when venturing out after the inside during the storm and tornado has passed.

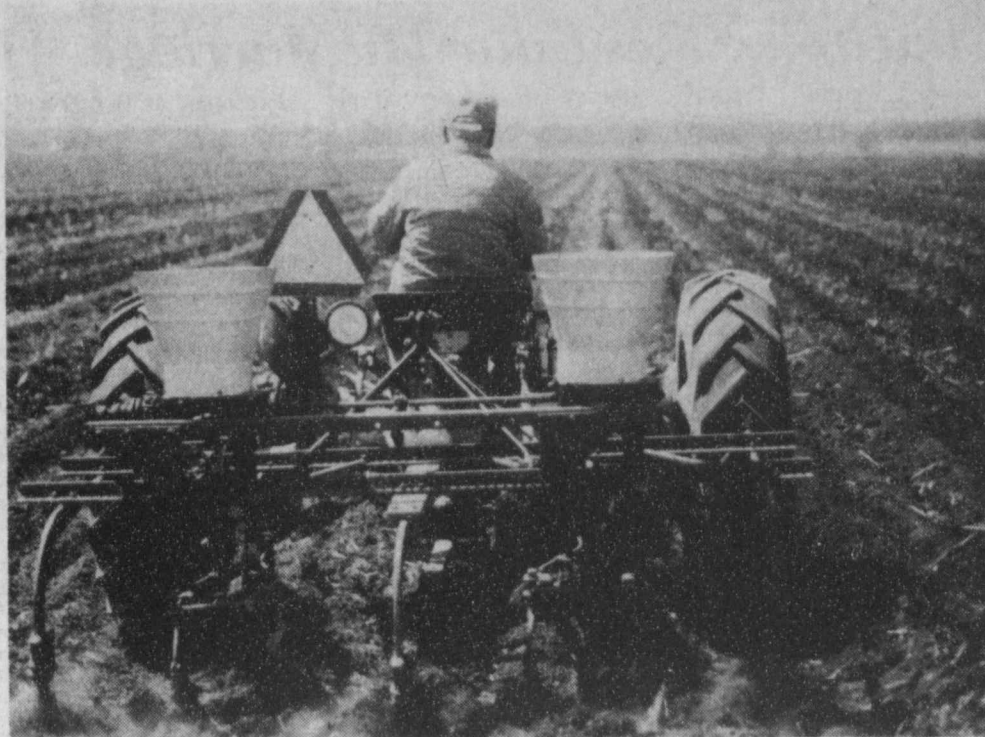

Weekly Agriculture Update

Cow-calf producers, like other citizens, are worried about today's economic situation and the economy as a whole. According to Dr. Randall Grooms, area livestock specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the economics of the current cow-calf situation requires maximum efficiency and productivity. Grooms says every producer needs to look at his individual situation and consider the amount of borrowed capital, interest rates, fertilizer requirements and a host of other pertinent facts that influence his economy of production. Then, he needs to put these factors in a profitable balance with maximum productivity.

Non-productive cows, late calving cows and slow

growing stocker cattle should be culled to decrease operating costs in proportion to potential income. The cow-calf producer should consider some preliminary marketing strategy such as dehorning, castration, vaccination and growth implants to get calves in an attractive package for the buyer. Grooms says watch the cow herd very carefully to make sure the cows are breeding to produce next year's calf crop.

Hay meadows should be fertilized to produce one and one-half tons of quality hay per cow. This should meet feeding requirements and help reduce cash expenses for feed next winter.

Basically, cow-calf producers are in a good position, Grooms points out. The nation's cow herd has decreased from over 132 million to 110 million head from 1975 to 1980. Even with this reduction in numbers, producers must use every management strategy to reduce costs and make a profit.
