counting on each of them to write me a letter.

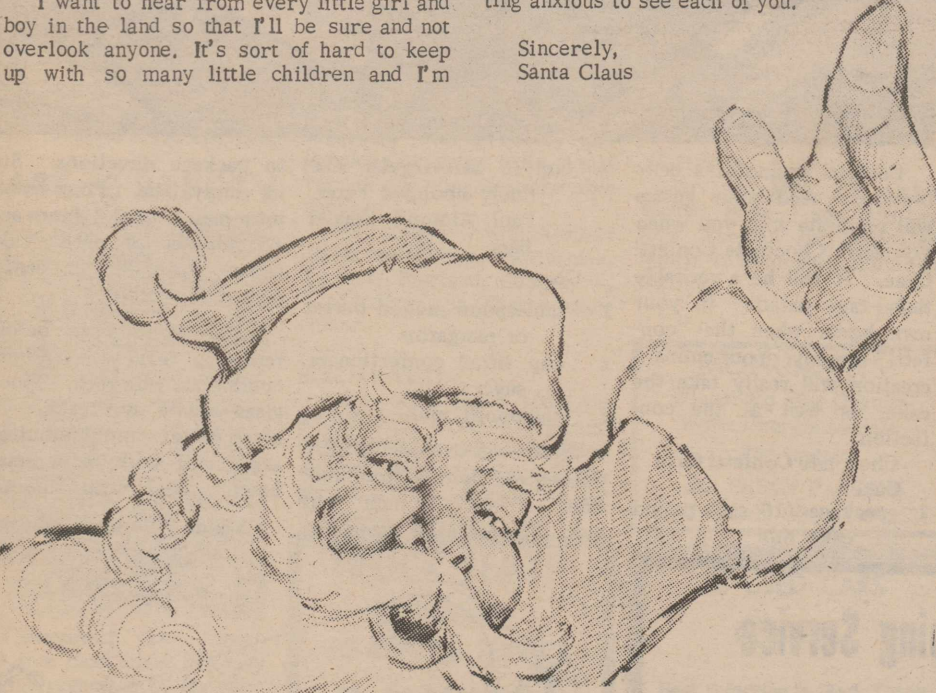

Horns Put Wraps On Best Ever Year

Hart Longhorns met their match Saturday night, losing their first game of the year and the regional play-off to the Powerful Clarendon Broncos, 21-6. Even with the loss the Horns compiled a 10-1-1 season record--THE BEST EVER FOR A HART TEAM.

The Horns received the opening kick-off and began a clock-eating march that consumed a large portion of the first quarter and went almost the length of the field--but almost was just not quite good enough. The Horns moved down the field behind short running bursts from Jimmy Brown and Stanley Dyer all the way to the Clarendon 31 yard line but the drive was stopped there and the Broncos took over.

Clarendon then put on an offensive show of their own as Tommy Shields led the Broncos to the Hart 3 yard line. The fantastic defense held the powerful Broncos.

Unable to move offensively, the Horns had to punt. Erasmo Castillo's punt was nearly

blocked by the Horns came up with a big break as Brown pounced on a Bronco fumble at the 20. The Horns fumbled it right back however and the defense was called on to stop the Broncos again. The Horn defense held for three downs but a fake field goal on fourth down caught them by surprise and netted a touchdown for Clarendon as Steve Carter stepped in from the 21. Kenneth King made it 7-0 with 10:20 left in the half.

On the ensuing kickoff, the Horns began again to move offensively but Clarendon picked off a Dirk Rambo pass at the 5 yard line to kill the threat. Defense again was the keyword for the Horns as they forced Clarendon to punt late in the half. This time the Horns really began to move and it paid off as Brown blasted over from the 5 yard line. Try for extra points failed.

Clarendon then drove down to the Hart 14 yard line in only five plays where Tommy Shields sprinted around right end for a TD and also booted

the extra point to give the Broncos a 14-6 halftime lead.

The Broncos took the second half kick-off and moved to Hart's 15 yard line before the Longhorn defense stiffened. Clarendon missed a 32 yard field goal to give Hart possession of the ball.

Clarendon produced a big defensive effort in the third quarter as they held the Horns and kept the score at 14-6. The Horns' good defense shone again as they stopped the Broncos at the Longhorn 12. Wayne Ethridge made the big play here, turning in a good defensive effort as he's done the entire season.

Following a punt by the Horns, Clarendon moved to the Hart 2 yard line where Shields scored for Clarendon. King booted the extra point, giving the Broncos a 21-6 lead.

Try as they might, the Horns couldn't penetrate the Clarendon defense and the game ended with the Broncos taking a 21-6 regional victory over the scrappy Longhorns.

The Horns ended the season as the state's ninth ranked team. The boys and coaches deserve a lot of credit as they overcame many obstacles in the season that saw them win the district co-championship and the bi-district championship.

Ten seniors and one junior have turned in their last performances on the gridiron for Hart. Graduating seniors are Rambo, David Barham, Castillo, Dennis Hill, Dyer, Dan Sharp, Bill Clifford, Ethridge, Mike Booe and Mickey Rodriguez. Harley Malone, junior center, will be moving away from the community.

Congratulations are in order for these boys along with the rest of the Longhorn team and the coaching staff for a job well done.

Hart High School's Longhorns did more than compile wins as the season went along. Admiration and respect multiplied with each victory.

The coaching staff, headed by Lonnie Phillips, deserves much praise for the leadership provided this year. Athletic "know-how" was not all they taught. Along with that vital ingredient, these men instilled integrity.

The '72 Longhorns put "Hart on the map" but it's the quality of those young men that will keep it there.

Farmers Union Protests Cotton Price Support

Farmers Union registered today a strong protest with Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz over his failure to raise the cotton price support loan in the 1973 program.

In a letter to the agriculture secretary, Texas Farmers Union President Jay Naman said that "maintaining the same programs and price supports for the '73 season that have caused the low production-cost prices this year indicate a callous disregard for the nation's cotton producers. Your decision to retain the 19.5 cent price support is clear evidence that once again your administration of the cotton program is based on the welfare of the cotton trade at the expense of cotton producers."

The letter noted that under

the law the secretary of agriculture can at this discretion set the loan at 90 per cent of the two-year average world market which in this case would be 24 cents per pound.

Naman said that both the cotton trade and the USDA had urged farmers to increase cotton acreage this year and gave assurances that prices received would permit a reasonable profit. "Following that advice," he said, "farmers produced a large surplus and now cannot sell their cotton even at the present loan level of 19.5 cents per pound."

"An increase in the price support loan level is clearly possible under existing law. As your own spokesmen have indicated, the loan level could be

raised to 24 cents per pound."

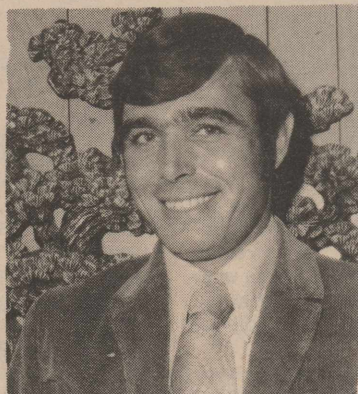
Naman said, "Failure to increase the cotton price support loan level will assure the cycling of all unsold cotton through the Commodity Credit Corporation at great cost to taxpayers and to the disadvantage of producers. By increasing the loan level, prices would be stimulated and producers would be able to market their crop this year through traditional trade channels."

The protest to Secretary Butz expressed strong agreement with the views of House Agriculture Committee Chairman W. R. Poage who personally urged an increase in the price support level and said, "In January Congress must begin working on a new farm bill. The Department can do a better job with some of the freedom of action Congress has granted it. But if that freedom is to be abused at the expense of producers, Congress may consider taking this discretion away."

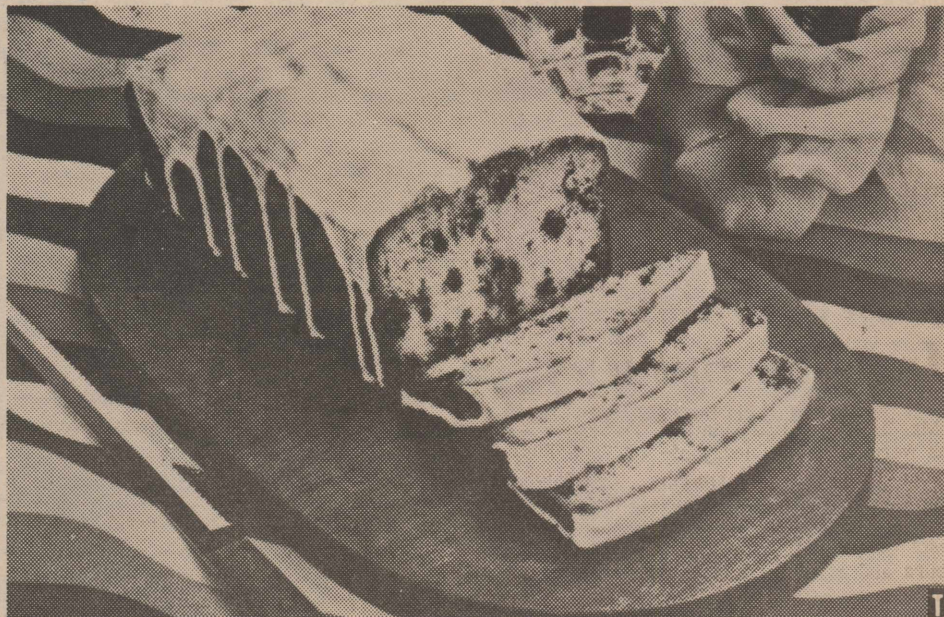

Confetti connotes a celebration. And your guests will celebrate with you when you serve Chocolate Confetti Cake. It will be a veritable ticker-tape parade in your own home when the "confetti" is ready. Your culinary creation will really take the cake, as well as the confection:

Chocolate Confetti Cake

1 package (16 oz.) pound cake mix

3/4 cup (3 bars-regular size) finely chopped Peter Paul Almond Cluster bars

Glaze:

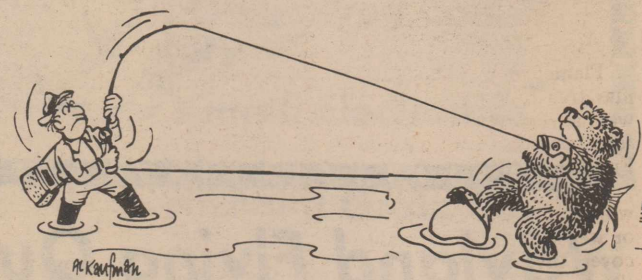
1 tablespoon melted butter or margarine
1 cup sifted confectioners sugar
4 teaspoons milk

Heat oven to slow (325 F.) Grease and flour bottom and sides of 9x5x3 inch loaf pan. Prepare cake according

to package directions. Stir in candy bars. Pour batter into pan. Bake 1 hour and 15 minutes or until cake tester inserted in center comes out clean.

Cool 10 minutes before removing from pan. Finish cooling on wire rack. Spoon glaze evenly over cake. To make glaze: combine butter, sugar and milk in a small bowl. Beat until smooth.

Yield: 1 loaf cake.

To make a fireproofing solution, mix 9 ounces of crystal borax and 4 ounces of boric acid in a gallon of water. Dip the sheet into solution and hang it up to dry. Remember, once you have washed the sheet, you have to retreat it before using again safely.

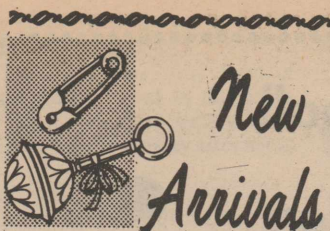

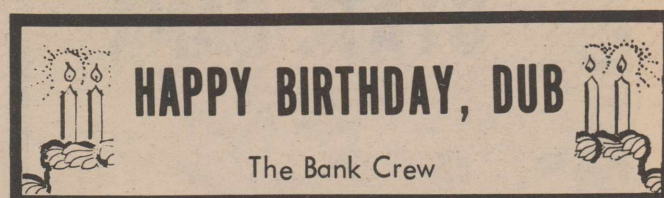

areth tournament that date.

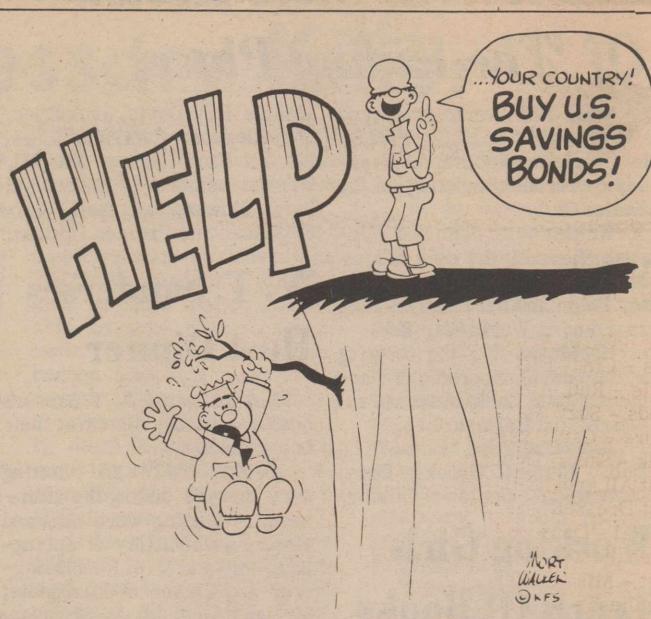

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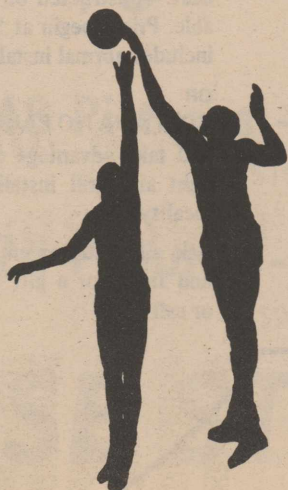

ROUTE OF NO EVIL

To prevent tragedy from fire this Christmas, you and your family should practice these home fire drills suggested by The Hartford Insurance Group, sponsor of the Junior Fire Marshal program.

Soil Conservation News

Wildlife habitat is the process of retaining, creating or maintaining wildlife habitat on other than wetland.

The purpose of this management is to improve habitat or living areas where one would like to have desired wildlife.

Where a habitat is desired to be put, there should be certain measures taken to control erosion where there is brush, but not sufficient amount of ground cover. One would have to plan some measures in order to cover the ground to bring the desired wildlife in your area.

If one has a habitat and wishes to improve it, there should be plantings made to a size in which to furnish necessary cover and supplemental feed during critical periods, and to facilitate harvest of wildlife when needed.

Different wildlife desire different food plants. Such as: quail and dove feed on millets, grain sorghums, and certain grasses. Deer and turkey feed off of sweetclover, vetch, various grains and grasses. Pheasant feed off of about the same as quail and dove and that also goes for your ducks and geese.

Wildlife habitats can be made out of shorelines around lakes or abandoned areas where

one does not produce any crop. These habitats can be beneficial to you and to the wildlife.

For more information on upland wildlife habitat management contact the local Soil Conservation Service in your county. They will be glad to assist you in any way.

Carbon Monoxide - Unnecessary Killer

Death and taxes may be inevitable, but many people are being killed or sickened by a preventable illness—carbon monoxide poisoning—says the State Health Department.

With a chill in the air, it is time for heaters and a time for caution because of the odorless colorless and tasteless gas which is present in all combustible substances. This gas can lull a person into unconsciousness before the victim knows he's in trouble.

By now most Texans have fired up their heating systems—at least for short periods of

time—with the arrival of the season's first northers. And if members of your household came down with unexplained headaches, dizziness or nausea after the heaters were lit, carbon monoxide could be the reason. All furnaces should undergo periodic checks to make certain they are safe.

Although carbon monoxide can occur anytime, it is thought of as a cold weather threat since homes, automobiles, mobile homes, hunting cabins and businesses are buttoned up tight to ward off the cold.

Every time a person burns gasoline, kerosene, wood, natural or manufactured gas, coal,

coke or oil in a heater, car, appliance, bonfire of grill, he has started a potential carbon monoxide factory. Hibachi grills, used with charcoal, are dangerous in closed-up areas. A car engine, running in an average-sized garage approximately five minutes, can produce a lethal concentration of carbon monoxide. Leaky mufflers or tailpipes can allow the gas to accumulate in a car, particularly one that is stopped.

The poison slowly gets into a person's bloodstream, rendering him weak and groggy and finally resulting in death unless the exposed person is moved to fresh air before it is too late.

Hospitalization often is necessary for victims lucky enough to live—but many receive brain damage from lack of oxygen. Early symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning include yawning, headache, nausea, dizziness, ringing in the ears and even abdominal pains.

A little bit of carbon monoxide can go a long way. It's an insidious killer. Its physical properties—no odor, taste or smell—make it almost impossible to recognize unless you understand the symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning. Then, once it is inhaled the gas invades the blood stream through the lungs and unites

with the hemoglobin in the red blood corpuscles so they cannot carry oxygen to the cells of the body. Asphyxiation results.

It is so poisonous that it combines with red cells of blood 200 times more easily than oxygen. So when oxygen and sizable amounts of carbon monoxide are breathed in together, carbon monoxide muscles the oxygen aside, causing illness. If oxygen is depleted sufficiently, death follows. Many deaths occur from faulty appliances, even though a window may be slightly opened.

At least 1,400 deaths are attributed in the United States each year to carbon monoxide poisoning. Some 10,000 persons suffer carbon monoxide poisoning. In Texas last year, at least 49 persons died from carbon monoxide poisoning, according to State Health Department statistics.

How do these deaths occur?

You think of the home as the most logical place—and it is—with some 70 percent of reported fatalities. Many people go to bed at night and never wake up, victims of a faulty flue or unvented heating device, water heater or even an old, unvented gas refrigerator.

But this summer in Texas carbon monoxide in a Lake Texoma pleasure cruiser claimed several victims...the fumes apparently brought into sleeping quarters by the air conditioner.

A young couple parked in a garage of a vacant house with the automobile motor running and heater on to ward off the cold were found dead—victims of carbon monoxide poisoning.

A newly-married couple—the husband a war veteran—checked into a motel on their marriage night. A faulty furnace, improperly vented, killed the young Marine veteran while he slept and sent his wife to a hospital.

Five persons driving in a car in Dallas—with air conditioning on and the windows rolled up—became so sick they were taken to a hospital.

At least sixteen persons died in one year from defective heaters in mobile campers. Deaths occurred in several states.

Yes, carbon monoxide is sinister. But it doesn't have to be fatal. With Texas in the midst of its fall and winter hunting season, hunters should check ventilation in their stoves and examine smokestacks and

chimneys to be certain they aren't clogged with leaves or the nests of birds or squirrels.

In the home, make certain the damper is open before lighting the fireplace. Have your gas refrigerator service-checked annually, even though newer models have improved control systems. All furnaces, regardless of fuel type, should be checked and properly vented to the outside. Combustion chamber leakage is a serious hazard, particularly if old. Individual room type gas heating equipment should be vented. And, don't use the gas cooking range for heat.

Automobiles and trucks, as well as other gasoline engines, shouldn't be run indoors for long periods—even with a garage door open. A charcoal grill or hibachi should be used only outdoors.

These are but a few life-saving tips. A person should always remember that anything which burns can give off death-dealing carbon monoxide and needs to be properly vented—or not used.

New Brake & Lighting Requirements For Trailers

New lighting and brake requirements for cotton trailers have been enacted by the special session of the Texas Legislature, replacing a law passed in August, 1971. An analysis by the Department of Public Safety lists the following specific provisions for cotton trailers.

Trailers under 15,000 pounds gross weight when operated during the daytime with visibility more than 1,000 feet: Trailers less than 80 inches in width and under 30 feet in length:

two red reflectors, one on each side of the rear.

Trailers less than 80 inches in width and more than 30 feet in length:

one amber reflector on each side centrally located on trailer body.

two red reflectors, one on each side of the rear.

Trailers more than 80 inches in width and under 30 feet in length:

two amber reflectors, one on each side near the front.

two red reflectors, one on each side near the rear.

two red reflectors, one on each side of the rear.

Trailers more than 80 inches in width and more than 30 feet in length:

two amber reflectors, one on each side near the front, one amber reflector on each side centrally located on the trailer body.

two red reflectors, one on each side near the rear.

two red reflectors, one on each side of the rear.

Trailers that are operated at night and when visibility is less than 1,000 feet are required to have the following electric lights and reflectors:

Trailers more than 80 inches in width and under 30 feet in length:

two amber clearance lamps on front, one on each side near corner.

two amber side marker lamps, one on each side near front.

two amber reflectors, one on each side near front.

two red side marker lamps, one on each side near the rear.

two red reflectors, one on each side near the rear.

two red stop lamps, one on each side on the rear.

two red tail lamps, one on each side on the rear.

two red reflectors, one on each side on the rear.

one white lamp on rear to illuminate license plate.

electric turn signal lamps on rear.

two red or amber flashing hazard warning lamps, one on each side on rear.

Trailers more than 80 inches in width and more than 30 feet in length:

all lamps described for shorter trailer plus:

one amber reflector on each side centrally located on trailer body.

one amber side marker lamp on each side centrally located on trailer body.

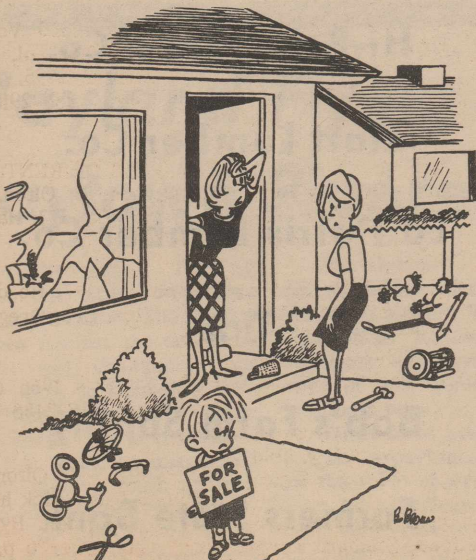
(A combination lamp will fulfill several lighting requirements. For example, one lighting unit is available to fit on the corners of the trailer body which furnishes front and side clearance and marker lamps.)

The requirement for the three identification lamps was eliminated from the law.

Brakes are not required on trailers up to 15,000 pounds gross weight when operated under 30 miles per hour. The combination of trailers and towing vehicle must be capable of stopping within 50 feet when traveling 20 miles per hour. Slow Moving Vehicle emblems are required only on trailers towed by vehicles which by design go slower than 25 miles per hour (trailers towed by pickup trucks would not require the SMV emblem; those towed by tractors would have to have the SMV sign).

Trailers weighing over 15,000 pounds gross weight require brakes on all wheels.

Trailer owners are urged to check their vehicles, installing new equipment if necessary in order to conform to the 1972 law. For information about the new enactment, trailer owners can contact the nearest Department of Public Safety office.

Price Urges Ag Secretary To Reconsider Adjustments

Congressman Bob Price has called on Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz to consider every possible alternative in the attempt to stabilize the cotton program and market before taking action reducing cotton acreage allotments and price support payments.

Price said he has visited with numerous cotton producers and bankers in cotton producing counties in an effort to establish the impact of any reduction of allotments and the elimination of set-aside acreage.

In a letter to Sec. Butz, Price said, "In view of the fact that farmers in my district are suffering from adverse weather conditions which have continually hampered harvest efforts and lowered the grades of cotton resulting in low prices on the current market, I strongly recommend that you reconsider those adjustments in the cotton program which you announced Nov. 15.

"I feel such a drastic change at this particular point of time would create an undue hardship on our cotton producers and result in financial ruin for a number of smaller cotton producers.

"The elimination of the set-aside requirement will free about 2 million acres of cropland on cotton farms for any

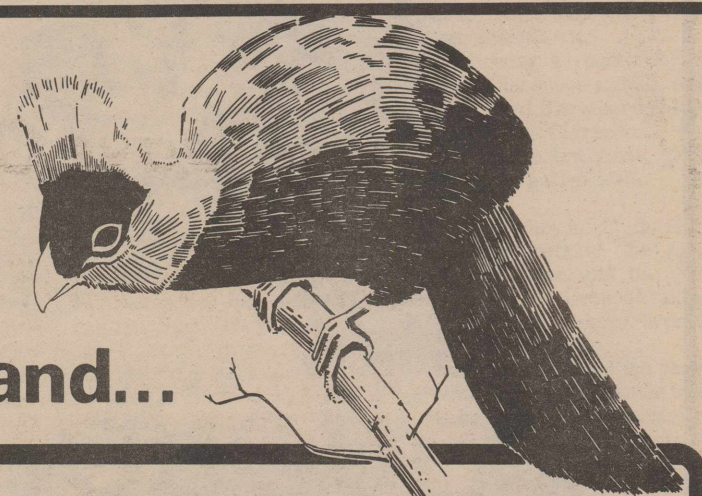
crops that producers choose. This step will aid some cotton producers in irrigated areas but at the same time could create new problems for those farmers engaged in the production of feed grains. Overproduction in feed grain could very well cause a price situation similar to that facing the cotton producer today. There must be some other method of achieving the same desired result other than such a drastic cut in the program during a period of depressed prices.

Price said, "I agree with your concept of allowing this nation's farmers the flexibility necessary for a stable supply and demand market. However, I do not feel this should be done at the expense of our nation's farmers."

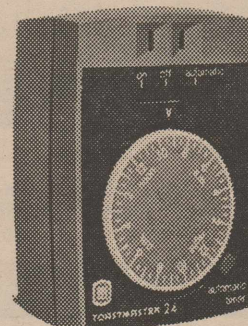
