Our Town...

MAYBE YOU'VE noticed, maybe you haven't.

Regardless, however, a gent named Walter G. Hall has started an ambitious endeavor in Texas.

He and the committee he chairs seek to abolish the poll tax — a cash paid prerequisite for voting in this Lone Star state since 1902.

Mr. Hall is a Dickinson banker and a Democrat.

In these days and times, I've run across all kinds of Democrats and bankers, too.

But I'm ready and willing any day to sign Mr. Hall's petition requesting a referendum among Democratic voters as an expression of opinion to the next legislature.

THAT'S BESIDE the point, right now.

For the poll tax is still a legal prerequisite to voting in Texas, the key to our individual voice in precinct, city, county, school, state and national elections.

And as of Saturday at least, poll taxes were selling at the Courthouse about as fast as bikinis in an Eskimo village.

County Tax Assessor-Collector Tom Glover reported slightly more than 500 poll taxes issued. Potential for the county is more than 3,000.

Deadline for obtaining poll tax receipts and voting exemptions, too—is less than 2 months away, Jan. 31.

IN PREVIOUS YEARS large numbers of Mitchell County citizens have been blacked out of democracy, really, because they never exercised their right to vote and elect... because they disenfranchised their right by not obtaining a poll tax.

If any of us do it this year, we will pass up one of the greatest opportunities in citizenship that will come our way ever.

That's because 1960 will bring elections for county offices, school trustees, city councilmen, state races and the U. S. presidency, too.

In addition, there are prospects for a municipal bond proposal here as well as other proposals.

Infact, since the State Supreme Court's recent decision concerning local option, there have been persistent rumors a beer election would be petitioned in one or more Mitchell County precincts.

MEMBERS OF Colorado City's Junior Chamber of Commerce have been observing the slow poll tax sale for weeks.

They are preparing a campaign to spotlight the poll tax and freedom's responsibility for voting — an effort they hope will influence more citizens to obtain the receipt that allows them to cast their ballots.

Peculiar, though, isn't it. Here in a nation where our forefathers made this right to vote a life or death matter... here in a nation where we claim all countries of the world should have this precious privilege... so many of us still have to be lured, shoved or we miss the ballot box entirely.

Area's Farm Census in Second Half

The 1959 Census of Agriculture is about 50 per cent complete in this area, it was announced Saturday by Field Director James W. Stroud of the Census Bureau's regional office in Dallas.

The census official stated that he was well pleased with the cooperation the census takers are receiving from farmers in the area and has high hopes of completing the canvass within the next 10 days.

Stroud pointed out that the field canvass of farms is one of the larger costs of the census and that cooperation of farmers in completing questionnaires promptly will be a vital factor in keeping down the final cost of the undertaking.

Quick completion of the census not only will help in keeping costs down but will aid in prompt publication of the results, the field director said. He urged Mitchell County farmers who have not already done so to complete the census questionnaire and have it ready when the census taker calls.

OVER WINTERS BLIZZARDS

Wolves Score 51-28 Win for Home Debut

Colorado City High broke a 3-game basketball drought Friday night, thoroughly outclassing Winters Blizzards in Wolves Gym, 51 to 28.

The victory, first of the season for the Wolves, stamped success on the debut of a Cadod Matthews coached team before hometown fans.

And it set the stage for a crowd pleaser here Tuesday night with the always potent Big Spring Steers of District 2-AAAA.

The Wolves jumped into an early lead and were out in front with a handy advantage for the remainder of the game.

Jimmy Smith, Winter's leading scorer with 11 points, showed the Blizzards under an opening lead with 2 consecutive field goals. Sam Albino added another.

But the veteran Kerry Ken-

drick broke the ice for Colorado City with a free toss and Jerry Haley, the game's leading scorer, added three more gratis shots to trail Winters 6-4 at 5:03 of the first quarter.

Kendrick registered the Wolves' first field goal right after a free throw by Buddy Compton to send the hometowners into the front 7 to 6, a lead they never lost.

And before the quarter ended Haley added 5 more points for a 12-8 Wolf lead.

Haley, who deviled the Winters defense, at least half the night, hit for 9 field goals and a remarkable 8 free throws for a total of 26 points, only 2 less than Winter's entire total.

Even more indicative of his warmness was the fact that Haley was the actual scorer for 14 of Colorado City's 20

successful shots in the first half.

By the time the half rolled around the sharpshooter and his teammates were in a comfortable 31 to 14 lead.

The Wolves, although substituting liberally in the second half, kept the pressure on and moved to a 42 to 17 lead at the end of the third quarter. Scoring was about even in the final period as the game ended, 51 to 28.

Ability to control rebounds and accuracy at the free throw line were major reasons for the Wolves' winning pace. C-City scored 13 points on foul shots and Winters hit for only 2.

There's no better example for the value of rebounds than comparison of the first and second quarters.

A Fort Worth hoodlum who was chased Thursday after taking a money sack from the Ben Franklin Store in Mitchell County jail serving a 90-day jail sentence.

David Leon Allen, who has a previous police record for theft, pleaded guilty before County Judge Elmer Martin to theft under \$50.

He admitted taking the sack containing \$9.50 in coins from the store just before noon Thursday.

Another Fort Worth man, Arthur Ray Stein, also with a police record, was arrested later and charged with being a partner with Allen in the crime.

However, Stein denied the accusation and his bond was set at \$1,000.

Allen was apprehended by a bevy of police officers after a chase that began near the Ben Franklin Store, 185 E. Second, and then progressed to a parked car, down an alley, across the T&P Railroad tracks and into an area of houses south of the railroad.

The money bag with the \$9.50 was found in a car which Allen went to immediately af-

ter he aroused suspicion leaving the store.

Mrs. James Carraway, a shopper, had thought she saw Allen take something at the store's checking counter and place it under his coat. And the chase began when the man ran as she reported the theft to Mrs. Luther Harrison Jr., policewoman for parking meters.

Stein, who was identified by police as being in the store at the same time of the theft, was arrested later at a downtown cab stand at Second and Oak.

Three other cases have been filed against men in County Court.

Jack Rentschler faces a charge of transporting beer and wine in a dry area. The complaint was filed by State Highway Patrolman Buddy Hertenberger.

A charge of child desertion Names Roy Rose as defendant, accusing him of willful deserting, neglecting and refusing to provide support for his wife and two minor children.

Mayor Sets Seal Week

Mitchell County's Christmas Seal sale, seeking the funds which help to find and treat tuberculosis cases here at home, gets a boost this week.

Mayor Trevor Crawford has proclaimed the week as Christmas Seal Week.

Designating the week for special recognition of the work of Mitchell County Tuberculosis Association, the mayor urged all residents to support the Christmas Seal campaign now in progress.

At the same time, Crawford pin-pointed 2 definite problems in the control of TB in this local area.

"Efforts to find the unknown cases of TB among people over 40 must be intensified," the mayor emphasized, "because a large part of the TB problem now is among our older citizens, especially men."

"Our community also needs

increased rehabilitation facilities to help the growing number of TB patients who are recovering from the disease to once again become productive members of society."

The Christmas Seal sale was reported at the \$1,047 mark Saturday by Mrs. C. P. Gary, executive secretary for the county association. That is a gain of approximately \$350 over the sale at the same period last year, she said.

Plans were being completed also Saturday for the Christmas tree which will be lighted on Mitchell County Courthouse lawn. Every \$5 contribution in the seal sale will light one bulb on the tree.

"Citizens concerned with the TB fight already have provided for 70 lighted bulbs on the tree," Mrs. Gary reported.

The proclamation issued by Mayor Crawford states:

Whereas, tuberculosis is a major health problem in Colorado City with people currently under treatment or in need of medical supervision;

Whereas, it is estimated that there are unknown cases among our older citizens, especially older men;

Whereas, with adequate help from the community, the great majority of TB patients can be expected to recover and maintain their health;

Whereas, we are determined to protect our homes from invasion by this contagious disease;

I, Trevor Crawford, Mayor of Colorado City, urge every citizen to contribute generously to the Christmas Seal appeal of the Mitchell County Tuberculosis Association, to help support and expand its program of health education, case finding, rehabilitation, and research designed for the protection of us all from TB.

"We request that all persons who have not yet been contacted for United Fund to notify the fund headquarters," Taylor said.

"By phoning the Chamber of Commerce office (fund headquarters) a volunteer United Fund worker will be sent immediately to that person's residence or business."

IN CIVIC HOUSE

"Women We Salute" Is Topic For 1921 Study Club Event

"Women We Salute" was the topic for study and discussion of the 1921 Study Club when they met in the Civic House with Mrs. P. O. Hickman as hostess.

Biography of four outstanding women were presented as follows by Mrs. H. B. Broadus, Sylvia Field Foster; Mrs. J. T. Pritchett, Florence Ellenwood Allen; Mrs. W. W. Rhode, Katherine Burr Blodgett; Mrs. R. P. Price, Marguerite Higgins.

Sylvia Field Foster was a financial writer who was a recognized authority of the U. S. Government finance, a national syndicated columnist and the financial editor of the New York Post, as Mrs. Broadus told some of the highlights of Sylvia Foster life.

"Miss Porter's first job was with a firm of investment brokers on Wall street, where she learned the practical side of finance," said the speaker. "Miss Porter wrote 'How to Make Money in Government Bonds' in 1929, the first book to cover all phases of government finance and the U. S. Securities Market." Mrs. Broadus told the group. She is also the author of "Reporting on Governments," the speaker continued, "one of the most widely circulated news letters of its kind in the nation."

"On three occasions, Miss Porter has received the award of the New York Newspaper Woman's Club for the best column written by a woman in any field," Mrs. Broadus stressed.

The award of the First Assembly of American Women of Achievement, was presented to her by the Boston Chamber of Commerce in 1951.

In 1954, Miss Porter received the Certificate of Merit from Philadelphia's Poor Richards Club — for her outstanding contribution of the year in the field of Economic reporting.

Florence Ellenwood Allen was the first woman to sit in a Federal court of general jurisdiction, Mrs. Pritchett told the group.

Judge Allen was appointed in 1919 to the post of assistant County Prosecutor of Cuyahoga County, the first woman in Ohio to hold this position. In 1920, she became the first woman to sit in court of jurisdiction. She was elected Judge of the Court of Common Pleas by the greatest vote ever given any judicial candidate in the county.

"Judge Allen was born in Salt Lake City, Utah, where the family was living because of her father's health," Mrs.

Pritchett told the club.

"She is recognized authority on Constitutional Law," explained the speaker.

Mrs. Rhode explained that her personality for salute, Katherine Burr Blodgett, was a research scientist.

"Her wide spread recognition has come from the practical application of her studies on thin films, and for the development of a non reflecting 'invisible glass,'" said Mrs. Rhode.

Dr. Blodgett was hired by General Electric in 1928, and has been associated with their laboratories for many years.

"Dr. Blodgett is the only scientist to be honored by Boston's First Assembly of American Women of Achievement and the first woman to receive the Ph. D. degree in Physics," said the speaker.

Marguerite Higgins, said Mrs. Price, was a famed journalist, war correspondent and later a roving journalist covering the farthest reaches of the world for the New York Herald Tribune.

The speaker stated that during the Second World War and in Korea, soldiers in the front lines grew accustomed to the sight of her trim, pretty and grim determination, daily risking her life under fire for a news story.

Miss Higgins graduated with honors from the University of California. She then received an M. A. degree in Journalism from Columbia University in 1943 and went to work for the Herald Tribune in London.

"Marguerite Higgins has circled the globe reporting the major events of our time for millions of readers, stated Mrs. Price.

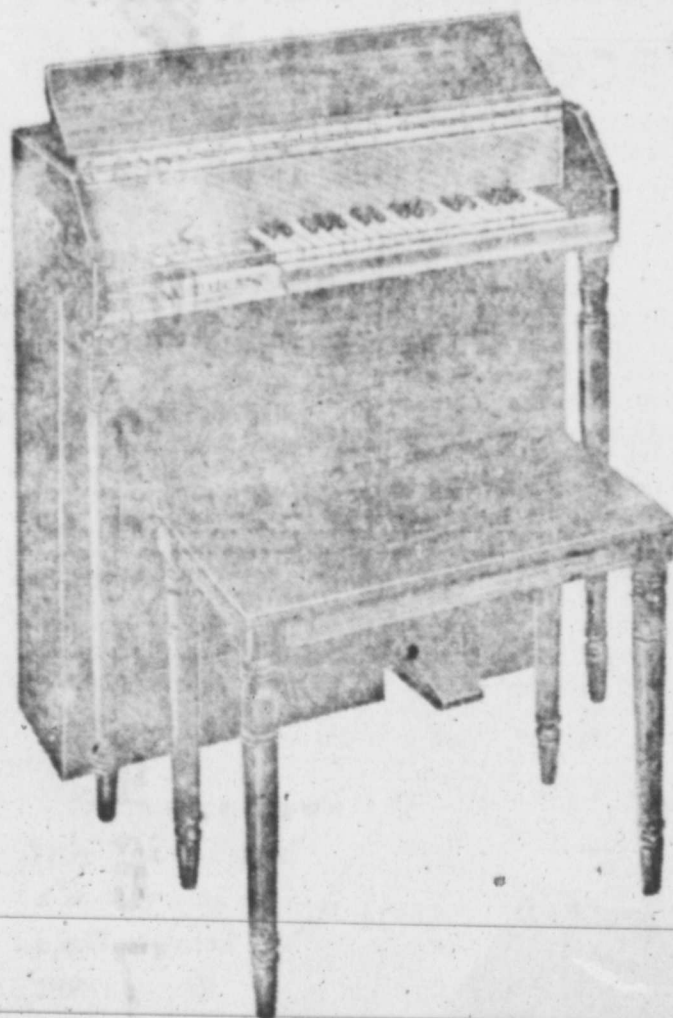

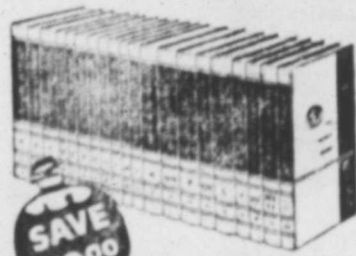
