Storms Play Havoc With National Balloon Race

Only Three Left Of Fourteen That Started in Event

Two of Bags Struck By Lightning. One Pilot Meeting Death; Winds Force Others Down

ANNUAL AIR CLASSIC OUT OF PITTSBURGH

Form Described by Pilots as One of Worst in History; Los Angeles Plods Through Winds

PITTSBURGH, May 30.—(P)—Walter Mortel, side on the Goodyear V, was found dead near Youngwood, Pa., tonight, having made a free jump from the balloon when it was believed to have been struck by lightning. Ward T. Van Orman, pilot of the Goodyear V suffered a fractured left leg in a parachute leap. Both men are from Akron, Ohio.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., May 30.—Only three of the fourteen balloons that started in the national elimination balloon race here today were believed still in the air tonight, announcement from race headquarters said. Two of the bags were down to have been struck by lightning and one pilot killed. Nine others had been forced down. The dead

Pilot Burns to Death

GREENSBURG, Pa., May 30.—Lieutenant Paul Evert, of Army No. 3 balloon, which took off from Pittsburgh today in the national elimination race, was killed when his balloon was struck by lightning at Youngwood, near here. This was reported by Dr. Albert MacMurray of Youngwood, who said Lieutenant U. G. Evert, Evert's side, was uninjured. The balloon burned, Dr. MacMurray said. The body of Lt. Evert was taken from the wreckage and sent to Greensburg, Youngwood is six miles south of here and less than fifty miles from Bettis Field, Pittsburgh, where the balloons took off.

Not was Lieut. Paul Evert of the Army No. 3, Langley Field, Pa. A heavy rainstorm, accompanied by sharp and frequent lightning, raged in southwestern Pennsylvania toward which section most of the balloons had drifted after taking off here by one of the reports arrived that balloons had encountered difficulty.

No Report On Two

The balloons on which headquarters had no reports were Army bags No. 1 and 2, both from Bettis Field. No. 1 was piloted by Capt. E. W. Kepner, with Lieutenant W. O. Jackson as side, and Captain Edmund Hill was pilot of the No. 2, with Lieutenant J. G. Fisher as side.

Texas Youth Charged With Killing 15-year-old Bride

Arrest Is Aftermath Of Finding Body In Creek Bed

TEXARKANA, Ark., May 30.—Earl Higginbotham, 19, was placed in jail here tonight charged with the murder of his 15-year-old bride, Frances S. Higginbotham, drowned in a creek near Redwater, Texas, last night.

Bond was denied pending a preliminary hearing, which property will not be held until Friday. Higginbotham's arrest was made at New Boston, Texas, by County Attorney R. O. Waters and Deputy Sheriff W. M. Chubberson, who have been investigating the drowning. Justice J. W. Hagland, conducting the inquest, announced that it may be several days before a coroner's verdict is rendered.

Higginbotham reported to officers that he and his wife had gone swimming in the creek near his father's home and that cramps prevented his going to his wife's aid when she got into deep water.

The girl's face bore a bruise which a physician said was made before she was drowned.

Negro Believed Lynched By Band Of Missouri Men

Slayer Was Taken From Constable's Auto While Being Carried To County Jail

MARSHALL, Mo., May 30.—Though no trace had been found of one Williams, negro slayer, and the twelve masked men who took him from Slater, Mo., peace officers, early today, authorities tonight were convinced that Williams was lynched.

Williams shot and killed another man in a card game in Slater yesterday, was being brought to the county jail here by Edgar Balow, Slater marshal, and Price M. Thompson, a constable, when their car was ambushed a short distance off of Slater by another car, armed. The men commanded Williams to get out of the officers' car and when he refused, removed him forcibly.

FAMED DOCTOR DIES

Was In Charge of Yellow Fever Research

LONDON, May 30 (P).—News was received here today of the death of Dr. William Alexander Young, director of the Gold Coast Medical Research Institute of Yellow Fever, at Accra, Gold Coast Colony, Africa. Dr. Young was a co-worker with Dr. Hideo Noguchi who died recently at Accra of yellow fever resulting in his researches into the origin of that disease.

Gloom and Waste of Far North Yet Hold Nobile Fate

Relief Ship Returns to Base After Search of Arctic Region to Report Only Failure

KINGS BAY, Spitzbergen, May 30.—No word has come out of the gloom and wastes of the far north of General Nobile, his companions and the missing dirigible Italia. With the return here of the base ship Citta Di Milano from a searching cruise off the northern part of Spitzbergen anxiety for the fate of the aeronauts has increased and hope of their rescue seems farther away.

The base ship came back at midnight. She had found no trace of the Italia. She encountered strong winds, severe cold and impassable ice floes, and she returned in a snowstorm, the men depressed by their failure. The vessel will remain here until it is decided whether the base for the Norwegian rescue expedition shall be Advent Bay or Kings Bay.

The belief is held among those waiting at this place that Kings Bay is better fitted for such a purpose, as flights to the north and east can be made from this point to better advantage than from Advent Bay. The sealer Hobbs, which is bringing Lieut. Lutetow Holm, and his hydro-airplane will stop at Advent Bay and take aboard a team of ten dogs, a sledge and supplies, and two men, the leader named Tandberg and a hunter.

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Bandits, Wielding Shotguns Hold Up Guests At Dance

More Than \$200,000 Loot Taken By Six Men Who Line Dancers Beside Wall and Take Jewels

GUESTS FORCED TO TOSS CASH IN SACK

Robbers Spent Twenty or Thirty Minutes During Raid on Fashionable Club At Indianapolis

(By Associated Press.)
INDIANAPOLIS, May 30.—More than two hundred guests attending a speedway day dinner dance at the Broadmoor country club northwest of Indianapolis tonight were held up by a number of bandits. Club officials estimated that between \$150,000 and \$200,000 in money, jewelry and other valuables was taken.

The dance was held in connection with the annual 200 mile Indianapolis motor speedway here today. Several out of town guests attended the dance and all in the building were said to have been wearing much valuable jewelry.

Six Men Take Part

At least six men took part in the holdup. About 10 o'clock, when the guests were making merry, four men rushed in the main door and ordered the manager, A. S. Labell, to hold up his hands, with two other companions who had slipped into the building, the four suddenly put a halt to the dancing and forced the guests to line up against the wall of the ball room.

All of the guests were forced to throw billfolds, watches, rings and other jewelry and valuables into a large canvas sack. Despite the assertion of A. M. Rosenthal, president of the club, that there was no safe in the building, several of the bandits, made a search.

Two of the men had sawed off shotguns. After spending twenty or thirty minutes in the building the six men left in a large sedan and sped toward Indianapolis.

STEWART TRIAL TODAY

Must Tell Why He Did Not Answer Probe

WASHINGTON, May 30.—(P)—Robert W. Stewart, chairman of the board of the Standard Oil company of Indiana, goes on trial here tomorrow for his refusal to answer questions put to him during the recent senate committee investigation of the Continental Trading company.

Attorneys for the prosecution and defense spent much of the holiday in a final organization of their cases in the District-of-Columbia supreme court. Stewart will be prosecuted by District Attorney Leo A. Rover, and Assistant District Attorney Neil Burkshaw.

STUDENTS RELEASED

Had Been Held For Part In Riot

NEW HAVEN, Conn., May 30.—(P)—Five Yale students who were arrested in connection with a student riot against police early today were released by the city court later in custody of Professor H. H. Twedy of the Yale Divinity school.

No action will be taken by the university authorities, Dean Clarence W. Wendell said, until after their cases have been disposed of in city court.

Calles Aide 'Fired'

Aided In Smuggling, Says Charge

MEXICO CITY, May 30.—(P)—Federal Jose Alvarez, chief of staff to President Calles, was dismissed today from that post, a written statement from the president to Mexican newspapers announced tonight. The statement said General Alvarez had conspired with "certain foreigners" in smuggling merchandise into Mexico.

CRASH KILLS TWO

Car Plunges from Dead End of Street

KANSAS CITY, Mo., May 30.—(P)—Two men, identified by cars in their pockets as Dr. Allen Porter, Kansas City physician, and Paul Hubbard of Wichita, Kansas, were killed tonight when their car plunged seventy feet off the "dead end" of a street here onto the railroad tracks below.

TO NOMINATE SMITH

Roosevelt Will Present New Yorker

NEW YORK, May 30.—(P)—The World tomorrow will say that Franklin D. Roosevelt, who nominated Governor Alfred E. Smith for the presidency in 1924, will nominate the governor at the democratic national convention in Houston, Texas, next month.

Friends of the governor let it be known that Mr. Roosevelt, one of the New York executive's closest friends, undoubtedly will receive the honor, although the formal announcement has yet to come from Governor Smith.

\$100,000 Building May Total Reaches New Record Mark

Building permits for May yesterday soared beyond the \$400,000 mark with the granting of permits totalling \$17,000 for the day.

May's total now stands at \$407,302 for eighty-two permits, and the year's total \$1,463,213 for 230 permits. Permits for the first five months this year are practically as large as the total for the entire year of 1927.

73 Delegates To Kansas City GOP Meet Contested

Texas' Contingent of 26 To Be Judged by Republican National Committee in Session Soon

WASHINGTON, May 30.—Contests affecting 73 seats in the Kansas City convention have been recognized by the Republican National committee, with the probability that those involving six will not be pressed.

The committee has been called to meet in Kansas City next Monday, eight days before the start of the convention, to pass on the disputes which him all but one case. Porto Rico have arisen in southern states. Former Senator Pepper, returning National Committeeman from Pennsylvania, will be in charge of the hearings, and those who are not satisfied with rulings have the right of appeal to the credentials committee, to be named after the convention organizes.

The entire delegations from three states—Louisiana, Mississippi and Texas—are in contest, as are nine of ten Florida seats, the two from Porto Rico, three from Georgia, two from Kentucky, four from South Carolina and three from Tennessee.

WASHINGTON, May 30.—(P)—President Coolidge, in his capacity of president of the American Red Cross, will lay the cornerstone tomorrow of the organization's new building, dedicated to the sacrifices and services of American women in the world war.

NEW YORK, May 30.—(P)—Dwight W. Morrow, Ambassador to Mexico, arrived today for a month's vacation and spent a few hours at his home in Englewood, N. J., before leaving late tonight for Washington to confer with President Coolidge and Secretary of State Kellogg.

Two Lubbock Youths Fail To Make Bond

WOMAN'S DAY

It is interesting to note that two men high in public life are quoted in two current magazines concerning their opinions of women on jury duty. Clarence Darrow, probably the most humane, clear-thinking attorney who ever stood before a judge, says several things on the subject.

He says that because women accept their present jury duties with better grace than men and welcome the opportunity to serve, rather than make any and every attempt to evade, is no proof that they are more adapted to this work, nor more civilly conscious than men.

"It's a new thing to women," says Darrow. "A new pastime, a new toy, a new emotion. Jury service gives women the same thrill that a shopping spree does. But I doubt if eventually the woman in business will be any more anxious to lose her time and money for jury service than a man, or that the society woman will be any more eager to accept a bridge tea for jury duty than her husband's golf or golf of chance to make a garden."

"And I, for one, do not see how any woman can quarrel with that statement."

HOW ABOUT PROPERTY? Women, Darrow continues, rarely by own property unless it has been acquired by inheritance from a male relative, and all property cases are turned over to other males. Why then, reasons he, should juries which, nine times out of ten, are concerned with property cases, be made up of women who know little about property rights?

That argument, is weaker in this day when any real estate concern will and does say that it includes as many, if not more, women clients than men.

Mr. Darrow meets this argument by merely saying that the majority of women who still choose marriage in preference to "career" is so overwhelming as to make this problem null and void.

Then he says that jury duty calls for the discussion of matters which social custom has always confined as conversational matters to only the most intimate relationships, and that any upturning of this custom, making it possible for mixed juries to impermissibly consider "such subjects" would result in general havoc and destruction.

AL SMITH, TOO. Governor Al Smith of New York talks to this effect on the subject of women on juries, too. He says in part:

"I don't want my daughters to sit in a New York criminal courtroom listening to endless stories of wickedness and filth."

No woman is so modern that the chivalry, even if mistaken, of gentlemen of the old school does not touch her a bit. But both Darrow and Smith could never understand the modern girl and woman who is so used to her biology and criminology and sociology courses as "the men" does not find "wickedness and filth" in fact so much as mere data beginnings in a world, socially

Menu for the Day

BREAKFAST—Orange juice, cereal, cream, crisp broiled bacon, creamed hashed potatoes, popovers, milk coffee.

LUNCHEON—Cream of carrot soup, broiled scallops, open tomato sandwiches, snowflakes, linseed.

DINNER—Broiled porterhouse steak, French fried potatoes, creamed onions, spinach and grapefruit salad, cherry pudding, milk coffee.

Snowballs.

One half cup rice, 3 cups milk, 3-4 cup sugar, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1-3 cup shredded coconut, white 1 egg.

Wash rice through many waters. Cook in milk until rice is soft and milk is absorbed. Add salt, sugar and nutmeg and mix thoroughly.

Let cool enough to handle and shape into balls, putting a tablespoonful of any kind of jelly in the center of each ball. Beat white of egg until foamy and roll each ball in it. Then dip in finely shredded coconut, coating the entire surface of the balls well with coconut. Let dry and serve with crushed fruit or custard sauce.

Slaton Hopes to Increase Water Supply

SLATON, May 30.—With the aim of increasing and improving the municipal water supply in Slaton, the City Commission had a test well put down by W. T. Gunn of this city, and at a depth of 180 feet a stratum of pure, soft water 26 feet in depth was encountered, extending down to the 206-foot level.

Two Sentenced to
Asylum From Here

One of Those Tried for Lunacy Had Hallucination He Was A Second "John The Baptist"

Two men, one who claimed to be "John the Baptist," the second and the other a 67-year-old farmer who is father of three children, yesterday were found guilty of "insanity" by a jury in county court.

They were sentenced to the state insane asylum at Wichita Falls by County Judge Charles Nordyke.

Verdicts of guilt were returned after a short deliberation by the jury. Both men entered pleas of "not guilty."

Local physicians recommended the sentence. One of the men was first troubled with attacks about a year ago, testimony showed. He was placed in a private institution in Dallas, but was released and declared incurable. It was testified yesterday by a physician, Juanita Mills, Winnell McCoy, Lera Isom, Messrs. Townsend, Waddell, J. E. Couch, Ronnie Shepherd, R. E. Mills, Jack Nelson, Donald Shepherd, H. C. Garrard and R. F. Shepherd, Jr.

The other man was arrested about ninety days ago at Slaton on charges of drunkenness. Testimony was introduced by the state to show that he was addicted to the liquor habit, that he had been kept in jail in an effort to cure him. At times the man seemed improved, but often broke out in deranged attacks, deputies stated.

Deputy Sheriff Vernice Ford testified that this man thought himself to be the second John the Baptist, and that he mattered and quoted Scripture almost continually on the trip from Slaton, when he was being brought here under arrest. Ford stated that the prisoner wanted to take the car and "fly through the air." He further testified that he often saw the man on his hands and knees on the road, staring deliriously at the floor.

These two cases made three insanity trials within the past two days to be tried in county court. Another man was sentenced to the insane asylum the previous day after he had voluntarily asked to be sent for treatment, and pleaded guilty to the charge. He declared that at times he had deranged moments during which he wanted to cut up every one in sight to "see the blood run." All three men will be sent to the institution at the same time.

Nearly Thousand New Laws Tell Of Congress' Labors

Legislative Mill Is Started Slowly In This Session But As End Nears Went In To High Gear.

WASHINGTON, May 29.—Nearly one thousand new laws repaired to night upon the statute books of the nation, telling their own story of the whirlwind legislative accomplishments of the first session of the seventeenth congress.

Covering a range of activities bounded only by the wide scope of American interests, the newly written acts constitute a legislative record unparalleled in a decade. Further, aside from the actual volume, the magnitude of some of the tasks completed rivals the work of any previous session on capitol hill.

Almost On Schedule

Starting off at a slow speed, the legislative machinery gradually was worked into high gear and as adjournment time approached the legislative speedometer touched new marks for recent years and the house and senate crossed the finish line almost on schedule.

Had it not been for the grip of Canyon Dam bill stationery in the senate, congress probably would have approved or rejected nearly every bill on the calendar of the two houses. It almost reached that exclusive of today, 19,770 measures were introduced in the two houses. Of this number 1223 were reported by house committees, and slightly more than 900 by senate committees, many still await action by one house or the other; some are in conference and 923 were enacted into law.

Most of those enacted received their finishing touches in the closing days of the session. This period of intense activity further was enlivened by a spirited disagreement between President Coolidge and the house and senate comparable only to the breach which developed 42 years ago when Grover Cleveland returned 116 bills with his disapproval.

Of more than a dozen bills vetoed by Mr. Coolidge, the two houses enacted three into law over his objection, and on three others sustained his veto. None of the remainder was brought to a second vote.

Among the major pieces of legislation placed upon the statute books by agreement between congress and the chief executive, were:

The supply bills this year called for a total appropriation of \$2,253,540,102, while the fixed charges including that for the public debt, totaled \$1,368,733,735.

Moral Turpitude Charged Against Pastor of Church

Held Love Trysts In His Study, Complaint Filed by Congregation for Ouster Says.

(By Associated Press)

LOS ANGELES, May 30.—Sensational charges against Rev. Frank Dyer, militant pastor of the Willshire Congregational church here, were on file today in superior court.

The church corporation, in an amended complaint filed in its suit to oust the pastor from the pulpit, accused him of moral turpitude. He is accused of holding love trysts in his study in the church.

The church corporation declared that the pastor made violent love to a married woman of his congregation, wrote her a letter inviting her to go to Santa Catalina Island with him, penned her a love poem, and was seen caressing her in a parked automobile.

Rev. Dyer, who has occupied pulpits in several cities of the Pacific coast, was summoned to appear June 7 before an ecclesiastical court for trial on charges of "conduct unbecoming of a Congregational minister."

BUILD POSTOFFICE

Big Spring Office Being Remodeled

BIG SPRING, May 30.—Remodeling of the Big Spring postoffice is now under way. The building is being remodeled both inside and out. The old awning is being torn away which gives the building an entirely different appearance. The interior is being redecorated and repaired throughout. According to E. E. Fahrnenkamp, newly appointed postmaster, larger quarters will be necessary due to the increasing demands upon the postoffice department here.

The offending memorial declared that the United States is suffering from official inactivity against the liquor traffic and added "the present condition, with the president, formerly attorney for that infamous business, appointing an excise board as chief of the enforcement bureau, while giving us what we might expect by putting party above principle, is bringing reproach upon our constitution, as well as upon our reputation as a professing Christian nation, both at home and abroad."

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City's Swimming Pool Planned to Be Ready June 1

\$20,000 Recreation Place To Be Open for Bathing Friday. If Contractors Plans Work Out

The city's new \$20,000 municipal swimming pool, located in Tumble N park, will be ready by June 1, or tomorrow, if efforts of the contractors work out satisfactorily.

The pool was secured as a result of efforts made by Park Commissioner A. V. Weaver and the Park Committee, members of which are J. B. Maxey and K. N. Clapp. H. N. Roberts planned the pool and work is being done by the Panhandle Construction company, with J. J. Clements in charge.

Eighty dressing rooms, completely furnished, and eight shower baths are to be found in the bath house. Sanitation will be the watchword at the pool. Four life guards, selected from personnel of the Boy Scout local troops have been named to be on duty as life guards. These are Eugene Adair, Boots Adkisson, John Hooper, and Tom Everheart.

A small charge, to meet expenses of maintenance, is to be made for bathing, city officials said.

Pool Modern Every Way.

The pool is 150 feet long and 50 feet wide, built on the most modern swimming pool plans and is arranged so that there will be 40 feet of water 20 inches to 3 1/2 feet deep for small children, 60 feet 1-2 to 4 feet for general amusement and 50 feet ranging from 4 1/2 to 10 feet in depth for swimming and diving. Pool equipment will consist of two regulation A. A. 17 diving boards, 3 feet and 10 feet heights, a 30 foot wave slide and an 8 foot water wheel, the newest in swimming pool apparatus. Wool bathing suits will be available at the pool at all times.

OSLO, May 30 (P).—Plans for a new auxiliary expedition to search for General Umberto Nobile and his companions on the ill-fated Italia have been approved by the Norwegian government. The steamer Ingefour, which has been in the coal trade at Svalbard, has been taken over for the transport of one, possibly two, navy airplanes. These will be piloted by Captain Riiser-Larsen, who has charge of all the rescue plans, and Lieut. Lelf Dietrichsen, both of whom accompanied Captain Ronald Amundsen on his Polar expedition in 1925.

The Ingefour will probably be ready to leave for the North Friday. She is a ship of 6,200 tons, strongly built and accustomed to force ahead through the ice. She will likely serve as a mother ship to the airplanes, proceeding along the coast while the aviators make short scouting trips across the ice-bound regions.

Wireless Messages Are Intercepted

CORDOVA, Alaska, May 30 (P).—Three wireless messages purportedly from the Citta Di Milano, mother ship of the Italian Arctic expedition, were intercepted by the naval radio station here today. One of the messages was signed "Nobile" and seemed to indicate that the crew of the dirigible was safe.

Messages intercepted by the United States naval radio station at Cordova, signed "Nobile" and "Amado" evidently were from the brother of the Italian explorer, lost now a week on the Italia in the Arctic, observers believed.

Storm One of the Worst.

The president urged his audience to work for peace by developing law abidingness and good citizenship, arguing that by these principles peaceful peoples are bred.

Defense in Paleolithic

He said that although the American military establishment was relatively small this country found its chief defense in its prosperity and industry and in the patriotism of its people, qualities which in contrast to large armies and navies, breed peace sooner than war.

President Coolidge finally scored Americans who while abroad refused to obey constitutional local laws and created international complications and covered the United States with disrepute.

SOUTH PLAINS SCHOOLS

In the early days of the Plains, people "back East" used to tremble for the people who came west because they said there were no schools. This fear was soon dismissed from the people who came and planted themselves in this section, because even when there were very few people in this country the schools were high grade. In the past fifteen years however there has been a wonderful development of schools in the west, and the little red school house that we have heard so much about has underwent many changes, and has been greatly improved over the schools of twenty years ago.

That little red school house just doesn't exist on the Plains of Texas today. It has been remodeled both inside and out and the people who gather around are as different as the buildings. We had occasion to attend a luncheon prepared by the Home Demonstration club of a certain community the other night and while there we could not help but notice the difference in that school, the community and the people in contrast to the pictured gathering at the little red school house. The advancement in rural education has been much more marked than the advancement in the city schools.

The consolidated schools of today have large modern brick buildings, lighted with electricity, and is neat in appearance as any city school. Due largely to the work of the county demonstration agents and health nurses, the people of the rural communities have a greater pride in their community, their health, their neatness and in sanitation that do the people who make up the population of the cities.

The girls of the farms are taught better than any town girls, how to prepare and serve food in an appealing and appetizing manner. Through the work of the girls of any rural community can serve a banquet better than most of our city institutions that cater to such work. Not only can these rural girls do it, but they take pride in so doing.

It is the development that has taken place in the rural schools of West Texas that is giving to the suburban people the same advantages that are tendered the city people, building community pride and good citizenship.

It is hard to find better people than the farmers of the South Plains and their families.

RAIL EXTENSION GREATEST ON THE PLAINS

The South Plains section had to wait many years for the coming of the railroads, but ever since the first line was marked through the fertile fields of the South Plains the development program has been going forward. The development however has been confined largely to the territory adjacent to the railroads and in this vast territory this meant that there was a big stretch of country that was not served by railroads, which prevented the biggest development program that might otherwise have been put over. With the completion of the extension of the Fort Worth and Denver line into South Plains points and also the short extension of the Acme Quanah and Pacific a vast territory is served.

Sixteen new railroad stations are included in the extension of the tow lines fourteen of them on the Fort Worth and Denver South Plains line and two on the Quanah, Acme and Pacific.

Twelve of them will be towns not previously served by a railroad.

Freight service was inaugurated over a portion of the Fort Worth and Denver South Plains Nov. 1st. On June 1st, a rate schedule granted by the Texas Railway Commission will become effective to South Plains, Sterley, Plainview, Hart, and Dimmitt, Silvertown, Lockney, Petersburg, Becton, and Lubbock. At the same time a schedule effective June 7th was established for the Quanah, Acme and Pacific to Daugherty, a new town, an to Floydada, the only two towns on the extension of that line. Of the fourteen towns on the new Fort Worth and Denver South Plains Railway, ten are above the caprock. Under an Austin date line, fixing of rate on the Burlington's new line was announced.

The rate basis is the same as now generally applies in that territory through Santa Fe service. The commission approved the rates as of June 1 for temporary application and set the schedules for public hearing for June 12 at which time shippers interested may be heard in opposition to or for amendments to the new publications. The application covers rates to every point on the new line extending from Estelline on the Fort Worth and Denver City to Lubbock Plainview, Dimmitt and Silvertown.

It is stated in the petition that no effort will now be made to handle heavy building materials for the large construction program in sight, such as for elevators, mills and ware houses, but that the road is preparing to expeditiously handle the wheat crop which begins to move in June. Later will come cotton and sorghums.

This means that the line will be ready for all kinds of service in June. It will be the realization of the South Plains country and also the completion of the Burlington's venture into that second in competition with the Santa Fe, which has long had a monopoly.

With the exception of the small area from Hart to Dimmitt all the remainder of the line is placed in common point territory in the movement of grain, which will be the great tonnage moving out of that section. Different rates on grain and its products will be added west of Hart to Dimmitt only.

Texas will go into the Democratic convention pledged to a dry candidate for the presidential nomination, and it remains to be seen just yet who it will be. There will probably be a Moses somewhere.

When the farmers of this country get lined up where they can attract the attention of buyers to this section, for the products that they raise there will be something really worth while for them in the agricultural business. There should be enough eggs produced in this country to have a uniform grade that certain kind of eggs, and the same should apply to dairy products and to poultry, including turkeys. The turkeys of this country are bought at themixed grade, taken somewhere else and graded, and told according to the demands of the buyers at prices that are far in excess of what they will bring on wide open market.

It is very dangerous, and we are sure that a great deal of trade is diverted from the city of Lubbock because of the dangerous crossings on the railroad, and we are of the honest opinion that Lubbock should not allow this important thing to be deferred longer.

We agree with the railroad people that a public street is no place for a race track especially when it crosses a railroad track, and again the highways is no place for fools to drive cars, and beating the train to the crossing is a gamble on life that is some day going to be lost by automobile drivers who insist on trying to cross the track when the train is approaching, but that is no reason that the railroads should not be willing to put underpasses on Broadway and on Avenue H.

The Texas democracy sends 60 delegates and 60 alternates to the national convention to cast its 40 votes. Guess the convention figured that in numbers is to be found great strength.

A cargo of booze valued at \$75,000, intended for distribution during the Houston convention, was captured by prohibition officers recently. However, no dry delegate with a third need have fears of a famine during the meeting. There will be plenty of live savers around.

YOUR HEALTH

BY DR. MORRIS FISHER
Editor Journal of the American Medical Association and of Hygiene, the Health Magazine.

Everyone knows that there are some odors that are pleasant and some that are disagreeable. In many instances the sense of pleasure or of discomfort is associated with some previous experience of the person concerned. The perfume called attar of roses is generally much more pleasant than that of asafetida. There are persons, however, to whom the smell is not altogether pleasant.

Some odors seem exceedingly pleasant at the first whiff and then tend to become more unpleasant the longer they are present. This is because of their intensity.

Health Plays Part.

In the University of Edinburgh, Dr. J. H. Kennen has undertaken a series of researches, including 25 men and 34 women who were examined as to their response to odors of many different substances and combinations of substances. The state of health of the person concerned seems to have something to do with the enjoyment of odors or with disagreement.

Psychological study was also made of associations with various smells. One man who was given camphor to smell immediately felt distressed and visualized the door of a wardrobe and then a feeling of suffocation or being in the dark. It appears that the odor reminded him of an incident in 1892 when he was placed in a closet because of some youthful misdeed. In the closet were clothes which had been supplied with camphor as a moth preventive.

A girl who smelled xylol visualized herself on board a vessel in a harbor in Ceylon. The odor of xylol resembles that of benzol which comes from harbor launches. The odor of cedarwood oil was associated with a summer evening of the Norwegian coast, with a cigar

America is on the eve of the greatest flowering of culture civilization has ever known. In the belief of Chamcey J. Hamlin, president of the American Association of Museums.

"We are beginning," says Mr. Hamlin, "to see the awakening of an interest in art, science, architecture, poetry history and other cultural subjects such as will surpass in grandeur the finest works of ancient Greece or the Renaissance."

This he believes, is due largely to our great prosperity. "Art has always flourished where people had leisure," he explains. "America's great industrial expansion has paved the way for a cultural expansion."

An essay on the relation of mass production to the fine arts would make interesting reading. It is rather surprising to think that America's preoccupation with factories, railroads and mines, which has given us the name of the world's champion materialists, should eventually be responsible for a flowering of spiritual and intellectual activity.

Yet after all, it is only natural that it should. Every period that has been unusually rich in the arts has been a period in which men felt that they were standing at the dawn of a new era; a period in which old shackles were dropping off, old barriers falling and new horizons opening to view.

And this period, in America, is such a time. To be sure, there are many who do not think so. Open any rough-paper magazine and you will find some writer bitterly deploring every facet of our civilization; you will read that there never was a time so hostile to intellectual and artistic endeavor; you will discover that the "deeper thinkers," almost unanimously, are very down in the mouth about everything.

But they are mistaken. Consider, for a moment, what the last two or three decades have brought us.

They have shown us that it is within our power to wipe out all poverty. They have enabled us to conquer the limits of time and space. They have given the submerged masses a chance, not merely at decent living conditions, but at luxuries and refinements. They have indicated that there is no material obstacle to mankind's well-being that cannot be removed.

What should such an age be if not an age of soaring hopes? The fact that we have not yet learned how to take the best advantage of our new discoveries is nothing. We have them, the future can be more marvelous than we dream.

Mr. Hamlin is right. We are at the dawn of a great age. Fortunately is the young person just now attaining manhood. He will see great things.
