Much Progress Shown In Perryton During 1930

Texas-Louisiana Power Co. Offers Lower Domestic Light Rate

NEW RATE SCHEDULE IS TAKEN UNDER CONSIDERATION BY CITY

NO CHANGE IN COMMERCIAL RATES UNTIL SPRING; MANAGER WHIPPO SAYS COMMERCIAL RATE ADJUSTMENT IS NOW BEING WORKED OUT

At the last meeting of the city council, a new rate schedule for use of electric current in homes was offered to the aldermen and the mayor for their consideration. The proposed schedule would result in considerable saving to most domestic customers of the power company, although in a few instances, it would mean a slight raise.

A comparison of the December bills, figured on both the present and the proposed new rates, shows a saving to the consumers of \$300.00, or approximately an 8 per cent reduction. The proposed new schedule starts with a minimum of 3 k. w. for \$1.00; the next 100; the next 75 at 4c and all over 100 at 3c. This is identical to the same rate that is now in effect in combination meter customers, and would make no change in their bill.

The few customers whose rates would run slightly higher are those who have two meters, one for lights and the other for heating. Also a slight increase would be made in the bill of those who use from nine to thirteen kilowatts per month, the increase running from 5c to 20c per month.

The new rate schedule has been under advisement by the city council and will probably be accepted, changed or rejected at the next meeting. C. E. Whippo, division manager for the Texas-Louisiana power company, states that they are now working out a revision schedule for commercial customers, and this rate will be ready for submission in the early spring.

Mr. Derrick explained the purpose of the Federal Farm board and how it was functioning. He also went into detail regarding the world wheat situation and urged farmers to reduce their wheat acreage, as the most logical means to remedy the existing conditions.

SHOW BIG GAIN AT LOCAL P. O.

RECEIPTS FOR 1930 GAIN OF \$1841 OVER RECORD YEAR OF 1929

A new high record for postal receipts was set by the local office during 1930, exceeding the record year of 1929 by \$1,841, according to Postmistress Fannie Mae Black. The receipts for 1930 were \$15,231 as compared with \$13,390 in 1929.

During the year money orders were issued for \$102,542. Registered letters numbered 2,367 and insured parcels numbered 3,921. During the year 540,650 pieces of first class mail were cancelled by the electric cancelling machine, an increase of 68,000 pieces over the preceding year.

The Christmas business exceeded anything experienced in the local post office during the past nine years and set an all time record. The remarkable thing about the Christmas business was that the outgoing business was much heavier than the inbound, 103 sacks being sent out on one mail on the Tuesday morning preceding Christmas.

Thirteen people are employed at the local post office, with an annual payroll of \$21,533.

REAGAN MEMORIAL ERECTED

PLACED ON CITY HALL PARK GROUNDS IN MEMORY OF FIREMAN KILLED ON DUTY

The beautiful memorial, purchased with funds raised by popular subscription, was erected last Monday afternoon on the city hall grounds in the memory of Jesse C. Reagan, volunteer fireman who gave his life in line of duty last September.

The beautiful Georgia silver gray marble stone was purchased at a cost of \$750, practically all of which amount has already been raised. The seven foot die is set on an eighteen inch base, making a total height of eight and one-half feet.

The stone is engraved as follows: "Jesse C. Reagan, a volunteer fireman born November 10, 1896, lost his life in line of duty, September 24, 1930."

The stone weighs over four thousand pounds.

Perryton Country Remained on "White Spot" on Business Map

Development in Perryton and Perryton country during 1930 was remarkable, as compared with other sections of Texas. The biggest paving program in the history of the town was launched, and a number of brick business buildings and fine residences were erected. In addition the entire Perryton country remained in the "white spot" of Nation's Business during the entire twelve months.

Close to four million bushels of wheat was produced in Ochiltree county, and about the same acreage has been sown again for the 1931 crop. The first car load of "Milk-ling Shorthorn" cattle was shipped into the county by E. W. Rogers. Duroc Jersey hogs and White Wyandotte chickens won many prizes at the Amarillo, Lubbock and Guymon fairs. A county agricultural exhibit was shown at the three above fairs and did much to advertise farming in this section.

The extension of the Santa Fe from Spearman to Morse and a truckage arrangement to the main line of the Santa Fe north of Dumas will give Perryton a main line connection for the shipment of grain, cattle and hogs.

Perryton was active in highway matters. Federal 83, a transcontinental highway from Canada to the Gulf was designated over No. 4 through Perryton. State Highway No. 117 was extended from Perryton to Follett. Work has already started on the grade and drainage of this highway from Perryton to Stinnett preparatory to paving. In 1931 the grade and drainage will probably be done to Booker, and on Highway No. 83 through the county towards Canadian.

Thirty-eight blocks of additional paving, brick on a caliche base was put down and a contract has been let for two and three-tenths miles additional paving within the city limits. This includes the extension of Main street south to the city limits and Brillhart street each way to the city limits.

Water mains and sewer extension were made to take care of the development; free mail delivery was secured; the new hatchery was built and another one doubled its capacity; an ice cream factory and butter plant was installed; and four new elevators were built in 1930.

Dr. Lanham is approved and recommended by the State Livestock Sanitary commission. Ft. Worth, for this work. In addition to testing the cows, Dr. Lanham will address a meeting of dairymen at the courthouse at 7:30 o'clock on Monday evening. Everyone interested is invited to attend.

According to County Agent Sheets, dairymen who are interested in having their herds tested can still come in on the group test anytime before the date of Dr. Lanham's arrival. He invites dairymen to come in and talk to him about having their herds tested.

Meade Banker a Suicide

Louis Boehler, Father of Former Perryton Woman, Shoots Self January 2nd

Louis Boehler, president of the Meade State Bank, Meade, Kansas, committed suicide last Friday morning by shooting himself. No cause for his tragic action can be learned other than worry over the health of his wife who has been confined in a Colorado Springs sanitarium for years. His financial affairs were in excellent shape and the bank was also in good sound condition.

The deceased banker has been a resident of Meade since 1884 and was known and respected over Southwest Kansas and a business man of much ability and honesty. A former Perryton woman, Mrs. Fred Holdeman, was a daughter. Mr. and Mrs. Holdeman lived in Perryton for one year. Mr. Holdeman preceded E. E. Shupe as high school athletic coach, and Mrs. Holdeman teaching at the Twichell school.

Lumber Company Head Plans Farm Protection

The following editorial from the Amarillo News concerns every citizen of this great Southwest. It is the fact that some steps must be taken for the protection of farm business. The government gives trade protection in the way of freight rates, tariffs, etc., to industries and manufacturers, then why not to the farmers? If every business firm in Perryton would write to the jobbers and manufacturers from whom they buy merchandise, asking that they use their influence to see that the farmer gets Federal protection for his business, it would be a vast help. We quote the News as follows:

"A suggestion from John E. Hill of Amarillo to Forbes Magazine recently that the time has come for the farmers to have the same trade protection as industrialists have received, has brought numerous expressions of approval from financial leaders.

"Mr. Hill said, in effect, that unless manufacturers and industrialists agree to some plan that will benefit the farmers, that the purchasing power of the country will greatly diminish and that the industrialists will lose out in the long run.

"Letters indorsing his suggestion have been received from Harry Eaton, noted financier of Washington, and from Theodore H. Price, internationally-famous economist.

"Forbes Magazine printed Mr. Hill's letter, which was as follows: "We believe the time has come for some great and courageous national leader to convince the industrialists of America that the great sustaining body are those who derive their living and their purchasing power from the soil, and that they should be protected against the raw products of other countries, the same as our industrialists have had protection for many years, in order to continue the prosperity of our country.

"You might contribute greatly to national welfare by getting our industrialists to look beyond their immense problems, looking rather at the problems of that great potential purchasing power of those who produce our first national wealth which comes from the soil."

Protest Re-routing Of No. 4 State Highway

We understand that certain citizens of this county have been rather severely criticizing Perryton and Perryton citizens for the new tentative routing of Highway No. 4 between Perryton and Canadian. At the present time the route is practically settled and it will angle southeast from Perryton, leaving the present highway at the city limits. This is contrary to the wishes of the Perryton Chamber of Commerce, the business men of Perryton and the great majority of the citizens. Many conferences have been held with the state highway officials and it is hoped that the highway can be routed straight south for at least twelve miles, then angling southeast to the corner of the county.

A paved highway straight south out of Perryton will serve many more people for they can come from both the east and west to the pavement and then straight into town. Perryton citizens have never been for the angling road and any person who thinks so is a big mistake. From a strictly selfish viewpoint, Perryton is not interested in one

lot as to how to build the shortest route to Canadian, what we want is a highway into Perryton which will enable the most people to get into Perryton, and the south route will do this, without doubt.

We, of Perryton and Ochiltree county, look at the location of this route from a strictly local angle, so we must not be too drastic in our condemnation of the state and federal engineers. Their problem is a national problem. United States 83 runs over this route from Canada to Mexico, and every mile saved is a mile made. The state officials take this same attitude. They have the two points, Perryton and Canadian, in mind as control points on State No. 4, and their task is to survey the shortest and most practical route between the two places.

The road committee of the Chamber of Commerce together with the county commissioners, are working hard on this proposition and it is hoped that a compromise route can be worked out which will serve more Ochiltree county people than the present routing southeast.

MARTHA A. HUMMER

Martha A. Hummer, daughter of Elder David and Leah Kimmel, was born January 1, 1858, near Brookville, Ohio, and died at her home near Booker, Texas, January 4, 1931, aged 73 years and 4 days. When five years old, she with her parents emigrated to Jefferson County, Kansas, but two years later they moved to Sangamon County, Illinois, where she grew to womanhood. Here she married Clement S. Hummer, September 14, 1879. The following year they moved to Kansas. This home was blessed with eleven children, five of whom survive her. They are Mayne E. Hummer, M. S. Hummer, D. D. Hummer, and Mrs. Rhoda Stollings of Booker and Mrs. Coy Trout of Pollett.

Forty-six years ago she united with the Church of the Brethren, and was a devoted member until death. The faith she had in the Saviour was especially comforting to her during her lingering illness. Many times she expressed herself as being ready to meet her Saviour. She, with her husband and family, came to this country in December, 1908, and had been in their home near Booker since 1906. She has experienced the hardships common to our pioneers, but through it all she maintained an optimistic outlook on life. She was truly a mother in the home and a neighbor in the community. The virtuous woman described in Prov. 31:10-31, could surely be applied to her by the life she lived.

AIDING THE SCHOOL CHILD

Within the last few years more than one-half of the states have enacted laws which in one way or another are designed to promote the health and physical safety of school children, according to the Office of Education in Washington.

Besides the efforts being made in behalf of children as a result of legislation, much is being done in the same direction by school authorities in states where no special laws on the subject exist. Superintendents, home economics teachers, school physicians and physical training departments all contribute to the movement for child welfare.

One phase of this movement which has been given increasing attention of late is instruction in matters of diet. In this, a proper balancing of essential food elements and the selection of easily digestible foods present the main problems. Obviously, the programs involves excluding unsuitable or harmful foods and beverages.

Physicians and educators generally condemn the use of tea and coffee by growing children, as the use of these stimulants is considered inimical to the proper development of the child, both physically and mentally. Miss Dorothy Paul, director of the modern health crusade of the Wisconsin Anti-Tuberculosis association, recently said:

"We feed about coffee that an old horse feeds stimulation, but a young colt gets his legs down in it. Coffee and tea stimulate, but they have no food value except the small amount of cream and sugar used with them."

The movement for safeguarding the health of school children is one of the utmost importance. Parents should cooperate with medical and school authorities in adopting measures which experience has shown to be beneficial to their growing boys and girls.

BUILDING PROBLEMS

Fifty years ago only 30 per cent of the country's population lived in communities of over 2,500, while today the urban population is 60 per cent of the total. This drift to the cities has been accompanied by a revolution in construction methods with respect to both residential and business buildings.

The amazing increase in value of both classes of structures is a notable feature of our national progress. According to an estimate by the heating research bureau of the C. A. Dunham Company of Chicago, the value of all buildings in the United States today is 141 billion dollars, these structures and the land they occupy representing half of the nation's wealth.

Modern requirements have produced the towering skyscraper, the giant hotel and the cathedral-like picture theatre. Projects costing up to twenty millions are no longer unique. These developments have brought some most difficult engineering problems, especially in the matter of heating. But, thanks to American inventive genius, it is now possible to heat the largest or smallest building with sub-atmospheric steam in a manner that precisely meets outside weather conditions. It is likewise possible to zone a building and heat it to meet the needs of its occupancy, thus effecting great savings in fuel.

No one knows what problems may arise in connection with buildings of the future, but whatever they may be, American engineering skill will meet them.

EMPLOYMENT OF WOMEN

It may be surprising to some to be told that for nearly 100 years after the Declaration of Independence no women were employed by the government, but such is the fact, according to a recent statement by the president of the Civil Service Commission.

The first law permitting the employment of women as clerks in Federal government offices was passed in 1870. Today more than 28,000 women are employed in such offices in Washington alone, while nearly 60,000 more are employed outside of the capital city.

Women are being appointed to such government positions as bac-

teriologist, biologist, botanist, chemist, economist, educationist, patent statistician, zoologist and technologists of various kinds. As is well known, many women hold postmasterhips.

The employment of women in private business has shown a steady increase also, the number of women wage-earners being nearly ten million.

Whether this increasing activity of women in industry, business and the professions is an indication of an improved civilization depends upon one's viewpoint. However that may be, women have shown their ability to engage successfully in nearly every vocation under the sun, and that they will continue to do so can not be doubted.

BIG INSURANCE POLICY

The largest insurance policy ever issued covering losses on material in transit will shortly expire, its terms having been complied with. Its original amount was \$1,500,000 and covered shipments of limestone—of all things.

The policy was issued to the In-

diana Limestone Company as protection against losses in transit of cut, carved and turned limestone used in the erection of the new Department of Commerce and Internal Revenue buildings in Washington, for which more than 1,500 carloads were required. It would have taken a train 17 miles long to haul at one time all the stone used in these structures.

The Department of Commerce building, said to be the largest office building in floor area in the world, will cost when completed about \$17,000,000. In its erection 1,100 carloads of stone were used. The Internal Revenue building is already completed and occupied.

According to President A. E. Dickinson of the Indiana Limestone Company, only two small losses occurred during the transportation of the vast quantity of material required for these two buildings which are important units in the great government building program now under way in the national capital.

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RUTH NICHOLS' RECORDS

By breaking transcontinental flying records for women, both eastward and westward, Miss Ruth Nichols of New York carries off the premier aviation honors of her sex in a year replete with remarkable performances.

Her westward flight from New York to California was made in a half minute less than 17 hours actual flying time, while her eastward journey required only 13 hours and 22 minutes in the air. In the latter flight her average speed was close to 200 miles an hour.

Only one man, Capt. Frank M. Hawks, has covered the transcontinental route in less flying time. Miss Nichols exceeded the speed made by Colonel Lindbergh in his flight last April, but he carried Mrs. Lindbergh as a passenger and was not really seeking a speed record.

Three women have had transcontinental speed records within a few months—Miss Laura Ingalls, an American girl; then Mrs. Keith Miller, an English woman, and now Miss Nichols, whose speed was almost twice as great as that of Miss Ingalls.

NEW LABOR SECRETARY

A few days ago the third man to preside over the Department of Labor since its divorce from the Department of Commerce in 1913 was inducted into office. He is William Nuckles Doak, born in Virginia 48 years ago.

The only other men to hold the Labor portfolio are William B. Wilson and James J. Davis, both of Pennsylvania. Wilson served under President Wilson, while Davis has served under three Presidents, Harding, Coolidge and Hoover.

Secretary Doak rose from the ranks of railroad trainmen, his education having been received in the public schools and in a business college. Since 1908 he has been prominent in the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, and for 14 years has been the legislative representative of that organization in Washington. Since 1928 he has been editor and manager of the Railway Trainmen.

He has been a close friend of President Hoover since the war, when he served with the future President in food administration work. He is the second youngest man in the cabinet, Secretary of War Hurley being 22 days younger.

UNSIGHTLY SIGNS

In spite of the widely advertised "code of ethics" adopted some time ago by the billboard promoters, their habit of defacing the landscape and encroaching upon residential sections has by no means been abandoned.

Public sentiment has been so aroused in opposition to the billboard nuisance that a national committee for the restriction of outdoor advertising is making a vigorous campaign against the unsightly signboards which glare at one on every hand.

Among the organizations cooperating with this committee are the General Federation of Women's Clubs, the Garden Clubs of America, the National Conference of State Parks, the American Society of Landscape Architects, historical societies, automobile associations, nature societies and other interested in the preservation of outdoor beauty.

Appeals are being made to advertisers direct, it being pointed out that an offensive advertising sign makes ill-will for the advertiser and tends to hurt rather than help his business.

KNOW TEXAS

Texas is producing in 1930 one-fourth of the pecan crop of the United States. In 1929 it produced almost one-half the total yield.

Texas' fall crops, exclusive of cotton, are valued at \$167,770,500 by V. H. Shoffelmyer, agricultural editor of the Dallas News. Texas' crops, including cotton and livestock, are estimated at \$710,000,000 for 1930, in spite of lower prices.

Texas spent \$47,331,997 on building and maintaining highways during the fiscal year ending August 1, 1930. Texas counties and road districts contributed \$10,515,575 of the total and the Federal government \$6,006,577.

ON TEXAS FARMS

By W. H. Darrow, Extension Service Editor

It's been a hard year. Farm folks are discouraged. Many probably resent having their attention called to individual success, of which there are many. Yet the surest road to farm life security is lighted up by these successes. Like most things these successes or demonstrations don't just happen. Often county farm and home demonstration agents have a hand, but always it's a member of a farm family with faith and vision and skill at the helm.

Take poultry, in which there is said to be no longer a profit. When the totals are compiled there will be thousands who have made \$1.50 net profit per bird in Texas this year. This wasn't accidental, and not everybody can do it, but there are likely 100,000 Texas farm people who could do comparably well.

Nineteen demonstrators in Bexar county averaged \$2.64 above feed cost last year from 3,708 hens. These birds laid 174 eggs apiece and one reason they did was that the owners fed \$1.91 worth of feed to each of them while many persons were cutting out feed altogether. There were other reasons, too, all of which included in the careful plans of management laid out by the county agents.

Five demonstrators with the home agent in Baylor county made \$1.55 per hen above feed cost last year with an average production of 142 eggs per hen. It cost fifteen and a half cents to pay for the feed for each dozen eggs.

In Washington county Mrs. G. C. Fischer Jr. made \$2.23 per hen as a demonstrator in a home demonstration club. She culled carefully and fed "plenty of mash, green feed, maize and some corn."

A POLITE SUGGESTION

The gallantry of an old-time western newspaper man is recounted in a story which recently appeared in several publications. It concerns the late great actress, Sara Bernhardt, and the late Sam Davis of the Carson City Appeal.

Mme. Bernhardt and her company were playing in the West, when Davis was requested by the San Francisco Examiner to meet her in Reno and accompany her to the then metropolis of California, and he did so.

After several days of acquaintanceship, during which Davis naturally showed the actress every attention, the time came to part, whereupon "the divine Sara" expressed her appreciation of his kindness by kissing him on either cheek and then on the mouth, saying:

"The right cheek for the Appeal, the left for the Examiner, the lips for yourself."

Nothing daunted, Davis made the polite suggestion: Madam, I also represent the Associated Press which serves 380 papers west of the Mississippi river.

Whether he received the additional expressions of appreciation to which he appeared to be entitled, the story does not state.

HOW STIMULANTS ACT

In recent years many experiments have been made by scientists to determine the effect of various stimulants on the human body and mind. Results of these tests have been in some instances rather surprising, as may be seen by a recent report from the State Normal College of Ohio.

Professor E. L. Mosley, head of the biology department of the college, tested 50 of his students to determine the effects of coffee on their mental efficiency. There were found to be 39 coffee drinkers and 11 non-drinkers in the class of 50, and the biology grades of the two groups were compared, with the following result:

Of the entire class, six attained the grade of A. Of these the group of 39 coffee drinkers furnished only one, while the other five grade A men were found among the 11 who did not use coffee.

These findings closely coincide with those of Professors Hoefler and Hardy, pioneer investigators of the effects of stimulants, who found coffee drinkers generally less alert mentally than others. They also discovered that less intelligent persons are not so susceptible to the effects of coffee as are those who are more intelligent and high strung.

The conclusion seems to be that the use of coffee by manual laborers and other low-income groups of adults is not especially harmful, while among children and brain workers it has a decidedly injurious effect.

DEATH OF MOTHER JONES

The recent death of Mrs. Mary Harris Jones at the age of 100 years removes one of the most remarkable characters ever connected with the labor movement in America. She was active in leading strikes and labor demonstrations until she was well past 90.

"Mother" Jones, as she was affectionately called by the workers whom she led, was a native of Cork, Ireland, but early migrated to Canada, where she received a good education. She taught in a Michigan convent and later was a teacher in Memphis, where she married. Her husband and four children perished in the yellow epidemic in Memphis in 1867.

Removing to Chicago, she set up a dressmaking business which was destroyed in the great fire in 1871. From that time on her life was chiefly concerned with efforts in behalf of the workers. Her views were radical and her methods were violent, but none doubted the sincerity of her purpose.

Even John D. Rockefeller Jr., with whose interests Mother Jones had clashed bitterly many times, sent her a letter of congratulation on her 100th birthday a few months ago. This pleased her and she remarked: "He's a damned good sport."

Two pigs slaughtered at Beloit, Wis., last week seem to have deserved a kinder fate. While being taken to market in a crate on the back seat of Mr. A. J. Dibe's car, they suddenly began to squeal lustily, and thus called attention to the fact that the car was on fire. Fireman put out the blaze, but the pigs were not rewarded for giving the alarm. The cruel butcher got them anyway.

A slight misunderstanding gave Mrs. John Acker of Newark an awful shock. Tried with her husband for passing bad checks, the judge sentenced John to a year in jail and then said to her, "I give you a like sentence." Mrs. Acker thought he said "life" and fainted.

The dog heroes of the diphtheria epidemic at Nome, Alaska, in 1925, are recalled by the recent placing of the mounted skin of one of them in Peabody Museum at Yale. It is

that of Togo, leader of a team that carried diphtheria serum to relieve the stricken community. Another of these famous dog heroes, Balto, is commemorated by a bronze statue.

A few hours after he escaped from police taking him to a reform school at Hugo, Colo., Lewis Demintou applied at the institution for admission explaining that it was too cold to remain outside.

International Sunday School Lesson
for January 11
THE CHILDHOOD OF JESUS
Luke 2:40-52
Rev. Samuel D. Price, D. D.

Just a few weeks ago we had the fascinating details about the birth of Jesus at Bethlehem. We followed the Shepherds from the fields near Bethlehem to the manger cradle and worshipped with the Wise Men as they brought their gifts. Herod wanted to kill the Child who in time would become a King but this was prevented when Joseph obeyed the command from God to flee to Egypt with the Babe and Mary the mother. When all was safe another message told the carpenter to go back to Nazareth, their home.

At the age of thirteen the Jewish boy became BAR MIZVAH, a Son of Commandment. Then he was of age to take his place before the law and to have part in the various Hebrew feasts. When the next Passover came Jesus was taken to Jerusalem with the family. During those twelve years He had been taught as other Hebrew children. Parts of the Old Testament Scripture rolls had been His study books.

People usually traveled in groups in caravan fashion in those days and it was supposed that the lad Jesus was somewhere in the company until bed time came, the first night out from Jerusalem on the way back to Nazareth. Then there was consternation because of this boy for the first time in His life. Haste was made to return to Jerusalem and the parents searched everywhere. At last they found Him in the Temple asking questions of the learned priests. He showed surprise that any search had been made for Him for they should have known that He would be in just one place—in the house of His Father. The Golden Text describes the next 18 years: "Jesus advanced in wisdom and stature and in favor with God and man." Luke 5:52.

BARTHELMESS TUTOR BY SPANISH EXPERT

Richard Barthelmess learned many things about the Spanish language during the making of "The Lash," his First National-Vitaphone starring vehicle showing at the Ellis Theatre for the last time tonight, Thursday, January 8.

I tried hard to make both ends meet with my turnip patch but when I got my turnips ready to sell everybody else was sellin' turnips for nothing and the market was glutted. I am worried clean to the bone and my wife's folks is comin' over Tuesday to spend the week end; my hand is so lame from bein' shook by politicians that I ain't able to even pull

my own fodder.

Please write if you hear of any Government relief comin' down this way. I am willin' to be a Republican or a Democrat or even a Socialist if that will help any. I wish that I had bought life insurance when I could.

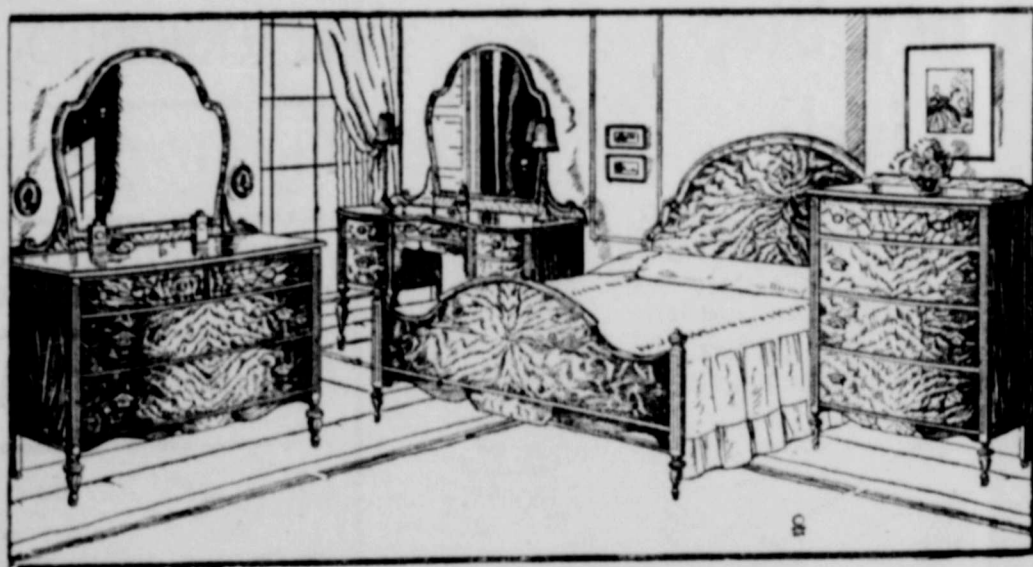

GET CALLS FOR PURE BRED HOG

WHEELER BREEDER BUYING STOCK FROM 4-H CLUB BOY IN THIS COUNTY

A short time ago there was not a registered hog in Ochiltree county. Now other counties are looking this way for pure bred hogs. On Tuesday of this week, Jake Tarter, county agent of Wheeler county, and J. B. Calcote, Wheeler, came up after registered Poland-China hogs. They found what they were looking for and more too, in Frank Robert's herd, ten miles east and two south of Perryton. They expect to come after more.

Frank is one of the 4-H club boys of this county that is making a success of raising pure bred swine. Starting with one registered gilt in May, 1927, he now has over fifty head, all the swine on the place, and they are all either registered or eligible to registry. He keeps culling his herd, selling the culls as fat hogs and keeping the best for breeding purposes, or selling them as breeding stock. He finds that pure bred hogs make more rapid and economical gains than do grade hogs. He is now feeding out some shoats for the fat stock show to be held at Amarillo, March 2-5.

of the Gulf Filling station, completion of the addition of the Champion Service station. Elevators were built by J. M. North, Ochiltree Grain company, Anderson Grain company and the Texas-Oklahoma Wheat Pool. The Baptist church was completed at a cost of \$30,000 and the first unit of the new Methodist church was constructed. The Farmers Cooperative Oil company erected a filling station and enlarged its storage capacity.

Jno. G. Cook built a large addition to his implement warehouse and work was completed on the new home of the Perryton Implement company. The Santa Fe completed work on a large unloading dock, additional trackage and other yard improvements.

Three large twenty and twenty-four inch gas lines were built across the county and one eight inch gasoline line. A \$700,000 booster station is being constructed fifteen miles northwest of Perryton. The Western Union opened uptown offices. A new rooming house was built. Warehouse for the Texas-Louisiana Power company built. A new filling station built on south Main street and another under construction. New home of the Plains Tractor & Implement company constructed. Shearer Produce company built new brick business building. Wilson Flower Shop constructed modern green house.

During the year eight or ten brick residences were erected and some fifty smaller residences were built. Building figures here were considerably under 1929, but the development was far ahead of most places in other parts of the country.

A short discussion was also held on the proposal of the Lions club furnishing playground equipment for the city park. Lions C. W. Claybaugh, Walter Allen and R. C. Johnson were placed on this committee. Further discussion was held regarding a proposed clean-up campaign and home beautification contest.

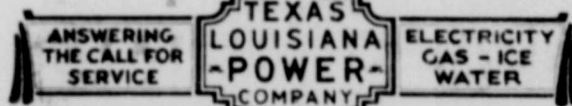
The meeting next week will be held on Wednesday noon instead of Tuesday noon, at which time the local club will entertain representatives from other clubs over the district.
