## Baseball Season To Open Tuesday

### Chamber of Commerce To Sponsor Wolf Hunters Association Meeting Here

#### Directors Meeting Is Held At Cedar Lake Friday Night

Attempt Will Be Made To Make This A Permanent Annual Gathering Here

The directors of the Lamesa Chamber of Commerce this week voted to sponsor the West Texas-New Mexico Wolf Hunters Association meeting at Cedar Lake, opening September 22 and running thru the 25th.

A meeting of the directors of the Hunters Association was called for last Friday night at Cedar Lake, by the president, C. D. Pounds, who lives in this county. A good crowd was present, with visitors from as far away as Abilene.

This association held their annual gathering at Cedar Lake last year and it is reported that between fifteen hundred and two thousand people attended the bench show. Three hundred and fifty dogs were entered in the various contests, and five states were represented.

The local Chamber of Commerce plans to hold the Bench Show in Lamesa on the night of September 22. Eighty dollars in cash will be given the winners in the Derby Dogs and All-Age Dogs contest. Suitable cups are given each year by the hunters' association for other winners.

It is planned to make this an annual affair, with the gathering being held at Cedar Lake each year. Hunters state this is among the most ideal spots in the county for an event of this kind.

The Chamber of Commerce plans to have some literature printed on the history of Cedar Lake, which will be sent out over a wide area, to attract as many people as possible to the event, and at the same time to interest people in other locations to visit this unusual spot.

WASHINGTON — Secretary Morgenthau announced today that Administration, both Democratic and Republican Congressional leaders had agreed to ask \$3,500,000,000 new taxes to be raised in next year.

The new structure, when completed will be occupied by the Wacker Stores, who will install new fixtures throughout, to have one of the most modern variety stores in West Texas. The work is expected to take from four to six weeks.

## Red Cross Is Very Active

With the importance of Red Cross aid to foreign unfortunates becoming clearer as world conditions become more chaotic, more Lamesa and Dawson County women are urged to take part in the work of this humanitarian organization.

Approximately four hundred different women of the town and county have taken part in local Red Cross work, states Mrs. Louis B. Reed, county chairman, but there are still many who have not, and are now urged to come to the Legion Hall for either sewing or knitting. The hall is open on each Tuesday and Saturday.

Some 1,666 yards of materials have been received at the local Red Cross headquarters, and must be made into garments and be ready for shipment by May 31, Mrs. Reed stated. All materials comes in the bolts and must be cut into the different garments made. Also in this shipment is enough wool yarn for the knitting of 56 sweaters and the crocheting of 10 shawls.

This amount of material is the second such shipment received in this county, the first being completed and returned on January 31. The number of yards mentioned above will give the public an idea of the number of garments the lo-

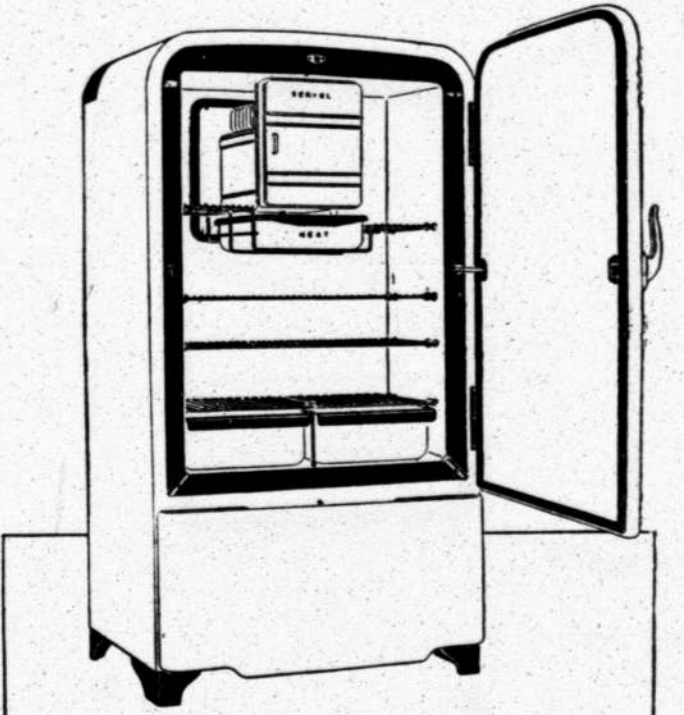

## Predatory And Rodent Control By Service Experts

This week April 14-19 the nation celebrates National Wildlife Restoration Week, sponsored by the National Wildlife Service.

Predatory and Rodent Control work in the Panhandle District of Texas is carried on by Mr. E. G. Pope of Lubbock. In addition to conducting or aiding in cooperative rat-killing campaigns, employees of the Service's Division of Predator and Rodent Control aid in operations for control of other animals that are injurious.

"Coyotes cause one of the biggest problems," Pope said, "because they are responsible for a greater total loss to livestock and poultry than all other predators combined." The coyote population has markedly increased in the last ten years in many sections of the West, he added, and the species is becoming established in the East.

Most of the eastern infiltration is due to tourists who bring coyote puppies home for pets and then release or lose them. "The Service does not engage in control of predators in all areas," Pope further stated, "In harmony with the established policy of the Department, predatory-animal control projects are for the protection of livestock, poultry and game are conducted only in areas where investigations prove that there is a pressing need for control."

Last year 14,191 coyotes were taken in Texas. Other predators in Texas taken included 2,086 Lynx-Bobcats, 847 wolves and 18 mountain lions.

Funds for this work are provided in part by the Federal Government and in part by cooperating States counties, livestock associations and others. Last year cooperating agencies contributed more than \$1,500,000.00 for predator and rodent control operations.

Rodents of all kinds affect the economic and health conditions in a community. In the West the ground squirrels, prairie dogs and jack-rabbits play havoc with the farm crops and grazing land, and at the same time may be carriers of communicable diseases. In the East field mice inflict great damage to orchard trees and nursery stocks. To reduce damage to crops and the spread of disease, rodent con-

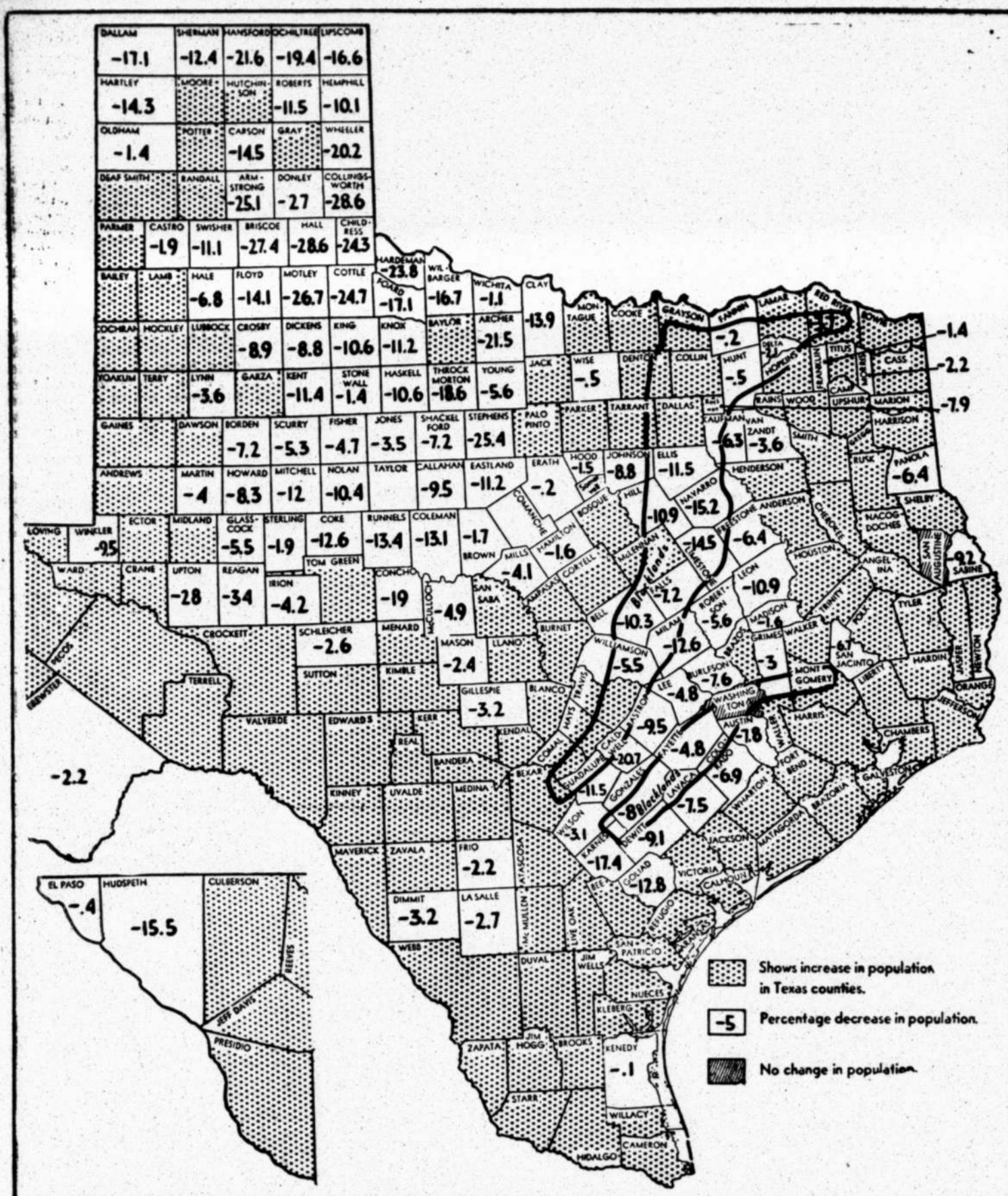

### Texas Population Shifts Depicted In New Map

What happened to agriculture during the 1930-40 decade is revealed by census bureau reports on the rural and farm population. Texas in 1940 had 418,000 farms, 77,600 less than in 1930 and 83,000 less than in 1935. But the actual area in farms increased from 124,707,130 to 127,733,372 acres in 1940. At least part of this change was attributed to increased farm mechanization.

Just how much increase or decrease in the farm population took place during the decade cannot be shown accurately at present, but

### S. C. S. Notes

More acres of cultivated land in Dawson County will be strip cropped this year than ever before, according to George D. Keathley, Camp Superintendent of the Lamesa C. C. Camp. Along with contour farming and terracing, strip cropping is one of the most widely used erosion control practices in the county on cultivated lands, he says.

Strip crops practically always should be planted on the contour. The growing of strips of erosion resistant crops in alternation with strips of erosion permitting crops is not a complete method of erosion control in itself, but when used

with other soil holding practices, however, strip cropping is economical and effective in conserving soil.

The practice of contour strip cropping is especially well fitted for use with terraces and contour farming and works well with crop rotation and the use of cover crops. On most farms where strip cropping is used as a method of erosion control, the crops grown in the erosion resistant strips are harvested for feed. This makes the strips serve a dual purpose of feed production and soil conservation.

The sorghums, such as Sudan grass, kafir, broom corn and cane, when thickly planted, are among the best erosion resistant crops in areas where soil plowing is a problem. On sloping fields where soil erosion is the principal problem,

drilled sorghum, small grains, and other down crops are the best erosion resisting practices.

The production of feed on the strips planted to erosion resistant crops has added to the popularity of this method of erosion control. Feed crops must be grown somewhere, farmers reason, and there is no objection to growing them where they can conserve soil.

Due to the lack of heavy equipment for terracing, many farmers are forced to postpone terracing another year, however, they plan on planting a sorghum strip on the terrace line which will permit them to get an early start on their terrace construction next fall.

### FEED TO PLANT FOR SILAGE

"What kind of feed should I plant for the purpose of filling my trench silo?" is the question that is uppermost in the minds of a large number of farmers of Dawson County at this time. These farmers realize that the trench silo will give them a service that no other farm practice can give.

They know that (1) one acre of feed in a silo is equal to 1 1/2 acres in a stack, (2) that this feed cannot be damaged by weevils, rats or weather, and (3) that feed stored in a silo will keep indefinitely, and always be a succulent feed. What to plant to put in this silo is a big problem.

The best rule one can use in answering this question is to "multiply the average yield in tons of any given feed by the value of that feed per ton". For example: Corn is worth \$5.00 per ton. Multiply the average yield per acre in tons by this value. If your corn crop will yield you 4 tons of silage per acre, then you will be harvesting \$20.00 worth of silage per acre. If your cane will yield 7 tons per acre, multiply 7 tons by \$4.00, the value of cane silage, and you will harvest \$28.00 worth of silage per acre.

Values placed on the different crops per ton are as follows:  
 Corn \$5.00; Redtop Cane \$4.00; Maize \$4.50; Amber Cane \$4.00; Kafir \$4.50; African Millet \$4.00; Hegari \$4.50; Sudan \$3.50.

Sweet sorghums, such as redtop, seeded ribbon cane, amber, african millet, etc., will yield more tons per acre than either the grain sorghum or corn. Therefore it will pay the producer to plant sweet sorghum for silage, if his tonnage times the value is greater.

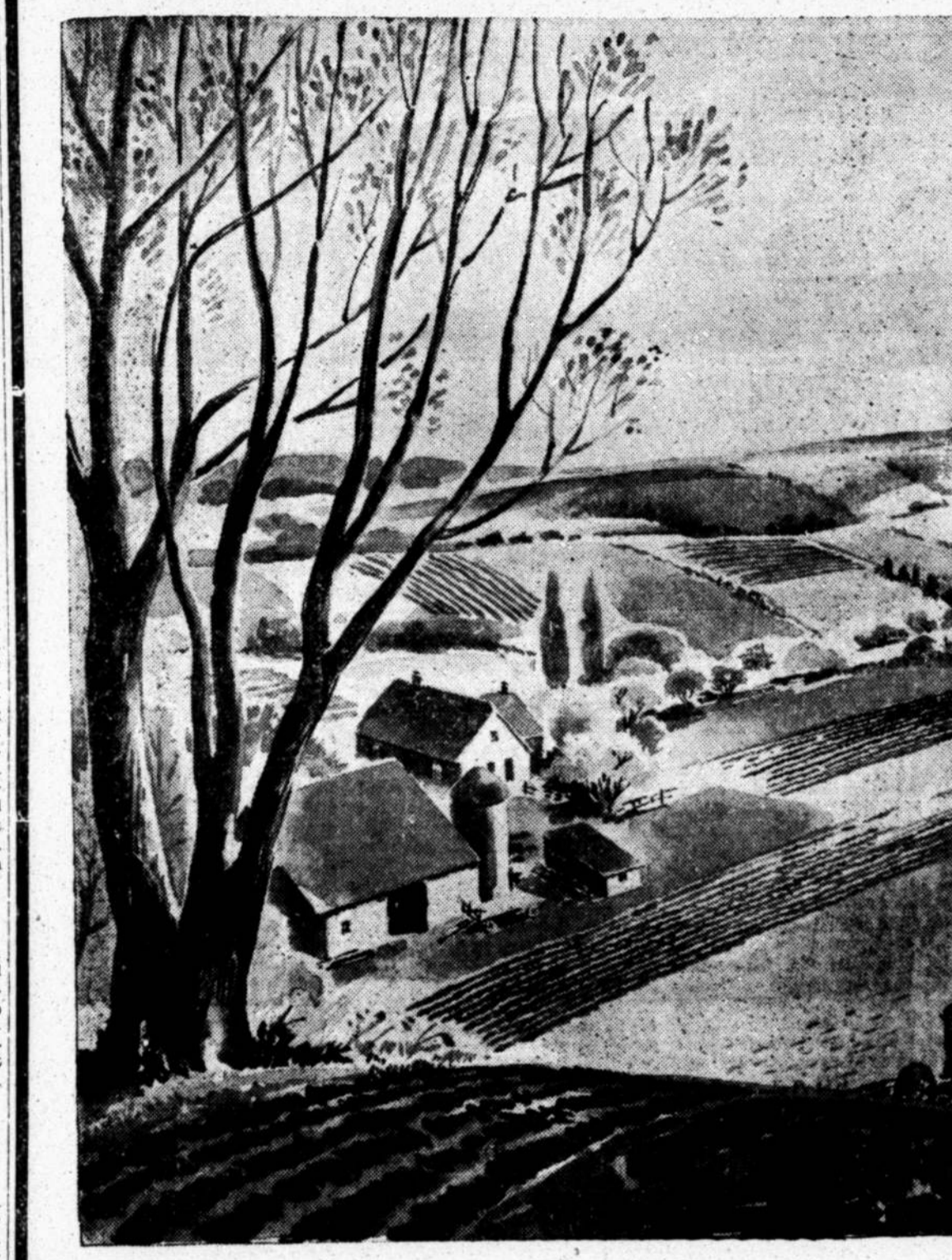

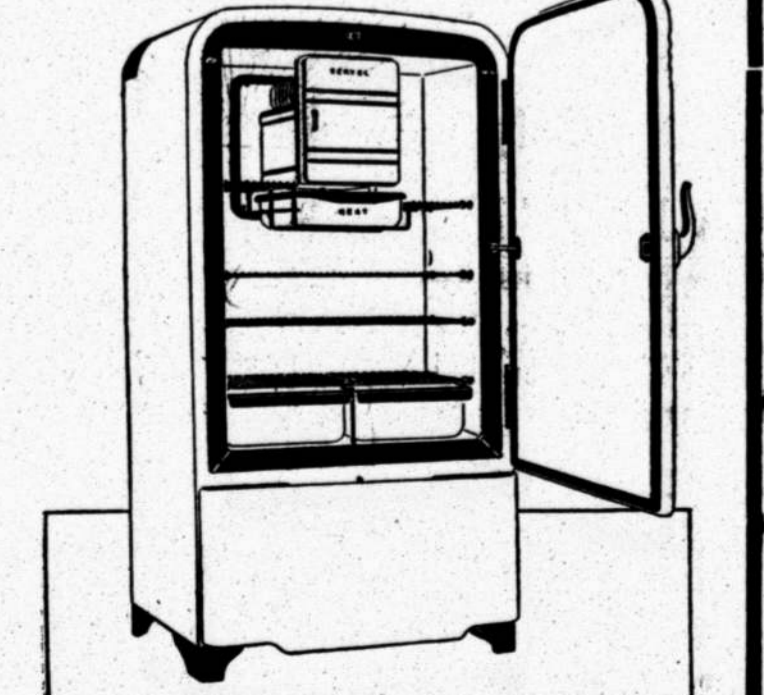
