Northwestern Student
Is Near Death in
Hospital

FENDER SCRAPE SOLE CAUSE

Victim and Brother
Were Celebrating
Victory

CHICAGO, Nov. 12.—(P)—Gunsman's bullets, hot-headed answer to a minor automobile accident, had left John Acher, Northwestern university football player, paralyzed and near death today.

In gangland, police sought an explanation of the quick-trigger tactic which ended a private celebration of Northwestern's 7-6 victory over Purdue.

From a hospital bed, where he lay crippled for life—if he lives—Young Acher told his story.

He had played fullback in the final quarter of the Purdue game, and had gone to a hotel party to celebrate with his 16-year-old brother, Chester, a student in Missouri Military Academy, he had borrowed a car.

They visited several night clubs and were returning home when their car scraped fenders with a passing sedan. A moment later the larger car overtook them. One of its occupants, waving a revolver, stood on the running board, and ordered Acher to leave his car. Acher slumped to the ground as two bullets struck him, one, severing his spinal cord.

The sedan sped away through the loop and eluded police who gave chase. Commissioner of police stated the shooting was "undoubtedly the work of gangsters."

The younger boy had come to Chicago to play with his school's team against Morgan Park Military Academy.

Claude Woman and Grand-daughter Are Injured Sunday

Mrs. J. F. Hukell and granddaughter, Phyllis Hukell, of Claude are in Pampa hospital with injuries received when their car turned over on the Clarendon road yesterday morning.

They were rushed to the hospital by a passing car. It was found Mrs. Hukell was suffering from three broken ribs and severe lacerations about the face. Phyllis Hukell received cuts about the hands and arms from flying glass. The car apparently turned over when it struck some loose dirt on the road.

O. D. Russell Is Ill at Denver

Word was received here this morning that O. D. Russell, a resident of Pampa for the last year, is in the Fritz Maurice Military hospital at Denver suffering from leakage of the heart. Mr. and Mrs. Russell and family left here three months ago for Los Angeles and were on their way back when Mr. Russell was taken seriously ill.

Mr. Russell was a popular member of the American Legion and 40 and 8 Mrs. Ina Moseley of Amarillo visited her brothers, G. C. Malone and Porter Malone, during the week-end.

IDEA OF FORCE AS MEANS OF SETTLING WORLD PROBLEMS IS PASSING, DR. HORN DECLARES

"Our hope of outlawing war lies in the substitution of love for hatred, selfishness for greed, persuasion for force, knowledge for misunderstanding, and conservation for waste," declared Dr. Paul W. Horn, president of Texas Technological college, in addressing the union Armistice Day services at the Methodist church yesterday.

Dr. Horn pointed out the causes of war and showed how they were contrary to the teachings of Christ, and generalized with the assertion that "any agency which tends to make men hate each other is bad, and any that tends to make men love each other is good."

He said that the idea that anything can be settled by force is erroneous. He pointed out that force in the home, the school, the church, and in government is being done away with in the substitution of better methods. The value of knowing what other countries are doing and thinking was shown in connection with the assertion that "we fight people because we do not really know them."

He sharply criticized teachers who teach the Revolution as a way to make the pupils hate the British, the Civil War so as to perpetuate prejudices, and the Mexican wars as a manner to create enmity with the neighboring country.

In praising the service of the veteran seated in a special section immediately in front of him, Dr. Horn said the war set a new standard of giving that should be maintained.

In detailing work of agencies working effectively for the prevention of destructive wars, Dr. Horn mentioned the church, schools, luncheon clubs, women's organizations, and the American Legion.

The service was opened with an organ selection by Mrs. F. L. Elliott. The Rev. James Todd, Jr., led in prayer; and the Rev. D. H. Truhitt read from the Scriptures. The Lions club quartet, composed of T. A. Fannell, R. B. Fisher, Olin E. Hinkle, and Roy McMillen, sang a patriotic selection "God Save America."

The orchestra directed by Prof. Fannell, with Mrs. Fannell at the piano joined the massed choir in providing special music for the occasion.

Following the service, Dr. Horn was the guest at a luncheon at the New Schneider. Those in the group were Dr. Horn, the Rev. Tom W. Brabham, Commander F. M. Culbertson of the Legion post, C. E. Cary, Bonnie Rose Walter Hardin, and Olin E. Hinkle. Mr. Hardin took Dr. Horn to Crosbyton for an address last night.

PRESIDENT RAPS CRITICS IN HIS TALK SUNDAY

Says Only U. S. Benefit
in War Was
Spiritual

POSITION ONE OF PATIENCE

Not Requiring More
Than Debtors
Can Pay

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—(P)—Turning from an acknowledgment of America's obligation to those who served her in the world war to a review of American relations with Europe since the close of the great conflict, President Coolidge last night made a vigorous reply to those of the old world who have criticized the nation's traditional policy of isolation.

The chief executive spoke before an audience gathered under auspices of American Legion to celebrate the tenth anniversary of the signing of the Armistice. He lauded the services of General Pershing and Admiral Sims, detailed the economic results of the war and what he considered its "spiritual" benefits, reiterated his stand for the maintenance of adequate naval defenses and entered a fervent appeal for world peace.

Declaring the question of America's duty to Europe had received a wide discussion on both sides of the Atlantic, Mr. Coolidge asserted that America has acknowledged the existence of such duties and had tried to meet them.

"They are not all on one side, however," he said, "they are mutual. We have been reproached for lecturing Europe, but probably ours are not the only people who sometimes engage in 'ever,'" he said, "they are mutual. We have also been charged with pursuing a policy of isolation. We are not the only people either who desire to give their attention to their own affairs. It is quite evident that both of the claims can not be true. I think no informed person at home or abroad would blame us for not intervening in affairs which are peculiarly the concern of others to adjust or, when we are asked for help, for stating clearly the terms on which we are willing to respond."

Mr. Coolidge said that the American position could be "truthfully be characterized as one of patience, consideration, restraint and assistance." He declared that we had accepted a settlement of obligations not in accordance with what was due "but in accordance with the merciful principle of what our debtors could pay," that, when asked, America has given advice and for constructive purposes has given of its resources, at the same time refraining from all unsought intervention which it was thought would be ineffective.

Military Funeral Given G. Landers by Legion Post

The funeral of a soldier was given Grover B. Landers yesterday by members of the Kerley-Crossman post of the American Legion, Mr. Landers, who died of gunshot wounds Thursday night, was an ex-service man.

The funeral service was conducted by the Rev. Tom W. Brabham of the Methodist church and C. N. Melton, chaplain of the Legion post. Following the service at the Malone chapel which was attended by many veterans, the body was buried in Fairview cemetery. Pallbearers were Legionnaires. Parents of Mr. Landers were unable financially to send for the body and burial here was arranged and conducted by the Legion post.

Sufferer in Bad
Accident

TRAGEDY HITS NOTRE DAME

Young Man Dies as
Freight Strikes
Football Fans

JACKSONVILLE, Nov. 12.—(P)—Eight students of Lon Morris college were injured severely and eleven others received minor abrasions when a bus in which students were being taken to Lufkin to attend the annual Texas Methodist conference collided with another machine and overturned near Aliso yesterday.

The most seriously injured, who were brought to a hospital here, were Reagan Taylor, Pine Hill, right leg crushed; Odell Crouch, Calvert, broken collar bone; Louise Hardin, Halleville, broken left arm and injured shoulder; Delois House, Wheelock, cuts about the face; Avis Adams, Minden, Gashes on head and broken right arm; Raymond Palmer, Halleville, internal injuries; Nola Frazier, Diboll, body bruises and lacerations; and L. B. Mackrell, Coosa Creek, right knee injured.

Others of the party less severely injured were taken back to the college for treatment.

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Nov. 12.—(P)—Tragedy struck last night in the midst of jollification for the Notre Dame football team returning victorious over Army, when a freight train ran into a crowd of fans, killing John Gleason, 20, of Canandaigua, N. Y., and seriously injuring four persons. More than twenty others were hurt slightly.

Four thousand fans, had massed about the railroad station awaiting the arrival of the Notre Dame eleven, during the wait, some students dragged across one of the tracks, a baggage truck. Half a dozen girls climbed on it, to join in the cheering of the crowd.

Half an hour before the football special was due, a westbound New York Central freight train struck the baggage truck, tossed the college girls into a group of students. The front-bound handle of the truck is believed to have crushed Gleason's skull.

The four in serious condition at local hospitals are Mrs. Madeline van Hoke, 22, South Bend, Ind.; Miss Majorie Mason, 21, Eliza Green, Ind.; Paul Duncan 17, La Salle, Ill., and Robert Hurley, 17, Friendship, N. Y.

LINER IS SINKING

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—(P)—The Lamport and Holt liner Vestris reported by wireless at 11 o'clock this morning that she was sinking slowly at a point about 300 miles off Hampton Roads and that her 140 passengers and 210 seamen would have to take to the lifeboats "any minute now."

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—(P)—The Navy department today instructed Admiral H. A. Wiley, commander in chief of the United States fleet, to send immediate assistance to the Steamer Vestris, reported sinking off the Atlantic coast.

Defining War

Before we can outlaw war, we must agree on a definition of it, or, in other words, acknowledge that its place in the activity of nations is that of an outlaw.

Dr. Paul W. Horn, in his address here yesterday, placed war in its right category of greed, waste, and carnage. There is nothing fine about war itself, although the patriotism of protecting one's nation against the ravages of a foe is one of the noblest of passions.

War is an international crime, not an economic or diplomatic necessity. It has in world affairs what the rough-and-tumble of the ruffian classes has in personal life. No longer is hand-to-hand fighting considered gentlemanly. Indeed, force nowadays settles little. The automatic pistol is too easily procured for anyone to permit bullying. By common consent, recourse to law is taking the place of personal combat in everyday life. Neither in a quarrel gains if death-dealing weapons are used.

So it is becoming in world affairs. The awfulness of scientific warfare as it is envisioned for the future shows that nations, like individuals, must resort to law. Democratic government should do away with these wars brought about by ambitious monarchs who take no account of loss of life in seeking their goals.

Having defined war, the next step is by education to eliminate the narrowness, suspicions, and fears which nationalities feel toward each other. Only when baser prejudices get full play will one people wage a war of aggression against another.

Making Scouting Work

The Pampa Scout program is at a crucial stage in its development—the stage of training adult leaders. The boys are ready, a number of them are active, but what about the men of Pampa?

The idea of scouting is voluntary work on the part of both boys and men. Trained, professional scoutmasters could be employed, that that plan would be too expensive and the inspiration of contact with ordinary business men would be lost. Scouting means much in that bringing together of business or professional man and boy. Each finds common interests that affects the other. Each learns his relation to the other and, incidentally, to society.

Pampa's business and professional men are busy, but there are many of them who are devoting time to activities which give them less enjoyment and benefits than Scouting. The man who takes stock of himself and then gets into Scouting for what it is worth is usually a happy man. The plaudits of boyhood give more pleasure than the more selfish applause of adult associates.

Scouting does not demand adults who can do everything that an Eagle Scout does. Both leader and Scout learn together. If they do not know

a thing, they hunt up an authority. There is no secret about it—unless that secret is to set aside a definite amount of time and stick to the schedule. Pampa needs more adult interest in her boys.

Georgia Tech Is One of Nation's Greatest Teams

BY ALAN J. GOULD

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—(P)—National championship football aspirations have been blown about in none too gentle fashion so far but when it comes to measuring the qualifications of contenders, none stands out any more to day than Carnegie in the East, Georgia Tech in the South, Iowa and Nebraska in the Middle West.

There are others clamoring for recognition among the slim state of the unbeaten, such as Florida, Tennessee, Detroit, Ohio Wesleyan and Boston college. There are still more, such as West Virginia and now Notre Dame that have gathered fresh headway after faltering in the early stages.

Iowa and Nebraska have had close calls, one point victories which the Hawkeyes gained over Minnesota and the Cornhusker over Syracuse, but they have decisively whipped their other foes. Carnegie and Georgia Tech have been equally impressive bowling over all opposition.

Georgia Tech's Tornado, with a mighty line and one of the greatest all-around backs in the country in Warner Mizell, has just about as fine a record so far as any team in the land. It takes on added lustre through Notre Dame's thrilling victory over the hitherto unbeaten Army. Tech's forwards sheared Notre Dame a few weeks ago on Grant field. Saturday Mizell and other Tech terrors raised havoc with Vanderbilt. They take on Alabama's Crimson Tide this week at Atlanta.

Carnegie's claims to the top flight were well buttressed Saturday when the Tartans took Georgetown, another unbeaten army, into camp. And just to prove that they have no fears about staking their reputation on any field Carnegie roams out to South Bend this Saturday to mingle with the rejuvenated Notre Dame eleven.

There isn't much rest in sight, either, for Iowa and Nebraska. Ingwersen's Hawkeyes ride the "Big Ten" crest now, as a result of beating Ohio State, but they clash with Wisconsin this Saturday in another crucial contest. The only thing that mars Wisconsin's state is a tie with Purdue so that there is anything but a soft assignment in prospect for McLean, Papp and other Iowa aces.

Nebraska, with the big Six crowd about clinched, turns to intersection for the next two weeks, playing Pittsburgh this Saturday at Lincoln before coming to West Point.

The classic touch to this week's program is furnished by the Yale-Princeton affair but it won't have a great deal of bearing on the championship situation. The Elis have been bumped much harder than the Tigers. They were upset by Maryland Saturday in one of the day's outstanding reversals, on top of a previous defeat by Army. Princeton has been tied twice, by Virginia and Ohio State, but otherwise the Tigers have a clean slate.

West Virginia, which has won seven in a row after losing the opening game to Davis & Elkins, runs into Georgetown this week. Missouri comes East to play New York university and share the spotlight with such other rivals as Columbia-Pennsylvania, Cornell-Dartmouth, Colgate-Syracuse and Harvard-Holy Cross.

Tennessee must beat Vanderbilt and Florida must dispose of Clemson to keep step with Georgia Tech, assuming the Tornado is too strong for Alabama, in the southern conference race.

Southern Methodist is engaged in a hot fight to hold the southwestern conference lead, as a result of being tied by the Texas Aggies. S. M. U. plays Baylor this week, while the university of Texas tackles Texas Christian.

Utah, its winning streak upset by a tie with Oregon in a nonintercollegiate game, returns to the Rocky Mountain conference this week, favored to beat Brigham Young and keep the lead while Colorado college battles Colorado university.

Southern California, now sharing the Pacific Coast lead with California, may find a Tartan in Washington State but the Trojans will be favorites as well as California over Nevada and Stanford over Washington.

FORT WORTH, Nov. 12.—A line of fullbacks—that's what Texas Christian university has this year. While in high school, almost every one of the forwards wall was a star ball toter. All big fast boys, whom Coach Ed Kubale, line mentor, has fashioned into first class linemen.

To begin with was Captain Jake Williams. While Jake was wearing the jersey of Central High school of Fort Worth, he was one of the outstanding fullbacks in the state. Sunday's air mail brought a letter from him to his father, Milburn McCarty, Sr. of Eastland. "It does not look so good, Daddy," he wrote, predicting that Smith would carry only Massachusetts and Rhode Island in the East. He added, however, that Gov. Smith was confident of victory.

Young McCarty had an experience during the history-making campaign which doubtless will interest his grandchildren 50 years from now.

He was personal page to vice-president Charles Dawes in the United States Senate, having gone to Washington as a page after serving in that capacity in the Texas House of Representatives, when Dawes picked his personal page, he looked around for the best and decided on the Texas youth.

When the Democratic National convention came to Houston, McCarty was asked to come along to do some expert paging.

After Gov. Smith's nomination, the Democratic Headquarters in New York placed the Texas boy in charge of the reception room. It was his duty to meet the visitors and pass them into the persons they wanted to see.

When it came time for Gov. Smith to "go west" on his speaking tour he personally requested Milburn to accompany him.

Tuesday night, following the election Milburn slept in one of the rooms of Gov. Smith's suite in the Baltimore Hotel.

Like Gov. Smith, he is quitting politics, and will surrender his place in the Senate with President Hoover's inauguration, according to Milburn's father.

**Texas Ranges Are
Detoriated Lately**

DALLAS, Nov. 12.—(P)—Texas ranges have deteriorated during the past 36 days and calves lost flesh generally yet cattle have held up well, according to the resume of livestock by the bureau of agricultural economics of the United States Department of Agriculture.

Range prices have declined slightly but local demand for stocker calves continues strong, the report discloses. The fall movement of Texas cattle to markets and northern feed lots has reached its height and sheep shearing is progressing rapidly. The fall clip is of good quality.

The condition of Texas cattle Nov. 1 was 86 percent, three points less than last month and one point below average. Ranges have gone back generally, although showing improvement in some areas where late rains have revived grass and weeds. The pas-

turing of wheat has been delayed in the northwest by dry weather, which has retarded growth somewhat, but October rains were beneficial and wheat pastures are improving rapidly. Grass in some sections has not cured as well as usual but on the whole, the report says, range conditions are near normal and sufficient feed will be available for the stock on hand.

The November 1 condition of cattle was 88 per cent, slightly below last month and the average. Stock cattle have held up well but feeding has been necessary in some sections to maintain flesh on calves contracted for fall delivery.

About all steer calves and many heifer calves have been sold and are now being delivered at contract prices.

The movement is heavy Northwest and West Central states the bulk of the stock going to belt states and northern feed lots. Receipts of cattle and calves at Fort Worth stockyards during October were 138,105 compared with 147,333 during Oct. 1927.

W. T. C. C. Eager to Help Cities Solve Aviation Problems

STAMFORD, Nov. 12.—A letter sent
from the West Texas Chamber of
Commerce headquarters here to all
Secretaries of member chambers of
Commerce and Unit Directors, by
President A. M. Bourland, and Man-
ager Homer D. Wade, urged them to
co-operate with their communities in
realizing the advantage of aviation.

One of the reasons for this act on
the part of the heads of the regional
organization is the development that
is sure to take place in aviation in
West Texas since the purchase of the
Texas Air Transport Company by a
group of financiers, headed by A. P.
Barrett of Fort Worth.

This company expects to have a net
work of air plane routes in all of Tex-
as, and particularly in West Texas.

The letter calls attention to the
fact that the Aeronautics Branch of
the Department of Commerce, at
Washington D. C. puts out several bul-

mercial aviation, and new methods of
transportation.

sions Field rules; and Information
Bulletin No. 36-Air Port Rating Regu-
lations.

ed direct from the Aeronautics Branch
of the Department of Commerce or by
writing the Congressman, or Senators
Morris Sheppard, or Earle B. May-
field.

War Veteran Is Killed in Plane

POCATELLO, Ida., Nov. 12.—(P)—
Ten years after the end of the world
war, Harry McDougall, 33, Boise as-
sistant attorney general and World
War ace, met death here yesterday
when a plane which he piloted in air
Armistice Day air circus crashed. Miss
Elda Rice, 20, his sister-in-law, also
was killed in the fall of the monoplane
which went into a tail spin at 150
feet.

McDougall was credited with bring-
ing down more than five enemy air-
planes during the war. He was decorat-
ed with the distinguished service
cross and the Croix de Guerre.

"Maryland" to Take Hoover to South America

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Calif., 12
—(P)—Final orders have been received
from Washington by the commanding
officer of the Battleship Maryland to
take Herbert Hoover to South Amer-
ica, sailing from a Southern California
port not earlier than next Monday.

The latest word here today was that
the president-elect would board the
ship at San Pedro, the port for Los
Angeles, on November 20, sailing on
the same day, and arriving at Balboa
at the Pacific entrance to the Panama
canal, about five days later.

After the inspection of the canal, the
ship will continue on to the first port
of call in South America, yet to be de-
termined. The Maryland, one of the
largest and newest of the navy's battle-
ships and regarded as an extraordi-
narily steady craft in rough weather,
was placed in dry dock today at Hun-
ters' Island in San Francisco bay, to
be conditioned for the voyage which
will take as far south as Valparaiso,
Chile.

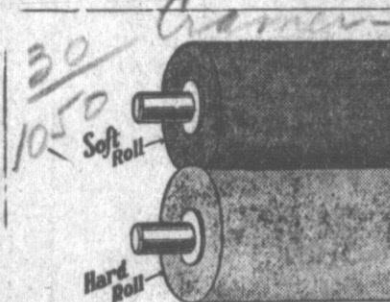

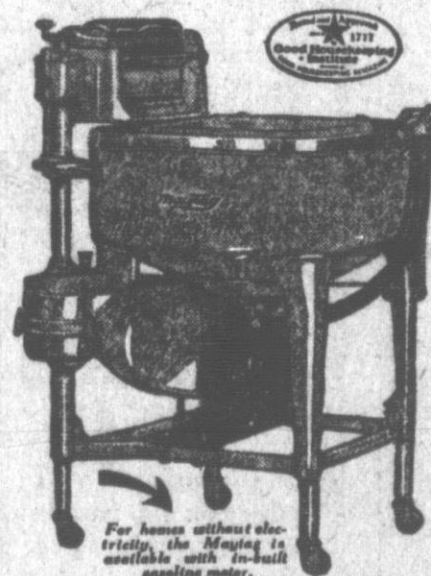
