LOCAL FARMERS AND BUSINESS MEN GET EXTENSION MEETING

R. J. COOK APPOINTED GENERAL EXECUTIVE CHAIRMAN; PROGRAM WILL BE ANNOUNCED LATER; TO BE IN HIGH SCHOOL AUDITORIUM

Negotiations that have been carried on by local farmers and business men with the Agricultural Extension Department of the International Harvester Company have been successful, and as the result a series of short course meetings in agriculture, horticulture, gardening and home economics will be held here on Monday and Tuesday, March 12-13.

Mr. F. J. Wolfe of the Harvester company was here Wednesday to outline the general plan of the short course and to render all assistance possible in making the preliminary arrangements. R. J. Cook has been appointed as general executive chairman to direct the arrangements for the two day course which will be held in the school auditorium.

The only purpose of the meetings will be to discuss, from a purely educational standpoint, important problems of the farm and home. Wherever they have been held, these meetings have been exceedingly helpful and inspiring to both farm folks and town folks.

The extension department of the Harvester company constantly maintains a large force of experienced people who give all their time and efforts to instructive and helpful work among as large a number of people as they can reach in the hope of increasing prosperity on the farm, improving the general health of the people, making the work of the housewife easier and helping boys and girls to accomplish worthwhile achievements.

So successful has this work been during the past ten or twelve years that there is a constant and increasing demand for their short course meetings. So numerous are these requests that only a few in this state can be accommodated this year, and this community is indeed fortunate in securing these meetings.

Full details of the short course have not yet been worked out and cannot be announced until later, but it can be stated that a crew of speakers and demonstrators—all men and women of exceptional ability—will be sent here to conduct the meetings, which will be virtually a farmers' and housewives' chatua. Much also will be provided that will be of great interest and help to the children. Large charts and many motion pictures will be used to illustrate the lectures.

Every meeting will be for everybody—men, women and children; farm folks and town folks—and everybody will be royally welcomed every session. No admission charge of any kind will be made. Watch for program and full particulars.

DAIRY MEETING A BIG SUCCESS

FIFTY FARMERS INTERESTED IN INTRODUCING BETTER DAIRY STOCK IN COUNTY

Fifty farmers were present at the dairy meeting called last Saturday by County Agent G. R. Sheets for the purpose of discussing the advisability of shipping in better dairy stock, twenty-two of them signifying their desire for some of the cows.

The meeting was called to see if there were enough farmers in the county interested in the move to organize a dairy association and the results of the first meeting were more than satisfactory.

When asked what breed of stock they wished to get, twelve signified that they wanted the milking Shorthorn, eight desired Jersey stock and two wanted Holstein. Steps are being taken to obtain data as to where good cows can be obtained and as soon as this is done, a trip will be organized and the farmers wishing to buy will be taken to see the stock and to make their own selections.

Action was also taken toward the formation of a co-operative bull association, all present favoring the plan of forming community clubs and obtaining a registered merit bull for breeding purposes.

the wettest summers in the history of this section of the Panhandle. After receiving 14.43 inches of moisture during the three months, June, July and August, and receiving a fall of 1.46 inches on September 18, this territory went nearly five months without an appreciable fall of moisture.

No moisture was received between September 18 and the close of the month. October showed only .27 of an inch for the month. November's recording of only .08 was the lightest month of the entire year 1927. A light snow in December supplied only .17 of an inch. January's recording was .00, indicating only a trace of moisture from two light dews, not even enough to record in the government gauge.

The rain started in Perryton about 8:15 o'clock, Sunday evening with intermittent showers until after noon on Monday. Reports from over the county indicate that the fall to the northwest, the west, and the southwest was even heavier than in Perryton.

W. G. Yeary of the New Hope community in the northwest part of the county reports a much heavier fall than was received in Perryton. B. L. Barnes, Waka, and B. L. Rogers, Farnsworth, both report heavier rainfall. W. M. Sharder, southwest of old Ochiltree, also reports a heavy fall.

While the heavy fall was not general over the entire Panhandle, yet the whole of the Perryton trade territory received at least an inch or better. Amarillo reported only .18 of an inch.

But in our finite world every individual, whether it is a rock or a tree or an ant, is so built that he

International Sunday School Lesson

Jesus Pictures the Kingdom of God
Text: Mark 1:14-15; 4:1-34

John the Baptist heralded far and near the truth that "the kingdom of heaven was at hand" (Mt. 3:2). Now that John was in prison, Jesus Himself came with the announcement: "The kingdom of God is at hand: repent ye and believe the Gospel" (Mt. 1:14-15).

Attempts to distinguish between the "kingdom of heaven" and the "kingdom of God" only bring confusion. Some would have it that the "kingdom of heaven" means the Messianic earth rule of Christ as the Son of David, but they find themselves in difficulties with the parables of "the kingdom of heaven," all of which clearly describe results of the presence of the Gospel in the world during this present church age. There is, we believe, a little difference between "kingdom of God" and "kingdom of heaven" as there is between the "kingdom of King George" and the "kingdom of Great Britain."

The proclamation of the kingdom of heaven (or "of God," as Mark calls it) was nothing short of the declaration of God's purpose, as determined from the foundation of the world, to introduce into this world a kingdom of heavenly character and spiritual power among men. In connection with this proclamation, we discover no hint of political independence for the Jews, and our Lord's every word is absolutely consistent with the idea that He came for earthly conquest or dominion. He came as the Lamb, not the "Lion of the tribe of Judah."

The kingdom Jesus proclaimed just at hand, in the days preceding His atoning sacrifice was, we believe, the rule of God through His risen Son, present wherever will bow to Him, but future as to its complete realization in the heavens, from whence it comes, and to which, like its King, it belongs even while on earth.

The parables of the kingdom in chapter 4 reveal the nature of the kingdom and the manner of its disciples on one side of Him, and a powerful band of religious leaders opposing Him, on the other, our Lord altered His method of teaching and "taught them many things by parables" (4:2).

He begins with the word "hearken" (v. 3) and repeatedly says: "He that hath ears to hear, let him hear" (v. 9). Here, then, is something worth thinking upon seriously.

"A sower went out to sow." Some of his seed falls by the wayside, some upon stony ground, some among thorns and some on good ground. Perhaps we may find a dispensational application here. Does not the wayside sowing suggest the patriarchal age, when the world was hardened and results were scarce? The stony ground sowing seems suggestive of the age of law, when Israel quickly received, but lacked soil (Ex. 24:7). The thorny ground sowing reminds us

of the Gospel age, when the Bible is widely exploited, but choked. The good ground surely suggests the kingdom age to follow, when there shall be great fruitfulness.

There is also a direct application, for in this present age we can find the four classes of soil mentioned: Trampled soil (v. 4); stony soil (v. 5); preoccupied soil (v. 7, and prepared soil (v. 8). Jesus clearly interprets His parable in vs. 14-20. Here we have the main points:

The seed—the Word. We need not expect spiritual growth from any other kind of seed. "Satan comes immediately and taketh it away" (v. 15). Unless we turn gospel facts into factors in our lives immediately, we will lose out. Satan's best energies are centered upon keeping truth from finding lodgment.

Stony ground hearers are those who mistake feelings for faith. They have no depth and cannot stand a scorching sun (v. 6). A little affliction or persecution, and they discover that their emotional spasms were only the results of a temporary admiration, not a real attachment.

Some soil is too far preoccupied to produce a crop (v. 7). The word is "choked" by "the deceitfulness of riches and the lusts of other things" (v. 19). Some seem to think they can be Christians and revel in the things of the world. The worldly weeds are the fast growers and need no cultivation. Just permit them to exist and, ere long, you'll find nothing else.

Notice that there are different degrees of fertility even in good ground (cf. Jn. 15:3, 5, 8). How limited is the soil in these days that brings forth sixty or a hundred fold (v. 20).

The parable of the candle follows (vs. 21-25). We are candles—movable light (not stationary chandeliers). It may produce a small light; it may be of short duration; it may easily flicker; but it is to be kept burning and kept moving. Some would hide their light under the "bushel" of commercial life and the cares of material things. Others hide their light under the "bed" of ease and comfort.

Verse 22 throws great light upon the difficult statements of vs. 11-12. His truth was hidden in parables, but it was so hidden that it might be clearly brought to light at last. "There is nothing hid which shall not be manifested." The mysteries of the kingdom were not permanent mysteries, but secrets that "should come abroad" shortly.

Let us not lightly pass over the warning: "He that hath, to him shall be given; and he that hath not, from him shall be taken even that which he hath" (v. 25). It is the old principle: "Nothing succeeds like success." Use or lose. We are told that the fishes in Mammoth Cave have lost the use of their eyes, not having any use for them. The intellectual and moral eyes, like the physical, become useless. Those who do not care to see it, the truth, lose the power to see it. Trifle not with truth. Act upon it. This is the honest thing to do, and

the only safe thing.

The parable of the unconscious growth (vs. 26-29) is one often neglected, because at first glance it seems like some other parable. But there is a vital difference, and it supplies an important link in truth. It is a needful companion to that of the tares and wheat (Mt. 13:24-30). It lays stress on the other side.

Will the tares outdo everything? Will the Gospel be a flat failure? Jesus pictures here the growth and ripening of the true wheat under the spontaneous action of the earth and sun, in spite of the enemies. The seed will not run out. "The earth bringeth forth fruit of herself" (v. 28). We may become discouraged in our seed-sowing, but let us be reminded that there are unseen agencies whose unhindered actions determine the maturing of His crop from beginning to end. Our part is to sow. God also takes a hand—do not forget that! The seed grows; the "sower knoweth not how" (v. 27).

The farmer's occupation is one, above all others, that calls for trust in divine providence. He cannot sit and watch his seed. He must go about his work trusting. He has done his best to prepare the soil. He has used the right kind of seed. God must do the rest. So it is with spiritual sowing. The Spirit carries on conviction through the Word, while the preacher sleeps. "God giveth the increase" (1 Cor. 3:6-7). "Sow in the morn thy seed."

At eve hold not thine hand; To doubt and fear, give thou no heed.

Broadcast it o'er the land. Thou canst not toil in vain; Cold, heat, and moist and dry, Shall foster and mature the grain For garner in the sky."

Again God's kingdom is compared to a grain of mustard seed in its beginnings (vs. 30-34). An abnormal growth is here depicted, for "it becometh greater than herbs and shooteth out great branches so that the fowls of the air may lodge under the shadow of it." This parable cannot be interpreted in contradiction to any of the others. This does not picture world conversion in this age.

Believers are not birds lodging in branches but "branches in the

vine" (Jn. 15). Their life is in the tree itself. Perhaps Mt. 13:4, 19 or Rev. 18:2 may give us a hint as to these lodgers in the last days. When the winds of judgment begin to blow, these birds will fly away. Are you a branch or just a bird?

The parable of the leaven shows us that the great outward growth of the church is to be followed by a sad inward corruption (Mt. 13:31-34). Days of widespread apostasy are upon us. Let us examine ourselves whether we are in the Faith.

PITH AND POINT

Some of the seed sown from modern pulpits is "barnard wheat" and will never make bread.

The devil doesn't let the grass grow under his feet (v. 15). Turn new truth into practice at once, or it will not be long with you (v. 15).

God's seed is safe only when it is buried.

A puff of wind sets shallow waters in a turmoil. The easily offended ones are the shallow ones (v. 17).

"All the troubles of a true Christian do but wash him nearer the shores of heaven."—Spurgeon.

A Christian can live in the world, but not in worldliness. A fish can live in water, but not in a water-main (v. 19).

The rash exposure of the intellect to that which we know is contrary to God's Word, is a dangerous practice (v. 24).

SUGGESTIVE QUESTIONS

Is profession of Christ enough to procure one an entrance into the kingdom of God? (Mt. 7:21).

What is the great condition of entrance into the kingdom Jesus announced at hand? (Jn. 3:3).

What is one of the first things involved in entering His kingdom? (Mt. 5:3; Mk. 10:15).

What is the key that unlocks this kingdom to us? (Col. 1:13-14).

Is the "kingdom of heaven" now in process of completion? (Mt. 22:1-14).

To whom were the keys of this kingdom given, and when did he use them? (Mt. 16:19).

If Peter used "the keys of the kingdom of heaven" at Pentecost in opening the door of gospel opportunity to the Jews, and later at

the house of Cornelius in formally receiving the Gentiles into the church, what would this prove as to our Lord's statement: "The kingdom is at hand?"

GOLDEN TEXT ILLUSTRATION

Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done in earth, as it is in heaven (Mt. 6:10).

Why should I give money to save the heathen abroad, when there are so many unsaved at home? Why should I give money to spread God's kingdom in other states when it is badly needed in my own? Why should I contribute to work in the slums when money is needed in my

own church? Why give to work in my own church, when my own family wants money? Why give to those in my own family when I want the money myself? And the answer! Because I am a Christian and desire all men everywhere to belong to God's kingdom. My prayer "Thy kingdom come" is mere mockery, if I am not willing to back it up with my service and my means.

Many Awards Offered

Local High School Girls Have The Chance to Win Scholarship And Cash Prizes

Knowledge of cooking, food values, selection as to quality, or other phases of the subject of meat, may bring local high school girls within reach of a university scholarship or cash award if they can transfer this knowledge to paper.

High school home economics teachers have just received formal announcement of the fifth national meat story contest. The contest is held annually in high schools of the United States under the sponsorship of the national live stock and meat board. It has the endorsement of college home economics heads and other leaders in the field who look upon it as a valuable educational project.

Interest in the contest has increased each year, it is said. Last year approximately 14,000 girls from high schools in every state of the union competed and the board expects that even a larger number will be enrolled in the present contest. As in the past, the distribution of prizes is arranged so that girls in every state will be among the winners. Miss Rose Gertrude Schmidt, Moorestown, N. J. won the national championship last year.

The present contest will close on March 15, according to the announcement. Judging of the stories will be in the hands of a committee which is to be selected from college directors of home economics and other authorities on the subject.

It is explained that the purpose of the contest is to stimulate more interest in the study of home economics. The scholarships offered are for home economics courses. These and the cash prizes furnish an incentive for the future housewife to take part in the event which, it is hoped, will better fit her to assume the responsibilities of home manager.

THE GENERAL WELFARE

While the farmer and the town man are probably closer today than ever before, the bond between them can never be cemented too firmly. One of the great world issues of the day is the promotion of international understanding and good will. It is a laudable undertaking, but good will, like charity, should begin at home. And it has.

This country has many a diplomat who has never been abroad. In the smaller cities and in the rural communities these men—and women—have been busy promoting understanding and good will between the farmer and the town man. Their fame may never be spread abroad in the land but they are content to let their good deeds speak for themselves.

This community has its share of such workers for good will but it needs more of them. The permanent prosperity of this community and of the nation in general depends up co-operation between farmers and town men. Both have much to contribute to the other.

The town man needs to know more about the problems that confront the farmer, and the farmer more about the tasks facing the town man. The farmer and the merchant for example, are working toward the same end, after all, but too often they seem not to realize it. By striving to reach a common understanding each has an opportunity to be as great an ambassador of good will in his sphere as Lindbergh in his.

additional charge for the gas used for any purpose equal to one-tenth (1-9) of the bill rendered. And in case said consumer shall make application to have services re-established and gas re-connected with his premises, he shall be required to pay all delinquent bills, together with the penalty thereto, and to pay a cut-on charge not to exceed \$1.50 for domestic use and \$2.50 for industrial use. It is further provided that the grantee shall be allowed to make a minimum charge of Three Dollars (\$3.00) per meter per month.

All gas furnished or supplied by grantee shall be metered and for this purpose grantee shall, at its own cost and expense, provide and install for each consumer a good and accurate meter of standard make. Grantee shall also provide and maintain at its proper cost and expense, facilities for testing gas meters and said grantee shall also provide and maintain, at its proper cost and expense, a standard meter of British thermal units or high-cubic-foot capacity, equipped with suitable thermometers and other necessary accessories, which shall be maintained in the accepted standard of accuracy, all to be to the satisfaction and approval of the City Council.

Such meters shall be and remain the property of the said grantee, and the grantee shall have right to require the customer or consumer to deposit with it a sum equal to the maximum monthly bill of the consumer, provided, however, that no deposit shall be in a less sum than \$10.00 for domestic meter, and \$10.00 for industrial meter.

Section 5.

The natural gas to be furnished hereunder shall be at all times kept to a standard of eight hundred British thermal units per cubic foot at the point of consumption, at a temperature of thirty-two degrees Fahrenheit, or zero centigrade; and to determine whether the gas supplied is of the heating value above specified, the City of Perryton, Texas, may have tests made by a competent analyst under recognized and scientific processes, according to the approved method of making such tests, and said tests shall be from samples of gas collected from the grantee's mains at any point or points within the City. If the result of such tests shall show that during a month the daily average of gas supplied was below eight hundred British thermal heat units, then there shall be deducted from the customer's bills for gas during such month a proportionate amount based upon the deficiency below said eight hundred British thermal heat units. In any month when such tests are being made the City shall advise the grantee of the results of each test within reasonable time after it is made, and the official report of such analyst, of which said grantee is so advised, shall be taken and accepted as the agreed prima facie evidence of the heating value of the gas furnished during such month and thereafter until a different result is determined or ascertained in a similar manner; said grantee shall furnish gas to consumers at pressure of not less than eight ounces nor greater than eight ounces, measured at the consumer's meters outlet.

Said grantee shall supply and install not less than one and as many as may be required for each self-registering pressure and gas gauge capable of recording the pressure of the gas, in the mains at points in the City designated by the City Council, for the purpose of self-registering pressure gauges shall be placed at a station which, in the opinion of the City Council, fairly represents the pressure of adjacent territory; and such station shall be securely enclosed under a lock, and duplicate keys to said station shall be retained by the City Manager, or some officer authorized by the City Council, and such self-registering pressure gauges shall be equipped with removable recording dials to record the pressure, and the said City Manager, or some representative authorized by the City Council shall remove or cause to be removed from the said pressure gauge the pressure records of the preceding period, and provide the gauge with recording blanks for the next period during which such record is desired to be entered in the books of the City; and each record taken from such pressure gauge shall be filed in the office of the City Secretary of the City of Perryton, Texas, and a record thereafter be entered in the books of the City by the said City Secretary and the said City Manager or some representative authorized by said City Council shall keep self-registering dials in said pressure gauge continuously for a month or as often as is required by the City Council, and the said gauge record and the said book record shall each

competent and prima facie proof of the pressure at the point at which record was made at the time as shown by said gauge record.

Each consumer of gas shall install and maintain suitable piping within his property lines and suitable appliances and fixtures, except meters, subject to the approval of the City Council, or such supervisor, inspector or other representative as may be authorized by said City Council, to pass upon the same.

Section 6.

The City reserves the right to lay and permit to be laid electric conduits, water and other pipe lines or cables, and to do and permit to be done, any underground work that may be deemed necessary or proper by the City Council, in, across, alongside or under any street, alley, highway or other public place occupied by the grantee; and whenever, by reason of changes in the grade of any streets, or in the location, or in the manner of constructing any of the pipes, electric conduits or other underground structure, it shall be deemed necessary by the City Council, to alter, change, adapt or conform gas mains and service pipes of grantee, such alterations or changes shall be made by the grantee when ordered in writing by the City Council so authorized to act, without any claim for reimbursement for damages against the City; said grantee shall indemnify and save harmless the City of Perryton, Texas, from any and all claims for injury or damages to persons or property occasioned by any arising out of the construction, maintenance, operation or repair of said grantee's transmission, transportation and distributing system, and by the conduct of the business in the City.

Section 7.

The right to use the streets, alleys, highways or other public ways or places of the City of Perryton, Texas, through which all gas is distributed to the City, shall be subject to the following restrictions, limitations and conditions, viz: That in building additional mains or lines of pipe, said grantee shall build and construct the same along and under the alley-ways where alleys exist, rather than along and under streets, and shall only use the streets for same insofar as may be necessary in connecting from one alley to another; and said mains and pipe line shall be placed below the surface of the street or alley and so as to protect all paving, wire cables, water pipes, and other underground utilities, and shall be so constructed and located with reference to water lines and sewer mains as not to interfere therewith, and under the direction and to the satisfaction of the City Council or the City Engineer.

Section 8.

That the City Council hereby reserves the right to install at the point where said grantee receives its gas for distribution in the City of Perryton, Texas, a pressure gauge for distribution to the City of Perryton, Texas, if the said inhabitants shall be passed, an adequate self-registering pressure gauge adequate to record the amount of gas distributed to the City of Perryton, Texas, and the pressure at which same was received by the grantee.

Said grantee shall also supply and install one distant pressure gauge under the section of the City Council and under the designation by the City Council which will indicate the pressure at such designated point, said gauge to be placed in the City Hall in the office of the City Engineer.

Section 9.

That after the said gas distribution system shall have been fully constructed, equipped, and in operation as herein provided in the City of Perryton, Texas, if the said grantee shall then fail to substantially comply with the conditions of this franchise, the City of Perryton, Texas, shall have the right by ordinance duly passed therefor to forfeit all the rights and franchises herein granted to the said grantee, provided that the City of Perryton, Texas, shall give the said grantee its successors and assigns, sixty (60) days notice in writing, specifying the conditions claimed to have been violated, and giving full and fair opportunity to be heard; hereon before declaring such forfeiture, such notice shall fairly and fully set out all of the conditions claimed and complained of and shall be given by the said City and shall be signed by the City Secretary under the seal of said City; after having been properly authorized by the Mayor and City Council of the said City; provided, however, that the said grantee shall have sixty (60) days after receiving such notice in which to rectify and correct such violations and to substantially comply with the terms and conditions of the ordinance.

is; should the violations of this ordinance so complained of not have been rectified and corrected and the terms and conditions of this ordinance fully complied with at the end of said sixty (60) days, then and in that event the City shall have the power to forfeit this franchise on account of the violations specified in said notice. That in case of forfeiture as herein provided, the City of Perryton, Texas, reserves the right to purchase the distributing plant of the grantee at its fair appraised value or to allow the grantee to remove same within one year from the date of such forfeiture, provided that before any of said property may be removed, the grantee shall be required to give the City a good and sufficient bond that the streets and alleys will be placed and left in as good condition as found.

For each and every breach or violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance by the grantee, it shall be liable to a penalty of twenty-five Dollars to be recovered in any court of competent jurisdiction by suit, of any persons or firm or corporation injured or damaged by such breach or violation and if the breach or violation shall be a continuous one, each day during which such breach or violation continues shall be deemed a separate breach or violation and separate ground for recovery against the grantee.

Section 10.

That in further consideration of the privileges and franchises granted to the East Plains Gas Co., of Amarillo, Texas, they agree to build a six-inch welded line for their main line from the field. It shall be buried at a depth of not less than eighteen inches (18") under ground and shall carry a pressure of not less than one hundred pounds (100 lbs.) at City gate. It shall adopt and use all and any reasonable safeguards to provide for the protection of persons or property against injury or damage growing out of the use of gas and that they shall construct and maintain in good order all mains, pipes and equipment used in said City for the distributing of gas, and shall always be prepared to furnish said City and its inhabitants a sufficient quantity of gas for all purposes; provided, however, that in case of explosion or accidents of any character or nature beyond the control of grantee, to the main lines or to the distributing system provided herein, or shortage of gas supply in the fields from which the gas is and the gas and the grantee is not able to furnish on account of such unavoidable conditions gas for all purposes, that preference shall be given domestic consumers, and that hospitals in the use of gas until such time as the supply may prove adequate for all purposes. Provided further that the grantee shall not be liable for any damage resulting from such accidents either to the lines of the grantee or to the lines on property of consumers.

Section 11.

That in further consideration of the privileges of the franchise granted to the East Plains Gas Co., of Amarillo, Texas, they agree when the price shall be reduced to twenty-two hundred the price shall be reduced to ninety cents per thousand cubic feet, when the total amount of meters has reached six hundred the price will be reduced to eighty cents per thousand cubic feet, when the total amount of meters has reached two thousand the price will be reduced to seventy cents per thousand cubic feet, and when the total amount of meters has reached twenty-four hundred the price will be reduced to sixty cents per thousand cubic feet.

By the total amount of meters is meant the amount or number of meters connected onto said line, or lines, from the point of origin of wells, to, through and including all towns to the termination of said line including the City of Perryton, but should said line extend beyond Perryton, this seal shall not apply beyond that point.

Section 11-A

That in further consideration of the privileges of the franchise granted to the East Plains Gas Co. of Amarillo, Texas, they agree to build for the installation of the town, a six-inch belt with four inch mains and three inch laterals. The location of the mains and laterals to be determined by a competent engineer, to be selected by the City Council.

Section 11-B

It is provided that the grantee shall in good faith begin the construction of its main lines and distributing systems by May 1, 1928, and shall complete such main lines by September 1, 1928, and shall be prepared to serve gas to consumers on or before September 1, 1928, provided, however, that grantee shall not be liable for time consumed or of such period by strikes, acts of providence, acts of constituted legal authorities, or acts beyond the control of grantee.

Section 12.

That the grantee herein shall have the right and privilege of assigning this franchise and all the rights and privileges granted herein, and wherever the word "grantee" appears herein it shall be construed as applying to its successors and assigns.

Section 13.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval and publication as provided by law.

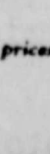
