Tom Ross Reported To Have Taken His Own Life Texas Fliers Beat West-East Non-Stop Flight Record

Capt. Frank Hawks Lowers Time By 36 Minutes, 1 Second

New Mark for Non-Stop Transcontinental Flight Is Hung Up By Houstonite And Mechanic

Had To Fly High

Snow, Rain, Fog and Bad Weather Forced Birdmen Way Above Clouds; Functioned Perfectly

ROOSEVELT FIELD, N. Y., Feb. 5.—Capt. Frank Hawks, of Houston, set a new record for a non-stop transcontinental flight today. Maintaining an average speed of almost 150 miles an hour despite snow, fog and rain that drove him high into the sky and for a time threw him off his course, he made the journey 36 minutes and one second faster than the only other plane that ever flew without halt from the west coast to the east.

Landed At 2:59:29

Hawks, piloting a seaplane torpedo shaped Lockheed monoplane, and accompanied by Oscar E. Grubb, mechanic, left Los Angeles at 5:37:30 o'clock, Pacific time, yesterday afternoon. He landed here at 2:59:29 o'clock, Eastern time this afternoon, giving him a flying time of 18 hours, 21 minutes and 59 seconds.

The only other west-east transcontinental non-stop flight ever accomplished was made last summer by Col. Arthur Goebel in another Lockheed with Harry Tucker as passenger. In 18 hours and 58 minutes, Tucker and Col. B. D. Collier later were killed attempting to beat Goebel's time.

A crowd gathered at Curtiss Field this afternoon to welcome Hawks but he chose this field as his landing place and the crowd saw nothing of him but a flash of red as he dropped like a comet from the sky and settled to earth a mile away.

Aside from being somewhat tired by the strain of fighting the elements, which he said were the only reasons he did not beat Goebel's record by two hours, Hawks seemed physically fit when he landed. Grubb

Subway Work Is Started Tuesday

City's Building Passes Another Milestone With Commencing of Projects; May Reach Record Mark

With construction starting today on the city's part of the subway at Broadway and the Santa Fe railway tracks, by the Panhandle Construction company, another milestone in Lubbock's building history is marked. The city is to pay half of the \$97,122.30 contract awarded the Panhandle company Monday, the Santa Fe to pay the other half.

In addition to this amount, the Santa Fe is doing its own work of tearing out tracks, putting in supports, and other portions of the underpass construction reserved by the company to do, the amount to be expended not to exceed \$85,000. The city will pay half of this figure, the Santa Fe doing it on a cost-plus basis, guaranteeing the total not to be more than \$85,000. Total Cost Is \$182,122.

The total cost of the Broadway subway is to be, therefore, \$182,122.30, half to be paid by the City of Lubbock and half by the Santa Fe.

With the subway figure added to this year's building record of \$273,328, to date, Lubbock's 1929 building permits would be at \$455,450.30, slightly less than half a million for a month and six days.

MUSKOGEE, Okla., Feb. 5. (P)—H. Nelson, 28, of Fort Gibson fell 45 feet today into a pile of rocks, landing on his head. He calmly arose, waited for an ambulance which fellow workers called and then described sensations of the fall to ambulance attendants as he was taken to a hospital for treatment of a split nose and the loss of several teeth, his only injuries.

Nelson fell from a Missouri Pacific railroad bridge upon which he was working.

Fossils Fared No Better In River

CANADIAN, Feb. 5. (P)—The quicksands of the Canadian river, which claimed many cattle in the old trail driving days, apparently were just as treacherous today as eight million years ago, according to members of the University of California expedition which is searching for fossils of prehistoric animals near here.

R. A. Sinton, curator of the museum of paleontology at the university, who heads the expedition, said that his party expected to find the bones of many camels, rhinoceroses, three-toed horses, and mastodons, trapped in the treacherous quicksands centuries ago.

Although hampered by cold weather several boxes of specimens already have been shipped to California and the party is digging along the river 20 miles southwest of Canadian. Headquarters for the expedition have been established here.

McMillan Is Given

Contract for Work On Hotel Addition

Local Contractor Awarded Job For \$135,500; Sherman Firm Gets Plumbing And Heating; Starts Soon

W. G. McMillan, Lubbock contractor was successful bidder for the general contracting on the five story addition to the Lubbock Hotel and was awarded the contract. A meeting of officers of the hotel Tuesday afternoon. Thirty firms entered bids.

J. C. Korlath Plumbing and Heating company, of Sherman, was given the plumbing contract, and the Ware-Ramsey company, of El Paso was given the electrical contract.

Exact amounts were not definitely set in all three contracts, although the approximate total for the three is \$200,000. Of this the general contractor will represent about \$135,500. Construction of the addition will begin between March 1 and 10, and ten completed, the hotel will have 300 rooms, the present structure having 143. Arrangement of the five added floors will be practically the same as the present six floors, with the exception that the eleventh floor will consist of a number of suites.

The present hotel was completed in September, 1926, at a cost of approximately \$500,000, with furnishings. The Lubbock Hotel Operating company, of which Walter Myrick, Sr., is president; Sam Arnett, treasurer, and Walter Myrick, Jr., is secretary, has been in charge of the

BILL GETS APPROVAL

Measure Creating 9 Posts On Education Board Oked

AUSTIN, Feb. 5. (P)—The House committee on education today approved the Shaver-Holder bill which would create a state board of education of nine members to replace the three, composed of the Governor, secretary of state and comptroller. The bill was approved by Governor Moody and B. M. N. Marrs, State Superintendent of Public Instruction.

Cruiser Measure Passed Tuesday By Senate, 68-12

Bill Provides For Increase of 105 Cruisers and Plane Carrier Before July 1, 1923; Goes to Coolidge

May Get Veto

Action Is Disregarded To President's Wishes; Program Involves \$274,000,000 Construction

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Feb. 5. (P)—An increase in the Navy by 105 cruisers and an airplane carrier was voted today by the Senate, 68 to 12, with the stipulation that the ships be laid down before July 1, 1931. The bill is almost the same as that approved by the House a year ago. It must be returned, however, for the consideration of the two amendments made by the Senate. Approval of these is expected without the necessity of a conference and if this is done, the measure then will go to President Coolidge.

Disregarding the wishes of the President the Senate, like the House, voted overwhelmingly to specify when construction of the ships shall be started, and if Mr. Coolidge accepts the bill it will be incumbent upon him to recommend at this session a budget estimate for five of the cruisers.

The program involves a total appropriation of \$274,000,000, including \$17,000,000 for each of the 10,000 tons cruisers and \$19,000,000 for the airplane carrier. Mr. Coolidge has had his doubts of the government's ability to meet this financial outlay and he is obviously very much displeased at the refusal of Congress to listen to his plea for control over the naval program. But he has not decided to veto the measure.

Tech Debators Win From Canyon Team

The Tech college debating team, composed of J. W. Jackson, Sid Knowles and Wilburn Edelman, yesterday won a judge's decision over a debatable team from the West Texas State Teachers college at Canyon in an inter-collegiate contest in the Tech Administration building. The visiting team included Frank Barnes, J. D. Gamble, and J. D. Hazelwood.

Tech defended the affirmative of the question, "Resolved: That the parliamentary form of government is superior to the presidential form of government." A Tech team will uphold the negative of the same question February 19 against Texas Christian University.

Two Men Escape from Submarine Lying On Bottom of Sea for First Time

Safety Device Aids Two Men to Escape to Surface Twice From Sunken Sub In Forty Feet of Water; The S-4, Same Boat Rammed Off Coast With Crew, Used

ABOARD U.S.S. MALLARD OFF KEY WEST, Fla., Feb. 5.—For what is believed by naval experts to be the first time in the history of the sea, man today escaped from a sunken submarine without outside aid, by use of a safety device.

In a series of tests, being conducted near Smith Shoals, 11 miles off Key West, two men attached to the tender Mallard twice made their way safely from the sunken submarine S-4 lying in forty feet of water to the surface of the sea.

House Passes Two Amendments And Raise Dan's Salary

Supreme Court Is Raised to Nine Judges; Executive's Pay Boosted to \$10,000 Per Year

May Be Voted Soon

Pitched Battle Precedes Vote On Salary; Junior College Bill and Realty License Bills Engrossed

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Feb. 5.—Checking its activities tonight, the house found that the day had been marked by passage of two Constitutional amendments enlarging membership of the supreme court from three to nine and increasing the governor's salary from \$4,000 to \$10,000 a year. If the Constitutional amendments survive a senate vote, they will be offered to Texas voters at a special election July 16.

Court Goes Through Easily. Little opposition was voiced to the supreme court measure after Representative Storey of Vernon told the house that disposal of cases was hindered seriously by lack of sufficient judges, but treasury "watch dogs" staged a pitched battle over hiking the salary of the state's executive that reached intensive proportions.

The final vote on the amendment was 104 to 22. The junior college measure, introduced yesterday by countless amendments, was ordered engrossed after a two-hour struggle, but failed to be finally acted upon during the afternoon.

The fourth major bill of the day, the Kemble-Morse-Acker measure licensing real estate operators, was passed by a majority of three votes, only again to be brought up for consideration.

Houston Police Make 487 Arrests

HOUSTON, Feb. 5. (P)—Police Tuesday were continuing a drive against crime which had netted 487 arrests since midnight Saturday. Although officials expressed confidence that the cleanup was having a deterring effect on a tide of crime that has swept Houston with increasing intensity the last few weeks, none of the arrests threw light on two recent slayings which baffled police.

Of the total number arrested after three days of the drive, 49 persons remained in the city jail tonight.

INFLUENZA DECLINES

Fifty Per Cent Decrease Is Noted In Disease

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5. (P)—A 50 per cent decline in the prevalence of influenza in 18 states, the District of Columbia and New York City, during the week ending February 2, as compared with the previous week, was announced today by the public health service, but at the same time Surgeon General Merritt W. Ireland of the army, issued a warning to the public against being lulled into any false sense of security because statistics seem to indicate the epidemic is on the wane.

General Ireland in a statement issued from the war department said it was indicated there must have been at least 8,000,000 cases during the eleven weeks ending January 10.

SOONERS DOWN TAX

Cosmetics and Tobacco Go Free In Oklahoma

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Feb. 5. (P)—Oklahoma, at least for the next two years will not place a state tax upon cosmetics and tobacco.

A house bill providing for the special tax for school purposes, was killed, when the house committee on revenue and taxation reported unfavorably on it today.

Carnes Is Given Prison Term For Shortage Charge

Ex-Convict Who Rose From Obscure Position to High Post In Baptist Church Is Sentenced; Million Gone

(By Associated Press)
ATLANTA, Ga., Feb. 5.—Clinton S. Carnes, who rose from ex-convict to a position of prominence as treasurer of the Southern Baptist Home Mission Board and died after nine years leaving a shortage estimated at nearly a million dollars, pleaded guilty to embezzlement here today and was sentenced to five to seven years imprisonment.

His plea was accepted on recommendation of board officials who said Carnes had turned over all his resources for restitution, that it would save the state a long, expensive trial and that justice would be served by the sentence because of his age. It was added that Carnes had agreed to aid in untangling the board's accounts, on which auditors have been working since he disappeared last summer.

Rose From Auditor

It was as an obscure auditor that Carnes first became affiliated with the Home Mission Board. A year later, in 1919, his business ability won for him the post of treasurer.

Then he joined the Capital Avenue Baptist church, became chairman of the finance and buildings committee, was invited to membership in several clubs and established a home in the fashionable Druid Hills section. He became the head of the private business enterprises here.

On August 15, last he disappeared and ten days later a search was started in the belief he had met

Suicide Follows Killing of Ranch Hand In Montana

Former Texan Reported To Have Slain Ranch Foreman Over Methods of Work; Known As Cannon

To Send Body Back

Burial To Be Made In Lovington, New Mexico, Report Here Reveals; Was Sought For Escaping Pen

HAYRE, Mont., Feb. 5.—A man known as Charles Cannon, but believed to be Tom Ross, formerly of Texas, shot and killed himself in one of the buildings of the Frye Cattle Company, in Glacier county, near Browning, Sunday night after killing R. C. Hayward, also an employee of the company, according to word received here today. Cannon had been employed as a foreman by the cattle company but had been succeeded by Hayward.

According to two eye witnesses and meager information received here, Hayward and Cannon got into an argument over the methods Cannon had used in carrying out his work.

Heid Witnesses Prisoners As Hayward walked from the room after the argument, Cannon pulled a gun and killed him. He then held the witnesses prisoners for more than an hour they said, after which he went to an adjoining room and killed himself.

Authorities from here have gone to the ranch to make an investigation.

Ross To Be Brought Back To Lovington for Burial

From the information gained here last night, it was learned that the body of Tom Ross, Texas cattleman reported to have taken his life in Glacier county, Montana, is to be shipped to Seagraves, via Lubbock, and carried overland to Lovington, New Mexico for burial. Ross's wife, and daughter and father-in-law, reside in Lovington.

He suggested that such shrubs and trees as can be purchased be placed around the schools and offered the council the help of the Tech horticulturists in the ground beautification.

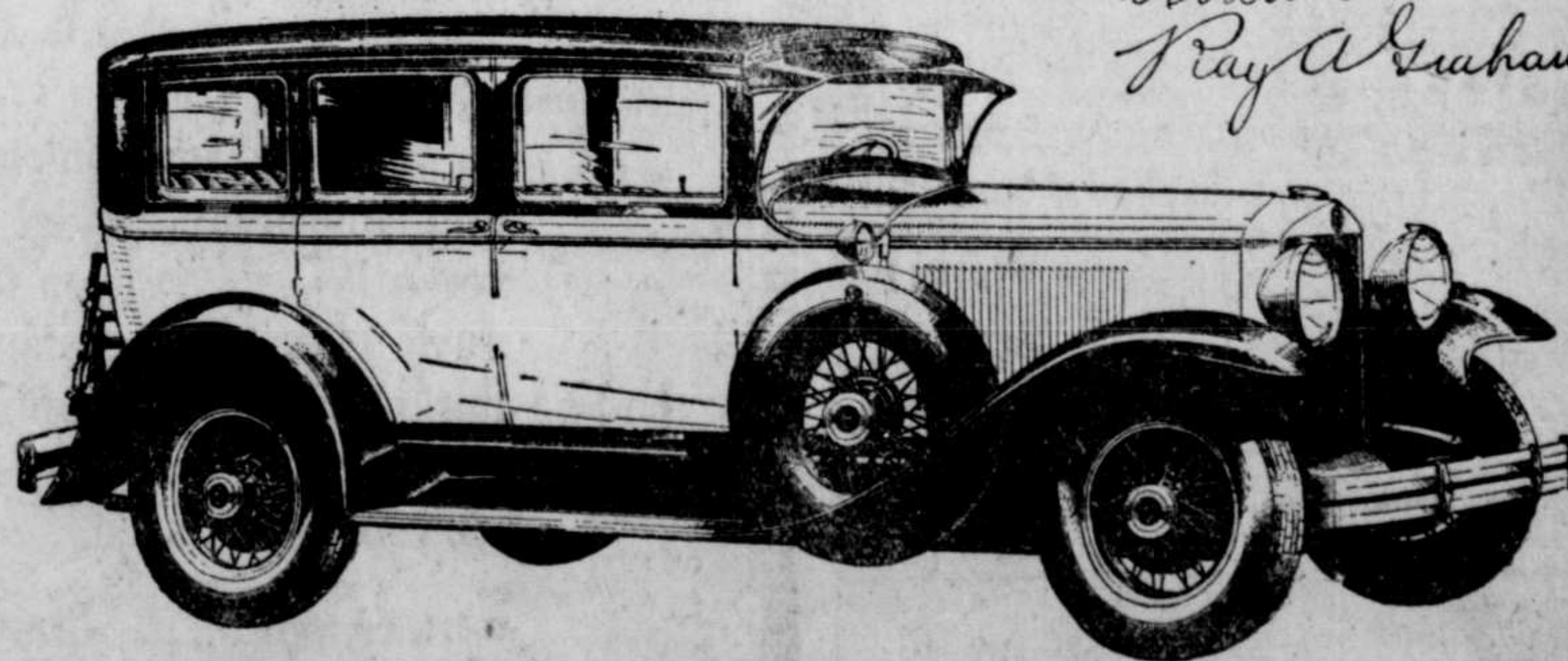

THAT ONE POINT MARGIN

The Texas Longhorns lost a heart-breaking basketball game to Southern Methodist University Monday night when the Ponies scored a free throw in the last thirty seconds to nose out the hitherto undefeated Steers 33 to 32. It was the first defeat suffered by the crack Texas team, which seemed bound for second place in the conference. It was the Methodist's stalling attack that frustrated the Longhorn five.

Texas can take the title by doing what might be considered the impossible, winning the remainder of the games on her schedule including two with the Arkansas Razorbacks. The Ponies have showed themselves to be in a class to themselves in the conference cage race, but comparative scores will mean nothing to the Longhorn quintet when the Ozark basketballers meet them in the Texas gymnasium. The Steers hold what might be termed a jinx over the Razorback basketball teams. Even when Coach Schmidt's pupils win the conference title, the Steers manage to beat them out.

All eyes will be turned toward Austin Friday and Saturday nights when the giant Razorbacks invade the Longhorn stronghold. While statistics do not give the Texans even so much of a look-in, Coach Schmidt's aggregation can expect a royal battle, and unless their scoring aces are going at top speed, are liable to suffer their first setback of the season. The majority of observers concede the out-of-state cagers a cinch to walk off with both games with little difficulty, one well-known scribe pointing out that one advantage of the small court in Austin was that only 500 fans could see the slaughter. But it may turn out quite differently.

Something like twenty-five basketball teams from all sections of the South Plains are expected to enter the invitation tournament to be held at Floydada Friday and Saturday of this week. Although Lubbock high school will not compete in this meet, the Westerners' rivals in this district, the Ralls Jackrabbits will uphold the reputation of this immediate section. Coach Froggie Lovorn's crew of fast-stepping basketballers are going like the proverbial "house afire" this season and should be able to give the other teams in the tournament plenty of competition.

Before returning the two game visit of the Canyon Eagles this week-end, the Westerners will take on Ralls here Thursday night. Unless the locals have improved several percent, the Rabbits will likely continue their victorious march toward the district championship. Reports from Ralls indicate Coach Lovorn's are pointing with all their strength to the game here with the Morganmen Thursday night at the Tech gymnasium. With the district title in sight for the winner of the contest, both teams are expected to shoot both barrels in what will likely be their last meeting before the district tourney.

The championship of the second half of the City League basketball race will likely be decided tonight at the high school gymnasium when the undefeated Business College quintet meets George Brown's Teachers. The Kelsey-Bryant scoring combination, unmatched for speed in the league, will be pitted against the uncanny passing and shooting combination of Morgan and Brown. It will be a battle between two super-scoring machines, with the Teachers holding a slight edge on defensive play.

Anything can happen to alter the standing of the teams in the city race, but the winner of this contest tonight will have the upper hand in the chase. The Teachers have lost one game by forfeit to the Whole-salers, but the recent showing of the team indicates it will be hard to stop from here on out. The addition of Jimmy Kerr to the lineup has made the Teachers one of the strongest defensive clubs in the loop.

Tom A. White of this city and Mr. Hankins are anticipating attending the meeting Monday at Carlsbad, and there is likelihood of a number of other Lubbock citizens going.

1929 Season Will Open On April 16 And Close Oct. 6

Sunday Baseball Muddle In Boston Holding Up The 1929 Schedule; To Be Referred to Heydler

(By Associated Press)

NEW YORK, Feb. 5.—The annual schedule meeting of the National League today failed in its major purpose as the 1929 schedule failed of adoption.

A series of playing dates had been arranged calling for a number of Sunday games in Boston, a permit for playing these games has not been granted the Boston Braves so the schedule, instead of being ratified, was referred to President John A. Heydler for later action.

If the Braves are permitted to play on Sundays in Boston the schedule will stand as drafted. If the authorities decline to permit such games the dates will be rearranged by President Heydler.

Has Vice President

The National League as a result of today's meeting has a vice president for the first time in its history. Barney Dreyfuss, president of the Pittsburgh club and senior member of the organization, was elected to the newly created honorary position. Mr. Dreyfuss became associated with the league in 1892 as the head of the Louisville club.

The 1929 season will open Tuesday April 16, five days later than last year, with New York playing at Philadelphia, Brooklyn at Bos-

ton, St. Louis at Cincinnati and Pittsburgh at Chicago. The season will close Sunday, October 6, one week later than the closing date in 1928.

As a result of formal action today the waiver priced on first year players will be \$7,500 regardless of the initial cost of the athlete involved. Formerly if waivers were refused on a first year player, the club claiming him was obligated to pay the club holding him the sum paid for him.

After the first year a player is subject to the waiver price paid for regulars, \$4,000. An effort to increase the regular waiver price to \$7,500 failed.

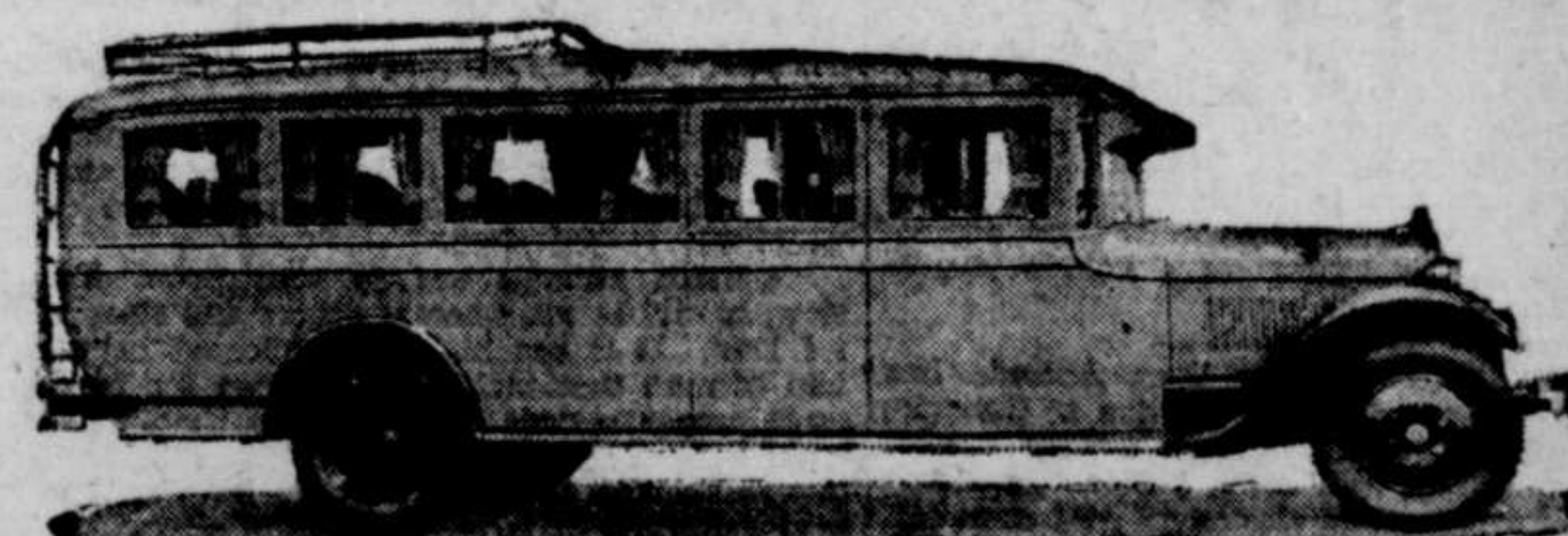

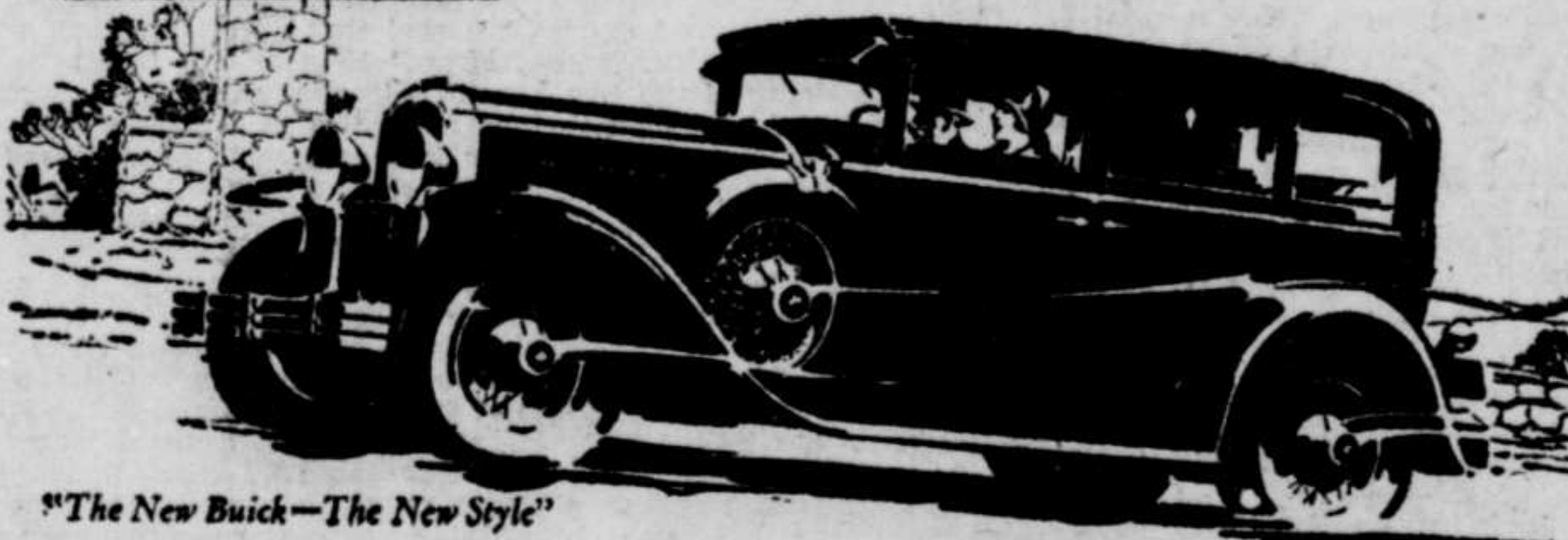

LOYALTY

A benefit performance at one of Washington's shows, given for a trio of convicted men who refused to "squeal" on their comrades in crime, attracted a large attendance and was accorded considerable space in the press. There is little doubt that the refusal of the three to tell the names of their companions, although by doing so they might have evaded a three-year prison sentence, struck a sympathetic chord in the hearts of a large number. Some people may argue that those who responded liberally with contributions to the benefit fund were limited to the class of people whose activities are of a character similar to those for which the three men were convicted. However, this is not proven, and one does not have to tax the memory heavily to recall when similar demonstrations of sympathy with a movement that, while it could not be characterized as a violation of the law within itself, contributed materially to the impediments law enforcement, were made by other classes. Loyalty to a friend and fellow being is an admirable human trait, and it apparently is still an integral part of man's nature despite the occasional disruptions that provide us with sensational features, against friend, or brother, against brother, in a bitter clash. However, there seems to be a great need in modern times of a spirit of loyalty to society. If a spirit of loyalty to the interests of society in general could be cultivated to the extent that, in most cases, would triumph over loyalty to the individual, when their interests conflict, an epochal accomplishment toward law enforcement would have been achieved, even though development of such a spirit could not be extended to the haunts of crime. The accused criminal is not the only person that declines to "squeal." Honor systems, introduced into American colleges several years ago, are being abandoned by many now because the students are reluctant to report abuses of the system. Prohibition enforcement is made doubly difficult because the law-abiding system does not report violations of the Volstead Act when he sees them, apparently consoling his conscience with the notion that it is no affair of his and that it is purely a problem for those actively engaged in law enforcement. Thus the lack of a spirit of loyalty to society is one of the greatest obstacles to law enforcement. It is particularly difficult to surmount because the lack of such loyalty is almost universal, without respect to the strata of society concerned.

VALENTINES

How many people are aware that when they send valentines to each other on February 14 they are merely perpetuating an old heathen custom? Very few. Yet such is the fact. Before the dawn of Christianity Roman youths and maidens were accustomed to select partners in love for the year on that date. But, in his "Lives of the Saints" describes the observance as "the heathen, lewd, superstitious custom of boys drawing the names of girls in honor of St. Valentine was a Christian bishop who suffered martyrdom on February 14, A. D. 271, and the church assigned him the day of his martyrdom in the calendar of saints. Every effort was made by the church to change the heathen festival into a religious observance in honor of St. Valentine. Butler says that "St. Francis de Sales forbade the custom of valentines, or giving boys in writing the names of girls to be admired and attended by him, and to abolish it he changed it into giving letters with names of certain saints for them to honor and imitate in a peculiar manner."

Nothing could better illustrate the hold which ancient customs and superstitions have upon us still than the fact that in spite of all this some pastors today are annually obliged to remind their flocks that St. Valentine's day is a Christian festival in honor of a martyred saint and to warn them against the exchanging of "valentines" of a nature unsuitable for the day.

Judge August McCloskey of San Antonio has again been given a certificate of election to Congress from the Fourteenth district. The court ruled that the judge's final fight will come before the House committee on privileges and elections. And that Mr. Wurchach thinks will be his Philippi and McCloskey's Waterloo.

President Coolidge laments the tax extravagance of the country, but he points with pride to the several reductions in the tax bill made by the national government. Yeah, we see the point. Had the federal government kept step with states, counties and municipalities in levying taxes we would be a bankrupt country all right.

Dispensation of federal patronage in Texas was not placed upon a money basis, says Major Withington, secretary and organizer of the state G. O. P. Nevertheless, as we gather from testimony before the Senate committee, the boys who didn't come across with a contribution stood a poor show of getting an endorsement.

For a sick man General Bramwell Booth seems to be putting up a pretty good fight to maintain his leadership of the Salvation Army. The court rules he can no be removed without first being heard; and when he is heard the tables may be turned.

Celebrating his 88th birthday recently, the only Confederate veteran in Congress discouraged solemnly in "states' rights." Which goes to prove that he who is 88th in the past has only memories to sustain him.

Russian scientists are credited with having perfected an artificial heart. Wonder if they can make the milk of human kindness flow more freely through it than is perceived in too many of nature's products?

On the Firing Line at the Nation's Capital

WEALTHY TAXPAYERS CARELESS
WITH FUNDS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.—Billionaire income taxpayers certainly are careless with their money.

We small fry, who sweeten the United States treasury only a few dollars apiece annually, may make our mistakes, too, but it is not sheer recklessness on our part. Few expert specialists can make any sense out of an income tax blank. We can't afford to hire specialist. Consequently most of us give the government the benefit of every doubt when we make out our statements, in order to keep out of jail—if possible.

It does seem as if a concern which counts its assets up into 10 figures and employs a big staff of expert accountants and high-priced counsel, to save it from a loss of a cent more than it ought to be proof against very many enormous accidental over-payments.

Yet two billions, 614 millions and 806 thousands of dollars is a considerable sum. Treasury records show that that amount was tossed casually into Uncle Sam's hopper, between 1923 and 1928, inclusively, in excess of the income tax law's requirements.

Uncle Samuel honestly returned it, in one way and another. It was not all repaid in cash. Some of it went into the ledger in the form of credits or reductions on subsequent taxes. A mere trifle of 900 and a few odd millions was refunded in actual dough.

However, Senator McKellar, of Tennessee, who was complaining about these funds, spoke of even 900 millions as a good deal of cash to be forked back, out of the treasury, with such a dearth of explanations.

McKellar did not know, at that time, about the credits and deductions. He knew about the 900 millions, because the treasury has to come to congress and ask for the money when it literally makes a refund.

The credits and deductions are simply little details of bookkeeping.

It was in the course of his howl over the 900 millions in cash refunds that it occurred to the senator to ask for the bookkeeping information also.

That brought the total up to above 2 1-2 billions.

Before Senator McKellar began discussing the refund in the upper house of congress, Representative John N. Garner of Texas had a great deal to say about them in the lower one.

Nobody has made it very clear why Secretary Mellon should not return money to taxpayers, if and whenever the treasury has collected more than it is entitled to.

Nevertheless, McKellar and Garner do both take a critical attitude. Anyway, they say, there ought to be more publicity concerning credits and deductions—and it is a fact that McKellar only learned of this by accident.

True, McKellar and Garner are democrats, so their remarks may be pure partisan carping.

Still, there are some republicans likewise who find fault with Secretary Mellon. Senator Couzens does, and Senators Brookhart, Nye and Farner—all G. O. P.-ites.

There are folks who believe Secretary Mellon's confirmation will be fought in the senate, if Mr. Hoover reappears him. The answer to that appears to be that Mr. Hoover may keep him without reappointing him—simply leave him in, just as he is now—so that he will not need any confirmation.

Your Health

ONSET OF SLEEP IS ONE OF LIFE'S MYSTERIES

Increasing evidence indicates more and more the importance of a sufficient amount of good rest, particularly for the growing child or the nervous adult. A British publication has recently secured from three leading physicians opinions as to the value of sleep in relationship to life in general.

A special report issued by the Public Health Department of the London County Council noted particularly increase of restlessness and nervousness among children, in many instances due to insufficient sleep.

Not only are the actual minutes spent in sleep important, but the nature of the sleep, since the child may rest for the normal number of hours without securing the type of rest that is involved in good sleep.

Resting for several hours in darkness and silence while lying down is of great aid in restoring the nervous system, but is not to be compared with the type of restoration and repair that occurs when one is unconscious of the existence of the world in completely restful sleep.

Certain animals are so constructed that they sleep hardly at all, whereas others will sleep all winter long. It is the highly complicated nervous system of man that makes it necessary for him to observe proper periods of sleep more than any of the lower animal species.

The actual facts are that we have not as yet a good definition or comprehension of sleep. We know that the lack of it produces serious changes in the nervous system, resulting after brief periods in complete prostration, hallucinations, delirium and loss of memory.

We know that there is a tendency for sleeping periods to come with a regular rhythm between waking periods.

Q.—Is it dangerous to drink water with chlorine in it?
A.—Chlorine in the amount ordinarily used to purify drinking water is not harmful.

ing periods. But none of these facts explains the onset of sleep. One view was that during this period the brain had no circulation; another that it had more circulation.

One scientist argued that during the waking state there was an accumulation of the products of fatigue which brought on sleep, and that during sleep these products were eliminated.

Other views have to do with the passage of fluid into brain tissues and with changes in the actions of the glands.

It is safe to say that none of these views has been sustained by sufficient scientific evidence, and that the actual cause of the onset of sleep and the tremendous desire for sleep that occurs have not been established.

The experience of mankind has shown that play periods previous to resting tend to induce normal sleep; physical exercise helps; a glass of hot milk may be useful. The bedroom should be quiet and cool. The window should be open sufficiently to "norm" ingress of fresh air. A hot bath before retiring not infrequently aids rest, but in many people results in increasing irritability.

Your Income Tax

Income tax returns are required of every single person whose net income for the taxable year 1928 was \$1,500 or more; every married person, living with husband or wife, whose net income was \$3,500 or more; and every person, single or married, whose gross income was \$5,000 or more, regardless of net income.

Husband and wife, living together, must include the income of each in a single joint return, or each must file a separate return showing the income of each. In the return of married persons must be included also the income of dependent minor children.

The Way Of The World

Although it is said that the level of human intelligence is no higher than it is, and although people in the mass, as well as individuals, are constantly making grievous mistakes, the fact remains that the majority of people mean to be just. When a question is clearly and fairly presented to the people, and if the proposition is a sound and proper one, the majority of the citizens of this country or any other civilized country can be counted on the side of justice. Thousands of citizens who do not lack intelligence, lack information. Given accurate information, they know how to act.

GOOD AND BAD LEADERS

There is a kind of man with whom we are all familiar who gives one the impression of being a leader because he is always full of new notions. He is forever suggesting that something be done about something. He has a rather vague idea about what ought to be done but he wants to do it. Or he desires intensely to get his friends interested in doing something about it. Sometimes he passes for a leader in the community. Frequently he mistakes mere change for progress. He gets a thrill out of seeing things changed. The fact that they are often changed for the worse doesn't much concern him.

There is no virtue in leadership if you are not going anywhere.

Paraphrasing the words of the prophet who claimed: "I said in my wrath, all men are liars." It has been a point in the records of public affairs when some think they are justified in claiming: "We hold the belief that all officeholders are grafters." Happily this is not true but it is tragically true that bribery and corruption in governmental offices, large and small, is too frequent and too great a menace to the safety of the citizen and the preservation of the rights of the public.

There is no heroism in being honest, but there is cowardice and dishonesty in being dishonest; there is not so universal epidemic of bribery and graft that an honest public official is entitled to a medal. This is the view taken by the Danbury, Conn. News in a recent discussion of this question. Commenting upon a Chicago slogan displayed by a Chicago preacher, the News says:

"We ought to make heroes out of legislators who cannot be bribed. This is the startling statement that stands out on an electric signboard on a Chicago church. The rector of the church calls his signboard slogans 'crisp sermons.' We trust the others are of higher ethical value than this one."

"A hero is defined, quite simply, as 'a man of great valor.' To assume that only men of great valor, of great integrity, are capable of resisting a bribe, is to assume that an honest man is a rarity."

"Medals and citations for bravery are given to soldiers when they perform a deed of valor 'over and above that required on the line of duty.' That is to say, it is assumed that soldiers will be brave; that they deserve any reward or special consideration for bravery is not part of the military tradition. Honesty, we had believed, was likewise assumed as an ordinary attribute."

"We believe that most legislators are honest. If the majority of men were not honest, business could not go forward as it is conducted today. If the majority of men were not honest we should find it necessary to alter most of our ways and habits. Legislators are ordinary men sent to represent other ordinary men and women in positions of temporary responsibility. That some legislators accept bribes is, unfortunately, true. To believe that the crooked, bribe-taking legislator is so numerous as to make the nonbribeable legislator a hero to be singled out for extraordinary honors is to believe that humanity has sunk to a disgusting low level."

"The legislator who refuses a bribe is no hero. He is merely a decent man, refusing to betray a trust. If the day is here when we must look upon mere refusal to turn crooked as heroism, then may God save the United States of America."

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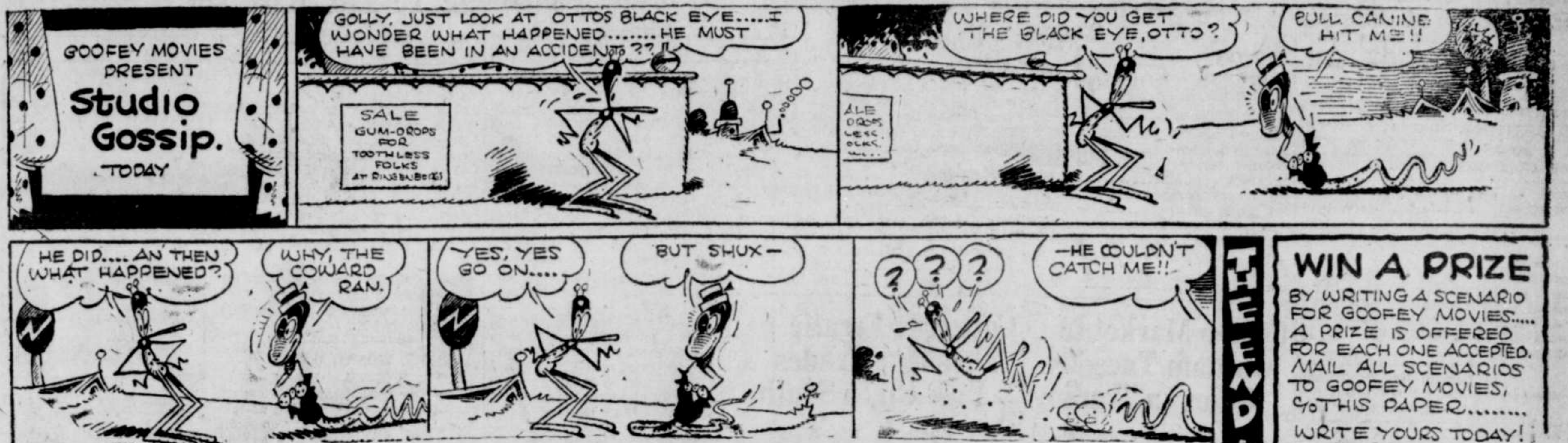
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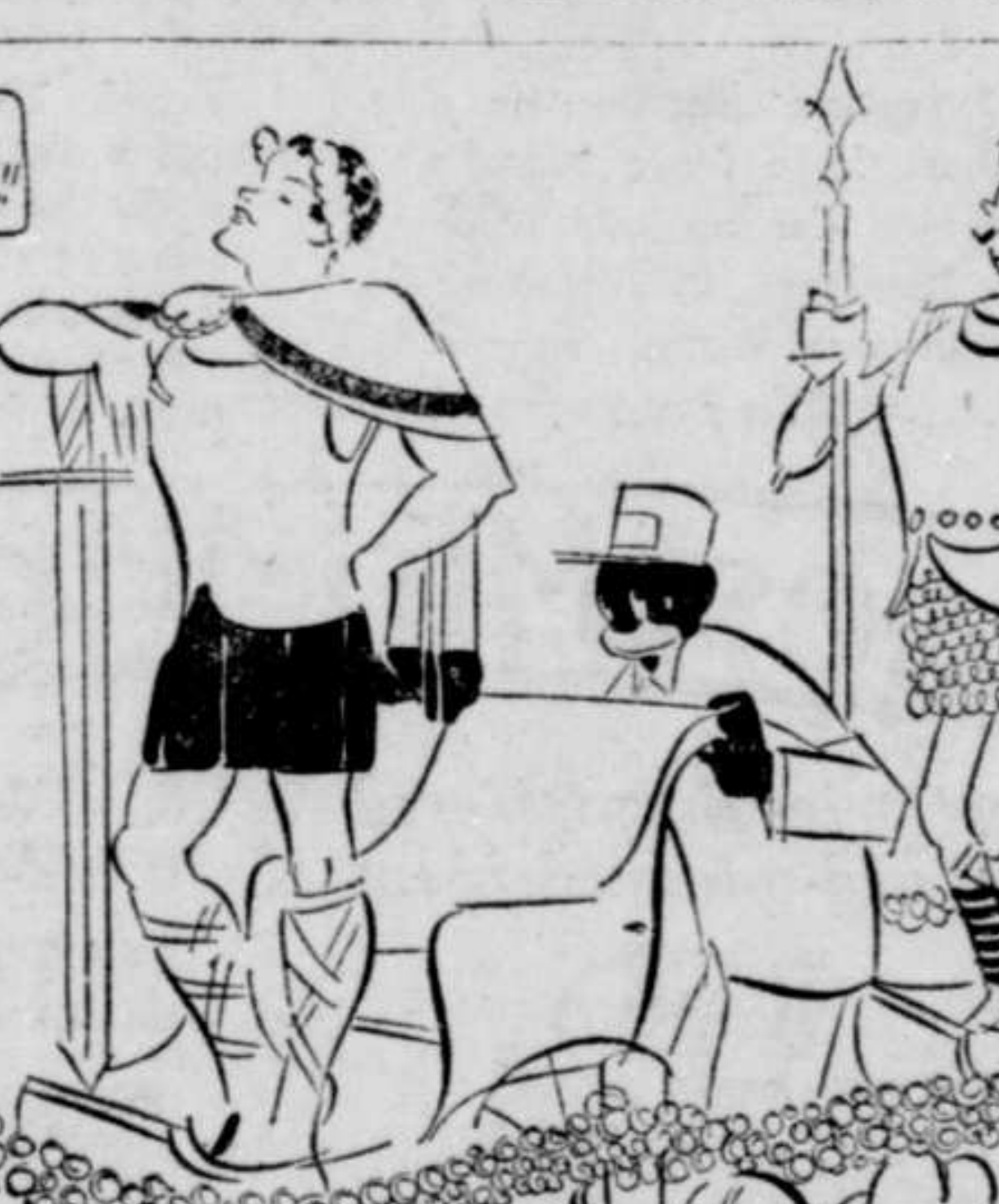

Stock Market Is Feeble Tuesday; Lindy Aids Air

Flier's Mail Hop Influences Aviation Shares; Coppers Go Forward; Grains And Cotton Are Dull

NEW YORK, Feb. 5. (AP)—The stock market was inclined to feel somewhat feeble today, but recovered considerably during the session after general portions of good news. More than a score of issues closed at new high levels, although a liberal sprinkling wound up 1 to 10 points lower.

Takings of more than \$15,000,000 in gold in London by New York bankers, the largest since the resumption of the flow of the yellow metal in this direction, was particularly stimulating, as it brings the total of the current movement up toward \$30,000,000. Call money held at 7 per cent all day, but was available in the outside market at substantial concessions from the official rate. The tone of time money again was somewhat easier.

Lindy Helps Aviation
Aviation and copper shares led the upturn, responding to the air mail flight by Col. Lindbergh in Central America, another 1-4 of a cent increase in the domestic price of copper from \$6 to \$7.

The uneven tone of the market was ascribed to uneasiness over the credit outlook and professional selling. Call money was held at higher levels this week than was anticipated.

Trading was moderately quiet. Total sales holding close to 4,000,000 shares for the second successive day.

The aviation shares responded to the flight of Col. Lindbergh in a manner reminiscent of the way they were sent soaring by his New York-Paris flight. Wright Aero mounted 20 points to a new peak at 299. Curtiss climbed 7 points to a new top at 178 1-2.

Foreign exchanges were quiet with sterling holding around yesterday's levels. The Peseta recovered about 1-4 of a cent.

Cotton Market In Gotham Tuesday Quiet In Trading

NEW YORK, Feb. 5. (AP)—An early decline under renewed liquidation, which apparently was influenced by lower Liverpool cables, was followed by rallies on trade buying and covering in the cotton market today. After selling off to 19.58 early, May rallied to 19.69 and closed at 19.66. The general market point on March but generally 1 to 2 points net higher.

The market opened steady at a decline of 3 to 7 points in response to the disappointing Liverpool cables and rather unfavorable Manchester trade advices. March sold off to 1.52, July to 19.24 and new October contract to 19.97 in the early trading, or about 6 to 7 points net lower, under further liquidation of old long accounts and some southern and local pressure.

Lower prices seemed to bring in more trade buying, particularly below 19.60 for May. After the initial offerings had been absorbed, prices turned steadier. Trade interests brought March at a discount of about 6 or 7 points under May, which helped to relieve the market of near month pressure.

Cotton Is Erratic Tuesday; Trades Pick Up In South

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 5. (AP)—Cotton prices developed frequent and erratic price fluctuations today and trading was rather more active than has been the rule of late. Although values developed no definite trend there was marked resistance to further declines with good buying encountered around the 19-cent level. May contracts after declining to 18.95 gradually rallied to 19.07 and closed at 19.04, unchanged from yesterday's close. The general market closed steady, unchanged to 1 point up.

The market opened easy in response to unfavorable Liverpool cables and although there was a flurry of buying right after the opening the market weakened again under selling promoted by the weather cables. March sold down to 18.90, May 18.95 and July 18.97, or 7 to 9 points under the previous close.

Later in the morning covering and trade buying on scale down orders coupled with some price fixing absorbed offerings and although there was a moderate reaction around noon the market stiffened again and made new highs in early afternoon trading.

Senator Parrish Seeks Memorials For State Sites

Bill Introduced by Lubbock Man Calls for Appropriation of \$301,000 For Historical Work

Senator Pink L. Parrish, of Lubbock, has introduced among his other bills in the senate, a measure seeking an appropriation of \$301,000 to build nine historical memorials in the State of Texas.

Friends of Mr. Parrish have been notified of his action in the senate. History has always been more or less a hobby of Senator Parrish. He is one of the leaders of the old settlers organizations of this section.

Establish Old Forts
Under the provisions of this bill memorials would be erected at Fort Worth where General Worth established a fort to drive back the Indians, at Nacogdoches on the site of the first camp of Moses Austin and at Goliad in commemoration of the Texans who died on the battlefield there.

This bill would erect a monument at Village Creek, where John C. Denton fell in battle with Indians, and another at Indianola, the port through which the first settlers entered Texas by sea.

Designates Lee's Fort
Fort Phantom, where Gen. Robert E. Lee founded the outpost of the United States army will be designated by a monument if this bill becomes enacted.

Jackboro, headquarters of pioneer Texans while freeing the Lone Star State of Indians, the Kutch-Manning battle grounds of many Indian encounters in Young county, and Mount Blanco, first settlement of Hank Smith, will each receive a monument.

The bill provides that the governor is to appoint a committee of three to carry out the erection of the proposed monument and it sets aside an item of \$1,000, included in the appropriation, to be used as traveling expenses that will arise in carrying out the provisions of the measure.

Some citizens put on the city's building code, a building permit must, of necessity, be taken out by the city itself for construction of the subway. To back up this claim, Section 3, of Building Ordinance No. 366, reads in part: "Before the erection, construction, or alteration or raising of any building, structure or wall, or any part thereof, or any platform, staging or flooring to be used for standing or seating purposes, is commenced, the owner or lessee, and so on, must apply for a building permit."

Others look upon the subway as street improvement. It is, in a way, yet there is enough doubt as to the correct status that City Attorney E. L. Klett has been asked for a legal opinion. This may be forthcoming today. If it says a permit should be issued for construction of this work, Lubbock will undoubtedly climb to an even higher standing among Texas cities in its record for 1929 building.

tended to 55 and 54 years each in the Texas penitentiary in 1923 for the killing of Inspectors W. D. Allison and R. L. Roberson of the Texas Cattle Raisers association, at Seminole. Both men escaped the pen in 1925 but Good was recaptured near Antlers, Okla., in 1926 and returned to Huntsville. Ross had been at large since.

The two inspectors were slain the night before the grand jury was to meet at Seminole to hear evidence collected by them against cattle rustlers. They were talking to others in the lobby of the hotel when a shotgun muzzle was thrust through the door and two charges of buckshot sent into their bodies.

Ross and Good then entered the door and shot the two inspectors several times more with pistols. Mrs. Roberson, who was in bed in a room above the lobby, ran down stairs in a nightgown and fired several shots at Ross and Good, inflicting a slight wound on Good's hand.

The trials of the two men were held here and at Abilene. Both attracted nation-wide attention.

REGISTRATION CLIMBS

Total Is 7,600 Cars Now; Surpasses 1928

Registration of motor vehicles for this year are already within a few hundred of the total number of registrations for all of 1928, a check-up at the county tax collector's office revealed Tuesday afternoon. Passenger automobiles number 7,600 which is compared to about 9,000 during all of last year. Motor trucks now number 827, as compared to about 1,000 in 1928. There have been 1,665 transfers of automobiles recorded.
