Ice Coating Covers Sector On Tuesday

Freezing drizzle and mist began falling in Cross Plains Monday, and residents of the area awoke Tuesday morning to a slick glaze covering virtually everything.

Streets and highways were slick and travel was hampered for a while within the city and on highways through the city.

By noon most of the ice on city streets had disappeared, although temperatures had not risen above freezing but were hovering near the 32 degree mark. Thermometers showed low-twenty readings early Tuesday.

Cross Plains Schools dismissed classes for the day, and no first class mail was received by the post office here due to delayed deliveries, believed caused by the icy conditions on roadways.

Scheduled basketball games at Cross Plains High School were moved to Saturday night. Although the ice had caused some inconvenience, little actual damage was believed directly caused by the icy weather. Ice buildup on telephone and

power lines in the city was minor up to midafternoon Tuesday.

Reports reaching the newspaper office indicated that area weather forecasts were for a good chance of freezing rain in this section Tuesday night and on Wednesday. Temperatures were expected to be in the mid-20's Tuesday night.

Registration Underway For Upcoming Beef Referendum

The 1980 Beef Referendum vote will be held February 19-22 in the Callahan County ASCS office, according to Greg Gerngross, Callahan County Extension Agent at Baird.

Producers must register in order to be eligible to vote. Registration will be conducted in the county ASCS office through Wednesday, February 6. Any bonafide cattlemen regardless of age or number of cattle owned may register to vote, says Gerngross.

The 1976 Beef Research and Information Act authorizes a national program under which cattle producers would be assessed

to finance research and information activities designed to improve markets for cattle, beef and beef products.

According to the act, amended in 1978, for the order to become effective, at least 50 per cent of those registered to vote in the referendum and a majority of those voting must vote in favor of the order. Originally the act required approval by two-thirds of the registered producers voting. An order voted in 1977 was favored by 56.4 per cent of those voting and was not approved.

Assessments to finance the program at the rate of 20 cents per \$100 value would be made through a deduction by the buyer each time cattle are sold.

Beef producers not wishing to fund the program would have their assessment refunded upon request when accompanied by proof of payment.

Copies of the order was published in the December 4, 1979, Federal Register. Copies are available from the Callahan County Extension Office in Baird, according to Gerngross.
