'Water Rates' May Be Topic At Meeting

The oft-used phrase "summer water rates" might possibly turn what had been expected to be a rather "quite" City Commission meeting Monday evening into something else again.

The matter of summer rates will likely be brought up for discussion and possible action when the city fathers gather at City Hall Monday at 7 p. m., reports are.

Such reduced rates were tested last summer, and the city lost approximately \$1,800 per month during the three-month period, it is reported. However, feeling seems to be that special rates should be considered again for this year.

It is known that the commission is split in their feelings toward the reduced rate. How a vote on the matter might go isn't known at this time however.

The original rate was set up on the basis of the more water a consumer used, the cheaper it became.

The State Highway Department has invited contractors to submit bids by 9 a. m. June 17 on a major construction job on IH 20 in Eastland County from 1.5 miles east of Ranger to 3 miles west of the Erath County line, to be completed in 350 working days.

The job calls for grading, structures, flexible base and asphaltic concrete pavement and is to be completed under the supervision of engineer R. P. Haun of Eastland.

That virtually was the situation in Eastland County Thursday as two brothers were apprehended moments after an automobile was stolen in Eastland.

Glaucoma Screening Project Of Lions Clubs At Eastland Today

Today is the day you may take the first step toward saving your eyesight.

Take a few minutes this afternoon and be at the Eastland High School Gymnasium between 1 and 5:30 o'clock and have your eyes tested for glaucoma, "the sneak thief of sight."

The simple and painless test is free — and quick.

All area residents who are 40 years of age or over are urged to attend. All adults are welcome.

Sponsoring the Free Glaucoma Detection Screenings are the Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness and the Eastland, Cisco and Ranger Lions Clubs, in cooperation with the Eastland County Medical Society and local health departments.

Tests will be administered by members of the Eastland County Medical Society and Dr. James C. Whittington of Fort Worth, serving as a public service. The doctors will be assisted by local volunteer nurses.

The gym is located two blocks south of Main St. (Highway 80) on Ammerman Street.

Dr. B. B. Alexander of Eastland and Dr. Whittington will serve as medical chairman of the project. Mrs. Pauline Outland, Houston, executive director of the Texas Society for the Prevention of Blind-

ness, is in Eastland to assist in coordinating the program. Marcus S. O'Dell, president, Eastland Lions Club, Roy Benton, president, Cisco Lions Club, and David Allsup, Ranger Club president, said the test are aimed at tracking down unknown cases of glaucoma, one of the leading causes of blindness.

Signs suggesting chronic glaucoma are: Frequent changes of glasses, none of which is satisfactory. Inability to adjust the eyes to darkened rooms, such as theatres. Loss of side vision. Blurred or foggy vision. Rainbow-colored rings around lights.

"Keep in mind," Dr. Alexander says, "that having any

of these symptoms does not necessarily mean a person has glaucoma. They may be caused by some other less serious eye trouble. On the other hand, these symptoms might not even be present, and yet you could have early glaucoma."

The test is simple. An instrument called a tonometer is placed against the eye and registers the pressure inside the eyeball. An abnormal pressure reading marks a possible case of glaucoma. In the latter case, the person is urged to seek medical care by an eye specialist for further tests to determine whether the disease is present.

The Club sponsors the event annually, publicizing and encouraging citizens to "clean-up," and get rid of trash. The city cooperates by running special garbage pickup schedules.

"There's no two ways about it," Mr. Deaton said, "This year's campaign is a big success and our city is prettier because of it."

BROWSING with BEV.....

How were your tulips and hyacinths this year? If you didn't get as many large blooms as usual, they probably need replanting. A few small flowers are a sign of overcrowding.

Wait until the leaves turn yellow before digging the bulbs. To be sure they are ready, uncover a few without disturbing them. The bulb coat should be light brown.

Keep the bulbs out of direct sunlight, particularly just after digging. Spread them in shallow trays and dry them in an airy, shaded spot.

When the outer scales are dry, move the bulbs to a cool,

dry, dimly lit area — your garage or cellar. Be sure not to leave any soil on the bulbs during storage. Check them at least once a week and remove any bulbs that are rot or diseased.

In early fall — when the bulbs are dry — separate those that have formed clumps. But don't forcibly tear apart any that are not dry.

Plant the bulbs no later than September in the North and late October in the South. You can plant tulips and hyacinths until January in areas where the ground is not frozen, but you get better results from

an earlier planting.

If you have fretted about the storage problem created by tall cereal packages, here's some welcome news. Look for changes by the major manufacturers of ready-to-eat cereal in the coming months. They'll be re-designed for storage convenience.

Consumers and grocers have found the tall packages difficult to shelve efficiently. In fact, they have stored the packages flat in many instances.

Forty-one per cent of the ready-to-eat cereal volume of one billion pounds sold annually by major processors is in packages more than 10 1/2 inches high. These packages are too tall to fit most kitchen cabinet shelves, and many consumers reported that the height discouraged them from buying the larger cereal sizes.

Making '80' Tourist Attractive Discussed By Cisco - Eastland

Developing the nine-mile stretch of highway between Eastland and Cisco was subject for discussion when representatives of the two towns met in Cisco Wednesday.

Members of the two towns' chamber highway committees met at the Cisco chamber office with Leo Phagan of Cisco presiding.

The group asked that Cisco Manager Tom Stevenson contact other towns which have faced similar conditions and determine what had been done that effectively attracted traffic off the "by-passes" and into town.

During the meeting, various suggestions were made concerning the creation of an attraction of the between-towns highway. Landscaping was mentioned as was the building of such things as a "boom town," a "coal mine," and other ideas. Both Eastland and Cisco will each have two interchanges into and off the Interstate Highway, and the one being asked for between the two towns has not been approved it was announced.

The men agreed that traffic "pulled off" the highway at either town, will most likely stay on the old U.S. 80 through the other town before returning to the interstate road.

This particular nine-mile stretch is unique in its advantages, all agreed. Actually the old highway (present 80) is shorter than the planned Interstate between the two towns — by .35 of a mile, the exact figure likely would not be used in advertising the "old" and "short" routes.

It was also suggested that present tourist attractions (including Cisco's dam, large swimming pool and golf course and Eastland's Old Rip, the three lakes, modern theater and bowling facility) be exploited.

Utilizing the recreation idea, one party suggested that a general theme might be "Twin Cities of Fun."

The advantages of working together to stimulate traffic on the present highway between the two towns would at the same time serve as a magnet for industry, possibly resulting in the realization of an

industrial park between the two which would enhance the economic status of the entire area, it was also suggested by another member.

The two committees will meet individually during the next weeks and then huddle together again in about a month, Mr. Phagan announced.
