NEFF IS NAMED RAILROAD CHAIRMAN

FORMER CHIEF EXECUTIVE IS CHOSEN TODAY

GILMORE'S POST WILL BE FILLED BY WACO POLITICIAN

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Oct. 14.—Pat M. Neff of Waco, former governor, today was named chairman of the State Railroad Commission to succeed Clarence E. Gilmore, who died Thursday.

Neff is a former member of the United States board of railroad mediation. He was appointed by President Coolidge.

He was governor for two terms, from January, 1921, to January, 1925. While the state's chief executive, he appointed Dan Moody, now governor, as district attorney.

Governor Moody, who announced the appointment, said Neff would assume his new duties as soon as practicable.

President Coolidge selected Neff for a second term on the mediation board, but the senate had not confirmed the appointment when the Coolidge administration ended and former Governor O. B. Colquitt was chosen for the place by President Hoover.

Neff had been mentioned as a likely candidate for a third term as governor, especially if former United States Senator Earle B. Mayfield should enter the race. Mayfield earlier opposed Neff's reappointment to the federal mediation body.

LAMAR, Colo., Oct. 14 (P).—The case of Howard L. Royston, charged with murder in connection with the robbery of the First National Bank at Lamar in 1928 and the fatal shooting of the bank's president, is called in court here today.

A battle loomed over selection of jury to determine whether he was guilty of first or second degree murder, but the jury may find a way degree, and will decide on imprisonment or hanging.

George M. Abshire last week was and guilty of first degree murder sentenced to hang by a jury.

Abshire, third member of the Barker-Karpis gang, next goes on trial.

CIRCUS ELEPHANT MUST PAY WITH HIS LIFE FOR CRUSHING WOMAN

(By Associated Press)
BAY CITY, Oct. 14 (P).—Black Diamond, the killer elephant, lay trussed in his death cell today, his little eyes aglow with a jungle lust to kill and his heavy chains a clanking badge of shame, while his owners, the operators of a circus, already ordered to take his life, deliberated on the method they would use to carry out the death sentence.

Sometime tomorrow or the next day, while the circus is pushing along toward its next stand, Black Diamond, who Saturday dashed Mrs. Eva Donohue, 52, of Kereks, to death and seriously injured his former trainer, either will be shot or strangled by his own kind. It first was planned to execute the nine-ton slayer today, but circus officials later decided the attempt might endanger life in town and would have to be postponed until some thinly settled countryside could be reached.

If in pursuance of a strange variant of the Mosaic laws—a life for a life—the method of strangulation is used, three of Black Diamond's elephantine companions will be hatched to one end of a huge chain and three to the other. Black Diamond's huge neck caught in a lethal snipnet in the center. The powerful lunge of the lumbering executioners would put an end to the killer quickly.

Should rifles be employed the job will have even less fanfare. Tent men simply will "let him have it" in a vital spot, dig a great grave and push the bulk in with levers.

Black Diamond's crime occurred Saturday at Corsicana. For some reason he became stirred with rage, dashed out of his quarters, swamped Mrs. Donohue in his great trunk and smashed out her life. Then he turned on his ex-master, H. D. Prickett, 38, also of Kereks, tossing him, broken, nearly 30 feet.

BORGER COURT OPENS TODAY

JUDICIAL ARM STARTS WORK IN OIL TOWN CRIME PROBE

(By Associated Press)
BORGER, Oct. 14.—The judicial arm of government over-shadowed the executive in Borger today for the first time since the assassination Sept. 13 of District Attorney John A. Holmes as the district court session opened to consider an over-laden criminal docket and the grand jury met to fix blame, if possible, for this turbulent town's most recent misdeeds.

District Attorney Clem Calhoun, appointed by Governor Moody to carry on a battle for law enforcement here after Holmes had been shot from ambush, had before him the voluminous record of a military court of inquiry which had been kept under powers of martial law, to outline the criminal background responsible for Borger's lawlessness. From this mass of evidence, he planned to select everything convincing enough to warrant indictment and place it before the grand jury.

Has 100 Criminal Cases
The district court, in addition to an overwhelming docket of civil cases, has 100 criminal cases.

Death Threat Made Against Grand Duke

BOSTON, Oct. 14 (P).—A police guard was established about the suite of the Grand Duke Alexander Michailovich at the Ritz Carlton hotel here today while detectives endeavored to trace a telephoned threat against his life.

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FALL CHARGED IN FEIGNING HIS ILLNESS

SENATOR HEFLIN SAYS FORMER OFFICIAL DEFIES COURTS

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Oct. 14.—Albert B. Fall was accused in the senate today by Senator Heflin, democrat, Alabama, with "feigning sickness" at his trial on charges of bribery.

Heflin asserted Fall had "pulled off a sickening, revolting stunt" in the court room and then had refused to permit Dr. Sterling Ruffin, whom the court had appointed to examine him to ascertain the cause of the illness.

"The whole thing stinks," Heflin shouted.

He recalled that Fall as one of a committee of senators who called on President Wilson to determine his condition "had quarreled with Ruffin at that time and added:

"Here he comes after having evaded trial time and time again, feigning an attack of illness, defies the court and rejects the physician."

The president, he added, "ought to clean out the courts."

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RUSSIANS MAY HOP ATLANTIC

FOUR SOVIET FLIERS LAND IN SEATTLE FROM MOSCOW

(By Associated Press)
SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 14.—Safe in Seattle after a hazardous flight from Moscow, four Russian aviators today disclosed they were considering a trans-Atlantic flight as a sequel to their present undertaking to be completed when they reach New York.

Worn out by a 1,000 mile flight from Waterfall, Alaska, during which their plane, "Land of the Soviets," battled a 35 mile an hour head wind, the four aviators reached here at dusk yesterday. As they rested from the trip, S. A. Shestakov, chief pilot of the plane, revealed a hop across the Atlantic which was under consideration.

If the Russians cross the Atlantic they expect to continue on to Moscow from the west by air, thus making a round the world flight.

The hop from Waterfall took 10 hours and 10 minutes. Navigator Boris V. Sterlingov said. Most of the way the ship cleared the waves at an elevation of only 15 feet because of fog and headwinds.

Property Owners On Avenue U Ask Relief

Property owners are appealing this morning for temporary relief from a hazardous condition on Avenue U between Thirteenth and Fourteenth streets, a block of unpaved street which was inundated during the week end rains and which has been almost impassable.

The block has been under water and extremely muddy since the heavy rain Friday night.

City officials announced this morning that nothing could be done at present to alleviate the condition, but stated that the proposal for drainage system would eliminate the recurrence of a similar situation.

MacDonald Leaves For Canada Today

NEW YORK, Oct. 14 (P).—Premier J. Ramsay MacDonald of Great Britain bade New York adieu today and departed on a special train over the New York Central railroad en route to Canada, where he will confer with Premier MacKenzie King.

Retreated somewhat from his two days of comparative rest, following his arduous official visits in Washington and New York, the British Premier and his daughter, Miss Isabel, were driven to the Grand Central terminal from their hotel.

They were greeted by a large crowd. A squad of motorcycle police, sirens screaming, formed an escort.

FLEAS FLEE FROM SUN TAN FAD

MUNICH, Oct. 14 (P).—The flea pest of Europe for centuries, is rapidly dying out, says Dr. H. Loeb, a Munich dermatologist, and the fad for sun tan is entitled to at least part of the credit. The balance, he says, should be charged to fresh air and bathing beaches.

Even in southern countries, the doctor says, it has been observed that under the influence of sun the human skin acquires properties that are obnoxious, if not injurious, to the flea. He even goes so far as to predict that in a few years the pestiferous insect may become of rare as to become an inmate of museums.

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SANTA FE IS SEEKING NEW RAIL ROUTES

APPLICATION IS MADE FOR 380 MILES OF LINES IN AREA

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Oct. 14.—The three subsidiaries of the Atchafalaya and Santa Fe railroad today filed applications with the Interstate Commerce Commission to construct new railroad lines aggregating 380 miles in Colorado, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Texas.

In one application, the Elkhart and Santa Fe railway asked the commission's authorization for the building of 149 miles of line in Oklahoma and New Mexico. The line would extend from Cimarron County, Okla., into Colfax and Union counties, New Mexico. One branch of 39 miles to be built would run from a point on the south line of Cimarron county into northwesterly direction into Boise City, Okla., and the other proposed line would extend from Felt, Okla., southwest through Cimarron county and into New Mexico via Clayton, N. M., terminating at Colmar, N. M., a station on the Santa Fe railroad.

FILM MAGNATE PLANS ESTABLISHMENT OF "TALKIES" THROUGHOUT THE U. S.

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, Oct. 14.—A program for the expenditure of \$9,000,000 during the next 25 years to put talking pictures into every school room, church and home in the country was announced today by William Fox, motion picture producer and theatre owner.

Mr. Fox said a system of visual education made possible by films would cut the present six-hour school day in half.

"We shall try to install a talking picture projection machine in every class room in the country," he said. "We shall get the best available persons to record a series of lectures on celluloid and distribute them widespread."

"On the theory that every man, woman and child will be a finer citizen if a God-fearing one," he continued, "we shall make talking pictures of the great religious leaders to be shown on screens in every church."

Fox predicted his plan would cause the 15,000,000 church seats in the country to be filled each Sunday where now fifteen per cent of them are vacant. He said his plan for films in schools would permit 15,000,000 to 20,000,000 school children to spend more time out of doors when the sun was at its height.

TARIFF VOTE IS SEEN FOR NEAR FUTURE

SENATE LEADERS STUDY MEANS OF ENDING DEBATE TODAY

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Oct. 14.—Senate leaders, gathering to work out means of ending tariff debate, were confronted today with a solution, which as its author, Borah of Idaho, claimed would bring the measure to a final vote within ten days.

His plan, however, was one to which Chairman Smoot of the finance committee and other republican sponsors of the bill could hardly agree; for Borah called for rewriting the measure "in accordance with the purpose for which the special session was called."

Strength Shown
Regardless of the time it takes, he said, republican independents, who in combination with the democratic membership have already shown their strength in tariff matters, are determined to stick doggedly to their task of producing a tariff bill they consider "fair to the agricultural interest."

THREE DIE AS PLANE CATCHES ON FIRE; STUNTING FATAL

LAKE PROVIDENCE, La., Oct. 14.—Three plane suddenly becoming a flying inferno, a pilot and two passengers were burned to death here yesterday as they crashed 2,000 feet to earth.

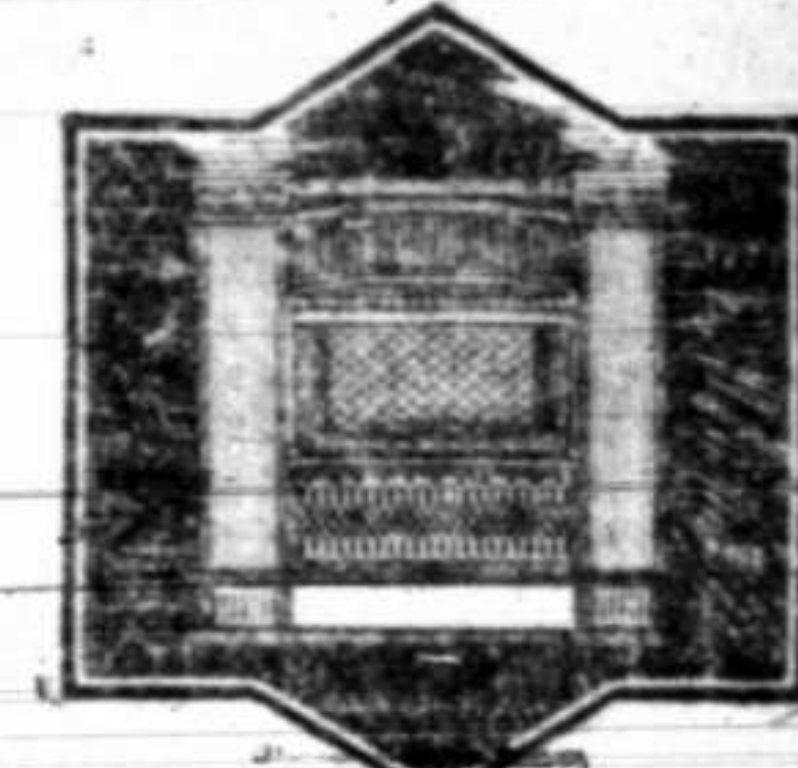
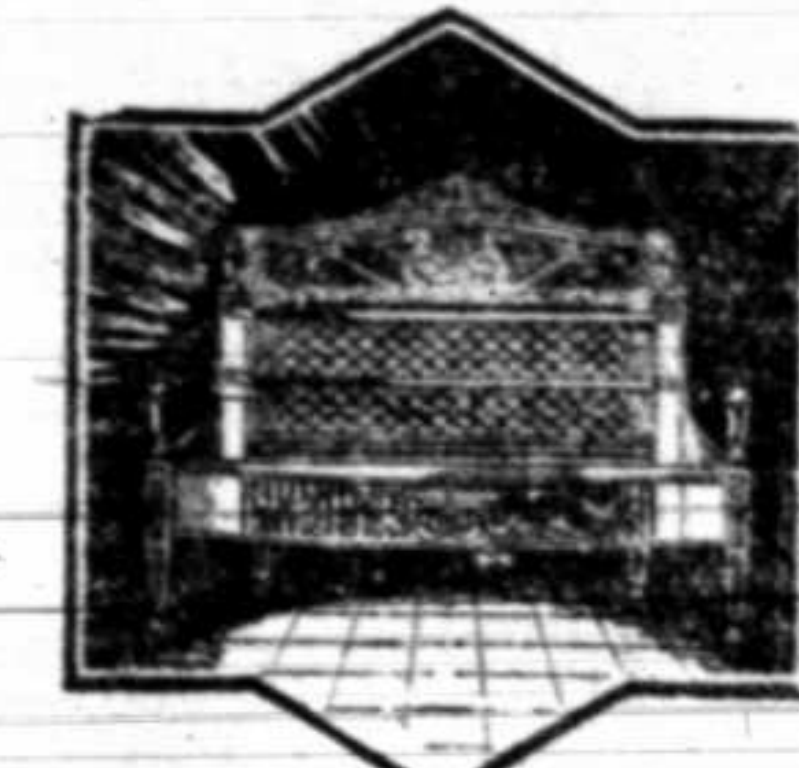

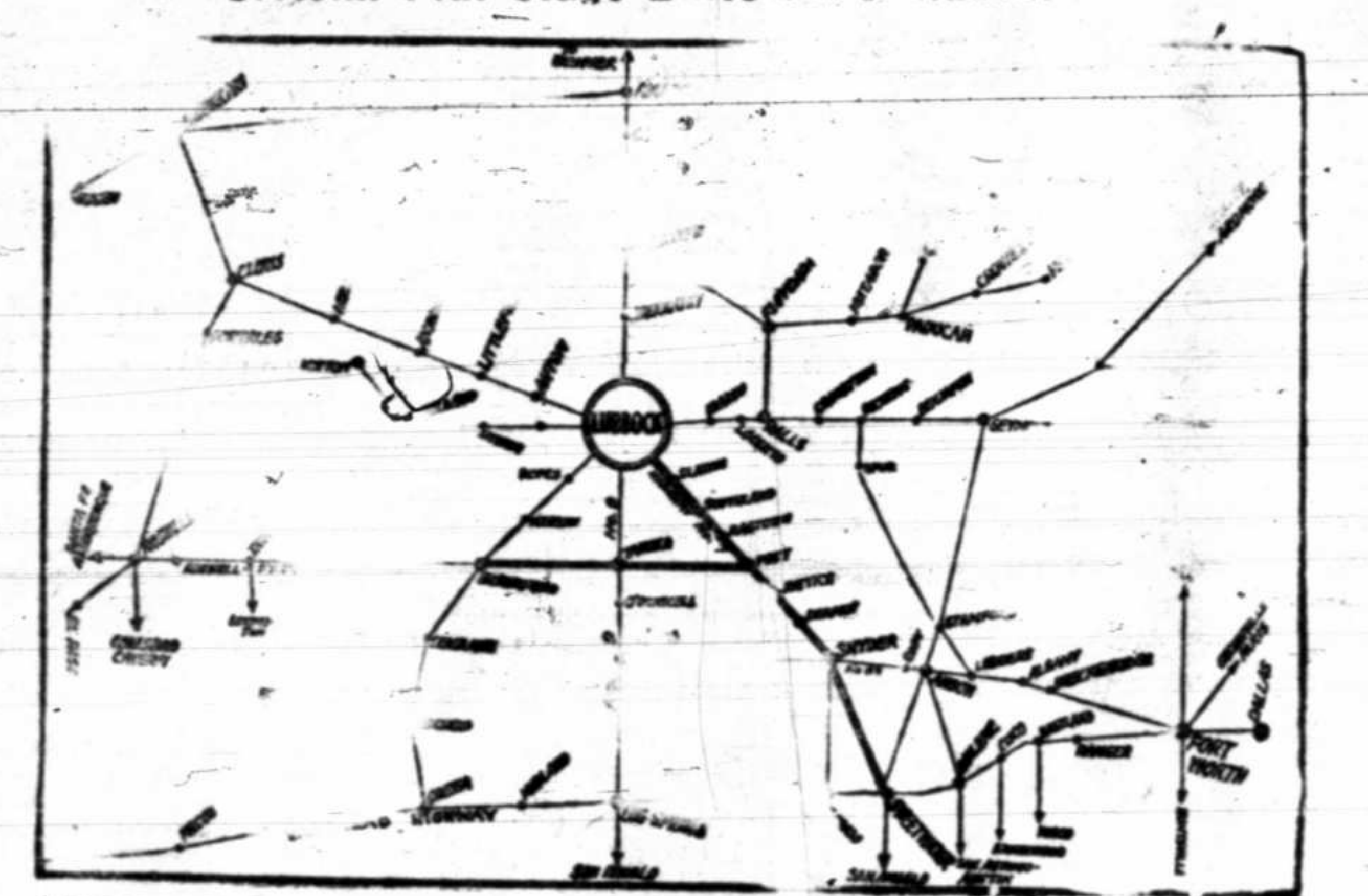

DRY MOVE IS GIVEN DOUBT

ANTI-SALOON OFFICIALS SAYS AMENDMENT IS INCONSTITUTIONAL

(By Associated Press)

ATLANTA, Ga., Oct. 14.—Dr. Arthur J. Barton, chairman of the national executive committee of the Anti-Saloon League of America, said he doubts the constitutionality of the proposed amendment to the prohibition law which would make the purchaser equally guilty with the seller.

Dr. Barton, who also is president of the national conference of organizations supporting the Eighteenth amendment and chairman of the commission of social service of the Southern Baptist convention said: "I do not know of any general demand among the dry organizations and leaders for such an amendment. I doubt whether such an amendment would be constitutional, and I fear that the introduction of the amendment at the present time is untimely and unfortunate."

Dr. Barton said it was his opinion that convictions under the proposed amendment would be impossible.

"A fundamental principle and a specific provision of the constitution of the United States is that no man can be forced to testify against himself," he said. "This being true, if the seller and the buyer should be made equally guilty it would be a practical impossibility to get evidence and to secure convictions."

As Simmons batted, a drive on the roof himself, not far from the spot where he passed one to start the seventh.

PUREBRED HEREFORD IS DONATED TO TEXAS TECH BY STAMFORD BREEDER

A purebred Hereford heifer, winner of grand champion honors at the Northwest Texas fair at Spur last week, is the newest member of the Texas Technological college herd of blooded Herefords, a gift to the institution from R. V. Colbert, ex-president of the American Hereford Breeders association and one of the most prominent breeders of purebred Herefords in the southwest.

Colbert operates ranches in Jones and Dickens counties, with headquarters at Stamford. He is intensely interested in Texas Tech's development of its Hereford herd and is highly desirous to see it built up. He had previously given a Hereford cow to the college that he won in her class at the 1925 and the 1926 Southwest Fair Stock Show, at Fort Worth.

Returns From Fair
Announcement of Colbert's gift was made here Saturday by Prof. W. L. Stangel, head of the department of animal husbandry at Tech, upon his return from the fair at Spur, where he went to officiate as one of the judges.

The heifer which Colbert donated is by a son of Superior Mississippian, which animal was sold in the Douglas Bros. sale, in Nebraska for \$22,000, and is out of Level Six, a granddaughter of Domino and Beau President, outstanding bulls of the Hereford breed.

The Tech Hereford herd now is composed of six cows, three calves and one bull, the foundation herd having been made up of other donations from John Gist, of Odessa; J. C. Ivey, and Henry Wilkinson, of Hereford; George Boles of Lubbock; J. C. McNeil, of Spur, and R. E. Dickson, of Spur.

One Hurt In Duel In Coleman Saturday

COLEMAN, Oct. 14 (AP).—A. Boyd Moneyhun and Dennis Lykins engaged in a brief duel with pistols in the main hall of Coleman Saturday afternoon crowd here but Lykins, whose leg was broken, was the only person injured.

Moneyhun was arrested and charged with assault to murder. He made bond of \$2,500. Lykins was taken to the hospital suffering from three bullet wounds in the leg, one of which broke the bone.

cases had nine murder indictments to dispose of and more than 100 criminal cases, with prospects that the grand jury would augment this list.

Although chief interest still centered in the question of whether the grand jury would return an indictment in the Holmes slaying, and for the killing of three peace officers, the settling of dates for trial of other important cases was of interest also. Chief among these was the case against "Whitey" Walker, famous desperado recently returned from Colorado to face trial for the killing of three peace officers. Although officers searched Walker carefully when they brought him from Colorado, a .25 calibre automatic was found strapped to his leg when he arrived at jail here. Since then he has been carefully guarded. He is regarded as the most dangerous criminal in the jail, and his trial will be attended by capacity crowds. He is wanted in Oklahoma on criminal charges.

There was little hope that District Judge E. J. Pickett would be able to clear the docket at this session. Calhoun announced he would not seek to have criminal cases transferred from this county and would push all through to trial at the earliest possible moment.

The grand jury was the first formally summoned investigation body this district had had. Previous grand juries had been called together without the formality of a jury commission. Shortly before Holmes' assassination he had obtained appointment of a jury commission to select a grand jury. Texas Rangers continued to fer-

ret out lawbreakers today, and the rigors of martial law were unabated despite activity of the court. Governor Moody has indicated he has no intention of calling off his soldiers until most of the county and city officials have resigned, or been removed. Rangers have charged repeatedly that crime here has had official connivance in several cases.

gas fields, as well as linking Colorado points and Gulf ports by a shorter route. The proposed line would extend from the railroad's existing terminal at Amarillo, and would run northerly through Potter, Moore, Sherman and Dallam counties, via Dumas to Stratford for a distance of 88 miles and then for 50 additional miles a line would be built beginning at Dumas and extending northeast through Moore, Hutchinson and Hansford counties, Texas, to Spearman, on the North Texas and Santa Fe railway.

The Dodge City and Cimarron valley railway company submitted a third application for an 83 miles extending for the south line of Baca county, Colo., northwesterly through Baca and Bent counties via Prochett to Los Animas, Bent county, on the Santa Fe railway.

This proposed line was needed, according to the application to furnish service to agricultural sections in two counties and to make a shorter line between Colorado points and Gulf ports.

Freight Service On Mississippi Asked

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14 (AP).—The Mississippi Valley Barge Line company of St. Louis today applied to the interstate commerce commission for permission to transport freight by boat and barge between Cincinnati and New Orleans and points between these two cities.

The application said it planned to start a bi-weekly service by water about February 1.

More Tourists Visit Parks During Season

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14 (AP).—A quarter of a million more people yielded to the yearning for the wide open spaces this past summer than ever before. The department of interior reported today a total of 3,248,264 persons, 223,420 more than last year, visited national parks and monuments during the year ended September 30.

Lattimore Upholds Occupation Tax Rule

FORT WORTH, Oct. 14 (AP).—Judge Hal S. Lattimore of ninety-sixth district court Saturday upheld the present state law in regard to the occupation tax on theaters, when he denied the request of fifteen Fort Worth play houses for an injunction which would have prevented collection of the tax.

The restraining order was asked by a group of the smaller downtown and suburban shows, commonly known as the "second-run" theaters.

Chicagoan Is Found Murdered On Road

HAMMOND, Ind., Oct. 14 (AP).—His refusal to make a cash settlement on a girl he had presumably wronged was believed by police today to have motivated the slaying last night of Attilio Fanello, South Chicago baker, whose body was found early today beside a little used road near here. Fanello had been shot six times.

A note, bearing a Kenosha, Wis. postmark, was found in Fanello's coat. Part of it read: "You got the girl into trouble—now come through with the money or something will happen."

ENGLAND HAS AIRSHIP NOW

DIRIGIBLE R-101 GOES
UP SATURDAY; WILL
CARRY 100 PEOPLE

(By Associated Press)
CARDINGTON, Eng., Oct. 14.—Great Britain's 100 passenger dirigible R-101, which has been subjected to cross winds of criticism almost since the time it was decided to build her five years ago, was finally launched Saturday in perfect calm and was moored to her mast expertly.

There was not a single hitch in the launching and "if the airship has any weakness suggested in recent criticism, they were not apparent to the cheering spectators as the craft soared a few minutes before being pulled by the nose to the mast."

Gets "Dry-Cleaning"
A slight wind rising after the morning was welcomed as an aid to "dry-cleaning" the big ship which in her long months of construction accumulated tons of dust not to mention cobwebs.

Lieutenant-Colonel V. C. Richmond, the ship's designer, estimated that one ton of dust from the top of the ship alone would be blown away by Monday when her trial flight is scheduled. The R-101 is a floating apartment house. Telephone jingle: "The folks upstairs" are heard talking; there is heard walking back and forth in the numerous rooms concealed inside the bag, and even conversations in various parts of the ship can be plainly heard. The plywood floors of the two passenger decks apparently serve as sounding boards.

Like an up to date apartment hotel the ship is even connected by way of the mast with a nearby exchange capable of putting her through direct to New York on transatlantic telephone. She even has a number—Bedford 2295.

James R. Clarke Is Victim Of Illness
