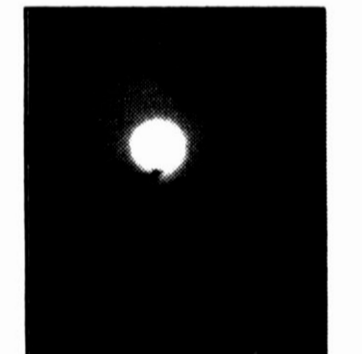

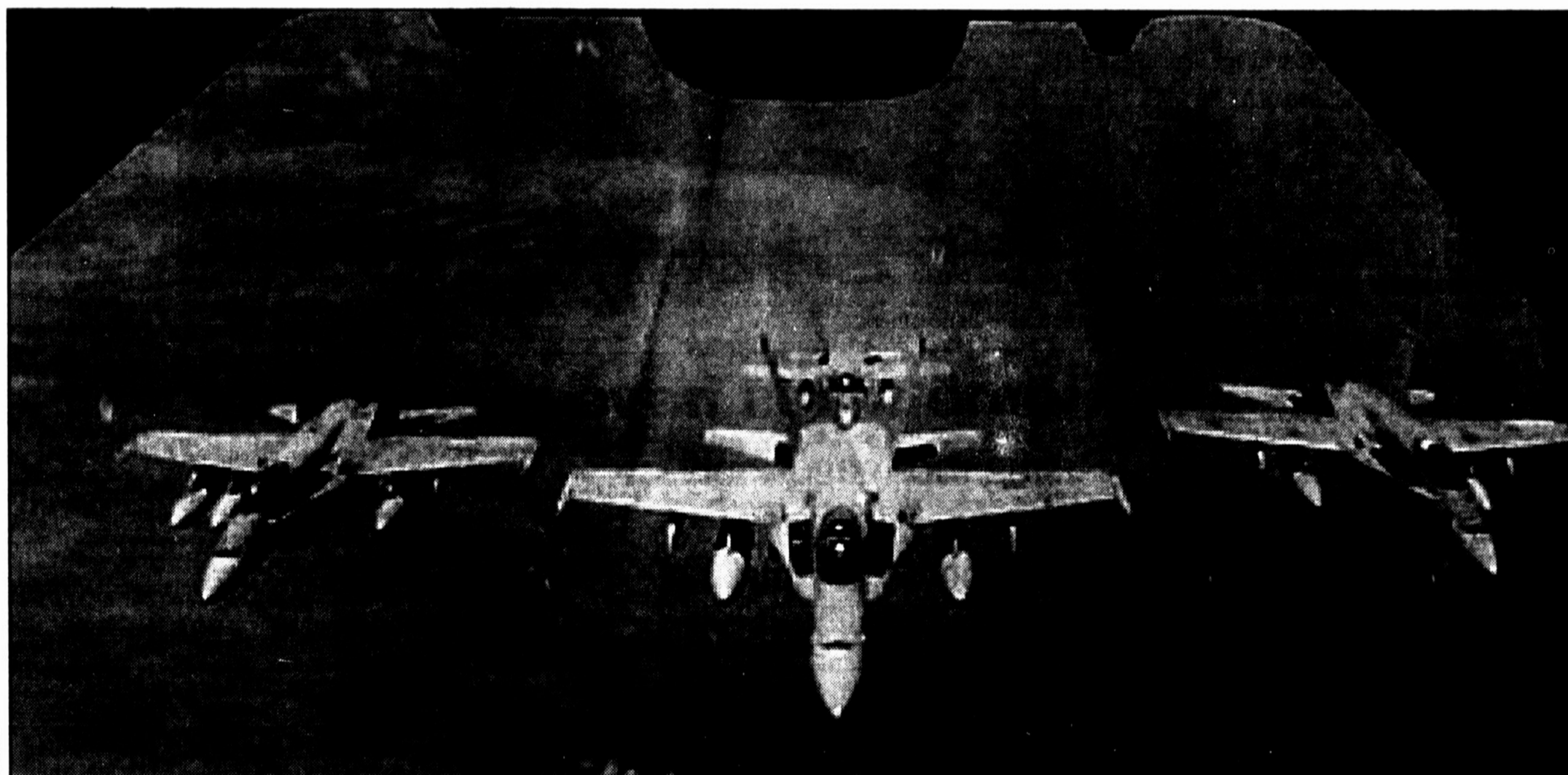

## Paetzold takes off in career

are more dynamic, but not as

Along about the end of May, high school seniors dream of moving the tassel from the left to right and then taking off into the wild blue yonder, at least figuratively if not literally.

Kevin Paetzold, a 1989 Hereford High graduate, decided to take the literal approach and joined the naval ROTC at Texas Tech University.

Paetzold kept his feet pretty much on Earth while working towards a bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering, but with fliers in his family, he pretty much already had his head in the clouds.

As part of his ROTC contract, he chose a Marine option and entered the Marine Corps as a second lieutenant with an aviation billet. That is, he was planning on flying if he could.

Paetzold said like all new officers he had to go through six months of basic officer training before he ever got a chance at flying.

"I had to pass tests with certain scores, had to be physically fit, and I couldn't get sick in the plane," Paetzold said with a wide grin.

"One thing about going with

the Marines is they don't want a lot of experience," he said. "They will teach you everything."

"First, we learned the basics - the parts of the plane, the nomenclature, aerodynamics, flight rules. That took six weeks. And, you had to pass each test with an 85 percent or higher," Paetzold said.

From his basic classes, Paetzold was off on the first leg of what he hopes to be along in-air career.

Military training has taken him to Pensacola, Fla., where he spent six months with an instructor sitting behind him in a prop plane. "That's where you get your first solo."

His first introduction to the world of jets came when he opted for a jet slot at the Naval Air Station in Meridian, Miss. There he flew T-2 Buckeyes and learned the formation and gunning patterns.

Paetzold said the Buckeyes

agile and quick as jets.

He received his wings on March 7, 1996, signed an eight-year contract with the Marine Corps, and then went to Kingsville to fly T-45 Goshawks, the next step in flying his dream plane -- the F-18.

"Each place I was trained and certified in another class of jet. Each one taking me closer to flying the best there is," he said.

At Kingsville, he practiced

more systems, faster starts, and some air combat maneuvers.

Paetzold finally traveled to El Toro, Calif., and flew the F-18 Hornet in day and night maneuvers.

"The F-18 is the best there is," he said. "I know it won't be in 10 years, but right now, there is nothing like it."

When he says it is a rush to get catapulted from the deck of a carrier, he knows what he's talking about.

"F-18s can reach 135 knots in 2.7 seconds from catapult," he said.

A knot equals about 1.15 statute miles, meaning at catapult Paetzold and his craft are traveling at 155.25 miles per hour. And that was reached in less than three seconds.

"Carnival rides can't compare," he said.

F-18s do all the rolls and turns as well as the air-to-air and air-to-ground combat maneuvers.

Paetzold, now a captain, is stationed at Marine Corps Air Station Iwakuni in Japan where he is completing the first year of a three-year tour.

"It's taken me all over the world. I've been in Hawaii, Alaska, South Korea and I just got back from Australia. I

just missed my 10-year-class reunion," he said.

"I can't believe I get paid for having this much fun," he said. "Carnival rides are nothing compared to the rush you get when you fly one of these big jets."

It's not all fun and games, though. Flying jets is serious business.

During a training mission, Paetzold and another pilot were involved in a mid-air accident, which forced Paetzold to eject from his plane.

"It was one of those things that happened. We were close to make the pass and the other pilot was able to land. I wasn't."

Paetzold's craft went down in the Sea of Japan and he was grounded for six weeks until an investigation could be completed.

"Mom cried when she heard," Paetzold said. "But, flying is not really dangerous if you do it right."

The thrill of Paetzold's job is only a small part of his day. He spends 10 or more hours each day taking care of routine duties of scheduling and organizing flights and practice sessions as well as doing the ever-popular paperwork.

"It's part of the job. I like to fly as much as I can and I hope to do it as long as I can.

## Acclaimed author to attend the festival

An award-winning novelist will be among the special guests this week at the High Plains Book Festival.

The festival will be Thursday-Saturday, with most of the activities to be held at the Amarillo Civic Center, 4th and Buchanan streets.

Elmer Kelton, author of more than 80 books, which critics say include some of the finest ever written about Texas, will be signing copies of his books at noon Saturday at the Hastings Entertainment booth in the civic center.

Kelton was born in 1926 on the Five Wells Ranch in Andrews County and grew

up on the McElroy Ranch near Crane. He served in World War and later would marry Austrian native Anna Lipp. He would earn a degree in journalism at the University of Texas at Austin.

As a journalist, he worked as agricultural reporter for the San Angelo Standard-Times, as editor of the Sheep and Goat Raisers magazine, and served as associate editor of The Live Stock Weekly in San Angelo until his retirement in 1991.

As a self-described "part-time novelist" until his retire-

ment, Kelton has received the Western Heritage Award from the Cowboy Hall of Fame, the Levi Strauss Golden Saddleman Award from the Western Writers of America and six Western Writers' Spur awards for the best Western novel of the year.

Among his most popular books are "Buffalo Wagons," "The Day the Cowboys Quit," "The Time It Never Rained," "Eye of the Hawk," "Slaughter" and "The Far Canyon."

Another Kelton novel, "The Good Ole Boys," was made into a television movie for the TNT cable network, with Texas actors Tommy Lee Jones and Sissy Spacek in the starring roles.

## Tax abatement hearing slated

A public hearing on Top of Texas Inc.'s tax abatement application will be conducted at 6 p.m. Monday in the county courtroom at Deaf Smith County Courthouse, 235 E. 3rd.

The hearing will be conducted by the Hereford Independent School District, City of Hereford and Deaf Smith County.

The county Tax Abatement Board voted unanimously Sept. 16 to recommend approval of the five-year, 50-percent abatement request.

The public hearing on the abatement request is required before the taxing entities make their decisions.

Top of Texas, a feed mill equipment supply and erector company that has been named

one of the nation's top 100 small businesses by Entrepreneur magazine, plans to expand its current facility. It is requesting a five-year, 50 percent tax abatement. The minimum amount of money to request for an abatement is \$250,000. Top of Texas Inc. exceeds that amount.

Max Middleton of Top of Texas Inc. said recently the expansion will cost "upwards of a million dollars."

After hearing the request, the board voted unanimously to recommend approval of the request. The board members are County Judge Tom Simons and Johnny Latham, the two county representatives; Roger Eades and Carey Black, two city representatives; Carolyn Waters and Mark Landrum,

## Home sales have record year

## Rising mortgages only dampens Americans desire of ownership

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rising mortgage rates dampened Americans' demand for existing homes and pushed sales down in August, but sales still are headed toward another record year.

Sales of existing single-family homes decreased by 2.8 percent in August to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 5.25 million units, the National Association of Realtors said Friday. It was the second monthly decline after sales hit an all-time high of annualized high of 5.63 million in June.

Despite August's decrease, association officials said they expect existing homes sales to post another record year in 1999. Last year's record was 4.97 million units.

The 5.25 million rate of existing home sales in August is about 9.2 percent higher than the sales level in August 1998, the association said.

August's sales level was the lowest since May when an annual rate of 5 million units were sold. The 2.8 percent decline in August followed a 4 percent drop in July sales after the June record.

The bite in August's sales came mainly from rising mortgage rates, economists said.

"The dampening in growth was due to higher mortgage rates, but it's going to take much higher mortgage rates to really slow down the strong housing market," said economist Clifford Waldman of Waldman Associates in Arlington, Va.

## Cal-Maine purchases Texas egg farm

JACKSON, Miss. (AP) — Cal-Maine Foods Inc., the largest producer of eggs in the United States, will acquire most of the assets of Smith Farms Inc. of Flatonia, Texas.

Financial terms of the deal were not disclosed. Fred Adams Jr., Cal-Maine's chairman and CEO, said Wednesday the purchase includes most of Smith Farms' egg business in Texas and Arkansas.

The deal also includes 3.9 million laying hens and growing pullets, two feed mills, two egg production facilities in Texas, an egg production complex in Searcy, Ark., and feed and egg delivery equipment.

"We have ... been acquiring some other companies in similar business to ours, so this is the latest of the 10 acquisitions we have made in the last nine years," said Adams, who founded Cal-Maine in 1969. "The closing is anticipated to be Sept. 30, so it will take us through the end of the first quarter of our fiscal year."

## Former students testify against TAAS

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — Two former students suing the state over use of an exit-level academic skills test have testified the exam did not reflect what they were taught in school.

Their testimony came in a federal court case centering around the high school version of the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills test, which students must pass before receiving a diploma.

Plaintiffs in the case argue the test, implemented in 1990, discriminates against minorities. They want Texas banned from requiring students to pass the TAAS test before getting a diploma.

"It was something totally different from what we were learning in class," said Rhonda Boozer, 25, of Fort Worth. "I'm good at doing the work in class, but when it comes to tests, I'm not that good at testing."

Ms. Boozer and Mark Garza, 20, of San Antonio testified Thursday before U.S. District Judge Ed Prado.

The Mexican American Legal Defense and Educational Fund filed the lawsuit on behalf of Hispanic education groups and black and Latino students who did not pass the test.

Ms. Boozer, who is black, took the exit-level TAAS test five times but did not pass the

average rate on a 30-year fixed-rate mortgage was 7.94 percent in August, up from 7.63 percent in July and 6.92 percent in August of 1998, the association said, citing figures from Freddie Mac, the mortgage company.

"Recent jumps in interest rates, coupled with the fact that many consumers spend August vacationing rather than home shopping, are factors that will typically impact sales," said the association's president, Sharon Millett.

The Federal Reserve increased short-term interest rates twice this summer in an effort to slow the economy and keep inflation in check.

The national median sales price for existing homes rose 5.3 percent in August over the corresponding month a year ago to a record \$137,700, the association said. The median is the point at which half the homes sell for less and half sell for more.

Fred Flick, the association's vice president of economic research, attributed the increase in the median home price to strong demand, a healthy economy and a 29-year-low unemployment rate. "People can afford to pay," he said.

Sales in the West took the biggest hit, falling 12.1 percent in August to an annual rate of 1.31 million units. Sales also were down in the South, by 1 percent to an annual rate of 2.05 million units last month.

Sales were flat in the Midwest, unchanged at an annual rate of 1.18 million units. Sales were up in the Northeast by 7.6 percent in August to an annual rate of 710,000 units.

The association's figures follow a government report last week that said construction of new homes and apartments rose 0.4 percent in August, leaving analysts marveling at the continued strength in housing despite rising mortgage rates.

Maine a 20 percent boost in its production and market capacity. Cal-Maine is the largest producer and distributor of fresh shell eggs in the United States.

Cal-Maine had net income of \$5.08 million during the last fiscal year.

On Wall Street, investors reacted to news of the acquisition quietly as shares of the company remained steady at 4-1/4 most of the day. Cal-Maine is traded on the NASDAQ under the symbol CALM.

Adams said acquiring Smith Farms would enable Cal-Maine to expand its services to a wider array of customers, 70 percent of which are commercial grocery store chains; the remaining 30 percent include institutional users such as hotels, restaurants and nursing homes.

Cal-Maine has 1,600 workers in its operations across the Southeast, including Mississippi, Alabama, Arkansas, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, the Carolinas, Tennessee, Texas, Kansas, Oklahoma and Utah.

two school district representatives; and Bobby Owen, the representative from the hospital. Also present at the Sept. 16 meeting were Beth Abernethy, Hereford Independent School District superintendent; Sid Shaw, executive vice president of the Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce; and Don Cumpton, executive director of the Hereford Economic Development Corp.

Following the board's action, the affected taxing entities -- county, city and school district -- will vote individually on the abatement. The entities' approvals don't have to be unanimous; one entity could grant the abatement with their money and another may deny approval.

In wake of reports of discrepancies in the school district budget, the HISD board is considered unlikely to approve the Top of Texas request.

HISD loses the most and gains the least when it comes abatement time.

According to Danny Jones at the Deaf Smith County Appraisal District, HISD has allowed a total of \$3,975,830 for abatement of (all three combined) Arrowhead Mills Inc., Panhandle Corn Products, and Bimbo Cereals Foods, Inc. This figure does not include ADM, which was approved in August, and the pending Top of Texas request.

Because of these abatements on the books, the state of Texas will not grant HISD \$55,228,025 (figure from 1998 tax rate) over the life of the tax breaks. The state looks into several factors, one being the total amount of abatements granted, and decides how much money will be given to that city's school district. The more abatements allowed, the less money HISD receives.

Tax abatements became popular in Texas during the late 1980s after the state made the tax breaks an economic development option to compete with surrounding states.

The maximum abatement was 100 percent for 15 years, but has recently dropped to maximum of 50 percent for 10 years.

The abatements are used to attract businesses into the county and Deaf Smith County officials think if they grant abatements for outsiders moving here, it's only fair to grant abatements for expanding businesses which are currently in the county, which is where most of the businesses which have been abated are located.

Tax abatements may apply to a permanent structure, not to land, vehicles, trucks, furniture and fixtures, and equipment.

Of the 10 abatements which have been granted in Deaf Smith County, only one (Western Ford Lincoln Mercury, Inc.) is within the city limits of Hereford. Imperial Holly Sugar and Whiteface (now Western) Ford Lincoln Mercury, Inc. were granted abatements because of expansion of their buildings.

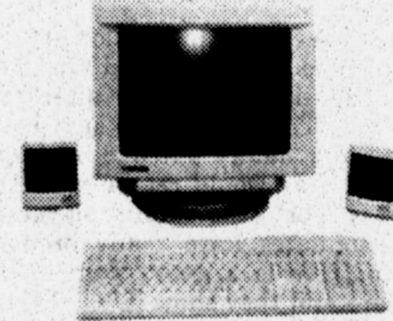

## A bridge over troubled waters

There has always been something destroying modern youth. It seems strange that I can sit back and say that since it doesn't seem so very long ago that I too was one of those headstrong creatures we commonly refer to as teen-agers.

There have always been so-called gaps between generations, and those gaps have often been bridged.

Now it's my turn. I find myself sitting on the precipice of one of those gaps — where life experiences are tethered to starkly different times and places.

As a kid hitting his pre-teen stride in the turbulent 1960s, I and those of my generation were too young to be a very big part of the problems, or the solutions everyone was looking for during that era.

We hugged the skirts of social calamity, but never really got bloodied by it — always just within hearing range of the actual turmoil.

I can remember my dad remark more than once that he didn't know what the world was coming to — inferring, usually over the blare of rock 'n' roll music that I had whined for him to tune in on the station wagon radio, that he doubted whether many of that day's young adults would ever amount to anything.

### Emphatic dislikes

He was rather emphatic about his dislike for the disheveled appearance, the music, the social mores and attitudes embraced by the hippie generation.

To a certain extent, I felt he was right, but to admit so would surely set a precedent for agreement I wasn't sure I wanted to indenture myself to.

Still, there was some peace on the home front. I learned, earlier than most, that the success of our detente depended greatly on my demeanor and my clear understanding of where the demilitarized zone began and ended.

If I chose to cross the line of demarcation, I did so at my own risk. Whether by bluff, out of my respect for him, or by absolute authority, my father rarely saw me cross that line into the danger zone.

My neighborhood friends and I were taught right from wrong; the Golden Rule; that manners were required at all times, and baring their absence at home, we would pay for breaches in public; that respect for adults was the 11th Commandment; that hard work paid off; what we would go to hell for.

### Truisms passed down

These ideals were the truisms that one generation passes on to another.

But crossing today's generation gap may be a different story because, at times, it seems many of the truisms I was taught and try to instill in my children seem to have died, uncelebrated and unmourned.

There were no Littletons in those days, even though there were still plenty of crackpots.

My parents never had to warn me that a schoolyard fight, frowned upon even then, could end with a situation infinitely more devastating to young lives than a fat lip, bloody nose or black eye.

Way back when, disputes became fistfights. The rules were clear. Hitting the other guy while he was down was bad form, no kicking was allowed. No weapons. If the other guy said he had enough, the fight was over. If a weapon had ever been brandished, the instigator would have been beaten by everyone on both sides of the line.

I never, ever saw girls wrestle or fight — not in grade school or high school. Fighting was beneath their exalted feminine mystique. I couldn't have imagined the thought. I wouldn't have had a favorable of impression of any girl doing so — still wouldn't despite today's emphasis for not applying double standards.

My parents never had to warn me about gangs. Thugs were thugs. You could single them out easily in those days because they were always expelled. They weren't permitted on campus to further disrupt the conformity practiced in school. They became outcasts, and public education continued its course, serving those who sought it and cherished it most.

My parents never had to warn me about deviants skulking in the neighborhood, or along the corridors of my daily walks from home to school. Perhaps they should have.

## More things right, than wrong with HISD

Dear Editor:

With reference to Mr. Ted Wimberley's letter to the editor in the *Hereford Brand* of Sunday, September 19, 1999, I would like for Mr. Wimberley to clarify and perhaps retract a portion of his comments.

The first issue addressed by Mr. Wimberley, the taxation on livestock, can only be addressed on the state level; the second issue, education of "immigrant" children, is supported by federal and state monies — the amounts can easily be verified through the administration office.

However, the third issue, due to Mr. Wimberley's evident lack of research or simple inquiry about this concern, is not correct. At the present time, only two board members have spouses working for Hereford Independent School District and each of these have been school employees much longer than their husbands have served on the school board. According to school law,

their service on the board is legal. Two members of the present board do not have spouses and the remaining three members' spouses do not work for HISD. Since Mr. Wimberley is a lawyer, I am surprised that he did not "do his homework" before presenting his case.

Having a vested interest in the future of HISD since I am a teacher and a taxpayer, I feel that the present school board, with the excellent leadership of Superintendent Elizabeth Abernethy, will see the school system through the present problems. It is also, I feel, of utmost importance that we keep the present school board intact. When election time comes, we must return the members whose terms expire to office if they desire to be re-elected. We cannot afford an entirely "green" board; that is, all members with two years, or less, experience.

While seeking to deal with things that may be wrong, we

must not upset or change the things that are right. And, there are many more things right than wrong with the Hereford Independent School District, including the performance of its students, the professionalism of its employees and its excellent leadership. We must, and will, get through this latest crisis and the positive support from the community will help to lighten the load.

**The Washington Post, on Congress and managed care:**

The majority leadership of both houses of Congress increasingly find themselves in the anomalous position of trying to suppress majority will. The House last week passed by 75 votes a campaign finance reform bill that the Republican leadership opposed and agreed to bring to a vote only when a majority threatened to seize control of the floor. ... the leadership acquiesced and announced it will likewise permit debate next

month on a bill it opposes regulating managed care.

In the Senate, the leadership was able to fend off a strong managed care bill only by passing a shell. It will likely take part in a filibuster next month to head off a campaign finance bill that it agreed to schedule only under duress.

Speaker Dennis Hastert has promised a House vote the week of Oct. 4 on a managed care bill that he has been trying to deflect for months. For all the claims made for and against, this is actually rather modest legislation. The country wants quality health care at minimal cost; the managed care industry sits astride that tension. ...

# Latest lawsuit is frivolous

School districts across the state face another ego-busting lawsuit from minorities who seem to think the "minority" claim gives them some special privileges.

The current upheaval revolves around the Texas Assessment Academic Skills test — otherwise known as the TAAS test — and its fairness to all those who have to take it.

Luckily for me, I never had to take the TAAS and I believe that teaching anyone to get through one event is ludicrous. But, that's just me.

Teachers and administrators can all say they don't teach to pass the TAAS, but as a parent listening to kids talk, I think even the very young students would disagree.

That's beside the point. Students who have attended Texas schools — regardless of their ethnic origin — should be held accountable for the

same tests as everyone else. Remember, it's against the law to discriminate on the basis of race, culture, nationality or origin.

Shortly after I left high school, this question arose with the standardized college entrance exams.

The individuals who brought those lawsuits claimed the tests were unfair to African Americans, because that culture speaks differently than white Americans.

It hasn't been but a couple of years since some California school districts thought of installing Ebonyphonics as a means of teaching English as a Second Language to this sub-group.

My reaction to that is tangled spaghetti, horse feathers and chicken teeth.

If these kids have gone to the same accredited schools as all the rest of the kids, why should they have a special set of tests?

On those grounds, there are a whole bunch of kids who should get preferential treatment because they come from single-parent homes or because both parents have to

work.

I don't buy the reasons given for these students doing poorly on tests.

Any kid, in any given school district in Texas, has the same opportunity to learn as every other kid within that district. They get the same opportunities to go to the library, use computers and speak with the teachers as any other student.

I realize there are some districts that are not as diverse or as advanced as others, but if they are accredited by the state then surely the students have the opportunity to learn.

Notice I am stressing the "opportunity" to learn. No one can make someone learn something they don't want to learn. On the other hand, the most unlikely students can learn something if they are interested enough.

Tests such as the TAAS may be excellent indicators of how many students actually reach a specified academic level. For that reason, all students should be expected to take the same tests.

Many of these kids that are claiming minority status actually have more opportunity to boost their learning abilities than do their counterparts.

Minority and low-cost hous-

ing complexes often set up after school tutorial rooms at no cost to the students or the residents. These tutorial rooms include English for children and adults alike, computer sessions and general tutorials for math, reading and science.

These are benefits not offered to children in other classifications. Unfortunately, these benefits are also terribly under-utilized by the residents.

Teachers, like modern textbooks, computers and other devices, are simply instruments of learning. Standardized tests are instruments to measure that learning.

By the time kids are in the sixth- or seventh-grade they have already decided to fit in and take advantage of the opportunities or they have decided to fight the system.

If the tests are to do what they were designed to do, then all students attending standard classes need to take tests for standard students. If special tests are granted to one special interest group, then comparisons for standardizing would be much akin to apples and oranges.

I believe what's good enough for one is good enough for all.

# LBJ fretted over war on eve of '64 victory

WASHINGTON (AP) — Exhausted from campaigning in 1964, President Johnson was so worried about the conflict in southeast Asia that there was no time for the Texan to bask in what would be the largest popular majority vote ever received by a president.

"I wish you'd go get some sun somewhere in Key West or something like that," Bill Moyers, a special assistant to Johnson told him on the phone before the returns were in on Election Day.

Johnson yawned loudly into the phone and replied that he couldn't — something weighed on his mind: "I'm afraid of Vietnam."

The conversation was among the latest batch of Johnson recordings released today by the Lyndon Baines Johnson Library in Austin, Texas. The tapes are mostly from November and December 1964, a year after Johnson ascended to the presidency when John F. Kennedy was assassinated.

The tapes capture Johnson's election night phone calls to and from supporters. His earthy and often blunt responses were tempered by his worries about America's involvement in the Vietnam conflict.

"We're in trouble in Vietnam, serious trouble," Johnson told Hubert H. Humphrey, his vice presidential running mate shortly before 6 p.m. on Election Day — when they were still guessing how large their victory would be.

Often during the calls Johnson aired his worries over Vietnam and sought counsel.

In a phone call to Humphrey some of his worries were expressed, "In the meantime, if you get any solution for Vietnam just call me direct, will you?"



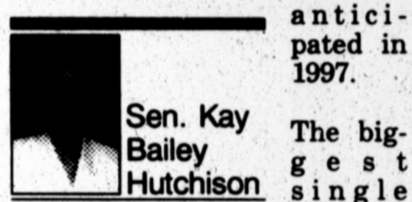

# Bill offers some first aid

Texas' rural hospitals, and all hospitals for that matter, operate on very slim margins yet manage to bring cutting-edge medical care to the communities they serve. But changes in Medicare payments to hospitals have put many insitutions in a bind. Others are fighting for their lives.

Rural communities across Texas have felt the impact of hospital closures for more than a decade now. When a rural hospital closes, local residents lose access to routine, preventative care, not to mention emergency services that can save life and limb. Doctors and other highly trained professionals move away. Then people must drive 100 miles or more in some cases to get the care city dwellers take for granted. Local economies suffer when jobs are lost. Existing businesses may have to move, and new businesses won't locate in places where health care is unavailable. Hospital closure can be a deathknell for struggling towns.

Now the Health Care Finance Administration (HCFA) says it will make cuts in its payments to hospitals that are much greater than what Congress expected in its 1997 Medicare bill. At the same time, hospitals face Y2K costs, higher blood supply costs and higher prescription drugs prices — increases in operating expenses that were not

anticipated in 1997. The biggest single dollar is a scheduled reduction in the annual inflation adjustment for standard, in-patient Medicare payments (what hospitals are paid for treating Medicare patients diagnosed with specific illnesses). Until now, Medicare has provided annual increases in payments to make up for increased hospital costs due to inflation. But hospitals are no longer going to receive that annual inflation adjustment.

To address this looming crisis, I am introducing legislation to restore some of the planned rollbacks in Medicare payments to health-care facilities.

This will provide a temporary shot in the arm to hospitals already hard hit by overall Medicare provider reimbursement cuts, and particularly cuts in outpatient services. As hospitals learn to adjust to the new reimbursement system for outpatient services, continuing to receive inflation adjustments might just mean the difference between disaster and survival.

Other rescue efforts for hospitals are under way as well, and I am co-sponsoring a number of bills that have been introduced to strengthen hos-

pitals' financial position. One would limit hospitals' losses under the new outpatient reimbursement system; another would increase the reimbursements made to rural hospitals for seniors in Medicare Choice-Plus (managed care) plans.

Finally, my successful effort to ensure that Texas' tobacco settlement funds stay in our state and out of the clutches of the federal government has meant that many rural hospital districts are receiving a financial boost. My bill, keeping the federal government's hand out of the tobacco settlement cookie jar passed into law as part of a larger emergency spending bill signed by President Clinton in May. As a result, Texas counties are in line to receive more than \$2 billion, including a lump sum payment of \$300 million from the fund this year. A \$1.8 billion permanent trust account also has been established by the state so that each county will get its share, every year, in perpetuity.

Texas hospitals aren't out of the woods yet, by a long way. But I don't believe Congress will stand by and watch them close. First aid is on the way.

# House gets its first-ever clean audit

WASHINGTON (AP) — Republicans, who gained the majority four years ago with a pledge to run the House of Representatives like a private business, are hailing their first-ever "clean audit" of the House's internal finances.

"Considering the hill that we had to climb, it is a significant accomplishment," said Rep. Bill Thomas, R-Calif., chairman of the House Administration Committee.

The accounting firm PricewaterhouseCoopers, in a report made public today, said the House had made significant progress in improving its financial management and the audit found "no instances of noncompliance."

The GOP majority first contracted for outside audits soon after taking over the House in 1995. The first audit found handwritten ledgers and little organization. Auditors discovered about \$14 million in over-budget spending by House offices and the awarding of contracts without competitive bidding.

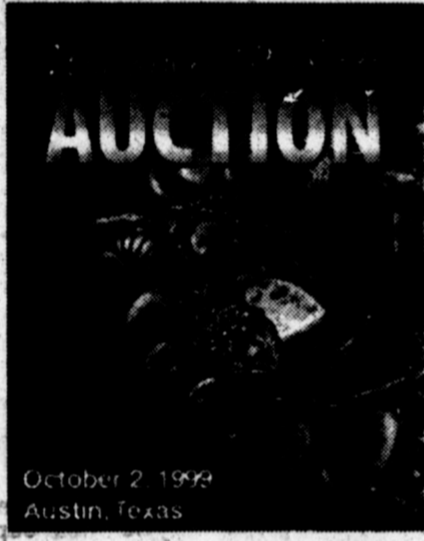

# Scott portrayed the curmudgeon

On screen and off, George C. Scott had such a curmudgeonly presence that his considerable acting talents seemed overshadowed by the force of his personality.

Still, the fact that remains is whether Scott was on stage, in films or on television, he was among the most dynamic actors of his generation.

His performances reflected his personal life; he conducted both fearlessly and without quarter. Scott was 71 when he died Wednesday.

In a 1971 Associated Press interview, he reflected on his profession:

"There are only two kinds of actors, in my opinion: risk actors and safe actors. Safe actors hold back, experiment not, dare not, change nothing and have no artistic courage. I call them 'walkers.'

"One of my professional faults has been never to walk. I may stagger a little now and then, but I have never been accused of walking. I would rather go out there and scream to the housetops than play it cool."

Such an attitude took its toll: stormy marriages, estrangement from his children,

a long record of alcoholism, clashes with directors, producers, other actors and yes, the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences.

Scott had no respect whatsoever for the Academy Awards, which he dubbed "a meat parade." He ignored his first Academy nomination as supporting actor for his second film, "Anatomy of a Murder" in 1959. He tried unsuccessfully to decline his second nomination, for "The Hustler" in 1961.

Then came the inevitable Oscar.

If ever an actor was born to play a role, it was George C. Scott as Gen. George (Blood and Guts) Patton. Scott's opening harangue to the troops before a mammoth U.S. flag in the 1970 movie "Patton" proved one of the great scenes in film history.

And Scott's refusal to attend the ceremony or accept the award confirmed his Pattonesque reputation.

"I decided to speak my piece," he remarked in 1977. "I sent the Academy a telegram which said, 'Include me out.' They replied negatively, saying it was against policy. Whatever the hell policy means. It's all absolute b.s."

The next year when he was

nominated for an Emmy for "The Price," he tried to avoid another brouhaha by asking his friend Jack Cassidy to accept for him if he won. He did.

And when another Oscar nomination came in 1971 for "The Hospital," Scott kept his mouth shut this time.

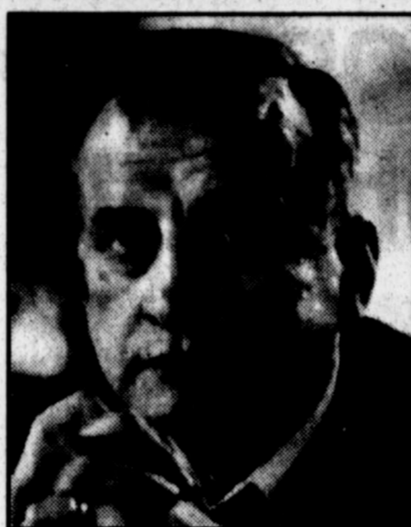
"Ah, it was so much nicer that way," he said later. "I have finally found out how to handle these things."

Scott's first three marriages ended in divorce. The first one, although brief, resulted in the birth of a daughter. His second wife was pregnant with their second child when he left her for his co-star, Colleen Dewhurst. The union of two such strong-willed figures seemed doomed, although they wound up marrying each other twice.

In 1972, he married a fourth actress, Trish Van Devere. That union would survive numerous co-starrings and separations.

Meanwhile, the actor's early years were marked by alcohol-fueled escapades.

"I drank that stuff for 30 years," he said in 1978, "and I've given up on it. I got tired of feeling bad. I tried so hard to drink everything they make, but they won."

"One of my professional faults has been never to walk. I may stagger a little now and then, but I have never been accused of walking. I would rather go out there and scream to the housetops than play it cool."

With or without booze, he was an intimidating figure, so much so that when Maureen Stapleton was rehearsing the play "Plaza Suite" with Scott, she wailed to director Mike Nichols: "I'm so frightened of George, I don't know what to do."

"My dear," Nichols replied, "the whole world is frightened of George."

## New wizard behind Big Tex opens Fair

DALLAS (AP) — Squint though he may, Dan Alexander can't make out the movements of Big Tex's steel jaw from where he sits. And just when Alexander's voice was supposed to ring throughout the grounds Friday to open the 1999 State Fair of Texas, the speakers sputtered and spat static.

It was an inauspicious debut for the new voice of the 52-foot cowboy.

But Alexander, undaunted by mechanical glitches, says lending his drawl to the Texas icon with size 70 boots is like a dream.

"I could never have imagined this," Alexander said, jittering in his control booth moments before the fair began its 24-day run Friday. "It all seems so unreal."

Alexander, 64, has some huge shoes to fill — for years, Jim Lowe was the little man behind the giant. To the dismay of practically everybody, Lowe's health problems mean the familiar echoes will be absent from the fair this year.

"I'm feeling a lot of pressure," Alexander admitted Friday, twisting a ring on his finger, knees bouncing. "There are gonna be people who try to compare me to Jim Lowe."

Take Paul Kathey, who displays antique tractors on the other end of the fair grounds. Kathey dropped in to chat with Alexander first thing Friday.

"I used to visit with Jim Lowe when he was here," Kathey, 68, said. "Now this young man's come along to take his place. But I think he'll do all right."

Big Tex sports new duds again this year — a bright red cowboy shirt, brand new belt buckle and, of course, a spiffy set of cowboy boots.

The big moment arrives: Sun catches the metallic sheen of the towering puppet, and his teeth open slowly. "Hooowwwdddyyy, fooooollkkkss," Alexander says.

## Rising mortgage rates tighten U.S. home sales during August

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rising mortgage rates dampened Americans' demand for existing homes and pushed sales down in August, but sales still are headed toward another record year.

Sales of existing single-family homes decreased by 2.8 percent in August to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 5.25 million units, the National Association of Realtors said Friday. It was the second monthly decline after sales hit an all-time high of annualized high of 5.63 million in June.

Despite August's decrease, association officials said they expect existing homes sales to post another record year in 1999. Last year's record was

4.97 million units.

The 5.25 million rate of existing home sales in August is about 9.2 percent higher than the sales level in August 1998, the association said.

August's sales level was the lowest since May when an annual rate of 5 million units were sold. The 2.8 percent decline in August followed a 4 percent drop in July sales after the June record.

The bite in August's sales came mainly from rising mortgage rates, economists said.

"The dampening in growth was due to higher mortgage rates, but it's going to take much higher mortgage rates to really slow down the strong housing market," said econo-

mist Clifford Waldman of Waldman Associates in Arlington, Va.

The average rate on a 30-year fixed-rate mortgage was 7.94 percent in August, up from 7.63 percent in July and 6.92 percent in August of 1998, the association said, citing figures from Freddie Mac, the mortgage company.

"Recent jumps in interest rates, coupled with the fact that many consumers spend August vacationing rather than home shopping, are factors that will typically impact sales," said the association's president, Sharon Millett.

The Federal Reserve increased short-term interest rates twice this summer.

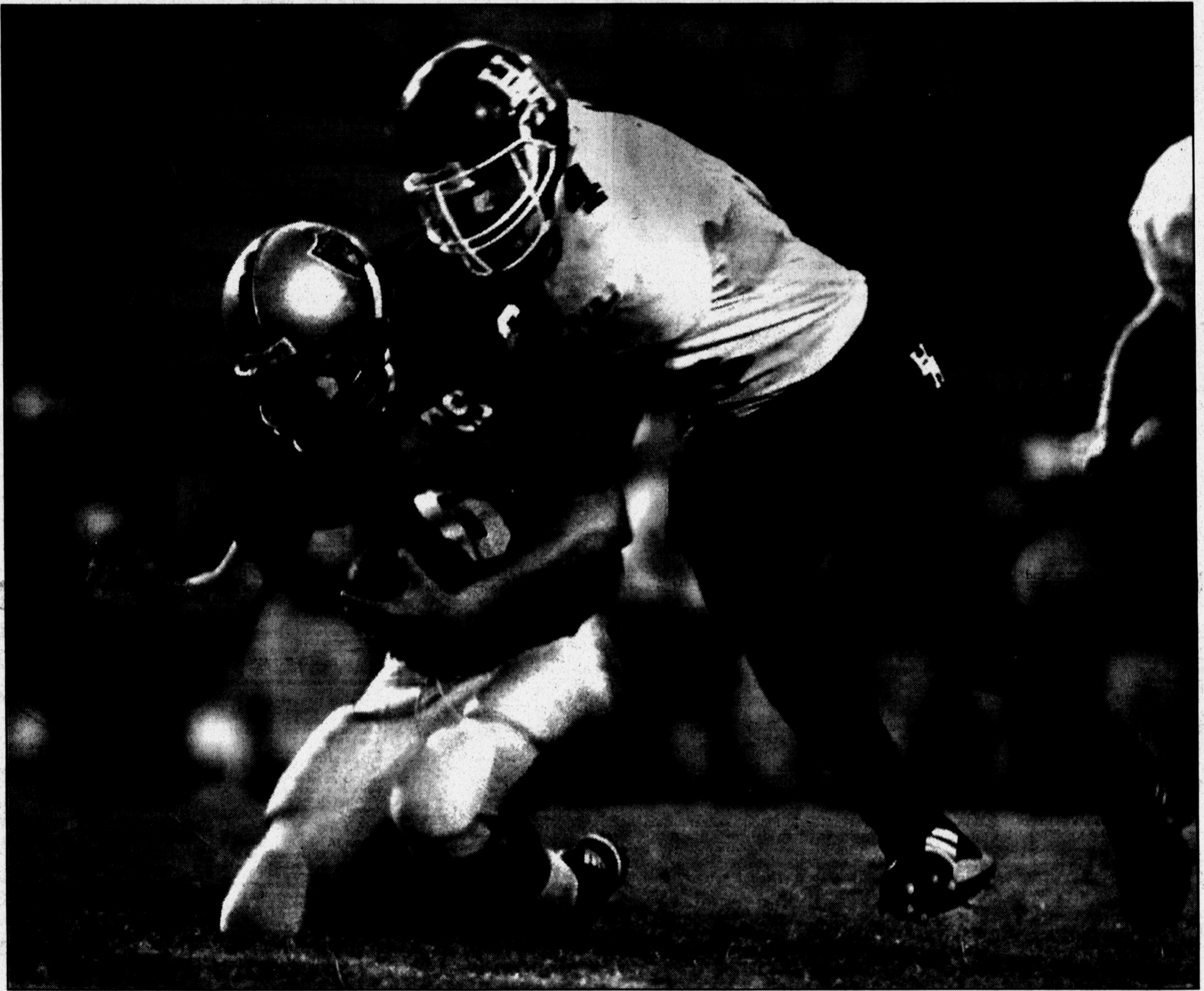

## Herd uses passing game, strong defensive line play to hand Canyon Randall 44-10 shellacking

**CANYON** — The Hereford Whitefaces went into the game 17-point favorites. But started out sluggishly on both sides of the ball.

Not to worry. The Whitefaces overcame those early obstacles and ran roughshod over their opponents.

The Hereford Whitefaces remain undefeated after four games by blasting the Canyon Randall Raiders 44-10 on Friday night at Kimbrough Memorial Stadium.

"I feel that everyone came out as a team," said receiver Slade Hodges, who caught 7 passes for 122 yards and two touchdowns. "Everybody came out and played the best of our abilities. All 56 of us won it and the coaches helped put it together."

The Whitefaces admitted they didn't hit their stride until their second series of the game.

After catching a pass at the Herd 33-yard line, Slade Hodges fumbled

at the 34 for the games' first turnover. The fumble was recovered by Randall's Aaron Henson.

That play set up a 37-yard field goal by Justin Ray for a 3-0 lead with 9:15 left in the first quarter.

"I knew we were due to have kind of a flat game and we did start out that way," Hereford coach Craig Yenser said. "We made some mistakes and we didn't really concentrate in the beginning."

Hereford woke up. The Whitefaces exploded on the field when Tony Lopez returned a kickoff 77 yards to the Raider two-yard line after the Randall field goal.

That set up Cody Hodges' one-yard toss to James Miller for a 6-3 Hereford lead.

"These guys really stepped up on their concentration level and intensity level," Yenser said. "It was a nice win despite our sluggish play."

From there, the rout was on. Thanks to a 13-yard catch to Slade Hodges and a 19-yard scramble by

his brother Cody, Hereford scored again on a 15-yard screen pass from Cody Hodges to Lopez and giving the Whitefaces a 13-3 lead.

The next series started with Cody Marsh running a reverse for 39 yards to the Hereford 22.

That, along with a 13-yard catch by Lopez, set up Cody Hodges' 10-yard touchdown run on a quarterback keeper with 10:37 left in the first half.

Hereford led then 20-3.

After holding the Raiders on another three-and-out, Cody Hodges handed the ball on a fake reverse to George Castillo, who threw a 63-yard bomb to a wide-open Slade Hodges through the middle of the field. Hereford now owned a safe 27-3 lead with 9:30 left in the first half.

"We were down and we needed to step it up," Castillo said. "Coach (Yenser) called the play and I just threw the ball to Slade. He was wide open, hoped he wouldn't miss it and scored. It was my first touchdown pass."

Added Slade Hodges: "After the fumble in the first quarter I said to myself 'I dropped that one.' I just watched all the way and caught it."

Randall took advantage of a Hereford offensive halt in the second quarter when Randall quarterback Branden Knapp, throwing a backward pitch to Travis Willard, who then threw a 47-yard pass to Justin Bryant to the Whiteface two-yard line with 3:22 second left in the

half.

That set up Knapp's 2-yard touchdown toss to Trevor Babbitt. The Raiders only trailed 27-10 at the half, but never amounted much of an offense after that.

Hereford ran the rest of the night and the defense chomped on the Raiders.

"All year, I've had confidence in our defense," Yenser said. "Our defense has played well most of the year. They're really unsung and I am proud of what they do."

In the third quarter, L.J. Vallejo, who ran only for 59 yards on 12 carries, scored on a 15-yard run with 6:31 left in the third quarter, increasing the Whitefaces' lead to 34-10.

Mike Bedolla put Hereford up 37-10 on a 37-yard field goal with 3:53 left in the third.

To cap off an excellent receiving performance, Slade Hodges caught a 3-yard floater from Cody Hodges for

## Europe too powerful in Ryder Cup

BROOKLINE, Mass. (AP) — Not even America's 1-2 punch could stop Europe from what could shape up to be another Ryder Cup runaway.

Tiger Woods and David Duval, the top two players in the world, were mere mortals Friday in the presence of a European team that put on a real exhibition by making clutch putts and seizing momentum with heroic shots that rocked The Country Club.

Led by Jesper Parnevik and his new sidekick, 19-year-old Sergio Garcia, Europe strutted off the course in fading sunlight with a 6-2 lead that left the U.S. team in a stupor.

The Americans have not won the Ryder Cup since 1993, and this wasn't the kind of start they had in mind. Even Mark James, the low-key captain for Europe, was surprised by the margin.

"This is good," he said. "This is a great start. We're all aware there's a long way to go. You get lopsided results when putts go your way."

But it wasn't just the putts. Parnevik holed out from 141 yards on No. 8 and was 7 under over the first 10 holes of his best-ball match with Garcia. The youngest player in Ryder Cup history, Garcia contributed with an eagle of his own, pitching in from 50 yards short of the 14th green and bounding into Parnevik's arms for another bear hug.

The biggest grin from

America came from Davis Love III, who made pressure-packed putts at the end of both his matches to earn a halve.

The only American victory in eight matches came from Hal Sutton and Jeff Maggert, two straight shooters who scored a 3 and 2 victory over Lee Westwood and Darren Clarke in the alternate-shot match Friday morning.

The shock came from who didn't win.

Woods and Duval failed to win a point. So did Phil Mickelson, who sported a 4-1-2 record in his past two Ryder Cups. James sent three of his seven rookies into the fray, and all of them contributed.

Woods, determined to avenge a 1-3-1 record in his first Ryder Cup two years ago at Valderrama, got little help from Tom Lehman when they fell to Parnevik-Garcia 2 and 1 in the morning match.

And he didn't get much help from Duval in the best-ball match that America figured to win hands down. Instead, they fell behind on the 17th hole when Clarke made a 5-foot birdie putt and neither Woods nor Duval gave themselves a decent chance at birdie.

The carnage was complete when Duval drove wildly off the tee, Woods bound a bunker on his approach to the green, and Westwood closed out a 1-up victory with a

simple chip that was conceded for par.

"A huge first day," Westwood said.

The 6-2 lead is the largest for Europe after the first day since 1987 at Muirfield Village, the year it won on American soil for the first time. Another victory in America would be old hat these days.

The Europeans have won five of the past seven Ryder Cups, and in all but one of those victories, they built their lead in team matches, typically a strong suit.

"Those guys played tremendous," U.S. captain Ben Crenshaw said. "They kept holing out. That's what happens in match play. Our guys played well, but we need to see a few more putts go in. That's all I can tell you."

Perhaps he should tell that to Mickelson.

The player reputed to have one of the silkiest putting strokes on the PGA Tour missed one crucial putt after another in the opening day of matches.

Paired with Duval in alternate shot, Mickelson missed three putts inside 6 feet in a 3 and 2 loss to Colin Montgomerie and Paul Lawrie. In the afternoon, he twice had a chance to tie a best-ball match, but Mickelson missed a 4-foot birdie putt on the 16th, and an 8-foot putt on the final hole.

# Rangers blast Oakland, 12-4

ARLINGTON (AP) — The Texas Rangers must've thought they could finish off the Oakland Athletics with one big win. Juan Gonzalez had three home runs and five RBIs and Aaron Sele earned his 18th win, pushing Texas a step closer to the AL West title with a 12-4 victory over second-place Oakland on Friday night.

The Rangers, who had lost three straight, upped their lead to 6 1/2 games and trimmed their magic number to three. Texas can clinch a tie with a victory Saturday night, then could wrap up its third division crown in four years with a victory Sunday.

The A's actually led 1-0 going into the bottom of the fifth, then starter Gil Heredia (13-8) fell apart and was quickly joined by his road-weary teammates.

Oakland was playing its fourth game in three days and three time zones. The A's were home Wednesday, then split a doubleheader Thursday in Baltimore. They arrived in Texas in the wee hours Friday.

Texas scored four in the fifth, six in the sixth and single runs in the seventh and eighth. Gonzalez had two-run homers in the fifth and sixth to nearly the same spot in the left-field seats, then sent the third one a bit higher and more toward the foul pole.

Although there was no doubt about any of them, he didn't celebrate until the third one. He slowed to admire the blast, pumped his fists and smiled toward the dugout to savor the third three-homer game of his career.

The crowd of 40,207 gave him a standing ovation and they remained on their feet until he came out of the dugout one

pitch later. One fan even threw a cap onto the field in honor of baseball's version of a hat trick.

Royce Clayton started the fifth-inning rally with a leadoff double and his two-run homer started the scoring in the sixth. He also drove in the seventh-inning run.

The A's aided Texas' outburst with some shoddy fielding: an error by right-fielder Matt Stairs on a slow-rolling ball, a throwing error by catcher Mike Macfarlane, a wild pitch by reliever Buddy Groom and someone's failure to cover first base on a suicide squeeze bunt.

Of Texas' 18 hits, Gonzalez and Ivan Rodriguez had four and McLemore and Clayton each had three. Gonzalez raised his average four points to .320, passing his career-high of .318 set last year. He also has 37 homers and 121 RBIs.

Rodriguez and McLemore each had two RBIs and two runs and three runs. Clayton had three RBIs and two runs.

Sele (18-8) allowed only an unearned run over seven innings to once again show manager Johnny Oates why he should be the team's ace in the playoffs.

He gave up five hits, struck out five and walked two. His sixth victory in seven decisions makes him second to Boston's Pedro Martinez for wins in the AL.

John Jaha scored Oakland's first run on a throwing error by Rodriguez. The A's scored twice in the eighth off reliever Tim Crabtree on an RBI groundout by Jason Giambi and a solo homer by Matt Stairs.

Mike Macfarlane hit a solo homer in the ninth.

Texas' Rusty Greer played his first full game since suffering a bruised retina in pre-game warmups on Sept. 13. He went 0-for-5, striking out looking twice. He also made a nice diving catch of a Stairs flooper.

# Houston stifles Hideo Nomo and Brewers

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Houston rallied with four runs in the eighth inning Friday night for a 9-4 victory over the Milwaukee Brewers in a game marred by a fan's attack on Astros right fielder Bill Spiers.

Milwaukee starter Hideo Nomo left with a 4-2 lead, but relievers Eric Plunk (4-4) and Hector Ramirez failed to protect it. The victory allowed the NL Central-leading Astros to stay 2 1/2 games ahead of Cincinnati, who beat St. Louis 5-4.

Before the Brewers batted in the sixth, a 23-year-old fan from Illinois came out of the box seats along the right-field line and tackled Spiers from behind.

Astros starter Mike Hampton led the charge as the entire Astros team came to Spiers' defense. The attacker, whose name was not immediately released, was beaten and kicked before being led off in handcuffs by Milwaukee County sheriff's deputies.

Spiers had a welt under his left eye and appeared to have a bloody nose. He finished the inning, but was replaced at the start of the seventh.

The Astros said Spiers was suffering from whip-lash and was day-to-day. A Brewers spokesman said the attacker would be charged with two counts of battery and one count of disorderly conduct.

Hampton shook off the distraction and pitched a scoreless sixth. Chris Holt started the seventh and failed to hold the 2-1 lead.

The Brewers loaded the bases on a pair of singles and a walk before Holt walked Ron Belliard to force in a run and chase Holt. Pinch-hitter Jose Valentin lined a two-run single off Trevor Miller (3-2) for a 4-2 lead.

# Ames holds slim lead at Texas Open

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — Stephen Ames is looking for his first PGA Tour victory. Sandy Lyle is trying to win for the first time in 11 years.

Both were in contention to win the Texas Open after Friday's second round at La Cantera Golf Club.

Ames shot a 3-under 69 and maintained his one-stroke lead despite slumps on the back nine and threats from a pack of other players.

Lyle shot a 68, Jeff Brehaut a 67 and Brian Henninger a 66 for two-round totals of 10-under 134, one stroke behind Ames.

Perry Moss, David Edwards and Rich Beem were two strokes back.

"I had a lot of patience," said Ames, who kept his composure even with the three bogeys down the stretch. "Over the years I've learned how to cope with the bad breaks and the ups and downs

of the game."

Ames birdied No. 2 and made a 6-foot eagle putt on the par-5 fifth. He bogeyed the next hole but managed to move to 12 under by the turn.

After making a 25-foot putt for birdie on the 10th, Ames' troubles began. He bogeyed the 11th when he couldn't get up and down out of a trap. He two-putted on the par-3 13th then missed a 15-footer on No. 15.

A birdie on the next hole kept Ames in the lead.

"It was up and down, yes. But I played well," Ames said. "My main goal this week is just to enjoy it, as usual."

A native of Trinidad and a resident of Canada, the 35-year-old Ames couldn't start playing PGA Tour events this year until May because of visa problems. Recently, he's picked up steam with a third-place finish at the Sprint International in August and a tie for fourth last week at the B.C. Open.

# A season of gains and losses for Ripken

BALTIMORE (AP) — Cal Ripken proved this season he can still hit for average and with power.

The Iron Man also showed he is a mere mortal, burdened by a back injury that required surgery and the emotional blow of his father's death.

Ripken's most trying season came to a sudden, early end Thursday. The 39-year-old third baseman closed the year just nine hits short of 3,000 for his career, a milestone he should reach in April if his rehabilitation proceeds as expected.

"You can carve this in granite: If anyone can come back from a back operation without losing a step, it's Cal Ripken," Dr. Bill Howard, director of sports medicine at Baltimore's Union Memorial Hospital, said Thursday. "He's got the strength, the conditioning and the mindset to

make it happen."

A year ago, it was hard to imagine Ripken missing a game, let alone a week. Or a month. The most durable player in the history of the sport played 2,632 consecutive games before voluntarily ending the run in the Orioles' final home date of the 1998 season.

This year was decidedly different. Ripken twice spent time on the disabled list for the first time since his career began in 1981. He missed three weeks with lower back pain beginning April 20 and sat out the entire month of August after the back spasms returned.

He finally decided this week surgery was the only option, and he had an operation Thursday in Cleveland.

The surgery completed a season that began with the loss of his father, Cal Sr., who died of lung cancer in March. The emotional and physical pain diminished a year in which he hit his 400th career homer and compiled a .340 average, 64 points above the .276 lifetime mark he carried into the season.

"I had to meet a lot of professional and personal challenges," Ripken said last week. "When you look back, will it be a season to remember? I guess in some ways it would be, but for the most part, it represents something of a loss as well as something of a gain."

The gain? Ripken found a batting stance that let him either pull the ball or drive it to the opposite field. He got a career-high six hits in one game and his 18 homers were more than he had in four of his previous five seasons.

"Ironically, in my opinion, his back forced him to have a conservative stance for the first time in years," teammate Mike Mussina said.

The back injury had everything to do with the fact that he played in only 86 games, a far cry from his steady 162.

Personally and professionally, it was a hard dose of reality for a seemingly invulnerable sports hero.

# WAR OF AGES

## Internet, high tech hastening conflict

The Internet and other high-tech developments are hastening and intensifying a conflict that demographers have long warned about: the war of the ages.

The young offer new ideas, a talent valued by employees in an age of vast technological change. Older workers offer stability and experience, often associated with a time fading into the past.

Though not alone, IBM has become a focus of the developing situation because of its attempt to convert its traditional pension (annuity) plan to a cash-balance or save-as-you-go plan.

Such a move, say employees who have worked for years under the old plan, where seniority plays a major role, could cut anticipated benefits by as much as 20 percent while favoring newer workers.

IBM human resources chief J. Thomas Bouchard, stated the case succinctly. "To retain and attract the people required to succeed in the future," he told a Senate committee, "we have to adjust IBM's overall compensation package."

While IBM later backed down and offered more older employees a choice between the cash-balance and traditional plans, the rancor did not subside. In fact, it spread to other companies.

The Senate Health, Education, Labor and Pension Committee heard evidence that 325 companies with \$330 billion in pension assets have switched to the newer plans, largely for the same reasons.

Some companies have even suggested that under the traditional plans, in which workers earned benefits based on such criterion as length of service and highest level of income, they faced problems similar to Social Security. That is, that they could go broke.

What IBM and other large companies face, especially those involved with the production or use of innovative, high-tech equipment, is a newer aspect of the conflict between young and old.

It is a conflict that showed up earlier in concern over costs older workers imposed on health insurance benefits, and it is involved in the current tax debate over inheritance taxes.

In its newer variant it involves access to ideas, increasingly those of a new generation that grew up wired to the new technology.

The U.S. Census Bureau estimates there are about 63.5 million Americans between the ages of 18 and 34 years. While not all are workers or potential workers, many of them have a wider choice of career opportunities than any generation before them.

# Clinton sees 'opportunity'

WASHINGTON (AP) — Addressing a gathering of party officials, President Clinton on Friday called on Congress to set aside partisan rancor and work on a budget that would shore up Social Security, Medicare and the education system.

"I still believe there's the opportunity for us to work together," Clinton said of the Republican leadership on Capitol Hill. "This is not an election year."

Clinton made frequent reference to the early start to the 2000 election cycle in his remarks to the annual meeting of the Democratic National Committee in Washington. He noted that he didn't announce his first presidential bid until October 1991.

"I feel like I've been going through this campaign all my

life, and I'm not even running," he quipped.

More to the point, he gave encouragement to Vice President Al Gore, whose campaign to move into the Oval Office has struggled to gain support in public opinion polls.

Without mentioning Gore directly, Clinton noted that he was in third place and the pundits were giving him long odds when the voting public

finally began to focus on the race in June 1992 and he won primaries in California, New Jersey and Ohio.

"It became real," Clinton said. "And people began to look and listen and they opened not just their minds but their hearts."

Clinton used the speech to recap the economic success of his administration and champion the work Democrats have done to fight crime.

"I want you to be of good cheer and proud because America is a better place than it was in 1992," he said.

The group cheered when the president mentioned that he had vetoed the Republicans' \$792 billion tax cut a day earlier because, he said,

it would have squandered the opportunity to strengthen the retirement and health care systems and invest in education.

"The reason I vetoed the tax bill is that it would make it impossible for America to meet its long-term challenges," he said.

Clinton told the party officials that their stand on Medicare, Social Security and crime would set Democrats apart from Republicans in the upcoming elections. "There really are differences between these parties."

"I always believed if ... we just thought about the people that nobody else in Washington seems to think about," he said, "you could marry good politics and good policy and everything would be all right."

# Senate impasse leaves vacancies on bench

In the long Senate dispute over confirmation of President Clinton's nominees to be federal judges, there are hostages on both sides now.

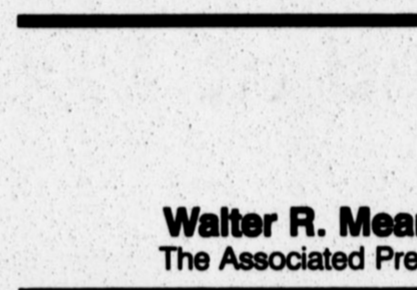
Democrats blocked approval of a nominee sponsored by Sen. Orrin Hatch, the Republican chairman who presides over the process. They insisted that Republicans agree to action on two long-stalled appeals court nominees, too.

Neither side would yield, all three were blocked at the impasse, until Senate leaders can agree on a way out.

So the judging of judges is itself stalled.

That happened as a bipartisan reform panel complained about partisan wrangling in the selection of judges, and said "it is time to lower the temperature of the debate."

Instead, it may be going up. Behind it is the opposition of GOP conservatives to Clinton judges they deem too liberal and likely activists on the bench. There has been

grumbling on the right that Hatch is too willing to lead Clinton nominees through the Judiciary Committee.

The Constitution Project task force on judicial selection urged an end to partisan wrangling over judges, and said the whole process should be streamlined.

Hatch said the vacancy rate is 7.6 percent, lower than the average. There are 64 judge-ships unfilled, and 44 nominations awaiting Senate action.

They may be waiting for a while. After his nominee was blocked Tuesday, Hatch said he was disappointed that the Democrats "would refuse to

avoid a filibuster of one of the nominees of its own administration." The nominee, Ted Stewart, was Hatch's choice.

When Clinton did not nominate him for a Salt Lake City opening, Hatch, chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee, stopped holding hearings on judicial nominees early this year. He resumed them on Clinton's assurance that Stewart, a former Hatch aide, would be nominated, as he was on July 27. The committee approved it three days later.

Now the Democrats will not let the Senate vote on Stewart without a GOP guarantee there also will be votes on Richard Paez and Marsha Berzon, long-held nominees to be appeals court judges in California. Paez, first nomi-

nated in 1996, and Berzon, named early in 1998, have been approved by the committee, but Senate votes are being blocked by the anonymous objections of some Republicans.

On party line votes, each side blocked the other from lifting the threat of filibusters against the nominations.

Hatch then said he had intended to have the committee hold more confirmation hearings this fall, but may not. "We shall have to re-examine the best way to move forward on judicial nominees ...," he said after the Democrats blocked Stewart.

The Democrats contend the double standard is in the opposite direction, that Stewart was moved ahead of 30 nominees awaiting confirmation.

The White House joined the debate on Wednesday, with Clinton's spokesman saying the Senate should vote people up or down without "preferential treatment for one candidate that they have interest in."

## DAR announces plans for two essay contests

Los Ciboleros Chapter Daughters of the American Revolution is sponsoring two separate essay contests this fall.

"An Obituary for George Washington: 1732-1799" is the topic of the American History Essay Contest for fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grade students.

The topic for the Christopher Columbus Essay Contest for students in the ninth through 12<sup>th</sup> grades is "If Christopher Columbus returned to the 'New World' in the year 2000, what evidence of his discovery would he find?"

The American History essay, an obituary written for a local newspaper at the time of George Washington's death, should focus on only one or two facets of his life. Focus could be placed on such roles as that of statesman, military leader, or agriculturist.

All fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grade students in a public, private or parochial school, or in a sanctioned home study program are eligible to enter the American History Essay Contest.

DAR members judge the essays on historical accuracy, adherence to topic, organization of material, interest, originality, spelling, grammar, punctuation and neatness.

Every student submitting an essay will receive a certificate of appreciation while first place winners in each grade level in each school will receive a bronze medal and second place winners are given certificates of award. These certificates and medals are presented at closing school assemblies.

One essay in each grade is selected as the chapter winner and is forwarded to the state

competition. A non-DAR judge selects the best overall essay from the finalists. A book on American History is given to the school that the overall winner attends with a name plate honoring that student.

An essay entered in the Christopher Columbus Essay Contest should provide specific examples of evidence of Christopher Columbus' discovery that might be found. Included could be such examples as the origin of geographical names, cultural events or celebrations, monuments, literature or music.

Detailed information for both contests has been distributed to schools in Deaf Smith County as well as schools in Adrian, Friona and Vega. Public libraries in Hereford, Friona and Vega have been provided contest instructions with a suggested bibliography to assist with research and for home study students wishing to enter the contests.

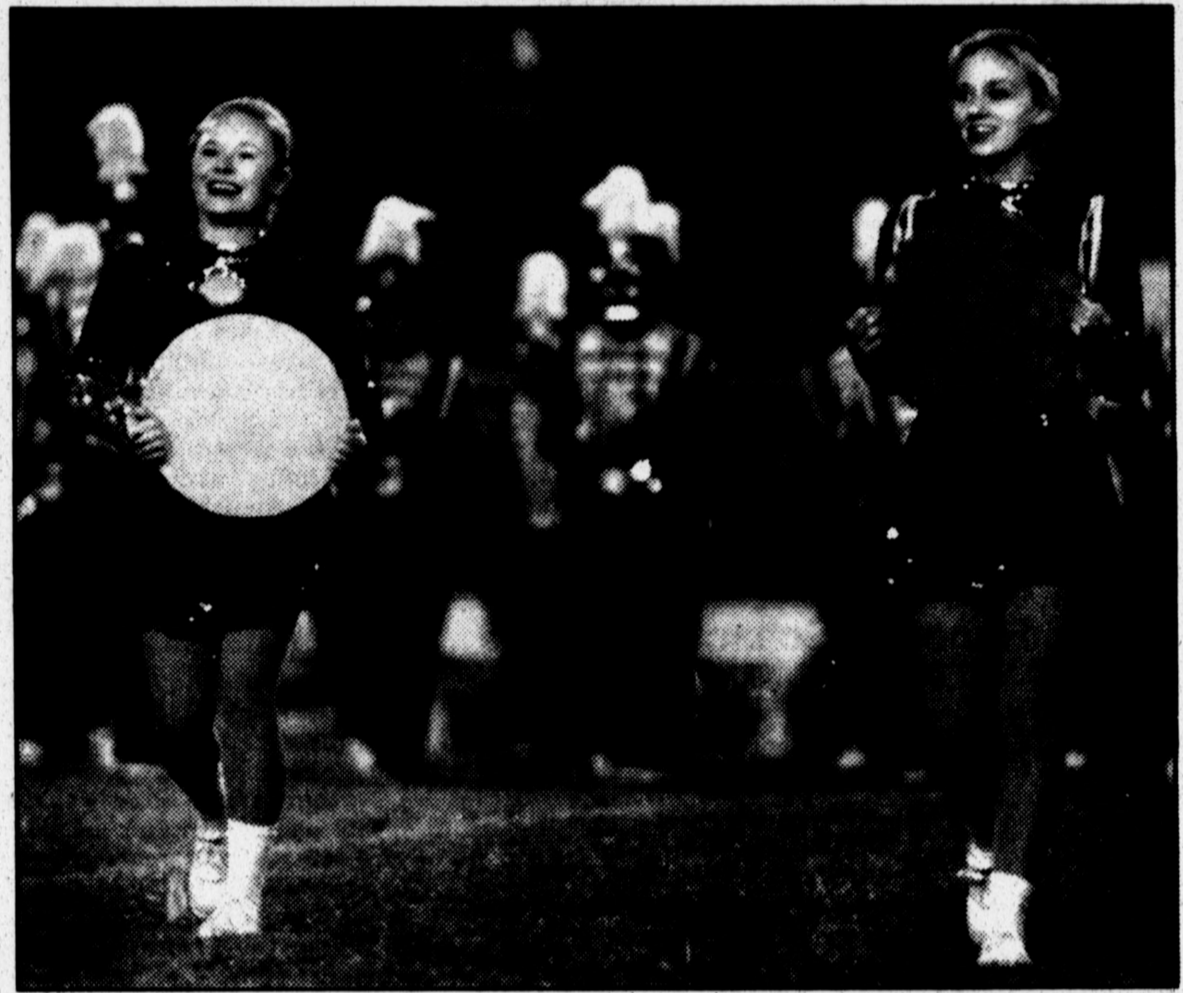
The deadline for either contest for submitting essays to the local chapter is Dec. 6. Winners will be announced in February.

An Honors Tea will be given by the chapter in April to recognize the winners of the contests. The students, their families, friends, teachers and school administrators will be guests of Los Ciboleros Chapter DAR at the tea.

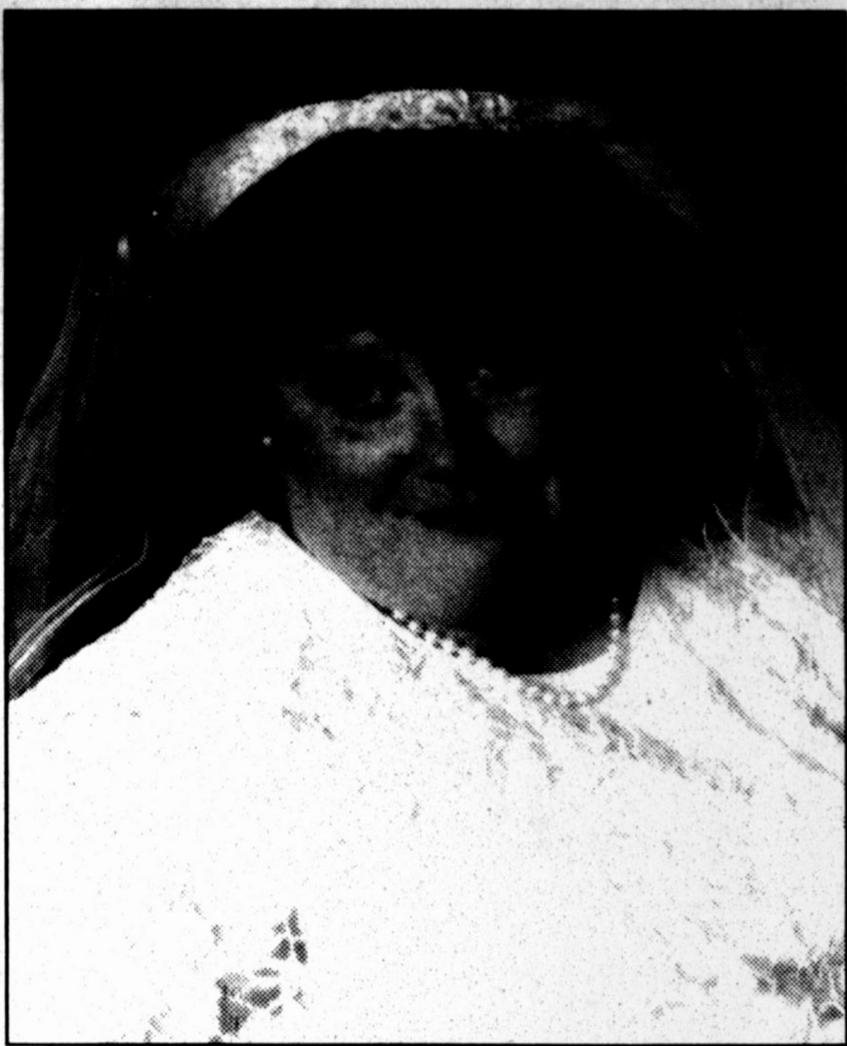

**Dear Ann Landers:** A reader recently asked why restaurants give free refills on coffee but charge extra for a second tea bag. I worked as a waitress for several years and this complaint is very familiar. Actually, it doesn't make a lot of sense to me. I come from Germany, where you have to pay for every cup of coffee and every cup of tea. There are no free refills. I would like to tell that gentleman who complained, if you don't have any bigger problems than this in your life, you are very lucky. Enjoy the free coffee while it lasts — before American restaurant owners get new ideas from Europe and start charging you for the coffee, too. — No Free Tea or Anything Else in Arizona

**Dear Arizona:** Thank you for the philosophical discourse. Keep reading for more on the subject:

**From West Point, Miss.:** That coffee drinker is living in the wrong part of the country. Down South, they bring you tea, coffee, water or any beverage you wish before your food is served. All through the meal, they come around with pitchers to refill your glass or cup. It's what we call Southern Hospitality.

**Waco, Texas:** While coffee drinkers have the option of regular or decaf, tea drinkers are rarely afforded the same courtesy. If I ask a server for decaffeinated tea, I am offered herbal tea, which I don't care for. I want the same brand of iced tea the restaurant serves, but I want it decaffeinated — especially at dinnertime. I hate having to drink plain water with a lovely meal. While I'm at it, why don't fast-food restaurants offer a variety of decaffeinated drinks? I'm sure there would be plenty of orders for decaf colas from seniors, pregnant women and nursing mothers. Is anybody in the food business listening?

**Norfolk, Va.:** I have a solution to the tea problem. My mother-in-law orders hot water and brings her own tea bags from home. When she wants a refill, she just reaches into her purse and asks for more hot water.

**Paris, Texas:** I am 77 years old and have NEVER been given a second tea bag, only extra hot water. The managers say, "It's our policy." One day, I brought my own tea bag, and the restaurant charged me for the hot water! I thought it was outrageous. Water doesn't cost them anything.

**Glen Ellyn, Ill.:** There are

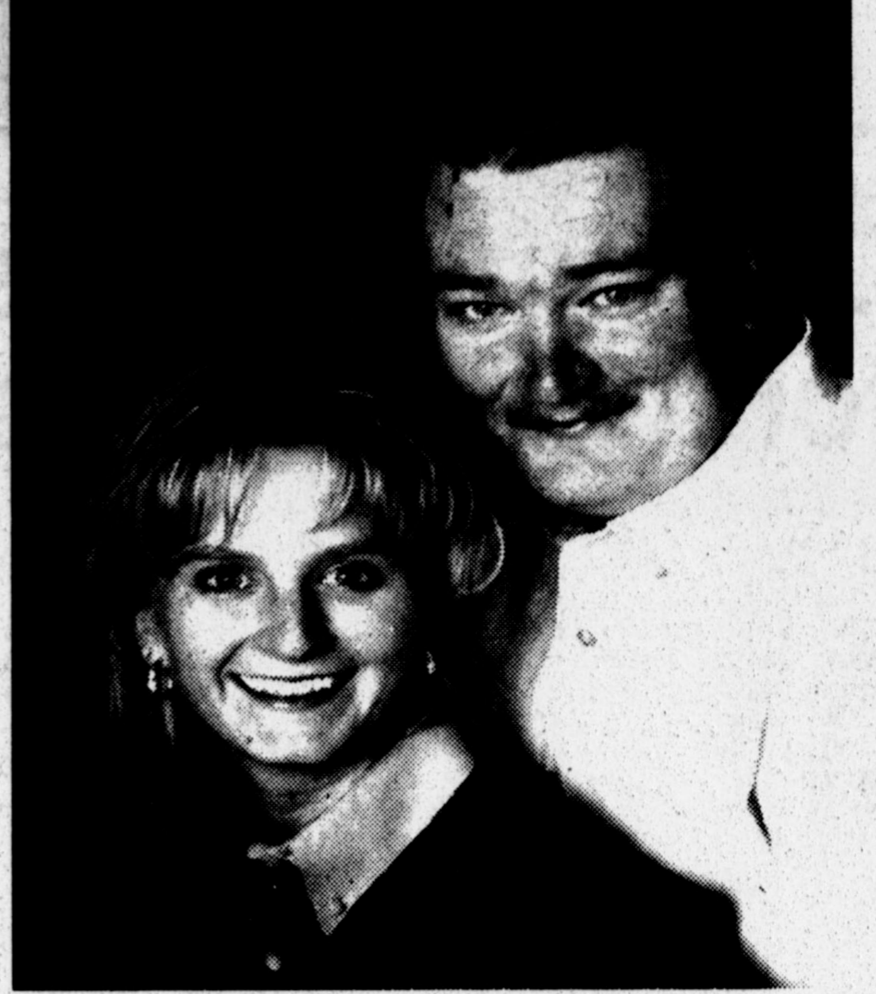
three things tea drinkers get shortchanged on. The first is one tea bag with unlimited water. Who wants flavored water? And the water is lukewarm most of the time. Tea requires hot water to brew properly. Second, the pot for water does not hold one full cup of tea. If you ask for a bigger pot, they give you one they use for coffee, which has a coffee taste. Third, some restaurants offer only flavored teas that come in elegant boxes but have a peculiar taste. This is a source of extreme irritation. All I want is plain tea, not some exotic perfumed herbal concoction that smells good but tastes like cologne.

We at the Deaf Smith County Library have tried to end this year on the up-swing and I appreciate all of you for your help and cooperation. We have been able to clean the carpets, get the sidewalks repaired and even begin a collection inventory.

Many of you have asked about last Saturday so I thought now would be a good time to answer your questions. Last Saturday the library was closed to the public, while the library staff came to work early and began to put everything in order so that a more accurate count of the collection could be made.

What we discovered were a number of books out of place, a few books that needed to be removed from the collection because of age and condition and a few who's labels were incorrect. Hal's last words, "I love you Kate." Who is this Kate and is it possible that Jill and Kate Gallagher are related?

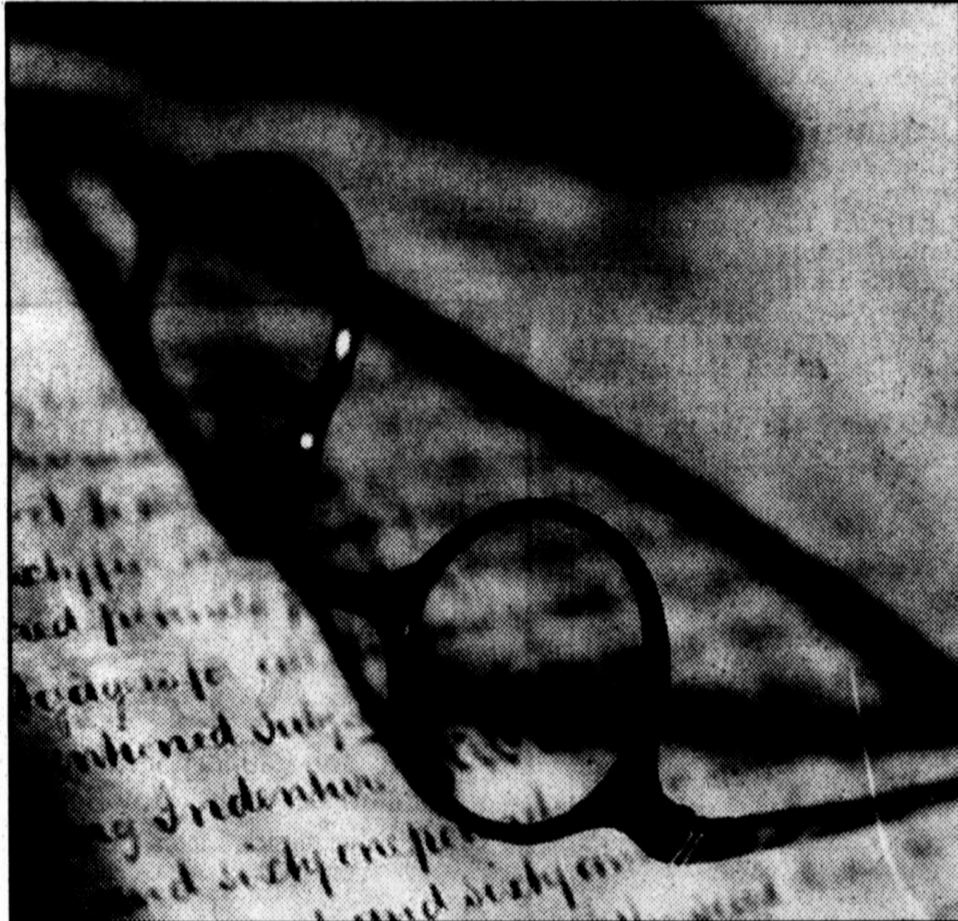

# Nutrition Update

## "THE GREAT DEBATE: FATS AND OILS IN THE DIET"

Fat is a hot topic. For well over a decade, the attention of health experts and consumers has focused on issues related to fat and cholesterol. The evidence is clear that a lower fat, saturated fat and cholesterol diet reduces the risk of chronic health problems, such as heart disease, some types of cancer, diabetes and obesity. However, the debate continues about how much and what type of fat is just as important as the total amount of fat you eat.

### KNOW YOUR FATS

Fats that are solid at room temperature are mostly saturated fat. Animal products, such as beef, pork, poultry, whole milk, cheese, sour cream and yogurt, as well as coconut, palm and palm kernel oils, contain mostly saturated fats.

Saturated fats can increase blood cholesterol levels. Higher levels of blood cholesterol increase the risk of heart disease. Fats and oils that are liquid at room temperature are mostly unsaturated, either monosaturated or polysaturated.

Examples of monosaturated fats are canola, olive and peanut oils. Corn, soybean and sunflower oils are high in polyunsaturated fats. Foods that contain mostly unsaturated fats include avocado, olives and peanuts.

Monosaturated and polyunsaturated fats have a blood-cholesterol lowering effect and can lower the risk of heart disease. Reducing total fat and replacing some saturated fat with unsaturated fats can help lower your risk of heart disease.

### THE GOOD AND THE BAD

Ideally, the following blood lipids should be within normal ranges; total cholesterol, low-density lipoprotein (LDL) cholesterol, high density lipoprotein (HDL) cholesterol and triglycerides. LDL is known as "bad cholesterol" because

it deposits fats and cholesterol on the lining of arteries. HDL is called "good cholesterol" because it carries the fat and cholesterol away. Check with your physician about your lipids and ask if you are at risk for heart disease.

### WHAT IS THE "FATS AND OILS DEBATE?"

Nutrition experts are concerned that some people are cutting dietary fat too drastically. That is they're choosing eating patterns that are too low in fat and too high in carbohydrate, especially simple sugars. While very low fat diets lower total cholesterol and LDL levels, they also lower the beneficial HDL levels and may raise blood triglycerides, which is not desirable. Also calorie intake may still be too high, leading to obesity, another risk factor for heart disease.

Researchers are finding that if you replace some saturated fat with monosaturated fat, LDL cholesterol are lowered without decreasing HDL cholesterol levels or raising triglyceride levels.

### CALORIES STILL COUNT

Too many calories from any source such as fat, carbohydrate, or protein, can lead to weight gain, even if the diet is low in fat. Be sure to check the number of calories per serving on nutrition facts labels when you choose foods. If weight gain or loss is a problem for you, have the calorie intake for you determined and a tailored healthful eating and physical activity plan set to meet your individual needs and goals.

### THE BOTTOM LINE

- [1] Follow the Food Guide Pyramid to choose a healthful eating pattern;
- [2] Select a wide variety of foods, include complex carbohydrates such as fruits, vegetables and whole-grain products;
- [3] Replace some saturated fat with mono or polyunsaturated fat;
- [4] Enjoy regular physical activity.

# RECIPE

## Peanutty Vegetable Medley

Servings: 4

- 8 oz. of pasta or rice
- 2 tps vegetable oil
- 1 large onion, chopped
- 2 cloves garlic
- 8 oz. tomato sauce
- 1/2 cup water
- 2 tps chili powder
- 2 1/2 lb. head cauliflower, broken into florets
- 2 carrots, cut into 1/2 inch slices
- 1 green pepper, sliced
- 1/2 cup regular or reduced-fat creamy peanut butter

Cook pasta and keep warm. In a large saucepan heat oil over medium-high heat.

Add onion and garlic and

cook 3-5 minutes, stirring often.

Stir-in remaining ingredients, except the peanut butter, and bring to boil. Reduce heat, cover and simmer 15 minutes.

Stir-in peanut butter and simmer 5 minutes, covered. Serve over pasta or rice.

# MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

## My Dream: To be at the front of the room.

I was just 19 when I heard my first dynamic professional speaker. He spoke to our insurance selling class, and he was inspiring. I can't recall his name or what he said, but I do remember wishing that I had his talent or gift.

As I watched and listened to his presentation, his commanding presence and his rapport with the audience, I wanted to be like him. I wanted to motivate and inspire. I wanted to be a dynamic, highly-skilled and polished speaker. I wanted to be at the

front of the room.

There was only one problem: I didn't know how. I didn't even know where to start.

As an inexperienced, 19-year-old farm boy there were three barriers to me accomplishing my dream. First, I had nothing to say. Second, I had no knowledge of how to create, organize or deliver a speech. And, third, I was frightened by the thought of speaking to a large group of people. So, the dream faded.

Nearly 20 years later, the dream resurfaced. I was working in economic development and was attending an annual educational conference. Dr. Arthur L. Mallory, then head of the Missouri Department of Education, was the keynote speaker at the conference.

For 45 minutes, Mallory captivated that room full of professionals with a masterful presentation. He encouraged. He motivated. He inspired. And most importantly, he delivered practical, useful information. When Mallory finished the audience rose to its feet and gave him a thundering, roof-raising, standing ovation.

I know many members of that audience went back to their communities with a renewed spirit. We couldn't do everything, but we could do something. We might not attain instant economic success, but we could begin the process.

### The Dream Returned

That night I lay awake in my hotel room. I re-ran Mallory's speech in my mind. I replayed his opening remarks, remembered how he had organized his speech into key points and recalled how he had summarized so effectively. That night I decided to become the guy at the front of the room.

For the past 14 years I've followed that dream. I accepted every opportunity to speak. I joined Toastmasters. I worked on my content and delivery. I tried various types of humor and style. I presented more than 500 talks, speeches and seminars before getting paid for one.

Now, as a professional member of the National Speaker's Association, I present nearly 100 times each year. People pay to hear me, and I love being the guy at the front of the room. I am living my dream and being paid well to do what I want to do.

### What's my dream?

Do you have a dream? Have you always wanted to play the piano, own your own business or write a book? Have you wanted to be a nurse, finish your degree or travel to all 50 states? If you have an unfulfilled dream that keeps you awake at night or haunts you during the day, I want to share a simple plan of action you can use.

- **Write it down.** Write your dream as a goal. Make it specific, achievable and measurable.
- **Break it down into action steps.** Don't just dream, don't just wish, take the first step. Decisions without actions have no value.
- **Get help.** Ask an expert. Seek out those with experience or skills.
- **Study and learn.** If there is no expert to ask, become the expert. Do your homework, study and do the research. People pay for knowledge and expertise.
- **Don't wait.** Do it now. If I have any regrets about living my dream, it is only that I didn't start sooner.

## Prison program teaches moms how to nurture their children

GATESVILLE, Texas — The scene appeared to be a typical leisurely Saturday: Mina Bolden sat at a table playing checkers with her youngest daughter Kourtney, 7, while talking to her oldest daughter Natasha, 14, and her son Stacey, 11, about their most recent sports endeavors.

Typical, except for the fact that this scenario was taking place in the Hilltop Unit of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice Institutional Division, the state women's prison in Gatesville.

Bolden, her children and about 75 to 100 other inmates and their families participated in Family Day, which involved nurturing time be-

tween the mothers and their children.

"It's a feeling of comfort to have a visit where it's not monitored like a regular visit," Bolden said. "It's nice to know we're going to have games and food and everybody's going to get to talk. It gives me an opportunity to know what my kids have been doing in their lives. It also gives me hope for when I get home to know that they'll forgive me, they're not mad at me and they love me."

Family Day is similar to a graduation ceremony for inmates who have participated in the most recent Enhancing Quality and Understanding in Incarcerated Parents (EQUIP)

program. The program is directed by Buckner Children's Ranch, a non-profit Dallas-based benevolent organization that serves families, children, seniors and adults throughout Texas.

The program was started in 1996, and offers a 15-week educational and therapeutic program to three groups of 10 at the Hilltop Unit. Inmates who are eligible to participate in the program must have children under 17, be eligible for parole within the next 12 months, be minimum custody inmates and have clean discipline records. The program is designed to prepare these women to be better mothers when they are released from prison.

## White sorghum adds new twist to old crop

### New varieties add value to popular crop

There's nothing new about the dark, red heads of grain sorghum ripening in the Panhandle fields.

What is new is the white or cream-colored grains ripening along side the red.

Dr. Fred Miller, geneticist and plant breeder, said the industry has worked for a number of years improving the yield and guaranteeing desirable traits to make white grain sorghum competitive with the more conventional varieties.

"The rest of the world uses white sorghum mainly for human consumption," Miller said. "The biggest push for growing more sorghum is coming from the poultry and swine producers."

Miller indicated if one big swine or poultry producer began feeding all white sorghum, they would use more than what the United States can produce.

Dr. Jeff Dahlberg, a research director with the Na-

tional Grain Sorghum Producers in Lubbock, said most grain sorghum producers in other countries grow white sorghums and consider the red or pigmented sorghums good only for feeding to stock.

sumption is made into porridge or flatbreads. People in these countries will not use stained flour caused from red or darker sorghums.

Unlike its red counterpart, white sorghums contain no tannins, which seem to tie up

tional value just as good if not a tad better than other feeds, white sorghums make an excellent choice as an animal feed," Dahlberg said.

A growing number of sorghum producers across the United States - 40 percent to 45 percent - are planting white or light sorghums, as well as the red varieties.

"There are some distinct advantages to white sorghum," said Dahlberg. "Some are small, but white sorghum growers will definitely have a market for their product."

Miller said the white grain sorghum shows a slightly better amino acid profile and the new varieties show less damage to individual grains than the older white or red varieties.

As far as the yield goes, Miller is expecting a strong showing from area growers. "Under a circle, we are seeing some fields which will produce maybe 9,000 pounds," Miller said. "Even our dryland fields should have a good yield."

Miller said white sorghums process slightly better because it has a lower bushel weight, which means it puffs better.

"Other than these few things the characteristics are about the same," Miller said.

"We are encouraging more of our growers to look at these growing markets and consider white sorghums," he continued.

Dahlberg said a few U.S. companies are looking into white sorghum uses, but the industry is not yet quite ready for table ready production.

Dahlberg, who has been a member of the Peace Corps, said most white sorghum, which is used for human con-

protein intake.

"There's no colored layer under the pericarp (the tough skin on the outside of the grain), so when it is ground up it makes a very white flour," Dahlberg said.

Tannins, which can change the color of the flour, can also create a staining problem for poultry and swine feeders.

For this reason many of the feeders will start the animals on a darker colored grain and then have to finish the animal with either white corn or wheat.

## Harder stresses farm safety

The week of Sept. 19-25 has been observed as the National Farm Safety and Health Week. Observance of this week must not happen just once a year but must be weekly to protect the agricultural sector.

Americans are encouraged to become more aware of the significance that agriculture plays in all of our lives, the importance of safety equipment and systems, proper maintenance, and preventing injuries and illnesses on farms and ranches. Not only for the week observed but year-round, safe work practices must be emphasized.

The Deaf Smith County Texas Partnership for Farm Family Health and Safety, a non-profit organization that formed in 1999, has been working during the last year to educate the public about safety practices through programs, media, and exhibits. Many safety practices applicable to the farm carry-over to the more urban setting and educate those citizens as well.

The Deaf Smith County Texas Partnership for Farm Family Health and Safety is

open to those interested in donating time, energy, or resources to help promote safety and health issues and more information on the Partnership can be obtained by calling the Deaf Smith County Extension Agent for Family and Consumer Sciences, Beverly Harder at 364-3573.

The National Safety Council's 1999 Edition of Injury Facts reports that agriculture is the second most hazardous industry in the nation with a rate over 22 deaths per 100,000 workers. The statistics also show an estimated 780 deaths and 140,000 disabling injuries in agriculture during 1998.

Tractor overturns remain the greatest source of fatal injury on the farm. Each year, hundreds of fatal injuries from tractor overturns occur with tractors not equipped with a Rollover Protective Structure (ROPS). Terry Wilkinson, manager, Agricultural Division of the National Safety Council, urges farmers to explore the availability of rigid and/or foldable ROPS for all tractors not currently having one.

Different age groups on the farm or ranch are receiving increased attention. Young

farmers under the age of 25 and farm workers over the age of 55 show a high risk of injury on the farm according to Wilkinson. New farm safety initiatives are focusing on these workers with positive outcomes to reduce their injury risk.

Other areas of major injury receiving attention to educate and train farm families and workers include the areas of extra riders on tractors and equipment, equipment entanglement, crop and manure storage facility hazards, exposure to toxic gases, chemicals, dusts and mold, sun exposure, stress, livestock handling, farm truck-related injuries first aid training response and care of injuries and illnesses in rural America.

This list of just some of the areas receiving attention through education and prevention indicates that National Farm Safety Week can not be observed just once a year - but is an EVERYDAY event that must be observed.

The Deaf Smith County Texas Partnership for Farm Family Health and Safety urges you to make safety a priority in your everyday farm or ranch operation.

## State peanut yields mixed results

COLLEGE STATION (AP) - The state's varied peanut crop is driving Texas producers nuts, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service reports.

Dr. Chip Lee, Extension plant pathologist in Stephenville said the state peanut acreage is down this year about 25,000 to 30,000 acres from what it was last year.

"The crop in the central part of the state is extremely poor because it has not rained," Lee said.

However, he said this is not the case throughout most

of Texas.

"In the Western part of the state, the crop is extremely good," Lee said, "as good as I have seen in the last several years."

He said crops in the Eastern Panhandle are average.

"It is not a great crop, but not a bad crop either," Lee said.

However, Lee said south of San Antonio, the peanut crop is excellent.

"Overall state production will probably be down slightly, but not very much," he said.

Production is down in acres, but only a slight de-

crease will occur in total tons produced, Lee said.

The varied production will not affect peanut prices, he said.

"Prices do not vary in peanuts," Lee said. "They are a

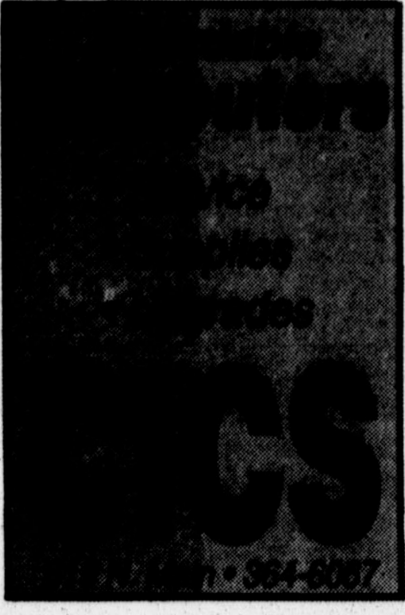



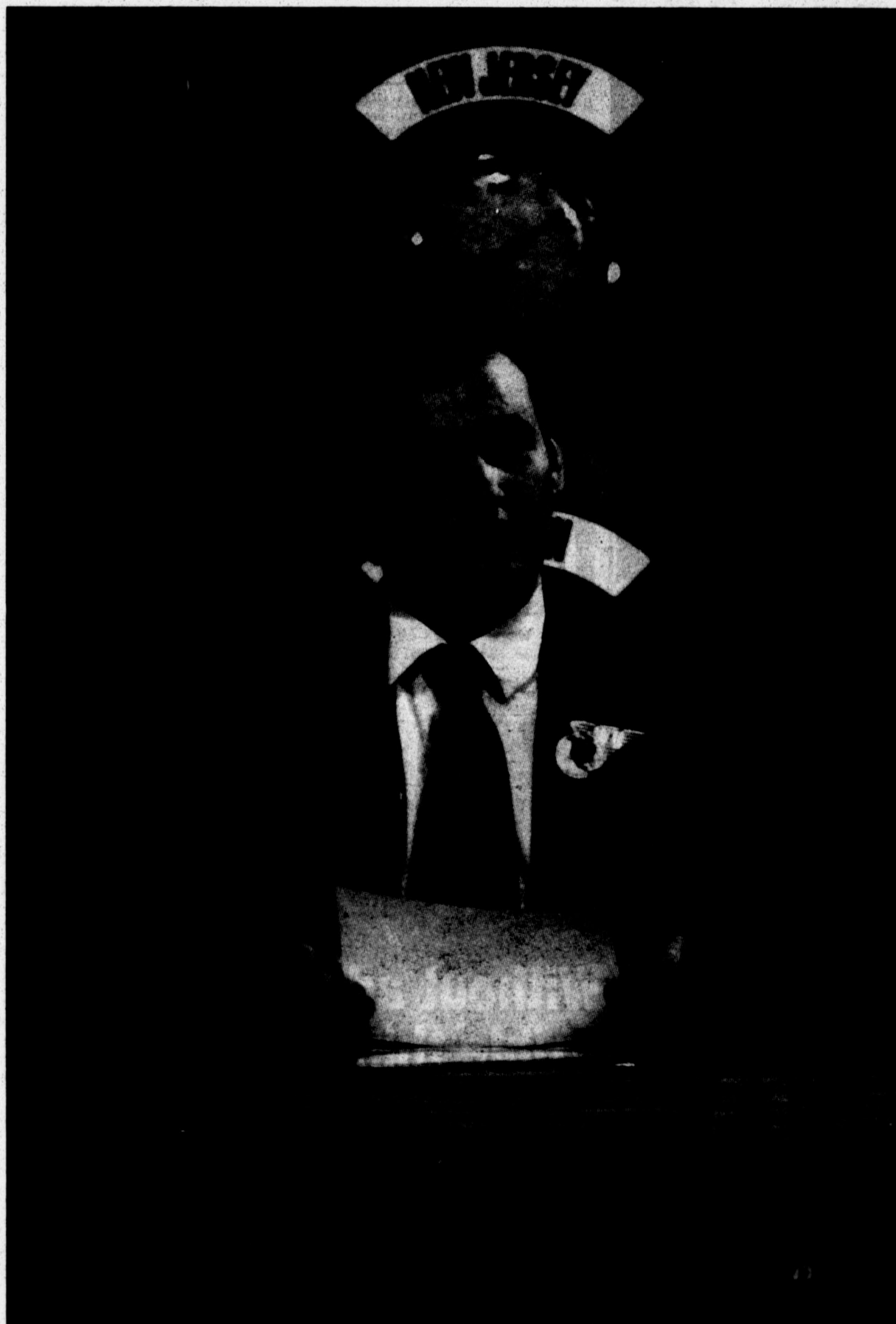

### Saturday Night Live marks another milestone

Sunday, NBC celebrates a quarter-century of late-night laughs courtesy of the Not Ready for Prime Time Players with *Saturday Night Live: The 25th Anniversary*. Bill Murray, an *SNL* regular from 1977-80, made a name for himself on the comedy series after replacing Chevy Chase behind the "Weekend Update" desk.

Hemlines were coming down, and Gerald Ford was falling down around the White House. People admitted they inhaled and were proud of it. It was against this setting that *Saturday Night Live* burst onto the scene.

Since its debut a quarter-century ago, one slot on television — Saturday after the late news — has belonged to only one show.

On Sunday, Sept. 26, a two-hour NBC special celebrates the show with *Saturday Night Live: The 25th Anniversary*.

"Primarily, it'll be a live show," longtime *SNL* executive producer Lorne Michaels explains. "I don't think we'll be doing sketches in any formal sense. You know, the first show will happen six days later. But, I think it will be a mix of clips and pretty much the people you would expect from the past and from the current cast. And music, at least two or three musical acts."

All former players have been invited to the special, which technically is airing at the start of the series' 24th season. But then again, the 15th anniversary special was at the premiere of the 14th season.

The show made its debut on Oct. 11, 1975, with George Carlin as guest host. At the time, NBC's biggest concern was that Carlin didn't plan to wear a suit and tie. That first year captured a generation bored with its parents' television.

"The references were entirely the ones that we understood, and I think the music was for us," Michaels says. "And I think the baby-boom generation somehow always thought that they would know what the No. 1 record was, and they would know a good movie from a bad movie, and they would know what was funny."

When things began to shift about 10 years ago and another generation began to express itself at *SNL*, Michaels says, the baby-boom generation was just as intolerant of change as the generations

before it. "I think it is natural for what was sort of music that you loved to turn into 'Turn down that noise,'" he adds.

During the years *SNL* has been on the air, many of the show's skits have become part of pop culture. Consider Gilda Radner's Emily Litella and her "Never mind," retort after completely misinterpreting a concept. Or Billy Crystal's unctuous Fernando with his "You look ma-h-h-h-velous."

Other routines — not all of them worthy — have been turned into movies, from the hit *Wayne's World* to the bomb *It's Pat*.

When early *SNL*-to-movie star Chevy Chase aped President Ford's proclivity for tripping nearly two decades ago, some viewers said the show should be yanked for its unpatriotic themes.

But millions tuned to see that very reverence. Over the years, the stinging satire and social parody of *SNL* helped launch the careers of Dan Aykroyd, Bill Murray, Billy Crystal, Jane Curtin, Chris Farley, Phil Hartman, Julia Louis-Dreyfus, Dennis Miller, Eddie Murphy, Mike Myers, Chris Rock, Adam Sandler, Martin Short and David Spade.

"To the extent that the show, I think, has been successful, it has changed, because it now deals with what people are doing, what they're thinking and talking about," Michaels says. "And if we were still doing the show that we did in 1975, we'd be on (rerun channel) TV Land."

While the show's presidential jokes now deal with fooling around, not falling down, some things remain the same: You'll still see it all skewered each Saturday night on "Weekend Update."

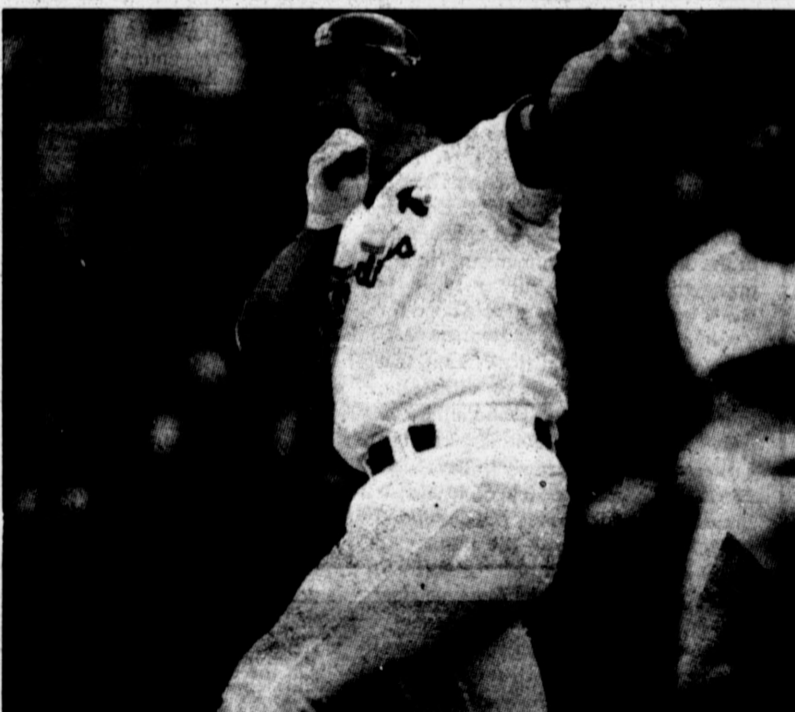

## Frontline profiles pope in season premiere

Karol Wojtyla has lived through some of the most tumultuous events of the 20th century. He witnessed firsthand the rise of Nazi Germany, cheated a 1981 assassination attempt and played a crucial role in the downfall of communism. He is a man who has seen humanity at its worst but still believes there's hope for a better tomorrow. If you haven't heard of Wojtyla, that may be because he goes by a different, more divine title: Pope John Paul II. He's the subject of "John Paul II: The Millennium Pope," airing Tuesday, Sept. 28 on PBS' *Frontline* (check local listings). The profile covers his childhood in Poland, his rise to the papacy in 1978 and his subsequent efforts to nudge mankind toward a more spiritual existence. Interviews, photos, film clips and musical selections illustrate what shaped the pope's dedication to his faith and the possible reasoning behind his denunciations of communism, capitalism and liberation theology.

To say the pope is against much of mankind's 20th-century path is an understatement. He has voiced his papal displeasure about everything from materialism and birth control to the ordination of women. The program doesn't hold back when discussing the pope's contradictory stances. He has been chastised for his opposition to women in the priesthood and for not being more vocal in response to the atrocities of the Holocaust. As for the pope's legacy, journalist Roberto Suro offers a unique perspective. "The pope (seems a) lonely, pessimistic figure," Suro tells viewers, describing the Polish pontiff as a man who appears only to view the dark side of modernity, a man "convinced that humankind has lost its way. A man so dark that he loses his audiences." That would make John Paul II a tragic figure, Suro surmises. "On the other hand, is he a prophet? Did he see something that many of us are missing?" Suro asks, concluding if that indeed is the case, "the tragedy is ours."

**Q:** What has become of Lucas Black, the talented young man who played Caleb Temple on *American Gothic*? He looked as if he had a promising career. —Ann Blackburn, San Marcos, Texas.

**A:** He still does, although he has said more than once that he really wants to be a bass fisherman when he grows up. Now 16, the Alabama native has been highly visible in movies since *Gothic* was canceled due to low ratings in 1996.

The show took its title from the name of a Paris cafe where Minneapolis divorcee Holly Aldridge (Valerie Bertinelli) worked while trying to put her life back together. Godin co-starred as Marcel, a mineral-water executive who was Holly's friend and occasional romantic interest.

**Q:** I enjoyed *Introducing Dorothy Dandridge* on HBO. *Dandridge's Carmen Jones* is shown regularly. Are there plans to screen her movie *Porgy and Bess*? —Leah via e-mail.

**A:** Not likely. The Gershwin family loathed this film version, complaining that executive producer Samuel Gold-

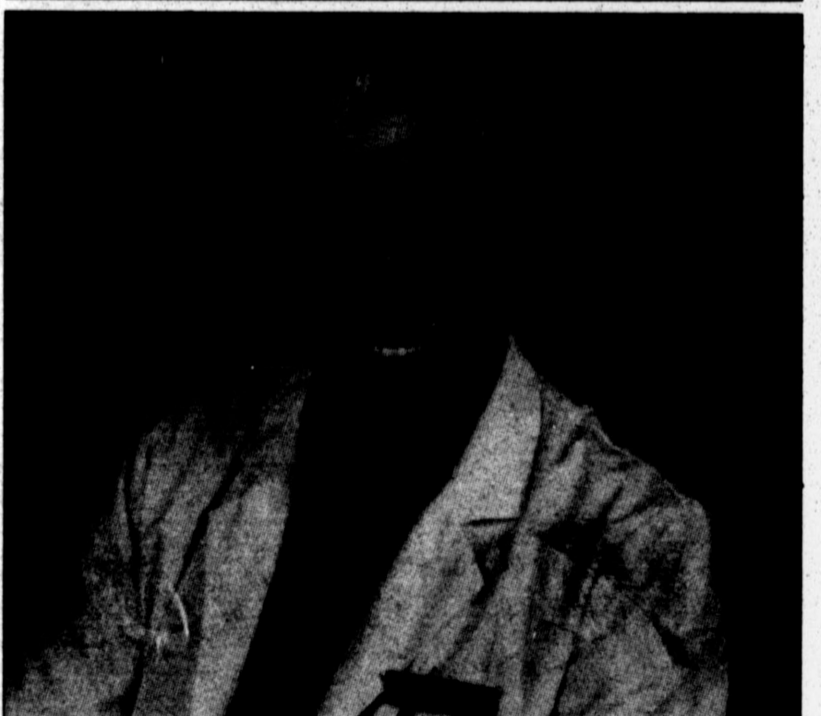

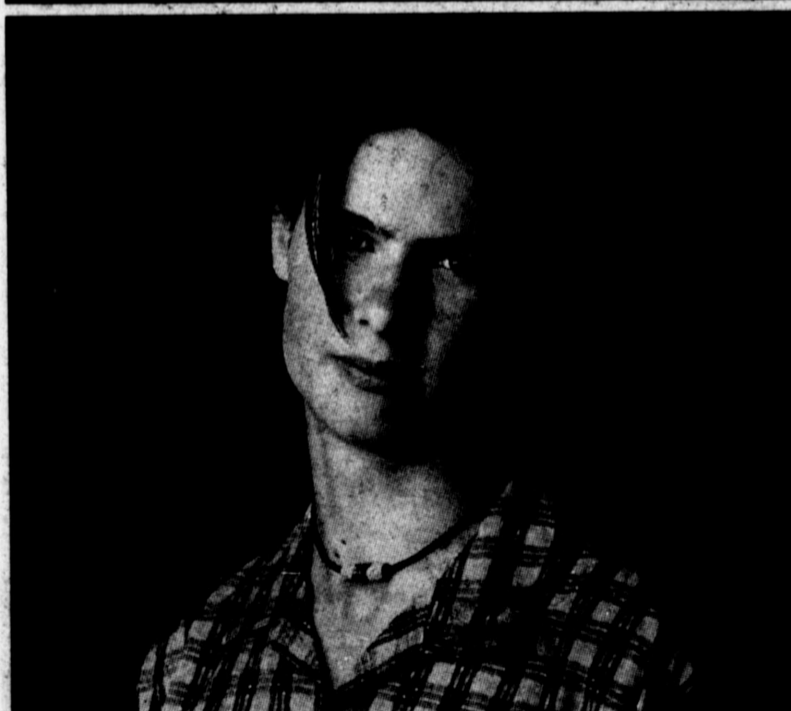

"I'm here taping our scenes now and I still can't believe all this is happening," Andrews says. "The musical director here at the show heard my music, and I guess he really dug it."

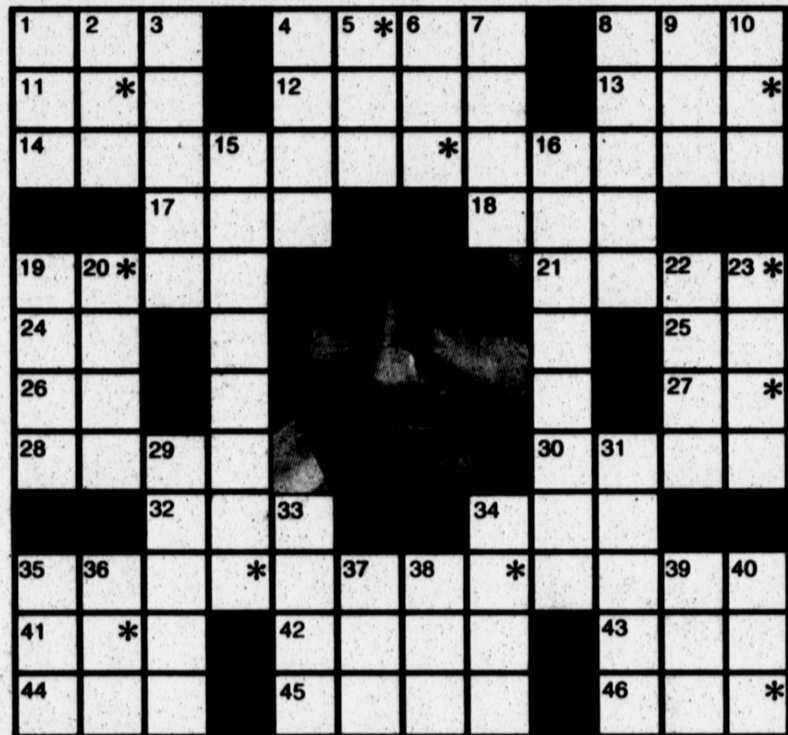
The blues musician will be performing one of the songs from his new album, *Time to Burn*.

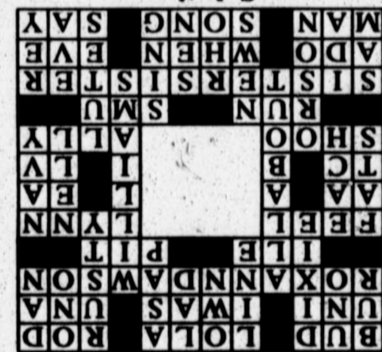

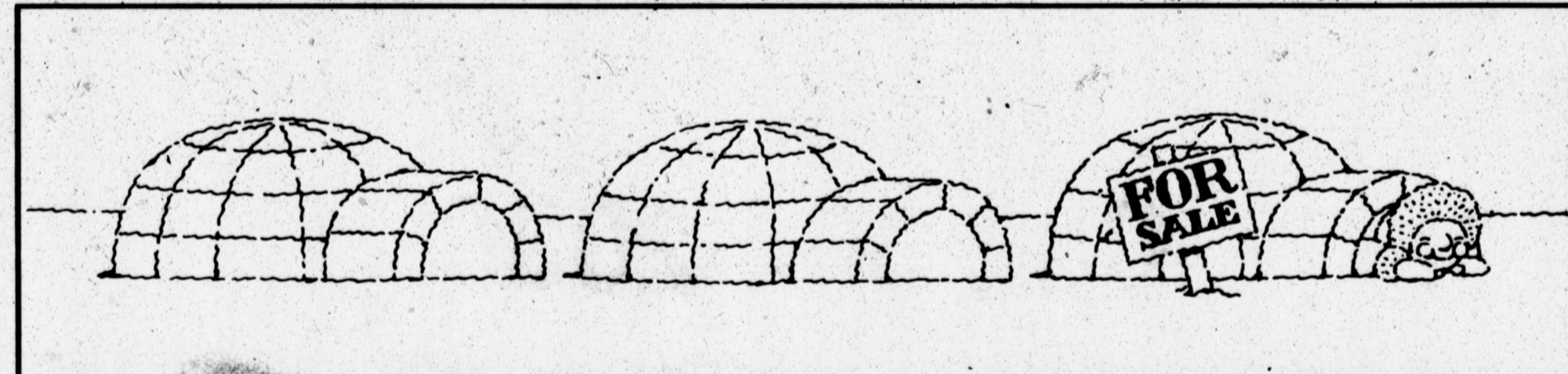
