

Aa Says Issue Of Soviet Interference On UN Agenda

Russia's Seat Empty; Iran Called Football

NEW YORK, May 22 (AP)—The United Nations Security Council decided today to continue the Iranian case indefinitely after hearing Iranian Ambassador Hussein Ala express doubt that all Soviet troops had left his troubled country.

NEW YORK, May 22 (AP) Hussein Ala, Iranian ambassador to the United States, told the United Nations Security Council today that he believed Iran's original complaint of interference by Soviet Russia "is still on the agenda."

Ala was invited to a seat at the council table on the request of the Netherlands delegate, Dr. Eelco Van Kleffens, after the United States and Great Britain had joined in a demand to keep the Iranian case on the agenda until a complete report has been made.

The ambassador said that Premier Qavam of Iran had asked that the question of Soviet withdrawal of troops from Iran be dropped. But, Ala added, the premier in his instructions had said nothing about withdrawing Iran's other complaint, that of Soviet interference in Iranian affairs.

Russia's seat at the council table was empty as the council met to decide what to do about Iran's case.

Dr. Oscar Lange, Polish delegate, charged that the council's attitude on the whole affair has served to make Iran "a perpetual football of big power politics."

Ala said he believed "it was long after May 6 when all of the Soviet troops were withdrawn from Iran—if they are actually out now."

He submitted a report from Premier Qavam last night saying Russian troops had left Iran by May 6.

Edward R. Stettin pointed out that the message from the Iranian government said "local people" in five localities had stated Soviet troops were out but "in the view of my government this is not sufficient evidence."

He called the situation "potentially dangerous" and "as yet unclarified."

He said he did not wish to propose at this time that the council make its own investigation but requested that the council keep the matter on its agenda.

Model Airplane Event Postponed

Due to several difficulties encountered by prospective entrants, the model airplane contest originally scheduled for Sunday has been postponed until June 16, Matt Harrington president of the local National Aeronautic Association chapter, announced today.

Several appeals were made for the postponement at the chapter's meeting Tuesday night, and in view of the large number making the request, the membership voted to set the new date, Harrington said.

Many local model plane enthusiasts reported that they needed extra time to get their planes in condition, and cited delays on shipment of repair parts recently ordered. Others have planes under construction and new planes ordered, which also are being delayed because of a shortage of parts. These conditions, coupled with the fact that the original date conflicted with high school baccalaureate services, prompted the postponement, Harrington said.

The contest probably will be enlarged, with the additional time available to make detailed arrangements. Under consideration is a division of exhibits for scale models. A prize range for these models, which do not actually fly, will be arranged within the next few days.

Youth Charged With Disturbance

Charges of starting a disturbance were filed by the county against a 17-year-old youth who police said was picked up Tuesday night after he vainly sought a man who had thrashed him earlier in the evening at the city park.

The affray at the recreational spot occurred, reports said, when the youth, accompanied by three juveniles, hurled insults at the wife of the man.

The juveniles were subsequently picked up but released after questioning. Released on \$100 bond, the 17-year-old's trial has been set for May 30.

Kuomintang Claims Its Troops In Kungchuling, Communist-Held City

Chinese government forces today claimed they had entered Kungchuling, halfway between Szepingkai and their goal, the Manchurian capital, Changchun.

Communists countered by closing in on Chaoyang in southeastern Jehol province and Tsinan, capital of Shantung.

Frontline dispatches relayed from Mukden reported elements of the government's new First Army reached Kungchuling, 40 miles south of Changchun, last night and that advance units today pushed seven miles further north.

Although government dispatches said National troops had "entered" Kungchuling and that advance units had pushed on north, it was not clear whether they had captured or by-passed that strategic city. Recently, government dispatches claimed the capture of Szepingkai but later reports showed they held only the southern part of the city. They required many days more to capture it.

With Changchun almost within artillery range, government Gen. Tu Li-Ming issued a press statement expressing hope that "the bandit force" (Communists) would "repent" and give up the capital to the Nationalists to avoid extensive destruction.

Mukden dispatches said the government's new First Army was advancing along five routes through and around Kungchuling. Some six weeks of fierce battling, chiefly for Szepingkai, and days of slow progress as the government troops plodded north afoot and with horse-drawn equipment, preceded the capture of Kungchuling. The push started as the Communists moved on Chai-gchun in mid-April when the Russians withdrew their occupation troops from the Manchurian capital.

General Tu told the press that three armies and 15 brigades of "bandit troops" totaling 110,000 men originally stationed at Szepingkai were preparing to attack Kalyuan and Changtu.

Soldier Suspected Of Killing Aged Man

VAN BUREN, Ark., May 22 (AP)—The body of an elderly Shreveport, La., man was found near Lake Fort Smith late last night and Crawford county authorities said they were holding an 18-year-old soldier on suspicion of murder.

The dead man, a small hole in his right temple, was identified as F. W. Joyner, about 60. Coroner Daisy Ocker said an inquest would be held today.

Cool Weather Felt In Central Texas

Cool weather prevailed over East and Central Texas today as a result of light thundershowers yesterday and last night. Snyder in West Texas reported a low of 46 degrees today while down in the lower Rio Grande valley Mission reported a high of 94.

The weather bureau said that easterly winds carried moist air throughout the state, but the east and central sections of the state received the only reported rainfall. The rest of Texas was partly cloudy today.

Stalin Says Russian Larder Nearly Empty

MOSCOW, May 22 (AP)—Prime Minister Stalin said today the Soviet Union already was doing what it could to feed the hungry world out of a cupboard that was getting bare and could not add to UNRRA's supplies at this time.

The Soviet leader's statement, published in Soviet newspapers and broadcast on the radio, was the first important announcement from the Kremlin on the world food situation, and came in reply to a letter from President Truman.

DALLAS, May 22 (AP)—Two Negro children, a boy six months old and a girl, 2, burned to death when their home caught fire here yesterday while their parents were away.

Weather Unfavorable For Crops In State

AUSTIN, May 22 (AP)—Weather conditions the past week were distinctly unfavorable for the best progress of growing crops and for necessary field work, the United States department of agriculture reported today in its weekly crop and weather bulletin.

Widespread hail damage affected nearly all crops and fruits, USDA said. High winds and heavy rains added to the damage and delayed small grain harvest. Drought conditions on the high plains were reported not greatly improved by light showers. Field work was at a standstill over many areas of the state.

Local Postal Workers Get \$18,000 Raise

More than \$18,000 annually will be received by Big Spring postal workers under the new pay raise bill signed Tuesday by President Harry Truman, Postmaster Nat Shick has announced. The bill grants \$400 per year raise to all regular workers and a 20 percent uplift to part-time workers, retroactive to last Jan. 1.

Locally, 23 fulltime Civil Service workers are affected, in addition to a dozen substitute employees.

Negro Soldier Shot By Second Witness

BAD NAUHEIM, Germany, May 22 (AP)—The Army confirmed today that a negro soldier who is a prosecution witness in the Lichfield trials was shot May 17 by a second witness in a quarrel over German girls.

Motion To End Food Subsidies Defeated

WASHINGTON, May 22 (AP)—A motion to end all consumer price subsidies on food next July 1 was defeated, 11 to 7, by the Senate banking committee today. Offered by Senator Capehart (R-Ind.), it would have exempted other subsidies now paid on copper, lead, zinc and rubber.

Mexico Increases Vigilance For Polio

MEXICO CITY, May 22 (AP)—A close watch is being kept along the borders of Mexico to prevent entrance of persons infected with poliomyelitis and spinal meningitis, Dr. Gustavo Baz, secretary of health, has announced.

He said Mexico normally has about 25 or 30 cases yearly. During the past six months the number of cases reported has been well within the experience rating, despite the reported prevalence in some border sections of Texas.

Oklahoma City Holds Suspect For Texarkana

Man Wanted To Buy Ticket To Arrive There At Night

OKLAHOMA CITY, May 22 (AP)—Chief of Police L. J. Hilbert said today police were holding a man for questioning in the deaths of five persons near Texarkana, all believed slain by a phantom killer.

Chief Hilbert said the man, 35, was arrested at the union bus station here as he waited for a bus to Texarkana, Tex., early today.

The chief added the man was picked up after a search started when Earl McCutcheon, manager of the bus station, called officers when a man bought a ticket to Texarkana and made repeated inquiries concerning schedules, declaring he wanted to reach there during "night hours."

The chief said the man picked up today fitted the description of the one who bought the ticket. He said McCutcheon would view him later in an attempt to identify him.

The man, who gave his age as 35, is dark skinned, has dark hair and eyes and is about average height.

Hilbert said the man told detectives he had been employed with a carnival here but had quit when it left.

The chief said the man told him his home was in Brookings, S. D. When asked why he wanted to go to Texarkana, Hilbert added, the man replied he "liked the town," and had left some personal belongings there. He would not say what the belongings were nor why he wanted to arrive at night.

Unions Submit 'Final Proposals' To Railroads

WASHINGTON, May 22 (AP)—John R. Steelman, presidential labor adviser, said today after an hour-long conference with the railroad brotherhoods that "I don't know about the chances for a settlement" before the rail strike truce expires at 4 p. m. tomorrow.

WASHINGTON, May 22 (AP)—Railroad brotherhoods said today they had submitted to the government a "final proposition" for settlement of the rail strike and may confer during the day with President Truman.

A. F. Whitney, president of the trainmen's brotherhood, told a reporter that Dr. John R. Steelman, presidential labor adviser, had advised him this morning by telephone that the brotherhood officials may be invited to the White House. Whitney said he is waiting to hear further from Steelman as to what time.

The strike of 250,000 engineers and trainmen is set for 4 p. m. (local standard time) tomorrow. "We gave Mr. Steelman a final proposition," Whitney said. "It is better than any we have submitted yet."

Whitney declined to give any details, saying, "You'll have to ask Mr. Steelman about that." The union leader said it was the second offer made since the two brotherhoods scaled down their wage demands from an original minimum of \$2.50 a day and 25 per cent generally to a minimum \$1.44 per day with a general 18 per cent wage boost.

"We now are waiting to hear from the government whether the new offer is acceptable to the carriers," Whitney said.

A spokesman for the carriers told newsmen that his group has neither heard from Dr. Steelman today nor had any word of a White House visit. Whitney said he did not know whether Steelman would invite only the brotherhoods to the White House or both the carriers and brotherhoods.

Connally Says All Should Write Treaty

WASHINGTON, May 22 (AP)—Senator Connally (D-Tex) told the senate today it is his "fundamental view" that all the nations which fought on the allied side should write the peace treaty, not the foreign ministers of the four big powers.

The chairman of the foreign relations committee made the statement in a report on the Paris foreign ministers' conference which he attended as an adviser to Secretary of State Byrnes.

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Lewis Asked To Give Support Encouraging Union Men To Work

WASHINGTON, May 22 (AP)—Two wartime naval officers took over the nation's soft coal mines today and waited eagerly for a sign from John L. Lewis that his 400,000 union members will stay on the job.

Government seizure — which raised the American flag over 4,500 pits — was announced by the White House in an urgent bid to keep alive the two-week strike truce, now set to expire Saturday night.

President Truman designated Secretary of Interior J. A. Krug, 28-year-old former naval lieutenant commander, as Federal Mines Administrator. To aid Krug, he assigned the hard-hitting boss of the wartime Seabees—Vice Adm. Ben Moreell, who ran the oil refineries after a similar seizure step last year.

The lieutenant commander and the admiral (their ranks now good-naturedly reversed) went to work on their major mission at once—to avert resumption of the strike next Monday. After that comes the task of settling the coal contract dispute without shattering the government's wage-price policy.

They scheduled a quick second meeting with Lewis at 9 a. m. CST.

At a preliminary session yesterday, the bushy-browed United Mine Workers' chief — obviously with the consequences of the Smith-Connally War Labor Disputes Act in mind — told Krug and Moreell that the question of working was one for each individual miner to decide.

But, Krug related, Lewis agreed to take under consideration a request for "support."

The new mine boss also met with the operators yesterday shortly after he took over his new assignment. As Secretary of the Interior, Krug also is Solid Fuels Administrator.

He emphasized at a news conference that whatever contract the mine administrators work out — in principle or otherwise — will have to be submitted to the operators before the agreement can be completed and the mines released to their owners.

House Unit Seeks Larger Peace Navy

WASHINGTON, May 22 (AP)—The house naval committee voted today to seek restoration to a pending naval appropriation bill of sufficient funds to provide a post-war navy of 1,079 combatant ships.

At a closed session, the committee decided to carry to the house floor tomorrow its fight to override the appropriations committee's recommendation for a fleet of 965 ships.

The 1,079-ship fleet is the size approved unanimously by the house late last year in legislation expressing the sentiments of congress with respect to the post-war navy. The senate has not acted on the house-passed bill.

Chairman Carl Vinson (D-Ga) disclosed the naval committee's action to reporters.

"We intend to make a strong fight," Vinson said.

Continental To Add Two Flights

Continental Air Lines will add two new flights in Big Spring on June 1, Marshall Poth, terminal manager, announced Wednesday.

The schedule, subject to confirmation by the postal department, calls for two southbound and two northbound flights out of here each day.

The first southbound flight arrives at 11:25 a. m. and leaves for San Antonio and San Antonio at 12:01 p. m. with San Antonio arrival at 2:12 p. m. The second, on a flight originating in El Paso, calls for arrival at 4:28 p. m. and departure at 4:33 p. m. with San Antonio arrival at 6:49 p. m.

To the north, the first flight arrives at 9:03 a. m. and departs at 9:06 a. m. with a prompt connection at Hobbs for Denver, Colo. The second northbound flight arrives at 5:35 p. m. with departure at 5:40 p. m.

Poth said that connections with other airlines were unusually good on the new schedule.

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USES To Channel Agricultural Job Seekers Through County Agent

Displaced war workers and veterans applying for jobs at the Big Spring office of the United States Employment Service will now be able to get job information about agricultural work as well as non-agricultural jobs through a cooperative agreement between the USES and the State Extension Service, H. A. Clark, USES local office manager, and Durward Lewter, Howard county agent, have announced.

"This plan has been worked out to help the Extension Service replace the emergency workers who have withdrawn from the labor force—men, women, youths and prisoners of war—with experienced agricultural workers released from war plants and the armed services just as rapidly as such workers become available," Clark said.

Under previous arrangements, the placement opportunities for agricultural employment were not adequately known to the USES, Clark said, and workers interested in agricultural openings were

merely referred to the office of the county agent for further information without knowing whether or not specific jobs were available for them when they got there.

"To remedy this situation, a plan has been worked out whereby the office of the State Extension Service will furnish the local USES office with a written list of current agricultural job openings taken from our orders on file," Lewter said. The list will contain the number of workers needed, their occupational classifications and sufficient information concerning employer specifications to enable USES interviewers to make proper selection and referral.

"The employment service will refer those applicants for agricultural openings meeting the job requirements specified to the County Agent's office," Clark added. "If the referral card returned to the USES by the county agent shows that the applicant referred is a claimant for either unemployment compensation benefits or readjustment allowances the USES will notify the Texas Unemployment Compensation Commission of these facts."

Patrick, who was due to return to Dublin tomorrow, has been permitted two visits daily to his brother, who has eaten nothing but vitamin C tablets since April 26 in a protest against prison conditions. An official report by prison authorities today said there was "no marked change" in David's condition.

High Life On Hudson To Pay Off For Riviera Owner, Hat Check Man

NEW YORK—A former booking agent named Bill Miller stands a hefty chance of being the young man of the year, Broadway showman division, if he can swing the weighty plans which now have the smarty-pants showmen, who are letting things slide until they can see a "trend," shaking their heads with dubious envy.

Having made a mark of sorts as one of Broadway's major independent bookers of talent, Miller, a young guy who rhymes as well as any Cuban, has turned his ambitions in the same direction which made Mike Todd and Billy Rose famous showmen.

The reason for the talk about this young guy is his opening a

few days ago of the Riviera, a fabulously-accounted night club located in a glamorous setting high atop the Palisades at the Jersey end of the George Washington bridge.

Bill bought this gay suburban glitter joint for \$750,000, and with the purchase price went a large slice of land around it, landscaped beautifully and expensively. He put another \$150,000 into it, he says, to re-paint and bring it back to its pre-war elegance.

The Riviera was built in the late thirties by a syndicate of gentlemen who invested an even half million dollars. It subsequently became a fabulous resort, with its cuisine and entertainment better advertised than the dice and roulette tables which made a weighty investment pay off. It had kitchens big enough to serve the largest hotel, and its modernity for the sake of the customers was almost equally matched below stairs, where the most efficient equipment made the service staff the happiest of any in the country.

Miller has bought two dozen limousines to carry his customers to and from their homes in Manhattan for a nominal fee. The customers will be able to sit on the picturesque Palisades and, through the huge window-walls, which disappear at a button's touch to let in the cool Hudson river breezes, look at the most glamorous skyline of any city in the world.

Miller also operates the successful Embassy Club on 7th St., where he stole a march on his fellow night club operators a few weeks ago by bringing to America the young French glamor boy, Charles Trenet.

The Riviera, to give you an indication of its size, will have a staff of 438 persons. Oscar Markovich, the hat check concessionaire, thought sufficiently of its chances of a huge success that he forked over a \$50,000 down payment on his \$75,000-a-season rental to Bill Miller before the place opened.

Florists Fashion Floral Chapeaux, Store In Icebox

BOSTON—Hothouse hats, which bloom at a predetermined date and are kept in the icebox with the milk at night, are the newest fancy in summer headgear.

The hats, which establish a new high in chapeau glamour, are designed for the wearer and are the origination of Eleanor O'Neill, a Boston florist with a flair for the unusual.

Miss O'Neill has levied upon science in the creation of her hats since she specializes in designing chapeaux for anniversaries and dates to be remembered, and to do this must be assured of blossoms that flower on the date the customer wants a hat.

Flowers are brought into bloom with a new device which maintains constant heat-flow. Scientists who developed the mechanism conducted tests which showed that the flowers could be made to bloom at any predetermined day, thereby assuring Miss O'Neill of the fragrant materials she converts into hats.

The festive bonnets sell for \$10 to \$40 and will last for five days provided they are parked in a refrigerator at night.

"Flower hats provide a new and exciting way of expressing the wearer's personality," says Miss O'Neill. "If she is the glamorous fragile type I use such flowers as gardenias, camellias or carnations in the pale shades. If she is a girl with many different personality facets, I combine the flowers, using some that are exotic and others that are more simple—perhaps a white orchid as the central flower with two or three butterfly orchids and a spray or two of white buddleia for fragrance. For a South American brunette who reminded me of Carmen Miranda I made a tiger lily hat and the night she wore it she was a sensation."

Miss O'Neill says she rarely makes two hats alike. "Every girl's personality is different, I try to express her individuality," she explains.

Smith Advocates Labor Contract Claims Court

A Labor Claims court, "where controversies between labor and management may be settled in peace and according to law," is one of the main proposals being advocated by John Lee Smith of Throckmorton in his candidacy for governor.

The lieutenant governor was a brief visitor in Big Spring Tuesday afternoon, on his way eastward after a speaking engagement in El Paso. He has a full schedule of addresses ahead, including talks this week at Paducah, Burnett, Hempstead and New Boston, but said he would return to this area later in his campaign.

Smith, who is completing his second term as lieutenant governor, is hammering away for a solution to labor-management differences. In regard to the Labor Claims Court, he said, "There is no valid reason why a labor contract should not be enforced in the court house in the same way that all other contracts are now enforceable."

"This certainly would be better for labor, management, and the general public, for strikes are costly. They cost the laborer wages, the employer profit, and they compel the general public to pay higher prices for all manufactured products."

"Methods of peaceful settlement of labor disputes would be more preferable than by lockouts and strikes. Law based on justice has been described as the guiding light of human progress. Let us lift the torch of a just law to light the way to industrial peace."

Valuable Horses Entered In Show

HOUSTON, May 22. (AP)—An estimated \$1,000,000 worth of horseflesh will be on parade at the \$15,000 Houston horse show scheduled Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights at the J. C. Abercrombie Pin Oak stables.

Proceeds from the show will go to the Navy League to build bowling alleys for the patients at the new Navy hospital here.

Among the entries will be Savage, a world champion road horse, and the Harross Sycamore Ace, recently purchased for \$20,000, from the stable of Lloyd Teater of Chicago.

Other well-known stables to be represented will be those of Mrs. R. L. Wheelock of Corsicana, 4-B farms of Amarillo, P. W. Woodruff, Jr., of Shreveport and Hobby Horse stable of Austin.

Stakes range from \$2,000 for the five-gaited to \$700 for the hunter and jumper divisions.

He said he would stay in the senate and "continue to try to get the government wrested from the political pirates who have taken control." Much of his speech was in condemnation of "communists, labor leader racketeers and New Deal stooges."

Rainey will announce his intentions in a statewide broadcast at 7:15 a. m. tomorrow and again the same day at 9 p. m. The broadcast will be carried by the Texas State Network of 14 stations and additional stations.

At a capitol press conference yesterday, Governor Stevenson admitted he had "some inclination" to run for reelection but refused to announce any plans or further details.

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Brazilian Soap Sent To Italy By UNRRA

LONDON, May 22. (AP)—A cargo of 420 tons of Brazilian soap, the first soap to be imported to Italy in several years, has arrived in Naples, UNRRA headquarters in London announced today.

The shipment came at a time when even hospitals and schools

were not able to provide soap. As a result, Italian authorities reported great numbers of children suffering from scabies.

The Brazilian shipment, UNRRA said, was enough to distribute approximately one ounce of soap to every person in Italy.

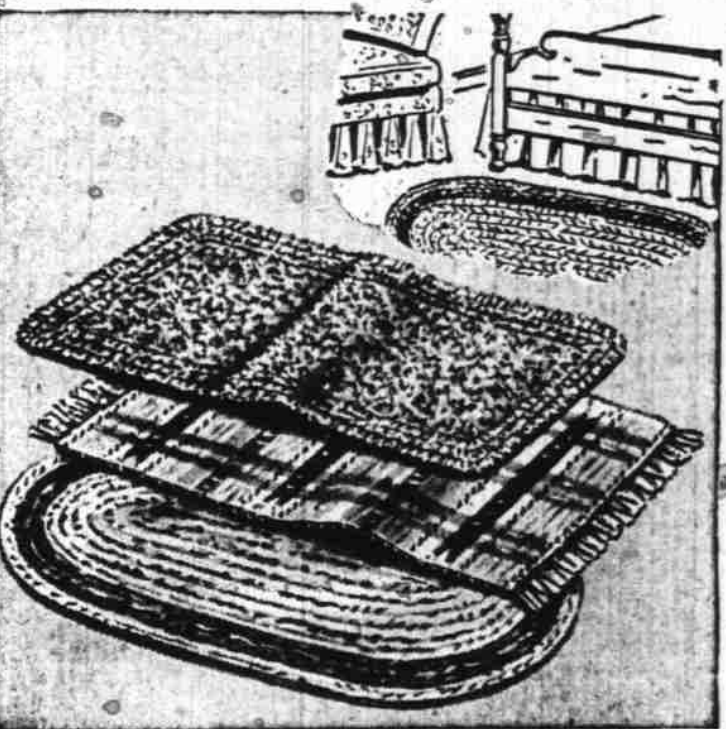

Vet Administrator Finds It Busy Job To Counsel Many Ex-Servicemen

By TOMMY HART

Primary purpose of the Veterans Administration is to assist ex-servicemen in applying for the benefits and services administered by the function—a job the local supervisor, Ray Boren, has discovered keeps him busier than the proverbial cranberry merchant.

Veterans, Boren found out soon after setting up shop here last Nov. 13, are not a bit backward about seeking information on what the GI Bill of Rights means to them. They besieged his office by the hundreds, each with a hundred questions on how they stand in relation to the legislation.

Last month alone, Boren conducted 75 separate interviews with ex-soldiers and sailors planning construction of new homes. He sometimes talks to as many as 13 a day seeking education benefits. Former GI's and gobs who desire surplus government property find the local office well supplied with catalogues on the available stock, being processed for sale in the southwest.

In April, Boren began correspondence for 22 veterans who had not received all their mustering out pay. Directing his inquiries to the camps where the boys were discharged, Ray invariably gets results.

In several instances, dependents of deceased veterans have gratefully discovered they are eligible for compensation through consul-

tation with the VA office personnel.

Requests for schooling are many and varied. Boren checks into the former serviceman's records as to his eligibility, then fixes up a certificate showing he is qualified for consideration under the GI Bill of Rights. The veteran takes it from there, making his contacts.

Most of the persons seeking to further their schooling pick some college in Texas, Boren's records show. However, there are exceptions to the rule. One ex-GI announced his intention to enroll in the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Something like a hundred applications for veteran benefits are now being made monthly through Boren's office. That volume of business is unprecedented and perhaps heavier in this part of the country than anywhere else in the United States but Boren and his help have been able to dispatch the applications through the proper channels without delay thus far.

Veterans learning a trade can

receive subsistence pay up to \$85 a month, if single, and up to \$90 a month, if married.

Former servicemen desiring government help on starting their own business clear their requests through the local VA office. Since he's been active here, Boren has had requests for assistance on all kinds of businesses—restaurants, paint shops, beverage parlors, motion picture houses, even skating rinks.

An odd thing about those skating rinks, Boren reminisces. He conducted something like seven interviews with ex-GI's interested in purchasing a skating rink, all within about ten days time, recently, and all of them were interested in the same rink.

Boren uses Big Spring as a headquarters but also serves Stanton, Lamesa, Gall, Snyder and Colorado City on an itinerant basis, visiting those places on three day trips starting the first and third Tuesdays of each month.

His immediate regional headquarters is located at Waco but will shortly become Lubbock.

He stressed the need of more participation by the individual in the government frontier; the importance of being a good neighbor in the international frontier; the new opportunities established by the country in the educational frontier; and the importance of making the right selection of the road to take on the religious frontier, the basis of all the others.

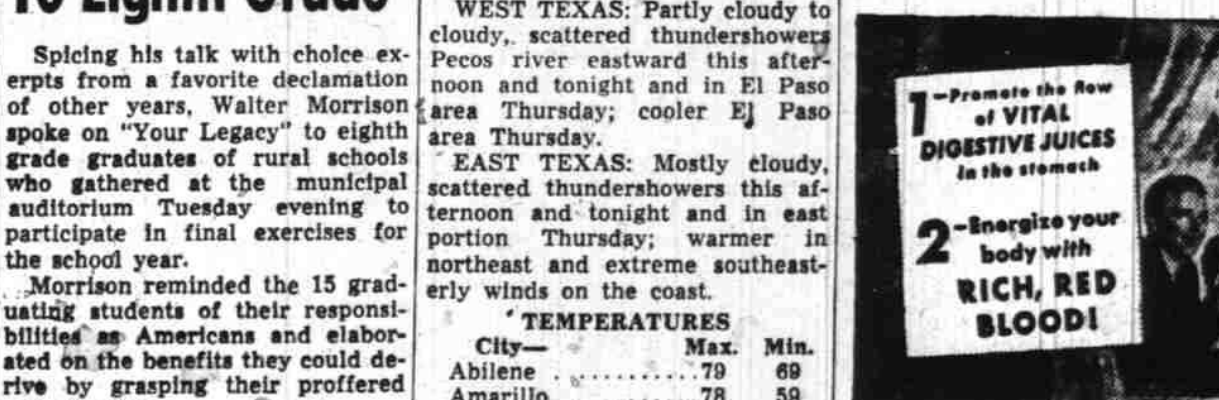

Ernest Bevin, British foreign secretary, told delegates from 31 nations to an international conference of agricultural producers that if enough people acquire the necessities of life Communism would vanish.

Said Mr. Bevin: "Nazism cannot exist, communism cannot exist if you remove from the world want and starvation... you cannot produce harmony out of hunger, starvation and privation."

Perhaps the answer is not as simple as that, but Mr. Bevin does have something there. Most of the troubles we experience in social fields, at least, originate out of

poverty, squalor and similar mass circumstance. On the other hand, agencies and institutions, which have had most success in rehabilitating people, have begun by putting something in a man's stomach before they began working on his conscience and soul.

It is true that "man does not live by bread alone," but neither does he live without bread. Mr. Bevin's suggestion is not the complete answer, but it logically is one in a series of answers.

It would be interesting to test his theory in Russia. If Joe Stalin succeeded in making all of his people prosperous and happy, would he succeed himself to death?

We've Been Nice Long Enough

Phillip A. Schraub, Corpus Christi attorney, has filed for a place on the ballot as a candidate for the legislature from Nueces county alone—an office which does not now exist.

Thus he injects an interesting issue into the 26-year fight for redistricting. If his name should be placed on the ballot and he is elected, most surely the issue will be thrown directly into the house of representatives at Austin over whether to seat him.

Odds are that should he ever get as far as the house, he would get no further. Yet the presence of a man duly elected by the people from a county clearly entitled to a representative of its own should give cause for reflection on the part of some representa-

tives who come from districts with as little as 30,000 population.

Just how they could justify their presence while denying that of one from Corpus Christi would be curious. Perhaps they would hide behind the law—but certainly not the constitution, which they have openly flouted since 1920 by failing to redistrict.

Probably this unique step won't accomplish anything within itself, but the cumulative effects of many resorts to every possible means of forcing the issue may compel the legislature to do a duty so plain that it should have been done more than two decades ago.

Time is over-ripe for action. We've been nice long enough. Let us use every legal stick and stone possible to get justice.

Congress And Strike Legislation

WASHINGTON, (AP) — Here's an ABC on what Congress is talking of doing about strikes and labor management disputes.

It is talking of making it less easy to call strikes.

But right here make a distinction between the House and Senate.

Some months ago the House, angry about strikes at that time, passed the Case bill.

That's one of the most severe measures to curb unions ever passed by either branch of Congress.

The House sent it to the Senate. There Senate friends of labor toned it down in committee and put it in moth-balls.

It might have stayed there if John L. Lewis strangled coal strike hadn't come along.

But the coal strike came. The

country suffered. Some senators got sore.

They dusted off the Senate version of the Case bill and yanked it up for a vote.

But first they want to toughen it up.

They want to tack changes on it in the form of amendments. The big fight in the Senate will come over these amendments.

Here's what the Senate is talking of doing:

1. Strengthen the government's conciliation service.
2. Compel both sides to use this conciliation service for 60 days before there could be a strike.
3. This might give both sides a better chance to cool off and reach an agreement.
4. Forbid a company to contribute to a union's health and welfare fund if the fund were to be handled entirely by the union.
5. This is aimed at John L. Lewis.
6. Outlaw secondary boycotts. (This is a provision of the Case bill. It means: if a union strikes against a company, a second union could not refuse, through sympathy for the strikers, to handle that company's goods.)
7. Make a union liable for dam-

The Little Werewolves

BERLIN, (AP) — Werewolves eat doughnuts at dusk.

At least the two who howl outside my front gate just before twilight do. They are German children — Manfred and Karin — but around the press camp they are known as "The Little Werewolves."

They are probably the largest consumers of doughnuts and soft drinks per capita in what remains of the Reich.

Manfred calls me his "Onkel Amie," which is his own compression for "Uncle American." He is a thin blue-eyed boy, blond as lemon pie and active as a kitten with worms. He is one of the most affectionate kids I ever saw. When he sees you coming, he runs half a block to meet you. When he is about five weeks away, he hurls himself through the air, completely confident you will catch him. Then he puts his skinny arms around your neck and gives you a hard quick hug, and looks up with a smile that seems to say he has been waiting all day just to say hello to you.

of her second glass of soft drink. Each afternoon they wait outside the gate, and "the doughnut hour" has become a ritual.

Both children dress neatly, but Manfred hasn't any shoelaces. He uses telephone wire. He always carries a small cardboard box. The German woman who works in the press club cloakroom says he collects cigar butts in the box and takes them home to his father.

Both children seem to spend the entire day roaming the streets. They know only a few words of English, such as "hello," "okay" and "bye-bye." Some days Manfred says he is three years old, other days he says he is four or five.

I think he must be five because he has started stealing tennis balls from the club court. As the press club has only six tennis balls, Manfred is falling into some disfavor.

"Manfred, find us a tennis ball and you can have a doughnut," the correspondents say after threats fall to move him. Manfred immediately streaks for home and returns with a tennis ball or two. He always manages to keep one in stock, yet no one has ever caught him taking them away.

Manfred is all sold on going to America, a land which he visualizes as flowing with soft drinks, tennis balls and doughnuts. He takes family responsibilities lightly. Once the cloakroom lady asked him if he went to America who would take care of his mother.

He thought that over from all angles, took another bite of doughnut and said placidly: "Well, I guess papa will just have to."

I suspect Manfred likes her chiefly because she always lets him finish the last half

Hoover Holds Ground On Food Issue

WASHINGTON, (AP) — A distinguished group of government officials, publishers, and businessmen who sit on President Truman's famine emergency committee gave his off-the-record report on his world inspection trip. It was not an encouraging picture. Millions of people, he said, were beyond any help in China.

Toward the end of this discussion, a voice came from one of Hoover's listeners. It asked: "What's going to be done for the manufacturers of this country? What are we going to get in the way of corn and wheat?"

The question came from Clarence Francis, president of the giant General Foods Corporation.

"Oh, I don't think anyone is going to starve over here," replied Mr. Hoover.

Other members of the famine committee sat silent and amazed as Francis pursued his queries. He tried to pin the ex-President down. Hoover, however, did not yield. He felt that American manufacturers could take care of themselves.

Mr. Francis happens to be one of the biggest food manufacturers in the country. He is an executive of Best Foods, Walter Baker, Diamond Crystal Salt, Calumet Baking Company, Jell-O, Maxwell House Coffee, Postum, Minute Tapioca, La France Manufacturing Company. His company also has the distinction of having been investigated by the Agriculture Department for getting a corner on a large part of the U.S. market last year. Chief stockholder of his company, Mrs. Joseph E. Davies, aunt of Barbara Hutton, serves more food at her swank parties than almost any other Washington hostess.

essential for war plant construction.

However, the brick plant was in the path of a clover-leaf series of highways which Colonel Groves planned around his pet Pentagon building. The brick plant did not interfere with the Pentagon building itself, only with the ornate, modern highway system. So Groves decreed that the plant be moved.

This meant that several hundred thousand dollars' worth of highly critical materials would have to be diverted from the rest of the war program for new construction of the brick plant at another location. It meant structural steel, steel rails, reinforcing steel, alloy steel, lumber, electrical equipment, brick dryer cars, rubber conveyor belts, dryer fans, heating equipment, etc. It also meant overburdening the railroads by hauling 3,000 car-miles of brick per day into Washington to replace the brick being made by the West Brothers.

The War Production Board, therefore, recommended that the brick plant remain where it was until after the war, and one of the roads detour slightly to go around it. Colonel Groves, however, said no.

to 1 in favor of OPA. Mail clerks had to work in three-hour shifts to handle them.

NOTE—One result of the first deluge of OPA mail was that Senator Hawkes of New Jersey, former president of the US Chamber of Commerce, and vigorous enemy of OPA, now says he isn't quite sure how he will vote. Another OPA opponent, Congressman Auchincloss of New Jersey, has been apologizing to constituents for his vote, says he didn't understand the Wolcott amendment. Beauty Before War

Reports Herbert J. Weber, then of the War Production Board: "I myself, visited Colonel Groves. I pointed out to him that the only product of condemning every other consideration to the prosecution of the war. I showed him the charts of detours around the brick plant which would bring the approach roads to the Pentagon just as effectively as would the route through the brick plant, albeit less decoratively."

"I might just as well have talked to a brick wall. Colonel Groves showed himself totally devoid of interest in subordinating every other consideration to the prosecution of the war. He showed himself incapable of patriotic motivation."

"In this matter, Colonel Groves—now the allegedly great General Groves—did, in fact, materially and knowingly retard the prosecution of the war. The War Production Board had to allow the diversion of highly critical materials. Colonel Groves knowingly created that situation in order to construct a decorative approach to the Pentagon building."

No one would begrudge General Groves his present spotlight on the stage if he were not today applying these same Pentagon tactics to dominating the future control of the atom—a future which affects the life of every man, woman, and child in America.

Synthetic A-bomb Hero

The American public has a habit of seizing upon personalities connected with historic events and making them heroes. They are interviewed on the radio, played up in the magazines; their faces flashed on every movie screen in the country. Overnight and out of the unknown, they become great men.

Sometimes, of course, it happens that the real heroes get no acclaim. This, however, is inevitable and not particularly dangerous unless the synthetic hero attempts to stay on the scene and use the glamour of his overnight build-up to influence unduly the American public.

Such an accidental hero was made when an historic bomb was dropped over Hiroshima. Overnight, the man who through pure luck was assigned to the construction of production facilities for the atomic bomb became a hero. The scientists who spent years working out the secret of the atom, the men who were spurned by the Army and Navy until they took their idea to Roosevelt, were given publicity back seats, while one hero, Gen. Leslie B. Groves, strutted across the stage.

No one would begrudge General Groves his moment of swagging splendor if he had taken his bow and passed on. However, he has remained to hog the stage; remained to pose as a great expert, whispering in senator's ears, trying to tell them what laws to pass, and now dominating Bernard Baruch's study of atomic energy.

In the files of the War Production Board (file No. 18095) is one small sample of the overrated efficiency of Leslie B. Groves. Then a colonel, Groves was in charge of building the much-discussed Pentagon building, giant home of the War Department. Near the site of the building was the West Brothers Brick Company, then engaged in making brick, considered

INDIANAPOLIS, May 22 (AP)—If a European driver wins the 500-mile race at Indianapolis Motor Speedway May 30 it will be the first time in 30 years.

Europeans won three of the first six races, from 1911 through 1916, but as speeds have increased on the two-and-a-half-mile oval they have been increasingly handicapped in competition with Americans.

Europeans Race Clockwise
In the first place, the Indianapolis classic is run counter-clockwise, opposite to the European practice. The straightaways are relatively short as compared with Europe's tracks and long experience is needed to learn the "groove" of the brick and asphalt.

European drivers usually have been able to defeat Americans in the "old countries" because of the different conditions and cars built to take advantage of them.

A major disappointment to American racing fans in this year's Indianapolis race is the inability of Rudi Caracciolo of Switzerland and Tazio Nuvolari of Italy to renew their rivalry. Caracciolo, European prewar racing champion, was refused permission to ship his German-built Mercedes to the United States. Nuvolari gave up plans to compete because of the death of his son.

Nuvolari has sent three Mercedes in charge of Achille Varzi. Altogether there will be 10 Mercedes in the race but five are owned and driven by Americans. Harry O'Reilly of Schell of Monaco has entered two of the others.

Schell originally intended to bring an Alfa-Romeo and another Maserati but notified Speedway officials he could bring only two. As drivers, Schell has nominated himself, Ralph Lanza and Louis Gerard.

Fifty-three cars are entered but only 33 will be permitted to start, so the drivers from abroad must drive faster than 20 American pilots in order to qualify for the starting lineup. Qualifications began May 18 and end two days before the big race.

Feller Handcuffs Yankees, 7 To 2 With Five Hits

Earl Johnson, a Battle of the Bulge vet who naturally finds no terror in enemy baseball bats, rates as Joe Cronin's relief ace with three straight "fireman" decisions for the soaring Boston Red Sox.

Every pennant club needs one dependable reliever with leewards in his veins who can step into the midst of a batting rally and quiet the opposition. Cronin appears to have that man in Johnson, a native of Redmond, Wash., who was awarded the Bronze Star for bravery in action before he was commissioned a first lieutenant on the field of battle.

After Joe DiMaggio had belted Joe Dobson for a grand slam homer in the opener of the "slap" series at Yankee Stadium two weeks ago, Cronin waved in Johnson and the lanky left-hander blanketed the Yanks with one hit in the remaining five frames.

Detroit found out about Johnson yesterday when once again he came in to save a game that Dobson almost lost, hurling five hitless innings and drive home the winning runs of a 6-4 triumph.

Although Cronin hopes to make Johnson a starter, slowness in rounding into condition forced the skipper to put him in the bullpen. He got the decision over Washington, April 17, failed to last in his lone starting job against the Senators, April 23, and then beat the Yanks and Tigers. In his last 12 innings on relief, he was allowed only two hits.

The Sox' first place margin was increased to six full games when the New York Yankees fell before Cleveland's Bobby Feller, 7-2. Rapid Robert, facing the Yanks for the first time since his no-hit, yielded only five blows and ran his strikeout total to 93 in 80 innings by fanning eight men.

In the only other scheduled tilt in the American, Jack Kramer hurled the St. Louis Browns into sole possession of fifth place on a 4-3 edge over Philadelphia.

The pesky Phillies knocked over the St. Louis Cardinals, 4-3, dumping the Red Birds into an exact first place tie with the Brooklyn Dodgers, who were rained out of their game with Cincinnati after playing one inning.

Wet grounds forced postponement of the Pittsburgh-New York game and the Chicago Cubs and Boston were not scheduled.

Bishop leads the fielding for pitchers with .964. Tom Chandler of Baylor tops the catchers in fielding with .980. Leon Mitchell of Texas the first baseman with 1,000. Reuben Ortega of Texas the second sacker with .947. Chick Zomlerfer of Texas the shortstop with .907. Julian Pressley of A. and M. the third basemen with 1,000.

TEXAS FARMERS TAKE TO THE AIR TO WHIP MUDDY ROADS, ISOLATION

Texas farmers and ranchers have whipped muddy roads and isolation by taking to the air.

An estimated 600 are using planes. An organization called Flying Farmers has been formed.

Muddy roads can't prevent their going to town to buy needed articles, or deliver light products to market.

Planes also help them speed up their work. They ride fences, looking for breaks from the air. They spot livestock in isolated areas.

E. W. Gill, Jr. of Coleman county predicts the time will come when he'll have a loud-speaker system in his plane, and direct roundups from the air.

R. L. Gibson is a pioneer in the use of planes on ranches and farms. And he's 75 years old! He's from Lynn county. He uses a plane to hunt lost stock, chase coyotes and fly farm machinery parts from town. He said he soloed after ten hours instruction, says

flying is no more difficult than driving a car. He took up flying when he was 72.

Robert S. McCormack of Ellis county lives 15 miles from town, but he says he's whipped the mud. When roads are impassable, he flies into Ennis for ice, groceries, ice cream and medicines.

Clayton Beard of Lynn county uses his plane for dusting his cotton crop and for checking on soil erosion, easily seen from the air.

A Texas chapter of the Flying Farmers was organized at College Station recently. It will seek affiliation with the National Flying Farmers' association. A Flying Farmer, as defined by the by-laws, must hold some type of flying license and have 51 percent of his capital invested in farming.

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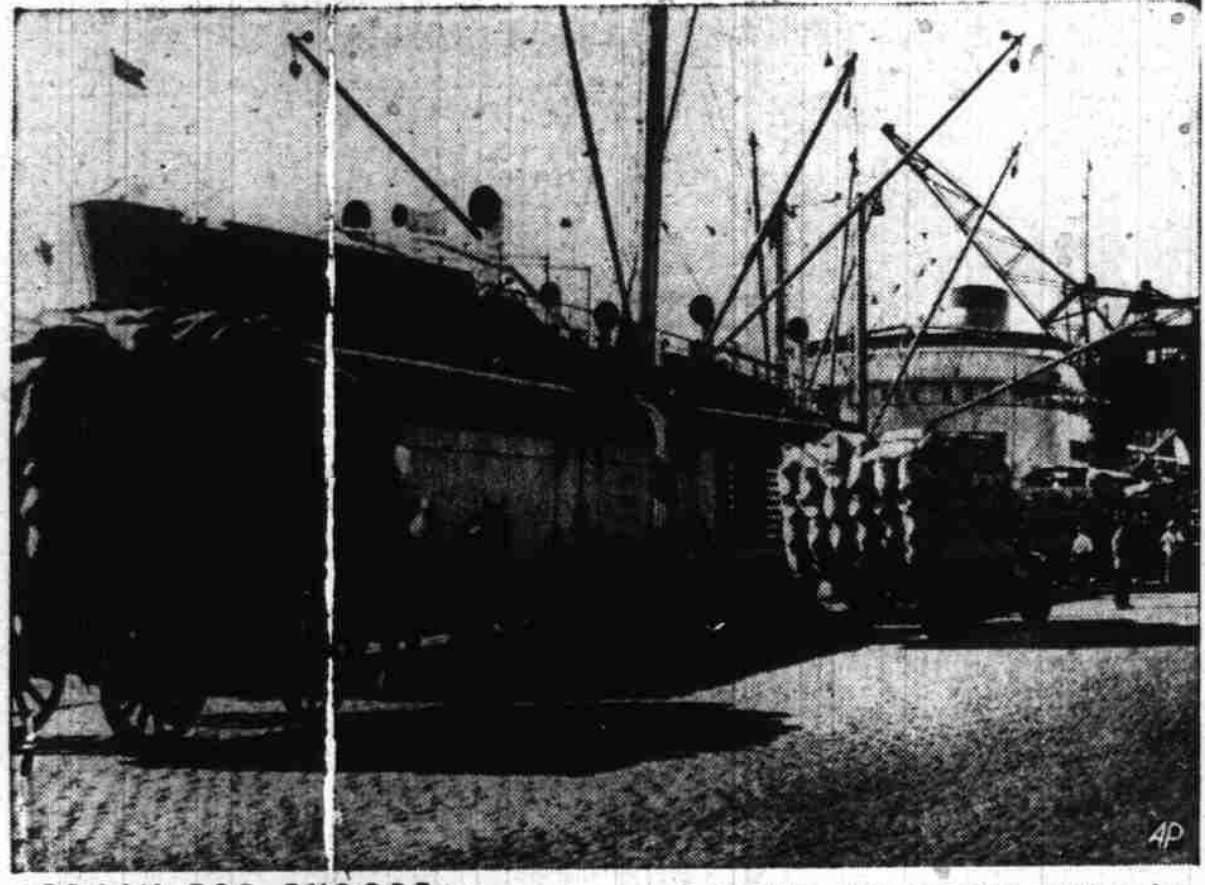
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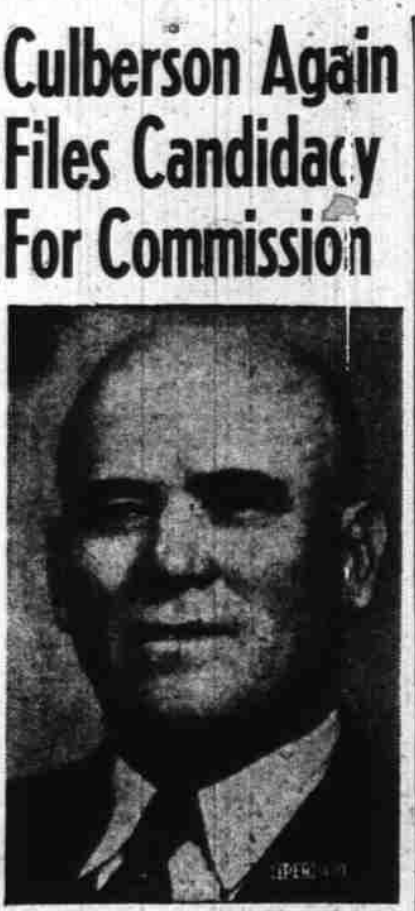
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Average Crude Oil Production Rises

Culberson Again Files Candidacy For Commission

Three Infants Die At Sea On Brideship
NEW YORK, May 22 (AP)—Three babies died aboard the brideship Zebulon Vance during its 13-day voyage from Le Havre to New York and 16 others were stricken by an undetermined malady, the New York port of embarkation disclosed last night.
All but two of the children were about six months old. Col. John U. Schless, chief of public relations for the port, said. Names of the infants were not announced. The all-

ing children have been removed to the Army hospital at Fort Hamilton, Brooklyn.
The vessel, carrying 426 war brides and children from France, Belgium, Poland and Holland, arrived Monday.
Schless said Army physicians had not yet diagnosed the illness but added that autopsies were being performed and tests already had been started on the food, water, milk formula and other supplies aboard the ship.
He declared "the vessel was equipped with enough medical officers and supplies to handle any ordinary situation that might occur."
Dr. John Battenfield, 33-year old veteran and director of health services for the University of Oklahoma, said he believed the illness of his six and a half month old daughter, Myriam, was caused by "poor sanitation" aboard the ship.
Dr. Battenfield, who said he served with the 551st Parachute Infantry regiment as a medical officer, said he had removed his child from the Army base hospital to a New York hospital.
Col. Schless made no comment on Dr. Battenfield's statement.

Ex-Reichs Protector Hanged As Criminal
LONDON, May 22 (AP)—The Prague radio announced today that Karl Hermann Frank, former reichs protector for Bohemia and Moravia, had been publicly hanged today as a war criminal.
Frank was convicted by a Czech people's court yesterday on charges of responsibility for the massacre of Lidice—a village of about 500 population 18 miles from Prague which was obliterated by the Nazis in June, 1942, in revenge for the slaying of Reinhard Heydrich, Frank's predecessor.
