Lamesa Post Office Is To Close Each Saturday Afternoon

According to announcement made by Postmaster Owen Taylor, the local postoffice will be closed each Saturday afternoon at 12 noon and will remain closed until Monday morning. This schedule will begin on January 2nd, the first Saturday in next year, and continue until further notice.

This change has been made necessary to comply with the new 40-hour week which has been inaugurated by the government mail service.

The local postoffice force will appreciate the cooperation of the public in this move. It may take a little time to get used to the new schedule, but remember that if you have business with the stamp, parcel post, money order or general delivery windows on Saturday, you will have to transact it before noon. Only two more Saturdays before this closing hour will become effective.

With the new schedule on mail from the east, coming from Big Spring instead of Snyder, the incoming mail will be more regular and mail for general delivery will be up in plenty of time to be called for before the window closes at noon.

Mr. Davenport was an extensive property owner in the southern part of the county. He came to Dawson county some ten or twelve years ago to take charge of the Ackerly estate holdings in this section. Later he purchased this property from the Ackerly interests.

Surviving Mr. Davenport are his widow and a nephew which has lived with them for several years.

Committee Named To Study Soil Erosion Control

Ways and means of providing equipment needed to continue and augment work begun in soil erosion in Dawson county was the theme of a meeting at the court house Tuesday afternoon, when several civic leaders met with the Commissioners Court to discuss government soil conservation control in this county.

As pointed out by the government representatives, this work can only be started by the government agencies. The demonstration work done by the government is not sufficient and must be followed by private work. The land owners are anxious to continue the work in the most cases but the equipment required for the terracing is too large and expensive for it to be practical for the individual farmer to purchase it.

Several plans for making this equipment available for the small land owner have been used in the Panhandle and these were discussed at the meeting. It was agreed that erosion control as already demonstrated by the work of the Lamesa CCC organization, was one of the problems which must be worked out by the citizens of this great agricultural region if the fertility of the soil is to be maintained. And some immediate and definite plan is needed to guarantee that the program as begun can be continued and enlarged.

A committee was appointed by the chairman of the court, whose duty is to investigate the various methods now being used to furnish equipment for the work of terracing farms which needed the work, and try to work out some practical plan by which necessary equipment can be made available in Dawson county.

Members appointed on the committee were W. M. Yates, Joe M. Peterson, A. G. Bearden, Joe Matthews and Elmer Barron.

Rules Given For Observance Of Traffic Lights

The traffic lights are installed and in operation and practically every body seems to be pleased with the results in controlling our traffic. However, in order to secure the maximum benefits from the lights it is necessary that everyone understand the special rules of driving and walking in connection with the lights. With that in mind, and the necessary changes in some of our traffic regulations brought about by the traffic lights the City officials have passed the following rules and are asking you to cooperate in the observation and enforcement of the rules:

1. Always stop on a red light and wait for a green signal before going.
2. Always go on a green signal.
3. Left hand turns are permitted on green signals.
4. No U-turns permitted on lights around the square.
5. A right turn is permitted on green and red lights, but in case of a right hand turn on a red light, the driver must come to a stop before turning.
6. No driver shall exceed a speed limit of 20 miles per hour within the city limits of Lamesa.
7. No center parking is allowed in the streets. All cars must park to the curb.
8. A short time for double parking will be allowed for loading and unloading purposes.
9. Pedestrians (walkers) must observe the signals the same as drivers; crossing the streets on green lights and stopping on red lights.

The signals are for the protection of everyone, drivers and walkers alike, and both must observe them. A pedestrian crossing the street on a red light is in great danger, since the automobile drivers have open traffic and are watching the signals and cannot watch for pedestrians who may carelessly walk out into the street in violation to the signals.

The City is to be commended for the forward move in an effort to improve our traffic conditions in Lamesa, and it deserves the fullest cooperation of everyone. Please remember that there should be no exception in any case everybody should be treated alike and certainly no person is ever in such a hurry that he cannot stop for a few seconds for a traffic signal, especially when lives may be endangered by his failure to do so. The way you cooperate in the observation of these signals is a mark of your citizenship.

Terracing Survey Will Be Made By Committee Soon

The Soil Conservation Committee appointed at the meeting of the Commissioners Court Tuesday plan a survey of the county to determine how many farmers are interested in contouring or terracing their land in the next four months. The purpose of the survey is to determine as nearly as possible the acreage which will require the use of special equipment in terracing the farms.

The information gained from the survey will be used in determining the kind, amount and necessity of terracing equipment. It is hoped that a plan may be worked out whereby some kind of equipment may be made available to the farmers.

Most of the farmers in the county will receive a letter from the county agent asking for certain information regarding the farmers plans with regards to terracing and contouring. It is very important that everyone who receives a letter give a prompt response.

BUSINESS INCREASE SHOWN BY SANTA FE RAILWAY

A general upward trend in both freight and passenger traffic in territory served by the Santa Fe has marked the present year. Various factors have contributed to this. Industries, such as building, mining, oil, lumber and manufacturing, have become more active. Another season of deficient moisture east of the Rocky Mountains curtailed such crops as cotton, grain and hay; however, prices for these and other farm products have improved. Livestock is doing well. Drought conditions in considerable areas of the southwest were largely relieved by heavy rains during the early fall, although they came too late to be of much benefit to any crops except feed for livestock. West of the Rocky Mountains agricultural conditions have been on the whole satisfactory. The increase in travel has been due to the attractiveness of air-conditioned cars, faster service, and low fares, coupled

A stainless steel light weight passenger train of nine cars is now being built to be delivered in the near future, and contracts have been let for the immediate building of 27 locomotives and 3,025 freight cars.

These capital expenditures mean employment for thousands of men in fields where employment has been lagging.

City Calls Attention To Fireworks Law

The City Officials are calling the attention of the public to the Fireworks Ordinance of Lamesa. The Ordinance prohibits the sale and firing of fireworks within the fire limits of the city. The fire limits are designated as the eight business blocks adjacent to the Courthouse square. Sections 3, 4, and 5 of the Ordinance reads as follows:

Section 3. It shall be unlawful hereafter for any person to sell or to possess for the purpose of sale, within such fire limits, any fireworks.

Section 4. It shall be unlawful hereafter for any person to shoot, fire, discharge, ignite, or explode any fireworks as herein defined, within, on or up the fire limits of the City of Lamesa, Texas, whether the same be done by means of fire, flame, spark, or impact or contact with another object, or otherwise.

Section 5. Any person who shall violate any provision of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not less than two dollars (\$2.00) nor more than two hundred (\$200.00) dollars, and each shooting, firing, discharging, igniting, or exploding any fireworks shall constitute a separate offense.

TOO WARM HOUSES
IS WINTER HAZARD

Austin, December 15.—It is an illogical fact that many people complain about the heat of Texas summers and yet sit indoors during the winter months in a temperature about as high as that which they complained in the summer season, in the view of Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer.

"If the average person would realize the definite hazard in developing and maintaining an indoor temperature of above 70 degrees, when the outside thermometer registers around freezing," he said, "There would be fewer colds, less bronchial conditions, and less pneumonia than there is today."

"Fresh air is one of the body's basic needs and no amount of luxury or artificial pleasure can be substituted for it. It may be a comfortable feeling to be warm, especially with the consciousness of the tough weather outdoors, but it is quite another matter to achieve this comfort at the probable cost of health."

Winters in the Temperate Zone are sufficiently trying upon the human system with their sudden and sharp temperature changes, without adding to the burden by making a hothouse of one's home. Of course, colds and other respiratory affections can be acquired in many different ways, but one of the easiest methods of becoming victims of such hazards is the overheated house.

"To become overheated and perspire, though the latter condition may not be perceived, and in this softened state to brave the cold winter blasts, is to take a thoroughly unwarranted chance with health."

"The wise householder therefore will check up on his artificial heat problem. He will resolve to keep his thermometer with safe limits."

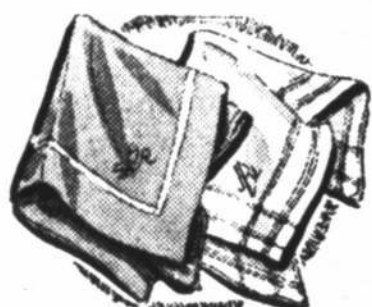
