It was satisfying to learn that the commissioners court of Cooke County has applied for an exemption to the Voting Rights Act, which requires that ballots be provided in Spanish as well as English. The request is being forwarded by the Texoma Regional Planning Commission to the US Justice Department.

We can only hope that this request will snowball sufficiently to get the attention of those fellows in Washington. Otherwise we can expect a long delay at best, and more likely no action at all. After all, the government is more inclined to pile on more regulations than to give relief.

The better way by far is to try for corrective legislation. In spite of the big liberal representation in Congress, common sense ought to prevail if the issue is thoroughly considered on the basis of merit and need.

This matter of need prompted the county's application for exemption. A survey based on surnames revealed that only 2.1 percent of the county's population has a Spanish heritage. And it is also known that many of those people speak English as well or better than Spanish. They would prefer to vote the regular ballot. And of the others, all but a very few could manage to vote English if they tried. In this county bilingual voting is an obvious waste of money.

The situation is different in the southern part of the state where the percentage of Spanish speaking people is higher. There are many more bilinguals, also some who can speak no English. Among them there are still many who can vote in English, and of the others many could if they made the effort. It seems reasonable to assume that people who really want to vote can manage to do it in English, and the remaining few don't care. . . probably are not voting anyway.

A thought that comes to mind on this subject is why aren't people able to vote in English? If they have been long enough to be eligible voters they surely have had the opportunity to learn. This applies especially to those who were here through school age. If they were here that long and still can't read the regular ballot they don't deserve to vote, and probably don't care either.

"When in Rome, do like the Romans", is an old saying that probably originated two thousand years ago and still makes sense. Ethnic groups are welcome here, but reason demands that they adjust to our ways, not we to theirs.

This subject was well presented in a recent TV program explaining the consequence if all ethnic groups enjoyed the same privilege as the Spanish. Community with German, Czech, Polish, Spanish, and all the other kinds of minorities would have to provide bi-lingual education, as well as ballots for all of them. Many places would have to accommodate in several languages. There would be no end to the confusion. Well, if others can adjust, why not the Mexican-Americans?

We hear talk of preserving Spanish culture as the reason for bi-lingual instruction, and discover that everything is taught in Spanish. Instead of using the native tongue as an approach to English, they stay with it and graduate youngsters who still regard Spanish as the vernacular. No wonder some politicians think that they are entitled to vote in Spanish. Well, that's a matter of opinion. Others of us think no one deserves to be accepted as an American citizen unless he at least communicates in our language.

As pointed out on the TV program, other minorities when they come to join us intend primarily to be Americans even while preserving their cultures. In homes and community they continue the language and customs, but as a means of enriching American life rather than replacing it. They do not allow their minority status to become a problem or burden to taxpayers.

As if to justify the absurd arrangement, some people are saying that voters cannot rightfully be required to vote in English because it has never been declared the official language.

Fred Hennigan Dies

Fred J. Hennigan, 70, a lifelong resident of Muenster, died at his home Monday, March 6, at 10 a.m. following an illness which began on January 21 when he was taken to Muenster Memorial Hospital with a stroke.

After dismissal on February 15 he has been a patient at home. He had been in poor health for a number of years and became seriously ill with a heart ailment in October.

Rosary was recited at 4 and 8 p.m. Tuesday in the chapel of Nick Miller Funeral Home.

Funeral service was held Wednesday at 10:30 in Sacred Heart Church with Father Stephen Eckart officiating at the Mass of Christian Burial and at the burial in Sacred Heart Cemetery under direction of the Miller Funeral Home.

Pallbearers were grandsons: Ronald Sicking, Randal Pelzel, Alfred Hennigan, Steve Hennigan, Billy Hennigan and Bobby Hennigan.

Fred Hennigan was born in Muenster on September 18,

1907, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Hennigan Sr. He was married to Caroline Wimmer on August 26, 1930. He was an employee of Muenster Refinery for a number of years, then owner-operator of a gasoline and butane dealership before retiring in 1955. He was a member of the Muenster K of C Council.

Survivors are his wife; five sons, Arthur, Fred Jr., Larry, Donald and Jerome, all of Muenster; two daughters, Mrs. Victor Sicking of Muenster and Mrs. Felix Pelzel of Pilot Point; 32 grandchildren; and one brother, Thomas Hennigan of Lawton, Okla.

Council Petitioned For City Addition

More acreage in the proposed extension of Muenster city limits came under consideration at Monday's council meeting when Southtown Partners petitioned for annexation of an area south of Eddy Street at the southwest part of town.

The council noted that this is the sixth annexation petition now on hand, and it is about ready to proceed with the preliminary detail work. It's intention is to sketch the several proposed additions on a city map, giving the picture of the expected future outline of the city before submitting the matter to voters. That is expected in about 60 days.

In the meantime, anyone wishing to have land annexed is asked to submit a petition for consideration with the other petitions. The only requirement is the formal petition with a plat indicating dimensions and location.

The council also set salaries, as required by law, for members of the next city council, which will be sworn in at the first meeting after the April 1 election. The decision was to continue the mayor's pay at \$90 a year and aldermen's pay at \$4 per meeting.

Likewise the council approved an additional phone line to the city hall plus an extension line from the city hall to the new warehouse and shop.

Replacement of Overpass Nears

Getting ever closer to the highway project replacing Muenster overpass with a four lane surface road, the city council in regular session Monday night met two requirements of the Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

The first was to remit \$10,800 for construction of curbing at both the north and south of the new road. It will extend some two blocks from Main Street to Maple. The other was agreement on a detour route while construction is in progress.

The detour route follows Main south to Cross, then Cross to Maple, and Maple to a new road beside the construction and leading to Highway 82 beyond. The paved detour route as well as the curbing will be built by the highway department.

FFA Sets Mar. 13 For Project Show

Muenster's chapter of Future Farmers of America will have its annual project show next Monday, the 13th, at Muenster High School. The show is one of the county's many preliminaries to the county wide Junior Livestock Show to be held later in the week, and participants are members of the local FFA with Vo Ag Teacher Edgar Dyer as advisor.

Dyer said the show likely will include 6 fat steers, 7 fat lambs, 1 fat barrow, 1 dairy heifer and several other classifications of beef and dairy animals and swine.

Entries will be judged at 1 p.m. by Larry Schumacher, vo ag teacher of Lindsay High School, and will be on display until the end of the class day. They will be judged according to merit rather than competition, being presented with blue, red or white ribbons. However selection of champion and reserve champion will be competitive, the selections being made from blue ribbon winners. Steers and lambs are the only divisions to get the champion and reserve honors.

Fourteen animals from the project show are destined for the junior livestock show and premium auction at the end of the week. There they will join 4-H and FFA entries from all over the county.

84 Pints Collected for Community Blood Bank

Blood donors of the community made a good effort in the semi annual collection by the Red Cross Bloodmobile, but missed their quota by 16 pints. Ninety one volunteers reported. Of those seven failed to qualify and the net result was 84 pints. The quota has been set at 100, which is the quantity normally used by the hospital and district in a six months period.

Technicians of the Red Cross blood center as well as local personnel were pleased with the response. They said a siege of illness in recent weeks has left fewer people disposed or qualified to give. The condition is reflected in the turn-down of seven volunteers.

The 84 units put the Muenster blood bank in good standing for another half year.

Subiaco Observes Centenary

Subiaco Abbey, the Benedictine monastery located near the Ozark mountains 47 miles east of Fort Smith, Arkansas, celebrates its centenary this year with a series of events for members of religious orders and lay people.

Named after the monastery where Saint Benedict established the first monastic community in Italy in the sixth century, Subiaco was founded in 1873 by a group of Swiss monks. Later, in 1887, they founded an academy for boys.

The members of the Abbey have planned a series of events to celebrate the anniversary, according to Abbot Raphael DeSalvo, the man responsible for the spiritual and physical operation of the monastery and academy.

"We felt that our hundredth anniversary would be an excellent time to take stock of where we have been and where we are going and renew our relationship with man and with God", Abbot DeSalvo said.

The centenary events begin with a workshop of North American Benedictine abbots at Subiaco Abbey on March 11-15. This event, according to Rev. DeSalvo, is an exchange of philosophies and an attempt

to face problems which are common in the apostolates of their monasteries. The discussions concern both spiritual and material welfare.

The workshop will close on March 15 with a special observance of the anniversary of the founding date. Among the many visitors expected for that event is the current abbot of Einsiedeln, Switzerland, motherhouse of all Swiss American Benedictines.

Also in the calendar are open house at the Abbey on April 16 and 23 featuring tours and refreshments. And another special event will be Visitors' Day on April 30 with Mass at 10:15 followed by lunch and tours.

"If there's one thing man should know for certain," Rev. DeSalvo said, "it's probably that he doesn't have all the answers. Our centenary is directed towards all of us at Subiaco and the guests who

It has recently come to my attention that many senior citizens of Cooke County are not aware of our Senior Citizens' Transportation Program, or at least do not know how to avail themselves of this service.

The Kiwanis Mini-bus began operating in Gainesville on September 1, 1975. Today, we have two vehicles — a 1976 Chevrolet sedan and a 1977 Dodge 12 passenger van. Our two vehicles are based

at the Soroptomist Friendship House, 209 North Morris Street, Gainesville, and are radio dispatched from that location.

Any resident of Cooke County 60 years of age or older or any handicapped individual regardless of age is eligible for this service. To obtain this service call 665-2492 and give your name, address, phone number, date of birth, who to call in case of an emergency, and the name of your doctor. Residents on the Valley View or Muenster phone system call 665-2492 collect. In most cases you are asked to call a day in advance of your actual trip in order to plan maximum usage of the vehicles. Passengers are expected to donate 25 cents each for in town rides, and 50 cents each for out of town rides. The only free rides are for Medicaid Patients and rides to and from the local SNAP Center.

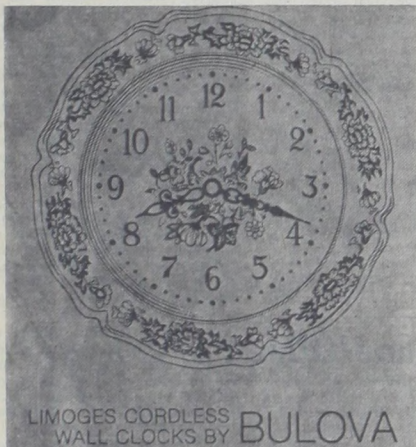

The Muenster Public Library announces the receipt of "Earth Has No Sorrow", presented by the Voluntary Action Center of Caldwell County and the Texas Commission on the Arts and Humanities. "Earth Has No Sorrow" is the result of a year long Oral History project funded by the Emergency School Aid Act in Lockhart, Texas. Gambling on Food Values

Gambling at the supermarket? Statistics show Americans spend about \$397 million each day chancing that their food budgets will meet family nutrition needs. As a guide for cutting food costs without eliminating essential nutrients, nutritionists suggest using USDA's Four Food Groups system.

Foods in the Four Food Groups — milk, meat, vegetables and fruits, breads and cereals — are categorized according to common nutrients supplied by foods within each group. In the meat group, eggs, hamburger and tuna fish all contain similar high quantities of protein, niacin, iron and thiamin. And vegetable-fruit group foods such as broccoli and watermelon are classified together because vegetables and fruits are principal sources of vitamins A and C.

Eating a variety of Four Food Group foods in the recommended amounts each day provides the foundation for balanced nutrition. Adults should have at least two servings from the milk group, two from the meat group, four from the vegetable-fruit group and four from the bread-cereal group. Children need at least three milk group servings per day; teenagers, four.

Food shoppers should compare the cost per serving of foods in the same food group, such as milk and yogurt or ground beef and beef roasts. In this way, the Four Food Group system can aid consumers in choosing a more economical food while maintaining the nutritional value of the type food they intend to buy.

To determine whether a serving of flavored yogurt or whole milk is the better buy for family snacks, calculate the cost per serving of each. Whole milk figures out to about 9 cents per eight-ounce glass whereas yogurt costs 33 cents per eight-ounce carton.

And, assuming that ground beef and chuck roast are about \$1.20 per pound, ground beef is more economical on a cost-per-serving basis. A pound of ground beef provides six servings of two ounces each, for about 200 cents a serving.

From a pound of bone-in chuck roast, expect four servings per pound, costing 30 cents a serving.

The Four Food Group system is based on the Recommended Dietary Allowances established by the Food and Nutrition Board of the National Academy of Sciences.

Save up to 20 per cent of your food bill by shopping more knowingly. Here are more suggestions from nutritionists for wise shopping:

1. Clip coupons. They can save you up to \$3.00 per week.
2. Read and clip food ads from newspapers so you know what products are current best buys and what the specials are. Take the ads with you when shopping.
3. Plan menus around plentiful or in-season foods. When there's a good supply of a food, you'll find better prices.
4. Make a shopping list based on your weekly food plan and stick to it.
5. Don't shop when you're hungry. A growling stomach makes all foods sound good, even foods you don't normally buy.
6. Allow just enough shopping time for cost comparing but no extra minutes for slowing down to look at feeds that aren't on your shopping list.

OPINION AND ORDER

On the 4th day of March, 1978, came on to be heard the above cause wherein the Defendant, Paul Lyndon Scott, was charged by complaint duly filed under the oath of Tommy Neil Huchton, Complainant, with violation of Texas Penal Code art. 22.01 (a) (3), Simple Assault, in particular, that Defendant stabbed Complainant with a knife in the course of an altercation between them, and came the Defendant in person and by and through his attorney of record, and the cause, having been reached in the regular course of the docket, and a jury having been waived, the complaint was thereupon read to the Defendant, to which the Defendant entered, and the Court received, a plea of nolo contendere.

In the course of the presentation of the case for the State, the Complainant testified as to the facts and the Defendant stipulated as to the amount of monetary damage, in the form of medical expenses and lost wages, in the amount of \$700.65, suffered by him as a result of the actions of the Defendant, as allowed by the Thompson, v. State, 537 S.W. 2d 521 (Tex. Cr. App. 1977). The Defendant presented his case, indicating therein an ability to pay the damages, and the case was rested and closed, the case was submitted to the Court. The Court, being satisfied after examination of the Defendant that such plea and the waivers associated therewith were knowingly and intelligently given and having heard the evidence and being satisfied that it substantiated the Defendant's guilt, entered a finding of guilty.

The Court next proceeded to a consideration of the punishment that could be assessed. All possible issues between the Complainant and Defendant having thus been joined, this case clearly presents the symbolic scales of Justice with an additional, third branch, that of the rights of the victim, which must balance in the end with those of the Defendant and of the State. The Court squarely the opportunity to do complete justice in one proceeding. To do so, however, the Court

must consider whether it has jurisdiction to effect a restitutionary remedy the monetary total of which, either by itself or when combined with the maximum fine that could be imposed, exceeds its statutory limits. The Court is of the opinion that it does.

This Court has concurrent original jurisdiction with the justice of the peace "in all criminal cases arising under the criminal laws of this State, in which punishment is by fine only, and where such fine may not exceed two hundred dollars." Tex. Rev. Civ. Stat. Ann. art. 1195. Under Texas Penal Code art. 22.01 (a) (3), Simple Assault, such cases are designated as Class C misdemeanors. This case, as filed, is therefore within the original jurisdiction of this Court.

"The Courts of the State of Texas having original jurisdiction of criminal actions shall have the power, after conviction, to suspend the imposition or execution of sentence and to place the defendant upon probation and to reimpose such sentence, under such conditions as the Legislature may provide." Tex. Const. Art. 4 §11A. The power to suspend is not inherent in the Court, but is authorized by this section. Lee v. State, 516 S.W. 2d 131 (Tex. Cr. App. 1974). The Legislature has provided two statutes relating to the power to suspend, namely Articles 42.12 and 42.13 of the Code of Criminal Procedure. The former is not applicable to misdemeanor cases. Tex. Cr. App. M-985, 1971. The latter, by its own terms, is applicable to cases beyond the jurisdiction of this Court. Tex. Code Crim. Proc. art. 42.13 §3(a). Under the principle of "inclusio unius est exclusio alterius" (the inclusion of one is the exclusion of another) (11 Coke, 58b), this Court would appear to have no legislative limitation on the power to suspend that undoubtedly is conferred directly upon it by the people of the State of Texas through its Constitution.

The legislative intent, however, would appear to be clear that, in addition to whatever fine or other sentence might be imposed, monetary damages as a further and restitutionary remedy are allowed in the criminal courts of this State in a proper case. The Court therefore, may properly look to Articles 42.12 and 42.13 for guidance as to what terms, if any, can or should be imposed upon the admission of a convicted

person to probation. Among the terms of probation enumerated are the specific grant of authority to the court to require the Defendant to "... make restitution or reparation in any sum that the court shall determine." Tex. Code Crim. Proc. art. 42.12 §6(h), emphasis supplied by the Court. In the case of misdemeanors, the reparation is limited to \$1,000. Tex. Code Crim. Proc. art. 42.13 §5(b). Thompson, supra, included an award of \$12,000 in restitutionary damage, an amount clearly in excess of the statutory limitations on fines to be imposed by the district courts, as permitted by Article 42.12 §6(h). The same power obviously obtains in misdemeanor courts. In this procedural respect, therefore, this Court does not differ from other Courts of the State of Texas. See Ex parte Quintanilla, 297 S.W. 2d 377 (Tex. Cr. App. 1948).

Public policy, as expressed in the phrase "judicial economy," would also tend to support a result whereby the victim of a crime is compensated without the further expense to himself and the taxpayers of a civil trial, without the rights of the defendant having been sacrificed, and with the full sanction of the state remaining intact. It therefore appearing to the satisfaction of the Court that the ends of justice and the best interest of the public as well as the defendant will be subserved thereby.

IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED, ADJUDGED AND DECREED that the Defendant, Paul L. Scott, having been found by the Court GUILTY AS CHARGED, be and is hereby placed on probation for a period of twelve months, entry of judgment and imposition of sentence to be suspended pro tempore upon the following terms and conditions:

1. The Defendant shall commit no offense against the laws of the United States, the State of Texas, the City of Muester, or of any other nation, state, or city during the said period; and
2. The Defendant shall make restitution and reparation to the Complainant herein in the amount of \$700.65, as allowed by law, within ten (10) days of the date of this Order; and
3. The Defendant shall submit himself to a duly licensed and qualified psychiatrist for examination at his own expense, the report of which is to be returned to this Court before the end of the probationary period; and
4. The Defendant shall appear before the Court at 9:00 a.m. on March 3, 1978, for final disposition of this case; and

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the violation of any of the terms of this Order shall constitute grounds for revocation of only that portion of this Order suspending the entry of judgment and imposition of sentence, which judgment may be entered and sentence imposed in accordance with law; and

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the Clerk of this Court furnish the Defendant a certified copy of this Order, taking his receipt therefor, as a written statement of the period and terms of his probation.

For all of which let all writs necessary issue.

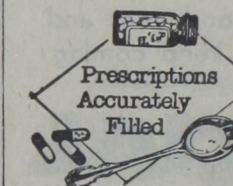

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Chili: Deep In The Heart Of Texas

American humorist H. Allen Smith once observed: "Every man who cooks chili believes with all his heart that his chili is infinitely superior to all other chilies on earth."

The origins of chili are somewhat obscure. Depending on which side of Texas/Mexico border your loyalties lie, national pride may force you to claim credit for this food item that one "chili-head" describes as, "protecting against colds and malaria ... aiding indigestion ... clarifying the blood ... developing robustness and resistance to the elements ... and acting as a stimulant to the romantically inclined."

Certainly Texas is the chili capital of the U.S., boasting the nation's highest per capita consumption. But whether the "Bowl of Red" has its beginnings here or south of the border, Texas history is chock-full of chili. According to Texas lore, back in the 1890's one West Texas jail made chili so good and with so much beef a man once broke into jail to get some.

The earlier quoted Mr. Smith, who also is self-proclaimed "world champion chili cooker," once asserted tongue-in-cheekly that chili first saw the light of day in San Antonio, thanks to Canary Islanders who were recruited from the Old World in the 18th century by the King of Spain to discourage French interlopers into the new southwest.

In his now classic *The Great Chili Confrontation* (Trident Press), Smith relates the story of his monumental chili cook-off a few years ago with a member of the Chili Appreciation Society International in the Texas ghost



town of Terlingua.

Terlingua has since become the permanent site of this annual epic battle. Author/chili-head Smith has said of Terlingua, "When Lyndon Johnson declared war on poverty, Terlingua promptly wanted to know where to go to surrender."

Whatever its origins, chili is uniquely western hemisphere, and there are as many ways to prepare it as there are preppers. Variations can occur in every ingredient normally associated with chili (and others not so normally associated).

So popular is this "ambrosia," as many chili-heads call it, that literally scores of food processors around the country have developed and canned their own varieties of chili, all the way from mildly spiced to the kind that some Texans love to describe as "hot enough to make the tonsils slip." Not a particularly savory description, but you get the idea.

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Subiaco Observes Centenary ---

we hope will come, learning a little more about each other, about us and about our relationship with a higher order of life."

In addition to the Academy, Subiaco also maintains a guest-retreat house, Courty House, which is used by Catholics and other Christian groups from a five state area every year. The Abbey also has charge of 21 parishes and missions in Arkansas and Texas and provides a chaplain for one hospital.

Subiaco had its beginning in 1878 when a small group of Benedictine monks from St. Meinrad's Abbey of Indiana settled there for the spiritual care of German immigrants. They founded St. Benedict's Priory which became New Subiaco Abbey in 1891.

By 1901 the monks had a complex of several buildings, much of which was destroyed by a disastrous fire. The rebuilding program that followed included the present main building, a massive five-story native sandstone building.

Fire struck again in 1927, this time nearly causing the monastery to close. But the monks rebuilt again and the monastery grew slowly until the early 1950's when the Abbey and Academy began to expand faster. Until then all buildings on the campus were built by the monks themselves.

The handsome abbey church, a tourist attraction and showpiece of the area was built in

1959. It serves as a chapel for monks and students as well as a parish church for surrounding families.

The abbey owns 1700 acres of land including its campus of over 50 acres for the boys' academy with an enrollment of 280. Principal units of the physical plant are the main building, the church, a dorm, classroom buildings, cafeteria, athletic field, gym, swim pool, library, infirmary and rec rooms. A new Performing Arts Center is under construction.

Subiaco is one of more than 40 Benedictine monasteries in the US with a combined membership of more than 2000 monks. Subiaco has 86 members, applying St. Benedict's motto of "pray and work" at the abbey and in 21 parishes.

Muenster's Sacred Heart Church and Lindsay's St. Peter Church have been served by the Benedictines since the early 1900's. During that time many young men of this area have joined the order. They are Fathers Paul Hoedebeck, Leo Koessler, Eugene Luke, Frowin Schoech, Alcuin Kubis, Francis Zimmerer, Herman Laux, David Flusche, Bruno Fuhrmann and Nicholas Fuhrman; also Brothers Thomas Moster, Henry Fuhrmann, John Schach, Michael Fuhrmann and Louis Fuhrmann. Formerly included were Abbot Alfred Hoenig and Father Sylvester Schach who have transferred to Corpus Christi Abbey.

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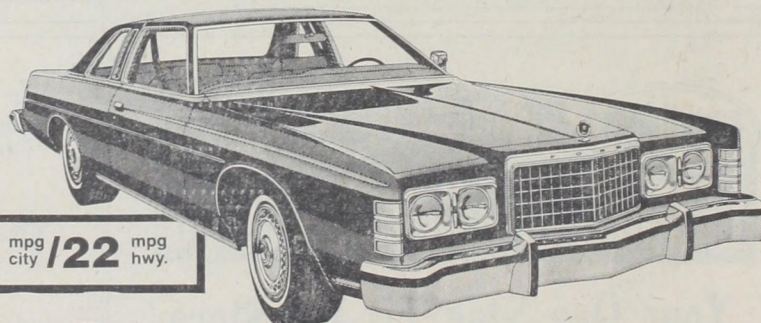
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
