The Gay Philosopher

THE TEXAS & Pacific Railroad is a good railroad and we wouldn't want to see them stop in Cisco but one of their methods puzzles us. And that is the habit of the passenger trains of stopping just across the Moran Highway. If the engine would stop ten feet sooner, traffic could continue to move. We've noticed it time and again. In fact, they do it every day. No doubt, they have a good reason. But we just don't understand it.

WHAT THIS country needs is for more people to hear Dr. J. Stuart Pearce of Catarina. He has spent the past week in Cisco and concludes a revival meeting this Sunday at the First Presbyterian Church. He formerly was minister of the church here.

WE HEARD HIM speak at the Lions Luncheon the other day. Wish we could have had a stenographer take down his talk for you. He warns of a threatening national bankruptcy and gives you plenty of figures to prove it. He pointed out that the country now is run by some 1,600 separate bureaus and agencies—one of which now collects more money each year than the entire government cost to operate 12 years ago.

Government, he says, ought to be protective. It should use only the authority given it by the people. Noting the trend in national legislation, he pointed out that there have been 167 socialistic laws passed in recent years—that we have lost more liberties in the past 28 years than in all history.

Dr. Pearce is very sincere. He points out that he is neither Democrat or Republican, but an interested citizen. It strikes us that more people ought to be like that.

He sees a return to the ideals of the Christian churches as the solution.

CITY OFFICIALS at Breckenridge have written Cisco officials that that city now has an iron lung and that it will be available if anybody in this area should need it. This is a very neighborly gesture that we know you will appreciate.

The time will be spent in singing and the serving of refreshments.

Dr. J. Stuart Pearce of Catarina will close his meeting at the First Presbyterian church with the evening services Sunday. Dr. Pearce held the pastorate of the local church and large crowds have attended each service.

Wranglers Lose to H-SU Frosh; Loboes Yield to Mountaineers

Loboes Lose Second Conference Game

The Cisco High School Loboes were never able to get going in Mineral Wells Friday night and dropped their second conference game in a row to the Mountaineers by a score of 28-12.

The Mountaineers picked the weak spots in the crippled Loboes defense and traveled on the ground to set up the initial score the first time they had possession of the ball. The ball was carried on off tackle and end plays to the Lobi nine where Quarterback James Elliston hit End Bill Harrell with a pass for the score. The kick was wide.

In the second period the Mountaineers climaxed a 55 yard drive with a one yard plunge by Don Mitchell for their second score. Drennon Daves kicked for the extra point.

After the half-time intermission Mineral Wells showed signs of letting up and took the kickoff and in eight plays were over for their third tally. The score came on a pass from Elliston to End Joe Brown. The ball was deflected by a Lobo defender but it fell into the arms of Brown on the five and he went over from there. Daves converted and the score stood 20-0. The kick was wide.

In the fourth period the Loboes took possession of the ball on a Mountaineer fumble on the 27 yard line in enemy territory. Runs by Harwell and Johnson moved the ball to the five where Hub Harwell carried over. The try for point was wide. Harwell's drive ended the scoring for the evening.

The bright spot in the game for the Loboes was the defensive work of Donald Watts, center and Norman Boggs, tackle along with the steady work of McMurry at guard, and backing up the line. Harwell in the backfield looked good on defense and was responsible for much of the Loboes yardage.

A running and passing Hardin-Simmons University Freshman team scored in each of the four quarters of their game with the Cisco Junior College Wranglers at Paramore Field in Abilene Friday to walk off with a 23 to 6 victory.

Quarterback Charles McGuire, aided by Mitchell Malouf and Jack Pritchard, proved too much for the injury ridden Wranglers as they went for 308 yards on the ground and 158 yards in the air for their six pointers.

Their first score came three minutes deep in the first quarter after McGuire hit Stanfield with a pass that carried to the Wrangler two. From there Malouf powered his way through to pay dirt. Boggs split the uprights of the extra point.

The Wranglers came back strong and after taking the ball on the kickoff after the touchdown worked it to the Cowpoke 30 where a pass interception killed the drive. In the opening minutes of the second quarter the Wranglers took the ball and in five plays were across the Hardin goal for their lone tally. The final 12 yards were made on a pass to Jim Spencer. The pass for extra point was no good.

The Freshmen took the kick on their own 10 and ran and passed to the Wrangler four where Pritchard took the ball over for the score. The kick was good and the half ended 14-6.

After a succession of plays the Freshmen took the ball on the Wrangler 49 and worked to the 12 where Malouf passed to Stanfield for the third counter. The try for extra point was good.

Late in the fourth quarter the Freshmen worked the ball to the Wrangler one where they had a first and goal to go. They tried the Cisco line four times and ended on the two where Cisco took over. They kicked to the Freshmen who took the ball on the 20 and ran it to the 10. From there Billy Rapp took a shovel pass and went over. The try for point was good as the game ended.

City Acquires Ownership Of Veterans Housing Unit

A PROCLAMATION

Purchase of City Bonds Reported

On November 1 the veterans apartments located on Avenue L, between 15th and 16th streets, will become the property of the City of Cisco, according to a recent announcement by the Housing Authority.

The houses were built more than two years ago by the government as a low cost housing project for veterans of World War II and since that time the city has supervised the rentals and maintenance. At the same time 28 units were constructed at Cisco Junior College and they were given to the schools a year later.

The city, under the terms of the contract, will have control of the rentals and the money will go into the general fund to be used for civic needs. Officials stated that there would be little change in policies and that there was no rent raise contemplated. Veterans will continue to receive preference.

The 20 units will add some \$650 monthly to the city revenue, figured on the present rental basis with all apartments full. Figures revealed that the units were full a large part of the time.

It was also announced that at a recent meeting of the council the city purchased, for cancellation, city bonds amounting to \$7,750. The transaction was a move to decrease the bonded indebtedness of the city over and above the regular obligations.

The bonds purchased at a cost of \$8,225, saving the city \$1,143.75. The retirement of the bonds saves the city over \$232 each year on interest requirements.

The 1949 tax collections were still continuing to pour in and the collector's office reported that \$44,249.60 had been paid up to October 27. The figure represented a big gain over any preceding year.

In the backfield Kay Jackson will probably start at quarterback, Jimmy Reynolds at left half, Franklin Brown at right half and Coleman Alsop at full.

Coach Sledge will probably alternate his offense between the single wingback and the split T. Other boys likely to see lots of action are Boy Gallagher, Tommy Barton, Donald Coplin, Jerry Kile, Ellis Tapia, Donald Farnsworth, Mac McCauley, Tommy Collier, Jim Branton, Billy Jackson, Coy Calloway, Don Curtis, Monty Ingram, Carl Ingram, Freddy Anderson, Jerry McMurry and George Callerman.

The Midgets looked good in their last appearance and are primed to give the touted Dogies a run for their money. Coach Sledge has been grooming the team on new offensive plays and on a stronger pass defense.

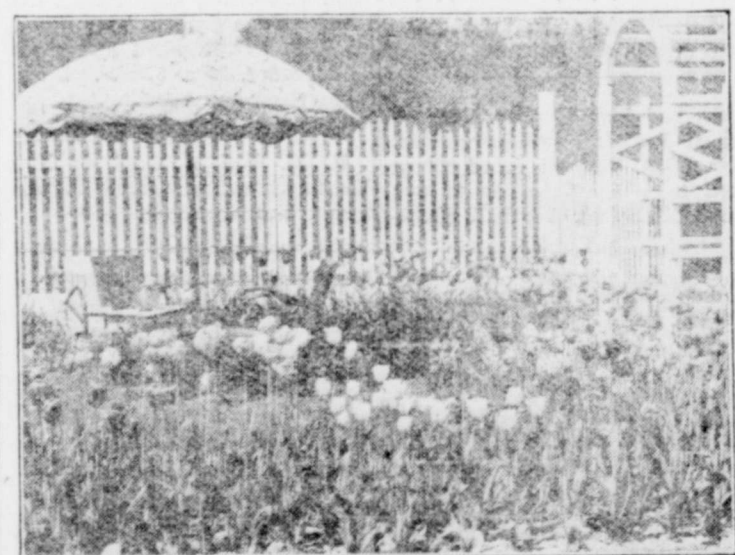

Some May, Some Must Items In Fall Planting List



For the First Six Weeks of Spring, Bulbs Supply Garden Color.

There are two kinds of fall planting—one which must be done now, or not at all and an optional kind, which may be done this fall or next spring.

Among the "musts" are the spring flowering bulbs, peonies, iris, ranunculus, lilies, the seeds of some perennial flowers and that of the annual larkspur.

"Mays" include evergreen and deciduous trees and shrubs, roses, the seeds of most perennial and quite a few annual flowers and vegetables, and lawn seed.

Obviously, not less than half of all planting to be done on home grounds can be done in the fall and garden owners who like to do things the easy way will spread their planting over two seasons, instead of waiting to crowd it all into a hectic spring.

The fact that only one-third of all gardeners do this, is no compliment to the intelligence of the clan; but indicates that they are controlled by emotion more than reason. In the fall there is no "spring fever," rather there may be lassitude. Like the plants themselves, the gardeners may long for a winter of dormancy, before undertaking a new season of growth.

But for those who resist the temptation to rest, fall planting pays rich rewards. In sections where winters are cold, most garden color in the early spring comes from plants in the "must" group, which should be planted in the fall, or not at all.

These include the spring flowering bulbs, which appear in gardens in the following sequence: Snowdrops, scillas, crocuses, daffodils, hyacinths, species tulips, early tulips and tall, late tulips. Without flowers from the fall bulbs, the garden is likely to be dull. Following the tulips, comes irises and peonies, which also must be planted in the fall.

In the vegetable garden, perennial onions must be planted in the fall, to bear green onions next spring, before onion sets could be planted. Rhubarb and asparagus roots may be planted now with good results. Spinach and other hardy greens can be sown, for the very earliest next spring.

If you decide to become one of the wise one-third and do fall planting this year, a schedule should be prepared to time your operations. There is no point to disturbing existing garden beauty, in order to create next spring's picture, unless this is necessary.

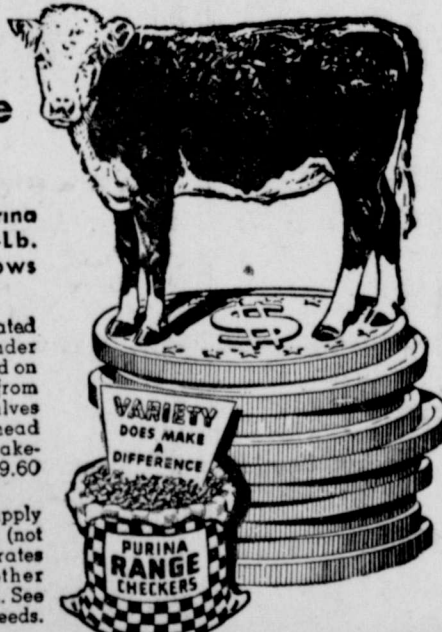

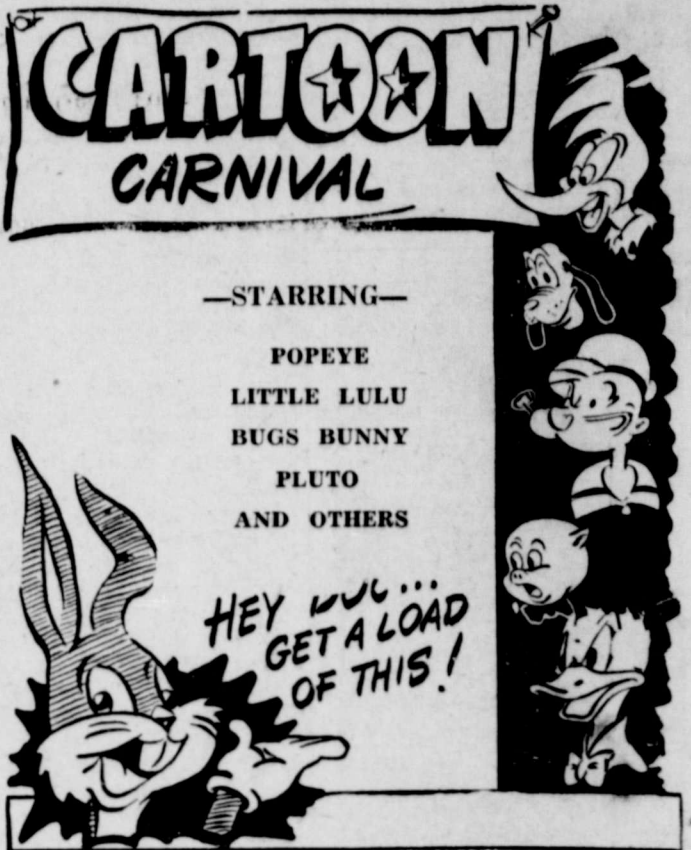

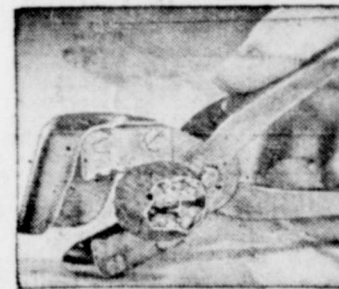
