nd Election Ordered for w Mexican School Building

Building Inadequate Last
Classes Held in CAC Hall; To
Dressing Rooms to Gymnasium

Judge G. J. Henshaw
ordered an election to
be held on September 8, for the pur-
pose of voting on a proposed school
bond of \$25,000.
The money will be used for the
construction of a new Mexican School
and the repairing of the old
school. A part will also go for
dressing rooms and showers for

both boys and girls in the present
gymnasium of the high school.

These bonds, if voted, will carry
a low rate of interest, 3 3/4%,
and will necessitate a very small
increase in taxes, amounting to
only 7 cents on the \$100 valuation.
Citizens eligible to vote are prop-
erty owners who own taxable
property and have duly rendered
the same for taxation in said dis-
trict. Other citizens are not eli-
gible even though they have paid
poll tax.

The need of adequate buildings
for the Spanish people can easily
be seen from the fact that it was
necessary for the school board to
rent the CAC hall during the
last term of school and conduct
two classes in this building. En-
rollment last year in Terrell coun-
ty showed a total of 440 Mexican
children with three regular class-
rooms in their building in which
to hold classes. It is easy to see
the difficulties to be encountered
by teachers endeavoring to in-
struct 440 students in three rooms
and the CAC hall, all elementary
grades being taught.

September 5th Set As Opening Date Sanderson Schools

Four New Teachers
Added to Staff;
Buildings Ready

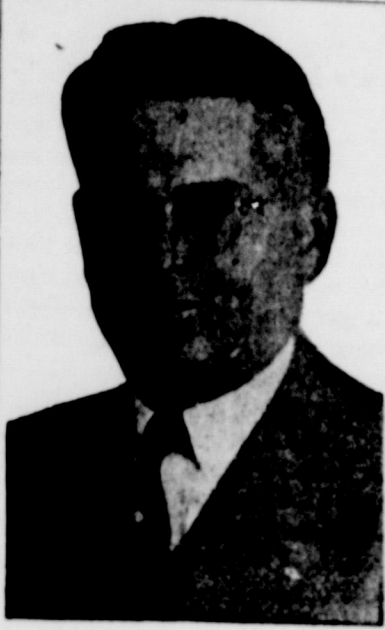
Superintendent R. D. Holt an-
nounces that the Sanderson Pub-
lic Schools are scheduled to open
for the 1938-39 session on Mon-
day, September 5. A brief pro-
gram will be presented in the
high school auditorium beginning
at 9 o'clock in the morning. Text-
books will be issued and classi-
fications of pupils arranged on
that day.

New teachers employed in the
Sanderson schools this season in-
clude Miss Mildred Rankin of
Brownwood in the elementary
grades and physical education in
high school grades; Miss Louise
Garrison of Lubbock in the ele-
mentary grades, Miss Helen R.
Simpson of Lamesa in the Mexi-
can School, and Roscoe G. Mor-
gan, who will teach industrial
arts in high school.

The three buildings have been
repaired and checked by the
janitors during the summer
months and will be in readiness
for the opening of school. Black-
boards have been refinished in
the elementary grades. Desks
have been refinished and repair-
ed, and all buildings have been
cleaned thoroughly.

Chemistry will be offered in
high school for the first time this
year. Industrial arts, consisting
principally of woodwork, will be
offered to boys in high school and
the upper elementary grades.
Perhaps other new courses, such
as art, mechanical drawing and
journalism, may be offered during
the second semester if there is
sufficient demand.

High School Pupils Enroll Early
All high school pupils, who can
do so conveniently, are requested
by Superintendent Holt to enroll
on September 1, 2 and during the
morning of the 3. Parents are
invited to come to the high school
building on those days and advise
their children upon the courses
enrolled for, if they so desire. An
early enrollment, or registration
will save the pupil considerable
time and waiting in the line.

The newly named bandmaster
succeeds C. W. Macune who had
served as director of the Edison
band for several years and holds a
degree of bachelor of science from
the University of Texas.

When a student at the Univer-
sity, Goldwire was a member of
the University Symphony. He also
has had experience in choral,
orchestra and band work in Sul
Ross. He was a member of the
Longhorn band at Austin. He
studied four years at the Texas
School of Fine Arts.

Highway 90 Project to Be Let By Oct.

To Replace Bridge Over Sanderson
Canyon East of Town; To Change
Channel of Canyon and Widen Bridges

E. L. Pearce, resident highway
engineer, announced this week
that plans would be complete about
September 5, for the \$200,000
road project to cover new bridge
construction and other road im-
provements on U. S. Highway 90.

The bridge just east of town
over Sanderson Canyon is to be

replaced with a 300-foot structure
which will have sidewalks on
both sides to accommodate pedes-
trians. The bridge will also be
quite a bit higher than the present
one, giving more clearance for
flood waters. This bridge is all the
work that will be done east of
Sanderson under the present pro-
ject.

There will also be three large
bridges built west of town, two
of which will be 300-foot struc-
tures and one to be 270-foot. One
of the large bridges will be over
three-mile canyon and will elimi-
nate one of the dips that curtail
travel during high water seasons.
The road at the Rufe Murrah
place is to be straightened which
will eliminate four dangerous
curves. The other 300-foot bridge
will eliminate another dip at
Gavilan, which is about four
miles out, and the 270-foot bridge
will eliminate a dip at Emerson,
nine miles west of town.

The Sanderson Canyon channel,
which crosses the road and then
recrosses about five miles out, is
to be changed. Mr. Pearce states
that an estimated 120,000 yards
of excavation will be necessary to
divert the channel, but that it will
eliminate two dips. The new
channel is to run about 300 yards
from the highway, remaining on
the north side all the way in-
stead of crossing and then re-
crossing.

Plans also call for widening of
present 20-foot slab bridges to a
width of 34 feet. There are two of these
slab bridges. There will also be
added several culverts in an effort
to carry all flood waters under
the highway instead of allowing
an overflow as is the case at the

OKLAHOMA NO. 1
RUNNING 10-INCH
CASING AT 1,480

The Schermerhorn Oil Corporation of Tulsa, Oklahoma No. 1, Allison Test located on Survey 22, Block B-2, in the north end of the County, was setting ten-inch casing at 1,480 feet Monday.

This test has caused considerable leasing and dealing in royalties the past few weeks, and indications are that Terrell County will see more activity in the next few weeks than ever before, inasmuch as the two test wells are to be spudded in on the F. present. These culverts will be added where needed to the county line, which marks the other end of the project.

As soon as the plans are completed they are to be sent in to Austin for blueprinting and for letting of the contract. This contract will probably be let the latter part of September or in October, according to Mr. Pearce. The project is scheduled to be completed in about a year, and will include about 3,753 miles of road.

As soon as the plans for highway 90 are completed Mr. Pearce and Russell Walker, who is assisting Mr. Pearce, will run location of a new right-of-way on U. S. Highway No. 285 to the Pecos County line. Mr. Pearce states that there is a fund of \$12,000 which will be available for use on the Sanderson-Fort Stockton highway as soon as Terrell County secures the right-of-way. As soon as the engineers finish running the location, it will be up to the county to secure the 100-foot right-of-way from the landowners. Almost the entire route will be a new right-of-way.

A proposed routing of the highway east of Sanderson would leave the present highway just after leaving the bridge and remaining on the north side of the railway until three-mile hill is reached where the tracks are crossed by an overpass. Construction plans of this overpass has already been submitted to the Highway Commission at Austin for approval, although there is no appropriation made for this in this year's program and it will probably be placed on the program for 1940.

John Bean Found
Dead In Bed
Wednes. MorningWell Known By
Old Settlers of
Terrell County

John Bean, said to be 80 years of age, was found dead in his bed Wednesday morning, August 24. Death was from natural causes.

John Bean is a well known character among the ranch people and old-timers of Terrell County. For the past several years he has lived on the Cecil Arvin ranch, coming to town only when necessary. A few days ago he sustained an injury to his eye while riding in the pasture and came to Sanderson for medical treatment. Previous to that time it is understood that the last time he came to town was some three years ago when he was bitten by a rattlesnake and came in for treatment.

Many interesting stories of the Pioneer West passed away with him, according to friends. Following is a story as sent in to the Times by one who knew him:

"The passing of John Bean, aged 80, found dead in bed Wednesday morning, brings back to the memory of several of our older residents stories of 'way-back-when'."

As one of the stories goes, John, as a Strapping youth, was attending a dance near the present location of the L. H. Hicks ranch on Independence, and as was usual in those days, the only "girls" present were the cowboys with a handkerchief tied around their legs. The dance was in full swing and the boys and "girls" were really having a swell time to the tune of two or three fiddles and a banjo, when some of the boys noticed that the Indians were also using the same music and having a dance. Immediately both dances were broken up, and yes, you guessed it, all of the horses were driven off with the exception of one small horse that was used to

"wangle" the cowponies with Young John, being the smallest, was delegated to trail the Indians and pick up the horses if possible.

Between camp and Dryden, John met young Lieutenant John Bullis, then in command of a small detachment of soldiers, bringing the horses back. Until his death, John never spoke of General Bullis other than "Lieutenant," as he was known when John Bean first met him.

"This, and many other 'sure-enough' western yarns were told on occasions to John's personal acquaintances."

Local maintenance fund a balance of \$1,209.29, the administration fund \$323.96, the textbook fund \$158.23, the building fund \$150.24, and the sinking fund \$3,523.11. The report also shows that for the first time in many years, the Terrell County public schools closed the year with a balance in the funds used for operation of the schools.

The receipts of the school district in 1937-38 shows that a total of \$29,793.64 was collected in county taxes, and \$16,567 was received from the state apportionment based on the scholastic census. The valuation of the property assessed for taxes for school purposes in the county in 1937 was shown to be \$4,133,746 and the rate was \$0.80 on the \$100 valuation.

The disbursements of the school district for 1937-38 shows that \$15,451.63 was spent for teachers' salaries and \$244.75 was spent for interest on salary warrants out of the state and county available fund. Out of the local maintenance fund a total of 11,521 was spent for teachers salaries; \$1,350 for transportation; \$120 for rent; \$1,538.48 for lights, water, fuel, etc.; \$1,449.50 for janitors services; \$330 for band equipment; \$368.29 for insurance; and \$1,663.25 in payment of note for furniture in use in the high school building.

The indebtedness of the school district consists of \$134,000 balance of the original issue of \$150,000 serial bonds of the 1930 issue, bearing 5 per cent interest, and \$6,404.70 outstanding furniture and fixture warrants for equipment of the high school, according to the auditor's report.

show the dire need of facilities for properly educating the Spanish speaking portion of our citizenry.

The enrollment in the Sanderson Mexican School in 1937-38, the term ending last May, amounted to a total of 376. During the same session there were enrolled in the Sanderson Elementary school, a total of 205 and in the high school building the enrollment was 140. In the Mexican school building there are three regular class rooms, with one of these divided by a partition into two small rooms. The CAC building was rented during the past session and two teachers held classes in this, although this provided temporary quarters which had not been planned for class rooms.

The scholastic census for last year, 1937-38, shows that a total of 440 Mexican children were enrolled, while the total scholastic enrollment for Terrell County was 718.

"These figures show the need for additional, and suitable school rooms and equipment for the Mexican scholastics."

"Mexican pupils who reach the seventh grade are permitted to enter high school. Last year, ten Mexican pupils attended high school."

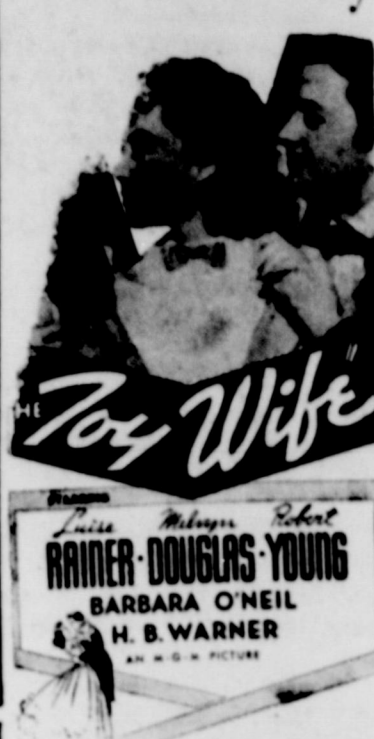
