

Russ Gundrum -- And His Talking Light

Student Scientist Eyes International Competition

Russ Gundrum is an 18-year-old on the go. He has just won the sweepstakes award with his physical science demonstration in the high school division at Oil Belt Regional Science Fair.

And he is being around for three days to show the demonstration to hundreds who Oil Belt Regional Science fair.

In about a month, Russ will be packing his equipment for a trip to 18th In-

ternational Science Fair in San Francisco, Calif., May 8-13.

There he will again exhibit his winning project, "A New Method of Modulating Light Waves" and compete for honors among the best young scientists in the world.

The participation in the International Science Fair is part of the honors heaped upon the Colorado High senior in the Oil Belt Regional competition. In addition

to the high school sweepstakes award, Gundrum received \$50 from The Institute of Electrical Engineers, the Special Air Force Award, Special Army Award and Special NASA Aerospace Award.

However, Russ will pass up the NASA trip to Houston's NASA Center and another science student will take his place because the Colorado City youth earned the trip last year while still a junior.

His sweepstakes winner this year is the result of several years of interest study and work in electronics.

In layman's language, his New Method of Modulating Light Waves is a means for "talking over a beam of light."

It was fine enough to win over such outstanding projects by West Texas students as dating by thermoluminescence, transmission losses in salt water, applica-

tion of the Quantum Theory, to photochemistry, similarity of sound waves and light waves, the colorimeter, complexions and coordination compounds, analog computer and study of acetylene, alk acid and others.

Russ is the son of Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Gundrum of 865 Marshall and his father is with the office staff at Col-Tex Refinery.

His sponsoring teacher is Arnold Paiker, Colorado High physics instructor, who

will accompany Gundrum on the all-expense paid trip to California.

Russ' aim for top honors in the Oil Belt Science Fair sponsored jointly by Abilene College and Abilene Reporter-News, was whetted during the last two years with other successes. And last year, after receiving the NSAS Aerospace Award, he set his sights directly on the sweepstakes.

To match his hopes, the

student came up with the idea he thought would succeed.

Then, he followed it up with hours and hours of reading, studying, inquiring, work, and he says, helpful assistance in ideas and advice from others.

The combination produced his winner in polarized light which his project shows is applicable to laser communications on earth or in outer space.

All the while, Russ was

being active in a broad field of citizenship. In other words, he was no egghead shut away from the business of a possible teenager.

Sure, his ability as a student reflects an average in grades for subjects like English, Physical Science, math, speech, civics and physical education.

But he is an athlete, too. He has won a 100-pound double on the Wolf football team. He is a swimmer.

Latimer, McCarley Win School Board Positions

For 4 Council Places

Tuesday Election

Voters within Colorado City will ballot Tuesday in their annual municipal election and they will elect four City Council members from a list of seven candidates.

The competitive ballot with four incumbents seeking reelection — is expected to attract the largest turnout of voters within four years.

Polls at City Hall will open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

Here is the list of candidates in the order they will appear on the ballot:

Lacy Boles, advertising manager of Colorado City Record, seeking his first elective office.

Mrs. Lena Porter, first woman council member in the city's history, seeking her third consecutive term.

C. G. (Skip) Harkins, long-time Col-Tex Refinery employe and candidate for his fourth consecutive council term.

Clarence C. (Mike) Burt, high school teacher with business interests, candidate for his third consecutive term.

B. D. Mason, independent

milk distributor, and a first-time council candidate.

Paul B. Hunter, owner of Better Cleaners, seeking his second term.

J. C. Brown, veteran Sun Oil Company employe and another first-time council candidate.

Only 70 persons marked ballots in last year's City Council election that returned three council members to new two-year terms without opposition.

In 1963, however, when there was competition for four council places, 450 persons cast ballots.

Salvation Army Net \$1,956.08

Bill F. Carter, chairman of the 1967 fund drive for the Salvation Army, reported Saturday a total of \$1,956.08 donated to the campaign so far in this county.

About seven percent of the cards issued have yet to be returned, Carter added.

Although the fund drive officially opened Feb. 7 and was to close March 31, Carter stressed the point that contributions to Salvation Army are always welcome and may be made at any time of the year at City National Bank or to Dee Tom, treasurer.

Wayne Shaw, senior vice-president of the bank, is chairman of the local Salvation Army unit.

Hoped for goal here was \$2,700. However Carter expressed gratitude at the figure reported.

"Very good," he said "in light of the numerous drives necessary since the United Fund plan was abandoned in Colorado City."

Voters Saturday re-elected Curtis Latimer to Colorado Independent School District's board of trustees and elected A. K. McCarley Jr. as a newcomer to the board.

Defeated in the five-candidate race for two 3-year terms were A. M. Holman, an incumbent seeking his second term, and two others making their first bid for office.

Rev. Fred Brewton, minister of First Presbyterian church, and Don Majors, newsman for Radio Station KYMC.

A total of 418 ballots were cast in the election, at least 50 below conservative predictions.

Latimer, elected to his second term, is a 51-year-old leader in agriculture who resides in Colorado City. McCarley, 43, also is farm leader and lives in the Buford area.

In voting for county school board here in Colorado City Charles C. Thompson, member-at-large, polled 230 votes and R. Y. Hammond, Precinct 1, received 225. Both were unopposed on the ballot.

Wolves Sprint To Champion Here

Colorado High, with record-shattering performances in 440, 880 and mile relay, claimed its own championship here Saturday in Lone Wolf Relays.

Every record in the meet fell into disgrace before the athletes from 11 schools walked off the field.

Gusty wind hampered every event — except the short sprints — but it did not stop the onslaught on records.

Coch Don Riley's Wolves totaled up 101½ points for their championship despite an almost complete drought in the field events. Closest competitor was AAA Sweetwater, back in second place with 89 points.

A couple of C-City's com-

petitioners in District 5-AA were in third and fourth with 63 and 51 points respectively. Wylie also had 51 to tie for fourth.

Milton Plagens, the graceful sprinter from little Class B Wall, startled the spectators with a 9.7 clocking in the 100-yard dash with the wind helping him along. Colorado's Don Steakley ran his fastest of the season with a 9.8 in pursuit.

In fact, every one of the first six leading sprinters broke the meet's 100 record.

Plagens ran a swift 22.4 in the 22-yard dash for another record. At his heels again was steakley with a 22.4, followed by teammate Don Higginbotham, 23.3.

C-City's fine mile relay team ran away from all

competition in the final event. Bobby Timada started off with a comfortable lead. Robert Brown lengthened it, so did Higginbotham and Larry Campbell finished it for an easy 3.28 performance.

Closest competitor was Haskell with 3:38.8. Wylie, which beat Sweetwater in the second heat, ran 3:38.5 and the Mustangs faded with a 3:40.9.

Campbell, although nearly caught by Sweetwater's John Heffner, set another mark with a 2:47.4 time in the 80.

Brown provided a surprise for the fans — and another record — when he hurried through the 440 with a 51.3. Haskell's Davis was No. 2 with 51.8.

One of the fine performances of the day was by 13-year-old Johnny Mayo, who latched the 440 with 1:13.70 inches and tossed the shot 33 feet 10 inches for two records.

All-Day Judging, Night Roping April 22

20 Classes In Horse Show

Twenty judging classes are planned for fourth annual Colorado City Quarter Horse Show here April 22.

Upward of 150 horses are expected to be entered in the show which will have both halter and performing classes.

Leo Thompson will be show manager for Western Riding Club, sponsoring organization, and will be assisted by Dink Rees.

Entries are now being accepted by Mrs. Dolores Wood, show secretary.

The show is approved by American Quarter Horse Association and AQHA rules will be used throughout, according to Mrs. Wood.

There will be 11 halter

classes including grand champion and reserve champion — mares, stallions and geldings. Judge will be John Dublin Jr. of San Angelo.

Eleven halter classes are scheduled with grand champion and reserve champion awards for mares (1963 and before), stallions (1963 and before) and aged geldings.

Other halter classes will be 1966 mares, 1965 mares, 1964 mares, 1966 stallion, 1965 stallion, 1964 stallion, 1965 and after geldings, 1963 and 1964 geldings.

Performing classes will be junior barrel race, senior barrel race, junior reining, senior reining, junior western pleasure, senior western pleasure, junior cutting, senior cutting and roping (all

ages).

Judging of halter classes will be in the morning show day, beginning at 9 o'clock. Performance classes will be judged in the afternoon, beginning at 1 o'clock.

A special jackpot roping will conclude the quarter horse show that night. There will be no restrictions on contestants or horses for the jackpot event — open to all ropers.

Trophies and ribbons will be awarded in all classes of the show and there will be no limit on entries. Which, of course, means an exhibitor may enter as many horses in each class as he desires.

However, a rider may ride only one horse per class, Mrs. Wood emphasized.

All entries must be registered with AQHA (permanent, tentative or appendix) with NQHRA horses eligible.

For halter foals, yearlings and two-year-olds in the appendix are eligible. Stallions and mares three years and older require registration number. Appendix registration only is necessary for geldings and also for all horses in registered performance classes.

All exhibitors must present registration papers (or photostats) as proof of registration before entries will be accepted for the show. Only exception will be for 1966 foals which must have registered sire and dam. Age will be counted from Jan. 1 of year foaled.

FOR the life of me, can not figure out one single benefit offered by the now seemingly assured Daylight Saving Time for Texas.

Save time for what? During the "War Effort" times it was tried in Texas as if things were not already confusing enough. Way it worked out for some of us was proof of the contrary nature of the human race. Lost more time adding and subtracting than was ever saved.

YOU go to bed last Saturday night in April after turning all the clocks up one hour.

If you started to bed at 12 midnight that means it is five hours after 7 a.m., when you crawl in. How come? Because the innocent little clock now says so. Your crafty heart knows different.

Up at six? Well, guess you know it's really, really, only a good way to dead for sleep all day. Go to work at 9? Well, do you realize you'll soon be reporting when it's really, really 8 — practically at the crack of dawn?
