Capt. Gorman Webb Tells of Action On Saipan and Tinian

(Editor's Note: The following letter, from Marine Captain Gorman T. Webb, to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Webb, gives an interesting account of action on Saipan and Tinian.)

Dear Mother and Dad: Well, we got Saipan Tinian cleaned up now, and are squared away and back aboard ship. I was never so glad to get anywhere in my life. After eating emergency rations for two months, it is just like a dream biting into a piece of real fresh meat and a hot biscuit. We have been dividing our time in three ways. In the sack (bed), in a mess hall, or in a shower, getting clean or washing our clothes. It's really a treat to get a hot shower and crawl into a bunk with clean sheets and a pillow again without any rocks or lumps under you, no dirt or rain falling in your face and no noise to wake you in the middle of the night. To be able to completely relax again, get full of good food and crawl into a clean bunk is worth a thousand bucks even, knowing that we'll have that for awhile now. Being away from the flies and mosquitoes and that musty Jap odor is also worth quite a lot, too. You never realize just how pooped out you are until you can just get cleaned up and full of good food and flop down on a good, clean bed and forget all about it. I've gotten over the attack of dysentery I had. It never was very bad except it saps your strength and you lose weight pretty fast. I had quite a bit of fat on me before this thing started, purposely, it's about all gone now, but it won't be but a few days before I'll be in the pink again; because I just lost the excess. I've been rather lax on writing, because I've been too busy thinking about other things but now I'm going to write you a long letter, or several letters covering the operation and

Light Vote Is Cast In Run-Off Balloting

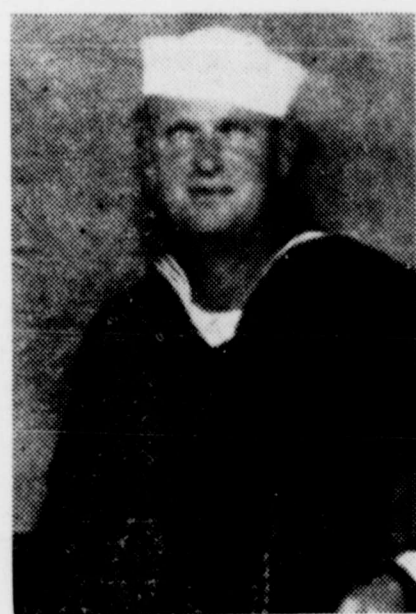
R. E. Wilson was elected commissioner of precinct 2 over incumbent R. A. Daugherty, and Julian Smith was named commissioner in precinct 4 over J. R. Clark. In this territory Lakeview voted 41 for Wilson, 42 for Daugherty, and Happy Union Voted 51 for Wilson, 36 for Daugherty. Total vote in that race was 244 for Wilson, 226, Daugherty; and for precinct 4: Smith, 233, Clark, 199.

Approximately 1,700 votes were cast by Hale county Democrats in Saturday's run-off election. Totals for the county in the two state races were: For Associate Justice of the State Supreme Court, Richard Critz, incumbent, 734, Gordon Simpson, 832, and for attorney general, Grover B. Sellers, incumbent, 662, Jesse Martin, 990. Totals for the state revealed a different trend for these offices, as Simpson and Sellers won the offices. Capt. Webb Letter . . .

try to tell you a few things that happened. I know it's all very hard for you to understand just what goes on out here and I know you have a million questions you'd like to ask and that there are many things I'd like to tell you, but censorship won't permit it. I'll tell you about as much of it as I can, though, and try to give you an idea of what it's all about. . . . My outfit hit the beach about one o'clock in the afternoon of D-Day. The navy had been bombing and shelling the place for three days previous to D-Day and were still going at it until the lead waves got close to the shore, then it lifted inland and to the flanks of the beachhead. When we went ashore in amphibian tractors everything was pretty quiet for a few minutes, and then mortars and artillery shells started falling about and everybody started looking for a hole. . . . I went in with my maintenance and supply section before my tanks came in as I was to be liaison officer between my company and the infantry regiment I was attached to. That afternoon and the next day we had quite a bit of stuff falling about the Jap's navy or planes just couldn't get in. We had a few nuisance raids from Jap planes for about

four nights in a row, but they didn't do much harm and I think we got all the planes before they got away. The island was much more rugged than it looked on the maps, or in aerial photos. Several of our tanks were knocked out from enemy gunfire or mines, but most of them were repaired and sent back in for more Japs, and our casualties were very low in the tank battalion. In most cases the entire crew would get out of a knocked out tank with nothing worse than powder burns or a few shrapnel wounds of minor importance. Our flame guns or our flame thrower tanks accounted for a lot of Japs. They were mounted in light tanks, though, and couldn't risk taking as active a part in the fight as the other companies which were all medium tanks. Most of the time on Saipan, they were used after the mediums had taken care of anti-tank fire. We cleaned out an innumerable number of caves and trenches with our flame throwers there. After we got over on Tinian, we burned out about 700 Japs one day with our flame throwers, in caves. We had interpreters try to get them to come out and they wouldn't, and then some of our men would try to get them to come out by approaching the cave and calling to them, but they would just stay there and throw out hand grenades, or shoot at our men. They thought we couldn't get them out without losing a lot of our men, but when we turned the flame throwers on them, they changed their minds, I guess, but it was too late. . . . About a two second burst from it will burn a man to

death. This operation is the first time this flame thrower has been used. I had a company of them in the 4th tank battalion, and Lt. Bill Crossfield, whom I told you about, who lives in Longview, had the 2nd tank battalion company. I saw him several times on both islands and had a long talk with him just before coming aboard ship. His outfit is remaining here but a lot of the officers and men are going home. They have been overseas anywhere from 24 to 32 months, I believe, and he thinks he might get to go back before very long. Every one of the officers I had under me in old C Co., 2nd Tank battalion, are getting to go back. Of course, they were not all in the same company when they arrived out here. They are all in good

health and doing OK. Johnny Richards, whom I told you about, from Minnesota, who was married just before I left the states the first time, Price, Armstrong, Smith and Sevens, everyone is going home. I sure was glad to hear it for every one of them has been over here for 24 months. . . . Our interpreters used a loudspeaker system on Tinian and got a lot of the Japs and Chimorros to come out of the caves, but some wouldn't and had to be burned out, or blown out with gunfire or dynamite. . . . Well, I'll stop for now. I hope everything is going well with you and that this thing will soon be over. Lots of love, Gorman.

P. S. I forgot to tell you about the Jap Banzai attacks. We had three of them that were pretty ferocious on the two islands. They got all smoked up on Saki (that's Japanese wine) and whiskey or rum, whatever they have around to drink, I guess, and then they come charging toward us in a mass rush shooting everything they have to shoot with and throwing grenades, if they get close enough, I guess. We never let them get close enough to throw any grenades. Our positions were always well lined with .50 calibre machine guns and .30's and they just set there and mow 'em down when they charge. . . . We had two such attacks at night and one in the day-time. It sure does save us a lot of time when they make a charge like that. We just sit there and knock them off. Well, enough for now.

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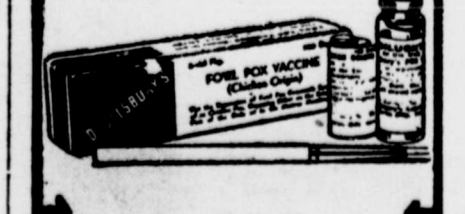

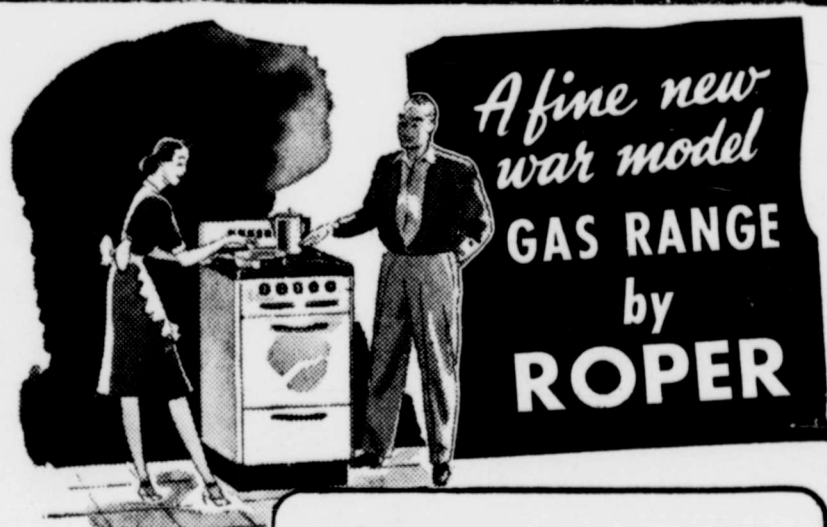
