Dear Mr. D.: Haven't had a chance to write in several days, however, I am still loafing. Most of the men in my outfit are telephoning down at GHQ. There are six of us still, all the first three grade sergeants are here. We were interviewed down at GHQ the other day for a job in the message center as TTY ops. The interview is just a form. They will make us take the job. If there is any thing I hate it is operating a teletype machine. You know how I used to type, still do, with two fingers, and they say I'm an essential trans-

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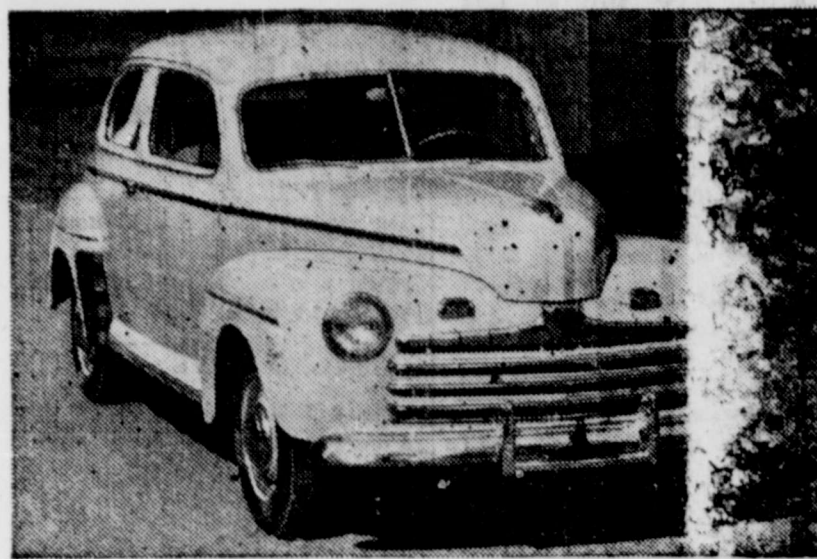

mitter man. Haven't seen the inside of a transmitter building yet . . . I type here with one hand and fight off the bugs tonight. They are really attacking me. It is so hot I try to keep my shirt from touching me, when a mosquito hits, he sticks and has to be pried off, I am so sticky. Who was that joker who wrote to you and said the girls were pretty here. He must have been down in New Guinea with the fuzzy wuzzy gals . . . Manila is the smelliest place, the sewer was all blown up. It is dusty on the streets, a fine powdery dust that clings to you. It has quit raining so much lately (600 inches a year here) and the heat is terrible. One can't get out in it at noontime. It scorches right through clothes. Downtown is a swirling, honking, clanging maelstrom of GI traffic. Took me three hours to get a jeep three blocks the other day. A bridge was out. The Passig river runs right through the city and there are about six bridges, all built by the army and one lane engineer type. It's a trial to walk across the river. There is a plank, 24 inches, built on struts sticking out over the water from the bridge and protected by a rotten rope rail, about fifty feet above the water . . . A new Red Cross club opened here today and it is really a beautiful place. Before the building was bombed, it really was a piece of work. It was an exclusive jai alai club. They have remodeled it into a snack club, dance floor, bunkhouse, reading rooms, etc. It's a large place. Even at that there aren't enough facilities here for the soldiers, to keep them entertained. Every outfit runs a truck to the fights, basketball games and symphony concerts in the Rizal stadium, which is quite a place also. Free tickets are given to each outfit to the Ideal theatre downtown. Also, there are innumerable GI movies (16 mm.) around areas. Usually we

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can go to a show somewhere within a mile every night except Saturday and Sunday. We have a show in our own messhall here on Saturday night. Our amp is a very nice place now, we have done a lot of work on it. We have twelve nice showers, a messhall and supply room of tin and wood construction, a rest room, and all our tents now have wooden floors and electricity from the power plant at the nearby signalops transmitter. There is an eleven o'clock curfew over here now. But no one seems to mind it. I never go to town unless I have to anyway, it's so dirty and there is nothing but holo in the wall souvenir stores, prices sky high. The other day we looked at a Chinese komina, 200 dollars. Even small items are out of sight . . . A lot of Filipinos are working for the army, all the KP and guard duty, they do also a lot of ditch digging and general labor on roads and camps. The inflation is starving them to death. Every day around the messhalls of all the outfits there are a horde of children with buckets begging for your scraps. Three pesos (\$1.50 per day) is labor pay and food is so high, a cup of coffee downtown is 20c; a full meal, very poor, costs \$0 . . . The markets selling food to the Flips are unsanitary—no refrigerators or protection of any sort, for meat and vegetables. No wonder many of them are diseased. The army throws away food here before it will give it to them. You are ordered not to let them have any scraps, and I can show you dozens of letters in the army gripe column here asking why this is. The official army idea is that the Filipinos are a bunch of robbers, but actually the inflation is the army's fault entirely. We can't even give them a lift in our jeeps without official permission. They have old army trucks, hay wagons and old beat up cars for buses. Manila is a big place and one can get nowhere at all walking. Soldiers hitchhike to all their destinations. GI trucks and vehicles have orders to pick up GI hitchhikers . . . I can't seem to pick up the language over here although all of the people speak English fairly understandable. Their language is tagalog. No Spanish is spoken that I know of, although there are a very few Spaniards here. I am going to enroll in some classes at the Philippine Institute as soon as I get settled somewhere if ever. They are being run by and for the army personnel here . . . RCA and the Philippine press wireless now offer radiogram 24 hour service to the states, at very reasonable prices, 4c a word, address and no. Not bad. No radio telephone service at all as yet. If I go to work downtown, I'll have to move down there to the second platoon, either in the Glaco building or in a detachment on city hall square in tents. It's hotter and noisier and dirtier down there so I don't want to do it . . . We eat pretty good . . . the food is not too clean and not much variety but plenty of it. Our chow tonight was pork chops, cheese, peas, beets, onions, bread, butter, jam and coffee. Plus atabrine . . . I'm not getting very yellow from atabrine, some guys here are really yellow . . . 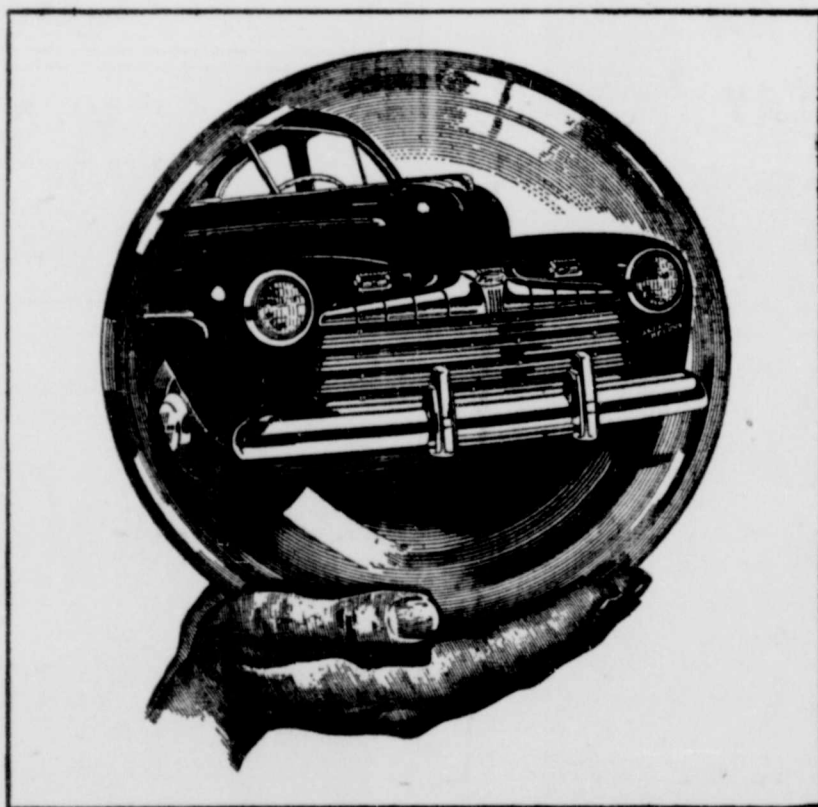
