Huge Gymnasium At Fort Davis Will Soon Be Finished

Fort Davis, Feb. 20.—(TPN)—The Fort Davis \$12,000 community hall and high school gymnasium will be completed, in approximately five weeks, according to Supt. Evan J. Wood.

The structure is situated on the high school campus and is designed to take care of all future indoor athletic events, community dances, etc. While the entire construction of the building is included in relief work, a question has arisen in regard to the floor. Many prefer a hardwood floor, but cost of this would be about \$1500, which includes costs of such accessories as dressing rooms and kitchen. A plan is now under way to obtain a PWA loan to finance the hardwood floor, which is more preferable than concrete.

Into the construction went more than 20,000 adobes. The foundation is of vari-colored rocks. The end walls are much higher than the side walls, and are 24 inches thick. For the present, only the inside will be finished, with a mud and sand plaster, which will be neat as well as durable.

When completed Fort Davis will have one of the largest gym floors west of the Pecos. It will be larger than that of many of the city schools and Y. M. C. A. floors—measuring about 39x 80 feet. Four entrances are provided, the main entrance being in the middle of the south wall.

TEXAS HISTORY IN THE MAKING

Old Nacogdoches, First East Texas City



The interesting little city of Nacogdoches in East Texas, played an important part in Texas history. Established in 1779 by Gil Ybarbo, leader of settlers, it became one of Spain's three outposts in Texas. Its first appearance in the official records was in 1805, when Ybarbo sold the old stone fort which now stands on the high school campus as shown in the lower picture. The upper photo is the Old North church, four miles from Nacogdoches. The first protestant sermon preached in Texas was under the tree in the foreground in 1837. The tree still lives, surviving a bolt of lightning several years ago.

Tax Expert Will Assist in Making Return on Income

For the convenience of those required by law to file federal income tax returns, a deputy collector of internal revenue will be at the court house in Sanderson next Thursday, February 28, from 8 a. m. until 5 p. m., to assist any desiring to make such returns. No charge will be made for his services.

If your net income is \$1000 a year or over, or your gross income is \$5000 or over, and you are single (or if married, not living with husband or wife) you are required to file a return. If you are married, and living with husband or wife, and your net income is \$2,500 or over, or your gross income is \$5000 or over, you are required to file a return. This matter of filing your income tax return should be given immediate attention in order to avoid penalty and interest.

Public to View Sky On Mount Locke

Fort Davis.—A limited number of people will be privileged to view the moon and other heavenly bodies on the nights of March 13 and 14, from 8 o'clock p. m. until midnight, thru the 12-inch telescope, temporarily installed on Mt. Locke in the dome of the McDonald observatory, according to F. E. Roach, astronomer in charge.

In order to prevent more people from going than can be accommodated in one evening, admission to the telescopic viewing will be by ticket. These can be had for both nights by corresponding with Marvin Hunter, editor of the Fort Davis Dispatch, Fort Davis. Those writing for tickets, which are free, are asked to enclose stamp for mailing the tickets.

It is estimated there will be more applicants than can be accommodated for the two night in March set aside for visitors. Those unable to secure tickets this time, it was stated, will get them at some future date, as more definite details are worked out for the future.

EDITORIAL COMMENT

THE VERDICT

(Christian Science Monitor)

At last the little New Jersey town begins to return to normal. Again the folk of Flemington will be able to step out of their homes without being engulfed by the mob that has overrun their streets and debauched their business for six weeks. No longer will the morbid curiosity of millions center upon Flemington's quiet courthouse. No more will it witness the indecent commerce in "kidnap ladder souvenirs" nor the diseased frenzy of Americans in silks and in rags ready to crush one another merely to get a glimpse of a minor witness.

And America comes a bit closer to sanity. After this men and women who have work to do and problems to solve may return to them with minds more nearly whole. They will not have first read what colored that the wife of a Bronx carpenter wore yesterday. They will not have to examine the detailed story of experts who say that the grain in this plank is the same as the grain in that ladder. They will not have to settle the vital question of whether the prosecuting attorney or the defense counsel is the more efficient stirrer of emotions. They will not have to hear publicity-seeking witnesses and lawyers attempt to render a radio verdict.

The thought of millions will be freer to consider less morbid news. It will be able to enjoy happier things and to tackle their own affairs. They may be more of a chance now to give attention to another case involving the mere matter of whether debts valued today at \$100,000,000,000 will be declared repayable in gold that would make them total \$169,000,000,000. There may be more opportunity for consideration of little questions like the best way of providing relief for 3,500,000 jobless or the wisest forms of self-government for industry and labor under NRA.

For a trial which the mob mind has magnified out of all proportion is now ended. What should have been a fairly criminal case, but which because of the prominence of the victim was turned into a Roman holiday, has been decided. The primary result is a tribute to New Jersey justice laboring under the pressure of personal publicity and vulgar emotionalism which too often overwhelm justice. It may add somewhat to the impression that has recently been built up in the United States—especially by the work of federal police—that kidnapping is not a healthy occupation.

The secondary and more important result is a verdict of guilty against the American public on the charge of cruel, morbid and dangerous curiosity. It confirms a judgment held by people of many countries whose culture Americans look down upon, that trial by ballyhoo arouses little surprise or shame in the United States because Americans know no higher standards of justice and of journalism. It is a challenge to very individual to establish standards for himself and to defend his own thinking against emotionalism and propaganda.

NOBODY'S BUSINESS

Austin.—Rejection by the House of Representatives of the senate's "Mother Hubbard" investigation resolution—substituted in the upper house for the original house probe proposal that would have put members of both houses on record as to who pays them retainers—has quieted down the investigating rampage which wasted considerable legislative time. The house intends to go through with its own limited investigating program—looking into fiscal affairs of several state departments and particularly investment of permanent school funds, and probably will ultimately put its own members on record about their retainer fees. It will leave the matter of senate retainers to the senators themselves. And, in the opinion of this reporter, the senate will do exactly as it did two years ago—which was exactly nothing about telling the public how its members make a living.

AT HOT SPRINGS

Jeff Sessoms returned last Saturday from the Indian Hot Springs south of Sierra Blanca where he went with Mrs. Sessoms and his sister and brother-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. W. L. McIntyre of Lumberton, N. C. Mrs. Sessoms and Mrs. McIntyre will remain there for some time while the latter undergoes a series of treatments at the springs.

Endorsement by the Texas Press Association at its Austin convention of the \$3,000,000 Centennial appropriation bill strengthened the Centennial project substantially, and the house appropriations committee probably will get hearings on the bill started during this week. The editors adopted resolutions especially approving the suggestion of Walter D. Cline, chairman of the Centennial commission's executive committee, that a third of the \$750,000 Centennial advertising fund be earmarked for expenditure in Texas newspapers. Cline logically argued that since from a third to a half of the Centennial attendance would come from Texas, newspapers which have loyally donated space during the formative months, ought to get some revenue from the show. He found the editors responsive also to his suggestion that the advertising fund be spent under direction of a board of three members, one from the press association, one named by Texas Advertising clubs, and one named by the governor, with two advisory members appointed by the Centennial commission.

Living in the governor's mansion has its humorous side, as well as

its glamorous aspect, the governor told the newspapermen in a little "off the record" address. One night soon after the inaugural, the Allred family and guests went to a lecture leaving the governor's father in full charge of the mansion and the Allred children. The ranger guard at the mansion had been changed that night and Grandfather Allred had not met the new man assigned to the job. So, after he had retired, when he saw a stranger prowling the hall opposite his room, he decided to investigate. The stranger stepped outside on a porch. Mr. Allred, in pajamas and overcoat, followed and overtook him. He thrust his hand into his overcoat pocket, pointed his finger at the stranger and told him to "stick 'em up" in approved west Texas fashion.

The startled ranger complied and soon identified himself. Later, he told the governor about it. "And, Governor, I was scared to death," he confessed. "I was afraid your father's gun might go off any minute."

"And I haven't told him yet that my dad's gun was only his finger," laughed the governor.

Friends of the race track betting law sustained three severe blows within 24 hours last week, and gained one slight victory. After a committee meeting that lasted until the wee small hours, a house committee pitched the repeal bill into the house with an overwhelming favorable report. Next morning the governor bared details of an investigation by Texas rangers of operations of an alleged "dope ring" at certain Texas tracks, reported to have been "charging" horses with shots of narcotics and altering saliva test reports designed to prevent such practices. Later he announced that he would send up a special message advocating repeal of the pari-mutuel betting law. Unofficial canvass of the house membership indicates likely passage of the bill in the house. The track operators and race horse owners hope to head of this bill in the senate, but admit a hard fight. They gained a modicum of comfort from the senate's quick con-

fimation of Paul Waggoner of Fort Worth as a member of the racing commission, after opposition to the appointment had been forecast.

This column last week reported certain current political rumors, including the one that Gov. Allred might oppose Senator Morris Sheppard for renomination next year. Congressman Wright Patman, Texarkana soldier bonus advocate, is now reported almost ready to announce for the same place. Lieut. Governor Walter Woodul of Houston is said to be ambitious to serve as state attorney when Attorney-General Bill McCraw seeks higher fields for his talents.

McCraw and his aides last week did some fine backstopping for the governor in the latter's efforts to show that the state is amply able to handle the problem of oil control without turning the oil fields over to Mr. Ickes. When two Travis county district judges issued temporary restraining orders, directing the railroad commission not to molest East Texas operators in the movement of oil, which oil owners claimed they had on hand prior to the date of the order requiring commission permits to move it, a flood of oil threatened. Millions of barrels could have been moved under the protection of the "temporary restraining orders" before a hearing could have been had in the district courts. McCraw and his assistants appealed to the court of civil appeals, showed that the "temporary restraining orders" were in effect actual injunctions granted without even giving the state a hearing. The higher court vacated the restraining orders, halted the movement of the oil, and incidentally read some law to the district judges. Able lawyers throughout the state pronounced the attorney general's legal strategy sound and timely.

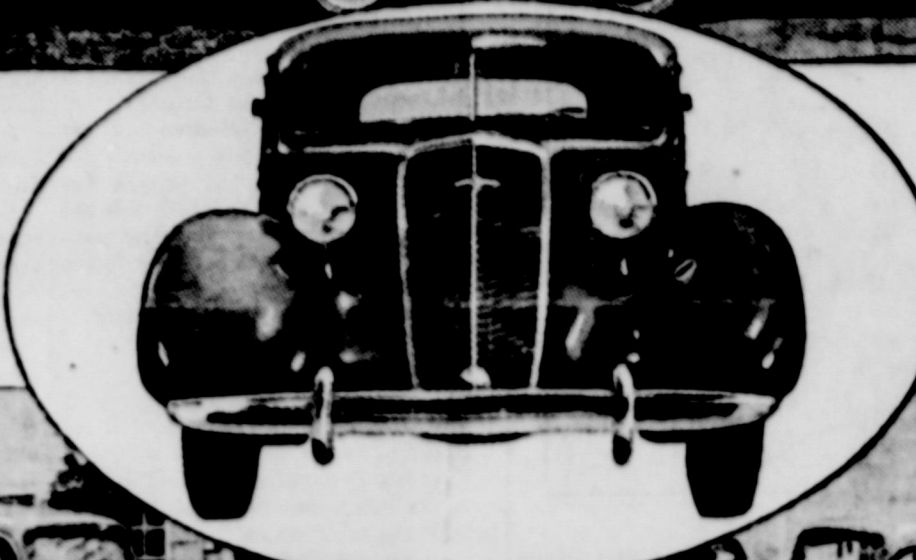

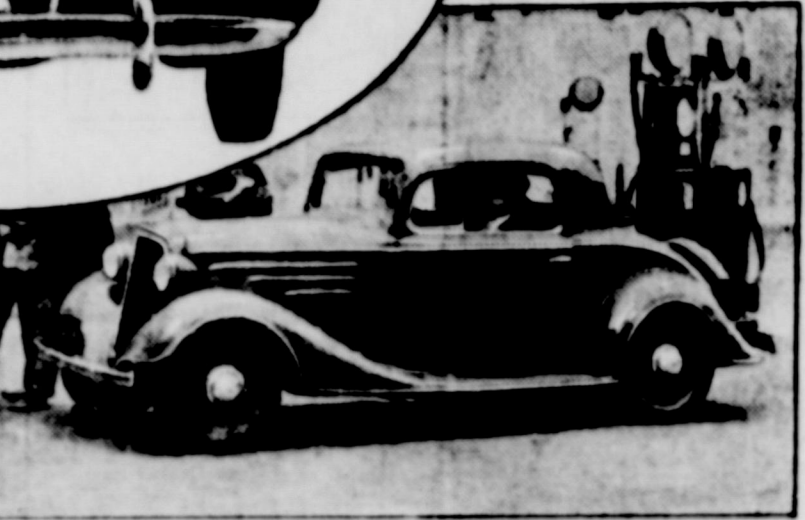
