D-C-D HIGHWAY BECOMES PART OF NATIONAL SYSTEM OF HIGHWAYS

The entire mileage of the D-C-D Highway from Galveston, Texas, to Boulder, Colorado, and from Canadian to Childress, and from Clinton to Oklahoma City has been included in the 7 per cent system of the total mileage in the various states which will receive Federal Aid to the maximum extent of sixty per cent in the cost of construction. This recognition of the D-C-D Highway makes it a part of the National system of Highways and is a distinct proof of the great importance of this Highway. The Highway Commission of Texas has recently advised the Secretary-Manager of the D-C-D Highway in Canadian of the inclusion of the D-C-D in the National System.

Another importance recognition of the D-C-D Highway is the fact that the "Green Book" of the American Automobile Association published in New York places the D-C-D Highway in the list of "Highways of Interstate Importance." In this connection it may be said that few highways in the United States in the brief period of five years can show a better record than the D-C-D Highway.

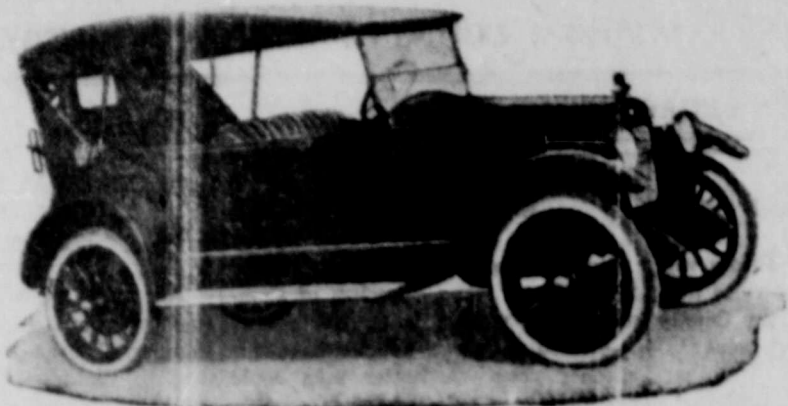

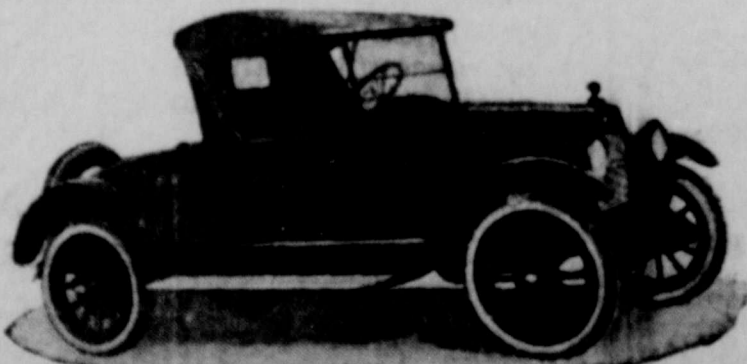

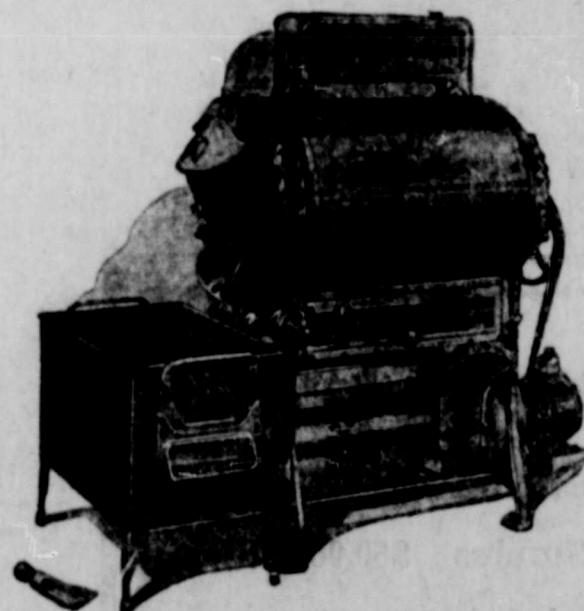

Photographing From Airplane.

In view of the facility with which objects many feet under water can be photographed from an airplane it is possible that the navigation of such a river as the Mississippi, with its shifting bars, may hereafter be made safe by monthly or weekly mapping from the air. In earthquake regions, such as southern Italy and Japan, the changing coast lines, shallows and safe harbors can easily be photographed from the air after each fresh shock, thus keeping navigation open and safeguarding the lives of mariners.

GOOD HIGHWAYS

PNEUMATIC TIRES ARE BEST

Cause Least Damage to Road Surface, According to Tests by Bureau of Roads.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Many roads not originally intended to carry heavy traffic were seriously damaged during the period of the war by the impact of heavy motor trucks. The natural result of this was to warn highway engineers of the importance of planning all future roads with reference to the kind of traffic that is likely to use them. The engineers responded immediately by building thicker roads and roads of more durable material; but in the absence of definite knowledge of the probable strength of the impact they have not known exactly how thick or how strong the roads must be made.

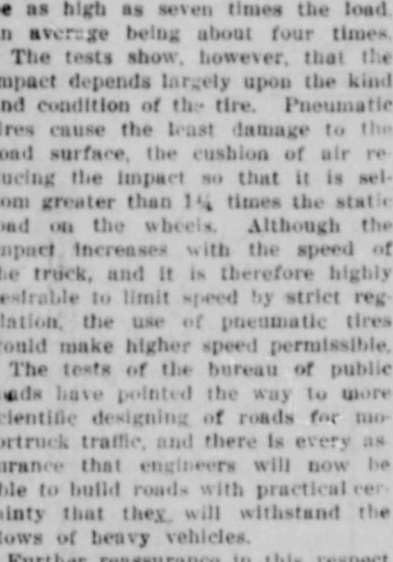
Recent tests of the impact of motor-trucks made by the bureau of public roads, United States Department of Agriculture, develop the facts that when a solid-tired truck strikes a one-inch obstruction, the impact may be as high as seven times the load, an average being about four times.

The tests show, however, that the impact depends largely upon the kind and condition of the tire. Pneumatic tires cause the least damage to the road surface, the cushion of air reducing the impact so that it is seldom greater than 1 1/4 times the static load on the wheels. Although the impact increases with the speed of the truck, and it is therefore highly desirable to limit speed by strict regulation, the use of pneumatic tires would make higher speed permissible.

The tests of the bureau of public roads have pointed the way to more scientific designing of roads for motor-truck traffic, and there is every assurance that engineers will now be able to build roads with practical certainty that they will withstand the blows of heavy vehicles.

Further reinsurance in this respect lies in the information that manufacturers are not building as many trucks exceeding five tons capacity as formerly. The number of industries in which very large trucks can be kept continuously working is extremely limited, so that the likelihood of forthcoming motor-truck damage to public highways is considerably reduced.

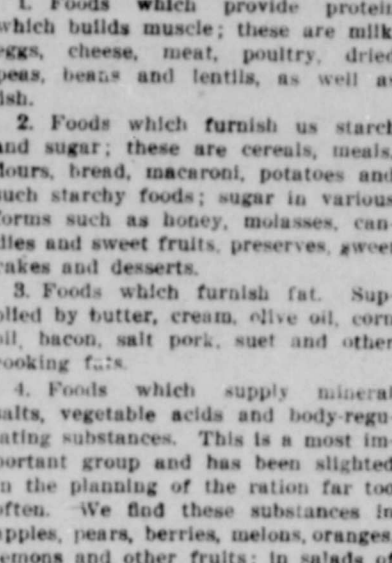
WHAT TO EAT.

It is not necessary to be a graduate of household economics to understand planning a well-balanced ration of palatable and nutritious food; but it is essential that study should be put upon the selection of foods. For a small amount of food rightly combined will give more energy than a large amount illly combined. Some one has said that the selection and organization of food in the diet is as important as the organization of an army. A properly disciplined force of soldiers is more effective than an untrained mob, we will agree.

One of the essential things to remember is the different groups of foods:

1. Foods which provide protein which builds muscle; these are milk, eggs, cheese, meat, poultry, dried peas, beans and lentils, as well as fish.
2. Foods which furnish us starch and sugar; these are cereals, meals, flours, bread, macaroni, potatoes and such starchy foods; sugar in various forms such as honey, molasses, candies and sweet fruits, preserves, sweet cakes and desserts.
3. Foods which furnish fat. Supplied by butter, cream, olive oil, corn oil, bacon, salt pork, suet and other cooking fats.
4. Foods which supply mineral salts, vegetable acids and body-regulating substances. This is a most important group and has been slighted in the planning of the ration far too often. We find these substances in apples, pears, berries, melons, oranges, lemons and other fruits; in salads of green vegetables, such as lettuce and cress; in greens, like spinach, green peas, tomatoes and squash.

When purchasing supplies for the family table think in terms of these groups. Some housewife will say: "My family will not eat such and such foods, or certain members of my family will not eat the kinds of food necessary for them to keep in perfect health." With rare exceptions this is admitting your own lack of properly training the children to eat the things that they should eat.

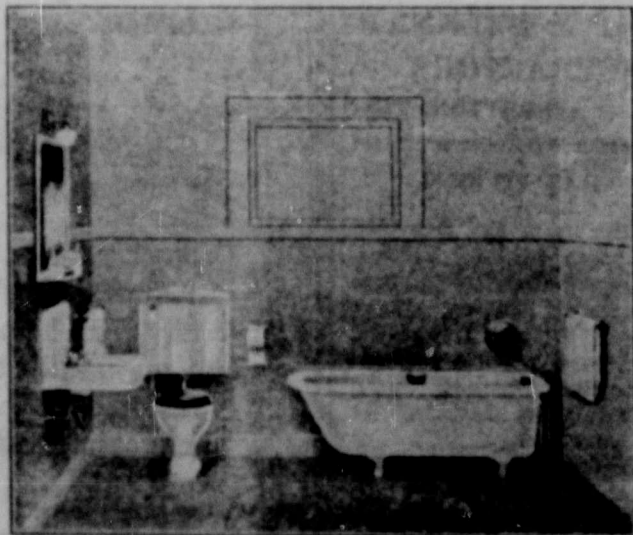

WHY CULLING IS PROFITABLE

Unculled Flock of 992 Hens Laid 3,576 Eggs in Week and 3,520 With 79 Taken Out.

An unculled flock of 992 hens laid 3,576 eggs in the week before being culled. Seventy-nine weak layers were cast out. The culled flock of 913 came right back the next week with a record of 3,520 eggs. While the 79 culled living under precisely similar conditions, and doing their very best, were laying only 85 eggs. The market value of the eggs laid by the culled was around \$3.70. The cost of feeding alone for them at a cent a day for each hen was \$5.53 for the week. Figures like these, say the poultry specialists at the university farm, show the importance of keeping only the best layers. Lessons driven home in the farm bureau's and extension division campaign for frequent culling of flocks should put thousands of dollars in the pockets of poultry raisers.

IMPROVED ROADS

PROPER WIDTH OF HIGHWAYS

Eighteen Feet Should Be the Minimum, Not the Maximum on Main Traveled Roads.

Through all the years we have been trying to maintain from forty to sixty-foot roads in a large percentage of our public highways when such a width was wholly unnecessary. The road sides have not been cared for because they were waste land and this lack of care has made them spreaders of weed seed and hay fever. A narrower roadway, well kept, would in most cases serve all the purposes required, drainage and safety, says the Successful Farmer.

Now that the roads are to be hard surfaced the tendency is to go to the other extreme in order to save tax-payers. We must look ahead. If we put down a paving that will last fifteen or twenty years, we must estimate if possible the amount and kind of traffic it will bear at that time.

If the road is dangerously narrow now, as is the case where less than eighteen feet is paved, what will it be in twenty years?

Eighteen feet should be the minimum, not the maximum, and on main traveled roads a greater width will seem narrow in twenty years. In England and France the roads are paved clear to the fences or sides of the highways, unless a curb and sidewalk or bicycle path is maintained between the road and fence. Every foot is kept in good condition. Good drainage is as much a part of the European highways as is the case with our city paved streets.

We are at the beginning of motor transport. Unless we look ahead and provide wider pavements, we will find the highways crowded and our possible relief from railway congestion annulled. A few dollars saved now in narrowing our paved highways will prove a short sighted policy.

We have already seen the folly of constructing our canals too narrow and locks too short. The great lakes boats needed in Atlantic transport during the war had to be cut in two and taken through the canals in pieces. Ocean ships cannot reach interior ports until the canals and locks are enlarged. This is a highway lesson to us. Look to the future.

ROAD LEGISLATION OPPOSED

Engineers, Dairy Farmers, Fruit and Vegetable Growers Making Vigorous Protests.

All industry and a great portion of the agricultural interests of the country are up in arms against the hasty and ill-advised legislation already enacted by a few states and pending in others which threatens to strangle one of the nation's most essential industries, motortruck transportation, says a writer in an exchange.

The protests come from highway engineers, dairy farmers, fruit and vegetable growers, grain belt shippers, all lines of industry and commerce and other operators of motortrucks and their patrons.

They say increased license fees and restrictive legislation have been effected without sufficient investigation and without conclusive evidence.

A sensible solution is being worked out by the state of Illinois. The state highway department has under construction an experimental road containing 64 test sections, each section differing from the others in design.

Building in South.
A stretch of hard-surfaced road in the southern states, twenty-five miles in length, was difficult to be found six years ago, whereas at present there are any number of hard surfaced roads from twenty-five to 100 miles in length.

Acquire Road Trees.
The state highway commission in California has the authority to acquire roadside trees along its highways.

Construction in India.
Highway construction is now making important and extensive strides in various cities in India.

Traffic to the Right.
Vehicular traffic on highways in France keeps to the right, while railway traffic keeps to the left.

MAY BE PROUD OF RECORD

Massachusetts Town Has Shown What Can Be Done When Management Is Intelligent.

In contrast with the situation at Block Island, where the town came near bankruptcy, is that of Middleton, Mass.

The entire permanent debt of Middleton at the present time is \$7,000 of which \$1,600 is due in notes which will soon be paid, leaving a balance of \$5,400. Here is what the town has to show for the amount and may be timely:

First, and one of the most important, are excellent schools. There is also a fine, free public library, well equipped with the best of books. There is public water with good by-drant service and with which a large portion of the townspeople can be supplied. Electric lights are in all the central streets and a large number of homes are equipped with them. There are good railroad accommodations. Two new bridges have been built over the Ipswich river. The improvement with the exception of the schools have all been made during the last 2 years, and are all paid for with the exception of \$5,400.

In addition to the above the state and county have expended on the streets in town, under the small town act, for macadam roads, \$150,000.—Boston Globe.

City Library and Farmer.

How pleasant relations are maintained between the farmers in the region of Stockton, Cal., and the attendants at the city library of the place, and how the farmers draw heavily upon the facilities of the library to their pleasure and profit, told in a bulletin of the Department of Agriculture. The library sends traveling libraries to communities, and it also encourages the country residents to make direct use of the main library. There are 30 communities and 22 school districts that are receiving county free library service from Stockton, and the main library has a direct country circulation of 6,281 volumes.—Rochester Democrat and Chronicle

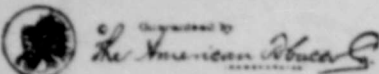

HOME TOWN HELPS

WHAT TO KNOW ABOUT TOWN

Matters on Which Prospective Citizen Will Do Well to Satisfy Himself Before Locating.

In the opinion of one who has given much thought to the question of civic betterment along various lines, the following points should be settled to his satisfaction before decision to make a home in any town is definitely arrived at:

Living—Can we live reasonably and well in that town? Are the best of modern conveniences available for its residents—electricity, gas, telephone, etc.? Are the housing and shopping conditions favorable? Rents, taxes, and prices fair? Hotels good? Home and truck gardens and dairy products plentiful?

Accessibility—Can we go and come easily? Does the town have adequate railroad connections and train service? Street car lines? Interurban lines? Well-marked automobile routes and hard-surface roads?

Business—Can I make good use of capital in that town? Are there banking facilities? Manufacturing interests? Up-to-date stores? Good shipping facilities? Favorable labor conditions? A prosperous farming territory? Active co-operation among business interests?

Employment—Can I get a job in that town at fair pay and with good prospects for the future? Can I count on co-operation from organizations making it their business to help in produce and establish new commercial interests and to welcome new citizens?

Progressiveness—Shall I find that I am in a town having a progressive city government, active civic organization, modern fire protection, and a well-together spirit in everything—a town with a future?—L. N. Flint, Department of Journalism, University of Kansas.

EXPECT RESULTS FROM CLUBS

Organizations Formed in Alabama to Beautiful Sections Are Hailed With Much Enthusiasm.

The "beautiful mile" idea, we understand, originated in the mind of Billie Malby, the manager of the club, who is actively engaged in working out the details of the club. In our opinion he has conceived an idea which is going to result in great good in the building of better roads, better homes, and the making of a better citizenship. The idea is taking root in other sections, and we would not be surprised to see "beautiful mile" clubs organized all over Alabama within the next 12 months. The idea will be carried into the towns and cities and "beautiful street" clubs will be organized. Everybody will want to live on a "beautiful mile" road or a "beautiful street." And, in the language of the Birmingham News, Billie Malby has started something which is going to keep the eyes of the public on the original "beautiful mile" club.

They are going to see what it does and how it does it. Here's hoping that they come up to the full expectations of those who are looking on.—Southern Democrat, Ocala, Fla.

Billboards in the Clean-Up.
The clean-up campaign fostered as a preparation for the American Legion convention is progressing well. Individuals have taken hold in good shape. People are cleaning up their yards and painting their houses. That is about as far as individuals can go.

Now it is up to the city to take a hand in the beautification program by banishing the billboards from the residence districts. Nobody has a right to damage his neighbor's property by setting up a big sign across the street from a residence, or next to a residence. Nobody has a right to damage the community by introducing glaring signs on a boulevard or into a residence district.—Kansas City Star.

Industrial Plants in Small Towns.
The small town as a potential industrial asset has already been utilized to some extent by manufacturers, chiefly those seeking relief from labor troubles in the cities. In some industries, where there is an enormous production of standardized parts, the only difficulty to be met is transportation, and it is reasonable to believe that good roads and motor trucks will solve that problem. If so, the small town may again become the backbone of the United States.

What Muskrats Did for Maryland.
Maryland has many muskrat farms. Owners of the marsh land of Dorchester county harvest from 100,000 to 125,000 muskrat skins a year. There is a market for the meat as well as for the fur. A single Baltimore firm handles 25,000 to 30,000 muskrat carcasses a year and is unable to supply the demand at that. Hotels in Maryland offer them on their bill of fares as "marsh rabbit." Marshes formerly considered valueless are now worth \$20 to \$40 an acre for muskrat culture.

BETTER ROADS

NO ONE TYPE OF ROAD BEST

Bureau of Public Roads Does Not Encourage Construction of Any Particular Type.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) No effort has been made to encourage the construction of any particular type of road in the federal-aid projects administered by the bureau of roads of the United States Department of Agriculture. The legal requirement that the roads shall be "substantial in character" has not been interpreted to mean that only the most expensive types of roads should be built. It has been recognized that the heavy and expensive construction which is necessary in New York, Massachusetts and Pennsylvania is not suitable or warranted for the less exacting traffic of Nevada, Idaho and the Dakotas.

There is a suitable type of road for every type of traffic. Granite blocks are best around wharves and freight depots; country thoroughfares need to be better than rural side roads, light-

ly traveled. A number of other considerations has influenced the choice of type in many cases. It is frequently found that suitable local materials may cost less than better materials imported from a distance; approval of the use of local materials is not infrequently given for the purpose of encouraging local production. In parts of the Far West the entire absence of water along a right of way, and the expense of keeping an adequate supply, often make it necessary to approve the building of a type of construction that can be built without using large quantities of water. The initial decision as to the type of a particular road is made by the state highways department. The bureau of public roads made an independent study of the conditions. The most suitable type of road in the judgment of the engineers of the State department and of the bureau of public roads is finally decided upon. The earth, sand-clay and gravel roads which make up 66 per cent of the mileage have cost only about one-fourth of the federal-aid funds used, while the higher types, including cement concrete, brick and bituminous concrete have called for 60 per cent of the money to build 24 per cent of the mileage.

BUILDS AND GRADES ROADS

Machine in Operation in Midwest That is Capable of Working at Rapid Rate.

Moderate initial and operating expense as well as rapid work are features of a motor-driven, one-man road builder and grader of somewhat novel design that has appeared in the Midwest. The machine carries at opposite sides endless conveyor drags that are supported at right angles to it by adjustable booms. These members are inclined downward, so that as they operate at a speed of 200 feet a minute, they carry dirt from the sides of a 30-foot roadway to the middle, filling depressions and building up the crown. Under ordinary conditions, it is said, the machine is capable of building a new road at a rate of one or two miles an hour. Road surfacing and dragging is accomplished at a speed of from two to three miles an hour.

First Turnpike Built.

The first turnpike in the United States was constructed between Lancaster, Pa., and Philadelphia.

Roads in National Forests.

The federal government is spending \$12,000,000 on roads in national forests in the western district.

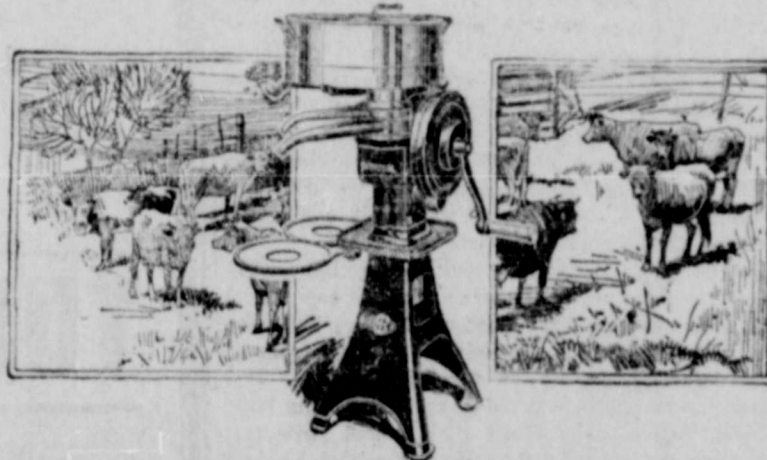
Lincoln Highway Surface.
