Murder charges filed in shooting of Tony Valdez

Victor Soto out on bond

Victor Soto, 38-year-old Post man now out on \$3,000 bond, is charged with murder in the death of Antonio Valdez, 35, in a wild shooting spree inside the Valdez Lounge here Saturday night shortly before 10 o'clock.

According to witnesses, Soto started shooting with a long-barreled gun when he entered the front door of the lounge.

Valdez, who was standing at the bar, was hit twice by slugs and fell to the floor, apparently dying instantly.

A second man, Guadalupe Gonzales, was shot in the side by another of the slugs. He was taken to the hospital and treated. The bullet entered his body on one side, went around his rib cage, and came out the other side, according to an officer's report.

According to witnesses, Soto then ran out the second door of the lounge near the bar with the gun still in his hand.

But this wasn't the end of the violence.

Joe Martinez told investigating city police and sheriff's officers that after the shooting he locked the front door of the lounge and ran to a nearby house to telephone for an ambulance.

Returning to the lounge he was met at the front door by a man later identified as Isabel Perez Jr., 20, of Post coming out with a butcher knife in his hand.

Inside, Martinez found that the body of Valdez had been slashed across the chest and that the wounded Gonzales had been slashed on the neck and was covered with blood.

Justice of the Peace Racy Robinson set bond at \$1,000 yesterday morning for Perez after Sheriff J. A. (Jimmy) Holleman had signed a warrant charging Perez with assault with an illegal weapon, a third degree felony under the new state criminal code. Perez was still in jail as of noon Wednesday.

Soto, a gin employee, gave himself up to Sheriff Holleman several hours after the shooting and also handed the law

enforcement officer his long-barreled 38-caliber pistol which had been used in the shooting.

Valdez was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Robinson a few minutes after officers had been called to the scene of the shooting and slaying.

Connie Lopez, who works in the lounge, was standing at the bar with Valdez when she said she saw Soto come in the main

entrance with the gun in his hand and point it in their direction.

She said she ran out of the door near the bar and then heard several shots. After that she told officers Soto ran out the same door with the gun in his hand.

According to Police Officer David Bradshaw's report, there were a number of witnesses to the shooting and these people

were questioned and asked to give statements.

What was the connection between the shooting and the slaying, if any? Sheriff J. A. (Jimmy) Holleman who worked with police officers on the investigation told The Dispatch yesterday he "didn't know."

Funeral services for Valdez were held Tuesday at the Holy Cross Catholic Church with Fr. (See Shooting, page 8)

CITY AGREES TO HELP

30-acre development project is proposed

The Post City Council, at a called meeting last Thursday, expressed itself as "agreeable in principle" to paying for half the asphalt paving and the extension of water and sewer lines and fire protection to a proposed 30-acre development project on North Avenue S.

Ed Miller and Bryan J. Williams, representing the Slaton Savings and Loan Association, told the council they had investors who are interested in purchasing and developing the property if the city would "go along with part of the expense."

The approximately 30 acres involved is owned by Mr. and Mrs. R. L. (Lou) Marks, and fronts on U. S. Hwy. 84, the council was told.

Tentative plans are to develop 12 acres of the property in commercial buildings fronting on the highway and apartments and duplex residences, and the remaining 18 acres in single-unit residences.

Miller and Williams told the council the investors would pay for the required curbing and gutters and for half the paving. It is estimated that about two and a half miles of curbing and gutters would be required in the development.

Tentative plans also call for the construction of from 12 to 15 single-unit residences and from five to 10 duplexes the first year in what was described as a "five-year program" of development.

Williams told the council that

"one of the finest steps the city has made has been to get rid of most of the old houses here, but there just haven't been any built back." Consequently, he said, a serious housing shortage exists in Post.

"In five years the city would have an additional one million dollars on its tax rolls from

property from which it is now getting only cotton patch taxes," Williams told the council.

Miller, who is president of the Slaton Savings and Loan Association, said a general development land plan on the project will be worked up "within the next month."

George Tracy funeral rites held Tuesday

Services for George H. Tracy, 71, of 808 West 4th St., were held at 4 p. m. Tuesday at the First Baptist Church, of which he was a member and on the board of deacons.

Tracy, who had been a resident of Post since 1945, died about 8 p. m. Sunday in Garza Memorial Hospital following an illness of several weeks. He and Mrs. Tracy were owners and managers of the Algerita Hotel here from 1945 until it was destroyed by a fire in 1961.

Since that time, he had been an oil operator.

Born May 21, 1902, at Kress, Tex., he was married to Miss Thelma Jo Blair at Frederick, Okla., on April 23, 1935. He served in the Army Reserve during World War II, attaining the rank of major and was post commander at Fort D. A. Russell, Marfa, Tex.

Tracy had been a Baptist for over 60 years.

Surviving are his wife and two daughters, Mrs. Douglas Shepherd and Mrs. Bob Carpenter, all of Post; two brothers, Dr. Nat Tracy of Brownwood and Horton Tracy of Fort Stockton; and five grandsons.

The Rev. Glenn Reece, pastor of the First Baptist Church, officiated at the funeral services.

Burial was in Terrace Cemetery under the direction of Mason Funeral Home. Deacons of the First Baptist Church (See Tracy Rites, page 8)

Local man shot 4 times here

Johnny Castro was shot four times with a .22 caliber pistol last Thursday morning, but none of the wounds are thought to be too serious and he is reported to have been released from St. Mary's Hospital in Lubbock where he was taken by the city-county emergency ambulance service after emergency treatment in Garza Memorial Hospital here.

Sheriff J. A. (Jimmy) Holleman, who investigated the shooting with one of the city police officers, said the shooting occurred in the home of Anselmo (Moses) Casares, Jr., 29, at 110 North Ave. O as a result of "a family argument" between Casares and Castro.

The investigation of the shooting is continuing. No charges have yet been filed against Casares as officers are waiting to see if Castro desires to file charges.

Castro was shot in the chest leg and thumb, the sheriff said.

Contracts extended for school principals, AD

Contracts for three Post school principals and Athletic Director Bobby Davis were extended through the 1975-76 school year by Post school district trustees at their February meeting Monday night.

In another major action, the board called the annual school trustee election for Saturday, April 6, at which Places 4 and 5 on the board will be filled.

These places now are held by A. C. Cash, board president, place 4, and K. W. Kirkpatrick, place 5.

Contracts were extended for Jack Alexander, elementary school principal; Billy Hahn, junior high principal; and Jim Pollard, high school principal, besides that of Davis.

All will receive the same amount "above state" as in their current contracts, but state pay increases each year, as does the teachers', under an annual experience increment plan adopted several years ago by the legislature.

Meeting with the Post trustees at the start of their meeting were Tom Griffin, Lubbock attorney, and most of the group of Southland school district landowners seeking annexation of at least some of their properties into the Post district.

Griffin, legal representative of the group, told Post trustees that they appreciated the board's current position in the annexation dispute but would be happy to see the board change its position to one of unqualified acceptance of the proposed annexed land if approved by the commissioners courts of Garza, Lynn and Lubbock counties.

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Listening Post

I went browsing through my childhood this morning.

I dropped in the library to see what was going on and found Pee Wee sorting and straightening books in the juvenile collection. I hadn't paid much attention to our children's books lately.

But this morning I started looking at titles and sampling illustrations from books I'd read years ago. Before I knew it I was reliving some of my happiest reading hours. I was always partial to fantasy in my early youth. My taste in reading was inclined to the miraculous and impossible.

When I was in the second grade my teacher read us a book called "To and Again" by a man named Brooks. It was the story of some farm animals who decide to migrate to Florida for the winter. I don't know what there was about the story that appealed so. Perhaps it was the good natured animals who triumph over all sorts of evil and bad-tempered men. Whatever the reason, this story stands out as among the very first of a still growing list of favorite books.

I found it on our shelves this morning. The title's been changed to "Freddie Goes to Florida"—Freddie was a pig and as close as the book comes to supplying a hero and finding him here in Post was like finding a long lost friend.

A book doesn't have to have animals as its characters to win my affection, but sometimes it helps. Kenneth Graham wrote a classic called "Wind in the Willows", one of the greatest of them all. I don't know of another thing the man ever did or wrote that history should notice or remember. But creation of Mr. Toad of Toad Hall and his roguish horse Cyril are as immortal as Alice in Wonderland.

If I couldn't get whimsical fantasy then I curled up with ancient myths, and for myth telling you can't hardly beat Hawthorne's two collections "A Wonder Book" and "Tanglewood Tales". At least, so says my memories of days gone by. I checked one out this morning to sample with my daughter. We'll see if memory has played tricks on me.

As I grew older I switched from fantasy to history. Any book that had a historical setting, especially early frontier days in our country, was bound to win my approval.

One of the first was "Caddie Woodlawn" by Carol Brink. I was introduced to Caddie by my school teacher. I would sit for hours not moving a muscle just to hear Caddie's story.

I soon discovered there were many others equally as good. Laura Ingalls Wilder wrote a series, among them "The Little House in the Big Woods" which never failed to please. Another was "The Willow Whistle" by Cornelia Meigs, a story of children on the frontier discover-

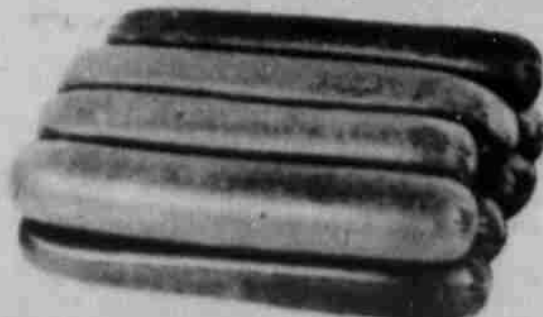

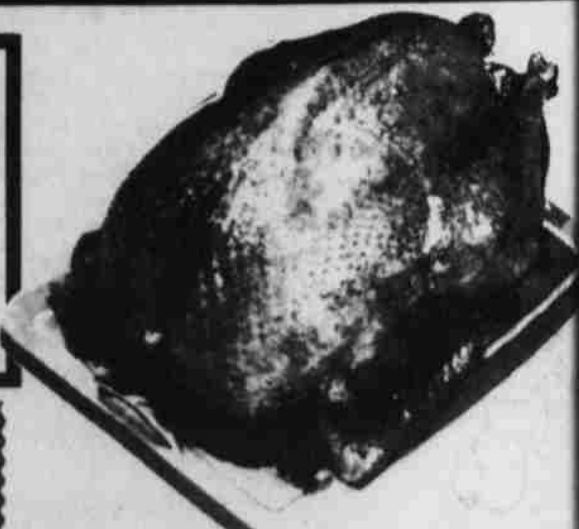

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feelings with each other in several ways.
First, listen. We all like to talk to someone who really listens — who looks at us when we talk, hears what we say and answers. If a person truly listens, others will want to talk with him more.

Another way to share feelings is by talking. Often it's hard to put feelings or thoughts into words, but it's important to try — and it gets easier with practice. The key here is choosing words that express what we want to say.

Doing things with the family is another way to share feelings. Sometimes it's easier to talk or listen while we work. Gardening or washing the car can be a time to share your feelings — tell the other person what makes you happy, sad, angry or joyful.

Sharing activities is an important part of everyday living — and can lead to family unity.

A fourth way to share feelings involves watching what you say. Sometimes adults say things that children — or others — don't understand. This can be confusing. Carelessly saying, "You're a bad boy!" instead of "You did a bad thing," is one example.

A parent can better understand a child's experiences and feelings simply by listening. It may help to say, "You look like you had a good time," or "You look tired. You must have worked hard at school." In addition, by sharing feelings — talking and listening to one another, adults set an example for children and young people.

Children look to adults for a pattern of behavior. They need to realize that adults have the same feelings they do, although adults don't always react like children.

Also, sharing feelings gives us an outlet for "bad" feelings. A person generally feels better if he can talk out feelings of anger, hurt or disappointment — rather than acting them out or "boiling inside."

Similarly, a child who learns to say he's mad, instead of just hitting, will get along better with everyone — including himself.

However, if we have done something we didn't mean to do, we should still try to share feelings when apologizing. We can explain, for example, that we feel mixed-up inside. That helps others forgive our poor behavior.

This is a part of sharing feelings, too.

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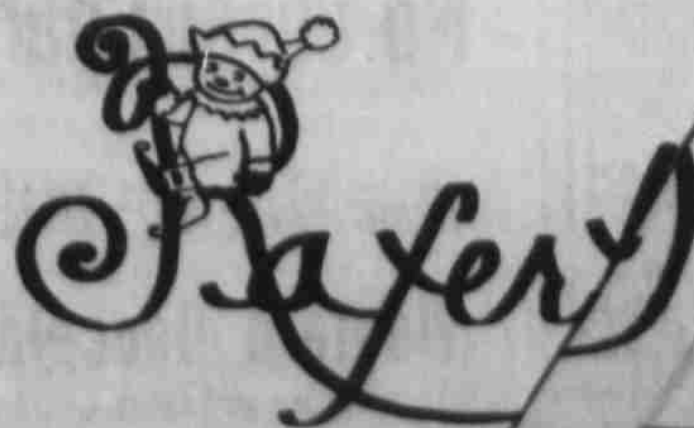


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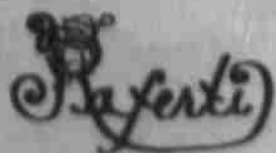

Rules set up for ambulance

A joint committee of city, county and hospital district representatives have worked up a set of rules and regulations for city-county ambulance service which provide fees ranging from \$20 to \$50 for ambulance use.

The county commissioners court approved the rules and regulations Monday and city council and hospital board are expected to approve them at their next meetings.

The committee gave their final approval to the rules at a meeting in city hall last Thursday night.

The fee schedule calls for a \$20 charge for emergency or transfer within city limits, \$30 for emergency or transfer out of town within the county, and \$50 for out of town service out of county but within 50 mile radius. The ambulance will not be operated outside a 50-mile radius of Post.

The city and county agree to divide the cost of the ambulance service on a 50-50 basis with all income received in ambulance fees to be divided between city and county on a 50-50 basis.

The ambulance service will be operated by the City of Post police department with the police chief and the city having full responsibility for the ambulance service operation.

Garza County agrees to pay the salary of one man to help run the ambulance service. This salary will be comparable to the salary of the Garza County sheriff's deputy.

The city will furnish a secretary to do the bookkeeping on the ambulance service, billing and collecting the ambulance fees.

The Garza County hospital district will provide supplies such as sheets, pillows, blankets, bandages, laundry, etc.

When off-duty police officers are used to operate the ambulance service they will be paid \$5 per call. All drivers shall have chauffeur licenses.

All drivers and attendants shall have completed the standard course of instruction of first aid to the injured from the American Red Cross. These shall be kept current.

Two men will be in attendance when the ambulance leaves on a call.

Qualified volunteers will be available in extreme emergencies, or in case police are not available. The chief of police will have a list of these volunteers.

Sheriff J. A. (Jimmy) Holleman told The Dispatch he has worked with the ambulance service project from the beginning and wants to assist in every way with its development. But he said he would much prefer that the county commissioners court give him a second deputy who could be used on the ambulance runs rather than putting that salary money into the city police department.

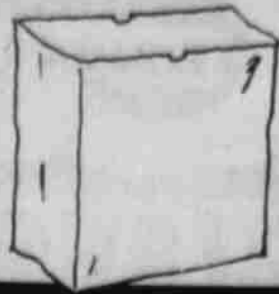

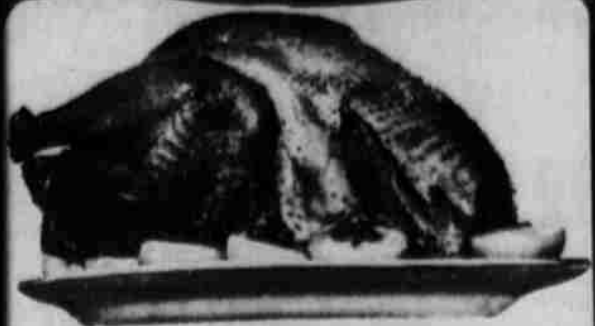

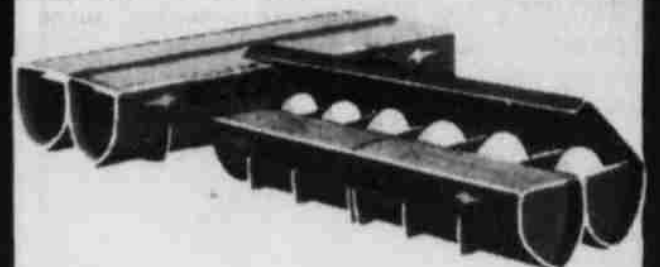

But we have no sales. We have one place to shop and that's it. Our B. X. is about the size of the old Wacker's store. It serves two bases. The prices are very expensive. It is also the only place to shop. Downtown is OUT. You wouldn't believe the German prices.

"I know the prices there are bad also, but you do have a choice. If one store is out of a product you can go to another store. Here, if they don't have it you do without. So, count your blessings.

"Actually, despite the hardships we are enjoying it. There are a lot of sports for the kids to get into. The base goes all out for it. We have three sons that are in everything. Also a daughter that is very active . . . Sincerely

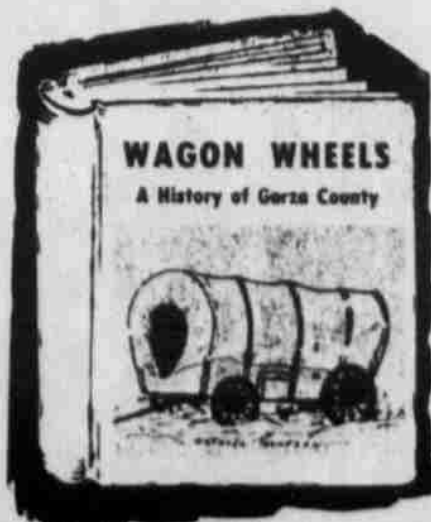

He assured Post trustees, as did the landowners with him, that the landowners would sign contracts with the school district to pay any such indebtedness should it ever come into existence. He said this would be a simple legal procedure.

Post trustees did not take any action to change their present position.

They are awaiting an opinion from the state attorney-general on the Southland school bond case, as attorneys have advised no similar case has ever gone through the courts to final judgment before to determine whether land being annexed out of one school district could be legally liable for a share of a bond issue voted in that district but not sold at the time of annexation.

Both Lynn and Lubbock commissioners courts have held hearings on the annexation, but have postponed decisions. Lubbock's court adjourned its hearing to Feb. 21 to give Post school trustees "time to clarify their position."

School Supt. Bill Shiver reported to the board that two fuses have recently "blown out" in the completely rewired Post elementary school building and that he has asked the architects to look into the matter as to cause.

At the end of the meeting Shiver went over new data on the evaluation system feedback data on teachers. He told the board that "it proved correct" our decision of two years ago to make a radical program change.

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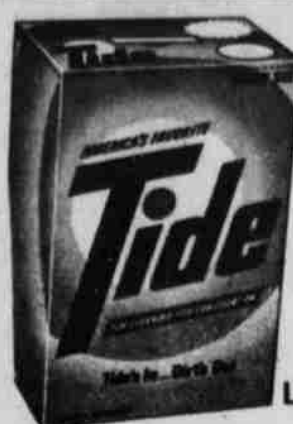

JUMPER CABLES
"Dead" car batteries are common during the winter, and that brings jumper cables into action. Their safe use is important to avoid injuries, points out an agricultural engineer for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The negative plate of a battery gives off hydrogen gas, so a spark could set off an explosion. When using jumper cables, be sure the ignition of both cars is off. Be sure both batteries are of the same voltage. Attach one cable to the positive terminals first. Run the second cable from the negative terminal of the good battery to a grounding point on the other car. Now try to start the car with the "dead" battery. You may have to start the other car as well to avoid excessive discharge of its battery.

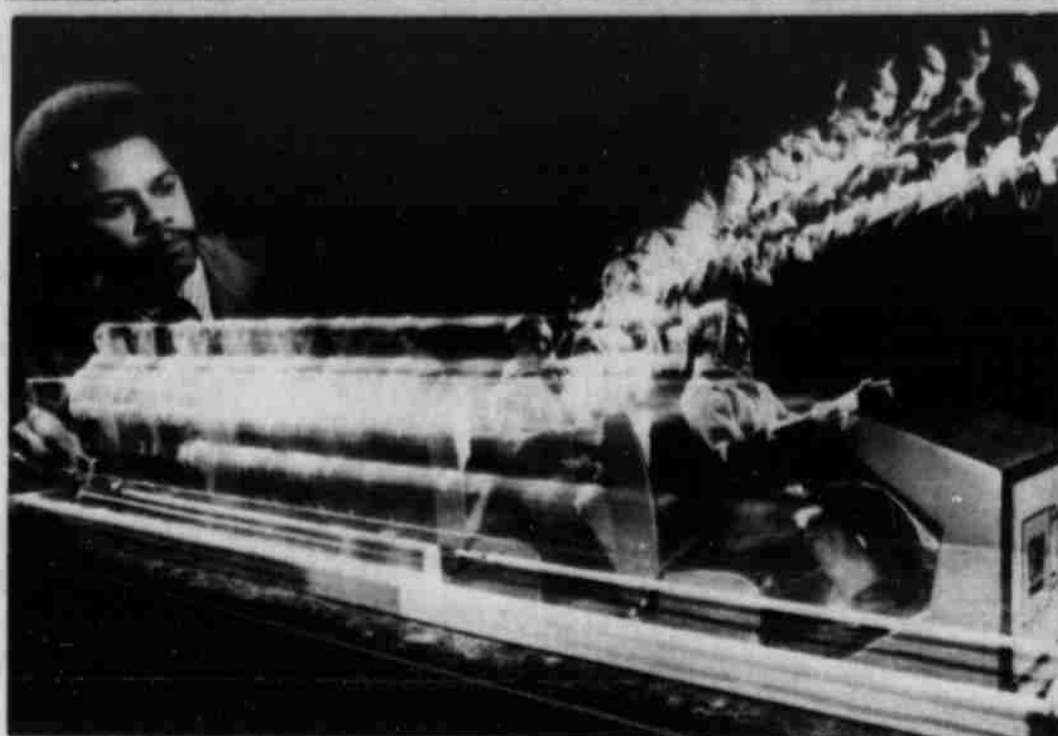

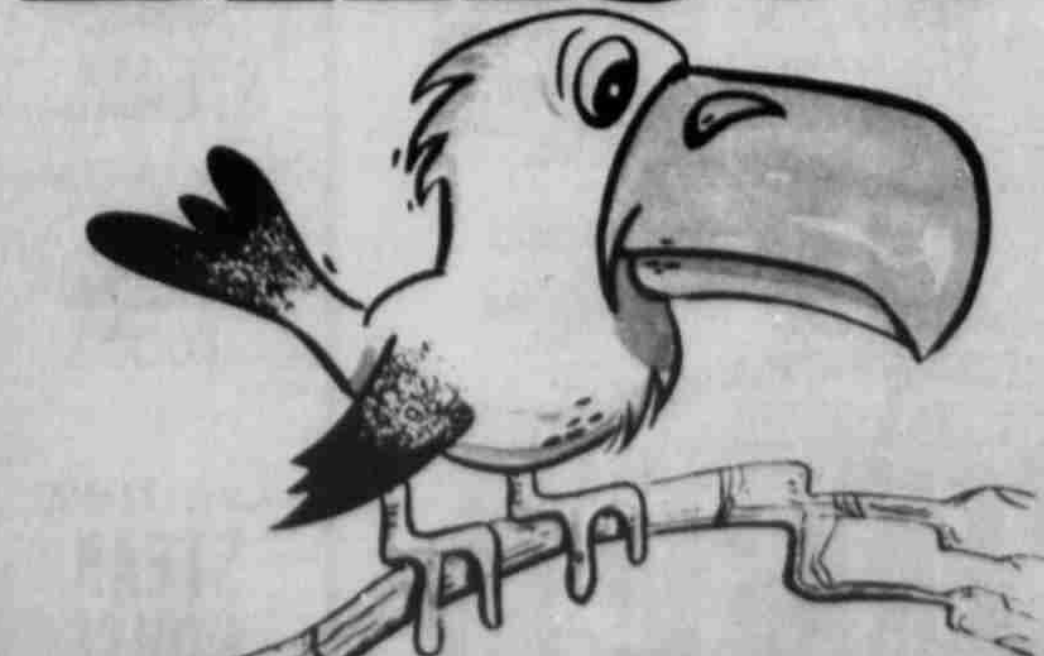
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A Plastic World
