LOS ANGELES, Feb. 16.—The legislative committee that has been investigating the acceptance of a \$2,500 "love offering" by Judge Harlos S. Hardy of Los Angeles from Angelus Temple, will recommend impeachment proceedings against the jurist, it was learned today from authoritative sources. The house committee, it was learned, will meet Monday to draft a formal recommendation. It is understood that Mrs. Almee Semple McPherson has been notified to return here from Canada as a state witness.

McKenzie is scheduled to die in the electric chair March 23, and ministers, lawyers and club women are petitioning the governor pro and con regarding the commutation of the death sentence.

WISCONSIN SETS RECORD WITH FISH HATCHERIES

MADISON, Wis., Feb. 16.—Wisconsin continues to hold its leadership in fish propagation among states of the middle west with a comparison of reports showing that Wisconsin planted more than twice as many young fish in the past year than the state of Michigan. Michigan planted 140,000,000 fish during the last year. During the same period Wisconsin planted 289,000,000.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16.—The army will stage a dawn to dusk flight from Brownsville to the Pan American Canal Zone on the tenth of March, it was announced today. The pilot will be Captain Ira C. Eaker who piloted the Question Mark in its endurance test. The plane will be the newest type of army pursuit group. Five stops will be made on the trip.

Slayer of Smith Is Indicted

The grand jury of Tarrant county Friday returned an indictment of murder against John Y. Bain in connection with the fatal shooting of M. C. Smith on January 9. Bain was arrested soon after the shooting which took place at a vacant house owned by Smith on Sagamore Hill. No date for the trial of Bain has been set by the court.

The Travis county grand jury also returned an indictment charging murder against Bishop Adams, negro voodoo doctor, for the slaying of William Globber. Globber was found in his store Wednesday with his head crushed and his throat cut. Robbery is thought to have been the cause for the negro attacking Globber and killing him.

Houston Citizens Want More Paving

HOUSTON, Feb. 16.—Residents of Meadow Street here have begun to get impatient at the city's delay in paving their street. Twenty years ago a petition was filed with the city asking that the street be paved. The street still remains unpaved, although six mayors have ruled the city since that first petition.

Oscar Holcombe, recently defeated for mayor, once lived the street and admits that he promised to pave it in event he ever became mayor. "Guess I forgot," Holcombe said recently in discussing the failure of his administration to lay the paving.

Grand Jury Adjourns; 14 Felonies Returned

In making its report, the grand jury for the February term of the district court found only 14 felonies and no misdemeanors. The inquisitorial body also reports a lack of harmony on the part of the citizenship, and cites specifically that witnesses summoned would either change their testimony or elude the facts.

The jail was found in a satisfactory condition and the manner in which the prisoners are cared for was pronounced satisfactory.

The body also reports the sale of a certain wine that is sold to young men and which produces intoxication, and states no means of stopping the sales of this beverage are available.

The report to the court, with a comment from that honorable personage follows:

To the Honorable E. J. Miller, Judge 35th Judicial District:

We, your Grand Jury, empaneled on February 11, 1929, for the February term of the above court, herewith submit to you our report. We have been in session five days, examined 39 witnesses, have faithfully inquired into all violations of the law called to our attention. We have found 14 felony bills and no misdemeanors.

It is our pleasure to report that we find that the sheriff of Runnels county and his deputies are rendering the public most faithful and efficient service and are bringing law violators to justice in practically all cases which come to their attention; we recognize that it is impossible to enforce the law in many instances and especially the liquor law.

It is our pleasure to report that we have received the most efficient and helpful aid in the discharge of our duties from both the district and county attorneys, for which we wish to thank them. We also wish to express our appreciation for the faithful services of our door bailiff S. D. Williams.

We regret to report that we find on sale in some of our drug stores a beverage called Wine of Elisir which is being sold to boys regardless of age and produces intoxication, which we found no way to suppress.

We have inspected the Runnels county jail, and investigated as to the maintenance and keeping of the prisoners. We are glad to report that we find conditions entirely satisfactory there. We have further inspected the county court house and park and find that they are being well cared for.

We express to you, our Honorable District Judge, also our District Attorney and other county officers,

Smith is Given 3 More Months

AUSTIN, Feb. 16.—Three months stay of execution has been granted to Bill Smith, alias Roy Miller, alias Joyce Shepperd, convicted in Jones county of murder in 1927. Allenists last summer declared that Smith suffered from a mental disease that would either kill the man or he will become normal in a few months.

Stay of execution was granted then and now the prison physician declares that Smith's mental condition is unchanged.

May Deport All Alien Gunmen

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16.—Aroused by the nation-wide increase in crime, particularly shocked by Chicago's gangland massacre, the house prepared today to pass a stringent deportation bill under which alien gunmen, racketeers and big bootleggers could be deported. The final vote on the measure will be taken today.

CHICAGO, Feb. 16.—"Clean up Chicago or suffer indictment by grand jury," was the drastic order given the Chicago Police Department by State's Attorney John A. Swanson. "Close and keep closed all gambling houses, houses of vice, soft drink parlors, speakeasies, beer flats, moonshine joints and all places where alcohol is handled," Swanson said.

Racing Bill Is Expected to Pass

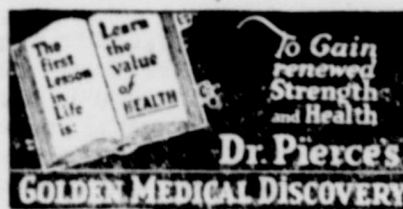
McWilliams Offers Expression Class Thanks to Citizens Pleasing to Crowd

The plays were presented on Thursday afternoon to the members of the Shakespeare Club as their program for their regular Thursday meeting.

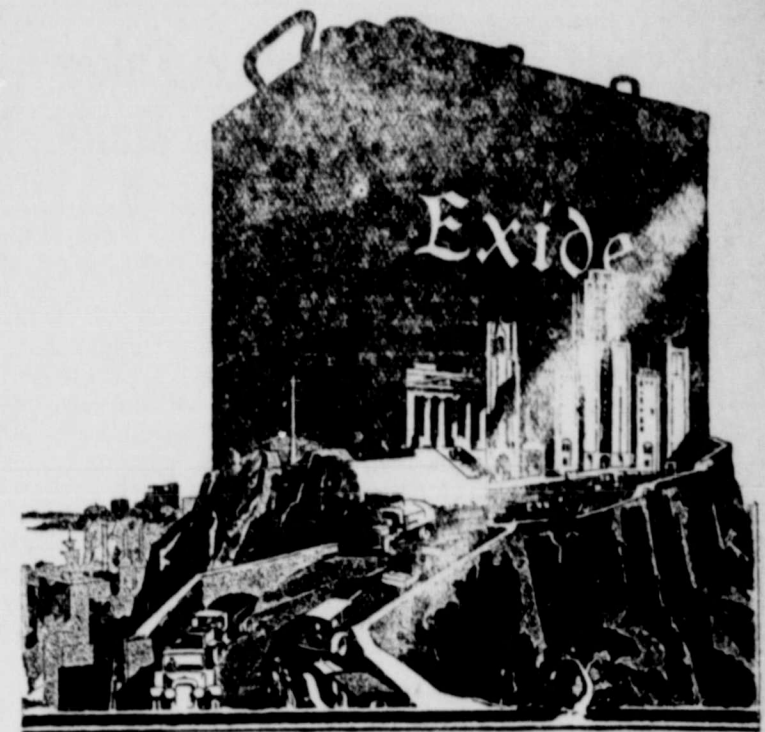

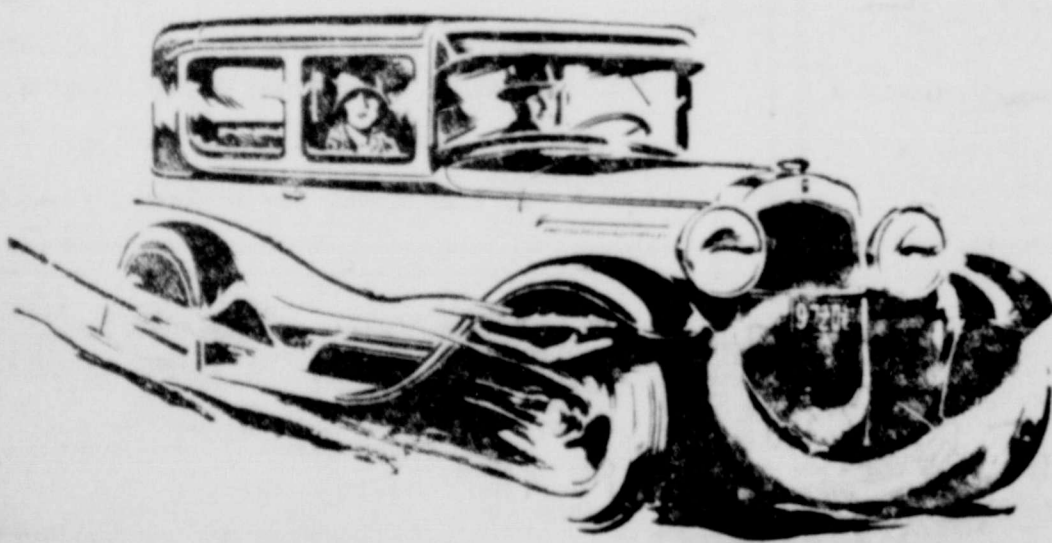

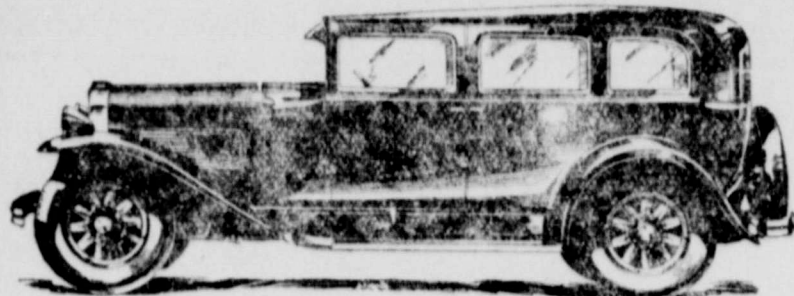

2 Youths Indicted; Bond Set at \$2000

Bill Winans and Archie Reese were lodged in the county jail Friday, having been indicted by the grand jury and are charged with assault and attempt to rape. Bond having been set at \$2000 each, and this had not been made Saturday.

The facts surrounding the circumstances leading to the indictments, as given to a Ledger reporter, are as follows:

Three young men, J. It was stated that the young lady had been to the postoffice at Hatchel, and while returning home was overtaken by the boys about one mile north of Hatchel and, the young men stopped and invited her to ride. She declined the offer for a lift, but it was stated that she was forced to ride with the boys. The four rode in the car together until they came to a lane that led to the girl's house a short distance south of Winters, and the young lady asked to be let out of the car, but that her request was refused and that she was taken on north of Winters about one and one-half miles, to a pasture on Bluff Creek, where it is alleged the assault was made upon her.

George Ray, who was a former Talpa citizen, who now resides at Shep, in Taylor county, was on his way to Winters, and found the girl in the road without shoes and hat and her clothing torn. He rushed her to Winters and notified the parents. The girl in her statement to Winters officers, on the day of the alleged offense, stated that J. Winans had nothing to do with the attack and no charge was filed against him. The two boys were arrested at about 5 o'clock in the afternoon of the day the offense is alleged to have been committed. The girl was unable to appear as a witness against the youths for several days after the alleged attack.

The case is scheduled to come up for trial during the fourth week of the present term of district court.

Cemetery Ass'n. In Annual Meet

At the meeting of the stockholders of the Ballinger Cemetery Association, Inc., only a few interested parties attended and the old board was re-elected to serve for another year, with the addition of John W. Bigby, who was appointed to succeed C. R. Crews, deceased.

The business side of the association was discussed and it was agreed that the \$100 assessment plan was the most important and far-reaching move that had ever been taken for the interests of the lot owners. By this plan a lot owner pays into the treasury in cash \$100 and this is held in trust and draws annual interest to equal the \$5 fixed tax. This will enable a person to buy a lot and by the payment of the \$100 have it cared for, the streets and sidewalks worked around the lot, exempt him from further taxation and receive the benefit for all time to come. By this plan it is pointed out that instead of paying out \$5 each year that you never pay another cent, that you receive the same benefit that you do when you pay your city taxes on a city lot with added conveniences. The \$100 gives a lot owner perpetual upkeep and continued benefit.

Committees were appointed for the various duties pertaining to the operation of the business and continued improvement of the cemetery and each appointment was accepted without complaint.

In a very few months or just as soon as the weather is settled and favorable a great many improvements will be made at the cemetery, included in which is the laying of the streets in the newly added plot to the ever growing city, trees and shrubs are to be set out, and other improvements made. It was also pointed out that water pipes had been extended so that each lot had water available in close proximity.

The board is deeply grateful for the co-operation extended by the citizenship and for the goodly response to the call for taxes this year.

It is our pleasure to report that we have received the most efficient and helpful aid in the discharge of our duties from both the district and county attorneys, for which we wish to thank them. We also wish to express our appreciation for the faithful services of our door bailiff S. D. Williams. We regret to report that we find on sale in some of our drug stores a beverage called Wine of Elisir which is being sold to boys regardless of age and produces intoxication, which we found no way to suppress.

We have inspected the Runnels county jail, and investigated as to the maintenance and keeping of the prisoners. We are glad to report that we find conditions entirely satisfactory there. We have further inspected the county court house and park and find that they are being well cared for.

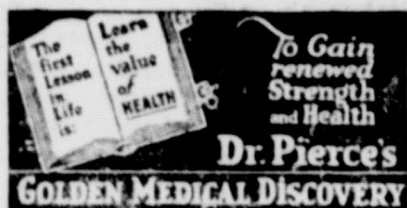
McWilliams Offers

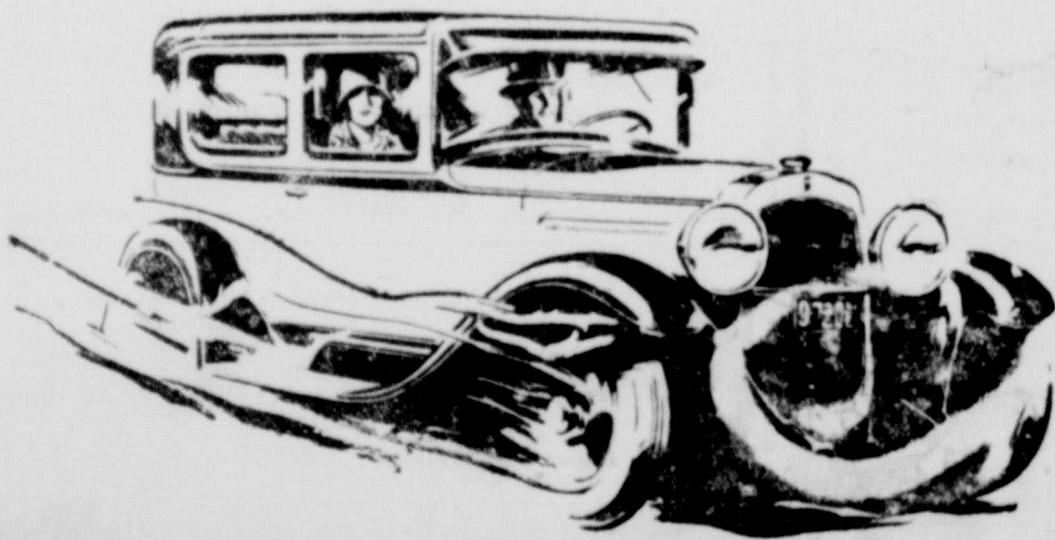

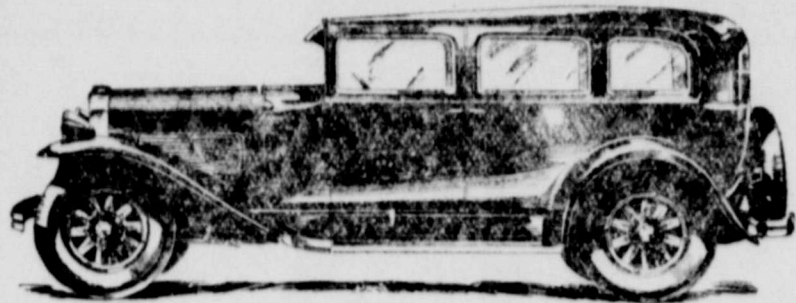

2 Youths Indicted; Bond Set at \$2000

Bill Winans and Archie Reese were lodged in the county jail Friday, having been indicted by the grand jury and are charged with assault and attempt to rape. Bond having been set at \$2000 each, and this had not been made Saturday.

It was stated that the young lady had been to the postoffice at Hatchel, and while returning home was overtaken by the boys about one mile north of Hatchel and, the young men stopped and invited her to ride. She declined the offer for a lift, but it was stated that she was forced to ride with the boys. The four rode in the car together until they came to a lane that led to the girl's house a short distance south of Winters, and the young lady asked to be let out of the car, but that her request was refused and that she was taken on north of Winters about one and one-half miles, to a pasture on Bluff Creek, where it is alleged the assault was made upon her.

George Ray, who was a former Taipa citizen, who now resides at Shep, in Taylor county, was on his way to Winters, and found the girl in the road without shoes and hat and her clothing torn. He rushed her to Winters and notified the parents. The girl in her statement to Winters officers, on the day of the alleged offense, stated that J. Winans had nothing to do with the attack and no charge was filed against him. The two boys were arrested at about 5 o'clock in the afternoon of the day the offense is alleged to have been committed. The girl was unable to appear as a witness against the youths for several days after the alleged attack.

The case is scheduled to come up for trial during the fourth week of the present term of district court.

Cemetery Ass'n. In Annual Meet

At the meeting of the stockholders of the Ballinger Cemetery Association, Inc., only a few interested parties attended and the old board was re-elected to serve for another year, with the addition of John W. Bigby, who was appointed to succeed C. R. Crews, deceased.

The business side of the association was discussed and it was agreed that the \$100 assessment plan was the most important and far-reaching move that had ever been taken for the interests of the owners. By this plan a lot owner pays into the treasury in cash \$100 and this is held in trust and draws annual interest to equal the \$5 fixed tax. This will enable a person to buy a lot and by the payment of the \$100 have it cared for, the streets and sidewalks worked around the lot, exempt him from further taxation and receive the benefit for all time to come. By this plan it is pointed out that instead of paying out \$5 each year that you never pay another cent, that you receive the same benefit that you do when you pay your city taxes on a city lot with added conveniences. The \$100 gives a lot owner perpetual upkeep and continued benefit.

Committees were appointed for the various duties pertaining to the operation of the business and continued improvement of the cemetery and each appointment was accepted without complaint.

In a very few months or just as soon as the weather is settled and favorable a great many improvements will be made at the cemetery, included in which is the laying of the streets in the newly added plot to the ever growing city, trees and shrubs are to be set out, and other improvements made. It was also pointed out that water pipes had been extended so that each lot had water available in close proximity.
