Clark M. Mullican, Judge of the 99th District Court, was elected to the presidency of the Lubbock Kiwanis club, for the ensuing year, at an election of officers held today noon at the Hotel Lubbock. Other officers selected, with 10 directors, are as follows:

HOOVER SIGNS PROCLAMATION

PRESIDENTIAL DECREE MAKES MONDAY A HOLIDAY

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—In order that the people of the United States may recall "the high purposes for which this nation entered the world war," President Hoover issued a proclamation today naming Monday, November 11 as Armistice Day.

The president also said it was fitting that on this day the nation should recall its obligations to the dead to apply itself to measures to "prevent repetition of such deceptions of humanity" as in the world war.

COLLEGIATE CARS ARE REPLACED

The "collegiate" wreck is as passé today at Texas Technological college as Oxford bags or a view from the towers of the Administration building. This conclusion was reached after a survey of motor cars parked on the college campus.

Robot Pilots Plane Safely

Mechanical Pilot Operates Ford Ship On Long Air Journey

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—Army aviators were enthusiastic today over the demonstrated efficiency of a newly developed robot pilot which keeps a plane flying straight and true to its course with no attention from the pilot at the controls.

It consists of two gyroscopes, one vertical and one horizontal, which maintain a constant position and by automatic electrical contacts bring the ship back to level flight and point it again on its course when disturbed by the wind, passing gusts, or downward air currents.

The whole device fits into a box, small enough to be placed under the pilot's seat, and weighs about fifty pounds. The electrical power necessary for its operation is derived from a wind driven generator.

The new robot was given an exhaustive test yesterday in a tri-motored Ford plane flying from Cleveland to this city.

JURY ACQUITS HAMILTON FOR DEATH OF LAD

AMARILLO LAWYER TO CONTINUE TO LIVE IN PANHANDLE

(By Associated Press)
WEATHERFORD, Nov. 7.—Judge R. H. Hamilton, acquitted by a jury here last night of slaying his son-in-law, Tom Walton, Jr., left Weatherford this morning with his family for his home in Amarillo.

The attorney said he would continue to reside in the Panhandle city and keep his connection with his law firm.

Weatherford, which for the past 10 days had been crowded with witnesses and attorneys connected with the trial, today took on a normal appearance once again. A case scheduled for today was postponed yesterday when it looked as if the Hamilton case would not be completed until this morning.

"CONSCIENCE CLEAR," HAMILTON AVERS

WEATHERFORD, Nov. 7.—Judge R. H. Hamilton, former member of the State Supreme Court Commission of Appeals, was free today, a jury having decided he acted in self-defense when his son-in-law, Tom Walton, Jr., the bridegroom in a secret marriage, was shot and killed in Hamilton's Amarillo law office last May.

The jury, after listening to seven days of testimony and eight hours of argument, required only one hour and 46 minutes and three ballots to acquit the jurist and lawyer. Four

IRE FARMERS 'SHOOT IT OUT'

TWO KILLED. TWO ARE WOUNDED IN FRAY IN MISSISSIPPI

(By Associated Press)
YAZOO CITY, Nov. 7.—Two brothers were dead today of gunshot wounds, and their father and a fourth man were wounded as a result of an altercation last night on the C. B. Box plantation near midnight.

George Eldridge, 31, was killed instantly, and his brother, Boyle Eldridge, 23, was fatally wounded when the pair with their father, James Eldridge, 30, manager of the plantation, clashed with J. J. Shelton, 30, manager of the plantation.

Argued Over Laborers

Though officials of Humphreys county had little information on the killings, it was reported the men all farmers, had argued over Mexican laborers.

Tom Eldridge father of the men received wounds in the arm and legs and was not in a serious condition. Shelton, rushed to a hospital, received a gunshot wound. His condition was not known here.

SNOW BLANKET IS LAID OVER WESTERN AREA

(By Associated Press)
KANSAS CITY, Nov. 7.—A blanket of white was spread over a wide area of the west today with the wheat lands of northwest Kansas receiving as much as two and one-half feet of snow overnight, the heaviest fall in years for this season.

Snow was reported falling this morning in eastern Colorado and western Nebraska as well as in western Kansas. The snow storm extended over Wyoming, Montana, and the Dakotas, the weather bureau reported.

Temperatures east of the Rocky mountains generally were lower, with freezing weather to the north of Kansas. The mercury was reported down to 10 degrees in western Kansas.

In western Kansas the ground was covered with from six inches to two and one-half feet of snow. Heaviest precipitation was reported in the vicinity of Goodland, where automobile traffic was seriously hampered. There was little wind, however, and the snow had not drifted.

ROBBERS LOOT POINT, TEXAS

POSTOFFICE AND A LI STORES ENTERED BY BANDIT GANG

GREENVILLE, Nov. 7.—With the exception of the bank, all major business places of Point, 19 miles southeast of Greenville, were entered last night by burglars who escaped with a considerable amount of loot.

The greatest haul was obtained from the postoffice, where the intruders carried away the safe containing \$194. The burglaries were discovered by the driver of a bakery truck. The postoffice safe was found near Emery.

Other Stores Entered

Other places entered were the B. B. Rabb store, the C. B. Rabb hardware store, the People's Pharmacy, the B. B. Davis store and the McMillan and Young store.

In most cases, the burglars satisfied themselves by taking what money was in the cash drawers and some merchandise.

COMMUNITY CHEST DRIVE PLANS MADE PUBLIC HERE BY CAMPAIGN'S LEADER

John L. Irwin, campaign director of the American City Bureau, outlined plans for the community chest drive to be inaugurated soon in this city and discussed policies of the campaign at a meeting last night of the officers and directors of the Lubbock Community Chest.

"Three divisions of the campaign are yet to be made up," said Mr. Irwin. "A general chairman must be selected, and that will be followed by organization of the preparatory division and the immediate campaign division."

Principles Listed
Fourteen principles governing the Lubbock Community Chest were adopted. These included: The funds raised in this campaign are for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 1929, and ending September 30, 1930; primarily, solicitations shall be at the place of employment; The executive in charge of all companies employing ten or more persons shall be requested to organize their soliciting and collecting media; The Lubbock community chest asks that no coercion be used in securing pledges from employees; A corporation gift shall not be construed to include the subscription of its officers, executives or stockholders; Subscriptions shall be payable in cash monthly or quarterly installments beginning December 1, 1929; The plan of solicitation will be on the block system; That is, each captain will be assigned a definite territory and it will be the responsibility of his or her team to secure

SENATE COALITION OF INDEPENDENTS AND DEMOCRATS HITS MANGANESE TAX

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—The senate coalition of democrats and independent western republicans today stood squarely opposed to the wishes of the powerful American steel industry and threw itself determinedly into an effort to impose an import duty on manganese ore.

Using manganese as an important hardening alloy, the steel men wanted it restored, after seven years, to the free list and had the support of the senate finance committee and the administration group. The manganese miners, on the other hand, were anxious for tariff protection and were given the backing of the coalition.

Coalition Is Strong
Most recent exhibition of the coalition's strength came late yesterday when a vote on the first major industrial rate schedule to be reached, that of fixing the duty on pig iron, by a wide majority, the coalition was successful in fixing the rate 75 cents a ton, a figure just half that proposed by the administration group and 27 1/2 cents less than the present duty. The vote was 48 to 30.

The manganese schedule has become one of the most controversial in the bill. At present the rate is one cent per pound, a duty approved for continuation by the house and at first by the senate committee. The latter reconsidered, however, voted again on the schedule and recommended that it be restored to the free list, from which it was lifted seven years ago by the Fordney-McCumber bill.

Might Be Reduced
The present law and the house proposal affect ore with a manganese content of 30 per cent or more. There was talk that in addition to urging a continuation of the duty

the coalition proposed to reduce the undutiable maximum from 90 to 10 per cent.

The circumstances under which the committee reversed its stand on this item came under the fire of the coalition, too, and furnished one of the major controversies producing points of the debate.

Action on the pig iron paragraphs yesterday provoked a sharp exchange between Reed of Pennsylvania, leader of the administration group, and Norris of Nebraska, spokesman of the independents. The former said the vote could only serve to uphold his contention the tariff bill was dead and the house could never agree to the wholesale charges which the coalition was making. Norris replied the Pennsylvanian had come "periously near to violating the rules of the senate" and had gone beyond the bounds of "ordinary sportsmanship."

An effort to limit debate on the metals schedule by unanimous consent was defeated through the objection of several senators who wished to speak at length on the manganese duty.

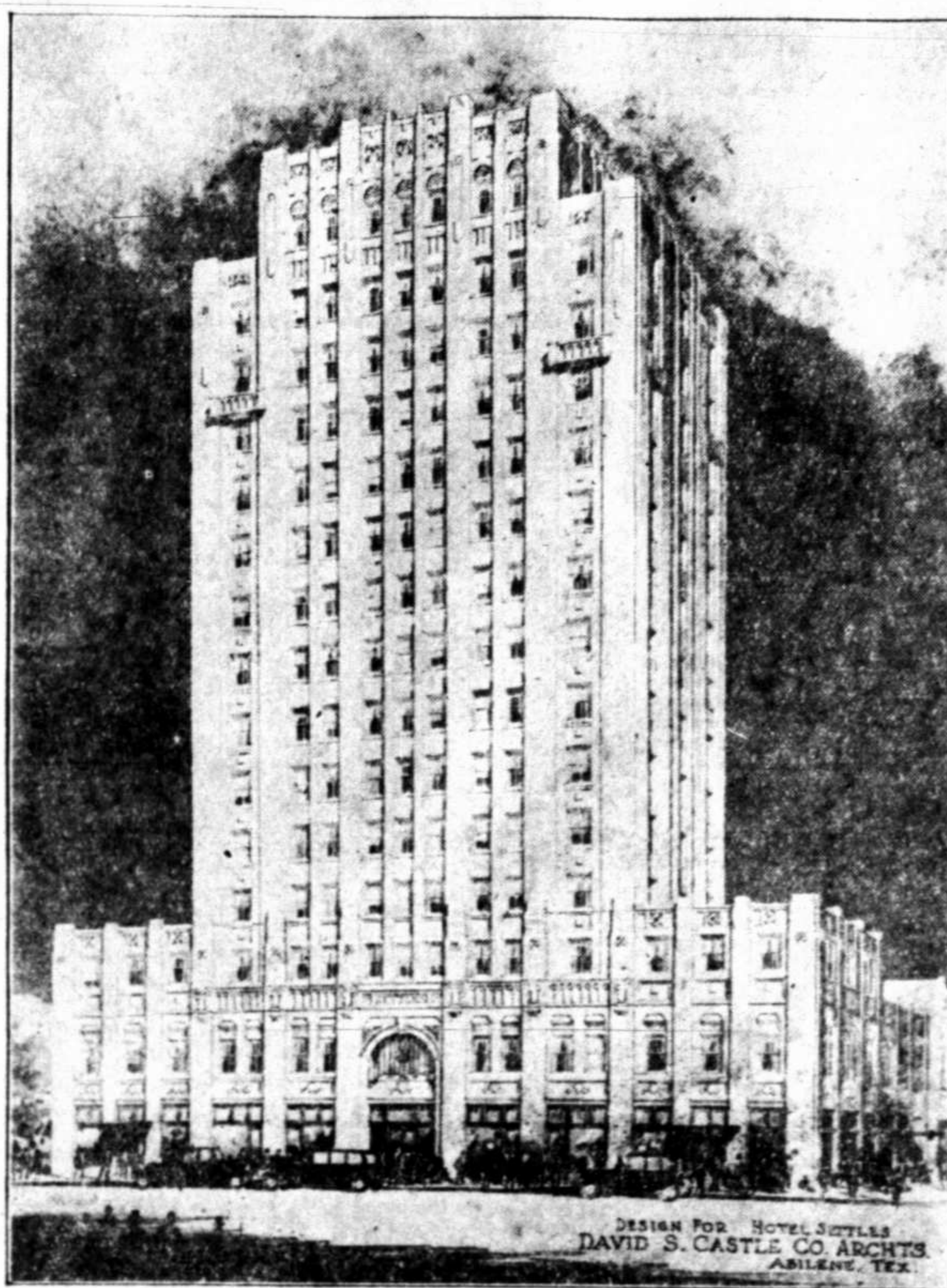

Body Of Stain Man Found In Oklahoma

GUYMON, Okla., Nov. 7 (AP).—Found lying beneath a bridge on a highway nearly seven miles north-west of here today, the body of a murdered man is held here while authorities attempt to identify him.

BRAZOS RIVER BODY SESSIONS

W. A. MYRICK CHOSEN
VICE-PRESIDENT IN
AUSTIN MEET

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Nov. 7.—Directors of the Brazos River Conservation and Reclamation district effected an organization and laid plans for financing their work at their first meeting here yesterday.

Representative Leonard Tillotson, of Sealy, was named general manager. L. Mims of Freeport was chosen president of the board of directors. W. A. Myrick, Lubbock, vice-president, and G. G. Chance, of Bryan, secretary.

In addition to the officers, C. M. Caldwell of Abilene, P. L. Downs of Temple, F. E. Harrell of Cisco, L. E. Seaman of Mineral Wells, John M. Lawrence of Bryan, Ward Templeman of Navasota, and G. D. Ulrich of Sugarland, were chosen members of the executive committee.

Divide Counties
The directors divided the counties along the watershed of the Brazos into zones in accordance with the benefits they would derive from di-

version and flood control and decided to ask each of the county commissioners' courts for money needed in the immediate future.

The amounts ranged from \$100 to \$500 and about \$19,000 would be raised.

In addition the directors decided to ask the Legislature for an appropriation of at least \$25,000 at the special session in January and the request authority to levy a district tax not to exceed 12 mills on the \$100, to carry on the work.

Is Big Job
The stupendous water control, diversion and utilization project affects sixty counties, about one-sixth of the state's area. The district was created by the 41st Legislature and the board of directors was appointed by the governor.

The directors selected Austin as their headquarters but decided to hold their next meeting February 3, at Waco.

Flying Invalid Is Worse After Jaunt
STRATFORD, Tex., Nov. 7 (AP).—Brought to the home of her son here yesterday in an airplane ambulance from from Albuquerque after suffering a stroke of paralysis, Mrs. Mary Craft last night was in a critical condition.

Physicians advised that Mrs. Craft must be taken to lower altitude at once or lose her life. The airplane, which left Albuquerque at 9:15 a. m., arrived here at 1:30 p. m.

HOOVER FORGOT TO INVITE SENATOR JOHNSON

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—President Hoover sent a letter to Senator Johnson of California yesterday saying that "an accident" had caused the senator's name to be omitted from the list of guests to the White House dinner Tuesday night in honor of Ambassador Davies.

Mr. Hoover wrote that directions had been given Monday to send invitations to all members of the Foreign Relations committee but that "an inadvertence occurred somewhere" which accounted for omission of one to Senator Johnson.

Statement Issued
Senator Johnson issued the following statement after the letter had been made public at the White House:

"Under no circumstances would I have commented upon or discussed the incident. In the present situation, of course, it is wholly ended."

The text of the letter follows: "My Dear Mr. Senator: I was greatly distressed to learn from the press last night that you did not receive an invitation to the dinner given at the White House for Ambassadors Davies and Guggenheim, to which the members of the

Foreign Relations committee who were in the city or available, were invited. Directions to send out the invitations were given on Monday, and in the hurried telephoning to senators and settlement of other details, an inadvertence occurred somewhere.

"Hoover Is Pained"
"I am most deeply pained that such an accident should have happened, with such an apparent lack of courtesy, and I hope you will accept my assurances that it was due entirely to a mistake which is most deeply regretted by all of us."

Mexico In New Row Over Church Rights

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 7 (AP).—The department of the interior has been asked to intervene in a controversy in San Andres Tuxtla, Vera Cruz, brought about by the refusal of the mayor to allow Monsenor Jenaro Mendez De Rio, Bishop of Tehuantepec, to officiate there.

The mayor bases his action on a law passed by a former governor which limits the number of priests

allowed to officiate in the state, while the bishop contends that the limitation upheld by the mayor has been nullified by modifications of the law.

COTTON PROGRAM UP

BIG SPRING, Nov. 7.—As a result of a meeting held here Saturday and business met and decided to standardize on cotton seed to be planted next season, the committee appointed to select the kind of seed to be planted decided on Moberg

seed in a meeting held here yesterday. It is the opinion of the farmers that this program of cotton seed standardization will prove of far-reaching benefit to agriculture and business over the entire region.

SHOUTING, SINGING MASS OF RUSSIAN REDS CELEBRATES BIRTHDAY OF NATION

BY JAMES A. MILLS

MOSCOW, U. S. S. R., Nov. 7 (AP)—Communist Russia today observed in traditional revolutionary fashion the twelfth anniversary of the 1917 upheaval which ushered Bolshevism into the world and destroyed the ancient Russian government.

To bring the event closer to the hearts, if not to the stomachs, of the people, the government gave bread and meat at cost price to every member of the population holding bread cards.

Red Is Predominant
With the aid of millions of yards of red bunting, huge flaming placards, symbolic wooden floats, numerous speakers' stands and large portraits of Lenin, Marx and Stalin historic red square was transformed into a mighty theatrical stage for the passing of a twelve-mile long military and civilian parade led by the commander of the Moscow garrison.

Favored by perfect weather, this singing, shouting mass of humanity, carrying banners, flaming flags and chanting the Internationale marched through the gate of resurrection where formerly stood the famous chapel of the Siberian virgin. Over the portals of the gates today appeared a gigantic red anti-religious placard reading: "Down with the deceit of Popes! Give us books instead of religion!"

Forward to Victory
Over the slender steeples and towers of the Kremlin fluttered huge red flags which, illuminated by a brilliant noonday sun, had the appearance of flaming sheets of fire. Within the shadow of Lenin's now empty wooden tomb to the wind reading: "Proletarians of the world! Stand under the banner of the Communist International! Forward

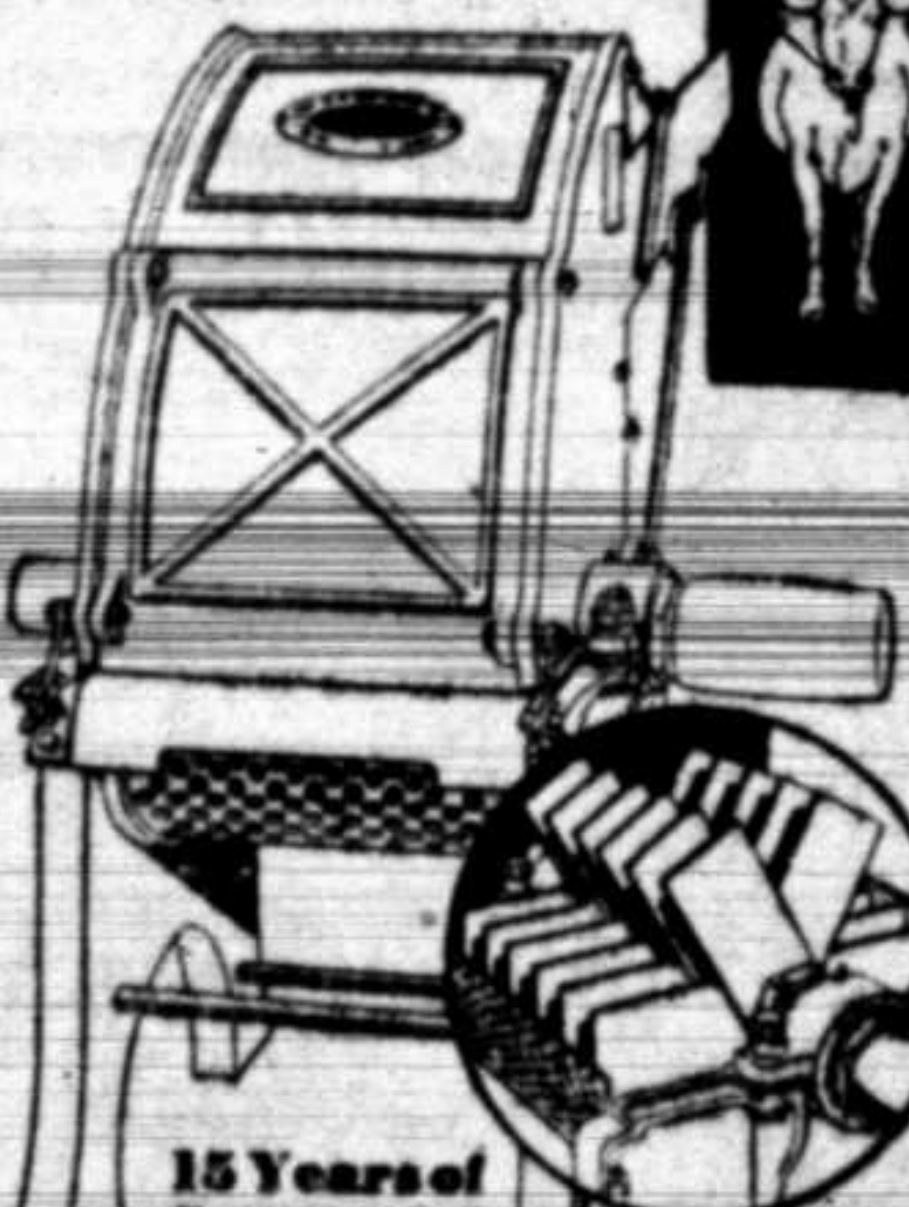

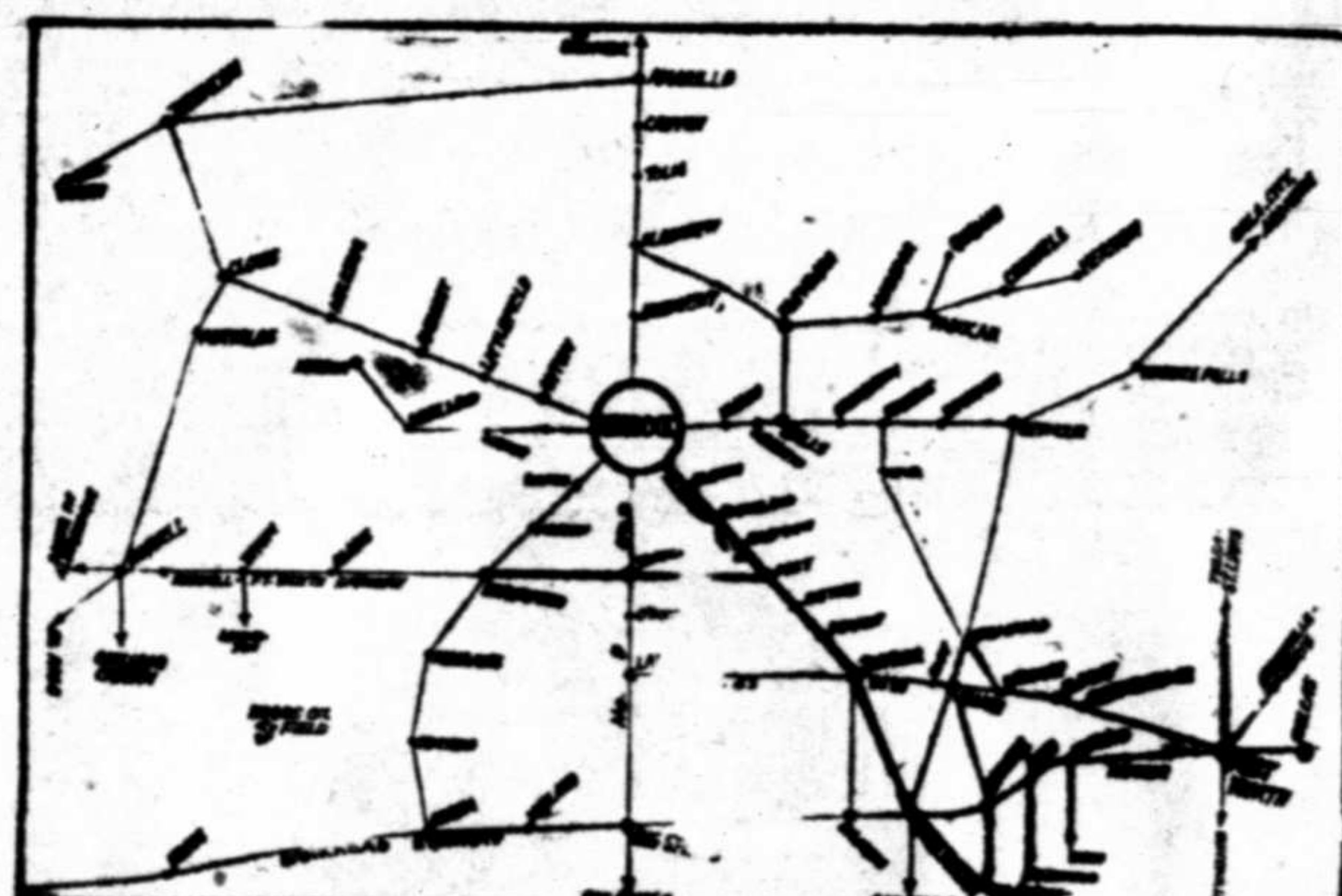

Neither of the Idalou petitions has been presented to the court.

HAMILTON, ACQUITTED OF MURDER OF SON-IN-LAW, GOES BACK TO AMARILLO

Jurors voted for conviction on the first and one on the second ballot.

Hamilton Asleep
The defendant was asleep in his hotel room when the verdict was read, according to his brother, Dexter Hamilton, who with the judge's son, Robert H. Hamilton, Jr., University of Minnesota student, thanked the jury.

He crossed quickly, however, when his son and brother rushed to the hotel and came to the lobby to meet his friends. Theresa, his 18-year-old daughter, whose secret marriage to Walton while the two attended the University of Texas was indirectly responsible for the shooting, threw her arms around his neck.

"Oh daddy," was all she could say, and she fell back to watch others congratulate him.

"Conscience Is Clear"
"My conscience was clear," Hamilton said to the only newspaper man who broke through the cordon of friends which surrounded him and said, "that gives you a clear conscience."

"Certainly it does. Certainly it does," Hamilton replied. "My conscience was clear." He added the

information, "I'm going home tomorrow."

The state in the trial sought to show that Hamilton, knowing or suspecting his daughter had married Walton, whose home was in Amarillo, deliberately shot the young man when Walton came to his office to make a clean breast of the affair.

"A Kindly Man"
The defense pictured Hamilton as a kindly father, aware of Walton's intentions toward his daughter and willing to bless the couple, once he was satisfied of Walton's desirability as a husband.

Defense testimony painted the young man in a kinder light, however, a number of witnesses testifying Walton had uttered dark threats against Hamilton, who, he felt, disapproved of him and hindered him in his efforts to see Theresa. One witness testified Walton had boasted a past as a Capone gangster and said he was more dangerous than a snake.

Several witnesses testified they had heard Walton threaten to kill Hamilton.

Self-Defense Plea
Hamilton himself, from the stand, testified these threats had come to

him through others and he had prepared to defend himself. When Walton entered his office on the fatal day, he said, the young man made a motion as if to draw a gun and he reached for his own weapon.

The defendant did not shoot, but said they had engaged in a mortal combat for the gun. Walton was shot four times and died on the floor of Hamilton's office a moment later.

Mrs. Walton, Judge Hamilton's wife, mother of the slain bride and Peter P., the son, were present during the trial. Theresa, widow of the slain man, did not testify.

Three Roswell Men
Shot During Affray
ROSSELL, N. M., Nov. 7 (AP)—Chief of Police T. U. Alford, Fire Chief Rue Christman and Garvie L. Womble were recovering today from bullet wounds. Two other chiefs were shot by Womble's yesterday morning when they answered a call for help from Mrs. Womble. After shooting the officers, as they walked upon his porch, Womble then tried to commit suicide. Mr. and Mrs. Womble had been quarreling.

Chief Alford and Womble are the most seriously wounded.
