One Dead, Six Injured In Highway Crash Last Night

JAMES BALDWIN EXPIRES HERE UPON ARRIVAL

Man is 21-year Old CCC enrollee From Anna, Texas; In Collision

Other Injuries Feared

Ford Coupe and 1934 Plymouth Sedan Are Involved In This Week

Three victims of the head-on collision at Twichell Wednesday night were found to have internal injuries, according to a statement Sunday morning by Mrs. Flora Halsey, supervisor of the Perryton hospital.

LeRoy Halsey of Perryton, O. H. and Ernest Rutledge of Booker are the only wreck victims who were retained in the hospital Thursday. All three were injured internally.

Examination of X-ray photographs late Wednesday night revealed that Rutledge's pelvic bone was fractured but his only head injuries were lacerations of the scalp.

Ernest Bass, the CCC enrollee who was riding with James R. Baldwin, CCC enrollee who died last night, was reported to be "doing well" at the camp Thursday morning after a lacerated shoulder and scratches on his forearm his only injuries.

Ernest and that his pelvic bone was broken. Bob Crocker received scratches on his wrist, head and neck. Jack Spalding's back was bruised. O. J. Hill had back and neck injuries.

The boys were riding toward Booker in a coupe, while the five others were coming toward Perryton in a sedan.

According to Spalding, the Sedan was traveling at a speed of 35 or 40 miles per hour on the right-of-way when the Booker boys spied a car without lights approaching.

Spalding said, "The coupe suddenly turned in the same direction, and the two cars collided head-on at a slight angle, Spalding said."

Building Program Underway To Relieve House Shortage

Work was started this week on two modern residences by W. B. LaMaster. These two new homes located at 701 and 707 Southwest Fourth St. will each have five rooms and bath. They will be of frame construction, exterior of stucco with Masonite interiors. Mr. LaMaster says that the houses will be rushed to completion and will be for rent when ready for occupancy.

Mr. LaMaster is building these two rent houses as a contribution to the acute housing situation that now exists in Perryton. He does not care to own residential real property from an investment angle but he realizes that the growth of Perryton is seriously handicapped through the inability of dozens of families to find rent homes in Perryton. Perryton needs more men with the vision and public spiritedness of Mr. LaMaster to build rent homes. Perryton is now faced with the most acute housing shortage that has ever existed since the town started. There are dozens of families who want to move to Perryton. They are clamoring for suitable unfurnished homes, for furnished apartments. Even sleeping rooms are at a premium.

There are a number of smaller homes being moved into town and put in livable condition and several small homes are under construction. Real interviews with contractors, real estate men and building material dealers indicate that at least 12 or 15 new modern homes will be started in Perryton within the next few weeks. All of these new homes will not be for rent; some of being built for the owner's use, but every new owner's home means the release of a home for rental. At a conservative estimate, at least thirty new modern homes are needed in Perryton to take care of present day needs.

FARMERS ARE FEEDING OUT ON VOLUNTEER

Livestock in County Materialy Boosted By Arrival of Herds For Fall Feeding

Others To Buy Later

Owners Will Lay Silage As A Protective Measure Against Wheat Pasture Failure

With the purchase of almost 2,000 ewes and lambs by Ochiltree county farmers this week indications point to a possible restoration of depleted livestock herds prevalent throughout this county.

J. S. Slaughter, Curtis Roach and Eton Lawrence returned Sunday afternoon from San Angelo and vicinity where they purchased 1489 head of ewes and lambs between them to feed out. Amos Schuster and E. W. Thomas returned Sunday from near San Angelo where Schuster bought 451 lambs weighing approximately 50 pounds each.

Mr. Schuster unloaded his livestock on a wheat pasture in the east part of the county for grazing on volunteer wheat.

J. S. Slaughter received 400 ewes and lambs from Sonora Tuesday and will feed them on sodan pasture, later finishing out on volunteer wheat.

Eton Lawrence received a shipment of 180 dry ewes from Sonora the forepart of the week.

Curtis Roach will receive Thursday or Friday a shipment of 450 lambs and a like amount of ewes from Sterling City.

Slaughter, Roach and Schuster all expect to put down silage to be used in finishing the lambs in case wheat pasture fails.

Carl Ellis is grazing 1,200 heavy lambs on stubblefield south of Perryton.

A number of other farmers and stockmen are expected to purchase and feed out lambs later in the season.

SCS PROJECT HEADS MEET HERE MONDAY

All Projects in Perryton Area to be Represented at Conference

PARKER IS HEAD

Soil Conservationists and Project Managers from all work units in the Texas and Oklahoma Panhandles served by the Perryton area office of the Soil Conservation Service will meet in this city on Monday for a two day conference under the direction of George M. Parker, Area Conservationist.

About forty men will attend the conference which has been called for the purpose of setting up details and working out problems in connection with the operation of the program under the direction of the recently opened Perryton area office.

Units under supervision of the Perryton office are the demonstration projects at Guymon, Okla., and at Stratford, Dalhart, and Channing, Texas; the CCC demonstration camp at Perryton; water conservation projects on Rita Blanca, Boggy and Wolf creeks; the Tri-State land utilization project in Dallam County; water facilities development on the Rita Blanca and Coldwater and Palo Duro creeks; and on the North Canadian River in Oklahoma; and cooperative work with wind erosion districts in Dallam, Hamford, Ochiltree, Lipscomb, Hartley and Moore counties.

New Texas Law Prosecutes Writers Of "Hot" Checks

The state of Texas, at last, has passed a law which makes it unlawful for any one to give a "hot" check. This law, passed at the last session of the Texas legislature, provides for the prosecution and conviction of persons giving bad checks. The offense is a felony. The following is a summary of this new "hot" check law:

H. B. No. 190 which repeals Section 4, Article 1546 Penal Code of 1925, makes it unlawful for any person, with intent to defraud, to obtain any money, goods, service, labor or other things of value, by giving or drawing any check, draft or order when such person does not have sufficient funds with the drawee to pay the instrument and all other outstanding instruments at the time it was given. Section 2 extends the above provisions to cover the payment for goods and services therefor received. Section 3 makes it unlawful for a person to secure or retain possession of any personal property to which a lien has attached by the giving or drawing of such an instrument. In all cases, the non-payment of the instrument upon presentation is prima facie evidence that the person gave or drew it with intent to defraud.

The following chart shows the penalties prescribed for the violation of any of the above provisions of H. B. 190, according to the amount of which the instrument was drawn and the number of times the offender has been convicted of this same offense.

First Conviction: Less than \$5—Confinement in county jail not exceeding two years or fine not exceeding \$200; \$5 to \$50—Confinement in county jail not exceeding 2 years or fine not exceeding \$500; \$50 and over—Confinement in the penitentiary not less than 2 nor more than 10 years.

Second conviction for same offense: Confinement in county jail

FHA HOME LOAN INTEREST CUT

INTEREST RATE ON FHA HOME LOANS IS REDUCED FROM FIVE TO FOUR AND ONE-HALF RATE

Families planning to borrow money for new homes on government-insured mortgages will get a lower interest rate beginning this week.

Officials in Washington announced this week the maximum rate on FHA-insured mortgages for small homes would be cut from 5 per cent to 4½ per cent, and that the maximum rate on large-scale rental projects would be reduced from 4½ to 4 per cent. It does not apply to mortgages already insured.

Stewart McDonald, housing administrator, said the new rates would extend to the public "the benefits of generally lower interest rates now prevailing in the money market."

Under the new rate, he said, a family could buy a home on terms as low as 10 per cent down and average monthly payments of \$5.81 on each thousand dollars.

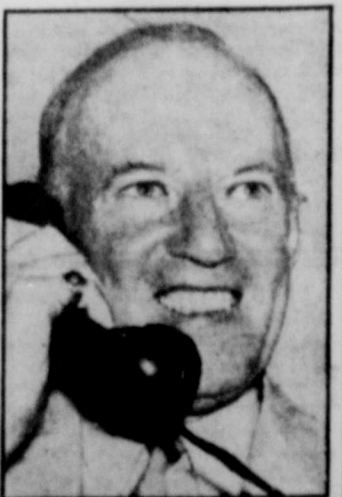

Sudden Death

Fifth in a Series of Articles on Safety by Captain J. C. TAPPE of the Texas Safety Council.

"Drink, drive, and die."

Statistics reveal with startling clearness that two things are the cause of a vast majority of the highway accidents in this State and Nation.

These two things are driving while drinking and excessive speed with faulty equipment.

Leading in the cause of fatal and near-fatal accidents undoubtedly may be listed those who drive while drinking—and this does not mean driving drunk.

Statistics reveal, on the Georgia Safety Commission, for example, is stressing the fact that the driver with two drinks or two bottles of beer is a more dangerous driver than the one who would come under the classification of drunk.

At first thought this might seem an extravagant statement. But have you ever noticed a young man, not

necessarily addicted to alcohol, who becomes a show horse after the second drink? He becomes imbued with self-confidence. He races down the highway looking neither to the right or the left, and sometimes not straight ahead. Result—a fatal accident. The drunken driver, in most cases, realizes his condition. He is likely to drive slowly. If he has an accident it is more probable that it will be a minor one.

The Texas Highway Commission is to be commended for placing this warning sign on the highway. Pierce Brooks, runoff candidate last year for Lieutenant Governor and president of the Texas Safety Council, said: "These signs should have a salutary effect upon the thoughtless driver who thinks a drink or two will not affect his driving. It's a warning sign that should be read and heeded."

Mrs. W. C. Barber Formerly of This City Passed Away July 25 Ill Several Months

Mrs. W. C. Barber of Drexel, Mo., passed away at the St. Margaret's Hospital in Kansas City, Mo., on July 25, at the age of 62 years, 8 months, and 18 days. In 1903 Mr. and Mrs. Barber moved to western Oklahoma where they lived on a prairie claim and in 1904 opened a store in a country community where living was primitive and supplies were freighted long distances by wagon. In 1913 they assumed the rearing of two nephews and a niece, all of whom, with the husband survive.

The Barber family lived in Perryton a number of years and owned and operated the Peoples Supply during their stay here.

Washington Letter

Corn Growers Urged to Store Surpluses for Another Year

WASHINGTON.—Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace and officials of AAA are urging everything they can to persuade the corn farmer to keep his 1937 and 1938 surpluses in storage for another year.

It is proposed that the due date of loans on over 257,000,000 bushels of corn be advanced from August, 1939, to August, 1940, and that the loans be renewed at the present rate of 57 cents on the bushel and continue to draw 4 per cent interest.

Corn belt farmers who want to cash in on their collateral crops are urged to consider what will happen if there is a short crop next year, and what effect their desire for quick returns on their corn will do to the hog market.

THEY are reminded that, if the corn market is flooded this fall, hog producers will raise more hogs and prices for both corn and hogs will drop sharply.

On the basis of past performance, corn crops do not lend themselves to the "ever normal granary" program so dear to the hearts of New Deal agricultural economists. The annual carry-over of corn has averaged only about 7 per cent of a normal crop. The percentage for wheat is much higher, and the average for all other basic crops is as high as 20 to 30 per cent of a normal year's production.

As a consequence, the market price of corn from year to year soars and falls like the chart of a fever patient.

On his own, the corn farmer tries to compensate for having a

short crop and small carryover one year, by increasing his corn acreage the next, hoping that this time the high prices he got for a scant crop will hold.

When prices fall, as they invariably do, he has to sell out, if he can, in order to make enough money to meet the next season's expenses. He isn't used to having a reserve, and it's difficult for the AAA balanced economy planners to induce him to save for the rainy season that will mean a shortage of corn.

Because of the small annual corn carryover, storage facilities are inadequate. The Department of Agriculture recently asked for bids on steel grain bins for the storage of about 50,000,000 bushels of corn. Administrators of the department's corn program hope that if farmers can be sold the idea of storing surplus corn for longer periods, they will be encouraged to build better storage facilities on their own property.

TYING up their argument for the extension of corn loans with the soil conservation program, AAA officials point out that the soil in one corn state has been worked so hard that from one-fourth to three-fourths of the top soil has disappeared from 17 million acres.

If the corn farmers co-operate and let the government seal up their 1937 and 1938 crops for another year, there will be a reserve of about 400 million bushels when the new crop harvest starts.

MISSING PENNIES

The U. S. Mint informs us that 3 billion pennies have been lost since they first started minting them. These misplaced coppers may be in many children's hands, a lot of them here in Perryton. These that have disappeared from circulation may be down a drain or lost in small cracks by hundreds of youngsters. The sales tax on articles have brought forth the lack of these coins, no doubt. Someone suggests that we have new one minted with a hole in the center as do the Chinese. We could string them on ribbons for necklaces.

We recently read where a plate of pennies appeared on the street of a mid-western city. A man had heated the pennies to a red glow and tossed them to children to hear them cry when they touched the hot coins. A judge didn't hesitate to fine this fellow an amusement tax with a jail sentence to cool off the episode. The entire affair turned out to be less amusing than the donor of the pennies expected, and we don't think him for putting pennies back into circulation in this way.

The Atlantic Monthly
For August, 1939)

A long time ago there was no advertising. Every man, with something to sell had to tell people about it personally and individually. This was not a great handicap in those days, for no one had very much to sell.

But as soon as large-scale manufacturing was begun, it was necessary to find a way to tell many people about products, and to tell them quickly and all at one time. To fill this need, advertising naturally developed as a universal business process. Without it, we could not operate large factories making goods for millions of consumers.

Advertising is sometimes spoken of as a special kind of business, as a separate industry supported by other lines of business. It is no such thing at all. Advertising is simply a part of the process of selling the products of every industry. It does the important job of telling people about merchandise and where to buy.

It is not enough to make goods and to transport them to places where consumers can buy them. The public must be told about the goods—how desirable they are, how people can make themselves more comfortable, more healthy, or more happy through buying them. In other words, the merchandise must be sold, not merely placed on sale. Advertising does a large part of this selling, and there is no other method that can take its place.

Since the days when there was no advertising, the quantity of goods produced has been multiplied by many, many times. Consequently, each consumer's share is vastly increased. The wealth created in making the goods is distributed to consumers through payments for wages, materials and dividends, and thus they are able to buy the greater volume of goods produced.

But merely being able to buy does not make people buy. Salesmen and advertising must be kept on the job all the time, to keep merchandise moving from factory to consumer, or the wheel will soon stop turning. The work of selling is just as important as the work of transporting. And advertising is the only way by which the large volume of goods now being produced can be sold.

In performing its selling work, advertising shows us the way to better living, by creating desires for better things. Through conveniences introduced by advertising, the burdens of housekeeping have been made easier and the family diet has been improved. Babies are healthier and homes are more sanitary because of the educational influence of advertising. Newspapers and magazines are sold for a few cents a copy and radio entertainment is free, because advertisers pay most of the costs of these three great mediums for advertising.

While doing all this useful and valuable work, advertising costs the consumer nothing because it is the most economical form of selling and lowers the cost of distribution. Advertising is the voice of industry, telling us all how to live happier lives and how to make our money go farther.

INTERNATIONAL Sunday School Lesson

Courageous Elijah

The International Uniform Sunday School Lesson for Aug. 6.
Text: I Kings 18:30-39.

WE have seen that King Aza and his son, King Jehoshaphat, were both confronted with widespread corruption in Israel, because of the idolatrous worship in which the people were imitating pagan peoples who surrounded them. As we have indicated, this was not merely a matter of mistaken ideas in religion, but the worship of Baal was associated with licentious practices contrary to the fine ideals of home, family, and social relationships, which were so incultured by the religion of Israel.

We forget perhaps at times the extent to which these ideals of home life and integrity of love relationships are a product of Jewish life and religion. It would be well, in an age when, without idolatrous worship, or with idolatrous worship in other forms, there seems so great danger of society's lapsing into loose and evil practices, if we could revive something of that nobility and purity of life upon which Elijah insisted.

Elijah seems to have stood with the minority in Israel, though he had a great many more followers than he was disposed to believe in his moments of discouragement.

OUR lesson centers around the famous test by fire, in which Elijah had a sign from heaven and put the prophets of Baal to rout. We can neither explain nor comment upon the miraculous aspect of the narrative, but the one thing that does stand out so strongly is the integrity and honor of Elijah in contrast with the trickery and deceit that have always been a part of false religion and of the activity of false prophets.

The ultimate test of the true, as distinguished from the false, is the sincerity and unselfishness

of all true religious faith and action. Elijah was not in any sense a self-seeker, nor had he in mind the establishing of his own power or authority. He began in his test by fire by calling all the people to him.

We must remember that, despite the high teachings, and ideals that emerged, it was a crude and raw age when people were more apt to be influenced by outward demonstrations than by the inner integrity of truth and righteousness. The people were tremendously impressed with the miracle that they saw, and we are told that they fell on their faces and said, "Jehovah, he is God; Jehovah, he is God."

How genuine was this demonstration and its repentance we cannot tell, but Elijah's triumph as the prophet of the living God was complete. That is, it was complete except for Elijah himself.

AS has so often happened in the world, we find the man of courage, despondent and weakening after he has fulfilled his purpose. He cries out to God in a voice of despair even in his hour of victory, complaining that all Israel has become recreant and that he only is left among the faithful. The divine voice had to remind him that 7000 had not bowed the knee to Baal, which after all was a considerable company in support of the prophet.

It is in accord with human experience that the hour of deep discouragement often follows the time of greatest triumph. Perhaps it is due to the fact that even a good man succumbs to the physical strain, and that the demon of doubt or of discouragement attacks him when he has the least strength to resist. But Elijah stands, none the less, as a great figure of faith and of courage. We think of him in his hour of faith and victory, rather than in his mood of unwarranted isolation. He was only one among the faithful.

MEMPHIS MAN RECLAIMS FARM BY EROSION CONTROL PROGRAM

Memphis, Texas.—When John D. Reed bought a 100 acre farm near Lakeview about 12 miles of Memphis in 1930, residents of the community were astonished. Everyone, they said, knew that the farm was washed away that it wouldn't produce enough to pay for the cost of the seed—that it was worthless. But John Reed thought he knew what he was doing—he studied the worn-out farm and had a plan which he intended to carry out.

Today, John Reed's farm is one of the best in this part of the country. Fertility of the soil is increasing each year and crop yields are growing in proportion. From his modern home, equipped with all conveniences—electricity, gas, refrigeration—Reed can look out upon fields which belie the fact that the topsoil practically had been washed away nine years ago. Reed has rebuilt a farm.

It was no simple task that Reed undertook, however, when he came into possession of the 100 acres in 1930. The farm is in the natural drainage of about eight sections of land. Flood water, rushing down the unprotected slopes had washed away most of the topsoil. Gullies from six to eight feet deep were eating through the center of the farm. Reed set out to check this severe erosion and to rebuild the fertility of the land.

With the aid of the county agent he constructed nearly five miles of terraces designed to retain the maximum amount of flood water and silt coming down the drainage-way. Next, he set about filling in the gullies. Wire check dams were constructed in the larger gullies, and then anything that might aid in filling in the ditches was dumped in—old worn-out farm equipment, rocks, barnyard residue, trash and hundreds of loads of cotton burs obtained from nearby gins. In one deep gully near the lower field border an old section harrow was placed on end in the bottom of the ditch and covered with hog wire.

Reed soon began to get results. As flood water, heavily laden with silt swept down from above with each heavy rain, rushed upon Reed's farm, the terraces spread the water over the farm. Check dams and other obstructions placed in gullies served to catch and hold a vast amount of silt. Breaks often occurred in the terraces because of the large amount of water they were called upon to handle, but Reed, immediately repaired the damage to the structures.

The system has worked well. The six and eight-foot gullies now have silted in until they are difficult to locate. Several feet of topsoil has been added to many spots of the farm. Where it was out of the question to think of crossing gullies with farming equipment nine years ago, Reed now is able to farm across the entire field. At the same time Reed has been building up his own farm by checking the rush of water which was cutting gullies on the adjacent land.

By holding more water on his land, trapping topsoil in the form of silt, and returning soil-binding crop residues to the soil, Reed has

steadily increased the productivity of his farm.

"During the first few years my cotton would not grow over a foot high, but now it reaches a height of two-and-a-half feet," Reed says. In 1937, he produced four tons of sorghum on 28 acres, while in 1938 he harvested 14 tons from 30 acres. Forty acres yielded 10 bales of cotton in 1937 while 37 acres produced 12½ bales last year. Only 1,400 bundles of cane were harvested from 10 acres in 1937, while 14 acres yielded 3,000 bundles in 1938.

Despite his success in restoring the fertility of his farm, Reed was not satisfied. This year he has sought the aid of the Soil Conservation Service CCC camp at Memphis in establishing a complete erosion control program on his farm.

Terraces have been increased in height and width in order to guard against breaks in the future. The back side of each terrace is being broadcast or drilled to Sudan grass or sorghum to give strength to the structures and to provide supplemental feed. Border strips of Sudan and sorghum are planted around the field to provide protection against erosion hazards. A flexible system of strip cropping and crop rotation of cotton, sorghum and Sudan has been worked out where, by cotton, which does not resist erosion, will not be grown in the same strip in successive years. Grazing of stubble is being restricted while a trench silo is used for storing feed residue.

Reed estimates that his crop yields have been increased by a minimum of 25 per cent on all of his land and that yields have been doubled on some portions, and at the same time he has built a practically worthless farm into a highly productive unit.

A provision in the AAA Farm Program permits sweet sorghum grown on retired acreage to be made into silage and this provision is expected to result in a large increase in the number of silos dug and filled this year.

A trench silo demonstration will be held in the county on Thursday August 24. E. R. Rindley, dairy specialist of the Extension Service will assist. The location for the demonstration has not been decided upon, but announcements will be made later.

Third offense: Confinement in the penitentiary for not less than 2 nor more than 10 years, regardless of the amount involved in the first two convictions.

Section 6 of the Act provides that any person who has filed a complaint or furnished information resulting in the acceptance of a complaint by a district or county attorney shall be guilty of a misdemeanor if he suggests or requests that the case be dismissed, and upon conviction shall be fined not less than \$100 nor more than \$500.

In all prosecutions under the Act, the issuance of service of process, either in or out of the county where the prosecution is pending, is to have the same effect as though the offense were a felony. Likewise, officers and witnesses are to be compensated in like manner as though the offense were a felony.
