## Contract pending on choice for new city manager

The city council has authorized the city attorney to negotiate a contract with Pete Kempfer for the position of city manager.

Kempfer, a Texas Tech graduate, lives in Paris, Texas. Originally from Wisconsin, Kempfer has lived in Texas for more than 25 years.

He has a background in secondary education, specifically earth sciences and worked for the FBI until 1990. He owned and operated a printing and publishing company in Dallas, Texas for 15 years before selling the company to work in economic development in New Mexico and later Paris, Texas.

Kempfer recently completed his certification in public management through the University of Texas at Arlington.

"I like West Texas," said Kempfer. "I like the climate and the fact that it's a small town. The people out here are another thing to be appreciated. They are the salt of the earth."

Kempfer and his wife of 28 years, Julie, have three children: Amy, a teacher; Trey, who is a law student and Daniel, a sophomore at Texas A & M at Commerce.

## Goat Cook-Off serves up good fun

The mouth-watering aroma of barbeque goat will emanate from Ruddick Park this weekend as the 14<sup>th</sup> annual Boer Goat Cook-off gets underway.

Teams wishing to participate may register at the Colorado City Volunteer Fire Department, 620 E. 11<sup>th</sup> Street. The entry fee for the three-man teams is \$125, with a \$75 non-refundable deposit.

The first 55 teams to register may begin checking in on Friday, October 2 from noon until 7 p.m. Each team will receive 1/2 goat at check-in.

As of Tuesday afternoon, 38

teams had already entered the cook-off.

Contestants, their families or any team member may begin setting up their camps in the park on Friday, October 2, 2009.

First place cook-off winners will receive \$1500 and belt buckles. Second place winners will receive \$500 and third place winners will win \$250.

There will also be a Jackpot cook-off for beans, pork ribs, brisket and dessert, which will be judged in conjunction with the boer goat on Saturday. There is

## Court plans clean up

The county commissioners met to discuss the sale or removal of structures on county owned property at a called meeting on Monday.

Buyer interest in a building on land owned by the county at the corner of 4<sup>th</sup> and Cypress led to the discussion. Since the prior owner of the building had an agreement with the county to remove the building, the court decided to investigate the matter further before taking action.

The court also discussed plans for cleaning up county property by demolishing old buildings or repairing and painting those that

can still be used.

Commissioner Jesse Muñoz expressed concern over the final destination of the demolished materials. Problems with space issues in the landfill, Environmental Protection Agency regulations and transportation costs of hauling the materials to a burn site or dump site were discussed.

The county also discussed removing all the nails from the lumber and running it through a chipper to use as tree mulch.

The commissioners will meet every week until the end of the year.

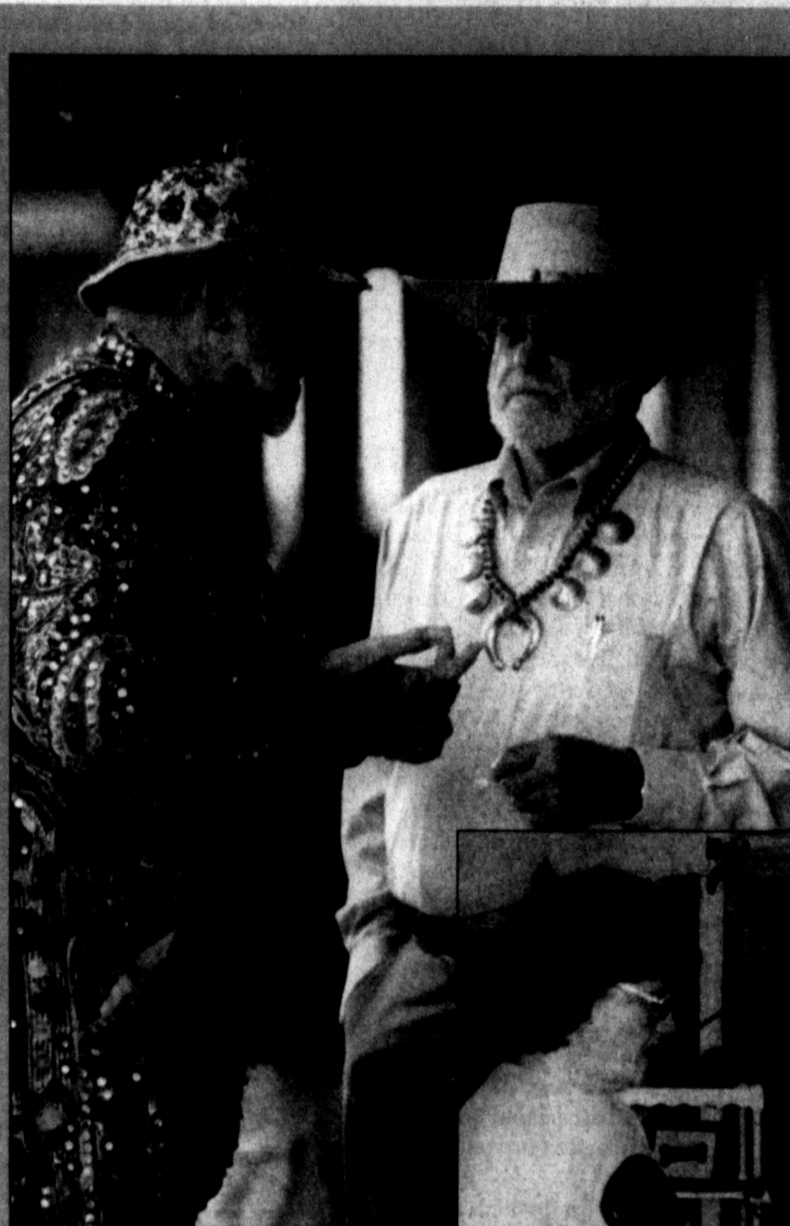
## Housing Authority elects director

## Museum benefit reconnects Colorado City's heart, soul

It felt more like a family reunion as storytellers Jay Boy Adams and Bill Worrell reminisced during the Heart of West Texas Museum benefit last Saturday.

Long-time friends, Adams and Worrell regaled the crowd with tales from their growing up years in Colorado City that continue to influence their music and art.

With feel-good music, down-home poetry and jokes from

bygone days, the duo shared poignant memories of faith, family and friends.

"Bill has no respect for anyone who pulled a practical joke, which is amazing because he pulled some atrocious ones," Adams told the audience.

"I never grew up here, I was just reared here," said Worrell.

The sold-out benefit enjoyed a steak dinner prepared by the Kiwanis Club in a garden setting at

the Heritage House.

"It's so absolutely wonderful to come to this house," said Worrell. "I've been in and out of this house so many times. Colorado City has done so much to preserve history; I'm grateful."

Several pieces of Worrell's primitive Native American artwork decorated tables and railings around the Heritage House. The dinner and concert helped increase the museum's member-

ship, creating a broader base of support for the preservation of Colorado City history.

Many of the songs Adams and Worrell sang were inspired by family and friends from Colorado City. Adams immortalized Vietnam veteran Ruben Martinez in *Shoobox*, while Worrell honored Spade cowboy Bobby Northcutt in a song about riding the range.

The two also shared tall tales of

### Good hygiene essential during flu season

While a new strain of influenza is creating headaches for the medical community, practicing good hygiene can help lessen its severity.

Dee Roach, Mitchell County Hospital head physician and Murray Hall, Family Medical Clinic supervisor spoke to the Lions club Friday about com-

munity preparedness for H1N1, formerly called "swine flu."

"First of all it has nothing to do with pigs," said Roach.

"This is a whole new virus," said Roach. "We have no previous exposure to it, so we don't have any immunity."

The good news is that although there have been H1N1-related

deaths, the strain is a relatively mild one, according to Roach.

Influenza symptoms mimic seasonal flu or colds, making it harder to diagnose. "Symptoms are high grade fever between 103 and 105, a relentless cough and the most horrific body aches you can imagine," said Roach. "If you have that triad of symptoms, they are symptoms of influenza."

Like cold germs, influenza is spread by microdroplet transmission. The microbes are found in water droplets from sneezing, coughing and runny noses.

"It's extremely contagious," Roach said. "Coughing or sneezing into the crook of your arm is still the best," he advised. "Alcohol based hand sanitizers are very effective, but only if you use them."

The virus, which is merely a chain of DNA, cannot survive on its own outside a living cell.

"It is susceptible to routine cleaning and household disinfectants," Roach said. "The most effective solution is 10% chlorox; one part chlorox to 10 parts water. It will kill any virus on the planet."

Protection against the new flu strain involves staying away from it and avoiding people who may have flu-like symptoms. The reason epidemics and world-wide pandemics occur is that people

## Covington still flying after all these years

If it has wings and a propeller, Shan Covington has probably flown it.

The World War II Army Air Corps pilot has flown 32 different aircraft over the years, including a 1942 Stearman with wooden prop, which won the award for the Most Unusual Aircraft at the 2009 Fly-In.

"I've been around airplanes a long time," said Covington, who was raised by his uncle, General Harold H. Clark, designer of numerous airfields, including Randolph Air Field in San Antonio, Hickam AFB in Hawaii and Barksdale AFB in Shreveport.

His passion for planes began in 1928 when he was six years old, sitting in a 1926 Flying Jenny (Curtiss JN-4), a biplane training aircraft for the U.S. Army.

Covington has flown a P-51 Mustang, C-47, DC 3, B-25 and flew a B-24 Liberator to the only CAF airshow held in Mexico. His second wife, who shared his love of flying, was co-pilot on the flight to Mexico.

"We had to land 7,000 feet above sea

level which in an old plane is hard to do because the air is so thin," he said.

As a flying master sergeant pilot during WW II, he flew P-40s with General Tex Hill, the only American to fly later with the famous Flying Tigers of China.

He also flew the British Tiger Moth, an open cockpit trainer whose engine ran backwards.

"It had no starter; you had to kick start the propeller and you'd better watch which side you kicked off from or it would take off your arm," said Covington.

His favorite plane is the B-26 Marauder, also known as the 'widowmaker'. "It was the fastest, heaviest bomber in WWII. More people were killed training in it than in any other plane," said Covington.

The Marauder had a 1/2 percent of one percent survival rate because with no glide capabilities, it had the properties of a flying boulder. "If you could go through training, you could make it

through anything," he said. "I liked it because it was tough, fast and got the job done."

Flying with the Commemorative Air Force out of Midland for the past 27 years has allowed Covington to continue doing the thing he loves — meeting people and flying planes. Some of the interesting people he has met through the air shows are George and Barbara Bush, Prince Phillip of England, and the Shah of Saudi Arabia's son.

Pilots who fly with CAF go through specialized training in order to be certified as a colonel or general. "You can't afford to turn someone loose with one of these planes just because they have a pilot's license," said Covington. "The CAF is actually far tougher than the service."

While CAF is best known for their world famous air shows, they are also preservers of history, finding old planes in the most unlikely places and restoring and flying them.

Old metal or appliances can be taken to PJs, east of town.

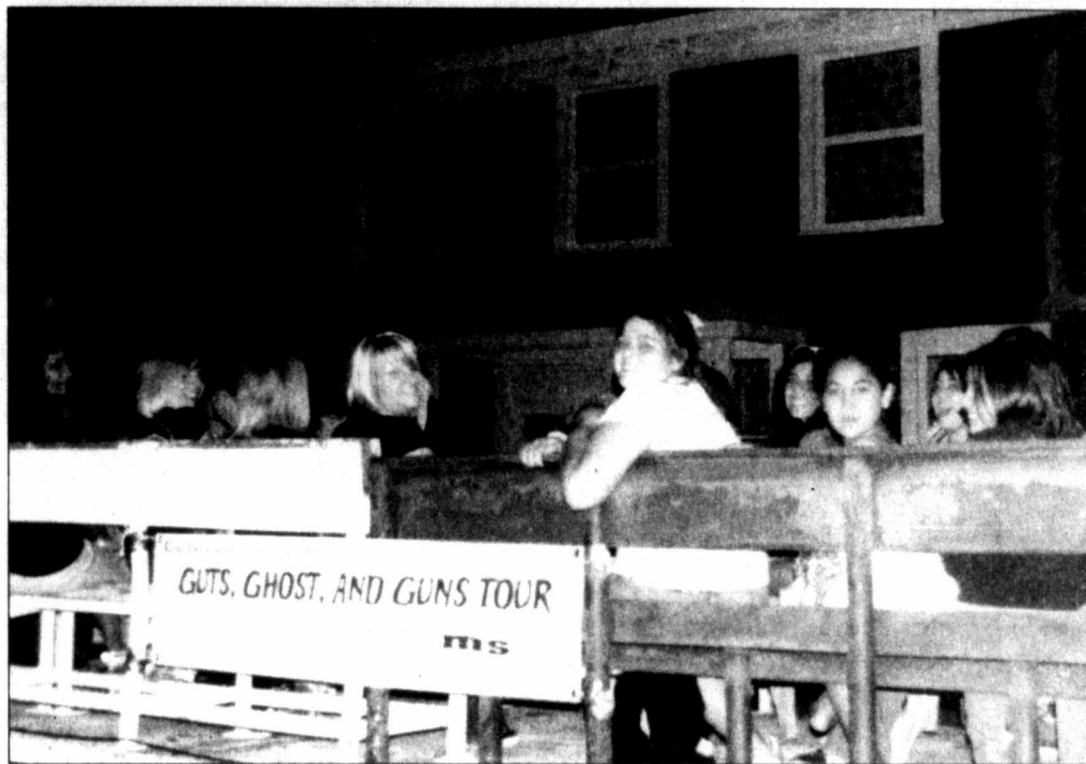

terials to be picked up should be separated and moved to the edge of the yard or the alley.

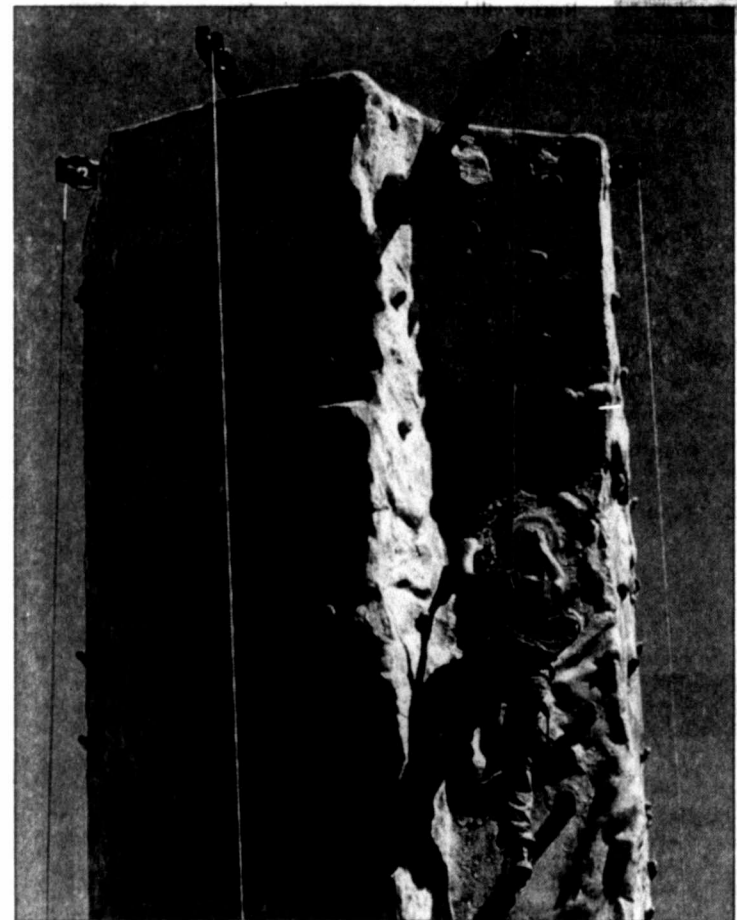

## TUMBLEWEED SMITH DISC GOLF IN COLORADO CITY

Four years ago, Marge Kolman of Colorado City read a newspaper story about disc golf. The more she learned about the sport, the more she thought it would be a good thing for Colorado City.

"It just sounded like an ideal recreational opportunity," says Marge. "It would be free, you wouldn't have to have expensive equipment, you could play with other people or by yourself and it would be a help in getting kids out of the house and away from the television and video games."

Marge contacted Greg Brooks of Big Spring, a longtime disc golfer who holds some records in the sport and asked him for help. Greg loves to get people involved in disc golf. He has set up several courses in different cities. He went with Marge to a city council meeting and got approval to build the course in Colorado City's Ruddick Park. Marge chaired the committee to raise funds for the project. Members raised eight thousand dollars in eight months and construction began on the regulation-size course. Some of the nine holes are nearly four hundred feet long.

"We had to build t-boxes, which are like twelve-foot pieces of sidewalk. There's a cylinder that is cemented into the ground, then you install the basket on the cylinder. Basket number six is difficult because it's on top of a mound of dirt that's about ten feet high."

The course had its grand opening on June 14th of this year, complete with a Chamber of Commerce ribbon cutting ceremony. Door prizes were discs. Now Marge wants to raise money to get disc golf in county schools. After she took the demonstration basket to nearby Westbrook, the administration there decided to build its own course. Marge shows up at various events all over town demonstrating disc golf, which is new to most residents. People in neighboring towns familiar to the sport say the course is a good one. Marge says five year olds have the most fun because they run up to the basket, put their disc in and think they've won the game.

Marge is in her eighties and does not play disc golf. She was born in Mitchell County and left for about 40 years to get an education and have a career. She studied social work at Tulane University and spent a year in Paris on a Fulbright scholarship. She worked in recreation and social work and traveled the world. She came home some twenty years ago to take care of her mother and has been involved with many volunteer pursuits like the garden club, library, Main Street Program and Keep Colorado City Beautiful. Marge says it's all fun. She appreciates the enthusiasm of people involved in getting the course built.

"I think we have a lot of people in Colorado City who are eager to learn new things and are generous with their support of these things. It's just a wonderful

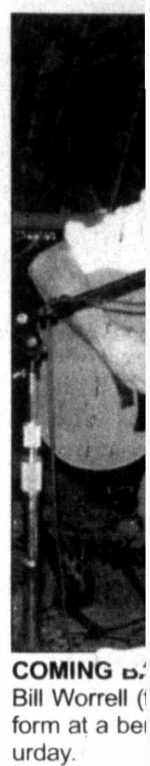

## Defendant pleads guilty in drug case

The district attorney's office continued the fight against drugs in Mitchell County as a defendant in a drug case pled guilty last week.

On Monday, September 21, 2009, Fernando Esteban Sandoval entered a guilty plea before the Honorable Judge Glen Harrison in the 32nd Judicial District Court. Sandoval was arrested by 32nd Judicial District Attorney Investigator Ronnie Stiltner

on April 16, 2009 in Mitchell County, Texas while driving a truck pulling an empty car hauler trailer on Interstate Highway 20. A search of the truck, uncovered over 400 grams of cocaine in Sandoval's possession, hidden in one of the axles of the truck.

Sandoval was sentenced to 25 years confinement in the penitentiary as well as a \$5,000.00 fine and court costs. In addition, the truck and trailer were

forfeited to the district attorney as contraband.

"I'm pleased when we can get good sentences on these cases through pleas," said District Attorney Ann Reed. "I believe we are able to do this because of Mitchell County's reputation for

being tough on crime, especially drug cases."

"The great thing about our forfeiture law is that I can now sell the truck and trailer and use the proceeds from that to equip our agencies with more tools to help fight crime," she said.

## Have microphone, will travel

### Columnist entertains with stories from around the world

With a well-deserved nickname, Tumbleweed Smith has a limitless bag of stories, garnered from all over the world.

Smith was the guest speaker at the Rotary noon meeting last Wednesday at Mi Ranchito, entertaining the Rotarians with anecdotes from his long career in radio and public speaking. Smith has taught speech at Permian Basin and is currently teaching writing and broadcasting classes at Western Texas College in Snyder.

Smith also shared stories of interesting experiences as a fellow

Rotarian. "Rotary is so much fun. I took some Rotarians who were on a study exchange out to Muleshoe and mentioned it was pretty when the mesquite came out. One person wanted to know where we kept them."

On a Rotary peace conference trip to Honduras, Smith traveled on the SAHASA airline and asked someone what it stood for. "They told me Stay At Home and Stay Alive."

Smith has visited Scandinavia, New Zealand and Australia as a part of Rotary's Friendship Exchange program.

"One Rotarian from England fell in love with a country western song about a fellow sitting on a naugahyde couch in a trailer park looking at a tumbleweed Christmas tree. The Rotarian wanted to know what kind of animal a 'nauga' was. We told him it was a hide used for seat covers in '55 Chevys."

Smith, known for his slice of life columns, began his life as a roving reporter while in high school on the annual staff, selling a full page ad to Pepsi for a new cola.

"I liked this journalism stuff because I got to legally get off campus," he said.

Always the adventurer, after graduating in 1957 with \$50 in his pocket, he decided to travel across the United States. He drove cars to the West Coast, then hitchhiked to Los Angeles. He caught a truck taking tomatoes to New York. "He'd drive 40 miles an hour and stop at every truck stop," Smith said.

Working two days at a landscape business in Florida gave him just enough plane fare for a hop to Havana before returning home.

"I came home with \$8 and had gone 10,000 miles in 28 days," Smith said.

His views of America changed between a trip to Mexico in college and serving in the military for two years in Europe. "I got a good look at the country after being away from it. I found there was a lot to like about the United States," he said.

Fellow Army soldiers who hadn't seen a commercial in two years, were actually applauding radio commercials because it represented America. It was a turning point for Smith, who suddenly knew what he'd be doing the rest of his life.

"Do we really know what influences us?" said Smith, who started writing his newspaper column 20 years ago, "after I got old enough to write."

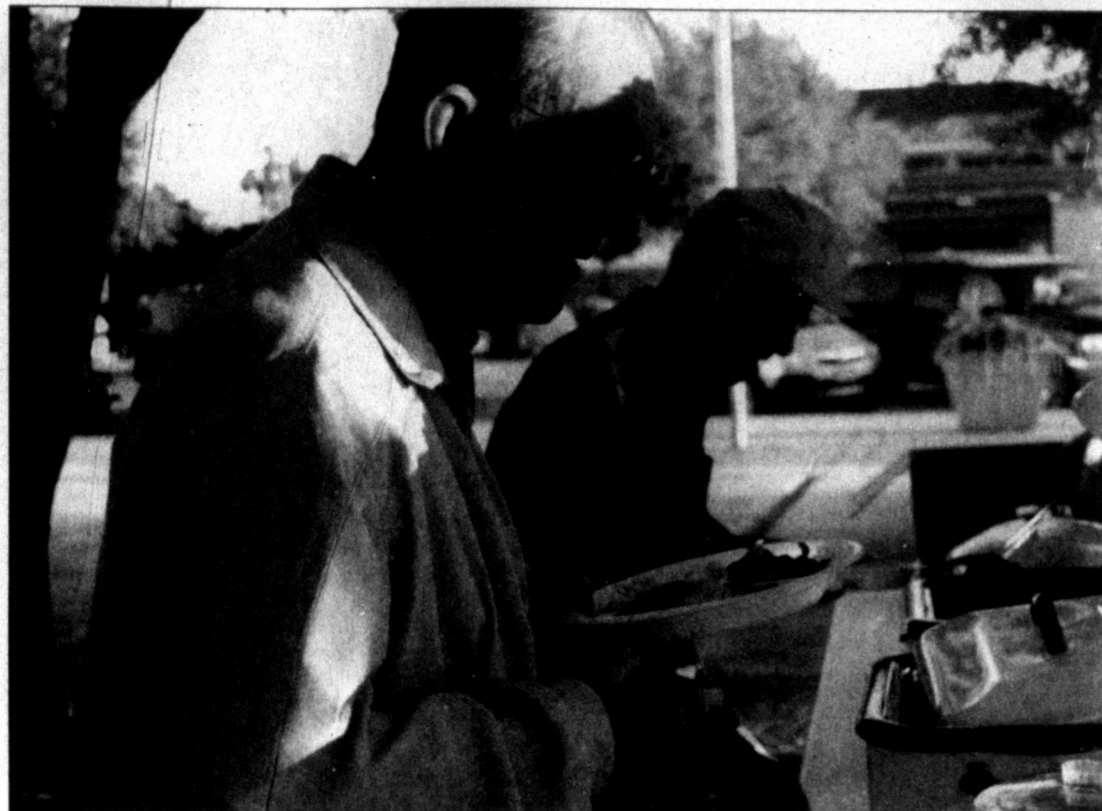

## Texas fisheries to host state fish art exposition

ATHENS, Texas — The Texas Freshwater Fisheries Center (TFFC) has agreed to host the 2010 national State-Fish Art expo next July.

"The Texas Freshwater Fisheries Center is an ideal location to host the expo," said TFFC director Allen Forshage. "We have a conference center, aquaria and educational exhibits and stocked fishing ponds on-site. Athens is conveniently located just 1.5 hours southeast of Dallas, and the community fully supports TFFC's activities."

For the past three years TFFC has managed the Texas division of the national conservation art contest, and during that time Texas has led the country in the number of entries. Last year 624 Texas students in grades 4-12 submitted entries, a fourth of all the entries nationwide.

"We're thrilled that Texas

the leading State-Fish Art state, offered to host the expo to highlight the national winners in true Texas style," said Doug Grann, president of Wildlife Forever, national sponsor of the contest. "By moving the expo to Texas, we hope to inspire other states' participation and get more students to enter the contest."

The State-Fish Art contest is open to all students in public, private or home schools and requires submission of a one-page essay and a drawing of an officially recognized state fish. Entry deadline is March 31 each year. Educators who wish to have their students enter the contest can download the free "State-Fish Art Contest Lesson Plan" at [www.statefish.art.com](http://www.statefish.art.com). The interdisciplinary curriculum includes lessons and activities, a species identification section profiling each state fish, a glossary and student worksheets.

The public portion of the State-Fish Art Expo will be held July 17, 2010 and will feature fishing, instructional seminars and demonstrations and a display of all the state and national contest winners. Plans are being made for a day-long schedule of events with food booths and outdoor activities and displays that the public can enjoy in addition to viewing the artwork and voting for the People's Choice Award. Public admission to the expo and related activities will be included with paid admission to TFFC.

One outstanding piece of artwork each year is selected for the Art of Conservation Award, and a commemorative stamp featuring the artwork is produced for sale. Proceeds from sales of the stamp are used to fund conservation projects. In 2007 a drawing of a Guadalupe bass, the Texas state fish, by Eagle Lake student Clayton Bowen, was selected as the Art of Conservation winner. The 2010 winner will be unveiled at the expo.

## Federal grants available for renewable energy projects

(AUSTIN) — More federal stimulus funds are now available for local and state government agencies looking for long-term energy savings. Texas Comptroller Susan Combs announced today that requests for applications are open for \$30 million in grants from the Distributed Renewable Energy Technology Program. Cities, counties, school districts and other local and state governmental entities can apply for the competitive grants.

The money will help install renewable energy technologies at or near the point of energy consumption in a public facility. Governmental entities can install solar panels, small wind turbines

or other types of renewable energy directly at a public facility to generate electricity for the place. This would also reduce the demand on a power plant and cut the greenhouse gas emissions from the plant.

"Having the ability to generate renewable energy on-site at their facilities gives governmental entities tremendous flexibility in meeting electricity needs while helping reduce tax dollars spent on energy costs," Combs said. "They could look at using these grants at city halls, county courthouses or school campuses, and energy saving opportunities may also exist in places such as libraries and public zoos."

The grants are capped at \$2 million each and can be used for projects that use biomass, geothermal, solar, water (hydro) and wind installations.

The Comptroller's State Energy Conservation Office (SECO) will administer the federal stimulus grants. Funding guidelines and selection criteria, such as priority for ready-to-go projects that can begin immediately, are part of the application process. Requests for applications were posted today, and governmental entities have until Oct. 30, 2009, to submit applications. 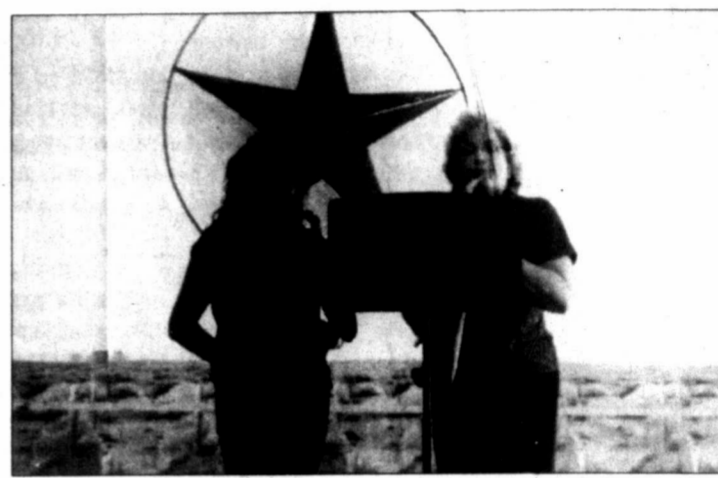

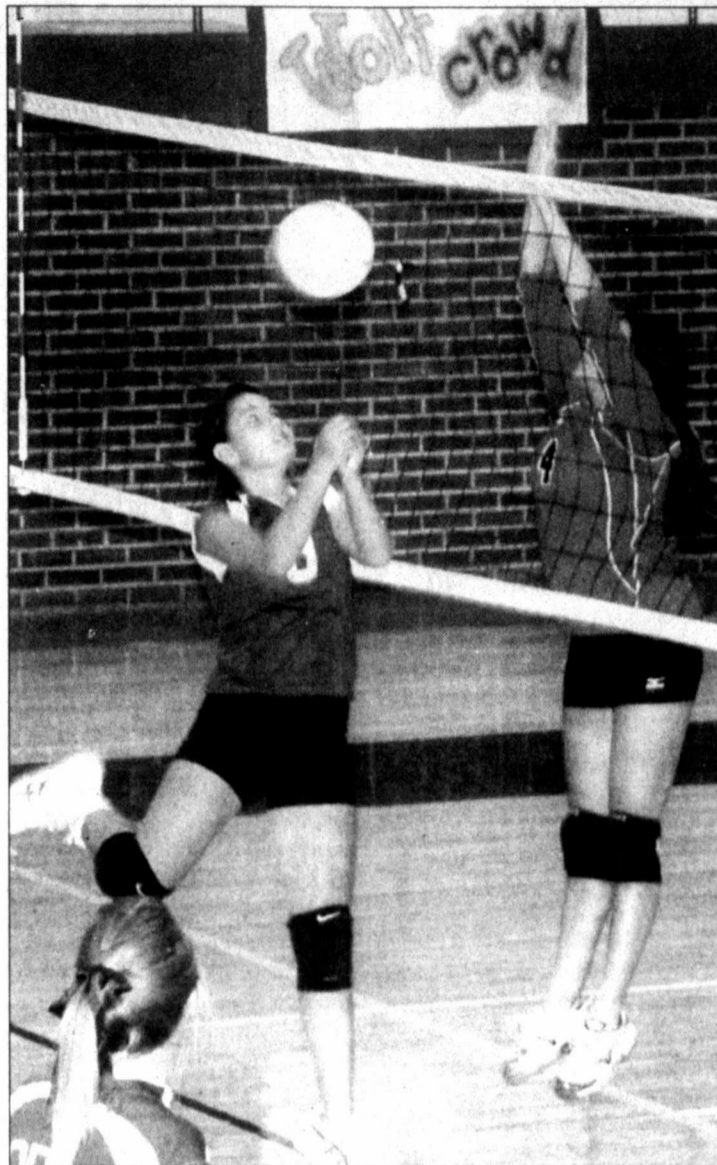

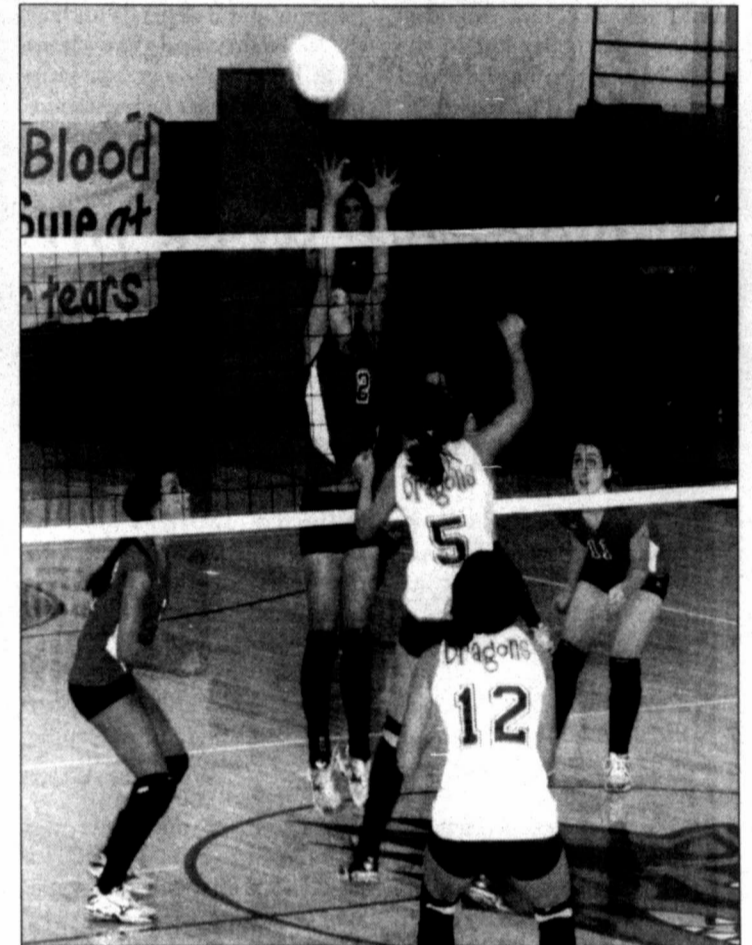

## Wolves face tough Cisco, lose first game of season

Cisco used an awesome ground game to pound out a convincing 47-6 victory over Colorado City last Friday night in Cisco.

Both teams entered the contest with identical 4-0 records, but the #4 ranked Lobos controlled the contest from the start.

Lead by an offensive line that most observers say is better than last year, Cisco's tailback Vegas Hastings and Bradley Toler rushed for 261 of the 421 total rushing yards the Lobos were able to accumulate.

"I think they're a better team than last year," Head Coach Frank Johnson said Monday. Last year the Lobos lost in the State Champion game and ended the season with a 14-2 record.

The Wolves never had a chance to get anything going. "We got

Asked if anything good can come out of this game, Coach Johnson said it depends on how the Wolves respond. "If we learn what happened to us and learn from it, so it won't happen again. I think we can benefit from it," he said.

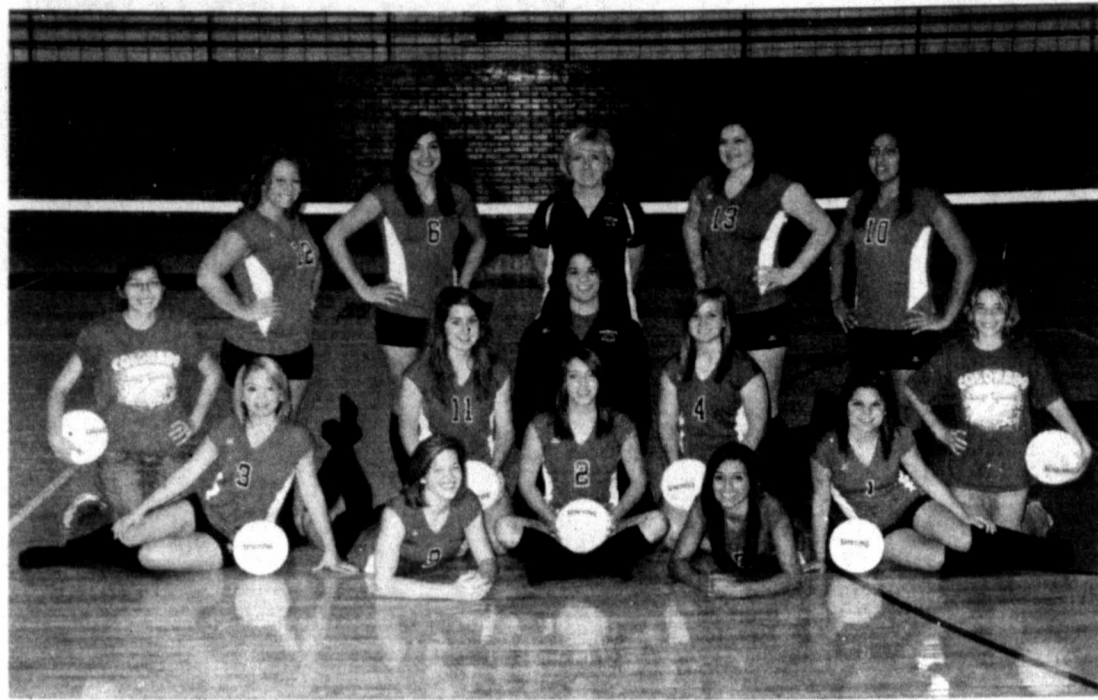

Henderson scored on runs of

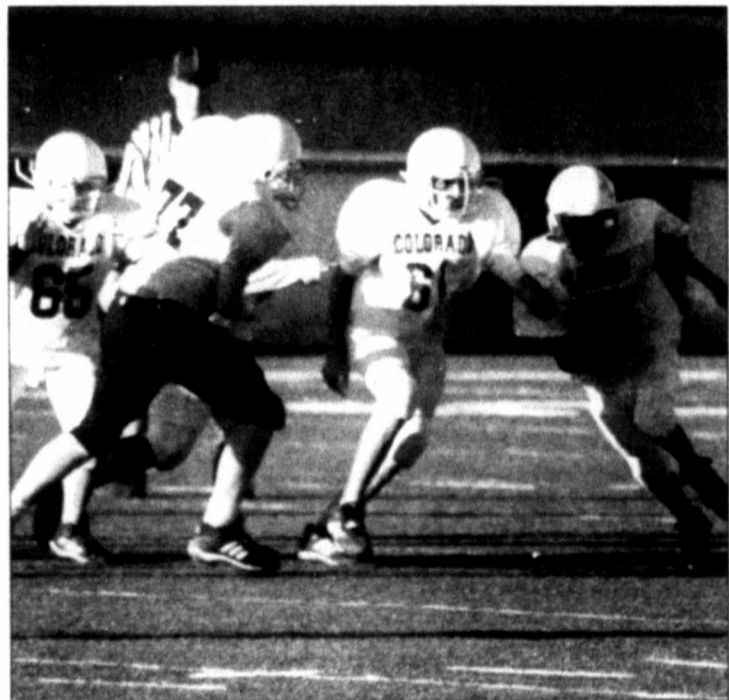
6, 40 and 25 yards, and Jackson scored on runs of 58 and 50 and a 20 yard touchdown pass from Dillon Gainey.

The 7th graders are 3-0 this year and play Anson on October 1st in Anson.

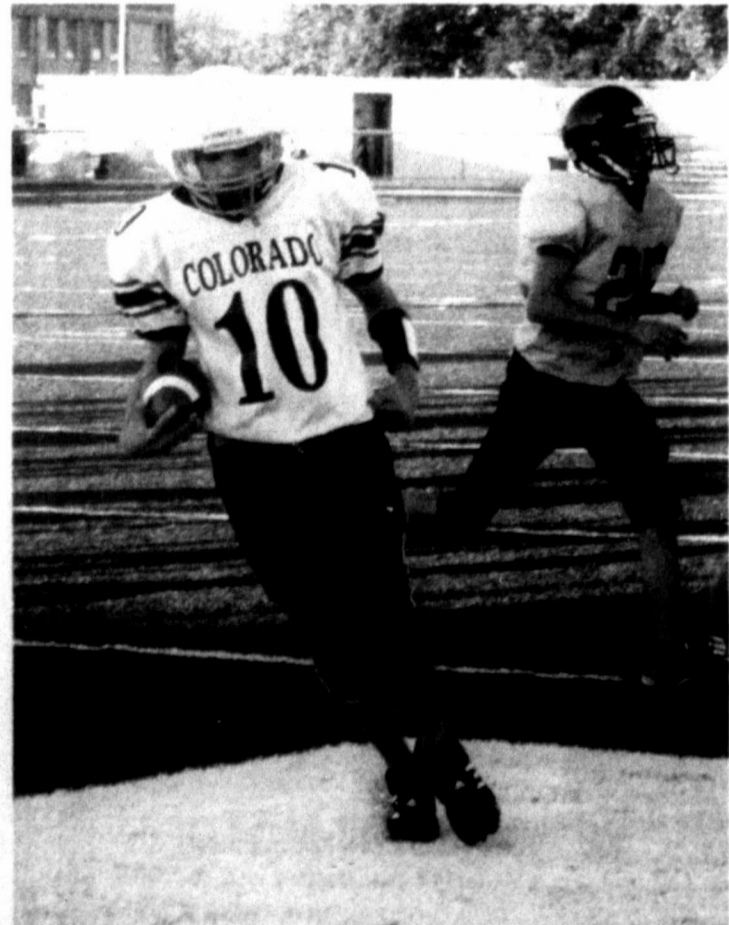

with flu are contagious long before they exhibit symptoms.

"During the 3-5 day incubation period, you may not feel sick, but you still are contagious," he said.

Eating healthy, getting plenty of rest, washing hands and staying away from things that suppress the immune system like alcohol and tobacco can help improve the body's ability to fight influenza.

A vaccine for H1N1 will be available in October for selected target groups; mainly those working with children in the public venue where the transmission of the disease can spread the quickest.

Questions about symptoms or the availability of the vaccine can

be directed to the Family Medical Associates at 728-2693 Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m.
