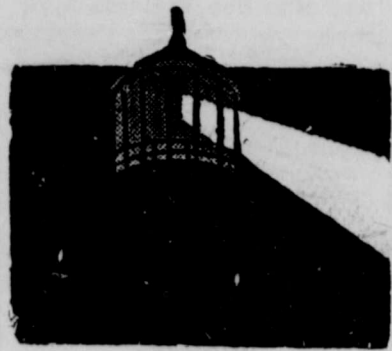

County Officials In Regular Meeting

Judge Bill Carter and the Commissioners Court met in a regular meeting Tuesday.

The Court voted to accept the City National Bank as bank depository for the County and School funds, and also voted to purchase a new TR 6 Kustom Radar.

Other business included: to co-sponsor with the Mitchell Co. Soil & Water Conservation Dept. in the Rural Community Development projects.

The Court voted to enter an agreement with McCreary and Huey to collect delinquent taxes and voted a salary increase to all precinct employees \$26.00 per month, and all other county personnel, non-elective, the increase of \$15.00 per month. This salary increase is effective Feb. 1st, and was included in the budget last August.

An Editorial

Loraine, like many towns in Texas, has a large number of Mexican-American citizens. Many of these people are among our best citizens but like all other cases some are not so desirable. We consider a number of Mexican people as good friends.

It is unfortunate that some agitator has come into our community and endeavored to stir up trouble among these people. It seems to us that the Mexican people in this community have received very good treatment at the hands of Anglos all through the years. They have been accepted in the school, and have been treated as equals in business and other respects.

It is true that no teacher in our school, no member of the school board or city council is of Mexican origin. But that is not to say that none could be elected to any of these position if they are qualified for the job. So far we know no Mexican-American has ever applied for a position as teacher in our school, made application to get his name on the ballot as a candidate for school trustee or the city council. How could they have been mistreated under these circumstances?

Instead of causing trouble and hard feelings the Mexican people should send their children to school -- all the way through high school and college -- so they can prepare themselves to become teachers, professional people, business people and all around good citizens.

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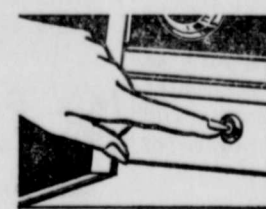
