Bateman, he stated that "a half loaf was better than none" and that should the I. C. C. refuse the permit for the whole line, the T. P. would go ahead and build the part of the road already granted. Judging that only the part recommended will be built, here are a few of the things that Lamesa will benefit: Less Freight Charges, an outlet to northern and western markets, passenger service, and accessibility to other points.

UNITED STATES BURIAL FLAG

The local Post Office was in receipt this week of an initial United States Burial Flag sent out by the United States to all post-offices in a town of a population of 10,000 or over. The purpose of this flag is to drape the casket of a war veteran of any war, or any war nurse who received honorable discharge during the war. In order to obtain this flag the nearest of kin to the deceased should apply at the postoffice and fill out application for the flag. The flag is used only for draping the casket and is given to the next of kin after the funeral. Size of the flag is 5x9-12 feet and made of wool bunting. The official name of the flag is the U. S. Burial Flag and cannot be used for any other purpose.

County Agent Offers Valuable Remedies to Eliminate Bad Pests

The woolly caterpillar infesting cotton wood and poplar trees, may be controlled with lead Arsenate Sprayed on the trees at the rate of 1 pound of Lead Arsenate paste to 25 gallons water or one half pound dry lead Arsenate to 25 gallons water. Lead Arsenate, either dry or in paste form should be fresh stock, as exposure from one season to another, may have tude. If lead Arsenate is not a lessened its value as an insecticide. Paris Green may be used at the rate of 12 pound to 25 gallons water.

Jack Rabbits are doing much damage to crops and pastures under field conditions. They may be poisoned with the same poisoned grain used to eradicate prairie dogs. The poisoned grain may be placed in piles, a tablespoon full to each pile, through the field along their runs. Also salt and strychnine, at the rate of 1 ounce of strychnine to 5 pounds of salt. Place a tablespoon full of the mixture on boards in the field that may be taken up or replenished as desired. Keep livestock away from the poison.

The host plant for cotton fleas is the Goat weed, a tall white thistle with purple or white blooms. The insect follows the plant and it appears throughout the state and wherever it abounds fleas are more or less abundant. Working on this plant as its principal host, the eggs are laid by the female by breaking the bark of the plant and depositing the egg inside, where it is hatched out. This same condition occurs on cotton. The flea damage to cotton is caused by injury to the bud and thus injured, the plant does bud and forms of the cotton plant not square or bloom, but little or none at all, according to the degree of infection.

The fleas may be easily confused with several other varieties of leaf hoppers that do no damage to cotton, although they look very much alike, yet there is the closest resemblance. The flea hopper is very shy, moves quickly, is usually found in the bud of the

plant, it hops like common fleas and the shape of the body is like the flea. While the common leaf hopper in shape of body and movements, are more like the grass hopper.

Sulphur dust has been applied to heavily infested fields to control cotton fleas, also nicotine sulphate dust has been used and other insecticides. The results from applying these remedies are not uniform. The destruction of the goat weed or white thistle is considered one of the most permanent control measures.

POINTS OF INTEREST ON GLOVER VACATION TRIP

We left Lamesa on Friday afternoon for Hot Springs, Ark., via Dallas, Texas, arriving in Hot Springs Sunday at noon. We did not visit any special points of interest here until Monday morning as we were very tired from our long drive. Monday we visited the Hot Springs National Park, went through the Zoo, took a plunge in their beautiful swimming pool, and visited the Hippopotamus and Ostrich farms. The latter was very interesting. Most of the birds were very shy. They would kick like a farm mule if you got near them. We were told by the manager of this farm that the female birds were more fickle than the males. If the mate of a female died she would get another, but if the male's mate died he never mated again, but grieved his life away for his lost mate.

The next interesting place we visited in Hot Springs was the famous Steel Observation Tower on Hot Springs Mountain, 165 feet high, and 815 feet above the city streets, which were only one-half mile distant. This tower has elevator service, so we went to the

top and viewed the surrounding country. We could see for miles distant the most beautiful and picturesque we have ever seen. We learned some interesting bits of history concerning this tower. It seems that the one who was responsible, or conceived the idea for such a tower, was a young girl in high school several years ago. She planned and dreamed of it all through her years in high school and after many years her dreams were realized—she is now operator of the Tower, and is a sweetvoiced, grey haired lady far up in years.

From Hot Springs we went to Bella Vista, Nature's Gem of the Ozarks, which is situated in the heart of the wonder mountains, only four miles north of Bentonville, Ark. Bella Vista is proclaimed the premier summer resort of the Ozarks. Any sort of amusement any one might desire can be found here. Swimming, boating, horseback riding, fishing, golfing, sightseeing—is all yours in Bella Vista. While here we visited the fast becoming world-famous Wonder Cave, known as the Miracle of the Ozark Mountains, 500 feet under

trance, which is a brilliantly illuminated passageway resplendent in colors and fantastic formations. We assented the Mystic Stairway, traversed the Hall of Mystery and entered the magnificent Wonderland Night Club. This club is furnished with an up-to-date orchestra, and they have dances in this underground room nightly. It is also popular for conventions and private parties, as well as a meeting place for religious services. The temperature is the same both winter and summer. Other divisions of this Wonder Cave are, Missouri Pass, Dante's Inferno, Mile Post, Arkansas Pass, Hall of the Vatican, Devil's Crater (which is a bottomless pit), Balance Rock (a huge bolder balanced over one of the passageways, which appears to not be leaning against anything, but barely balanced, and the least jar would send it tumbling downward, destroying everything in its wake), Batdom (alive and swarming with bats), Queen's Veil (a misty looking veil), Giant's Tombstone (formed by the many colored crystals), Crystal Valley and Crystal Palace (so named because of the beautiful many colored and different forms of the crystal rocks). All this keeps one gazing in wonderment and awe. Tradition has it that the notorious bandit Jesse James when about to be captured at one time, took refuge in Wonder Cave, and was thought to be entrapped but he made his escape from the mouth of a cave in Missouri several miles distant. There are numbers of the passageways that have not been explored even at this late date. The cave is rich in Indian myths and other legends.

We went from Bella Vista to Kansas City, which boasts of being America's most beautiful city and so far as we have seen, it is. Here we visited Swope Park, Woodland Park, and Fairland Park. We also visited Union Station and viewed the city from the top of the Liberty Memorial. This monument is a Memorial to the soldier dead of Kansas City. It has an elevator shaft 280 feet high, with a large crucible at the top in which a fire burns constantly. Steam is forced up through the structure, and at night this looks like a huge ball of fire. We do not have words to express how beautiful it is. This Memorial also includes a Hall of Records of the boys who gave their lives for their country, and a Veteran's Fraternity House, which serves as a meeting place for war veterans.

Our next stop was Topeka, Kansas, which was our real destination. Here Homer Bud entered the Security Benefit Association Hospital for a surgical operation. As soon as he was physically able we turned our faces homeward, and lost no time in getting back to our own native state. As we "forded" into Lamesa, we were reminded of the old song, "Mid pleasures and palaces though we may roam, Be it ever so humble, There's no Place Like Home!"

WESTERN UNION WILL SELL AMERICAN EXPRESS M. O.

To meet the constant demand of Lamesa residents for a money order to be mailed or sent by methods other than telegraph, the local Western Union office will begin the sale Wednesday of American Express money orders, it was announced by Katye Lee Bumpus, local manager of the telegraph company.

Western Union main and branch offices in all parts of the United States will inaugurate the service at the same time. Offices of the American Express Company will act as branches of Western Union in the sale of telegrams, cablegrams and telegraph money orders.

By agreement with the American Express Company, 800 Western Union offices in and near New York City, Boston and Philadelphia began a trial of the sale of American Express money orders last December 15. Immediate success of this trial indicated a general demand for an economical money order which can be obtained at conveniently located offices, and accordingly, the general extension of the plan was arranged.

This service will in no way conflict with the Western Union Telegraphic money and gift order service which annually transfers \$275,000,000 in small amounts, and comprises about 93 per cent of the nation's telegraphic money orders.

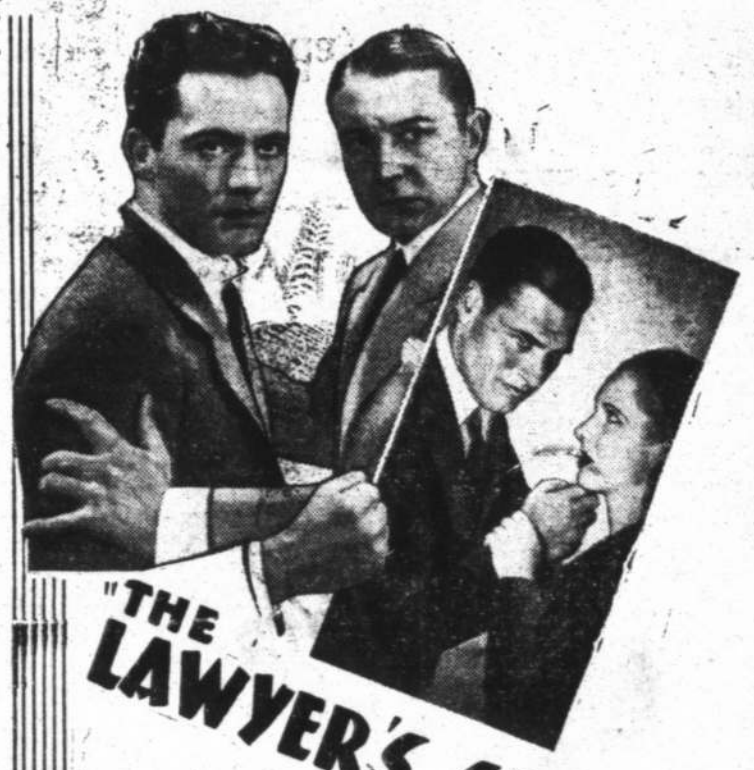
