## 3,637,078 AUTOS MANUFACTURED IN 1924

Washington.—The number of automobiles manufactured in the United States and Canada in 1924 totaled 3,261,682 passenger cars and 376,396 trucks, the Census Bureau announced on the basis of information furnished by 166 manufacturing plants.

The 1923 figures, 3,637,216 passenger cars and 376,444 trucks, do not offer a correct comparison with those of 1924 the bureau stated, because of differences in the scope of the compilations for the two years.

### "SMOKES" TAX

#### FOR EDUCATION

Blue law fanatics may have another chance to rave in Texas. A proposal has been made to add a 10 per cent tax on cigars and cigarettes and use the \$4,000,000 estimated income therefrom in bettering the state's educational system. Some smokers are going to object if the law is passed.

Governor Ferguson has announced her approval of the proposed law. Whether or not it will get through the channels necessary to become a law is not known, but if it does persons interested in the mental welfare of Texas children will have cause to rejoice.

Such a tax doubtless would meet with much opposition, but basically it is fair and beneficial. The 10 per cent tax on "smokes" would be a tax on luxury to provide for necessity; that is the most universally approved form of taxation. It is the tax on necessities that hurts. The theory is that a man able to buy luxuries is better able to pay taxes than the man who barely ekes out a living for himself and his family. Up to a certain point, the man who can pay is the man who should pay, and a law cutting down some man's number of daily cigars and adding to some farm boy or girl's opportunity to learn is bound to meet with approval.—Texas Commercial News.

Rev. Frederick W. Jones of Kerrville will hold a service next Sunday morning in Trinity Episcopal church. Morning services on the second Sunday of each month, instead of afternoon services, have been decided upon in order to allow church members and their friends who live out on the ranches and in neighboring towns an opportunity to attend and return home by daylight.

Mr. Jones will be the guest of Mr. and Mrs. John Rennie, arriving Friday in time to meet church people of the town and surrounding country for conferences preceding the service. The subject of the sermon will be "The Holy Mount."—Reporter.

## FEBRUARY TERM OF DISTRICT COURT OPENS

On Monday of this week the February term of the Kimble County District court opened with Hon. J. H. McLean of Llano on the bench. The Judge and District Attorney, F. H. Hammond, arrived in Junction Sunday afternoon.

Court was opened with a short Chapel Service by Rev. E. L. Kelley, local pastor of the Baptist church.

The first order of business was that of empaneling the Grand Jury. The following compose the Grand Jury for the term: Frank L. Wilson, Foreman; E. O. Dunbar, W. E. Bolt, E. H. Harrison, L. A. Warren, E. H. Kothmann, E. I. Cummins, Alton Miller, I. O. Weldon, Robert Hunger, Dan Davis and Tom Walton.

John S. Munn and Will Emley were appointed riding bailiffs, and B. S. Jeter, door bailiff. The Grand Jury perfected their organization and began work immediately.

A number of civil cases were heard, most of which were continued. Two divorce cases were heard and granted, Elizabeth Henderson vs. Newton Henderson and Ora Eckert vs. Aug. Eckert.

Court opened at nine o'clock Tuesday morning. The docket was called and several judgments rendered in civil cases, mostly suits on promissory notes.

On Tuesday a number of civil cases involving suits on accounts and notes were heard. Divorces were granted in the following cases: J. H. Taylor vs. Martha Taylor, Mrs. Anna Beasley vs. Ross Beasley and Clarence McDonald vs. Flossie McDonald.

Wednesday morning the following men were selected by the court as jury commissioners to select names for the grand and petit juries for the September term of court: Floyd Little, A. O. Lawler and M. C. Reese.

## \* \* \* \* \* BY-PRODUCTS OF GAS.

The manufactured gas industry has developed processes of by-product recovery to such a degree that the country may soon count upon it for supplies of fixed nitrogen and other items vital to the national defense, taking the place of foreign supplies.

Among these by-products are: explosives, fertilizers, dyes, drugs, rubber substitutes, flavoring extracts, paints, perfumes, inks, wood preservatives, motor fuel, insulating materials and many others, all of which are saved when gas is used instead of coal for fuel.

"Locked up in the nearly 600,000,000 tons of coal produced in this country each year, mostly consumed in steam production and heating furnaces, are by-products of value comparable to the total wealth of the nation twenty years ago," says a recent authentic report.

## MAN INJURED FROM ACCIDENTAL GUN SHOT

Last Thursday, Will Thomas, who has been at the McKee ranch this winter, received serious injuries from an accidental gun shot. Will had walked up to a car, and had set his shot gun on the running board and was leaning on it. The stock slipped off the running board and in falling hit the hammer, causing it to discharge the gun.

Almost the entire load of shot passed through the inside of his left arm, just above the elbow, tearing most of the flesh from the arm. The accident happened on Chalk Creek.

Prompt medical aid was given him and, while he is doing well, he will lose the use of his left arm for awhile, but fortunately, the muscles were not badly injured and within a few weeks he will be able to use his arm.

## NEW BUILDING FOR SCHREINER INSTITUTE

Owing to the growth and development of Schreiner institute it was necessary last year for the Board of Trustees to authorize the construction of an additional building to house the students clamoring for admission to the school, and again this year the Board is faced with the same proposition.

Consequently at a meeting of the Trustees held in this city Tuesday afternoon authorization was made for the construction of a combined dining hall and dormitory, to cost approximately \$60,000.

Judging from the inquiries already being received at the Registrar's office this additional room for boarding pupils will prove inadequate to take care of all the applicants who wish to enter the school next fall.

The new building, which will be of brick construction and conform to the same style of architecture as the other buildings, will be located on the north side of the campus just east of Dekey Hall—Kerrville Mountain Sun.

## SELF-RULE AND SPINNING WHEELS

Granthi calls on every Indian patriot to spin 2,000 yards of cotton yarn a month. He stresses again what has been stressed before as the most important factor in the Nationalist campaign for Indian self-government. In one nation and another there have been flags with harps and pine trees, white elephants and even rattlesnakes. In India the Nationalist flag has a spinning-wheel on it.

For it is Granthi's belief that the ties which bind a subject people to its rulers are chiefly economic, and his conviction that India can best make itself of little value to the British by ceasing to buy British cloth. Today Lancashire imports India's raw cotton, enjoys the profits of skilled labor and ships India the finished product. The value of the trade is not stupendous, but for British industry it is a substantial factor and for a nation equipped with India's present buying power an economic fact of first importance. It amounted in pre-war years to a turn-over of approximately \$300,000,000 annually.

It is the trade at which the Indian Nationalists attempt to strike with their program of "non-co-operation." Granthi points out that in the old days the people of India spun what cloth they needed for themselves, and more cloth for export. To popularize the spinning-wheel, Granthi has revived the old songs that once accompanied the whirling charha; emissaries of the Nationalist movement travel from town to town like mediaeval troubadours, not preaching propaganda but singing it as they sit at some street corner spinning. Nor is all this a strange Oriental doctrine unheard of in the West. It is the same theory which the American attempted to apply in 1765 when Samuel Adams stumped New England urging "non-intercourse" and a British boycott.—New York World.

#### CHAPTER FROM DEAD PAST IS INTERESTING

To those who have been born in the last half century it is difficult to realize that such a thing as human slavery ever existed in this land of free, and that it not only existed but it was accepted by all classes of society as one of those things decreed by a higher power. But that it did exist is not only attested by many yet living who remember its existence, but it is also attested by history. Here is an evidence presented by an old advertisement clipped from an issue of the Memphis Appeal published in 1855:

#### FORREST & MAPLES SLAVE DEALERS

87 Adams Street  
Between Second and Third  
Memphis, Tennessee  
Have constantly on hand the best selected assortment of Field Mechanics, House Servants and Mechanics at their Negro Mart, to be found in the city. They are daily receiving from Virginia, Kentucky and Missouri fresh supplies of likely Young Ne-

groes.  
**Negroes Sold on Commission.** and the highest market price always paid for good stock. Their Jail is capable of containing Three Hundred and for comfort, neatness and safety, is the best arranged of any in the Union. Persons wishing to purchase are invited to examine their stock before purchasing elsewhere.  
They have on hand at present, Fifty likely young Negroes, comprising Field Hands, Mechanics, House and Body Servants, etc.

The Forrest here referred to was Colonel Bedford Forrest, who afterwards became a noted leader in the army of the Southern Confederacy. Mr. Maples was also a prominent Memphis citizen. The firm was quite active in the slave business until the war came and put an end to it.

There were many things about slavery that were not bad; there were others that were intolerable. The devotion of the old slaves to good masters was one of the most beautiful things in the world, and stands to this day to the credit of the race. Many a man and woman yet living among us hold in memory as a thing sacred the love of a "black mammy," who tended with the utmost care and the most unselfish love the child committed to their care by the mistress of the home.

But we are glad there are no slaves now, and glad that the race which were once slaves are making such splendid progress.

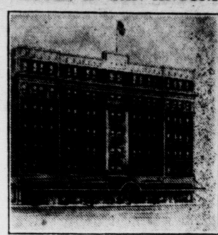

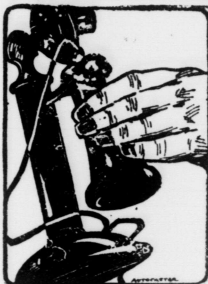

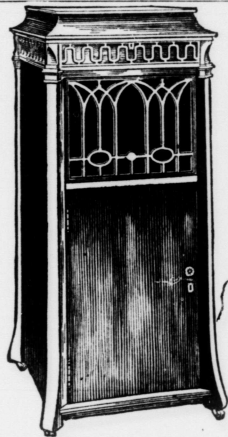

## YOUR OWN VINE AND FIG TREE

Many a farm owner would not cut a few grapes and blackberry vines, a half-dozen of peach and pear trees, and some fig trees in sheltered spots, and then give them proper attention. It would only be a matter of three or four years when the family could have an assortment of fruit that would lend much to the pleasure and health of the family.

Not every farmer should attempt fruit growing as a commercial proposition. That can be left to those who are adapted to the work and have the horticultural knowledge to make it a success, but there is no reason why every farm owner

should not have fruit for his own table and for canning.

Now is the time to purchase trees and vines. February is a good month to set them out. Buy your stock of a reliable nursery and exercise care in setting the trees and vine roots. See that they are properly pruned when set, and then next summer keep down the weeds and, if necessary, give them water. A few good waterings will promote growth. A handful of good fertilizer properly worked into the surface of the ground will give them a good start, and in a comparatively short time there will be fruit—and such fruit as you cannot buy, because fruit fresh from tree and vine is always better.—Farm and Ranch.

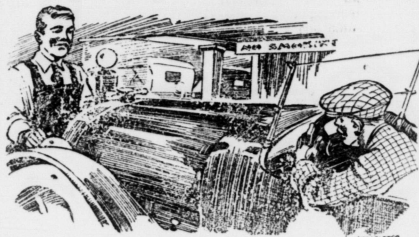

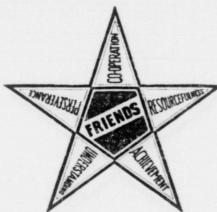
