## Court Action Is Likely In McKee Reward

Claims Of Seven Officers In Arrest Of Alleged Slayer Of Billingsley; Conley In Favor Of Division

Following the offer of a \$1,000 reward for the arrest of Ira McKee, alleged slayer of W. B. Billingsley at Sparanburg, and his subsequent arrest, confusion resulting from claims by the seven officers who participated in the arrest may result in court action. It was learned here yesterday.

Upon receipt of the information from B. Conley, chief deputy sheriff of Lubbock county who assisted in the arrest of McKee, stated that he would contest the claim of any one individual, or any two or three persons, who seek the whole reward.

Hardy Gives View  
Wade Hardy, sheriff, expressed an opinion which differs with that of Conley. Sheriff Hardy stated that the Lubbock county sheriff's department, Chief of Police Tom Abel, of Slaton, and Sheriff Gib Abernathy, of Palo Pinto county, are entitled to division of the reward.

Conley is willing to divide the reward between the seven officers who participated in the arrest. They are: Chief of Police Abel; Deputy Cony; Buck Bennett, chief deputy of Dawson county; Sheriff Abernathy; State Rangers Smith and Young, of Fort Stockton; and Sheriff Pharris, of Henderson county.

"We were out practically all the expense leading to arrest of McKee," said Sheriff Hardy. "Through information received from Sheriff Abernathy, we traced a car, having a Lubbock county license plate, and discovered the whereabouts of McKee. Adding in this was Chief Abel of Slaton. The arrest was caused by information we, including Abel, secured following a tip from Abernathy."

Not Contentious  
"We are not going to be contentious in the matter and hope that court action will not be necessary."

"I am perfectly willing to divide the reward among the seven," said Conley. "I am not in favor, however, of permitting one man to receive the fund offered for the arrest."

According to advice from Governor Moody's office, received by Sheriff W. G. Reese, of Slaton, court action may be necessary to settle the complex case.

## Slaton Youth Is Declared Guilty

## TWO BODIES FOUND

Murder And Suicide Theory In Double Tragedy

KENDALLVILLE, Ind., June 4 (AP)—The bodies of Emma Menzel of Kendallville, and Marion Campbell, of Evansville, Ind., were found today in an automobile three miles south of here under circumstances that indicated murder and suicide. Both had been dead several days.

Miss Menzel had been shot through the head and heart and apparently had been strangled. Empty pistol nearby indicated the method taken by Campbell to end his life.

## Two Men Shot In Gun Fight

Bandits Seriously Wounded In Running Police Battle After Holding Up Of Drug Store In New York

NEW YORK, June 4 (AP)—Two men who held up a Bronx drug store shortly after midnight were shot and seriously wounded by police after a running gun battle in which more than fifty shots were exchanged. One policeman was wounded in the leg.

The chase led through several streets, up the stairway of an apartment house and down a rear fire escape before the men finally were cornered by more than fifty policemen.

The robbers had obtained \$30 and a small quantity of narcotics at a Cypress avenue drug store. Police said they believed the two men responsible for a series of thefts of narcotics from drug stores in the last few months.

## Brothers Held After Robbery

Three Of Bandit Quartet Are Taken Following Two Days Of Gun-Fighting; Five Men Are Wounded

MANCIELONA, Mich., June 4 (AP)—Three brothers, members of a quartet of robbers who held up the Avon County State Savings bank Monday, were under arrest today after two days of gun fighting during pursuit by posse in which five men were wounded.

The turmoil died down today and shot guns went back to their racks because the fourth robber escaped by train, covering his tracks.

The three men under arrest are Sylvester, Leonard and Fred Elliot, former residents of this community. Leonard and Fred were wounded the former seriously late yesterday in a shotgun battle with possemen who came upon them in an alfalfa field. R. G. Bennett, member of the posse was wounded.

Sylvester, who was captured Monday night, pleaded guilty in circuit yesterday. Sentence was deferred pending pleas by the others. Two wounded citizens still are in a serious condition.

# Former Policeman Comes To Aid Of Austria Government

## Johann Schober Goes To Helm of Nation For Third Term

LONDON, June 4.—A former policeman of Vienna named Johann Schober, having hobnobbed with Mussolini in Rome, with the President of France and the Premier in Paris, recently came to London, tucked his feet under Ramsey MacDonald's luncheon table and then hurried off to Buckingham Palace for a long confab with King George. Which is some achievement even for a super-cop. But then Dr. Schober has been alternating between the jobs of police chief and chancellor of the little republic of Austria, and he now is taking his third turn at the governmental helm.

**War-Shocked Condition**  
After huge slices of the Austro-Hungarian empire were given to Czechoslovakia, Yugoslavia and Rumania—and after Hungary had been set up as a separate state—Austria found herself in the worst condition of all the war-shocked lands of Europe. She was saddled with war debts, and her creditors had a first mortgage on her treasury receipts. Surrounding states set up tariff walls that took away most of her old customers.

As if this were not bad enough, Austria was not even at peace with herself. Vienna, with 2,000,000 of the nation's 6,000,000 people, was strongly socialist and formed its own army, called the Schutzbund. The country people, many with Fascist tendencies, also formed an army, the Heimwehr. The conservatives ruled Austria as a whole, but the Socialists ruled Vienna—all but the police. The constabulary was maintained out-side the grasp of city authorities.

That's where the super-cop came in. During the war, Dr. Schober had charge of the political police. When Emperor Karl abdicated, he asked Dr. Schober to take the job of police-president in charge of police. Schober did so, and thus preserved the city from extreme terrorism.

Eight years ago Austria seemed about to collapse. Factories were closing, no foreign loans could be obtained, and her people were on the verge of starvation. Schober was called to the chancellorship, and pled his country's cause so effectively that an international loan was sanctioned by the League of Nations. Furthermore, the heavy financial burden placed on Austria by the peace treaties were temporarily suspended.

**Job as a Policeman**  
Having pulled his country out of the mire, Dr. Schober went back to his job as a policeman.

But last year more trouble cropped up—the threat of civil war. The reactionary Heimwehr and the socialist Schutzbund seemed in actual battle. Austria's credit ready to fight out their quarrel again was ruined, and rich people were taking their money out of the banks.

In September, with conditions at their worst, Dr. Schober again became chancellor. He found the Heimwehr very arrogant in their demands and threatening to march on Vienna. The socialists prepared to fight. Schober calmly announced that the Heimwehr would not be allowed to enter Vienna. He mustered all his police, stationed them around the public buildings, and placed machine guns at every strategic point. The rural fire-eaters realized he was not bluffing. They quit.

Then Schober acted swiftly on

the advantage he had gained. He cleaned up the city's financial situation, got more power into the hands of the president, went to the Hague conference and soon persuaded France, England and Italy to agree virtually to suspend all reparation payments by Austria until 1928. Her treasury was once more her own and she was free to go into the world's money markets for loans.

So it was as Austria's strong man that Dr. Schober has visited Berlin, Paris, Rome and London to thank various foreign statesmen for their help. Very shortly, with the kindly acquiescence of these nations, Austria expects to borrow \$100,000,000. With this money Schober says he will develop Austrian roads, water power and the entire industrial situation.

#### Floydada Crash Victim Back From Hospital

FLOYDADA, June 4. (Special)—Mrs. Sam Berry of this city, who was injured in an automobile crash a month ago near Idalou, has been brought home from Lubbock where she was in a sanatorium for treatment.

Mrs. Berry is reported as showing considerable improvement but she is still very weak and is gaining strength slowly.

## Rural Schools of Floyd County Have Good Record; Over 2,000 Enrolled

(By Staff Correspondent)

—The schools of Floyd county have a good record with more than one third of a million dollars invested in 39 rural schools and one independent district, with 2,156 pupils enrolled and 35 teachers employed.

Scott Payne, county superintendent, reports that all but three of the rural teachers of the county have been employed for the next year.

### Disease Shows

Rural statistics the coming year will be 2,156, including six-year-old children, compared to 2,133 last year and not including the six-year-olds.

Twenty-three of the 39 districts have brick buildings. Twenty of the districts have teacherages for the instructors.

Out of the 39 teachers, 29 are men and 10 women.

Average days of school for the district is 180, or an eight month term.

Value of school property is \$364,135.

### Alken Independent

Alken school is the independent rural district. Floydada and Lockney are both independent city districts.

Two rural schools are yet to close. One was in close Friday, June 3 and the other one, South Plains, will close June 13. This late closing was occasioned by a change from an old to a new building.

During the summer three new buildings are to be erected in the county. The districts that will erect new structures are Fairmount, Ster-

ly and Center. All three will be two-story structures—two will be brick or brick and tile and possibly the third.

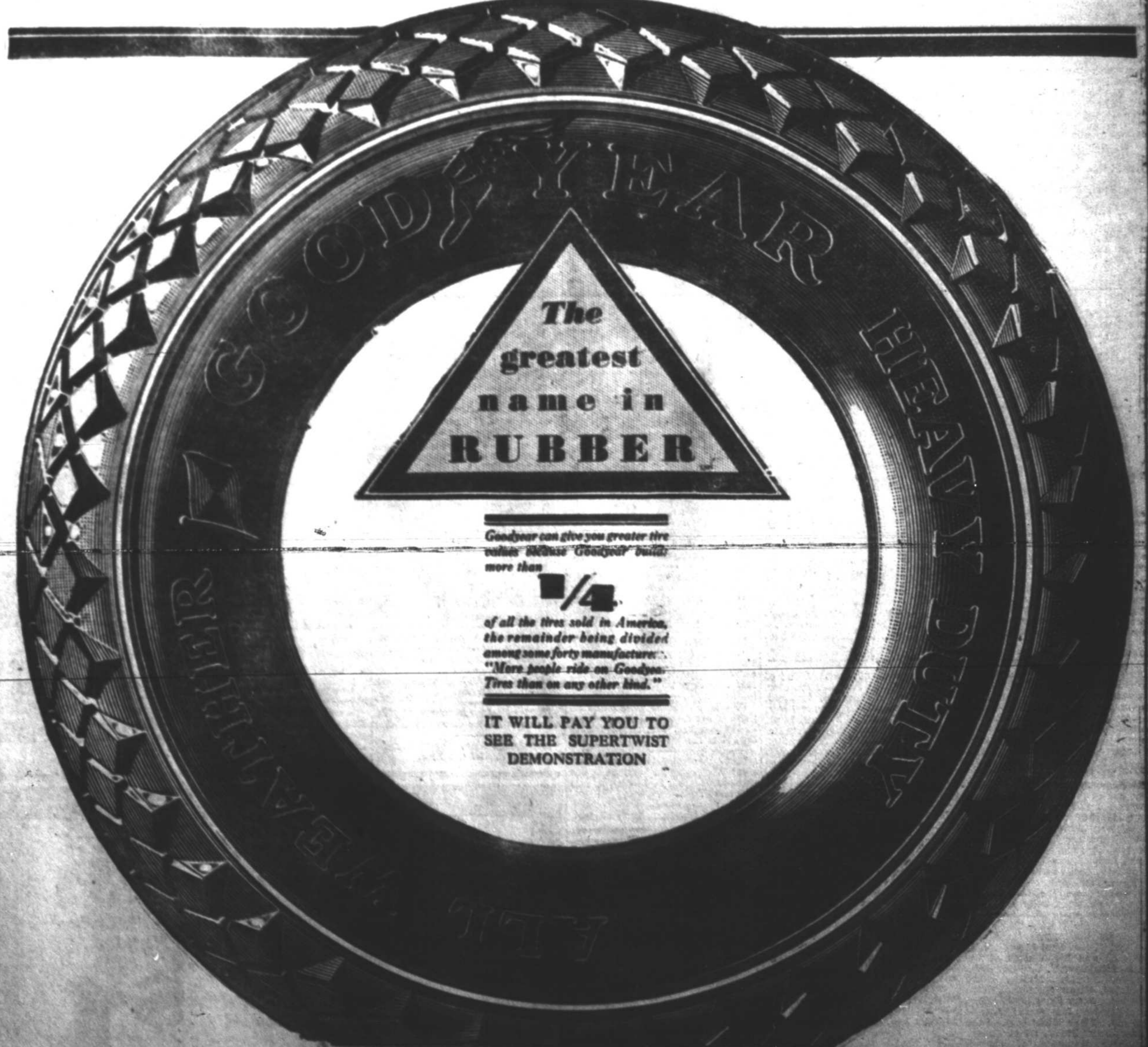

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## Freight Rate Increase Seen For Railways

### Combination Of Recent Court Decisions And Business Conditions Expected To Cause General Advance

WASHINGTON, June 4. (P)—A combination of recent court decisions and business conditions are regarded here as placing American railroads in an advantageous technical position to seek a general advance in freight rates.

Thus far there have been no authoritative announcements from railroad quarters of an intention to take advantage of the situation, although a move in that direction would cause little surprise in Washington quarters most interested.

Since 1920, with trivial exceptions, the course of railroad rate adjustments in the United States has been downward.

### Reduction Invalid

The Supreme court this week, by invalidating a transportation rate reduction which the interstate commerce commission sought to make under its interpretation of the Hoch-Smith resolution, contributed the newest factor to the novel prospect on general rate increase.

The effect of its finding, however, can only be estimated in the light of other new phases in the rate situation.

By the transportation act the commerce commission is required to fix rates that will enable efficient carriers to earn "as nearly as may be" a reasonable return on the capital invested in their properties.

The commission has construed the reasonable return provision to mean 3-4 per cent on property valuation. Since January, railroad earnings have been tending downward, and the bureau of railway economics, an institution maintained in Washington by the carriers, estimates that March and April earnings barely amount to a 3 per cent return on the value of investment in railroad property.

**Not In Effect**

The Hoch-Smith resolution directed the commission to apply to products of agriculture affected by depression the "lowest possible rates compatible with the maintenance of an efficient transportation system," and while the commission has not yet put it into general effect, it did follow its conception of the law in granting a reduction on California deciduous fruit shipments. The court this week ruled that reduction was unlawful, taking into consideration all the effects on rate earnings.

The previous decision bearing upon the situation was rendered a year ago in the valuation test case of the St. Louis and O'Fallon railroad. While the complete result of this controversy will not be known for an indefinite period, the decision is generally regarded as assuring the railroads a legal right to estimate their returns in proportion to a considerably larger valuation than any the commission has been willing to grant as yet.

Thus three of the factors bearing upon rate policies have all been brought to point in one direction. By the O'Fallon decision, railroads are entitled to claim larger earnings to justify the larger estimate of value forecasted for the property; by the current monthly returns they are falling short of what has been construed officially as a "reasonable return," and by the Hoch-Smith resolution the commission has been directed to revise its conception of justifiable reductions.

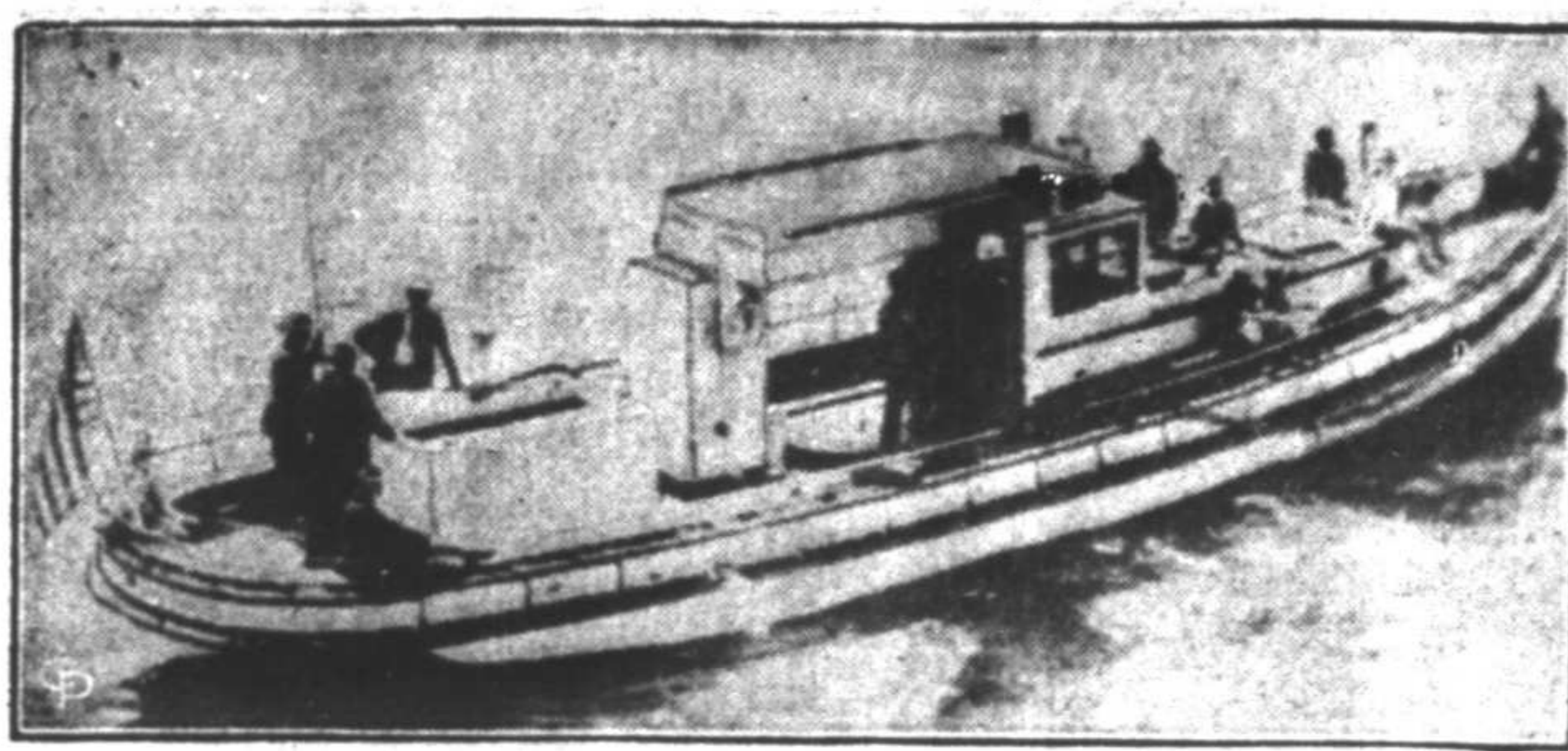

Those indicted included Everett C. Minner, county attorney of Ford county, Marcus Gorge, Wichita, and others accused in connection with the alleged southern Kansas liquor conspiracy ring. Fifty of this number were included in one indictment charging conspiracy to violate the national prohibition law. Names of other defendants were not made public, but 28 of the indictments were said by Dan B. Cowie, assistant United States district attorney, to be the result of the jury's investigation last week into the distribution of adulterated Jamaica ginger throughout the country, and alleged liquor traffic at Leavenworth, Kas.

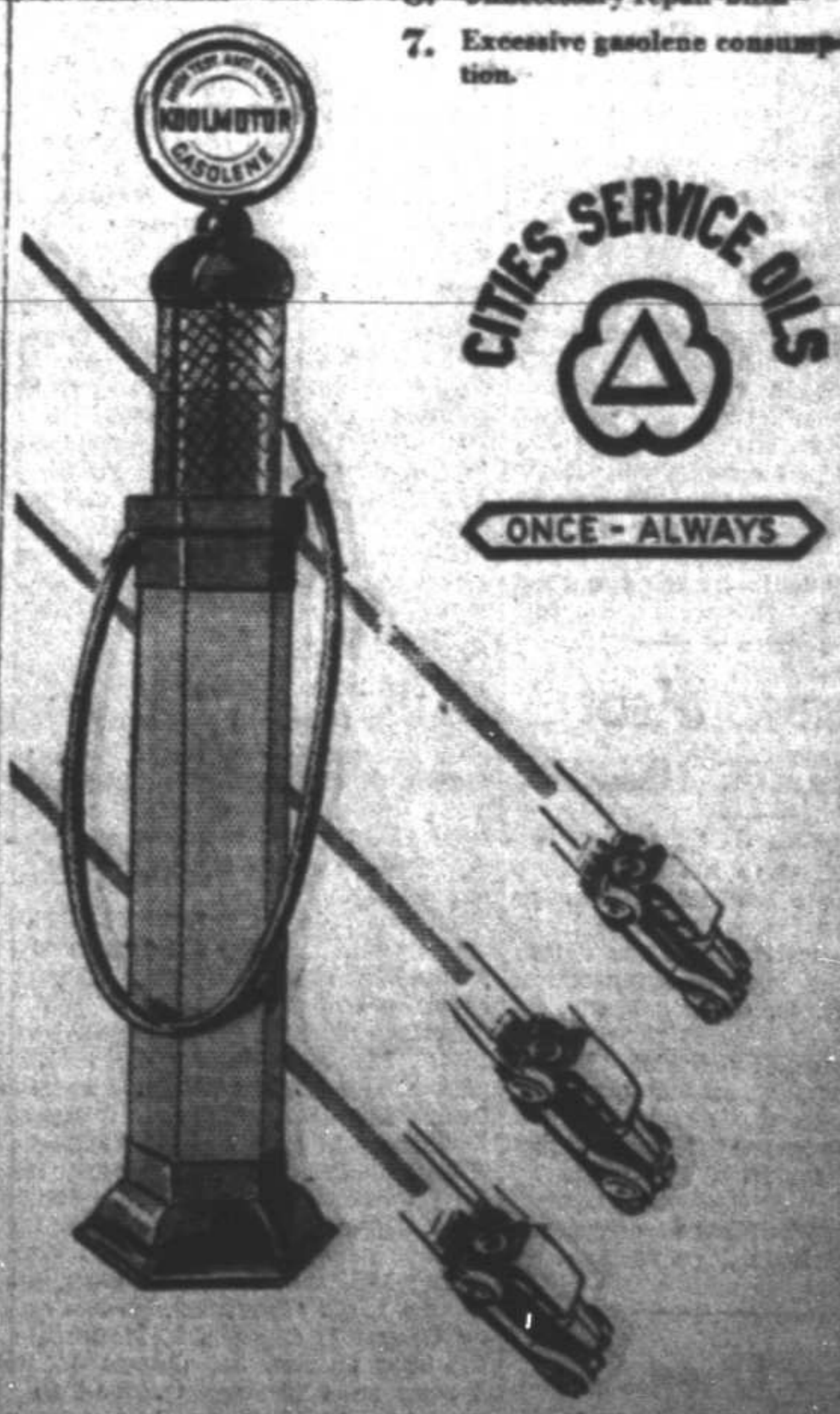

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# Young Farmer Is Charged In Bomb Slaying

Attempts To Weave Web Of Circumstantial Evidence About Leroy Brady Is Made Known In Murder Trial

(By Associated Press)

ROCKVILLE, Md., June 4.—An attempt to weave a web of circumstantial evidence about Leroy Brady, young farmer and mechanic, accused with his brother Herman, of the New Year's day bomb murder of the latter's 18-year-old bride and two members of her family, was made today as several of the state's 55 witnesses took the stand.

The explosion of the bomb, which struck bedecked with Christmas seals as a belated holiday gift, took place in the home of the parents of Herman's bride, Mrs. Naomi Hall Brady, at Seat Pleasant, near Washington.

Materials Found

Dr. John R. Woods, of Johns Hopkins university and two police detectives from Baltimore, testified they found at the Brady farm materials like fragments of the bomb. Mrs. John Buckley, a neighbor, on whose porch the package was left gave evidence late yesterday of the seal that took the lives of her oldest daughter and of two younger children.

Held Expert

Evidence will be presented, Special Prosecutor J. Wilson Ryan told the jury to show that Leroy was an expert at devising theft-proof locks and fashioning automatic guns to kill marauding animals. Thus far the state, however, has kept hidden its theory of the motive for the crime, and both the brothers have protested they could have had no motive.

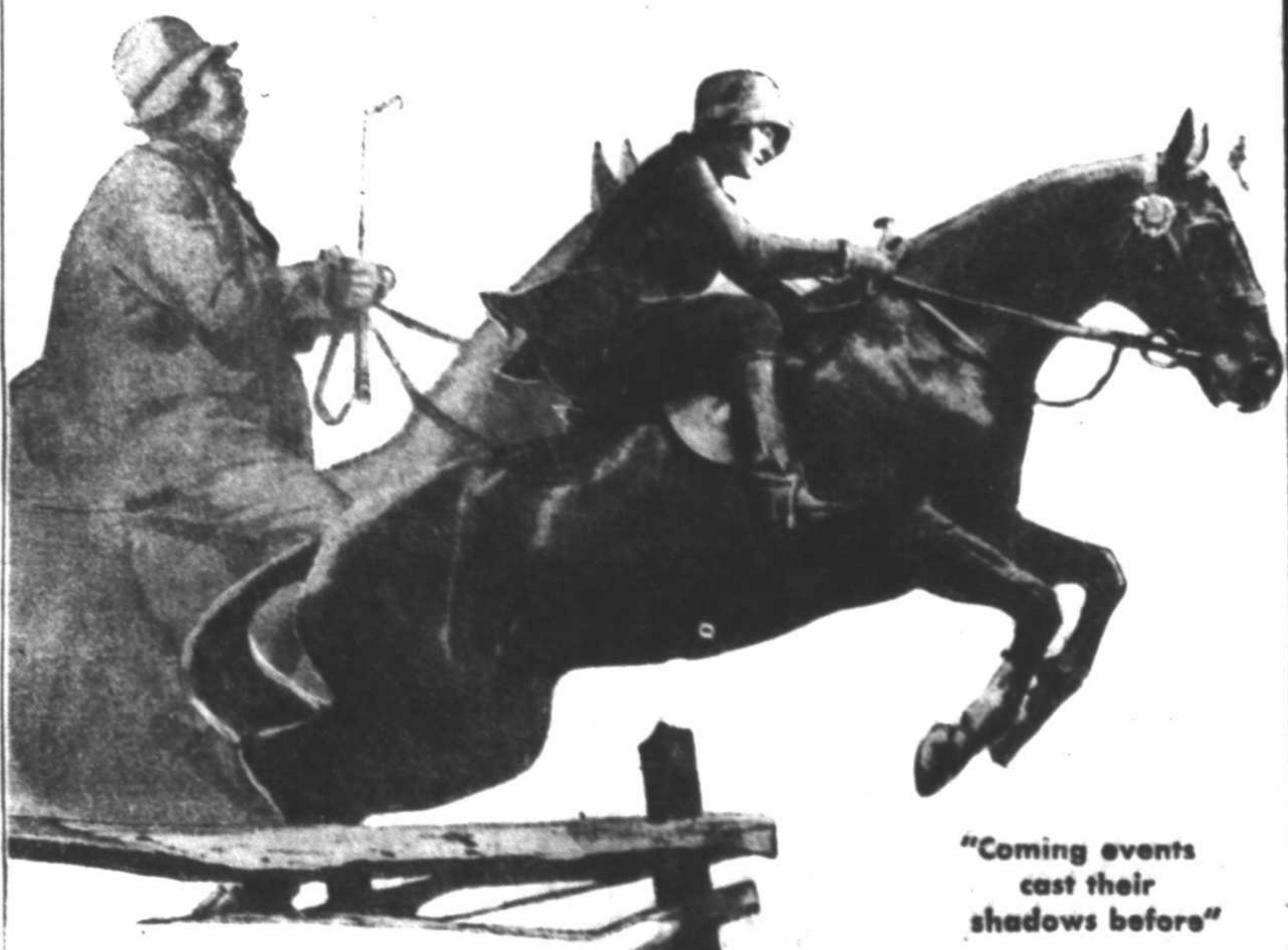

# Tariff Action This Week Aim Of GOP Group

### Republican Leaders Of Senate Seek To Work Out Agree- ment For Speedy Vote On Impending Measure

WASHINGTON, June 4. (AP)—Republican leaders of the senate today sought to work out an arrangement that would insure a vote on the tariff bill by end of the week. Repeated in an effort to obtain an agreement for a roll call late in the afternoon on the supplementary conference report, containing the proposed flexible clause, they nevertheless were hopeful that way could be cleared for early disposition of the bill.

**Prevents Agreement**  
A democratic spokesman, Senator Simmons of North Carolina, ranking minority member of the finance committee, prevented the proposed agreement for a vote today. Senator McNary, the assistant republican leader, proposed such an agreement late yesterday, but Simmons objected on the ground that several members wished to speak before taking roll call.

With Senator Norris, independent republican, Nebraska, Simmons opposed much time might be saved, if the two conference reports could be considered at once. Only the supplementary report is now before the senate. It contains but six provisions, including the flexible clause and the lumber tariff, while the other sections of the report contain hundreds of rate sections.

**Return Likely**  
A belief persisted in the senate today that when the latter is submitted points of order will be raised against it necessitating its return to conference. It has already been approved by the house, and additional changes in conference would require further action by that branch of congress.

# River Levees Still Intact In Louisiana

### Determined Effort Is Made By Workers To Stem Flood As Crest Nears; Conditions Better In Upper Valley

ALEXANDRIA, La., June 4. (AP)—River levees here held intact today, as the result of determined and undiminished effort by levee workers to stem the flood, the crest of which was believed to be fast approaching. The town of Pineville, of several thousand inhabitants across the river from Alexandria, seemed safe, although the river had reached a height where it was necessary to top the levee to prevent water flowing over the top.

**Flood Near Crest**  
As revised by the United States weather bureau at New Orleans, the flood crest prediction for Alexandria stood at not over 41 feet, or one and four-tenths feet below tide height attained in the flood of 1927. The levees along the lower stretch of the Red river, near Marksville, in Avoyelles parish, still held after the strengthening of a weak spot in the Benrush Cross levee. The lower section of the valley still has much water yet in sight however. Cattle has been removed to high ground.

**Conditions Better**  
In the upper valley conditions were brightening. Many of the 15,000 refugees have already begun to return to their homes from which they were driven by water, and rail and highway transportation continued to be restored.

The Louisiana legislature has under consideration a resolution by Senator R. E. Knott of Lincoln parish appropriating \$20,000 for relief of flood sufferers.

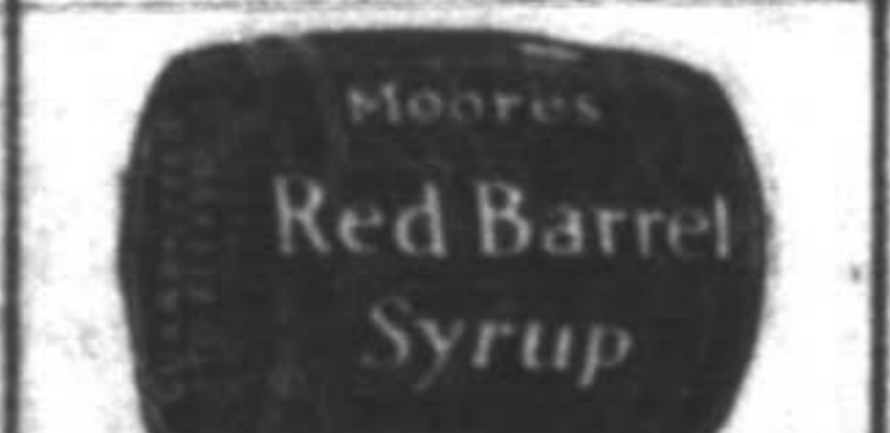
# Fort Worth Final Census Announced

HEAD OF CAMPAIGN FUND COMMITTEE ADVOCATES THAT GOVERNMENT PAY ELECTION EXPENSES OF CANDIDATES

(The fourth and last of a series on campaign fund investigations.)

WASHINGTON, June 4.—The solution of the problem of political campaign expenditures appears to me, says Chairman Gerald P. Nye of the senate committee on investigation of the cost of this year's primary and election fights for U. S. senate seats, "to lie in the payment of all such expenses by the government."

Each aspirant for honors at the polls is required to make a substantial cash deposit, in order to have his name placed on the official ballot.

As an alternative, Senator Nye suggests a primary primary—with a low maximum expense account limit—say two or three hundred dollars—enough to keep out the pure pests who otherwise always would run, but not enough to bar serious entrants from participation in the wide-spread-out contest.

With every fresh outcry against it, with nominal restrictions constantly being tightened, with a fresh investigation following or accompanying every primary and every election, with scandal ensuing after scandal, the figures continue to mount higher and higher.

Other papers accredited the plan, or kept silent—but not for long. Right on the heels of the reward's announcement came other "robberies" and men were shot down in short order.

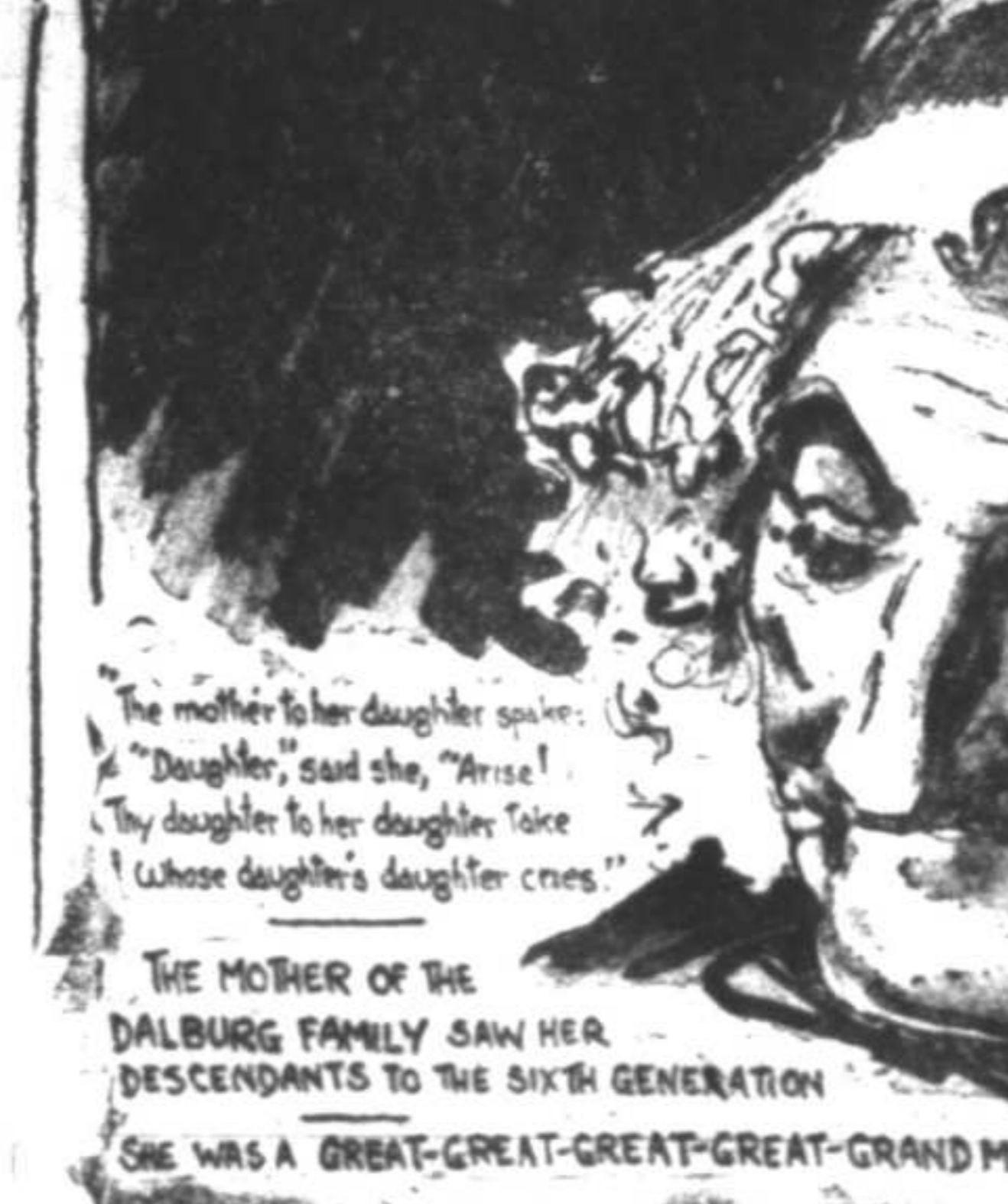

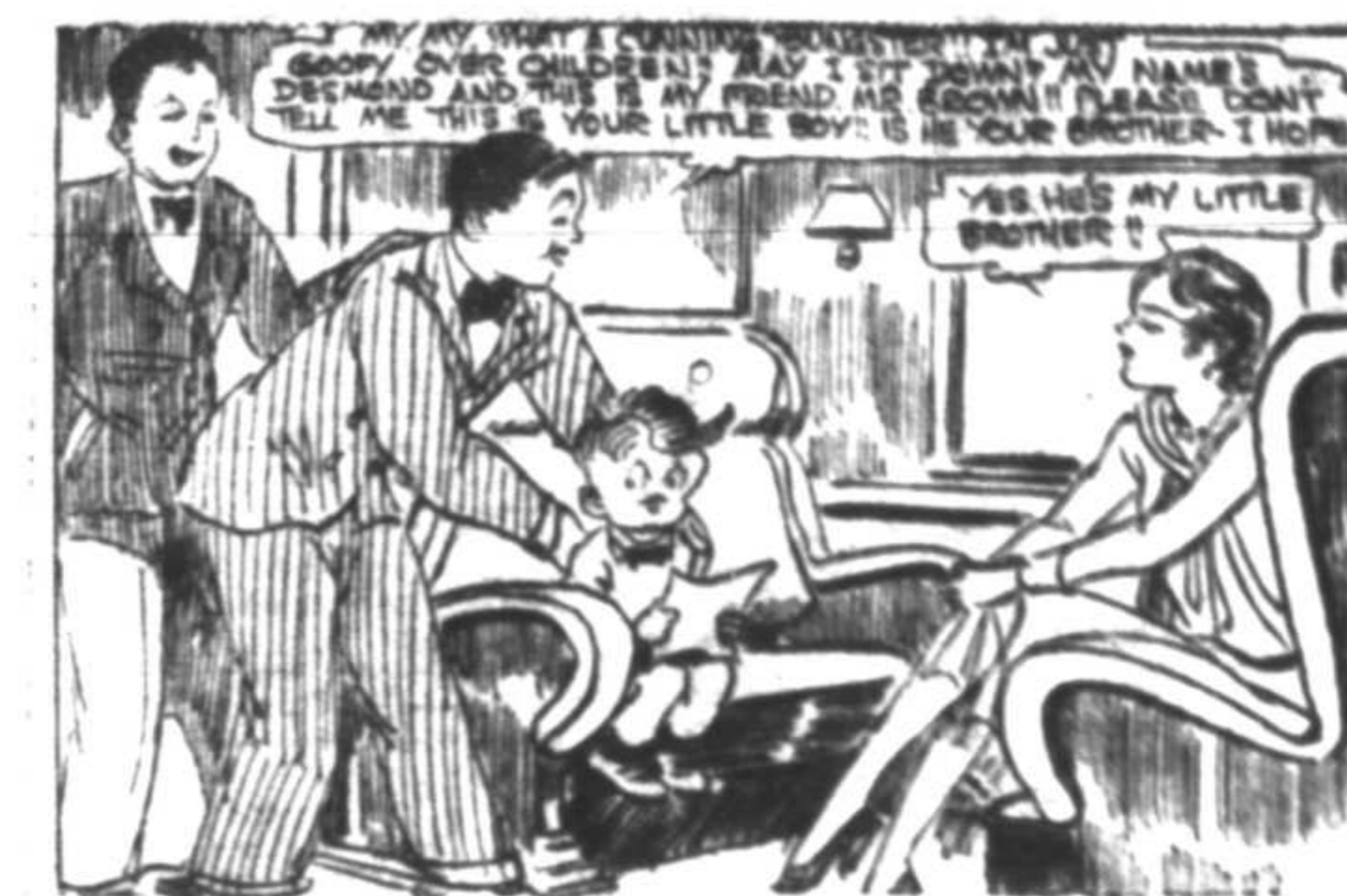

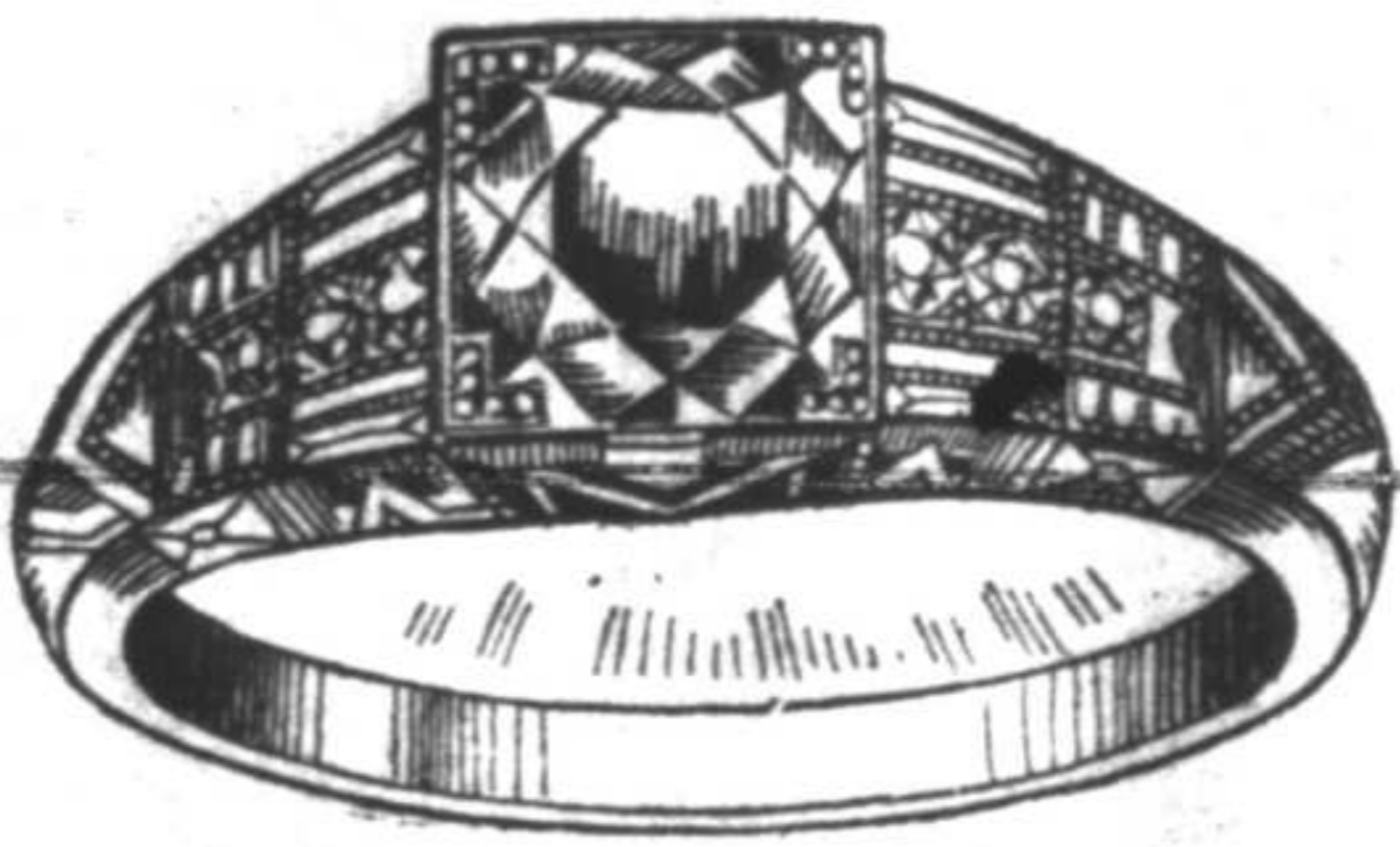
