Those who feel that the payments to World War veterans constitute an undue drain on the American treasury, which no government can reduce without running great political risks, should cast their eyes for a moment at the difficulties the French government is having with its bureaucracy.

The French government has some 800,000 employees. They are well organized and militant. For years they resisted efforts to reduce either their numbers or their pay. Successive parliaments shied away from the job of cutting the federal payroll.

Now the government is moving. A tenth of the 800,000 have been ordered discharged, and 10 per cent of the pay of those who remain is to be slashed. Otherwise, the French budget cannot be balanced. And the workers are up in arms. New riots are feared as a result of the move. All in all, the French face a problem so knotty it makes our difficulties over Veterans' Bureau expenses seem rather mild.

How To Make A Tropical Pie

Tropical Pie
3 egg yolks, 1 cup Imperial sugar, 1-8 teaspoon salt, 1-3 cup flour, 1 cup water, 3 tablespoons lemon juice, 2-3 cup crushed pineapple, 1-4 cup orange juice, 2 tablespoons butter.

Beat yolks one minute. Add sugar, beat until creamy. Add salt and flour and when blended add rest of ingredients. Cook in double boiler until thick and creamy. It will require about 15 minutes to thicken. Stir frequently. Pour into baked pie shell and spread with meringue.

Meringue
3 egg whites, 1-2 cup Imperial sugar.

Beat whites until stiff. Add sugar and beat until creamy. Roughly spread over filling. Bake 15 minutes in slow oven. Cool and serve.

Jellied Tuna Mold for Six
(Can be made the day before)

1 package lemon flavored gelatin mixture, 1-2 cups boiling water, 1-3 cup salad dressing, 1 cup tuna, flaked; 1-2 cup diced celery, 2 tablespoons chopped pimientos, 2 tablespoons chopped sweet pickles, 3 hard cooked eggs, diced; 1-4 teaspoonful salt.

Pour water over gelatin mixture and stir until dissolved. Cool. Add rest of ingredients and pour into glass mold. Chill until stiff. Unmold on lettuce, garnish with bits of pimientos and asparagus and top with more dressing.

Fruit Compote in Orange Baskets
1 cup diced oranges, 1 cup diced grapefruit, 1 cup diced pineapple, 1 cup white cherries, seeded; 1-3 cup Imperial sugar, 8 sprigs mint.

Mix and chill fruits and sugar. Arrange in little baskets made from orange skins, top with mint or any other greenery. Serve on paper doilies.

Egg Souffle
(Baked in Custard Cups)

1-3 cup butter, 1-3 cup flour, 2 cups milk, 6 egg yolks, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1-4 teaspoon paprika, 1 teaspoon chopped parsley, 1-4 teaspoon celery salt, 6 egg whites, beaten.

Melt butter, add flour. Blend and add milk; cook until thick, creamy sauce forms. Stir constantly. Add yolks and seasonings and beat one minute. Fold in egg whites. Fill buttered custard cups 2-3 full. Set in pan of hot water and bake 35 minutes in slow oven. Carefully unmold and serve.

Muffins
3 cups pastry flour, 6 teaspoons baking powder, 1-2 cup Imperial sugar, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 3 egg yolks, 1-2 cups milk, 6 tablespoons butter, melted; 3 egg whites, beaten.

Mix flour, baking powder, sugar, salt. Add yolks, milk. Beat one minute. Add rest of ingredients and half fill buttered muffin pans or paper cups. Bake 15 minutes in moderate oven.

Leftover Recipes

Ham and Chicken Timbales
3 tablespoons butter, 4 tablespoons flour, 2 cups milk, 3 eggs beaten; 1 cup diced chicken, 2-3 cup diced cooked ham, 1-2 cup cream, 1-4 teaspoon salt, 1-4 teaspoon paprika, 1-4 teaspoon celery salt, 1 teaspoon chopped parsley, 1-4 teaspoon chopped onion.

Melt butter, add flour. When blended add milk and cook until creamy sauce forms. Stir constantly. Add rest of ingredients. Fill individual pans or custard cups. Set in pan of hot water, bake 35 minutes in slow oven. Unmold on platter, surround with sauce.

Creamy Sauce
3 tablespoons butter, 4 tablespoons flour, 2 cups milk, 1-4 teaspoon paprika, 1-4 teaspoon celery salt, 1-4 teaspoon salt, 2 egg yolks.

Melt butter, add flour. Mix and add milk and cook until creamy sauce forms. Add rest of ingredients, mix well and serve.

Sunshine Salads
6 slices canned pineapple, 6 canned each halves, 1-2 cup diced celery, 1 tablespoon preserved ginger, 1-2 cup shredded salted almonds, 1-2 cup mayonnaise, 1-2 cup whipped cream.

Chill ingredients. Combine mayonnaise and cream. Arrange pineapple on lettuce and top with peaches, hollow side up. Mix celery, ginger and nuts and stuff peaches. Cover with mayonnaise mixture.

Delectable Squash Dishes

Properly Cooked Squash is One of the Most Edible Summer Dishes. The gardener who has a fairly large piece of available ground and neglects the summer squashes and marrows is missing one of summer's most delicious offerings. This is no doubt due to the imperfect knowledge of preparing these delicious vegetables. One is so accustomed to finding them cooked in such a "soupy," unattractive manner that it is the natural thing to ignore them, whereas they can be made a dish fit for the most discriminating epicure.

Boiling the squash is the most ordinary method of preparation, and it is true that this manner permits of a mushy texture. It may be eliminated to a large extent, however, by draining well before serving. A better way is to bake the squash, or it may be fried in much the same manner as egg plant. Marrows are best fried. Follow this procedure for frying squashes and marrows: slice vegetables into slabs about one-half inch thick, dip them in milk in which an egg has been beaten, and then after breading them with crumbs, fry in deep fat. An ordinary skillet may be used in place of deep frying provided that adequate grease is used to prevent burning. They may be tugged like pancakes. If you forget your aversion to these two vegetables until you have these two vegetables until cooking them, you will be pleasantly surprised to find that they represent a delicious addition to your summer table.

Still another method of serving squashes is peculiarly available to the home gardener. It is the boiling of fruits which are just a few days old, boiling briefly with the skin on and serving them with melted butter like asparagus. The Italian marrow is especially suited to this treatment. Pick it when it is about 1 inch thick, when cold it may be sliced and served with

mayonnaise. All summer squashes may be served the same way in the baby stage.

The squashes like a rich, loamy soil. Plant them in rows from 3 to 4 feet apart, and in hills about the same distance apart in rows. The same cultural instructions apply in the case of the marrows, except when planting the vining types, where 8 to 10 feet should be allowed between the rows, as well as the hills. Succession planting every two weeks is a good plan, as it will assure a constant fresh supply of young vegetables for the summer months.

TEXAS TOPICS

Another "thou shalt" will add to the burden of many property insurers throughout Texas this year. At the same time, basic rates themselves will raise the premium costs to property insurers of Austin and other cities.

The state board of insurance commissioners has approved the proposition of insurance companies to compel any person who wants to take tornado insurance also to pay for hail insurance, whether the property owner chooses to buy hail insurance or not. The charge is \$1 per thousand, or about a \$3 annual levy upon the ordinary home owner.

Many people of Texas have not chosen to buy hail insurance; but now they either will pay it or will abandon tornado insurance. Except of mortgaged property where they are compelled to furnish storm insurance, and thus are roped in on the charge for hail coverage, it is apparent that the cancellation of tornado insurance will offset the extra income from compulsory types. But then, at least 99 per cent of all the premiums on hail insurance in Texas is net profit.

In and for Austin, the state insurance supervisors have approved a change as to residences which will increase the cost of fire insurance about 15 per cent. The same form of increase was proposed for other cities of the same rank.

Property owners of Texas have suffered seriously in respect to insurance—and particularly automobile owners—in that the state is without an independent investigating and rate-making agency that could check up on the validity of ever-growing demands of the companies.

As it is, the people who pay the bill are unprotected and all the state, with its present facilities can do, is to inquire, "any objection?" and then put into effect whatever tables or schedules the companies propose.

Claiming organizations in 175 out of the 254 counties, the Young Democrats of Texas organization has called its second annual state convention to be held in Dallas Friday and Saturday, May 4 and 5, according to notices sent out by J. Cullen Looney of Edinburg, state president.

Richard F. Roper of Washington, secretary of the democratic national committee and Cliff Woodward, Des Moines, president of the Young Democrats of America, have accepted invitations to attend this Texas meeting, it was announced. State Chmn. J. K. Brim, Sulphur Spring, Roy Miller, Corpus Christi, who was director of the national campaign in Texas in 1932, have been invited to address the meeting.

Announcement has just been made that J. T. Scott, Jr., Houston, has accepted South Texas chairmanship of Maury Hughes' campaign for governor.

This was forecast several days ago, when Mr. Hughes addressed a state meeting of the Thomas Jefferson society in Houston, sponsored by the young democrats.

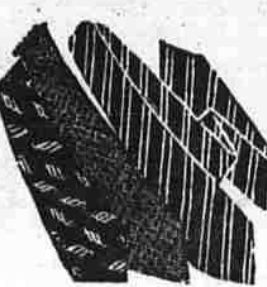

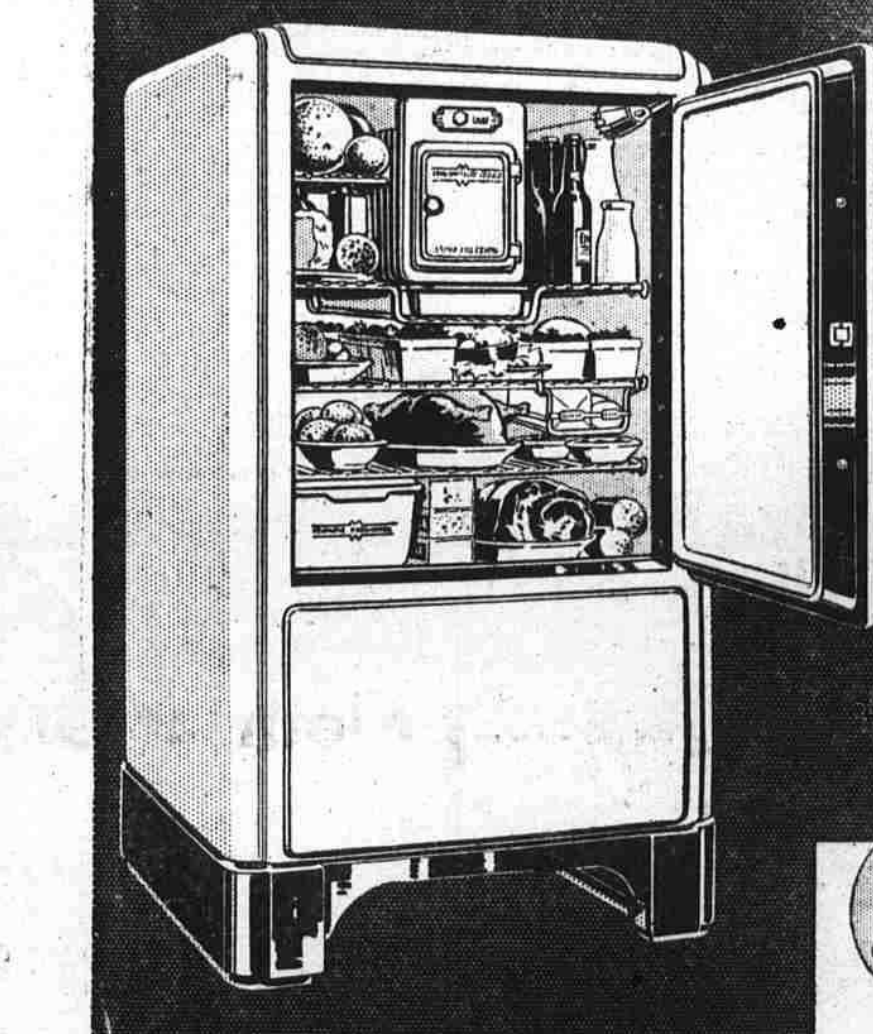

C. C. McDONALD DELIVERS OPENING CAMPAIGN SPEECH FOR GOVERNOR AT BONHAM

BONHAM—An old-age pension plan to abolish the poorhouse, and a state-supported home-ownership plan to abolish tenantry, were proposed by former Sen. C. C. McDonald of Wichita Falls, Ferguson-supported candidate for governor, in opening his campaign here this 88th anniversary of San Jacinto.

The cost of each mile of state highway would buy four 160-acre farms and change four tenants in to owners, McDonald said.

The former senator, long-time anti-prohibition leader, who managed the statewide campaign last year to ratify repeal of the 18th amendment and legalize beer in Texas, stressed his old-age pension, retirement fund for workmen, and his labor plank for taxing machinery that replaces man-power.

He outlined his proposal for a \$15 to \$30 per month state pension for the aged, and said it would prove an actual saving to the state a money, as well as in humanitarian values. He said 29 states have adopted the plan.

Sen. McDonald condemned the multiple employment of kinship people by government agencies, urged a strong nepotism law, and denounced national and state policies of raising tax-exempt securities. He said most of the wealth of Texas escapes taxation, and blamed the exemption of the mortgage while the debtor-owner pays taxes on property.

McDonald opened his speech with a short personal sketch of his "Methodist ancestry," and recited his family came to this country two generations ago.

He declared his home-ownership plan foremost of all the things he will advocate. He urged a constitutional amendment extending state credit for the purchase of homesteads, either farms or in the cities.

Continuation of reduced state appropriations, putting an end to issuance of tax-free bonds, retention of the two-year equity of redemption law, he advocated, along with repeal of all state property taxes on real estate and substitution of a capital tax on corporations and an intangible tax on monopoly business, and a severance tax on natural resources.

He advocated a tax on machinery according to the number of men it rendered jobs; state laws to protect workers in collective bargaining, to restrict exorbitant executive salaries, a six-hour day and 30-hour week.

McDonald told his hearers he will do his utmost, if elected, to maintain the scholastic apportionment at the present \$18, but will not favor increasing it; and will try to hold down school expenditures for plant and equipment, and will oppose creation of any more salaries, supplementing the present figure number.

"Twenty-nine states," he said, of the old-age pension plans, "have abolished poor houses and adopted old-age pensions, because this plan is economical and humane, and in every state tremendous savings have been made to taxpayers, and more people have been cared for."

"Democracy," he said, "is a fallacy unless it can make the values of life accessible to the normal man, instead of concentrating the proceeds of industry in the hands of a few. I stand squarely behind President Roosevelt's new economic creed which liberated a million children from factories and sweatshops. I do not want to see the people of Texas pauperized. They must not be charity or handouts. They must be made to work, and must be made to pay taxes, and must be made to contribute to the state. "To provide opportunity for universal home ownership in town and country, to equalize the burdens of taxation, to repeal state-wide prohibition and substitute strict supervision, to pension our aged and infirm, to secure just rights and wages for working men and women, and to provide a permanent system of universal and worthwhile education, shall constitute the foundation stones of my candidacy and efforts for a permanent relief and prosperity program."

Texas Oil Allowable Is Raised

Railroad Commission Fixes Increase At 15,561 Barrels

AUSTIN (AP)—Allowable production from Texas oil fields Friday was raised to 1,009,660 barrels daily, effective 7 a. m., April 25 to June 1, by the Texas railroad commission. An increase of 15,561 barrels daily was ordered for four districts.

No change was made in the East Texas field allocation of five percent of the hourly potential. Allowable production on that basis was estimated at 462,000 barrels daily.

New allowables by districts are: Gulf coast 168,068 barrels, 6,826 barrels increase; West Texas 137,789 barrels, 3,907 barrels increase; West Central 31,000, 4,500 barrels; East Central 50,246 barrels, 1,449 barrels increase, and South-Central 52,107 barrels, 121 barrels increase.

Allowables for other districts were unchanged as Panhandle 62,000 barrels and North Texas 54,900 barrels.

A daily allowable of 1,500 barrels was fixed for the new Cayuga field in Anderson county.

Maximum production of 980,700 barrels daily from Texas fields in April and May was recommended by Harold L. Ickes, secretary of interior and federal oil administrator. At a state wide hearing, producers filed nominations for 1,140,000 barrels daily in April and 1,148,000 barrels daily in May.

LOCAL OIL MEN NONE TOO JUBILANT OVER ORDER

Local oil men were none too jubilant over the increase in oil allowable for West Texas, which includes the Howard-Glasscock county fields. The 3,907 barrel daily increase has been set aside for twenty-four counties in the Permian basin, and it was not known Saturday just what part of this would be allotted to Howard-Glasscock area. The present allowable for Howard-Glasscock is 17,500 barrels daily, and local refiners and oil men were anxious that this amount be raised to at least 25,000 barrels, in order to supply local needs.

600 Shots Per Minute Can Be Fired From Thompson Gun

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Roosevelt Saturday signed the Bankhead Compulsory Cotton Control bill, declaring its purpose "is to place the cotton growing industry on a sound financial and economic basis."

Air Mail Bill Gets Approval By Postoffice

WASHINGTON (AP)—The house postoffice committee Monday approved the administration's temporary airmail bill authorizing the postmaster general to make one-year contracts and calling for creation of a special commission to make a general survey and to recommend a general aviation policy. The bill would set airmail postage at five cents an ounce.

5 Per Cent Salary Increase Granted To Western Union Workers

The Western Union Telegraph notified local employees Wednesday of a 5 per cent increase in salaries. E. J. Cook, manager, reported Saturday. This is in addition to a 10 per cent raise and bonus granted in 1933, and is within 6 per cent of the highest salary paid to employees, said Mr. Cook.

This increase was effective from April 15, and effects employees of the entire system.

CLINT C. SMALL IN OPENING CAMPAIGN SPEECH AT MEXIA URGES OIL, GAS COMMISSION

Sam Eason's Mother Dies

MEXIA—Senator Clint C. Small of Amarillo, opening his campaign for governor here Friday afternoon, advocated creation of a separate oil, gas and natural resources commission, expansion of the railroad commission to broad policy supervision, urged a broad policy of social legislation for increased state services and pledged his efforts to prevent diversion of gas line taxes from the highway fund.

Senator Small was the second candidate to begin the speaking phase of the governor's race, following James V. Alford by 10 days. His speech preceded one day that of C. C. McDonald at Bonham and Tom F. Hunter at Clifton Station and while Maury Hughes will open at McKinney Saturday of next week and Lieut. Gov. Edgar E. Witt who has made several radio talks will postpone general speaking engagements until May.

Sen. Small, who is making his second race for governor, told his Mexia audience that old age pensions, mother's pensions, unemployment insurance, state services, health care and cure of crippled children, tuberculosis and the insane were "legitimate subjects" for state attention under the new deal.

Small devoted much of his speech to a demand that agencies for catching, trying and punishing criminals be modernized and said these reforms can be achieved and the state saved \$500,000 by the legislation he will advocate. He urged consolidation of the ranger and highway patrol into a state constabulary adequately equipped to deal with the crime situation.

Among his planks, one a reversal of his former day stand, Sen. Small advocated resubmission and repeal of the state prohibition amendment, to the end of more adequate enforcement, with provisions to allow any area to remain dry by local option.

He warned the audience that little more can be done to cut state expenses and said he will favor economy by suspending temporarily such functions as can be spared, but that the chief economy will be to make the civil courts and various licensing and supervisory state agencies more nearly supported out of fees. He urged reduction of the number of civil appeals courts and great simplification of court procedure, with fees graduated up for appeals in the civil courts. He pointed to his own bills already making courts more readily available to speed criminal cases.

Sen. Small urged that felony prosecutions be permitted on complaint and abolishing the grand jury system. He advocated a constitutional amendment to create a pardon board appointed by the supreme court and the governor, and including the attorney general, the governor having only veto power over its acts.

Small would create, he said, a strong state police force, equip the men with radio and adequate arms and transportation facilities and set up a system of state identification bureau to aid the work.

He said he would "stop the wholesale pardoning of criminals." He said the state needs a three-member commission to handle oil, gas and natural resources matters exclusively, taking in the duties of the railroad commission in this respect, and of the board of mineral development and a board of water engineers. He said the railroad commission should be converted into a general utility regulation body. Sen. Small urged full support of the public schools and college system, though he opposed the plank advocated by others by taking one cent of the gasoline tax to supplement school funds. "As Governor," he said, "I would not retreat, but lead a charge for the betterment of education."
