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Work On Connellee Theater Is Halted Because Of Government Building Freeze

Work on remodelling the Connellee Theater was halted abruptly Tuesday when Aubrey Brann, local manager for Inter-Theaters, received word from headquarters of the chain that the work should be suspended.

It was told that work on all show houses being built in the county was to be halted at the same time because of the recent government freeze order.

Work on the theater already had advanced to the point where it was impossible to hold further shows there. Seats had been taken down and interior trim ripped out.

Brann Garner, district manager for the theater organization, said Thursday that he had no further word on the stoppage. He advised the Dallas office that if it would bear any weight, he could take a delegation of Eastland citizens to the proper governmental agency to tell of the necessity for the work here.

With work on remodelling the Connellee Theater either under way or not, depending on the day of the week, Brann Garner of Ranger, district manager for Interstate Theaters, is wondering what he is going to do with his hearse.

Like your scribe, you may be wondering what a hearse has to do with remodelling a show house, but in this case, it does have a connection.

It seems that quite some years ago Garner found this hearse at a bargain and bought it. He had free storage for it for about 15 years, but that eventually played out, as most free things do, and he had to find a new storage place. Casting about in his mind, he thought of the huge and empty backstage area of the Connellee, and there the hearse is right now.

Of course this wasn't just any old hearse, or Garner would never have bought it in the first place. It is an old horse-drawn vehicle that was brought by sea from New York to Galveston some 80 or 85 years ago, and thence taken to Thurber when that one-time metropolis of Texas was on the boom.

Now the very houses of Thurber are gone never to return, but the town's once-shiny hearse gathers dust backstage at the Connellee—and soon will have to seek still another resting place.

Garner, who recently bought a part interest in the Gholson Hotel in Ranger, said that a fellow once said to him, "You'd buy the Brooklyn Bridge if they'd sell it to you with a low enough down payment, wouldn't you?"

To which Garner said he replied, "Yes, and think of what a lovely toll bridge it would make!"

Watermelon Group Widens Program; To Erect Market

Widening of the scope of the Carbon Watermelon Growers Association and increasing its program was agreed on at a meeting of the newly formed association Monday night as it was agreed to buy a lot in Carbon and erect a shed for handling retail sales of produce grown by members.

Later in the week, the lot was reported purchased, and a shed located and bought to move to it.

To be handled by the group will be cantaloupes, peaches and other produce as well as watermelons, if grown in marketable quantities.

It was reported that approximately 500 acres of watermelons had been or will be planted, mostly in the Carbon area, but also in other sections of the county. Any farmer in the county is eligible to join the association.

Six new members were reported. A goal of the "first melon by July 4" was set, and it was announced that prizes will be given for the first melon and the biggest melon grown by members.

Three directors of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, L. E. McGraw, Robert D. Vaughan and Theo H. Lamb, attended the meeting, and pledged support of themselves and other Eastland business men to the group. All three bought memberships in the association, and it was agreed that other sustaining memberships will be sold to other Eastland business firms that wish to take them.

It was said that watermelons this year should bring from \$35 to \$45 a ton. The Eastland County melons will be shipped to all points where there is a market.

Elbert Richardson of Carbon, is president of the association.

Clean-Up Campaign Is Termed Success

Officials of the Eastland Civic League and Garden Club this week praised residents of Eastland for the whole-hearted way they had co-operated in the recent clean-up campaign, and said that they believed Eastland looked cleaner and neater than it ever had before.

City Manager K. B. Tanner said that there was a mistaken belief on the part of some that city trucks would remove anything during the drive, regardless of size, and that some people had put out objects such as large logs to be picked up.

City trucks cannot handle such objects, he said, and they should be removed at the householder's expense.

Many persons voluntarily have removed loads of trash to the city dump, Tanner said, without city help.

Track Team Wins From Cisco, Aims For District Meet

Eastland's track team, which could be called not only the trackless wonders but almost the shoeless wonders, won another track meet Tuesday, this time from Cisco, as they primed for the all-important district meet in Gorman Saturday.

Other Interscholastic League contests also will be held Saturday, but all will be in Comanche except track and volleyball in Gorman.

A great many students of the Eastland schools will take part in the contests.

The track preliminaries at Gorman Saturday will begin at 1 p. m., and the finals at 8 p. m.

Coach Chief Warden this week appealed for track shoes as a loan from anyone who has any. The boys especially need sizes 8 and 9½, he said. Eastland High School this year was able to buy only two pairs of track shoes, and other coaches have told Warden he was lucky to get that many.

As it is, the boys as they take part in competition have barely enough shoes to go around among those actually in the events. For instance at Cisco, the relay team would wear the shoes, then pass them on to the broad jumpers, and so on.

Eastland barely skinned by Cisco, 48 points to 47, thanks to some sterling work in the dashes and field events.

Jimmy Mathews won both the 100 and 220 yard dashes, and Bobby Blair was second in the 100. Billy McFarland was first in the 440-yard dash, and Lewis Crossley second. Bill Eddleman was second in the 880 and Jack Chamberlain third.

W. D. Cannon was second in the mile run, and Allen Hunt third. In field events, Herbert Barker won the discus throw, and Johnny Hicks was second; Barker was second in the shot put; Dan Collie was second and James Doss third in the high jump, and Bill Brasher and Dan Collie tied for third in the broad jump.

In junior events, Jim Smith of Eastland was second and Dick Sparks third in the 100-yard dash, and Smith was second and Gene Garner third in the 50-yard dash.

Warden said the team's chances of winning the district meet at Gorman Saturday are excellent, if the competition is no stiffer than it was last year.

"That's something you never can tell about," he said.

Time of the downtown closing whistle in Eastland will be changed Monday to 5:30 p. m. from the present 6 p. m., J. B. Johnson of the Modern Dry Cleaners, who blows the whistle, said this week.

The new time will conform to new closing hours for most downtown business concerns, and will be changed again later if business hours are lengthened again in the fall, Johnson said.

Other times for the whistle, at 8 a. m., 12 noon and 1 p. m., will remain as they are, Johnson said.

Refinishing Work Begins On Carbon To Gorman Highway

Work was started last week on widening the highway between Carbon and Gorman by adding shoulders to each side of the existing pavement, and later a new asphalt surface will be applied, E. M. Pritchard, resident engineer for the State Highway Department, said Thursday.

An \$80,000 appropriation has been made by the State Highway Commission for improving the stretch of highway, long known as one of the worst in Texas.

Pritchard said that although the strip of highway lacks proper foundation, the work being done will improve its riding qualities greatly.

Official Is Added To Aid Unemployed

Bert P. Darden, interviewer for the Texas Unemployment Compensation Commission, has been transferred from Abilene to Eastland as full time claims interviewer for "unemployed claimants and unemployed and self employed veteran claimants" in the Eastland County area, it was announced this week.

His office is located in the U. S. Employment Service office at 311 West Main Street. Hollis Bennett is manager of the employment office.

Darden is a veteran of World War II with a record of service in the European theater as staff sergeant. He and his wife live at 204 West Plummer Street.

Eastland heretofore has been served only as a visiting point for unemployment commission interviewers, but because of increasing number of claims, the full-time interviewer now is necessary, it was said.

Darden's office hours are from 8 a. m. to 3 p. m. except Saturday, when they will be from 8 a. m. to noon.

Lowery Will Head Drive For Funds

W. E. Lowery of Olden has been named as Eastland County chairman of a campaign to raise \$15,000,000 toward the National Americanism Endowment Fund, according to an announcement from Austin. Eastland County's quota has been set at \$1,224, and Texas' goal at \$450,000.

Established by the American Legion, the fund is designed, according to a news release, to "carry on a broad educational program combatting all subversive 'isms' in conflict with the principles of the United States Constitution." President Truman is honorary national chairman and Gov. Coke R. Stevenson is national vice chairman.

Tom Grissom, son of Judge and Mrs. Clyde Grissom of Eastland, took top honors in the Hereford division of the annual Eastland County Livestock Show in Ranger football stadium last Saturday by exhibiting both the grand champion bull and grand champion cow.

More than 200 animals were shown. Attendance was fairly good, and apparently was held down by the unseasonably hot weather, that had both animals and spectators panting.

When the show's sale threatened to become a fiasco because of lack of buyers, a group of Ranger businessmen came to the rescue and bid up prices on the animals to be auctioned.

The champion calf in the fat steer class, shown by Bobby Cleveland of Cisco, brought a top bid of 33 cents a pound from the Merchants State Bank of Ranger. The calf weighed 850 pounds and brought the young owner \$280.50.

Young Cleveland this week was looking for another calf to buy for feeding to show next year. The calf he showed Saturday was bred by his father out of range stock.

Other calves brought good prices, also, with Brann Garner of Ranger bidding in a calf shown by Wilburn McKinney of Cisco at 33 cents a pound. Another McKinney calf went to E. L. Martin for 26½ cents a pound. Other Cisco boys who sold calves were Edward Reich, to M. L. King of the Dr. Pepper Company for 27½ cents, and T. G. Gilbert to Texas Drug Company for 20 cents.

Two fat lambs were auctioned, with the lamb of Don Gene Kurlin of Cisco going to Hall Walker of Ranger for 17 cents, and Travis Kurlin's lamb being bid in by George Campbell for 16½ cents.

Paul Tankersley of Morton Valley exhibited the champion sow in the swine division, and W. T. Eaton of Ranger showed the champion boar. Charles McDaniel had the champion gilt.

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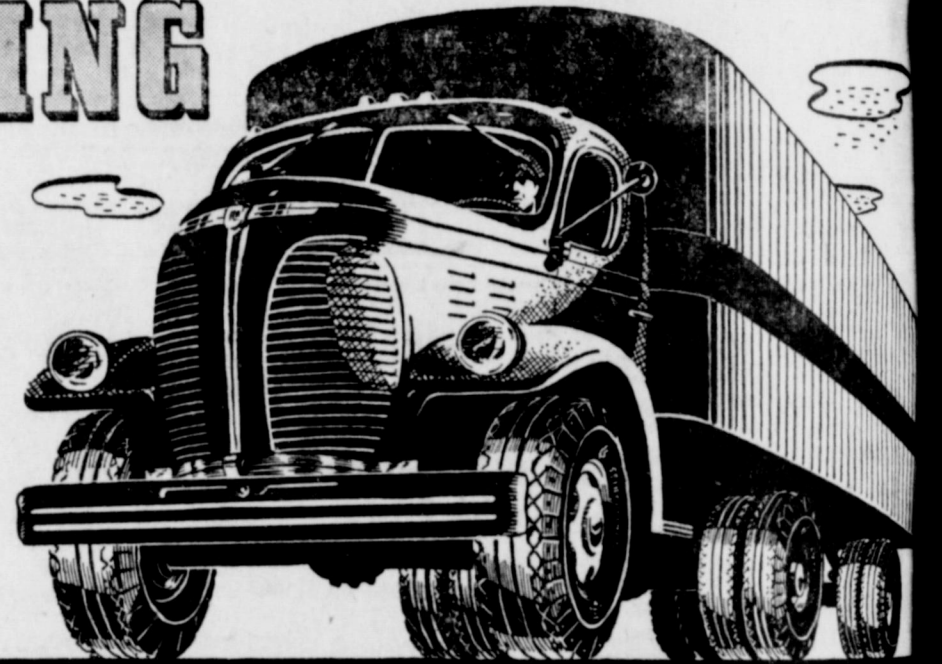

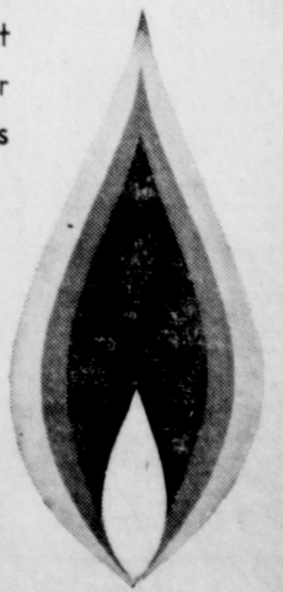
