radiation therapy... Early suspicion, prompt investigation, and treatment are still the most important weapons against cancer.

Cancer is like a forest fire—spread by 'sparks' which are carried off through the blood stream to distant parts of the body. No one can predict when this will take place.

But if a person is able to recognize the early symptoms of cancer, and will see his doctor at the earliest sign, and he makes regular physical check-ups a habit for life, he has in his possession the surest insurance against this disease.

"The person who delays in going to a qualified doctor is only reducing his chances of cure," says J. Louis Neff, executive director of the American Cancer Society, Texas Division. "There is seldom a second chance in cancer treatment. The right treatment must be used the first time."

Mr. Neff warned Texans to beware of advertised "cure alls," patent medicines, and such quick remedies. There are only three accepted methods of treatment—surgery, x-ray, and radium. See your family doctor. Not a cancer quack who advertises a cure.

Fat Calves-Good Beef Now Is Time To Start

Now is the time to start getting that milk pen calf ready for the locker plant this fall, says Roy W. Snyder. You want tender, juicy and tasty beef in your locker box and you can have it if the calf you butcher is fat.

Snyder adds that a thin animal with no external fat usually produces meat that is dry, tough and stringy but a fat calf furnishes the kind of meat that we all like to eat. There is fat mixed with the lean muscles and that is what makes a juicy steak or roast.

Snyder says, he likes a calf that will weigh about 500 pounds on foot and is fat. It will dress out about 270 pounds—135 pounds to the side—and this doesn't include the heart, tongue and liver. It is easy, he says, to cut to fit any size family. The roasts can be cut either large or small and you can't do this with a thin small calf. The short ribs from this kind of calf are also very good. You'll find them juicy and tasty because of that mixture of lean and fat.

A beef type animal is desirable but a milk pen calf makes a good substitute and they are

Jobs In Orchard Can Be Completed After The Growing Season Is Finished

College Station — When the fruit is off the trees and sold, the orchard owner has an opportunity to do some of the jobs that were put off during the growing season. Sucker sprouts are growing on both young and old trees and they should be removed, says J. F. Rosborough, extension horticulturist of Texas A&M College. Otherwise, they will make additional growth during the next 60 days and will take up plant food and moisture that is needed by the tree.

An orchard cleanup program is in order, he thinks. Remove from the orchard all fruit that has fallen on the ground. He says it's probably full of worms and other insects and diseases that could cause a lot of trouble in the orchard next year. You know an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure and a thorough clean up, he says, is that ounce of prevention.

Every tree in the orchard should be checked for San Jose scale, phony and other insects and diseases. If San Jose scale is found, mark the tree and then go back and treat it. Rosborough recommends washing the tree with a mixture of 1 pound of concentrated lime sulphur and 3 gallons of water. Apply the liquid to the frame work branches and the body of the tree, this should hold the scale in check until a thorough job of spraying can be done this winter. If the scale is left unchecked, it may kill the tree. He says to keep the solution off the leaves, if possible, because it will burn them.

The use of a DDT spray mixture for controlling peach borers is becoming more popular, he says. It is made by mixing 3 pounds of 50 per cent wettable DDT powder in 50 gallons of water. Spray the body of the tree thoroughly with the mixture. Also available on most farms, says Snyder. So long as the calf gets milk and good grazing it will do well but when the grass begins to dry up supplemental feeding is necessary. This is the feed that will make the good beef. The grain ration should be increased as the calf gets older and if grazing is not available, it is advisable says Snyder, to feed hay or other roughage with the grain.

though the first application is usually made in early July, a second in early August and a third in early September, Rosborough says there has been little evidence of early borer damage and it is probable that an early August and September spraying will be effective.

In some of the older bearing orchards, a disease known as phony has appeared this year. It is characterized, says Rosborough, by a checking of the current season's growth and the leaves on infected trees take on a peculiar dark green color. The fruit on infected trees is smaller than usual and the crop is light. Trees suspected of having this disease should be removed from the orchard because they are a probable source of infection.

Trees that were abnormal this season and have been on the sick list should be removed and this also applies to those infected with crown gall, nematodes or oak root rot. Do a good job of orchard keeping, he says, and the orchard will help you.

National School Commission Picks DuPont Executive As Staff Director

New York, N. Y.—Henry Toy Jr., 35, Du Pont Company Executive and founder of the Council for Delaware Education, has been appointed Executive Director of the new National Citizens Commission for the Public Schools, Roy E. Larsen, president of Time Inc. and chairman of the Commission, announced recently.

"As a businessman who realizes the vital importance of the public schools to each community as well as to the nation, Mr. Toy has been largely responsible for the dramatic success of the Council for Delaware Education in helping citizens to improve the public schools in communities throughout Delaware," Mr. Larsen said.

"In his capacity as Executive Director of our Commission he will be able to give all his time and the full benefit of his experience to implementing the program outlined by our members. According to part of this program the Commission will act as a clearing house of information to enable one group of citizens endeavoring to improve their local public schools to profit from the experience of others. Mr. Toy will also assist us in carrying out many other projects which we are planning to help encourage the broad public interest in the public schools which we believe is necessary to solve the many existing serious problems which confront the schools today."

The National Citizens Commission for the Public Schools is composed exclusively of laymen, many of them outstanding in business, labor, law and publishing. It was formed last May to work for concerted action by citizens in their own communities. The group has received initial financial support from the Carnegie Corporation and the General Education Board. Its officers are: President, Mr. Larsen; James F. Brownlee, former deputy director of the OPA, vice-chairman; John A. Stevenson, president

of Penn Mutual Life Insurance Co., treasurer, and Leo Perlis, director of the National CIO Community Services Committee, secretary.

The Council for Delaware Education, which Mr. Toy headed for two and a half years after founding it in November of 1946, is a dramatic illustration of what a group of determined citizens can do for their schools. It has been instrumental in achieving many far-reaching school improvements in Delaware. These include increases in teachers salaries, appropriations for the construction of new school buildings, wide-spread legislative changes for the benefit of the schools, and an upsurge in public interest in the schools which has been reflected in a greatly increased number of voters turning out for elections affecting the schools.

Correct Posture Is Necessary To Good Development

Correct posture in school children, and adults as well, is necessary to proper physical and mental development, says a warning from the Texas State Department of Health. "Good posture is a sign of self respect and plays an important part in winning the respect of others," said Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"Many of the ills of childhood and the deformities of adult life have their beginning in poor posture acquired during childhood," he said, "and it is particularly important that the child's posture conform to nature's dictates. Most children are born in good physical condition and yet examination of large groups of school children show a high per cent to be suffering from poor posture. Malnutrition and fatigue are productive of poor

posture. These lessen the size of the chest and decrease the lung capacity. Abdominal organs may also be pushed out of natural position, which may seriously interfere with their action. These conditions must be corrected before the body is able to attain normal weight and nutritional standards.

"School children who have poor posture are said often to average lower in attendance and in school mental and physical activities than those who have good posture. A child may be forced to hold his body in an unnatural position by a desk that is too high or too low. Desks and work tables should be just high enough to allow the feet to rest on the floor and the forearms and hands to rest upon the tops without the shoulders being hunched up.

"Begin early in life to teach your children to stand straight and sit straight for health and self-confidence, and they should grow into strong, well-built men and women."

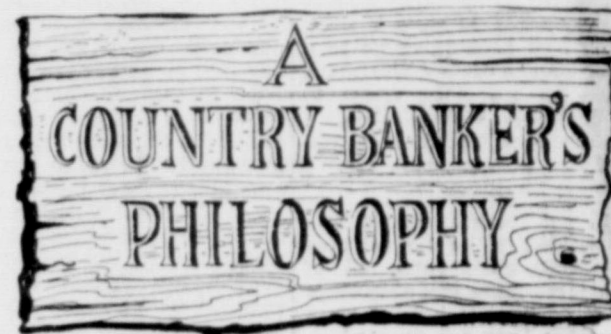

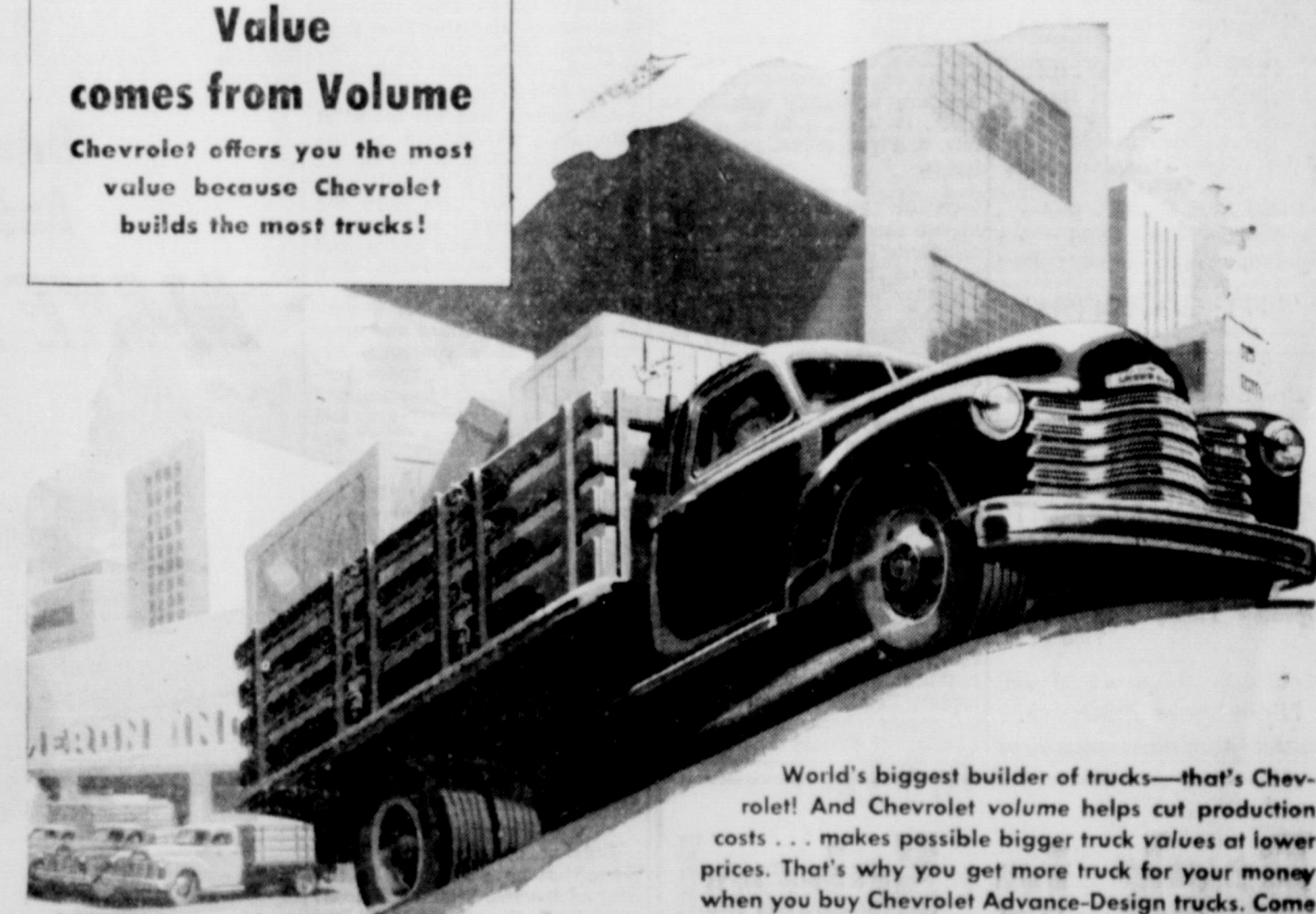

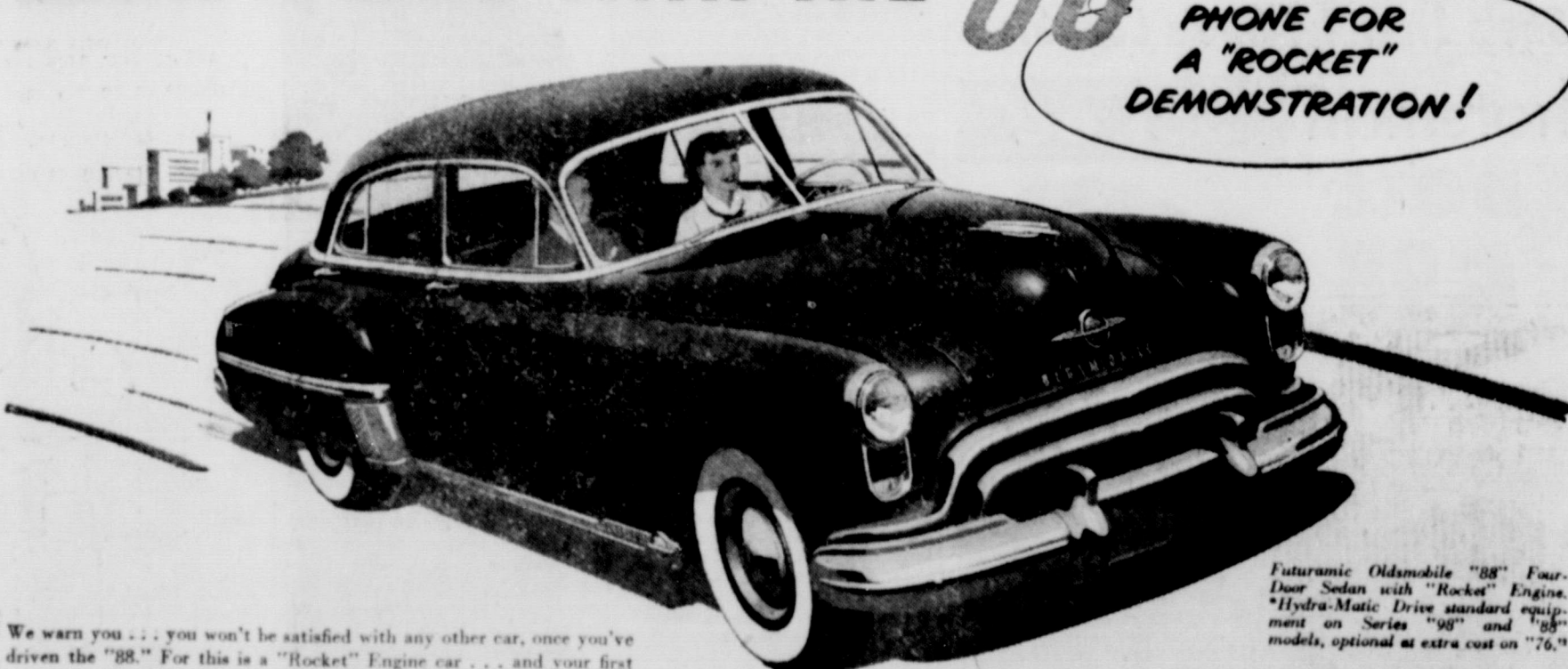
