Demand Prosecution Of Bishop Cannon

(By International News Service) WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—Demand that the Department of Justice prosecute Bishop James Cannon, Jr., for violation of the corrupt practices act was laid on Attorney General Mitchell's desk today by Representative George Tinkham, Republican from Massachusetts. Tinkham accused the Bishop of having violated federal law in the financial management of the Anti-Smith campaign in the South in the last presidential election. It is Tinkham's contention that Bishop Cannon financed the Anti-Smith committee with loans from the church board.

Football Practice Starts August 26

Coach Felton Wright announced Wednesday morning that his high school gridiron warriors would be called together in their first practice at Fair Park on Monday, August 26th. This will give the players one full week's work before school opens and will do much towards getting them in condition to play football. It is believed that this week's work will do as much good as a camp would and all kinds of conditioning will be given to get the athletes in shape to start the grind on September 2nd.

The coach stated that equipment used last year was all in good shape and nothing would be bought this year with the exception of new shoulder pads and new balls. The new style shoulder pad is a good one and will eliminate many injuries the team has experienced in past years. The new equipment will be here by the time of the first practice.

A meeting will be held at Brady on the second Saturday in September, at which time a schedule will be made for the schools in this district. All schools who compete for the championship of the district must play a schedule which includes at least five of the recognized eight schools in the district. Five games will be considered a representative schedule and the winner will go into district games for the championship of this zone.

An assistant coach and commercial teacher has not yet been employed and local football enthusiasts are hopeful that the new man will be a football man and of some assistance to Coach Wright in developing the eleven here.

Coach Wright expects about fifty men to report for training on the first day of school, and hopes to have at least thirty the week before school opens. While a number of letter men will be back for their old positions, the coach stated that no man had a place clinched and that there might be considerable changes resulting in new faces in the starting line-up.

Chinese Plan for Soviet Conference

(By International News Service) HARBIN, Manchuria, Aug. 7.—Despite numerous obstacles the Chinese today continued plans for a definite conference with Soviet Russia for a settlement of the Manchurian problem and especially the issue growing out of China's seizure of the Chinese Eastern Railway.

Chu Shao Yang, Chinese minister-delegate to Finland and Nanking's envoy to the proposed Sino-Russian parley, who was arrested here yesterday, said he would go at once to Manchuria, where conversations between the two nations already have begun.

RUSSIAN GIRL IS "ADDING MACHINE"

(By International News Service) MOSCOW, Aug. 7.—Nina Glagoleva, the girl with an "adding machine mind," has been declared possessor of one of the most amazing memories in the world by a quartet of Moscow university professors who examined her.

Nina is 22 years old and never had more than a grade school education. But she worked out intricate mathematical problems mentally in 15 seconds that took professors two hours with paper and pencil.

The girl at the tests performed by Profs. Kojevnikov, Chijevsky, Kojinsky and Kiselev, had 40 Russian words dictated to her and instantly repeated them in the order dictated. She did this five different times with a total of 200 different words without a mistake. Then series of as many of 29 words in any of a dozen foreign languages were dictated, and she repeated them correctly in the order given with not a mistake.

Nine squared or cubed numbers of three digits in an instant. She had the square or cube root of nine digit numbers on the tip of her tongue when the professors finished reading the numbers to her. It took her from 2 to 20 seconds to extract the seventh root of 16 digit numbers and the ninth root of 20 digit figures.

The multiplication, division or subtraction of billions from billions was child's play for her. The examiners said her mind worked like a calculating machine, except that she won races with machines in 95 per cent of the trials. Almost invariably she would have the correct answer ready when the machine operator had released the lever from the last digit of the sum dictated.

Zeppelin to Begin Return Trip Today

(By International News Service) LAKEHURST, Aug. 7.—Speed will be the primary objective of the Graf Zeppelin when she points her nose into the Eastern skies some time between sundown and midnight tonight. "We have proved the stability and safety of our dirigible, now we are going to prove her speed," an official of the Zeppelin company said today.

To Investigate Prison Revolt

(By International News Service) LANSING, Kans., Aug. 7.—An investigation to determine how pistols were smuggled into the state prison at Lansing was begun today as the result of yesterday's outbreak which ended in the death of two convicts. The attempted outbreak, which came on the heels of the mutiny at the Leavenworth federal prison, nine miles from here, was quickly quelled and all was quiet and orderly in the institution two hours after the sensational break was made by six convicts.

(By International News Service) SHANGHAI, Aug. 7.—The Evening Post today forecast the resignation of President Chiang Kai Shek of China within the next few days. The prediction is based on the crisis precipitated by the army general's demands of huge sums to carry out the disbandment program drawn up by the Nanking conference Tuesday.

Ballinger to Send Speaker for Meet

J. D. Motley and family tomorrow will go to Colorado, Texas, where Mr. Motley will be a speaker on the program of the West Texas Sheriffs' Association convention, and they will return tomorrow night or Friday morning. Sheriff McWilliams and family will also attend the meeting, and after the convention Mr. McWilliams will make an extended trip to other parts of the West, going to New Mexico.

The West Texas Sheriffs' Association will meet twice a year at different places in the district. The last meeting was held in Ballinger in March.

Ballinger is the founding place of the organization and the first meeting was held here. Sheriff McWilliams, who is now president of the Texas Sheriffs' Association, was at one time president of the West Texas group, and has been active in its work since its founding. The present president is Bob Miller of Paint Rock, who will preside at Colorado.

Water Consumption Largest During July

A laboratory test of the Ballinger water supply is being made it was announced Wednesday. This is one of the most vital subjects confronting any city, and one that all guard religiously. The water rate in Ballinger is \$1.00 per 5,000 gallons, which is one of the cheapest in the entire state. The average rate is \$1.00 per 2,000 gallons, which is true in all the surrounding cities.

"The public as a whole is ignorant of the many steps that are required to get water to the consumer in a pure form, and free from germs," said one of the commissioners Wednesday morning. "The city water here goes through three steps of purification after it is pumped from the reservoir until it is used in the homes. First it is pumped to a storage tank and during this process all odor is taken from it. Then it goes through a purification process, and before being pumped into the mains it is again purified. People just use water and never stop to think what is necessary for them to get real clean, pure water. And it is something that all should know, something that everyone takes for granted, and never investigates."

July just passed showed the largest consumption of any month in the history of Ballinger. More water was pumped and used than at any preceding time. This increase makes it even more vital, it is pointed out, that an adequate supply be kept at all times.

Two tragedies visited West Texas Tuesday afternoon and four persons met death from drowning.

Three members of the same family were drowned at Spur in a tank where a number of men were fishing. The C. J. Smiths, a pioneer family, were holding a reunion at Spur and on Tuesday afternoon the men and boys went to a large stock tank to fish. Late in the afternoon Herman McBroom, a youth of 12, was on the opposite side of the lake wading when he walked into water over his head and screamed for help. His father, Escell McBroom, and Henry Smith, his uncle, leaped into the water with their clothes on to swim to the child. When his father arrived at the place when the boy was last seen he had already drowned and in looking for the boy the man became exhausted and went under. By this time Smith had reached the place and McBroom grabbed him and the two men went to their death together. Other members of the family swam to their rescue but could not separate the two drowning men.

The bodies were soon recovered and three were carried to the home at Spur where a very sad occasion marked the last day of the family reunion.

Four miles from San Angelo at the Ben Picklin crossing on the Concho, P. A. Johnson was drowned late in the afternoon. Johnson was 44 years old and a good swimmer. He was swimming about 40 feet out in the stream, pushing a barrel in front of him when he was supposedly stricken with cramps and went under. He did not cry for help but kept coming up and trying to support himself on the barrel, but each time the barrel would turn over and throw him under. His wife saw his predicament and screamed for help and some boys in swimming went to the distance away ran to him. He had sunk for the second time. Hubert Murrell, 18 years old, who lives near Coleman, succeeded in locating the body by pulling it to the surface and a resuscitation was applied manually until a pulmotor arrived in an ambulance but a physician pronounced the heart action stopped and the body was carried back to San Angelo to be prepared for burial.

GIVEN FINE OF \$40 FOR PASSING CHECK OF \$1

A Mexican from San Angelo was tried here this week for passing a bad check. He gave the check here on May 30, for \$1, which was returned. He was arrested for the offense and decided to fight the case, and asked for a trial by jury.

The trial by jury was granted and he appeared this week before court accompanied by a San Angelo attorney. The case was heard, and the jury returned a verdict of guilty and fined him \$40 and costs.

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First bales of cotton are being reported daily from many sections of North, East and West Texas. Cotton men are expecting the staple to start moving fairly fast within a few more weeks. Reports lately indicate that the crop in West Texas is more spotted than at first thought and the yield will probably be cut considerably through this section. The need of rain is being felt all over West Texas by the farmers.

Grave diggers of New York have gone on strike and in a day's time over 600 bodies were being held, awaiting burial. Since the strike commenced less than four days ago, more than 1,000 bodies have been buried in trenches resembling those of war-time days. The grave diggers are asking for \$7 per day and double time for Sunday work, and more than 700 are on strike.

In speaking of the proposed extension of the Abilene & Southern Railway from Ballinger to San Angelo recently we referred to through sleeper service over that route to Dallas. We did not mean to state that we did not already have this service. For many years the Santa Fe has operated a through sleeper from San Angelo to Dallas and does at present. Travellers can leave Ballinger late in the afternoon in a pullman and arrive in Dallas around eight the next morning without making a change.

Work of uncovering the last stretch of cement on Highway No. 30 north of Ballinger started Wednesday morning and the road will be opened to the public for travel by Saturday. This last strip extends from the King filling station just south of Hillcrest to the pavement on Broadway. There is little work to be done on this stretch of road at present. The asphalt has been poured on the bridges and a black line will be painted down the middle of the highway. At a few places railing will be put up along the approaches to the bridges, and with this the highway will be completed.

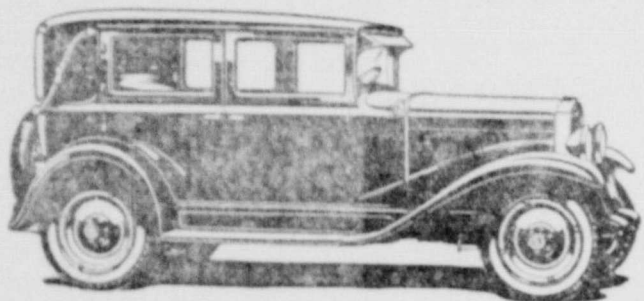
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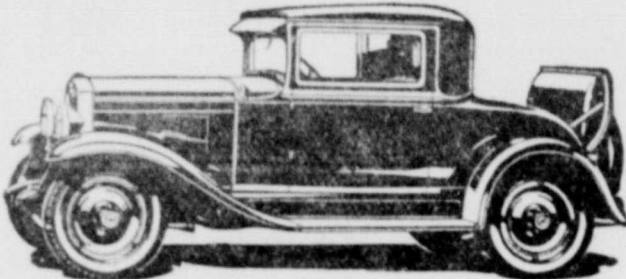

Three in a Row From Sheep Herders

"Spec" Dockery's long line drive over Taylor's head in center field let Lynch trot home from second with the winning run in the last of the ninth inning Tuesday to defeat San Angelo for the third time in as many days.

The game was a thriller and a real athletic contest from the beginning to the end. With San Angelo in the lead, E. Mueller hit the ball over the right field barrier in the seventh to tie things up, but no other scores were made until the ninth round. The finish was like you read about in novels. Two men were down with Danny on second, the count on "Spec" was three balls and two strikes when the big fellow leaned against one that went to the boards in deep center. The hit would easily have been good for three stations but Dock stopped at first as the winning run crossed the plate. Before this hit Lynch had singled and stole second and was ready to score on any kind of a hit.

Lefty Lybrand pitched good ball through the game, although hit hard he kept the blows scattered, and the handsome southpaw came in for a perfect day with the willow himself. Out of five trips to the platter he got a sacrifice, a base on balls and two double smacks, as a 1000 per cent for the afternoon.

Lefty Blackwell started the game for San Angelo, but five bases on balls and five hits in the first three innings was enough so Manager Alexander pulled him and sent "Possum" Eubanks to the eminence. "Pos" pitched fair ball but the Bearcats were able to hit the pellet when men were on sacks, so the big fellow gets credit for a loss.

Ballinger commenced scoring in the second when Parma led off with a single. He was sacrificed to second by Lybrand, went to third on an infield out, and scored on a passed ball. In the third E. Mueller beat out a hit on the infield, Lynch walked and Heine scored on Dockery's smash. Lynch later crossed the rubber when Parma grounded out, second to first. Another marker was inscribed in the sixth. Lybrand led off with a double, went to third on Kittrell's hit, and scored on a wild pitch. In the first of the seventh Heine Mueller tied the score with his home-run over the fence and the climax came when Lynch hand Dockery each hit in the ninth with two gone, and Lynch came home to make the fans happy. Lynch added to his stolen base record Tuesday by pilfering two hassocks.

While the Ballinger team was holding their lead with another victory Tuesday, the Midland Colts finished taking three in a row from the Abilene Aces, while the Coleman Bobcats defeated the Big Spring Cowboys. This leaves the standing just the same, with the Bearcats hold the lead by one and a half games. Coleman goes to Midland today for three games and there is some hope that the Bobcats will take two from the Colts. JAPAN UNIVERSITY PLANS EXTENSION

TOKYO, Aug. 3.—The board of directors of Tohoku Imperial University decided at its conference to call for the unusually large appropriation of \$1,600,000 for the next fiscal year with a view to effecting an extension of the institution and

to launching various enterprises for guidance of students thought. Of this sum, \$1,450,000 is to be used as extraordinary expenditure.

About \$350,000 of the extraordinary expenditure is to be used for the promotion of athletic games as measured against radical tendencies of thought. The authorities plan to establish regular training quarters for fencing, judo and archery, and to purchase more physical training apparatus, establishment of a students' dormitory and equipment for the promotion of health.

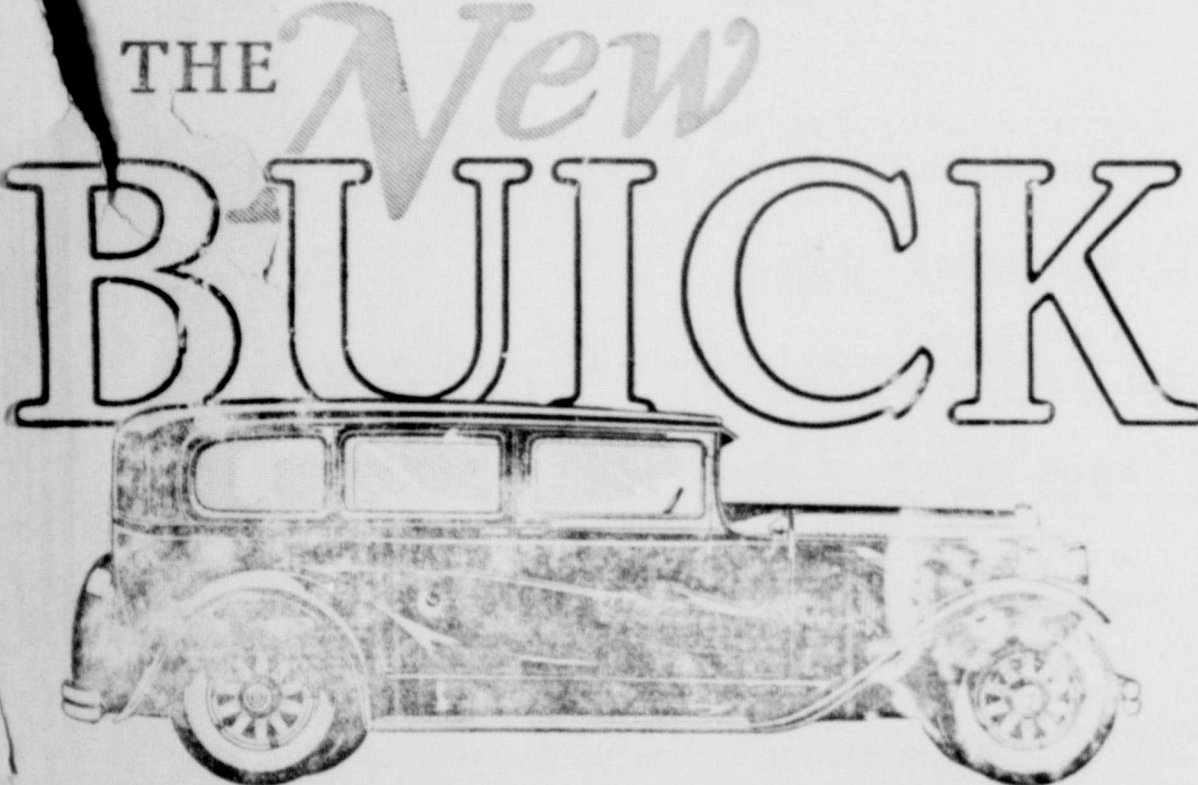
