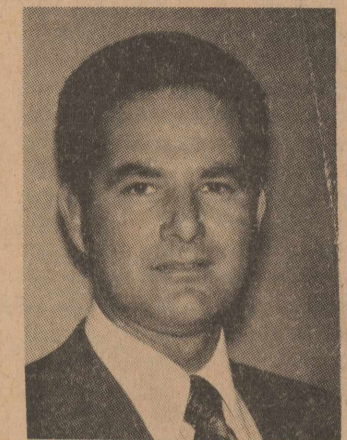
Among members of the staff are Phillip A. Howard, Administrator; Mary Thornton, Director of Nursing; and Edith Cruser, Dietitian.

Following the serious injury to Rhonda Smith who was hit by a car while walking to school in darkness Monday morning, the School Board Monday night voted to change the starting time for local schools from 8:10 a.m. to 9:10 a.m., starting Wednesday, Jan. 16.

## Student Hit by Car In Darkness at 7:45 A.M.

An example of the dangers to students created by the darkness of Daylight Savings Time, when boys and girls are walking to school, occurred here Monday morning.

Shortly before 8 a.m., while walking to school and crossing Highway 35 North near the Campus Drive-In, Rhonda Smith, 14

years old, was struck by a car and seriously injured, according to city police. Rhonda was rushed to Lyman-Roberts Hospital and later transferred to Spohn Hospital in Corpus Christi.

She suffered a fractured pelvis and other serious injuries.

The driver of the car, police reported, was Michael Scott of Rockport. Police said no charges had been filed against Scott and they stated that the new federal regulation putting the nation on Daylight Savings Time to conserve energy had created a hazardous condition by making it necessary for boys and girls to go to school in darkness.

## Airline Problems Speed Topic

Operating problems of airlines with special emphasis on security, were discussed by Richard Barton of Corpus Christi, who is district director for Braniff International, at a luncheon meeting of Rotary Club January 9 at Ramada Inn.

He illustrated several of his points by staging a humor-oriented demonstration of how some types of passengers react to electronic search of their person and baggage.

With the lives of passengers at stake it is the firm policy of Braniff, as well as other airlines to obey the orders of a hijacker with a gun in his hand, Barton declared.

Barton described the complexity and cost of Braniff's security system. He said it has worked almost perfectly and that there have been surprisingly few objections from passengers. Most of them are impressed with the effectiveness of the system despite the minor inconveniences involved, he asserted.

Barton said airlines long ago learned to stress, good food, good service and good-looking stewardesses in their advertising instead of the safety, operating efficiency and good scheduling, even though the latter are of first importance to the airline management.

## 'Missing' Boatman Makes It to Shore

A Rockport man and his 22-foot outboard boat, stranded in the intercoastal waterway last week with engine trouble, finally made it back to shore about 24 hours later, Coast Guard authorities reported.

Ronnie Guy, 27, had been the object of two separate Coast Guard air searches. A helicopter had discovered Guy's boat alongside another craft. When he indicated he would require no assistance, the helicopter departed and the search was terminated.

However, later Guy still had not put in to shore, so another Coast Guard aircraft was sent to find him before gathering fog and mist could obscure his boat from view. He was spotted less than a mile from shore and making good headway. The Aransas County Sheriff's Department later reported Guy had successfully concluded his lengthy cruise.

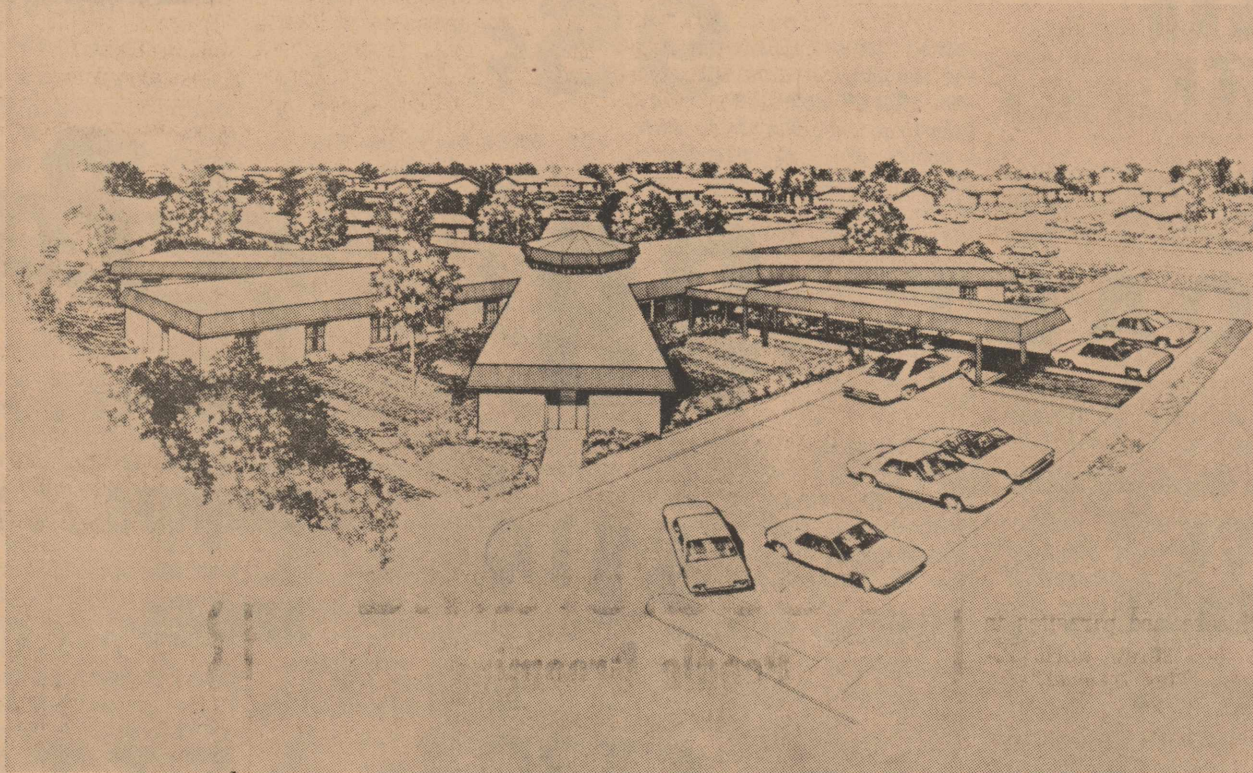

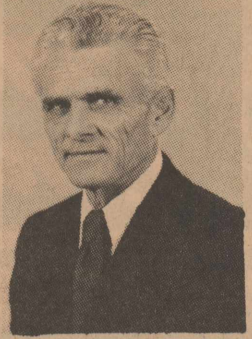

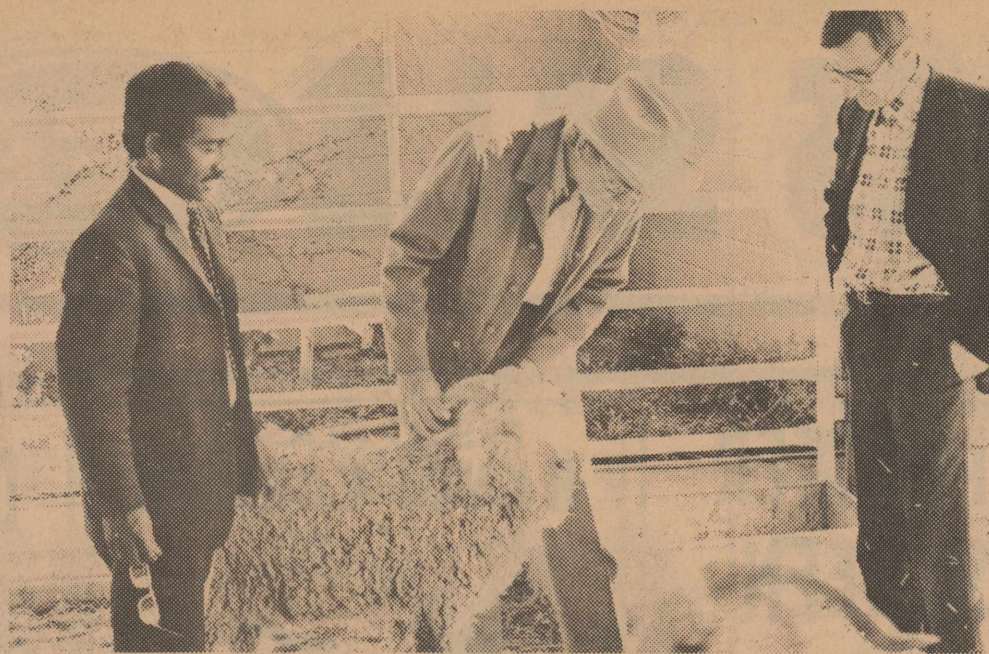


Did you ever stop to think what the space program has done, or might do, for you as a sportsman, or, as far as that's concerned, for you as a citizen? Now, I don't think that in the foreseeable future any sportsman will have his own private spaceship so that he's only 40 minutes away from fishing in Siberia. I don't think we'll be taking the family camping on the plains of Pluto soon, but, nevertheless, the national space program has, and will, provide a number of down-to-earth benefits for the hunter, the camper, the fisherman, and other outdoorsmen.

Some by-products of space research are already on the market. The widely advertised "space blanket" is a good example. Made of insulation developed for space missions, this blanket was designed especially for sportsmen by

National Research Corporation. It is 10 times warmer than wool and reflects 80 to 90 per cent of the body's heat. It is washable, pliable, light weight, windproof, and it won't crack, mildew, or rot. It can be used as a ground cloth, a windbreak, a reflector, a poncho, or you can even use it to wrap up a case of beverage to keep it cold. It can be folded to about eight by five inches and weighs only 11 ounces. Other products include filament wound fishing rods, ski poles, and archery equipment.

It is impossible to identify all the products that have come, or will come from space research. Studies have shown that there is a long time lag, sometimes as much as several hundred years, between original research or invention and commercial use. It is possible

that we'll see some application of the fuel cell which makes electricity and drinking water at the same time or the solar cell which converts sunlight into electricity.

More important right now than the products, are the services that we'll receive. Better and better long range weather predictions certainly will be a boon to the family planning their vacation, and the orbiting satellites are making these possible. As far back as September, 1961 a weather satellite spotted Hurricane Carla in its formative stages, thus alerting the world, and 350,000 people were able to flee from the path of the storm. Since then satellites have spotted numerous hurricanes, tropical storms, and typhoons. They have even alerted Arabs to the formation of destructive sand storms, helped predict the start of monsoon rains, and reported ice conditions in the seas and inland waterways.

Satellites can spot schools of fish, help in studies of fish migration, indicate water depths and currents, and spot forest fires before they get too large to control. They can furnish better maps at a cost of one-tenth of one cent per square mile compared with two or four dollars if the mapping is done with conventional aerial photographs. They can also spot tree disease and parasites in forests and screw worm infestations. Tiny transmitters, developed in space research, are now available to biologists for tracking fish, birds, and animals.

The space program is costing the taxpayer a mint of money -- there's no doubt about that -- but it is producing a great many products and services that are useful to the average citizen and the outdoor man in particular.

### IRS Conducting Free Tax Workshops

AUSTIN, TEXAS -- The Internal Revenue Service will conduct free institutes for tax return preparers in January in Austin, El Paso, Houston and San Antonio, according to IRS District Director Richard J. Stakem, Jr.

The three-day programs are set up so that return preparers may select and participate in sessions dealing with topics of specific interest, he said. Courses will relate to individual, farm and small business tax law.

San Antonio's Sheraton Inn will be the site of the first workshop, January 8-10. Next is the Villa Capri Motor Inn in Austin, January 15-17. The third location is the Rice Hotel in Houston, January 22-24. And, the final institute will be at the Sheraton-El Paso Motor Inn in El Paso, January 29-31.

Capital gains and losses, basis and adjusted basis of property, installment sales, non-taxable exchanges and involuntary conversions, and investment credit are on the first day's program line-up.

On the second day, attention will be directed to minimum tax, child care, moving expenses, net operation losses, hobby losses and farm recapture, and farm deductions.

The final day's topics are depreciation, depreciation recapture, tax problems of divorced people, what's new, and problems.

## Taxpayers Ask I. R. S.

Q: My 20 year old son attended college full-time two months last winter, dropped out to go to work, and returned to school full-time in September. He earned about \$3,000 during the year. Can I still claim him as a dependent?

A: Yes, if he meets all the dependency tests, including your having provided over one-half of his total support. If your son is a full-time student during some part of each of five months of the year, there is no limit on how much he can earn and still remain your dependent. These five months do not have to occur consecutively.

Q: I know that a political contribution to a candidate or his campaign committee may be eligible for a deduction or credit. What about contributions to a political party?

A: Contributions to a national, state or local committee of a national political party may also qualify for the deduction or credit.

Q: You may deduct up to \$50 (\$100 on a joint return) or take half of your contribution as a direct credit against your tax up to \$12.50 (\$25 on a joint return).

Q: I've transferred \$2,000 worth of investment securities registered in my name to my child. I am custodian for the account. Do I have to pay gift tax on this transfer?

A: A transfer for the benefit of a person under 21 generally qualifies for the \$3,000 annual exclusion from gift tax, provided the minor has use of the property and income from it

before he turns 21 and any property or income not disposed of by that time passes to him.

The \$3,000 annual gift tax exclusion will still be allowed even though state law requires the property to be distributed to the minor at age 18.

Q: I'm a school teacher. I paid a person to substitute for me for a day. Can I deduct the amount I paid for the substitute?

A: Yes. Amounts you pay for a substitute teacher to take your place are deductible. However, you are not entitled to this deduction to the extent that it is allocable to amounts excluded as sick pay.

### Tax Form Due From Fishermen

AUSTIN, TEXAS -- Farmers and fishermen who have not filed a 1973 declaration of estimated Federal income tax must file and pay the tax by Jan. 15. According to the IRS, the only exception is if they file an income tax return and pay the tax by March 1.

The requirement applies to all persons who earned at least two-thirds of their 1973 gross income from farming or fishing.

IRS Publication 225, "Farmer's Tax Guide," and 505, "Tax Withholding and Declaration of Estimated Tax," provide additional information and are available free at the local IRS office.

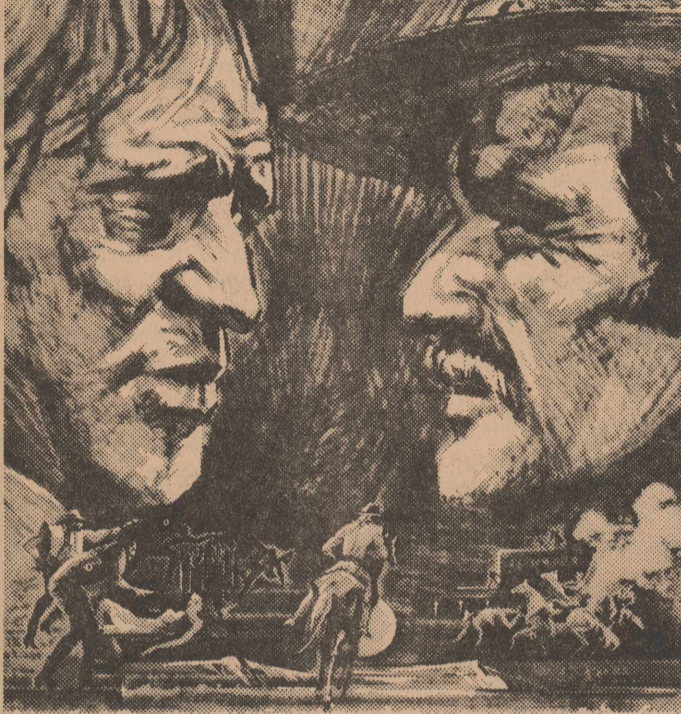

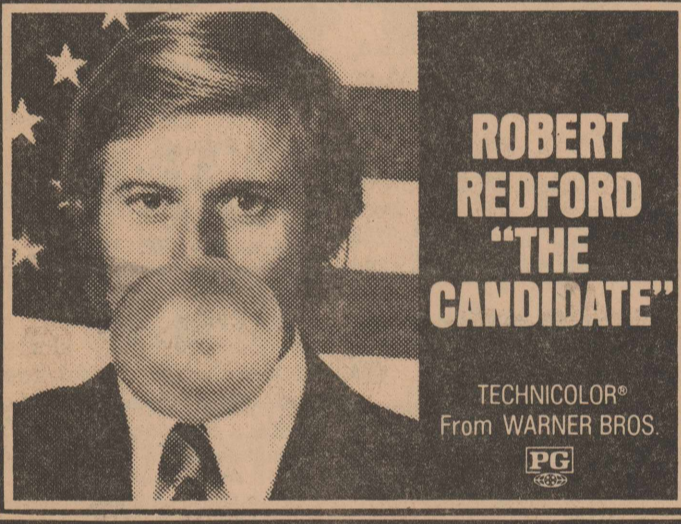

### Speed Limit to Be 55 Miles Per Hour

The Texas Highway Commission has set a statewide maximum speed limit of 55 miles per hour, effective at 12:01 a.m., Sunday, January 20.

The action was taken in keeping with the law passed by the recent special session of the Texas Legislature, empowering the Commission to set lower speed limits to comply with federal energy saving actions. Under the terms of the Emergency Highway Energy Conservation Act signed by President January 2, a state not establishing a 55 m.p.h. maximum speed limit would not receive its share of federal highway construction funds.

Federal taxes on items related to the operation of motor vehicles--notably a four-cent-per-gallon levy on gasoline--go into the Federal Highway Trust Fund. These funds are apportioned back to the state for the federal government's share of highway construction.

Texas' share amounts to some \$240 million annually which would be withheld if the lower speed limit were not set by early March.

This action is subject to review within eight days by Governor Dolph Briscoe. The lower speed limits will apply to all highways in the state, including highways under the control of the Texas Turnpike Authority, cities and counties.

New speed limit signs replacing the old 70 m.p.h. maximum speed limit on the State's major highways, will be in place by the effective date. The Highway Department will begin immediately the task of making and posting the new signs.

The Commission also directed the Highway Department to monitor and document circum-

stances "which might relate to the establishment of speed limits and to report to the Commission on a monthly basis." This is in order that the Commission may make findings as to whether the 55 m.p.h. limit should continue in effect.

Many motorists in Texas already have voluntarily reduced their driving speeds to below 55, Highway Department spokesmen said.

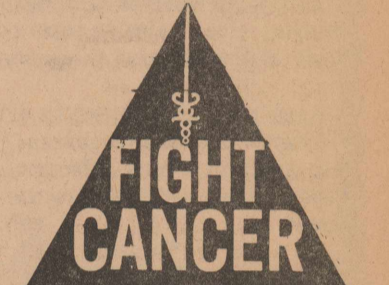
### Ruby Hart Reports On County Court

Ruby Hart, County Clerk, reports that the December report to the Texas Civil Judicial Council compiled by her office shows a continuing monthly increase in the caseload in the County Criminal Court.

During the month of December, 19 new cases were filed including 9 driving while intoxicated, 2 worthless check, 1 marijuana and 7 in other categories.

During December a total of 18 cases were disposed of by plea of guilty or by dismissal, leaving a total of 134 cases on the criminal court docket.

### Ehrlich Completes Missile Course

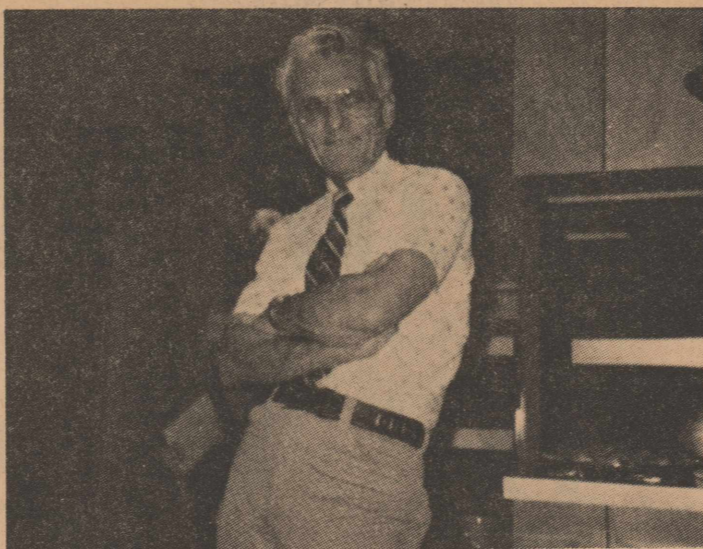
