Mountaineers Take 32-6 Beating From Bangs; Go To Goldthwaite Friday

The Bangs Dragons upset the Homecoming football game prediction and romped over the Mountaineers 32-6 before approximately 2500 fans and former students last Friday night. This was the first win of the season for the Dragons and the fourth loss for the Mountaineers.

Ronnie Halford, Dragon half-back, figured in all the Dragon's scores. Early in the first period he pushed the ball over from the 1-foot line for the TD and then kicked the extra point. Again in the first period Halford passed to Tommy Snow for the second TD and then Halford kicked the extra point.

During the second period the Mountaineers showed a little initiative and held the Dragons to no score, making a half-time score of 14-0 for Bangs.

Early in the third period Hollis Bible busted the Bangs line open and raced his way down field 54 yards before being pulled down from behind, on the 4 yard line. Two plays later Bible went over for the only Mountaineer score of the game. Johnson missed the try for extra point.

Midway in the third Halford passed to Bob Sikes for 8 yards and another TD. In the fourth Halford passed to Kenneth Eason for 28 yards for one TD and 16 for another to make the final score of 32-6 for Bangs.

Nothing would seem to click for the Mountaineers, while the ground and air attack both worked perfect for the Dragons.

The Mountaineers will travel to Goldthwaite Friday night for the second of the conference games of the season. The game is scheduled to be played in the Goldthwaite Eagles Stadium at 7:30 p. m.

The Eagles have three wins, a tie and one loss for a season record. Last week they handed the Burnet eleven their fifth defeat in a row, by taking them 21-12 for their first conference win. Goldthwaite is predicted to be one of the top contenders for the district crown this year.

AROUND THE DISTRICT

Mason continues to lead the district with five straight wins and no losses. Last week they handed Llano a 24-7 defeat to win their first conference game.

Second in standing is Goldthwaite with three wins, one tie and one loss. Third in the standing is Early with one win and three losses. Early rested last week and will begin conference play this week. Bangs and Llano are tied for fourth and fifth places with one win and four losses each. Santa Anna is in sixth place with four losses and one tie. Burnett is still in the cellar with no wins and five losses.

AN EDITORIAL—

We Favor Charlotte Burney

We feel that a very grave injustice has been done to Charlotte Burney and the members of her family. Details leading to the deed are as follows:

Last Wednesday W. E. (Bill) Burney, County Treasurer, was stricken with a heart attack and on Thursday afternoon Mr. Burney passed from this world. Funeral services were scheduled to be held in the Trickham Union Church at 2:00 p. m. Saturday afternoon.

Bill, as he was familiarly known to most every one in Coleman County, had been nominated for re-election during the Democratic primary in August and his name was printed on the General Election ballot, for use on November 2.

But before his remains were laid to rest, 18 of the county's 28 Precinct Chairmen met in Coleman Saturday morning and by a vote of 11 to 7, decided to put his last opponent's name in his place on the General Election ballot, without any apparent regard for Mrs. Burney, the members of her family or Mr. Burney, or without waiting at least until he was laid to rest.

As the ballots were already printed, there would appear to be no such hurry in determining whose name was to be put on the ballot. However, plans at the present time call for the printing of E. C. (Ernest) Brusenhan's name on gummed paper and pasting it over Burney's name in the Democratic column on the General Election ballot. Burney and Brusenhan were thrown into a run-off in the second primary when Burney failed to get a majority of votes over two opponents seeking the office in the first primary. First primary results gave Burney a total of 1461 votes to 1215 for Brusenhan and the second primary gave Burney a total of 2,005 votes to 1872 for Brusenhan. We feel that had the majority of the people of Coleman County wanted Mr. Brusenhan to have the position as County Treasurer, they would have voted for him in the two previous elections.

However, his name is to appear on the General Election ballot. We have absolutely nothing against Mr. Brusenhan and feel that he is about as well qualified for the position as Mrs. Burney, but according to record votes in both primary elections, considerably more people of the county favored Burney over Brusenhan and we feel that Mrs. Burney should have the privilege of filling the place of her husband if she so desires.

A part of the minutes of the Commissioners' Court records for Monday, October 11, read as follows: "On motion by Earl Hardy and seconded by Pete Sneed and unanimous vote of the Court, Charlotte Burney, widow of W. E. Burney, deceased, was and is hereby appointed to the office of County Treasurer of Coleman County, Texas, and to serve as such until December 31, 1954. Her appointment to be effective as of Friday, the 8th day of October, A. D. 1954, and shall be authorized to act as County Treasurer as soon as she has executed her bond and oath, and the bond has been approved by the Commissioners' Court of Coleman County, Texas."

There is only one way that Mrs. Burney can be elected to the office, to serve after December 31, 1954, and that is by a write-in vote. A write-in campaign is kindly tricky, but it is legal if it is carried out properly. In this particular case, the proper procedure is to scratch through or mark out the name of E. C. (Ernest) Brusenhan, under the heading of County Treasurer in the Democratic column and over on the right hand column of the ballot, under the heading of "Write-In" and under the sub-heading of County Treasurer, write in Charlotte Burney or Mrs. Charlotte Burney. Her name used in any other manner will not be legal and the vote will not be counted. It is imperative that the name be spelled correct on the ballot.

Rites For W. E. Burney Held At Trickham Saturday

Funeral services were held at the Trickham Union Church on Saturday, October 9, at 2:00 p. m. for W. E. (Bill) Burney, Coleman County Treasurer, who died on Thursday, October 10th at 5:30 p. m. in the Santa Anna Hospital. He had suffered a heart attack at noon on Wednesday.

Rev. Howell Martin of Trickham and Rev. H. G. Verner of Santa Anna, officiated at the services.

Mr. Burney was born in the Trickham Community September 8, 1914, being 40 years and 29 days old at the time of death. He was a member of the Baptist Church.

Burney was serving in his fourth term as County Treasurer and had received the Democratic nomination during the August Primary for a fifth term. His election would have been on November 2, at the General election.

Survivors include the wife, Mrs. Charlotte Burney; one son, Willis Weldon Burney, three step-sons, Charles Edward, Stephen Wayne, and John Herschel Hogue, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Burney of Trickham, two brothers, J. L. Burney of Pueblo, Colorado, and Jesse L. Burney of San Marcos, one sister, Mrs. Mary V. Cummings of Pueblo, Colo.

One brother, Willis Burney, was killed in action at Pearl Harbor soon after the beginning of World War II.

Homecoming Is Big Success; Over 400 Register For Days Activities

Slightly over 400 former students of the Santa Anna schools registered during the day at the annual Santa Anna Ex-Students Homecoming Saturday. An estimated group of from 825 to 850 persons participated in the days program. The registrations do not include any visitors here except the ex-students.

The days activities were carried out as planned. To say the affair was a success is an understatement, but words are not in our vocabulary to describe the actual success of the day. Everyone had a grand day and a number of the group expressed the opinion that they "never had such a grand day in all their lives". Large numbers said they had no intention of ever missing another Santa Anna Homecoming.

Registration was held from 8 a. m. until late in the afternoon. At 10:00 a. m. a coffee was held in the auditorium of the ward school, honoring Mr. J. E. Hickman, who was the first superintendent of Santa Anna schools and who laid the foundations for the present school system. Mr. Hickman was the speaker and was introduced by V. L. Grady, one of the first members of the Board of Trustees. Mrs. R. C. Gay and Mrs. E. K. Thompson of Coleman, were introduced as being members of the first graduating class of Santa Anna in 1896.

The afternoon program consisted of the invocation by Lewis Newman, the Welcome by Supt. R. K. Green, introduction of the speaker by R. G. Hollingsworth of Coleman and the Homecoming address by Walter S. Pope of Abilene.

In the business session John C. Gregg was elected to head the organization for the next year. Bill Brown was elected as vice president and Mrs. Kenneth Bowker was elected as Secretary and Treasurer. Gregg succeeds M. L. Guthrie who has served as president for the two years the organization has functioned. Brown succeeded Gregg and Mrs. Bowker replaced Patricia Davis who has served for two years.

A variety program was held in the ward school auditorium from 8 p. m. until 12 p. m. and a full house was present for this entertainment. A dance was held in the gym with a full house present.

Plans are now in the making for a bigger and better Homecoming next year.

It is hoped that everyone will help the officers of the organization by telling all former students about the Homecoming and urging them to be present.

Subjects At Drive-In Chapel Continue

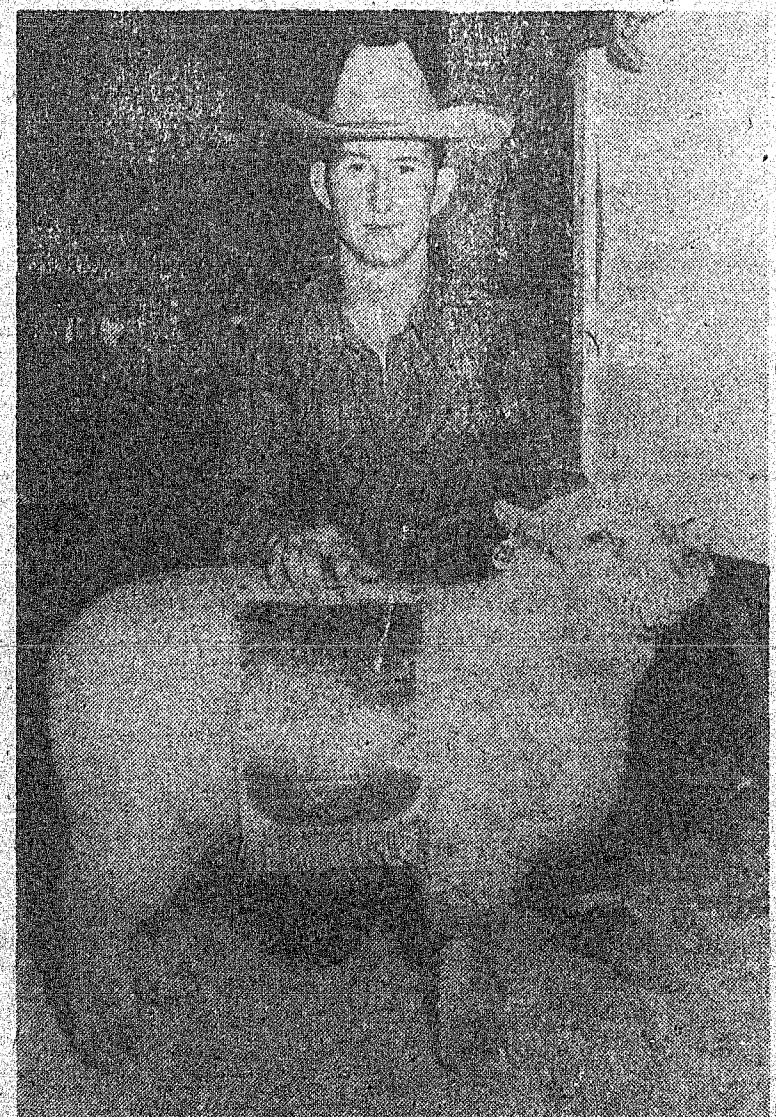

Way of Wisdom

Lesson for October 17, 1954

WHAT is the main thing to be desired in life? Different answers have been given and still are given. Some people think they would rather be rich than anything else; others count health the number one must; others value freedom above all things. There is a section of the Bible in which all the writers unite in giving an answer still different from any of these. "Wisdom is the principal thing," say they all, "therefore get wisdom."

The book of Proverbs is part of what Bible scholars call the Wisdom Literature. It is unique among the books of the Bible. It does not tell a story, it has no plot, no argument. It consists of a large number of sayings or proverbs, put together for the most part with very little order. You can try the experiment some time of reading aloud any chapter in Proverbs from chapter 10 through chapter 29, backward (i.e. the last verse first, then the next-to-last, and so on to the first verse), and see whether your listeners know you are reading backward.

Knowledge and Wisdom

But while the book of Proverbs is not all arranged in orderly sequence, there is harmony all through it. The great theme is Wisdom. The whole race of man is divided here into three kinds of persons: the wise, the fools, and the young—who can choose wisdom now before it is too late. (No fool like an old fool!) Wisdom is by no means the same thing as knowledge. Almost anybody can acquire knowledge; all it takes is perseverance and a good memory. Knowledge can be gained quickly, as the rapid-instruction classes in the army have shown. A person can learn a language, well enough to get along with it, in a year's concentrated time. But when he speaks it, will what he says be

wise? A man may know a dozen languages and yet talk no sense in any of them. A high school student can make "A" in agriculture in his examinations on the book, and still not be a good future farmer. Wisdom is founded on knowledge; the complete ignoramus can never be wise. But wisdom is more than knowledge; it is knowing what to do with knowledge, how to put it to work.

Wisdom Is From God

In the book of Proverbs wisdom is not only different from knowledge, it is different from what is sometimes called worldly wisdom. Men are sometimes called wise by unthinking persons when they are merely wise in the ways of the world—smart, shrewd, able to look out for themselves, always alighting on their feet, like cats. The wisdom commended in Proverbs is not worldly, it is divine. It differs from ordinary smartness in two ways. First, it is from God. It can be learned anywhere ("Go to the ant... consider her ways, and be wise") but God is the final source of wisdom. In other words, wisdom in these pages means much the same as what other writers call conforming to the will of God. It means looking at things with the eye and the mind of God. Further, as the writers of Proverbs see it, true wisdom includes God; that is to say, the wise man will remember God while the fool either never gives God a thought, or says in his heart, there is no God. He is the most important fact in the universe; to leave him out of all our calculations is to be a top-flight fool.

Wisdom Is for This World

There have been good pious people who didn't know quite what to do with this book of Proverbs. For it is out of line with any other worldly notion of religion. People who think that religion and common sense are two different things; people who think religion is concerned with things unseen while common sense deals with everyday facts; people who think that religion is chiefly concerned with death and what comes after—all these people are taken aback by the earthly simplicities of the Proverbs. The wisdom which is here admired and praised is not anything "out of this world," it is strictly for this world. A former governor of Virginia testified that during his term of office he had received more help in the practical problems of government from the book of Proverbs than from any of the books on political science which lined his library shelves.

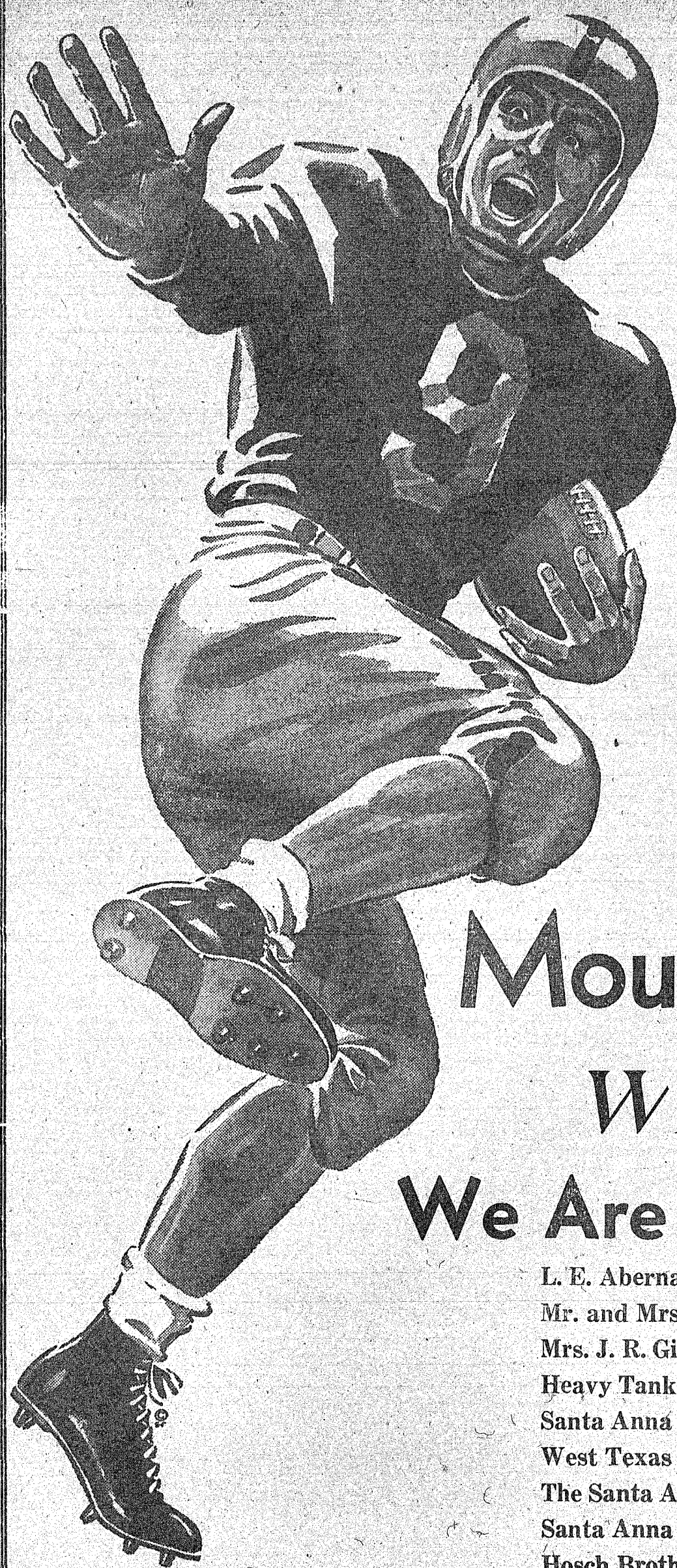

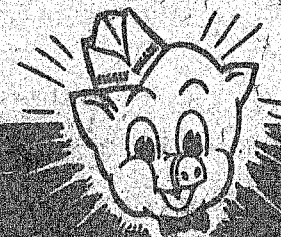
