And . . . If nothing else, the Teenagers feel a great responsibility about answering the telephone.

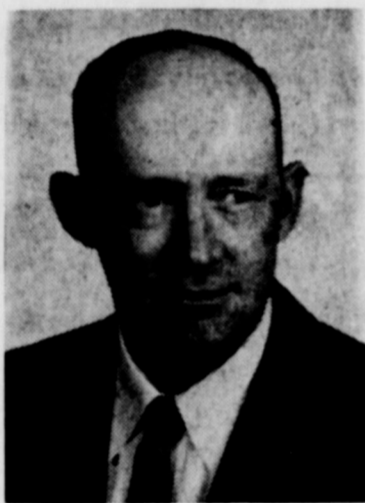
Youths Arrested In Olton After Robbing Elroy's 66

GIRLS WIN 35-28

A 26 point scoring performance by Minnie Wheat carried the Springlake Junior Girls to a thrilling win over Lazbuddie 25-28.

It has been recommended by the Texas Education Agency at Austin that the Springlake Independent School District be removed from the warning list due to the corrections made of violations of accreditation standards in '55 and the agency further advised that the present program of School improvement should be continued.

The following report was received this week by Supt. Bill Mann. Springlake Schools of Lamb County are located between Springlake and Earth, Texas and serve both communities. Both White and Negro school are located on the same campus. The white school had an average enrollment of 710 and the Negro school 29 during the 1955-56 school year. The school employs five teachers above Minimum Foundation allotment. The school district valuation is \$7,195,448. The tax rate is \$1.53; of this amount, \$1.12 one-half is allocated for maintenance.

On December 14, 1955, an accreditation team from the Agency visited this school. Because of the violations of accreditation standards it was recommended that

The teachers and parents are to be commended for their diligent work in making it possible for the local schools to be removed from the warned list and to be restored to full fellowship among the accredited schools.

The school board is to be especially commended for the fine work they have done. A large measure of the credit for the progress made by the schools belongs to them. It has long been recognized that a school can be no better than its school board. Their leadership, their sound judgement in considering and planning for the total program, has done much for the schools.

I. Written policies and other printed materials for communicating administrative policies.

The Board of Trustees have developed and printed written school board policies. The policies have been distributed to the public and are in the process of being published in the local newspaper. The following handbooks have been issued and are being used during the current year.

A. Teachers Handbook of Administrative Policies

B. High School Handbook for Students

C. Junior High Handbook for Junior High Students

D. Band Handbook developed for band programs

II Springlake Colored School was housed in a one room structure and located in the City of Earth. This school has been moved out to the white campus. The present building contains two rooms with inside toilet facilities. Grades one through three are taught in one room, grades four through eight in another. The Negro pupils eat in the school lunchroom and use the school gymnasium. For the most part this school in terms of facilities, teaching materials, and teacher pupil load would meet accreditation standards since grades 1-3 enrollment is 21 and grades 4-8 enrollment is 19. There needs to be a great deal more work done relative to planned instruction and written lesson plans.

III Development of school site: A good number of trees and shrubs have been planted on the school campus and around the school buildings. More work such as concrete sidewalks and grass soddings are to be added in the spring.

IV Teaching materials, equipment and supplies seem to be adequate enough to meet accreditation standards. Two thousand dollars have been spent on library books and adequate shelves and library equipment have been added. The English teacher, who is qualified librarian, serves as the library coordinator. She is assisted by a full-time library clerk. The

Water-Short Texas Towns Eager To Pay For Needed Water Storage

TEMPLE — Water-short Texas towns are making up to the opportunity of adding to their water supplies through the Department of Agriculture watershed protection and flood prevention programs in the Trinity and Colorado River watersheds and in local projects under Public Law 566.

State Conservationist H. N. Smith of the U. S. Soil Conservation Service reports growing interest on the part of municipalities eager to pay added costs to provide needed water storage behind floodwater retarding dams.

Smith explained that the dams are designed as detention structures primarily. Their purpose is to slow down floodwaters and release them automatically at a rate stream channels can hold. Each dam must first be justified on the basis of its usefulness in flood prevention. Water storage for any purpose other than flood prevention must be secondary and in keeping with State Law.

Applications for SCS help under the comparatively new Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention Act (Public Law 566) now total 113, Smith reported. Modification of the Act has made it easier for municipalities and special purpose districts to make use of the program in meeting local water needs.

In the new watershed protection program, municipalities or other authorized organizations can build water storage into a floodwater retarding structure by paying the difference in cost, Smith explained. The city of Kaufman, in the Kaufman-Van Zandt Soil Conservation District, was the first Texas City to take advantage of the water-storing opportunity.

Added capacity of 1834 acre feet was built into a floodwater retarding structure on Big Cottonwood Creek, a small watershed in

the big Upper Trinity flood prevention program.

The 1834 acre feet of storage—nearly 600 million gallons—was provided at a cost to Kaufman of \$18,114.

Smith said construction has started on a similar project near Cooldidge, Texas, to provide 355 acre feet for that city in the Pin Oak Creek watershed program.

In the new watershed protection program the government can lend up to \$5 million for periods of as long as 50 years at a rate of about two and one-half per cent. The loan is retired on an annual basis. There is no such loan provision in the older Upper Trinity and Middle Colorado Prevention program.

SCS is authorized by the new law to cooperate with local subdivisions of government in building structures up to 5000 acre feet of floodwater detention capacity. Additional storage up to 25,000 acre feet in total capacity can be provided for municipal water supplies.

A city or water district must use its own engineers or employ one to determine water needs and suitability of the watershed and the proposed structure for a municipal supply. The local engineer may re-design the dam to include the additional storage, or the city or water district may use SCS engineering help and reimburse the agency.

Smith explained that the objective of the locally sponsored watershed program is to give protection to land, crops and property against flood damage. Soil conservation treatment of land in the watershed is fundamental. It insures a long period of usefulness for the floodwater retarding structures by reducing sediment carried by runoff into streams and reservoirs. It also benefits the farmer and rancher through more efficient use of land and available moisture.

Fine for after-fool-hall fare, for easy-do suppers on rush nights, or just because your family goes for hot and hearty dishes featuring favorites like pimientos, rice, and sausage combined in a delicious, new way.

Pimiento-Rice-Sausage Bake

1 1/2 cups water
1 teaspoon salt
1 cup long-grain rice
1 to 1 1/2 lb. small pork link sausages
1 can or jar (4 oz.) whole pimientos, cut into large pieces
4 to 6 tablespoons sausage drippings
1/2 teaspoon oregano
3/4 cup milk

Add the salt to the water in a heavy saucepan, and bring the water to a boil. Pour in the rice, stir once, and cover. Reduce the heat to its lowest point and simmer for 20 minutes. Stir the pimiento pieces into the rice. Meanwhile, fry the sausages over low heat until brown and about half done.

Spoon half the pimiento-rice into a 1-quart casserole or baking dish, covering it with some of the sausages. Add the remaining pimiento-rice, and arrange the rest of the sausage links on top. Heat together the milk, sausage drippings, and oregano, and pour this mixture over the casserole. Bake at 350° for 25 to 30 minutes, and garnish with parsley sprigs. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

AUSTIN, Tex. — Texas' Legislature is down to business with a "first things first" agenda.

House members agreed to Speaker Waggoner Carr's plea to give top priority to appropriations. A \$2,000,000,000 appropriation bill is proposed by the Legislative Budget Board. It would require no new taxes. But it does not include such strongly-backed items as the teacher pay raises.

Members of the House Appropriations Committee, headed by Rep. Max Smith of San Marcos, already have begun their dollar-by-dollar deliberations said Speaker Carr, as they began. "You are the key to the whole session."

A host of other controversial problems will be pushing for attention. Among them:

1. Long-range, state-wide water conservation. Sen. George Parkhouse of Dallas, chairman of the Water Resources Committee, is asking for prompt action. Sixteen bills, two constitutional amendments were presented by the committee.

2. School integration. Rep. Joe Chapman of Sulphur Springs circulated a Texas Manifesto which pledged signers to support legislation to help preserve school segregation.

3. Election code revisions. Rep. Joe Pool of Dallas proposes a law requiring a run-off between top candidates in special elections for U.S. Senator and congressman-at-large. He wants it passed on an emergency basis to apply to the upcoming race for Price Daniel's place. Republicans are protesting vigorously.

4. Lobby control and legislative ethics. Rep. Zeke Zbraneck of Dalletta says he will introduce a bill requiring lobbyists to file monthly financial reports.

KEY POSTS ASSIGNED — Though new faces abound — 56 in the House, seven in the Senate — honors as usual went to old hands. Sen. Otis E. Ljek of Lufkin, veteran of nearly 20 years in the

Legislature, was elected president pro tempore. It is the top Senate honor, second in line to the governorship.

House Speaker Waggoner Carr of Lubbock is a fourth-termer.

Rep. Max C. Smith of San Marcos, now in his seventh term, drew the important House appropriations committee chairmanship. Other key chairmen in the House are Frates S. Seelingson of San Antonio, revenue and taxation; W. S. (Bill) Healy of Puducah, state affairs.

Other returning lawmakers hold remaining House chairmanships. They are: aeronautics, Vernon J. Stewart of Wichita Falls; agriculture, Harold B. Parish of Taft; banking, Thomas R. Joseph of Waco, claims and accounts, W. A. Stroman of San Angelo; commerce and manufacturers, W. W. Glass of Jacksonville; common carriers, J. B. Walling of Wichita Falls; controller's accounts, Louis H. Anderson of Midland; congressional and legislative districts, Malcolm McGregor of El Paso; conservation and reclamation, Leroy Saul of Kress; constitutional amendments, Jack Welch of Marlin; contingent expense, Louis Dugas of Orange.

Candidates are Reps. Joe Burkett Jr. of Kerrville, Ben A. Glusling of Kingsville, Barefoot Sanders of Dallas and Will Smith of Beaumont.

Decision will not be definite until after the 1958 elections.

CITIZEN SHIVERS — Gov. Allan Shivers steps out of the Capitol into multiple private business activities.

He will continue to live in Austin where he will serve as chairman of the board of Western Pipe Lines, Inc. He will also oversee his farm and ranch property at Woodsville and the Shary estate in the Valley.

His family moves from the mansion to a large rented home while remodeling of their next home, the 100-year old Pease Mansion, is completed.

Raftel will be introduced by David C. Levell, publisher of the Galveston News-Tribune. Levell is president of the Texas Press Association and will preside over the meetings.

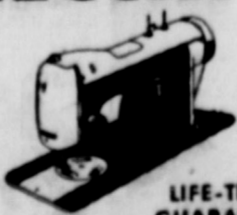
Edmund C. Arnold, Editor of Linotype News, Brooklyn, New York, will conduct a Saturday afternoon clinic on makeup and typography.

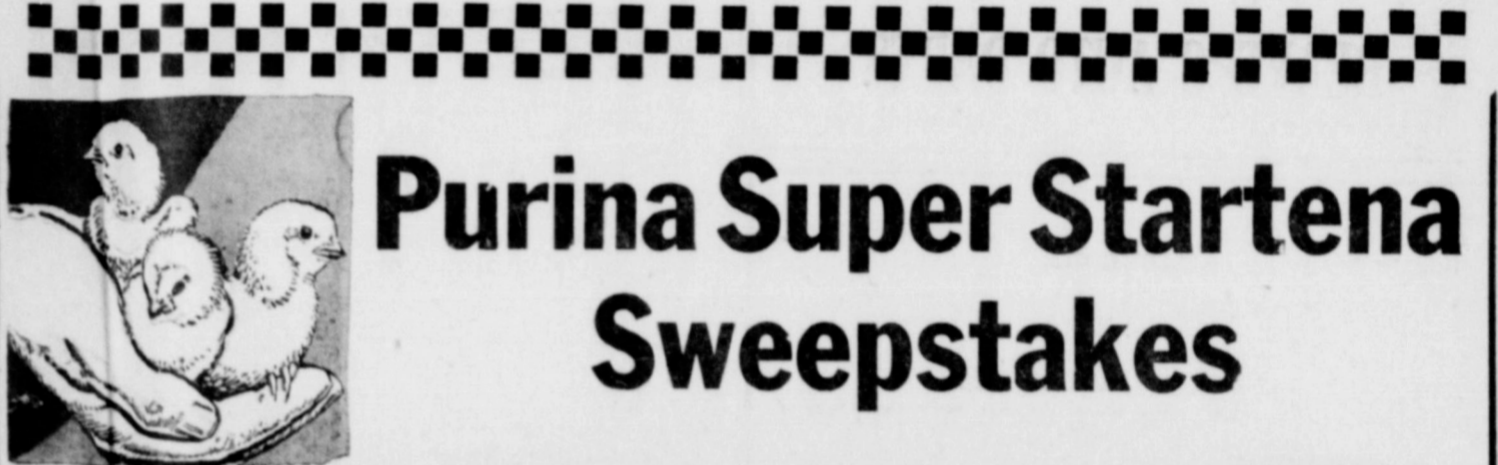

Of the nationwide sweepstakes which the company and Purina dealers launched in December, it was announced by Earth Elevator, local Purina dealer.

Texas Congressmen and Senators Propose Bill For Drouth Areas

Washington, (Special) — Rep. George Mahon of the 19th District has joined with several other Texas Congressmen and Senators in introducing legislation in the new session of Congress designed to bring early assistance to the drought-stricken areas of Texas and the Southwest.

The proposal as worked out and presented was termed a "two-fold approach to the drought problem."

The bill was described on the floor of the House by Rep. Bob Poage of Waco, chairman of the House Committee on Agriculture, as calling for immediate assistance to farmers and ranchers in the wide area of Texas and the Southwest who are in desperate need of help.

Mahon and Poage pointed out that the prime purpose of the bill would require the Department of Agriculture to make payments to land owners who will agree to defer the use of their depleted pasture lands for periods of not less than 12 months. The program become effective immediately and would continue over a period of three years after the drought is broken.

The Congressmen explained that

the present crisis "could well become a permanent condition unless steps were taken to give the parched pasture land a chance to recover."

Another feature of the bill would instruct the Secretary of Agriculture to assist in providing protein feed concentrates such as cottonseed cake. Members of the group said they felt the cake was needed immediately to maintain the range herds of the Southwest and that type program would be cheaper and more effective than the hay or grain feeding program now being carried out.

"This bill would enable the stricken areas to take steps which they know to be sound from a conservation standpoint but which they cannot afford to take in the absence of some Government program," the lawmakers explained.

Farm Bureau Roundup

Bracero Farm Laborers and qualified local farm laborers was the topic of discussion at a meeting of the Labor committee of the Lamb County Farm Bureau last week according to chairman, Harry Engleking. Present at this meeting was E. C. Travis assistant to Wayne Grant, District Director of the Texas Employment Commission.

Some of the suggestions this group presented to Mr. Travis were (1) That available labor should be classified as farm labor or town labor. (2) Have farm laborers available when needed. (3) Qualified year around Braceros should be kept on contract and furloughed during periods of no employment. (4) More courteous services needed in the Local Texas Employment Commission office.

Travis suggested that one way the farmers could help to have more farm labor available is to report any laborer, that they get from the Texas Employment Commission, that is not satisfactory. This will take this employees name if there are no other local laborers available.

A recommendation was made that whenever the farmers become short of hand and cannot get qualified local labor, a survey be made by the local Farm Bureau and turned over to the local, District and State Texas Employment Commission so the farmers might get authorizations to bring in qualified men from Mexico, rather than wait weeks and lose money.

It was suggested by Engleking that all farmers notify either the Farm Bureau office or himself if they have any problems pertaining to the farm labor.

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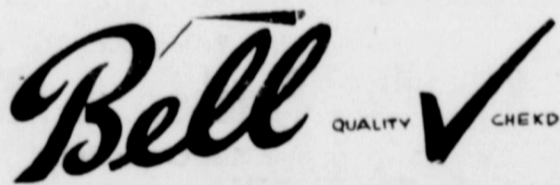

 books are catalogued according to the Dewey Decimal System and arranged on open shelves. Periodicals are being added to the library to be used in several areas of the instructional program. New equipment has been added in the following areas: vocational programs, science program and athletic program. More teaching aids have been added such as maps, globes, record players, records, film strips, and projectors. Teaching material such as art supplies, paper, ink, and duplicator materials are supplied at all levels. The visitors recommend that additional equipment be provided in the following areas: vocational agriculture, science, and driver education.

V. Instructional program.
 In science the elementary schools have developed lesson plans and courses of study at different grade levels. In grades five through eight teachers plan to group students according to abilities. Improvement was noted in the display of students' work and appearance of rooms.

Some tests have been given to determine students' individual needs, interests and capabilities for instructional and guidance purposes. It is recommended that results from tests be used in improving the instructional and guidance program.

Some progress has been made in physical education. The visitors recommend that the physical education be further improved by planning a balanced program at all levels.
