Varying reports of the number of dead were received as bands of Mexican soldiers and bewildered citizens searched the debris of wrecked adobe homes. Salvador Estrada, comandante of Mexican police across the line said four bodies had been found.

Two Women Drowned
Bodies of two unidentified women had been swept to the Arizona side. That of another was taken from a collapsed house.

One hotel, one two-story tenement house, and 20 other adobe homes collapsed between midnight and dawn as the surging water, five to six feet deep, tore through the two towns. Most of the damage, as well as the loss of life, was on the Sonora side where the brunt of the water's onslaught was borne.

More than 100 persons were homeless, while occupants of 50 other houses threatened with collapse, were ordered out by the Mexican police.

Appeal For Aid
The American Red Cross, the chamber of commerce and the Nogales, Arizona, branches of the American Legion sent out appeals for aid. These organizations reported.

Routing of Tourists to New Mexico from Texas Talked at Brownfield Session as Lubbock, Tatum Men Attend

Routing of tourists from Texas to southeastern New Mexico, in which Hobbs and Carlsbad are control points, was discussed Thursday afternoon at a meeting in Brownfield of chamber of commerce officials and business men representing Lubbock, Brownfield and Tatum.

Negro Nervous On Eve of His Electrocutation
Rainey Williams Scheduled to Die in Electric Chair Early Today for Attack on Negro at Port Arthur

MUNTSVILLE, Aug. 7. (AP)—The slottidly with which Rainey Williams, 28 year old negro, had faced the prospect of execution early tomorrow vanished late today and he appeared somewhat shaken.

Williams, accused of attempted attacks on several Port Arthur white women and convicted of criminal assault on Joyce Keller, a negro, was threatened with mob action three times before his court appearance. An angry group first sought him while he was in the Port Arthur jail but officers hurried through the crowd with him and took him to Beaumont. There two additional hands gathered about the jail, but each was dispersed by Sheriff W. W. Covington and his deputies.

Getting Nervous
The negro, found guilty July 2 after the jury had deliberated 18 minutes, had a negro minister in his cell, practically all day today. He was "bawling in and out," said Simmons, general manager of the prison system said, and told a brother who came to see him this afternoon that he would "meet his mother in heaven."

The brother, Mr. Simmons added, said none of the family would be here early tomorrow morning when Williams dies.

Two Negroes Are Lynched by Mob

MARION, Ind., Aug. 7. (AP)—Two negroes held in connection with the fatal shooting here last night of Claude Dexter, 25, of Fairmont, Ind., and an assault on his girl companion, were taken from the Grand county jail tonight and hanged on the courthouse square.

A mob estimated at 1,000 on its first attempt to enter the jail, was dispersed by tear gas bombs tossed by sheriff's officers. It returned, however, broke in, and removed Thomas Shipp, 18, and Abe Smith, 19.

Shipp was hung from the base of a window in the jail building and Smith from a tree on the courthouse square. The mob remained on the square, apparently undecided as to action regarding Herbert Cameron, the third man held.

Huston Flays Opponents as He Drops Post

Senator Fess, Robert Lucas Placed at Helm of Republican Party on Resignation of National Chairman

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7. (AP)—With a final blast at his opponents, Claudius H. Huston, of Tennessee, today formally ended his brief, but tumultuous career as chairman of the Republican national committee, and a new slate of officers, headed by Senator Fess of Ohio and Robert H. Lucas of Kentucky, was installed to take immediate charge of the party's fall campaign.

Senator Fess was named to succeed Huston and Lucas, commissioner of internal revenue, was appointed executive director.

Plans Changed
Changing plans at the last minute, the party chieftains also filled the vacancy in the national committee secretaryship, naming Geo. Deba Keim, a retired banker of Edgewater Park, N. J., to succeed Representative Franklin Fort of the same state, who resigned several months ago.

Two new national committeemen also were chosen. They were Ernest Lee Jahnke, assistant secretary of the navy, to succeed the late Emile Kuntz as committeeman from Louisiana, and Ezra R. Whittle, Coeur d'Alene, to fill the place as committeeman from Idaho from which this candidate's health and, the

'Ma' Ferguson Opens Race in Cooper Speech

Candidate Injects Money as Issue in Texas Gubernatorial Campaign; Flays Ross Sterling's Rich Support

Hogg Talk Quoted
First Texas Woman Governor Charges Opponent with an Attempt to Buy Governorship; Scores Dallas News

COOPER, Texas, Aug. 7.—The present campaign for Democratic nomination for governor is not "great," so much "because of the personnel of the candidates, but great because of the principles involved," Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson, Texas' first woman governor, trying to "come back" said here tonight in opening her run-off campaign.

She quoted from a speech at Houston by "the immortal Jim Hogg," as follows:
"The colossal power of wealth may thwart the will of the people for a season in Texas. Between knowledge and belief that the avicious hand of corporate power is again at the throat of Texas, the people, upheld by faith in their righteous duty, will press on to 'liberty's portal to shake it off, that they and their posterity may free forever.'"

These prophetic words were uttered more than a quarter of a century ago," she said. "Their wisdom and timely utterance have saved this state until now. But again this same hydra headed monster has raised its head in Texas and is once more endeavoring to enslave the people of Texas to do for our posterity what our fathers have done for us."

Flays Millionaires
"Intoxicated with the jingle of gold this same avaricious hand of corporate power has now pushed one of their number into this campaign for governor and every millionaire banker, every big corporation lawyer, every bond grabber, every big oil corporation are rallying around their candidate to defeat me in this campaign. Take from this candidate his health and, the

The man walked into the bank at 11:30 a. m. and waited until the noon hour, until everyone had left the bank excepting Lee Green, cashier. The intruder then brandished a pistol and compelled Green to give him a package of money containing \$500 in \$1 bills. He fled in a waiting automobile. He made no attempt to take money from the bank vault.

Green quickly gave the alarm and officers pursued the robber. Green said tonight.

Intensive membership drive of the Texas Cotton Cooperative association in Lubbock county continued Thursday with a community meeting at Idalou in the afternoon and three similar assemblies Thursday night. One night gathering embraced Foster, Wolffarth and Barton communities and the other two meetings were at Carlsile and Posey.

About 50 farmers attended the Idalou meeting. Chamber of Commerce Capt. M. H. Duncan reported and a dozen, either signed marketing agreements or already had done so. Others attending appeared enthusiastic, opposition being negligible, and a similar gathering will be conducted at Idalou within about two weeks, Duncan said.

Attorney Bares Plot Details In Lengthy Confession Given To Officers; Used Dynamite

Admitted Slayer Becomes More Cheerful After Telling of Efforts to Do Away with Mate; Confesses Infatuation With Former Secretary as Reason for Murder Plot

STINNETT, Aug. 7.—Dynamite which blasted to bits A. D. Payne's automobile June 27, killing his wife and maiming their 10-year-old son, was the last of five methods the Amarillo attorney had used in attempting to put his wife to death, Payne related today in a lengthy confession which he was still dictating, at a late hour.

Becoming more cheerful hourly, as though freeing himself from the clutch of a demon, the attorney who confessed to infatuation for a woman who formerly was his secretary, talked during the morning and afternoon.

To Sign Lengthy Confession
The 60-page transcript of his confession was expected to be ready for his signature late tonight.

According to officers who had read the part of the statement thus far transcribed, the attorney related that he first tried unsuccessfully to poison his wife, then tried asphyxiation, drowning, shooting, and at last, the dynamite charge planted beneath the driver's seat in their automobile.

Details of the attempts were lacking and were not expected to be available until the full text of the statement was released when completed tonight.

Plot Details Bared
Payne, according to officers, described in detail how he prepared the fatal dynamite charge, declaring that he had tried several days earlier to work the scheme out failed.

He said he used three sticks of dynamite, which he had carried in his car for a week, hidden in a sack of grain.

A fuse about three feet long was attached, according to the officers' report of his statement, and was placed over an improvised alcohol lamp. The fuse was kept away from the flame by a rubber band, held taut by a string tied to a pickaxe lying on the garage floor.

He lighted the lamp before leaving home to walk to town, on June 27, according to officers' account of his statement, and when the car was started by Mrs. Payne, the string broke, allowing the dynamite fuse to come in contact with the alcohol lamp's flame. The fuse led to three sticks of dynamite hidden in the sack of grain in the rear compartment of the coupe.

Daughters Not Included
The officers reported Payne declared he wished to kill only his wife and son, his two small daughters not being included in the death plot.

The dynamite charge was arranged a month before the fatal blast occurred. Payne was reported as confessing to Deputy Sheriff Charles Rebut of Amarillo and Sheriff W. N. Thompson of Amarillo. He said he bought the dynamite at a hardware store in Borger, several weeks before hand.

The bomb failed to explode two or three weeks before it finally was set off. Two rubber bands were then tied to the end of the fuse to pull it over the alcohol flame when the car started and a slip-noose secured to a stationary object in the garage and allowed the fuse to be pulled into place directly over the flame.

First Plan Perfected
After the first failure, Payne related he fixed a wire on the end of the fuse to connect with the rubber band, so the rubber would not be burned and cause the fuse not to ignite, as happened on the first attempt.

The car was backed into garage on the fatal morning. It had been driven seven blocks by Mrs. Payne when the blast occurred. Payne's statement related he had computed it would travel seventeen blocks.

Amarillo newspaper men recalled that the day after the blast, when they were inspecting the Payne garage, Payne had pointed out the pick lying on the floor and said, "If I were investigating this case, I would find out whether this pick had anything to do with the case." They said he added, "It probably did not, but I wouldn't leave a stone unturned."

Matches Pointed Out
He then turned, they declared, and pointed to some burnt matches lying near a gas jet on the floor of the garage and said, "Why are those matches lying here?"

THE POLICE SCHOOL

MEMBERS of the Lubbock Police department will go back to school on Monday. A Fort Worth police captain, experienced in the art of keeping public peace and in the operation of metropolitan police departments, will open a thirty day school for the cops here and every man on the local force will be required to take up the work. The move is a logical one and should react favorably to the efficiency of the Lubbock force.

Small city police departments are notoriously inefficient for the very logical reason that police work, like law and medicine, is a specialty and has its finer points which experience and study alone will uncover. In bringing an expert here to conduct a school for policemen, City manager Bryan Miller is displaying wisdom and his plan will undoubtedly receive the utmost in co-operation from the officers themselves.

No one would expect the staff of The Morning Avalanche to prepare, daily, a metropolitan newspaper of the acknowledged superiority of the New York Times, without study and the benefit of experience. Likewise, it is unjust to expect the Lubbock police department to handle its business with the accuracy and dispatch of a larger, more experienced department, without similar training.

When a town blossoms into the city class its police work, like its other lines of endeavor, takes on a more varied aspect. In order to handle the situation policemen must be trained along many avenues of public service.

The Avalanche unhesitatingly hails the innovation of a police school as a forward step and in so doing would make one point clear. The fact that the school is being held is no slur, no basis for criticism against the previous efficiency of the police department here. Rather, it is a progressive move which should be approved upon the ideal that city officials are going to all ends to improve the work of the officers.

POWER OF WILL

Doctors give "the will to live" as one of the strongest opponents of death.

When the mind accepts death as a foregone conclusion and surrenders, the fight against disease is almost hopelessly handicapped.

Lend Byron, in his youth, was told by a fortune-teller that he would die in his thirty-seventh year. The idea haunted him, and when he became ill after his thirty-seventh birthday anniversary he remembered the prophecy and, prompted by his superstitious belief in south-saying, said he was destined to die in that year. He died that year, but the conviction that his time had not yet arrived might have helped him get well.

A centenarian in an eastern town recently predicted that he would die on a certain day and at a certain hour. He died suddenly a half hour before the appointed hour. Doctors believe the strain of waiting for the end was too great for the aged man's heart and that he might have lived several years longer had his imagination not exposed his heart to the fate devised.

If he can make his patient determined to get well, the doctor considers the battle half won. But the fight is all up hill when the patient thinks he must die and is just waiting for the end.

FUTURE ROADS

Road engineers and chemists are not satisfied that they have evolved the best and cheapest kinds of materials for construction of highways that are hard, durable and smooth.

The modern concrete, asphalt and macadam surfacing is vastly superior to the old stone roads, with which the main problem was finding a good binder so that the broken stones would find adjustment and use, become moulded into a hard, even surface. Adoption of the materials and construction methods now in use was hastened by the rapidity with which the good roads movement sprang up in the wake of the automobile.

Now that most of the states have good roads and the maintenance cost has entered their budgets, the question arises whether there may not be devised through the resourcefulness of the chemist materials which could be worked into even better surfaces and with less cost and possibly with less wear upon machines.

And as yet the chemists who are interested in road construction seemingly have not found material that will fill the bill. Chemistry has done little for the building of roads other than to furnish some materials, but there are indications that new surfaces will be evolved through chemistry that will surpass anything yet produced.

Chemistry performs such wonders that it is not so much a question of the raw material with which it works as of the chemical structure of the material, and what takes place in the world of atoms. In some common substance of by-product it will find the improved material for the roads of tomorrow.

On the Firing Line at the Nation's Capital

GRANT UNLIKELY TO QUIT CAPITAL UNTIL PROGRAM IS COMPLETED

ASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—Lieut. Col. U. S. Grant III is due to be transferred from his post as director of Washington's public buildings and parks, under the army limiting military assignments in one place to four years.

However, here he remains. It is President Hoover's will. The president is commander-in-chief of the United States army. When he sets a military precedent aside, it goes.

Washington's parks, though numerous and important, do not matter so much.

As to public buildings, the capital is in process of being made over. Tourists who come here next year will hardly know how it used to look, except for a very few ancient landmarks.

The Capitol will still stand, externally practically unchanged, to be sure, and the Washington monument. There also will be here and there a department for which new quarters will not be ready quite that soon. Nevertheless, some of them already will have moved completely; some will have moved in part; the rest will at least be undergoing alterations.

It is Colonel Grant's task, as director of public buildings, to boss this job.

He is right in the midst of it.

Transferring him at present probably would result in a terrible jam.

The president wants no jam in connection with an undertaking, the cost of which runs well up into nine figures. Jams are too expensive, interrupting programs representing hundreds of millions.

As previously remarked, the Capitol will be here next year, as usual—though the United States supreme court will be preparing to abandon it, for its new building on the opposite side of the plaza.

There doubtless will be folk to offer a reminder that the White House architecture also will remain unmodified.

Outwardly, true enough.

Yet anyone will be badly mistaken who imagines that it is the same old White House that Colonel Grant found when he took over the Washington public buildings directorship.

One of the first things Director Grant did was to go over the White House. President Coolidge was its tenant then, figuratively speaking, with a microscope.

His verdict was that the roof was liable to fall in almost any night, and squash the president.

The executive mansion had been rickety, as a matter of fact, since Ulysses S. Grant lived in it. The latter's grandson was free to say that, in Calvin Coolidge's day, it had become positively dangerous.

What Director Grant did was euphemistically described as "restoring" the historic edifice. It would be more accurate to say that he replaced it.

Virtually, he enclosed it in a mould, to retain its outline, took out everything inside it, and reconstructed it of new materials—thus preserving all its time-honored associations, as sentimental people viewed the proceeding, but really creating a brand-new building.

Maybe the colonel did succeed in keeping the historic associations bottled up within his matrix, however. At any rate, he made a safe White House out of it.

In effect, the colonel combines just the divergent qualities that the national capital needs in the office on his particular job.

Strictly up to date in the matter of modern improvement, he yet respects genuine antiquity. Hard boiled on practical questions, he nevertheless realizes that plain utility is not quite all that Uncle Sam requires in city planning.

And the multiplicity of posts he fills! An army engineer, Director of public buildings and parks, Executive and disbursing officer of five different commissions, some of them of national scope. An associate on two more. A member of the Washington zoning board. District of Columbia motor transport co-ordinator.

Notabilities like President Hoover, Vice President Curtis, Speaker Longworth and the chief justice of the United States supreme court hold the chairmanships and other honorary positions on most of these bodies.

Colonel Grant does the actual work.

"Pooh Baha" like this is scarce. I wouldn't wonder if the army engineers' corps had to spare him indefinitely, until the capital's present building program is completed, anyway.

Your Health

HEART DISEASE DEATHS DOUBLE THOSE OF NEXT HIGHEST

EDITORS NOTE: This is the third of a new series of articles by Dr. Morris Fishbein on "Frontiers of Medicine," which will describe important advances in the history of medicine and problems that face doctors today.

It is possible to tell by listening to the beat of the heart and feeling of the pulse whether the heart is taking place satisfactorily and whether the blood is being pushed through the blood vessels and back to the heart as it ought to be. Such measurements are, however, loose determinations. A device has been discovered called the electrocardiograph, which measures by photographing waves on a photographic plate the changes in the beat and any disturbances of the mechanism of propelling the heart beat through the organs of the body.

In the same way, one may feel the pulse in the wrist with the finger, or one may attach to the wrist a device called the sphygmograph, which records the variations in the pulse beat on a moving strip of paper in such a way that the finest changes may be determined. The machine is far superior to the human finger in detecting changes.

Functioning the Heart

There was a time when it would have been considered equivalent to murder to push a needle into the sacs around the heart. Today, however, the physician extracts any fluid that has accumulated in that sac which he knows is there on the basis of his studies of the heart condition by the methods that have been mentioned. He does not hesitate to insert a needle and withdraw the fluid.

The best of the heart was first heard by a physician who placed his ear directly on the chest. Then came the discovery of the method of listening to the heart through a solid tube. Later more delicate devices were discovered which had a bell for collecting the sound, a membrane for amplifying, and rubber tubes to carry the sound to the ear. With the development of electric transmission of sound and later of amplification, it now becomes possible to step up the sound so that the variations may be easily determined.

Through examination of the heart after death in case of known disease, it is possible to correlate all of these observations made before death with the appearance of the heart and to know the significance of every part of the procedure for examination.

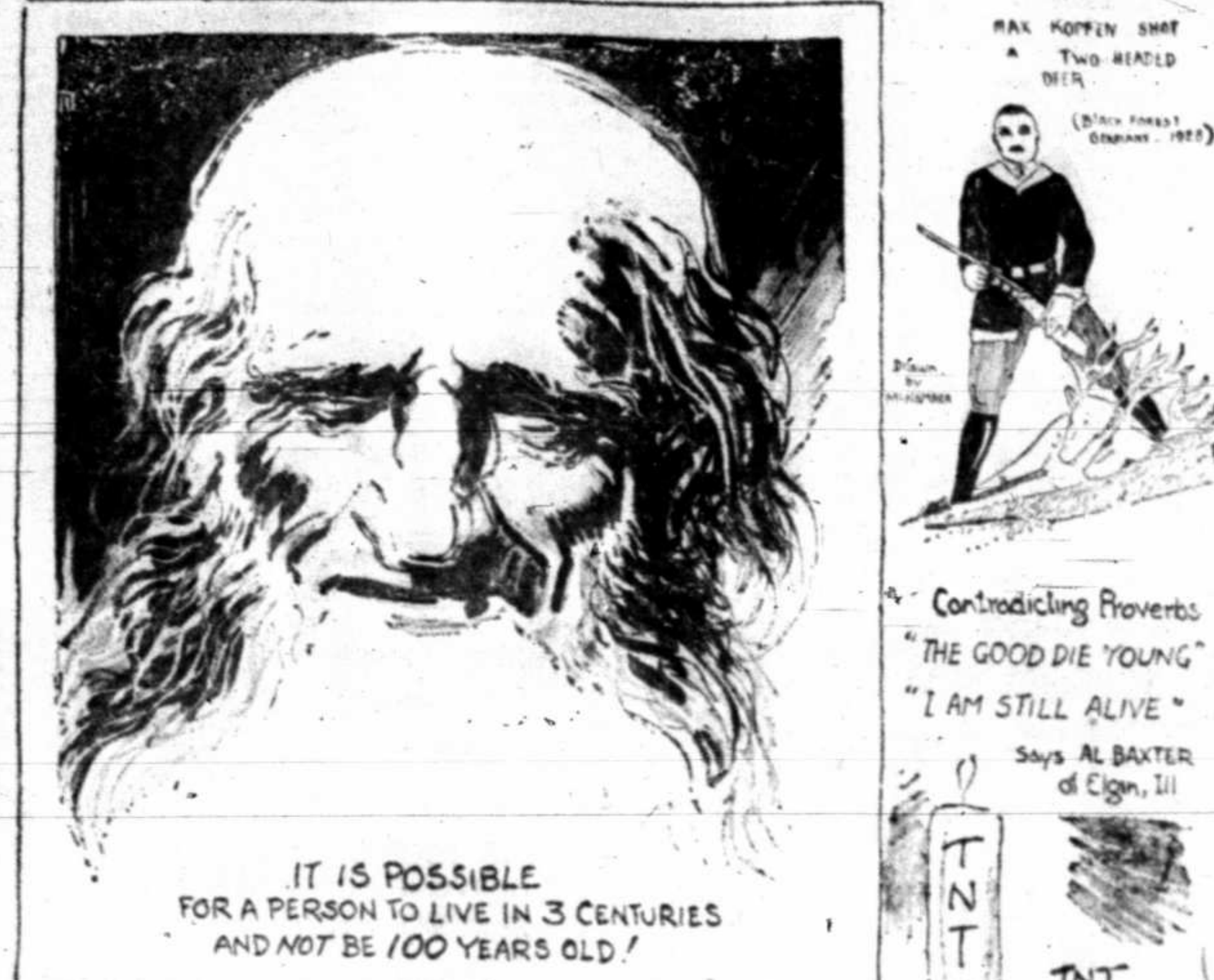
Of special interest to the patient, as well as to the doctor, is the question of how capable the heart may be of carrying on its work. To the specialist in heart disease a dozen or more functional tests are known whereby he can measure the capacity of the organ to withstand unusual effort.

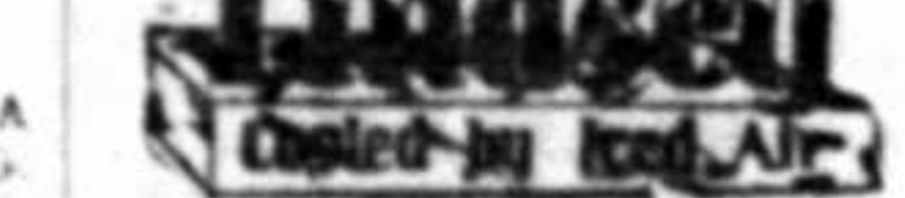
New Postoffice and Federal Building to Be Built

Hobbs Drilling Proves Costly

Lack of Mud Suitable to Use in Shutting Off Gas Forms Problem in Hobbs Field; to Ship in Necessary Material

(By Staff Correspondent.)
HOBBES, N. M., Aug. 7.—Drilling in the Hobbs oil field is expensive because of the depth at which oil is found and the lack of mud suitable for shutting off natural gas. Wells in the field cost between \$65,000 and \$90,000, depending upon the location, gas, and other factors. The average is estimated about \$75,000.

Mud that can be used successfully for shutting off the gas is imported as it is not available in the Hobbs field or in this section of New Mexico. It costs \$50 a ton to get the mud, in dry form, laid down in Hobbs. It is shipped by the carload by all of the big companies.

Cost Runs High
Sometimes, when gas pressure is heavier than usual, the cost of stemming the tide of gas will run up to \$35,000. This increases the cost of drilling to \$10,000 or more per well. Average mud costs per well are from \$25,000 to \$35,000, oil men estimate.

Because of the cost, operators are saving mud from the present wells. This is mixed with a little local mud that can be used and the cost cut.

More than \$2,000,000 has been spent for drilling of the 28 wells now producing in the field. Twice that much has been or will be spent on derricks already erected and the wells are expected to be producing wells within a short time.

Before January 1, it is probable that \$10,000,000 to \$12,000,000 will have been spent in drilling operations alone.

DOVE SEASON TO OPEN

Texas Nimrods to Get Chance At Feathered Prey Friday

AUSTIN, Aug. 7. (AP)—Texas nimrods will get their first chance to hunt feathered animals since January 31 with the opening Friday of the white-winged dove season.

Lack of Funds Halt Work on New Building

Construction on American Legion Home to Be Stopped on Saturday as Result of Shortage in Money

Lack of funds to complete the new American Legion home Saturday will necessitate a halt in construction of the building, it was announced Thursday by J. A. Raley, Jr., commander of Allen Bros. post. The legion home is being built directly north of the city hall on Texas avenue.

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Texas to Gain Congress Seats

Experts of Bureau of Census Occupied with Task of Dividing 435 Seats in House on Equitable Basis

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7. (AP)—Dividing up 435 seats in the house or representatives so each state will have an equitable share of members on the basis of its 1930 population today occupied experts of the census bureau.

The secretary of commerce has been directed by congress to submit on the first day of the December session a compilation of the population of the states and the number of members to which each is entitled under the method known as "major fractions."

Principle Adopted
That method, roughly, applies the principle of counting as unit any remainder more than half and the dropping of a remainder of less than one-half.

Application of this method to the first completed preliminary census figures indicated today twenty six seats would be affected in the coming reapportionment. Twenty states probably will lose one or more members. Ten states are expected to gain the twenty six seats. Legislatures in the states affected will have to rearrange their congressional districts before the election of 1932.

Texas probably will gain three additional seats in the reapportionment.

DALLAS, Aug. 7. (AP)—Sterling P. Strong of Dallas, high mart in the Democratic primary for lieutenant governor, will conduct an aggressive campaign for the nomination during the runoff, he said today on his return from Wichita Falls, where he held a conference.
