

Eagles Advance To Bi-District Play With Loop Longhorns

To Be Played on Forsan Field Tonight at 8

The Sterling City Eagles won the right to represent District 8-B in 6-Man Football with the win over Mertzon last Friday night 59-52. Actually tied with Forsan, the Eagles get the right to represent the by virtue of beating Forsan in regular district play. The Eagles only lost one game—the one to Christoval 40-39 here two weeks ago.

The Eagles beat the Mertzon Hornets by the score of 59-52 here last Friday night. The Eagles led with scoring all the way until the last quarter, and the Hornets began racking up scores with a widespread formation that stymied all of the Eagles' defense.

Scores accounted for by the locals were Melvin Foster—25 points, Lynn Glass—12, Bill Young—8, Jimmy D. McWhorter—8 and Kelton Gaston—6.

After gaining the right to represent district 8-B in play, the Eagles had to iron out arrangements for the bi-district game with Loop. A group of school men and interested fans, met with the Loop officials at the Settles Hotel in Big Spring on Monday night of this week. Loop would not hear of coming to Sterling City to play the game. The two schools then named Forsan and Ackerly as home fields. A guarantee of \$300 was made to Loop, and Sterling has the concessions and ticket sales. Programs are to be furnished by Sterling City also. This arrangement was thought best because of the poor condition of the Ackerly field and seating arrangements.

Admission will be \$1.00 for adults and 25c for students.

Winner of the Sterling City—Loop contest will play the winner of the Pyote—Dell City contest. The regional play-off will be decided after the winners are settled.

Making the trip to Big Spring Monday night to meet with the Loop officials were Coach W. L. Young, school superintendent O. T. Jones, School board president Worth B. Durham, and high school principal Weldon Snodgrass, and Chesley McDonald, R. T. Foster, Jr., Delbert Haralson, John Copeland, Marvin Churchill and H. A. Chapple.

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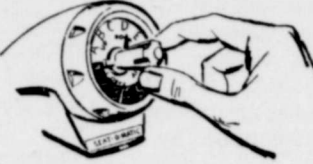
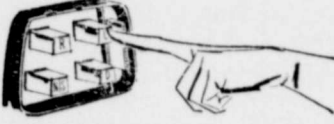
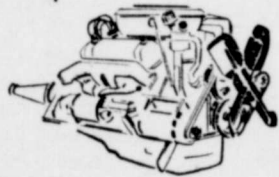
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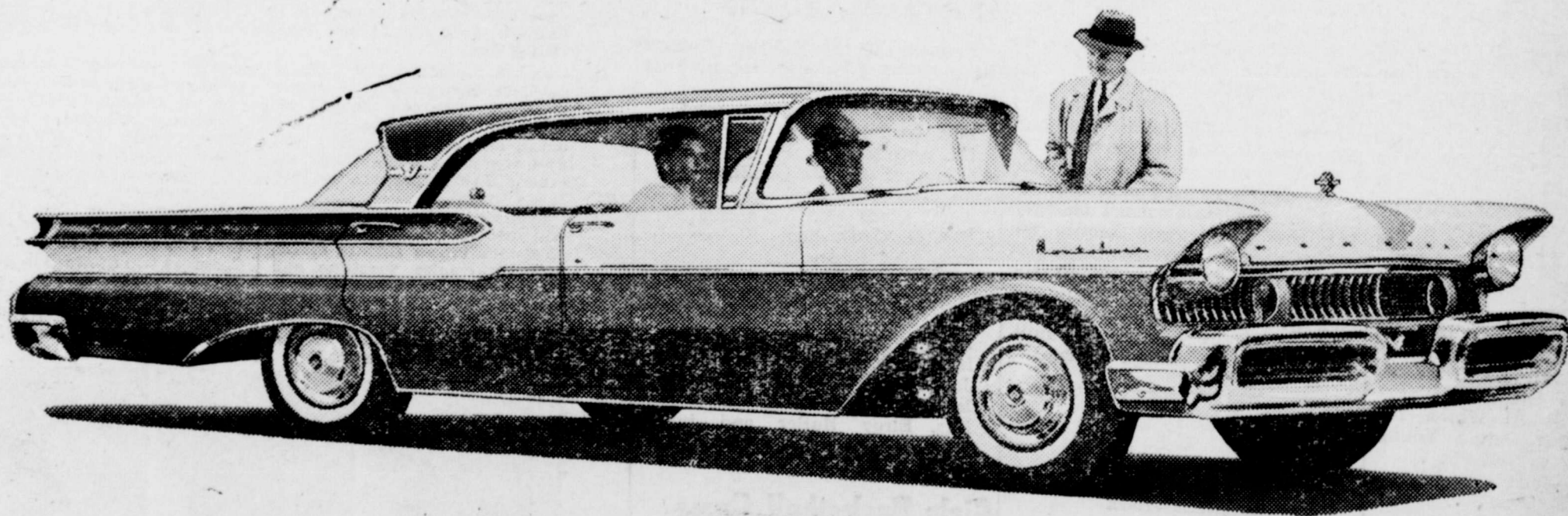
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Behind The 8 Ball

"MOTHER WANTS TO KNOW"



ALL THE TIME IS "SCHOOL TIME" FOR BABY!

Doctor, my friends' babies are all walking; some of them are even younger than mine. Why is he so late in starting?

Nearly every mother worries about her baby's growth, says Dr. Otto A. Faust, pediatric consultant to Beech-Nut Baby Foods, and wonders... is he learning fast enough? When will he walk? Why doesn't he talk yet?

She compares him with the baby down the block and worries if he doesn't seem to be making as much progress as other children. That's why it's important to know that your baby will learn, says Dr. Faust—if you don't push him, or rush him—in his own sweet time, and learn it better his way too!

You can help him over those first important learning hurdles, advises Dr. Faust, if you try to take constructive attitudes like these:

1. For one thing, try to drop "don't touch" from your vocabulary. Your baby's ten little fingers are vitally important to his growing awareness of the world. You know, every waking moment is "school time" for baby, who's busy discovering how to do a

thousand new things he must try himself, if he's ever to learn.

2. Don't let baby's messy table manners discourage you, says Dr. Faust. Even though more food gets on him than in him, let him try when he first gets the urge to feed himself, or you may find yourself feeding a lazy four-year-old later!

3. More than anything else, says Dr. Faust, encourage your child warmly! The desire for approval is one of the most elementary human needs. Just watch his face light up with pleasure the next time you praise him!

4. Don't expect too much. Each child reaches several "leveling off" periods of growth in which he may even seem to slip backward. Help him to cope with situations that seem a little big for him for the moment, until he gets his second wind again.

5. Although it's necessary to encourage a "do" atmosphere in your baby's world, when the "don'ts" really matter be sure your baby recognizes them, says Dr. Faust. Teach him the dangers of fire, knives and scissors, the rights of others and the limits he must observe to be safe.

Outstanding accomplishment in 4-H Tractor, Soil Conservation, Safety, and Poultry programs won top state honors for Texas Club members. Their reward is an all-expense trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, Nov. 25-29.

Knowledge, skill, and good judgment are important factors in getting the most out of the 4-H Tractor program, and Frank Morton, 16, of Wichita Falls has all three. A week at Club Congress provided by Stanolind Oil & Gas Co. is his reward.

A 4-H'er for seven years, Frank learned that care is more important than repair for maximum tractor operation. He assisted with county tractor school in 1954 and encouraged 4-H boys to fill out tractor maintenance books. Outstanding in tractor demonstrations, he is president of the Wichita County 4-H tractor club.

Frank also is a good business man, having made a nice profit raising grand champion steers. Ralph Swinford is his leader.

The 4-H Soil and Water Conservation program means a lot to Arden Walker, 17, and his family's farm in Jayton. As state winner he will be honored by Firestone Tire & Rubber Co., donor of his Congress trip.

A 4-H'er for seven years Arden practices all phases of soil and water conservation. Subsoiling for deeper moisture penetration, brush traps, crop rotation and stubble mulching are employed. He is now working on a mesquite control program.

Arden won district honors twice, was secretary of his club and past president of the county 4-H council. His local leader is W. E. Walker.

Safety first, last and always is the motto of Mary Sellers of Whitesboro. By participating in

the national 4-H Safety program, this 17 year old girl assumes a responsibility to make the farm, community, and the nation a safer place.

Mary and her sister conducted a survey on their farm and corrected light hazards. With the farmers' cooperation they placed 500 placards on various hazards they found on farms. The largest number of hazards found on one farm was 54, the smallest, 17.

She has tested 25 wells in the community as a safety measure against disease. She and her sister gave safety demonstrations at the Texas safety convention.

With help and encouragement from her local leader, Mrs. Cecil Sellers, Mary completed 13 projects. General Motors, which has supported 4-H work for 12 years, provided her trip.

In a manner of speaking, Virgil Polocsek's hen laid the golden egg that turned into a week's expense-paid trip to the Club Congress. Living on a farm near Big Foot this 17 year old chalked up a remarkable record in the 4-H Poultry program. Sears Roebuck Foundation is donor of his trip.

Now in his sixth year of Club work, Virgil is handling some 5000 pullets, laying hens, and broilers. He carried 5 projects involving swine, grain, garden, and health. Virgil's industry and skills have produced substantial profits. John Field is the local 4-H leader.

Rabies Discussed By County Agent

Rabies has long been one of the dread diseases and is still one for which scientists have no cure once the disease has become present in man or animal. No one in medical history has ever recovered once the disease has begun its course; records of rabies go back thousands of years dating to the pre-Christian era.

Prevention is the key and even though the United States leads the world in the fight against disease, we are far behind the rest of the world in the fight for prevention of rabies. Many countries have completely eradicated the disease. We are fortunate in that we do have a vaccine that can be given to the family pets each year to protect them. We also have the Pasteur treatment that is given to persons bitten by rabid animals or animals suspected of being rabid.

Most of the rabies that we find now can be traced back to some form of wildlife since most of the dogs and pets around the home are vaccinated annually. Foxes, skunks, squirrels, bats, rats, and rabbits are just a few of the wild species that carry and transmit the disease. Domestic animals such as cows, horses, hogs, sheep, goats and dogs and cats are well known carriers.

There are several symptoms of the disease that should be known to all. Any time a wild animal comes around the premises or people, we should be on the lookout. This is not a natural action of the animal and we should destroy that animal. It is not natural for wild animals, notably foxes and skunks, to be attracted to people or buildings and when we find one that reacts in this way or starts fights with animals on the place or refuses to run, we should destroy the animal before it can cause more trouble.

There are two forms of rabies. One, the furious type, is well-known to nearly everyone. In the furious form the animal becomes aggressive, snaps at various objects placed before it and will attack other dogs, people or even objects such as cars or buildings. If confined in a cage the animal will attack the bars, often breaking teeth. Dogs will roam for miles from place to place fighting dogs, or other animals and then moving on. In this way the disease is spread over a wide area.

In the dumb type which is less well known, the animal is not vicious, has no tendency to bite or fight or roam and is not excitable. The outstanding symptom here is paralysis of the lower jaw or throat muscles. The paralysis progresses and the animal finally dies. Each year a number of people take treatments for rabies because they thought the animal had something in its throat and they attempted to remove it only to find that the animal was rabid. If there is something in the animal's throat, the animal will cough or try to remove the object in some way. In rabies there is no motion or attempt to do this.

If a pet is suspected or having rabies, confine the animal for observation for observation. If it is rabies, the animal will die within 10 days. The head should then be removed and sent to the State Health Department for laboratory examination. In the case of wild animals, kill the animal and pay close attention to your pets even though they have been vaccinated in the last year. The head of the animal should be sent off and if rabies is confirmed, any pets bitten by the animal will have to be destroyed if not previously vaccinated.

If you are bitten by an animal and suspect it of having rabies, lock that animal up for observation and consult your physician. He can tell you what steps to take.

Tourists Visit Bible Lands On Paris-Baghdad Autobus

With the inauguration of a de luxe autobus service between Western Europe and the Middle East, it now becomes possible for the tourist to travel from Paris to Baghdad by land, a stretch of 4,500 miles covering ten of the world's most interesting countries and almost a fourth of the earth's surface, at a total transportation cost of less than \$135.

The first leg of the journey is from Paris to Munich in Southern Germany by French National Railroads, the second from Munich to Beirut on the shores of the Eastern Mediterranean by the Orient-Europa Pullman Line and the third from Beirut to Baghdad on the Tigris River by the Desert Train of the Nairn Transport Co. The countries traversed are France, West Germany, Austria, Yugoslavia, Greece, Turkey, Syria, Lebanon, Jordan and Iraq.

Once in Beirut, home of the American University, the tourist is within a few hours drive or flight from Baalbek, the Graeco-Roman "City of the Sun," Damascus, the world's oldest inhabited city, the Crusader Cas-

ties and Cathedrals of the Levantine coast, Jerusalem and the nearby Biblical towns with the Holy Places of Christendom, the rose-red city of Petra in southern Jordan, Cairo with its Pyramids and Sphinx and the ruins of Luxor and Asswan in Upper Egypt.

If one chooses to go directly to Baghdad, he may take the Nairn Autobuses from Beirut or Damascus straight across the Syrian Desert through country made famous by Lawrence of Arabia. As the city of a "thousand and one nights," Baghdad is dotted with museums, mausoleums and mosques, including the golden-domed Mosque of Kadhmain, a Moslem shrine, and is washed by the waters of the Tigris River.

Within an hour's drive is Ctesiphon, once the winter palace of the Sassanian Kings with its enormous brick arch, and within two hours are the ruins of Babylon, once the site of the Hanging Gardens and the Tower of Babel. 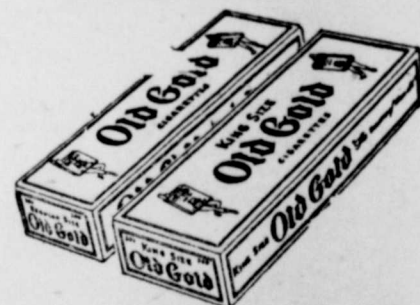

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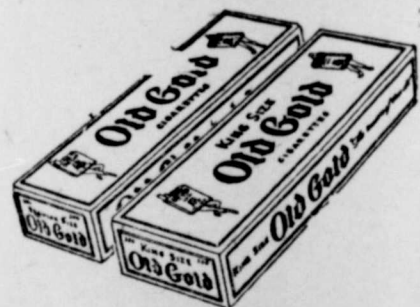
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
