SOME DEMOCRATS SURPRISED

Governor Readies Slate For State Convention

"Connally Coordinators" gave the stamp of approval to Abilene attorney Tom Gordon and Big Spring newcomer Mrs. Kate Irons as their choice to be nominated for 24th Senatorial District spots on the State Democratic Executive Committee.

The "Coordinators" — chosen representatives of Governor Connally will now return to their home counties to sell the slate to county dele-

gates to the state convention. Passed by in the Abilene session was incumbent committee woman Mrs. Betty Station of Sweetwater who said she "wasn't invited" to the meeting. She is currently in her second term at the post and said Friday that she "was still interested in the committee position."

Selection of Mrs. Irons as choice for committee woman came as a surprise to many

loyal Democrats in the area who told the Record that she had never taken active part in Democratic politics to their knowledge.

In Mrs. Irons' hometown of Big Spring, Democratic officials said, "old line Democrats were amazed" at her being chosen by the Abilene group.

Big Spring sources told the Record that Mrs. Irons had never taken an active part in Democratic campaigns to their knowledge.

No Mitchell County representatives were present at the meeting.

The Abilene meeting, of course, was not official, but designed to get a base of nominees for the coordinators to sell to delegates in their home counties prior to the state convention.

Official nomination and election to the committee will be accomplished in Austin at the Sept. 20 state convention.

Most Mitchell County Democratic delegates were not notified of the Wednesday meeting. County Chairman R. H. Hamill said he was out of town, but did not receive any word on the meeting.

Reports received here said Will Davis, secretary of the State Democratic Committee, had asked Abilene attorney Raleigh Brown to call the meeting. Brown presided at the session.

Others receiving the blessing of the "Connally Coordinators" were Mrs. Barton Kirtley Jr. of Young County to serve on the platform and resolutions committee with Leon Thurman of Jones County as alternate.

Topped for a spot on the credentials committee was Rupert Jackson, Baird attorney, with alternate John Earl Beall of Albany.

In addition Harvey Jones of Winters to the nomination of party officials and the permanent organization committee along with Jimmy Waddell of Fisher County as alternate.

M. C. Outlaw of Post would be on the canvassing and party nominees committee with Bob Herron of Haskell as alternate.

Colorado City Schools Opens Doors Wednesday Quickly

Three months of summer vacation ends Wednesday for students in the Colorado Independent School District as classes open for the fall term.

Faculty for the system was completed this week with the hiring of two new instructors and transfer of another to fill a vacancy.

Hired was Mrs. Mary Lois Coffin, a graduate of Southern State College, who will teach junior high PE for girls, and John Southall, a Texas Western College grad, to teach math in high school. Mrs. Dorothy Fowler has been moved from special education to the remaining fifth grade spot.

An 8:30 a.m. coffee Monday will honor faculty members and teaching aides in the new high school cafeteria.

The annual affair is sponsored by the education committee of the Chamber of Commerce.

General faculty meeting begins at 9 a.m. Monday following the coffee in the cafeteria.

Faculty meetings for the respective schools will be held at 10:30 a.m. Monday on the individual school campuses.

Students in grades 1-6 are asked to report Tuesday, from 9 a.m. until noon for room assignment, issuance of textbooks and payment of fees.

Junior high students who have not picked up their schedules are asked to do so

Monday or Tuesday 8 a.m. until 4 p.m. On the first day of school junior high students meet in the auditorium for the first period.

Times for classes to begin and end at the various schools are as follows:

Primary — 8:40 a.m. start with first and second graders dismissed at 2:30 p.m. and third graders at 3 p.m.

Junior High — 8:45 a.m. and 3:45 p.m.

Colorado High — 8:30 a.m. and 2:45 p.m.

Buses will leave at 8:25 a.m. to transfer sixth and seventh graders to Wallace Junior High and Hutchinson schools.

Parents are asked to have their children at the two locations promptly at 8:25 a.m. for transfer to Wallace. All buses in the system will

begin their regular runs Wednesday morning except for the bus to Fort Cook Jr. High, Fortson Road.

Final check on the opening program at various campuses is expected to be completed by the start of school except for some work to be done in the summer. All highways are expected to be in operation.

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Spraying Started Quickly

First reported case of encephalitis in Mitchell County was reported Saturday morning.

John Hall, 17, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Hall of Lawrence, is in Lubbock hospital with the disease.

Large-scale action was taken by health authorities Saturday and through spraying of the Lawrence area was begun by Colorado City units.

A complete spraying in Colorado City was completed Saturday morning according to city officials and additional spraying was scheduled for Monday.

Dr. Bruce Johnson, Lawrence physician, said the girl was first reported ill early last week and was transferred to Lubbock where the disease was diagnosed as encephalitis.

Form of encephalitis contracted by Miss Hall was not known Saturday.

City Health Officer Dr. Kenneth Cusack said, "We anticipate no problems in Colorado City."

He noted the city had added insurance against the disease this year spraying.

The physician urged all residents to check on their premises and vacant lots for mosquitoes where water could collect and serve as a breeding ground for the disease-carrying Culex mosquitoes.

He said old tires were particularly good havens for the mosquitoes.

City spraying units are using Malathion combined with diesel to spray in the cities.

In general a farm owner, tenant or sharecropper is eligible to vote if he is eligible to take part in one or more of the programs administered by the ASCS committees. Eligibility to vote or hold office is not restricted by reason of race, color, creed or national origin.

Envelopes containing marked ballots may be returned or mailed to the ASCS county office anytime before Sept. 7. Ballots will be tabulated publicly by the county committee on Sept. 12 at 8:30 a.m. in the ASCS office.

In the current election three regular members and two alternates will be elected for each committee.

Chairman, vice chairman and third regular member of the elected ASCS county committee will also serve as delegates to the county convention.

Principal speaker for the occasion was F. Wainwright Bleasdale, South Central Area ASCS Area Director who was introduced by Bland Harrison of Stamford, State ASCS Fieldman. Mr. Bleasdale told the group the 1967 cotton production regulations would seek to maintain a better balance between supply and demand, that producers wishing a price support program would have to cooperate in acreage reduction regulations and that there was little chance of any changes in present shipment regulations.

AFTER VIET NAM

Pfc Robertson Gets Reassignment Order

"It's got to be done. Somebody's got to do it," is the simple way Pfc Tom H. Robertson sums up action in Viet Nam where he was stationed for a year.

Pfc Robertson, 28, is scheduled to leave today for Fort Campbell, Kentucky, for reassignment with the 101st Airborne Division.

His duty in Viet Nam was with the 1st Cavalry in the Southerland Highlands, at Pleme, near the Cambodian border.

Pfc Robertson would have liked to see Saigon, where some men of his outfit were sometimes sent for rest. He didn't get to Saigon. And his last was in the hottest part of Viet Nam.

He arrived back in the States July 21 and was given 30 days leave plus eight days travel time. He has been visiting his father, Tom E. Robertson, Snyder Highway here.

The leave and visit, look forward to for a year, was not altogether a happy one for Pfc Robertson. He was in Colorado City when news of the death in Viet Nam of his friend and "buddy" Tom Davis reached here.

Robertson and Davis enlisted together January 14, 1965, in Abilene. They trained to-

gether as paratroopers and were separated only because Pfc Davis was recovering from jump injuries when the unit was shipped to Viet Nam.

Pfc Robertson, former Col-

orado High School pupil, has again, he said, "Well, it's got to be done. Somebody's got to do it." He completed his high school to be done. And somebody has to do it since joining the Army, got to do it.
