The Wheeler Mustangs got back on the winning side of the ledger last Friday night when they whipped the previously undefeated Vega Longhorns 21-0 in Vega in the Mustangs first game away from Nicholson Field.

It was a ragged game offensively for the Mustangs who played well on defense however to thwart any Longhorn threat. The Longhorns never got closer to the Mustangs end zone than the Wheeler 26.

Fumbles and penalties hurt Wheeler and the Mustangs had a 65 yard TD run by Danny Benefield wiped out in the fourth quarter by a clipping fine. The Mustangs saw another promising drive that had reached the Longhorn 12 with a first down go down the drain when they

were flagged for holding.

Wheeler built a 14-0 halftime lead and cranked up for their first touchdown midway of the first quarter after taking over on their 45 via a Vega punt. On second down, a Mustang pass was intercepted at the Vega 28 but the Longhorns quickly gave the ball up or first down with a fumble. Bubba Smith recovered Klay Waters fumble at the Vega 28 and nine plays later, Bubba Smith climbed left guard from four yards out. Richard Smith's PAT kick was wide right and with 0:36 to play in the opening period, Wheeler led 6-0.

Bobby Sword recovered another Longhorn bobble at the Wheeler 47 early in the second quarter and the

PANHANDLE PANTHERS ARE MUSTANGS FOE THIS WEEK

The Wheeler Mustangs can't savor their 21-0 win over Vega very long as they have the unenviable task of going on the road once more Friday to face the Panhandle Panthers with the kickoff slated for 7:30.

The Panthers have dominated Class AA football in the Panhandle the past few years and although they only have a 2-2 record thus far in 1986, the Panthers are once again picked to win their district and advance to the playoffs.

Panhandle has whipped Boys Ranch and Stinnett and lost to River Road and Frith. Their record is somewhat misleading as turnovers killed the Panthers in both of their losses. Winning over Stinnett last week, the Panthers were able to eliminate their turnovers running out of the Houston Veer and were able to whip the strongest team they have played to date.

Wheeler will have to contend with an experienced ball club as Panhandle puts six seniors on the field both on offense and defense.

"Not only will we have to defense the veer but Panhandle throws the ball well", head coach Preston Smith said this week. The Panthers possess better than average speed which makes their two pronged attack hard

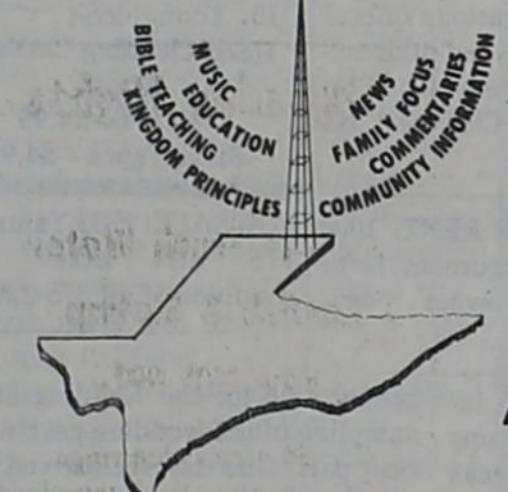

KPDR SOON TO BE AT 3000 watts

KPDR will soon be operating at 3000 watts. When we do, we will cover an area in excess of 40 miles in all directions. Presently, we are reaching 15 miles in every direction and 20 in most with some hearing us as much as 40 miles from Wheeler. We are functioning in a testing mode of operation while waiting on the big transmitter. The stand-by transmitter being used now is giving us a power output of about 250 watts and we are only operating from a height on the tower of about 120 feet. When the engineer installs the other transmitter to raise us to 3000 watts, he will also complete the engineering on the tower and

raise the antennas to the top of the 400 foot tower. This will put our signal way on out beyond the 40 mile radius. The circle will include Pampa, Elk City, Sayre, Wellington, and Canadian and all within it. (Actually, we have had one report of being heard in Kingsmill, a report of being heard near Borger, and a report of being heard 19 miles south of Sayre). This means that when we are at full power, many people in the panhandle and western Oklahoma will be able to hear KPDR. 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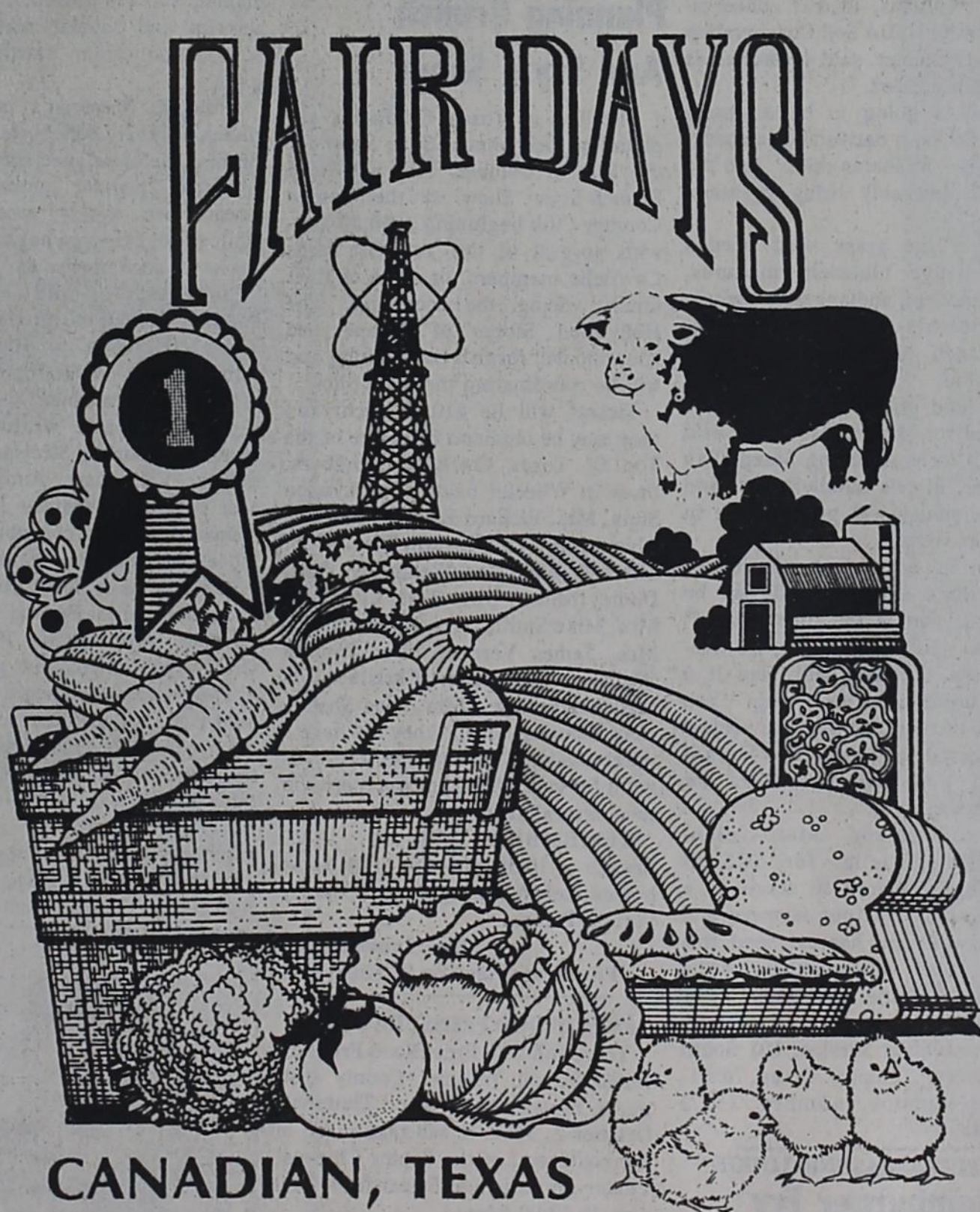

Agriculture Soil Conservation Service

If you have grasses or forbs that can be harvested for seed this fall, you might make a bundle of money.

That's because at least five million pounds of seed will be needed to plant 1.1 million of land accepted in the Conservation Reserve Program in Texas this year.

And with another sign-up expected this winter, the demand could be even greater.

Lavon Williams, district conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service at Wheeler, said several kinds of seed are needed.

"There is going to be a strong demand for both native and introduced species," Williams said. "And the seed will probably bring premium prices."

Some of the grass seed needed include native bluestem mixtures, little bluestem, indiagrass, switchgrass, sideoats grama, blue grama, King Ranch bluestem, and green sprangletop.

Since land placed in the CRP can be leased for hunting, seed for wild plum and forbs including Maximilian sunflower, illinois bundleflower, and engelmannsdaisy will probably be in very short supply.

"If you have land that can produce any of these seeds and it can be harvested, now is the time to act," Williams said. "Removing all live-stock from the land will give it a chance to produce a seed crop. "You may also recommend that you contact a commercial seed grower to learn if you can work out a contract for handling the seed."

Richard Heizer, state plant materials specialist for SCS at Temple, has offered to serve as a clearing house to put farmers and ranchers who can harvest seed this year in contact with members of the Texas Seed Trade Association. For information, write Richard Heizer, Soil Conservation Service, 101 South Main Street, Temple, Texas 76501-7682, telephone number (817) 774-1294.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service is cooperating with the Internal Revenue Service in offering Tax Practitioner Workshops across the State, reports Don King, County Extension Agent. Twenty-six General Workshops will be held in all major Texas cities. The General Workshop nearest our county is in Amarillo on October 30-31. There will also be fourteen Advanced Workshops offered in major cities. The General Tax Workshops will concentrate mostly on personal taxes -- the Advanced Workshops' emphasis will be on business tax problems.

In addition to the General and Advanced Tax Workshops, there will be three Partnership Workshops, four Estate Planning and Tax Form Preparation Workshops, four Problem Resolution Workshops, and -- new this year -- three workshops dealing with Income Taxation of Trusts and Estates.

The Tax Practitioner educational program has been highly successful. Last year about 4,400 people participated in this state-wide series. These practitioners reported filing more than 519,000 tax returns. 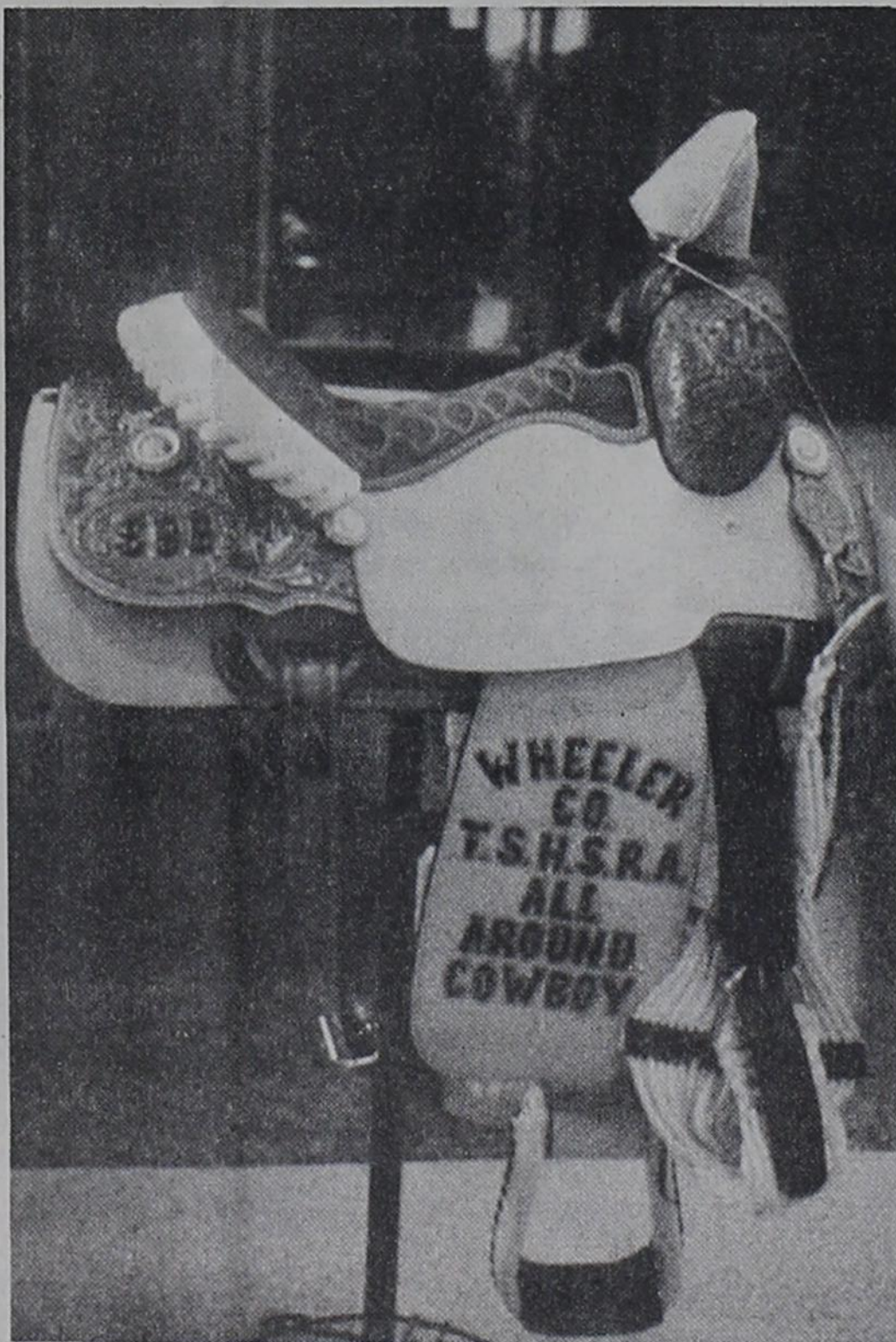
