A letter of commendation said he made valuable contributions in the work of salvaging vessels damaged by enemy action at Pearl Harbor where he was stationed at the time of the sneak attack, Dec. 7, 1941, by the Japs.

The letter said in part:

"During the course of these operations, you made numerous dives inside and alongside damaged and submerged vessels under difficult and hazardous conditions, and by sustained individual effort, requiring courage and skill, you contributed in a large measure to the success of the diving phase of this important work."

Tire Inspection: T bookholders every 6 mos., or every 5,000 miles, whichever comes first. No tire inspection required on passenger cars except to obtain tire replacements.

ACREAGE IN 1944

"Because cotton is a war crop, there are now no restrictions on production. The 1944 acreage goal is slightly above last year's planted acreage. We have not had to expand production to meet the war demand for lint, but we have great need for its meal, oil and hulls." War Food Administrator Marvin Jones said in a recent broadcast of importance to every cotton grower who has land and equipment best adapted to cotton growing. "Cotton is our largest single source of vegetable oil, about half of the total supply. Of all fats and oils, both animal and vegetable, cottonseed oil is second only to lard as a cooking fat, and second only to butter as a source of table fat," he added.

Stressing the importance of producing grades, staples, and qualities of cotton needed today, the War Food Administrator urged more careful harvesting and ginning to produce the kinds of cotton needed. He discussed the many problems of lint cotton exports and supplies, calling attention to the need for careful planning along practical lines by cotton leaders, adding, "If they do that wisely, cotton will always be a source of happiness and a means of livelihood for many people in the United States."

Discussing cottonseed, Jones said: "It should be remembered that for every 500 pound bale of cotton lint, there are produced 990 pounds of cottonseed. Not a pound of this seed is wasted, not even the hulls. This 990 pounds of cottonseed yields 140 pounds of vegetable oil for food, 400 pounds of meal and cake for livestock feed, about 240 pounds of hulls for feed and chemical use, and — finally — 80 pounds of linters for smokeless powder, plastics and other things. The linters alone, which are just the fuzz on the cottonseed, are the best natural form of alphacellulose, for making smokeless powder. Out of these same linters, they make the transparent section of bombing planes and the finest synthetic yarns and fabrics."

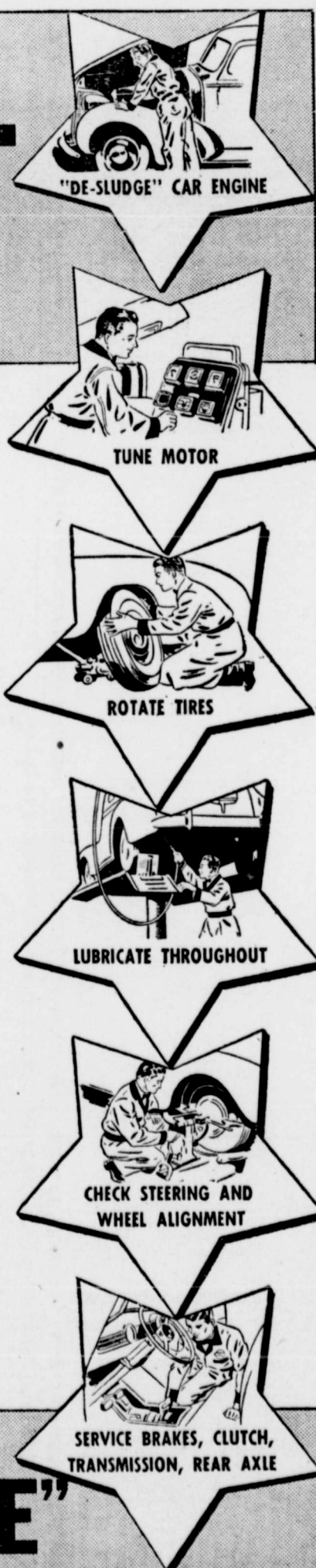

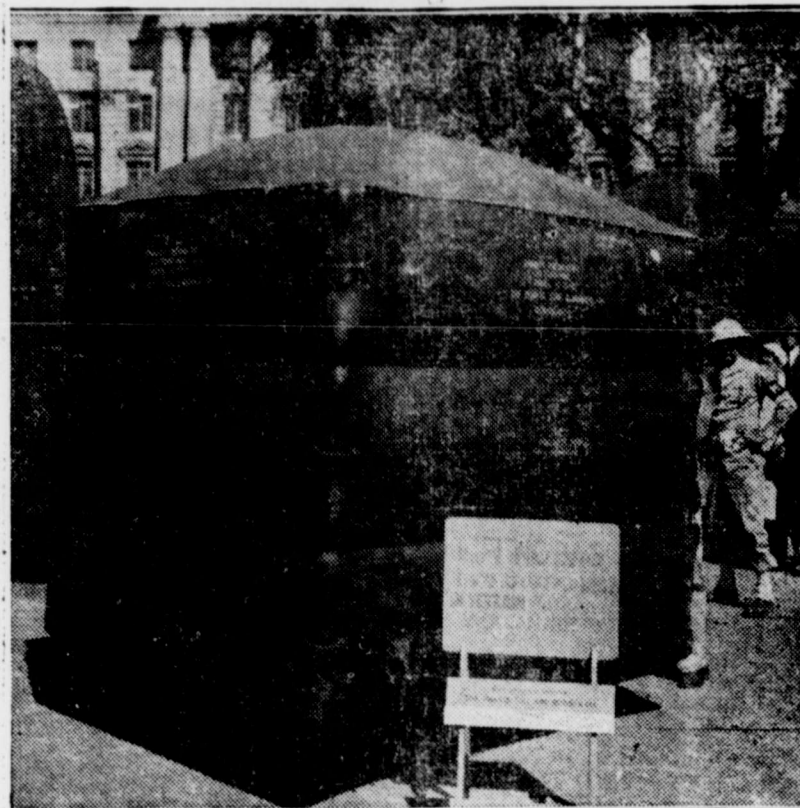
